NATIONAL DEFENCE

DELIVERY OF CF-5 PLANES— STORAGE AT NORTH BAY

Mr. A.D. Hales (Wellington): Mr. Speaker, may I direct a question to the Minister of National Defence. It has to do with the tactical ground support air fighter known as the CF-5. Have the balance of the 115 CF-5's been delivered by Canadair? Second, in view of the shortage of storage space at Trenton, is the minister planning or arranging to dismantle these aircraft and store them at North Bay?

Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, my most recent information is that the assembly line will be delivering both NF-5's for the Netherlands government and CF-5's for another several months. I believe I am correct in saying that some of the aircraft are in temporary storage now at North Bay. I can inform the hon. member that we will be submitting the CF-5 to trials in Norway for the balance of this month. I would hope to be able to make a statement about the middle of March, probably to the committee on defence, with respect to the use of the aircraft.

Realizing the accident potential of the situation he took positive steps to improve this deplorable trend. To date his programme has been so successful in training command that similar programmes are being established throughout the Canadian armed forces.

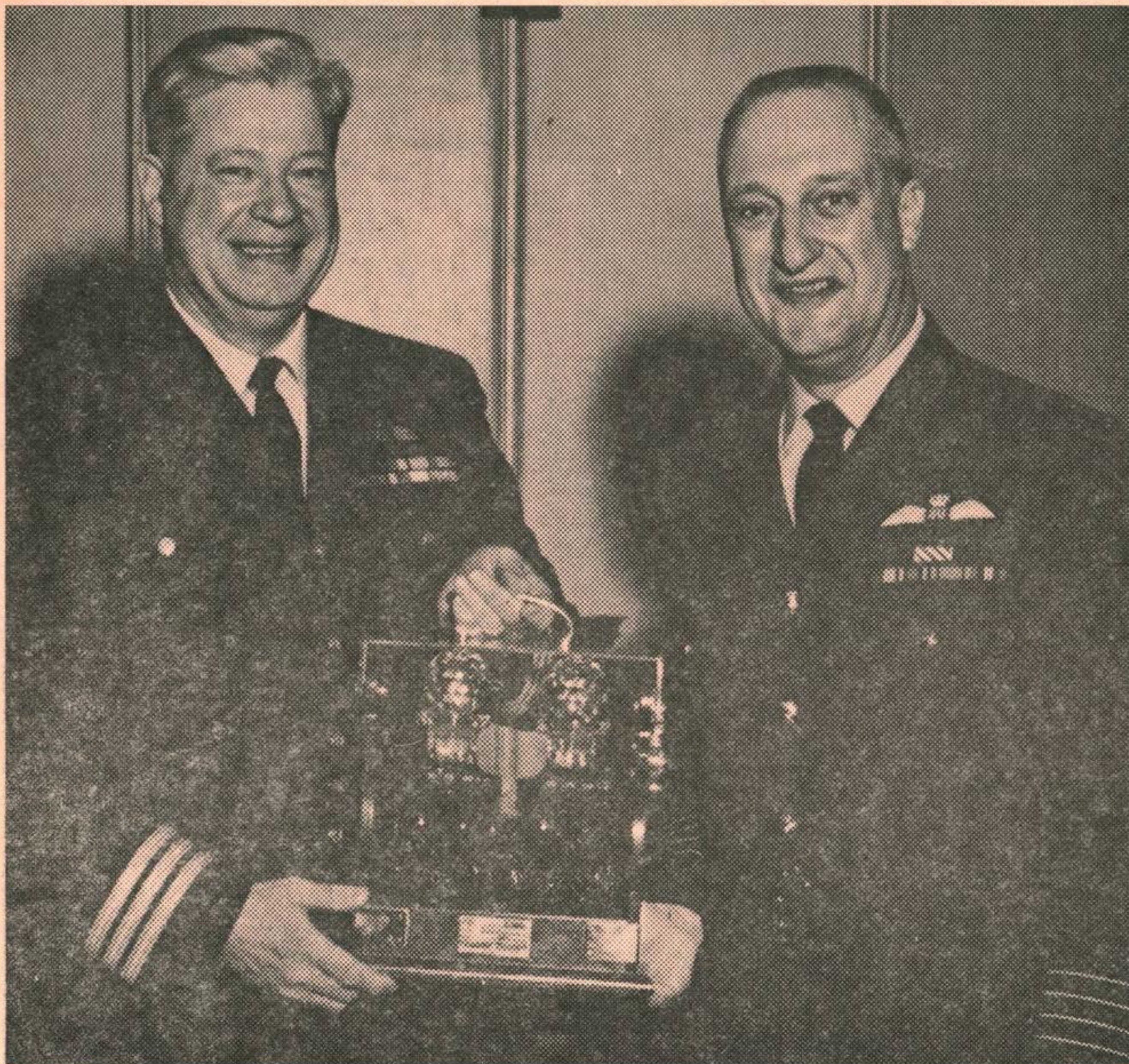

CADETS TURN BACK CLOCK

OTTAWA (CFP)--Fur traders, Indian drums, York boats and soldiers; the only indication to an observer that he had not lost one hundred years are the lack of bears.


