RETIREMENT

CFB GIMLI....Major R.(Bob) Fraser, C.D., 46, of Winnipeg, Manitoba, was recently honoured at a mess dinner at Canadian Forces Base Gimli, Manitoba, on the occasion of his retirement after 27 years of service.

Maj. Fraser was born and educated in Winnipeg and graduated from West Kildonan Collegiate in 1941. He enlisted in 1943 and took pilot training at North Battleford, Saskatchewan, which he completed in April 1944.

In the summer of 1945 Maj. Fraser left Canada for Europe and returned in the fall, following which he was released due to post-war cut backs in Canada's military.

In November 1948, Maj. Fraser re-enlisted as a pilot and became a flying instructor, serving in that capacity at Centralia, Ontario, Gimli, Manitoba, and Trenton, Ontario until the fall of 1952.

Maj. Fraser left Canada early in 1953 to fly F-86 Sabres at Grostenquin, France, until 1955 when he was assigned to staff officer duties at Air Division Headquarters, Metz, France. Early in 1956, he was posted to Chatham, New Brunswick, as a supervisor at the F-86 Sabre operational training unit where he served until 1959 when he was assigned staff duties at Air Defence Command Headquarters, St. Hubert, Quebec. Following the staff assignment he flew CF 104's at Baden-Soellingen, Germany from 1963 to 1965 and returned to Canada to take up instructional duties with the CF 104 training unit at Cold Lake, Alberta.

Upon completing this tour in 1968, Maj. Fraser was moved to C.F. B. Gimli, Manitoba where he was again involved with training pilots. At Gimli, Maj. Fraser held numerous offices at the flying school, including commandant.

Maj. Fraser has always been a keen flyer and has logged time on numerous aircraft ranging from the Tiger Moth and Crane to the sophisticated CF 104, Starfighter.

He is married to the former Leona Warde, also of Winnipeg, and they have two sons, Ian and Warde. The Frasers will retire in Winnipeg and all friends and acquaintances wish them well after their 27 years of faithful service. (C.F. Photo)

Since Friday last, an unsettling story-rumour has been circulating the area -- ie: corporals and above will not be promoted unless they have a working knowledge of French. Oddly enough, this rumour/story has been passed about by so called responsible people -- George Hees, MP, John Diefenbaker, MP and others in the House of Commons.

As of yet, higher authorities in the Canadian Armed Forces have yet to confirm or deny this story/rumour. Surely, since this directly concerns an individual's career, we are entitled to know of any changes in policy regarding promotions. Rumours such as this can have but one effect -- to destroy an individual's ambition and morale.

With this in mind, the purpose of this letter should be quite clear -- will someone PLEASE confirm or deny this rumour.

The unsettling story/rumour which was published in a number of newspapers recently about the fact that corporals and above, would not be promoted unless they had a working knowledge of French was, in essence, incorrect and did not reflect any announced change in policy within the Armed Forces.

The original order from CFHQ directed to all Armoured Regiments, including the Lord Strathcona's Horse (RC), pointed out that there were a number of vacancies for sergeants in the French speaking Armoured Regiment at Valcartier (12e Regiment Blinde du Canada). The letter pointed out that there were also a surplus of English speaking sergeants in the other Armoured Regiments. Therefore, the Armoured Corps personnel were informed that any corporals desiring promotion to the rank of sergeants, or sergeants prepared to accept a posting to the 12e Regiment Blinde du Canada to fill these vacancies must be prepared to accept a posting to Valcartier and either be bilingual or prepared to take a French language course and graduate with sufficiently high standing to permit them to operate in the French language.

Therefore, the message contained no basic change in policy, and applied only to the NCOs in the Armoured Corps and was an attempt

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Gimli Again The Best In The West

C.F.B. GIMLI WINS TRAINING COMMANDS HIGHEST AWARD IN MOTOR TRANSPORT SAFETY

C.F.B. Gimli is not only "Best in the West", we are now the "Best in Training Command". It was announced last Thursday that C.F.B. Gimli had won the "Training Command Buckler". This award is presented annually to the T.C. base reporting the lowest accident rate during the preceding year.

