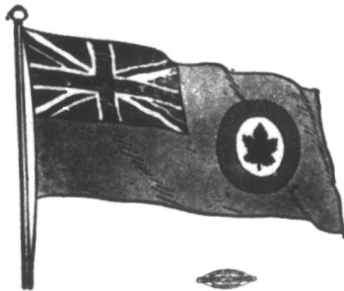

REMUSTERING OF AIRMEN

GENERAL

Airmen of the RCAF, unless enlisted into a specialized trade under special authority are enlisted as Standard Tradesmen or Standard (General Duties). Subsequent to examination by the Trade Selection Board at No. 1 "M" Depot, Standard Tradesmen are allocated to the various official trades in the RCAF.

REMUSTERING TO AIRCREW

Standard (General Duties) and Tradesmen are required to complete six months service in such capacity or in their trade, subsequent to enlisting or remustering to Standard (General Duties), before being eligible for remustering to aircrew.

To be otherwise eligible for remustering for aircrew an airman must be within the required age limit, not have reached his 35th birthday; must have the required educational standard, not less than two years high school or equivalent; must be medically fit to aircrew standards.

If an airman is desirous of remustering for aircrew training he is advised to consult his Unit Educational Officer in respect to his educational standard. Subsequently airmen should apply to their Flight or Squadron Commander advising of their desire to be considered for recommendation for remustering for aircrew training. All airmen recommended by their Flight or Squadron Commander are to be interviewed by their unit or station C.O. and if considered suitable in all respects for aircrew training they will be required to take Educational and Ability to Learn Tests. Subsequently station or unit C.O. will select and recommend the best qualified airmen for recommendation for remustering for aircrew training in accordance with quotas laid down from time to time by Air Force Headquarters.

It is to be understood by all airmen that recommendation made by C.O. for recommendation for aircrew training are to be in recognition of exemplary character and meritorious service in the discharge of their duties in ground trades or as Standard (General Duties) and further that the ultimate selection of airmen for such training is to be governed by the numbers of trained personnel which may be available as replacements for those so selected, to ensure that RCAF ground services are not disrupted. Under these conditions it may be necessary from time to time to prohibit the remustering of airmen for aircrew training from certain ground trades.

REMUSTERING STANDARD (General Duties) TO TRADE

An opportunity is provided for Standard (General Duties) airmen to remuster to RCAF ground trades which are not over-established in the service. Airmen are required to have obtained through contact training or their own efforts, a sufficient knowledge of the trade to which they wish to remuster equivalent to that required of a "C" Group Tradesman. Airmen who consider that they have obtained the required standard of knowledge are to make application, to their Flight or Squadron Commander, to be brought before the Command Trade Test Board to their unit. If successful in their trade test the remustering of the airman to Group "C" of the trade will follow.

REMUSTERING TRADE TO TRADE

Tradesmen who have received a course of instruction at an RCAF Trade School or who have advanced in their trade by contact training, are of definite value to the service in their trade. For this reason airmen are not generally allowed to remuster to another trade unless it is found that the airman is equally or better qualified in other duties. All remusterings so permitted are required to be in the general interests of the service and not of the individual.

TURVEY CUP COMPETITION

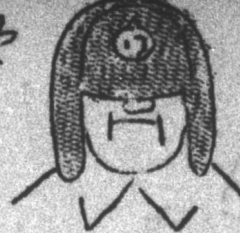

The Club held their last meeting Wednesday, December 2, in the games room of the officers' mess. Mrs. G. W. LaRocque presiding.

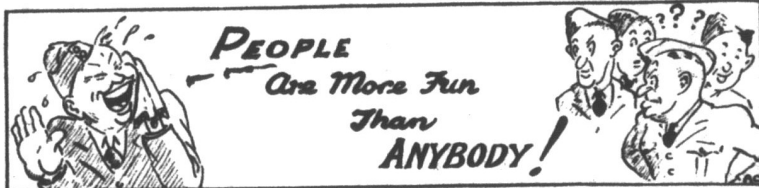
Several sweaters and pairs of socks were completed and turned in.