When 2000 sea, land and air cadets display their two hour pageant and tattoo on March 20 at the Winnipeg arena, the viewer will see some of the earlier days of Manitoba, arrayed against a mock-up of historic Fort Garry.

In addition there will be a sunset ceremony, the hornpipe, brass and pipe bands and squad drill.

The aim of the spectacular is to demonstrate the versatility and character-building derived from cadet training.

Co-ordinated by former Captain J.W. Dangerfield and under the chairmanship of Reserve Major L.A. Madson, the regular and reserve force elements are determined to refresh the memories of federal and provincial dignitaries who will be invited to attend.

It is hoped the Tattoo will illustrate the benefits and aims of the cadet movement. "We teach citizenship, with the aim of building a healthier and happier individual and community," said Major Madson. "Cadets learn to take and give orders, to value neat appearance and develop good attitudes to fellow cadets and others."

CONSUMERS' NEWS AND VIEWS

At times most of us receive mail we do not want -- advertising leaflets, magazine subscription forms and record or book club offers. This kind of mail is a perfectly legitimate way of doing business and it is strictly up to the recipient to decide whether he wants to pay any attention to this method of selling or not.

But what do you do when you receive a credit card you never asked for, a C.O.D. parcel you never ordered, or a package of Christmas cards you did not request?

Unsolicited mail is annoying and in some cases, it is illegal. The Consumers' Association of Canada would like to draw your attention to some business mailing practices you should know about.

With the record and book clubs, the most common complaint is getting merchandise that was not ordered. In accepting one of the "specials" giving a free trial or a free offer, the first shipment usually contains a message saying, in effect, "If you don't want more, send a card saying so -- if you would like more, do nothing". Often the recipient does not read the en-

closed information thoroughly, and not understanding the conditions, fails to return the card. At other times, it may be a case of clerical error or a prankster sending in coupons and orders in another person's name.

A particularly objectionable practice is that of sending merchandise by C.O.D. to persons who have recently died. A survivor in the household often accepts the goods believing that they were actually ordered by the deceased before death. It is against the law to send any article by C.O.D. which has not been ordered or requested.

As far as credit cards are concerned, there is nothing illegal about sending unsolicited credit cards through the mail although Consumers' Association of Canada would like to see the practice made illegal. It is entirely up to you to decide if you want to keep and use the card -- but if you do not want it, be on the safe side and destroy the card so no one else can use it.

You should note an important condition that almost invariably

accompanies each card that goes something like this:

"The card holder named hereon agrees to pay for all purchases made by any person using this card until the company has received written notice of its loss or theft."

Most companies will not charge for purchases made on an unsolicited card - if you have never used it, but once you have used it or signed the card, you are completely responsible for all purchases made with it.

Consumers' Association of Canada feel very strongly about this matter of unsolicited credit cards and advise returning the mutilated card to the sender with a letter of protest against this method of promotion.

Items such as Christmas seals, key tag services or Easter seals are sent with a request for a donation or with a definite charge for the item. However, this is viewed as a generally acceptable method of raising funds for charitable purposes and very seldom results in a complaint.

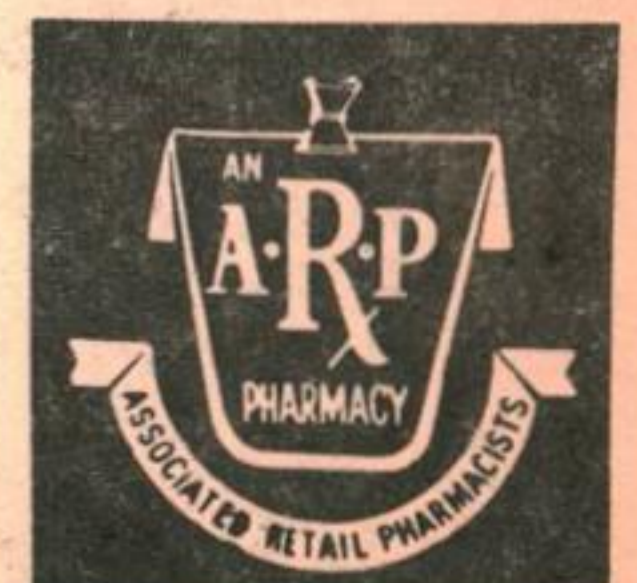

NEWS AND VIEWS

Greeting cards mailed to the home are usually accompanied with a request for payment of a stated sum and suggesting that the money sent will benefit handicapped persons. The Post Office now requires that a notice be included with the shipment stating that you do not have to pay the return postage and are under no legal obligation either to purchase the cards or to return them.