In 1969 C.F.B. Gimli came second to C.F.B. Clinton but 1970 is our year. During 1970 we accumulated 542,805 miles with only one accident. This works out to an accident rate of 0.18 per 100,000 miles. Covering 1969 and 1970 we accumulated 1,090,217 miles with only two accidents.

Other awards won by the base are the Commander's Motor Transport Safety Scroll presented semi-annually to the T.C. base with the lowest accident rate in two categories: Special Purpose Vehicles (snowplows, blowers, cranes, mules) and Passenger/Cargo Vehicles (staff cars, station wagon, buses, trucks). Gimli won these scrolls on the following dates:

SPECIAL PURPOSE VEHICLES - 1 July to 31 December 1967 and 1 July to 31 December 1969.

PASSENGER/CARGO VEHICLES - 1 July to 31 December 1968, 1 July to 31 December 1969, * 1 January to 30 June 1970 and 1 July to 31 December 1970.

*(Bases cannot be awarded with two successive scrolls. Therefore, even though Gimli won for this period, the second place base was presented with the scroll; but Gimli was acknowledged as coming first.)

You have to admit that this is quite an impressive list of awards. But, who gets the credit for this. Definitely our safety supervisor, Sergeant G. Newport deserves recognition. His job is promoting safety and by looking at the above, he has done his job well. But his job is like "leading a horse to water, he can't make it drink". Likewise he cannot make the operators drive carefully. This is where most of the credit is due! The drivers/operators at the transport section and the user drivers. There are the people who must practice safety every minute they are behind the wheel. These are the people who deserve a pat-on-the-back and a "Good-Show" for a job well done.

But accidents are not always caused by the "human error". Many accidents are caused by equipment failure. Here another "Good Show" should go out, this time to the hand maintenance people. They are the people who ensure that the brakes will work when needed, or the horn, or the turn signals.

So you can see that safety is not a one man job. Safety involves everyone and is everyone's responsibility.

You may think that all we think about in the transport section is safety. This is not so. At the beginning of 1970 T.C. came out with a Transient Service Award. These scrolls were awarded to base/sections which had been noted by the majority of transient people as the best service. C.F.B. Gimli Base Transport has received two such scrolls. The first for January to June 1970 and the next for July to December 1970.

After reading this you can see why I said "Gimli is not the only 'Best in the West', but the 'Best in Training Command'".

FIRST PROTESTANT CHAPLAIN AT R.C.A.F. STATION GIMLI RETURNS

The Reverend Doctor S.R. McLeod of Wesley United Church, Thunder Bay, Ontario, will be guest of honour at the Closing-Out Service and Banquet of the Protestant Chapel to be held on March 4, 1971. The Chaplain-General (P), Brigadier-General J. Cardy, will also be present for the occasion.

Dr. McLeod was attached to R.C.A.F. Station Gimli in October 1943. At the time, the station consisted of three hangars, a tower, recreation centre and YMCA style barrack complex. Housing in Gimli was very scarce, however, Dr. McLeod managed to obtain a two room cottage in which he housed his wife and two small children.

When Dr. McLeod, was interviewed, there were two incidents that stood out as highlights of his tour at Gimli. The first was the time that two Ansons were coming in to land. One Anson was about 100 feet above the other. Evidently, there was a blind spot on the Anson that made it impossible for the pilot of the one aircraft to see the other beneath him. In mid-air the higher aircraft came to rest on the Anson beneath. The instructor had the presence of mind to turn off his engines. The instructor on the lower plane landed with the other riding piggy-back, and as Dr. McLeod said, "Didn't even blow a tire".

The second incident, Dr. McLeod recalled, was one Friday evening when an instructor got fairly well inebriated. The aircraft were loaded with live ammunition. He got into a plane, took off and proceeded to shoot up the station. His aim must have been particularly good because he hit a flagpole on top of the control tower. The shot hit the flagpole half way up and bent it on a 90° angle.