From the individual consumer's point of view, the Post Office Act states that once an article is posted it becomes the property of the addressee. However, any individual has the privilege of refusing mail. Just mark it "refused", sign it, and return it to the Post Office where it will be disposed of in accordance with postal regulations. It is entirely up to the consumer to decide whether he should keep or return unsolicited material. In your own best interest, however, it would be wise to return the material to the Post Office. Here are a few important points to keep in mind when dealing with unsolicited mail:

- read all offers carefully
- understand the conditions of acceptance of any unsolicited proposition
- you are not required to pay for unordered merchandise
- it is against the law to send unordered merchandise C.O.D.
- check all invoices carefully
- if you do not wish to retain unsolicited material, mark it "refused" and return it to the Post Office
- report any suspected misuse of the mails to the Post Office Department, Ottawa.

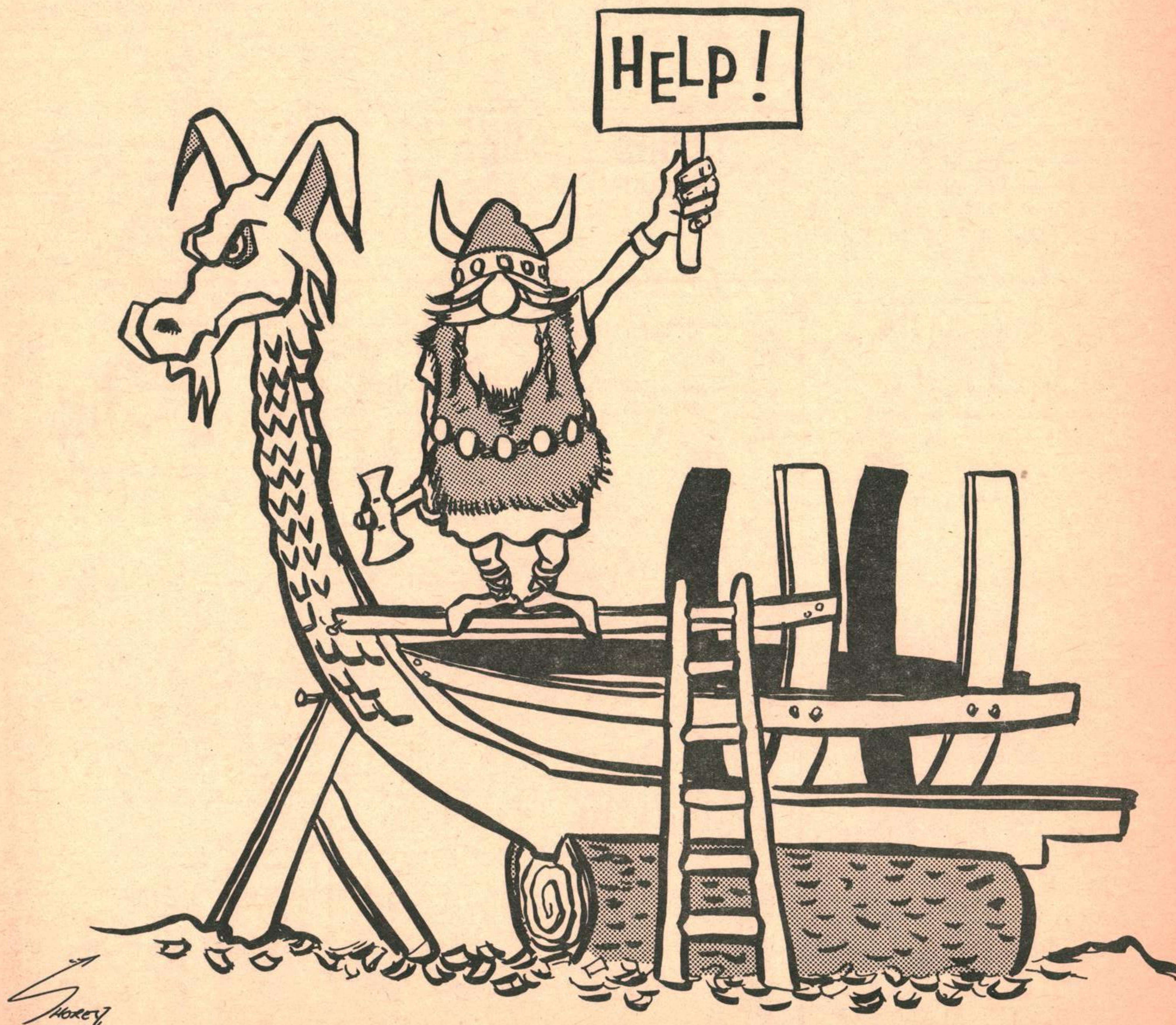

GOOD SHOWS

GOOD SHOWS IMPORTANT

OTTAWA(CFP)--"Good Show" ... a term that has been around for many years and is used extensively. For Colonel R.D. Schultz, director of flight safety, and his staff at CFHQ "Good Show" has a special meaning. For them, "Good Show" means an award to demonstrate that accident prevention efforts are recognized and appreciated.

Between 50 and 75 "Good Show" awards are handed out each year. To be nominated an officer or man is recommended by his unit or base commander. That recommendation, including photos and full details to substantiate the recommendation, are in turn forwarded to the directorate of flight safety in Ottawa to be judged on their merits.

Normally only Canadian forces personnel receive "Good Show" awards. However, a USAF pararescue crewman, Sergeant D.C. Beyerle, stationed at Pease AFB, New Hampshire, was recently honored along with Corporal G. Rowe of C.F.B. Shearwater.

The men were on board a Sea King helicopter returning to base after participating with another helicopter in a sea rescue of four survivors from a sunken trawler. Suddenly the forward personnel door opened and a fellow crewman fell out. With complete disregard for his own safety, Cpl. Rowe lunged for the open door and by leaning out managed to grasp the man's flying suit. At the same

time Sgt. Beyerle grabbed Cpl. Rowe and together they pulled the crewman back in. During the remainder of the trip to C.F.B. Shearwater Sgt. Beyerle administered first aid while Cpl. Rowe held the badly damaged door in place.

Other service personnel to be honored with "Good Show" awards include Private F.E. Shippee, C.F.B. Edmonton, Captain W.A. Edgar and Corporal K. Cotter, C.F.B. Trenton, Corporal G.R. Scory, C.F.B. North Bay, Captain R.M. Hellberg and Lieutenant K.R. Keevill, C.F.B. Bagotville, Corporal T.J. Condon, C.F.B. Cold Lake, Corporal A. Westgaard and Private D.E. Killens, C.F.B. Comox and Corporal N.A. Shepherd, C.F.E. Baden-Soellingen.

NATO'S SATCOM

NATO'S HOTLINE PLANS ANNOUNCED

OTTAWA(CFP)-- Canada's terminal for a new NATO satellite communications system is scheduled to become operational this summer. The terminal is now under construction at Carp, outside of Ottawa.

The system, called SATCOM Phase II, will be NATO's space age system for political consultations and military communications.

SATCOM consists of two satellites and twelve ground terminals one in each of the following NATO countries; Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Germany, Greece, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Turkey, United Kingdom and the United States.

Each ground station, located near the seat of government in its respective NATO country, will be linked to appropriate government and military headquarters by a telephone land line cable or by a line of sight microwave radio system.

In a literal sense the system is NATO's "hotline in the sky". Besides providing voice communications, however, each station will also be capable of selectively communicating with each other via satellite over teletype circuits.

Production of equipment for the system is shared among participating countries of NATO. On February 3 the United States launched the second communication satellite in an initial elliptical orbit.

Canada will supply high powered transmitters and teletype order wire equipment for all twelve terminals.