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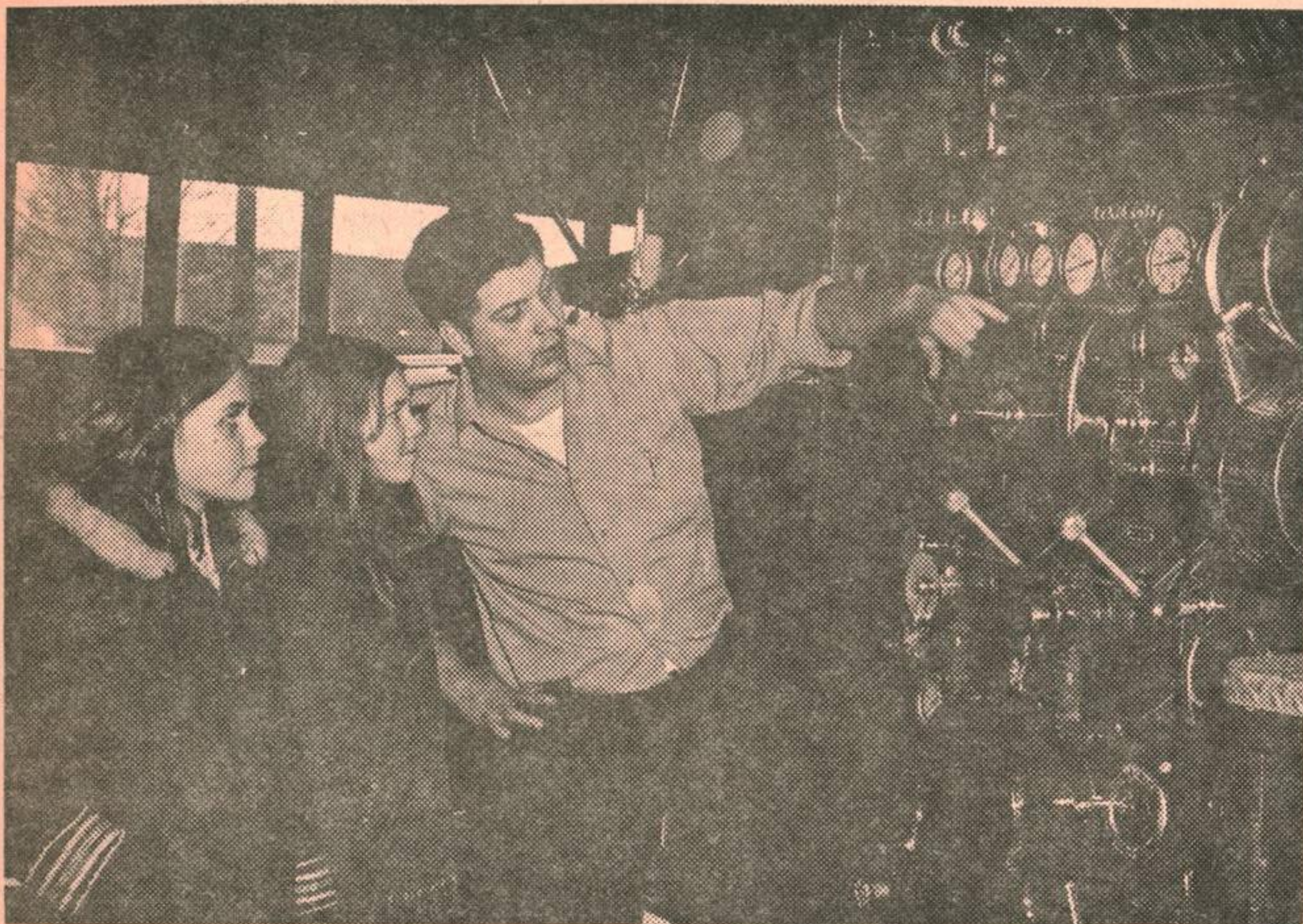
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MINERVA 4-H CLUB TOURS BASE