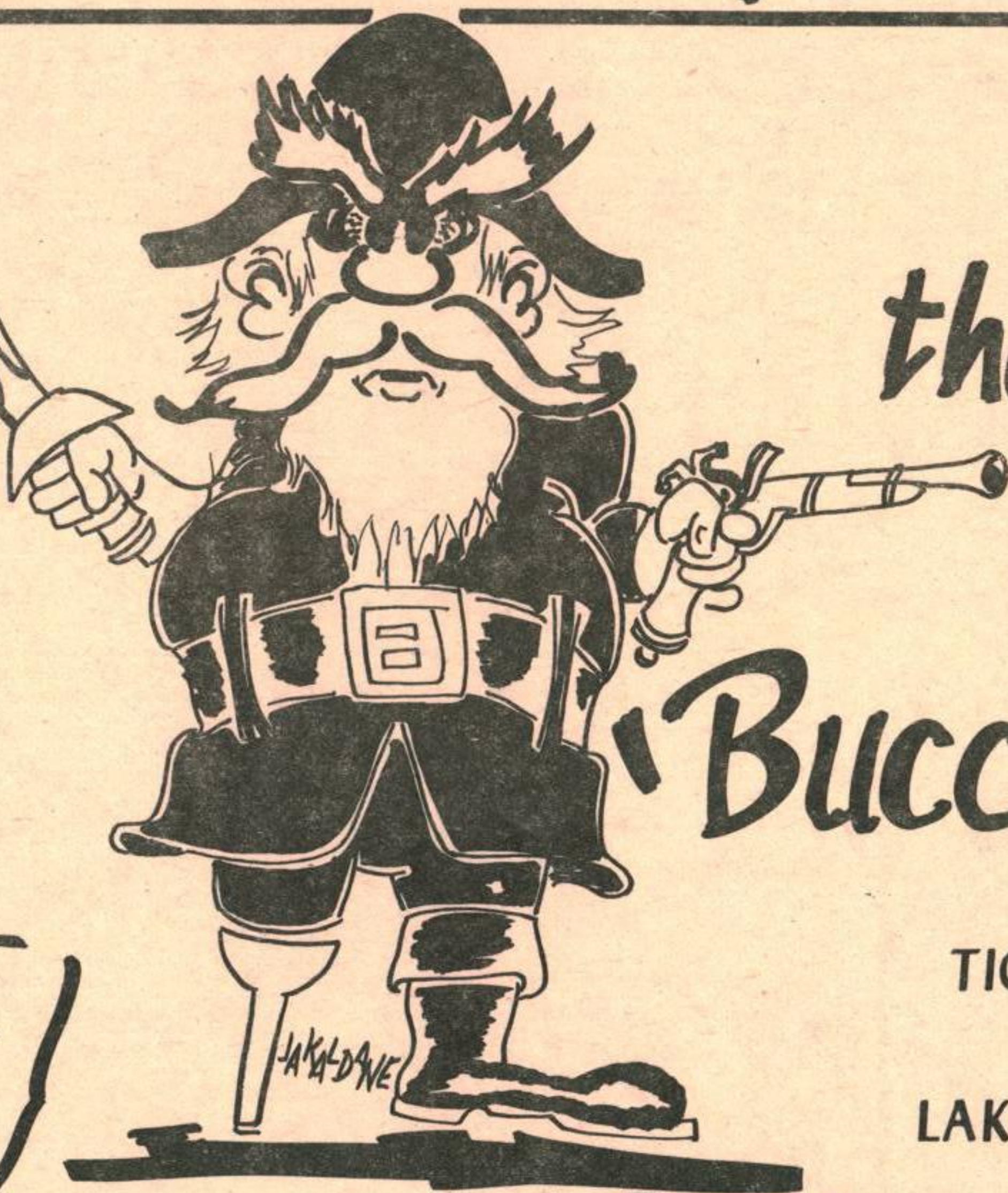

OTTAWA(CFP)--The Canadian Forces Central Fund, in its recently held thirty-first and thirty-second meetings, has authorized loans amounting to just under \$2,000,000 in non-public funds.

Largest recipient is C.F.B. Halifax, with a \$600,000 loan for construction of an exchange groceteria at Shannon Park.

Other bases receiving loans are:

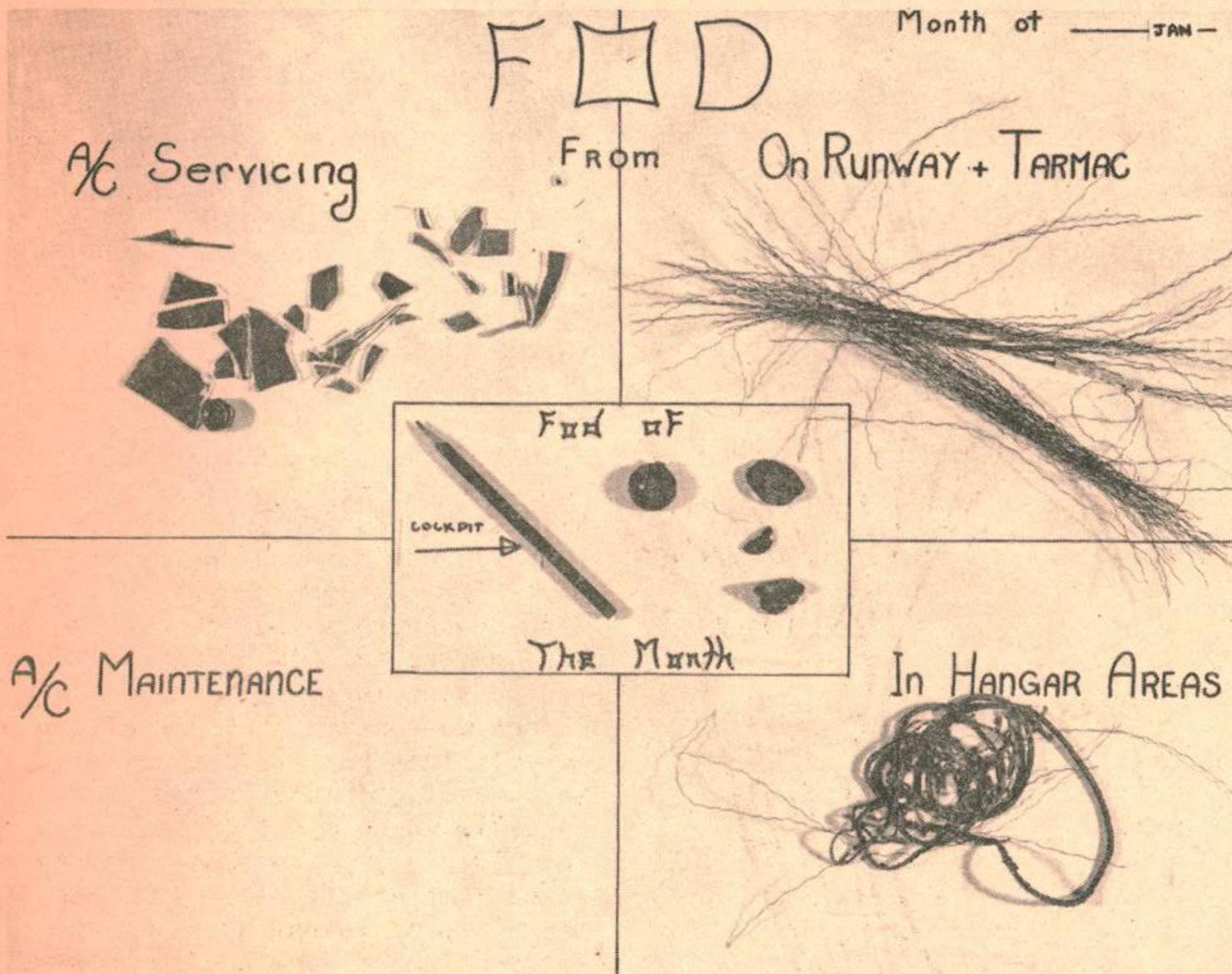

Armstrong, \$25,000 for renovations to the Junior Ranks club and \$5,000 for curling club-social centre renovations; C.F.B. St. Jean \$5,000 for renovations to the Officers' Mess.

C.F.B. Lahr gets \$170,000 for refurbishing the Junior Ranks club and \$12,000 for renovations to the club house at the Baden Hills Golf Club; C.F.S. Lowther, \$2,500 for furniture to the Officers' Mess; C.F.B. Esquimalt, \$6,000 for furniture and furnishings for the Base Recreation Association.

For C.F.B. Chilliwack, \$30,000 for the Sergeants' Mess and \$20,000 to the Junior Ranks Club; C.F.B. Portage la Prairie, \$15,000 to relocate, renovate and stock the exchange; C.F.S. Holberg \$250,000 for construction of an exchange groceteria; C.F.S. Inuvik, \$150,000 for the community centre.

C.F.B. Moosenee, \$25,000 for renovations to the Sergeants' Mess; C.F.B. Rockcliffe, C.F.B. Uplands and CFHQ/AU, \$100,000 for joint participation in the development of a ski and summer resort at Calabogie Peaks; C.S.C. Royal Roads, \$5,000 for the gunroom mess; C.F.B. Sydney, \$55,000 for renovations and fixtures for the base exchange; C.F.B. Alsask, \$15,000 for air conditioning for the Officers' Sergeants' and Junior Ranks' Messes; C.F.B. Bagotville, \$192,000 for construction and fixtures to the base exchange; C.F.B. Moose Jaw, \$60,000 for renovations to the Junior Ranks Mess.

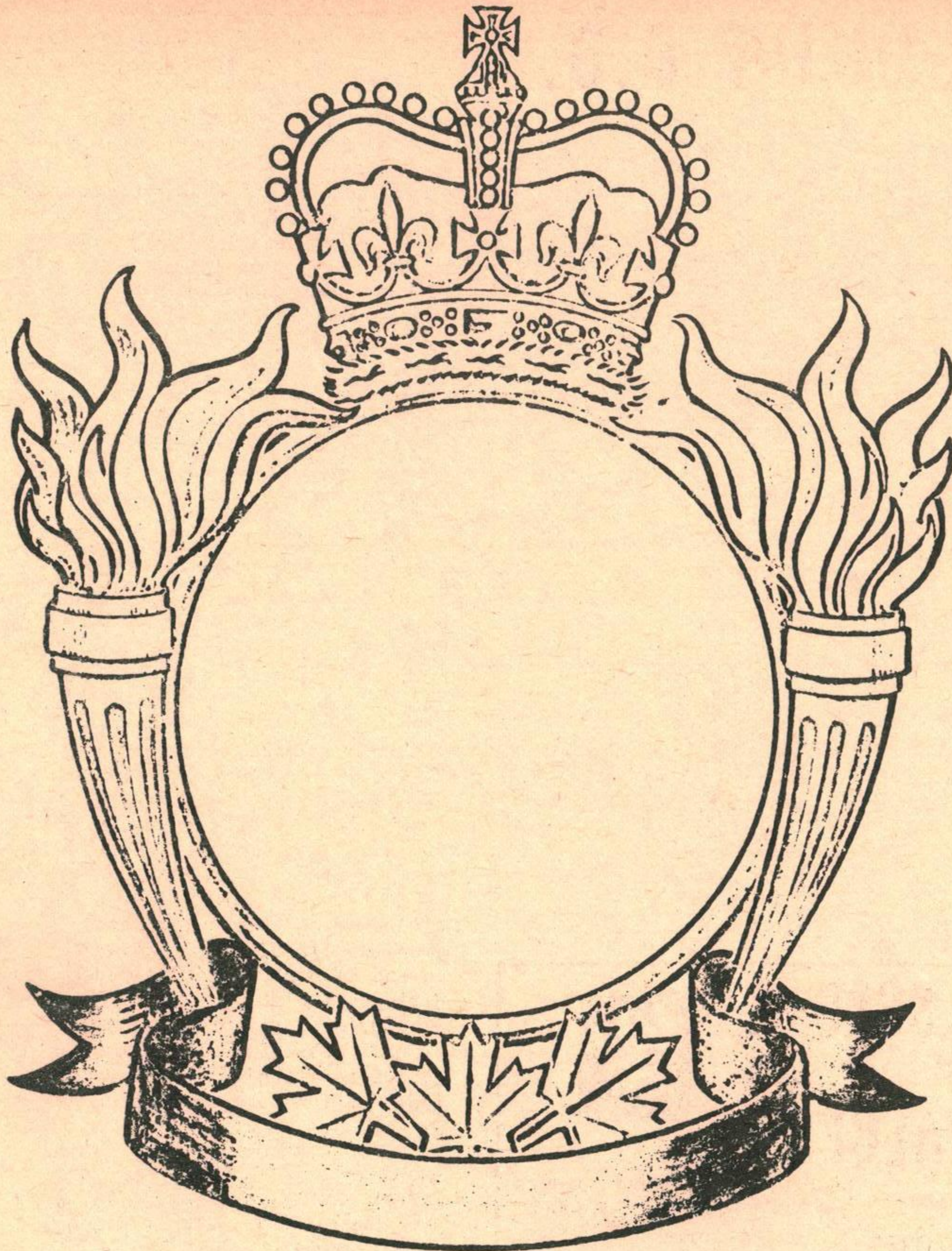

DESIGNS SOLICITED

The following is a reprint of a letter from the Commander, Training Command:

BADGES: Canadian Forces Schools

Since unification, a new series of badges have been designed for elements of the Canadian armed forces. Command, base and squadron badges are examples of different frame styles that help to identify the unit represented.

CFHQ have advised that they are now in a position to staff proposals for badges for CF schools.

Enclosed is the badge frame style for CF schools. The torches were chosen to symbolize the light shed by the educational activities of the schools system. The device is not to contain the name of the school. This permits flexibility in case of possible future changes to title which might be necessary for a variety of reasons. The stylized lamp and flame, symbolizing the "lamp of learning" shall not be used in the device. There is no objection to using the device and motto form existing navy, army or air force badges if they are considered appropriate for the Canadian forces.

This project is being co-ordinated by Captain J.W. Graham, Local 173 Stds. section.

It is requested that personnel wishing to submit their design for No. 1 CFFTS do so on or before 12 March 1971.

The more designs submitted the better the chance of finding an appropriate crest for this school.

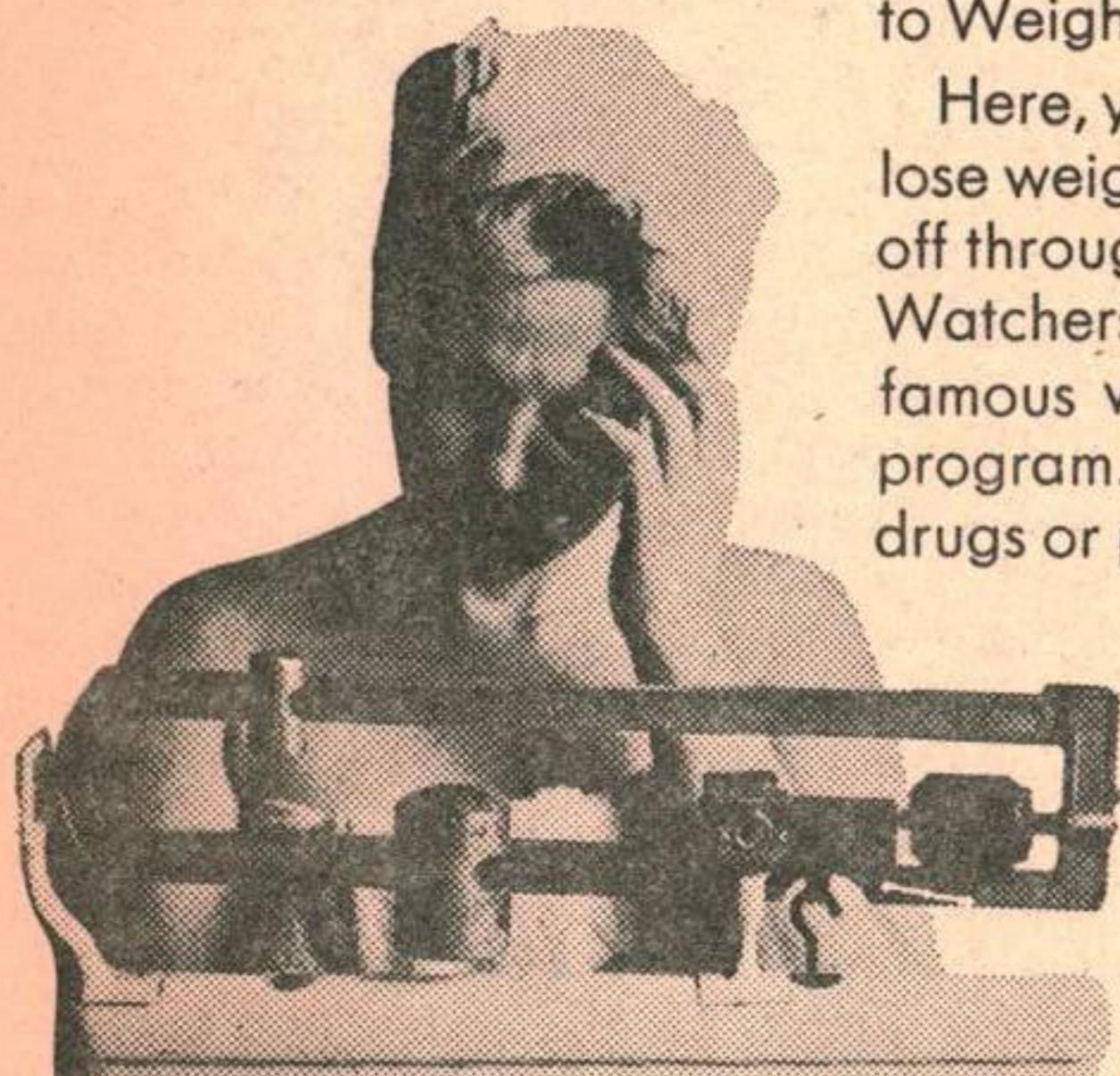

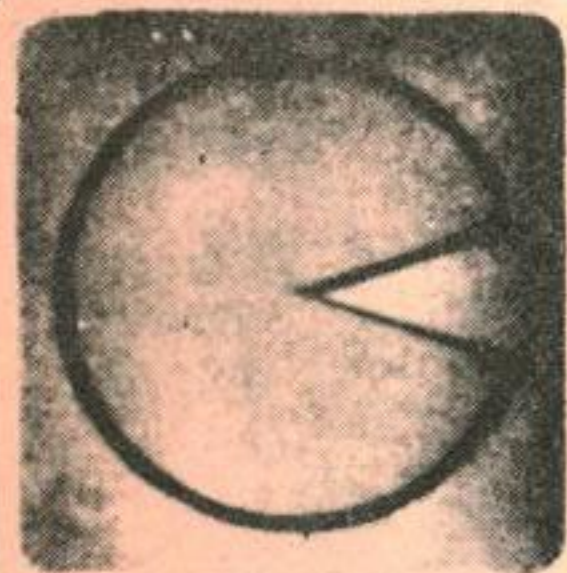

THE RIGHT TO DISSENT

I have just completed six articles in the Framfari on the general theme of "The Church In Our Time". These six articles each dealt with a separate, but related theme. They were:

- °What is the Church's Role in a Changing Society (Part I).
- °What is the Church's Role in a Changing Society (Part II).
- °Can a Person be a Christian in the Armed Forces.
- °How Must the Church Change.
- °What Should the Church be Doing in Canada.
- °The Courage to be Different.

In writing these articles I greatly appreciated the suggestions and views of the Editor both written and verbal. His obvious concern and good judgement were a great help to me. Mind you, we disagreed both in writing and in discussion.

This week, I wish to write on the RIGHT TO DISSENT. The Oxford dictionary defines dissent as "The difference of opinion"...non-conformity". In a free society every person has the right to express his own opinion, there is a place for differences of opinion, and a person can be a non-conformist in his thinking while still conforming to the rules and norms of his society. I think, if we are honest, all of us have a little non-conformity in us.

Honest dissent is not disloyalty. In fact, without dissent there would be no progress and no growth. Without dissent parliamentary government would cease to exist. Without dissent the church would not have opened its eyes to see the needs of the day and would not be in its present stage of upheaval and turmoil as it struggles to speak and act with relevance in the confusing and complex era of history that we live in today.

Many a true Christian has suffered and has been martyred because he dared to dissent. This happened in Nazi Germany. Bishop Hans Lilje, the retiring Lutheran bishop of Hanover, suffered terrible persecution while in prison, because he dared voice christian dissent against the Nazi regime. Martin Niemoller, likewise suffered at the hands of the Gestapo while Dietrich Bonhoeffer was hanged because he dared to disagree with the Hitler establishment. Bonhoeffer's book "The Cost of Discipleship", is worth reading, if only to show the courage that is sometimes needed to be an honest dissenter. Only tyrants and cowards are afraid of dissent.

What about the greatest dissenter of them all, Jesus Christ? Was he crucified because he went around doing good? Certainly not. He was crucified because he had the courage to state, with great effectiveness his differences of opinion with the religious and political establishment of the time. He was so effective that the authorities had to get rid of him and so they crucified him. But, Jesus Christ is alive and his voice can be heard through the church if the church has courage to speak out as he spoke out, and, if necessary, to suffer, as he suffered.

If we are to be the church, then let us not be afraid to state our opinions on any issue whether it be great or small. The church must speak with courage, with intelligence and with relevance. If we do this, we shall then be following in the steps of our Lord.