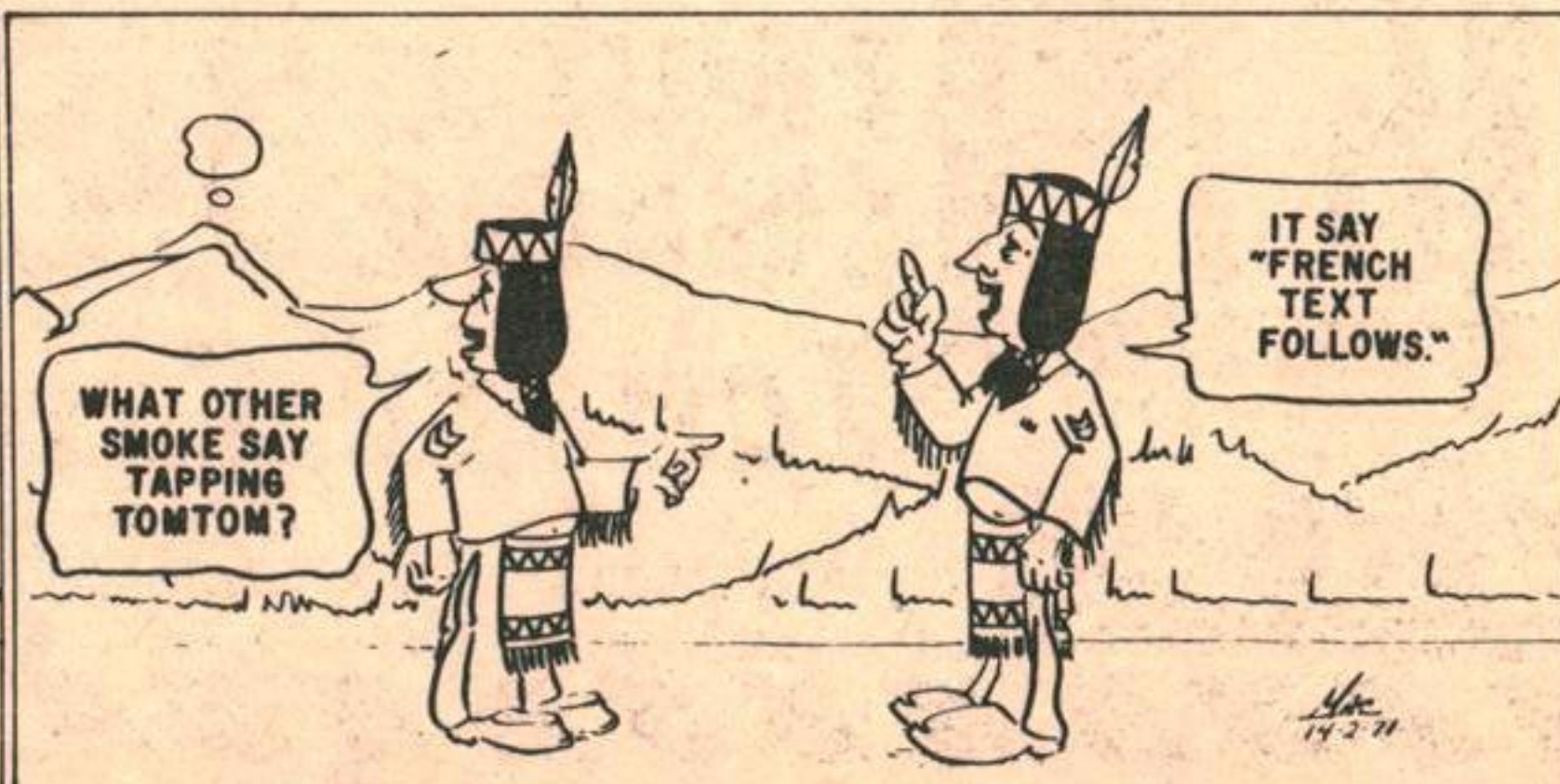
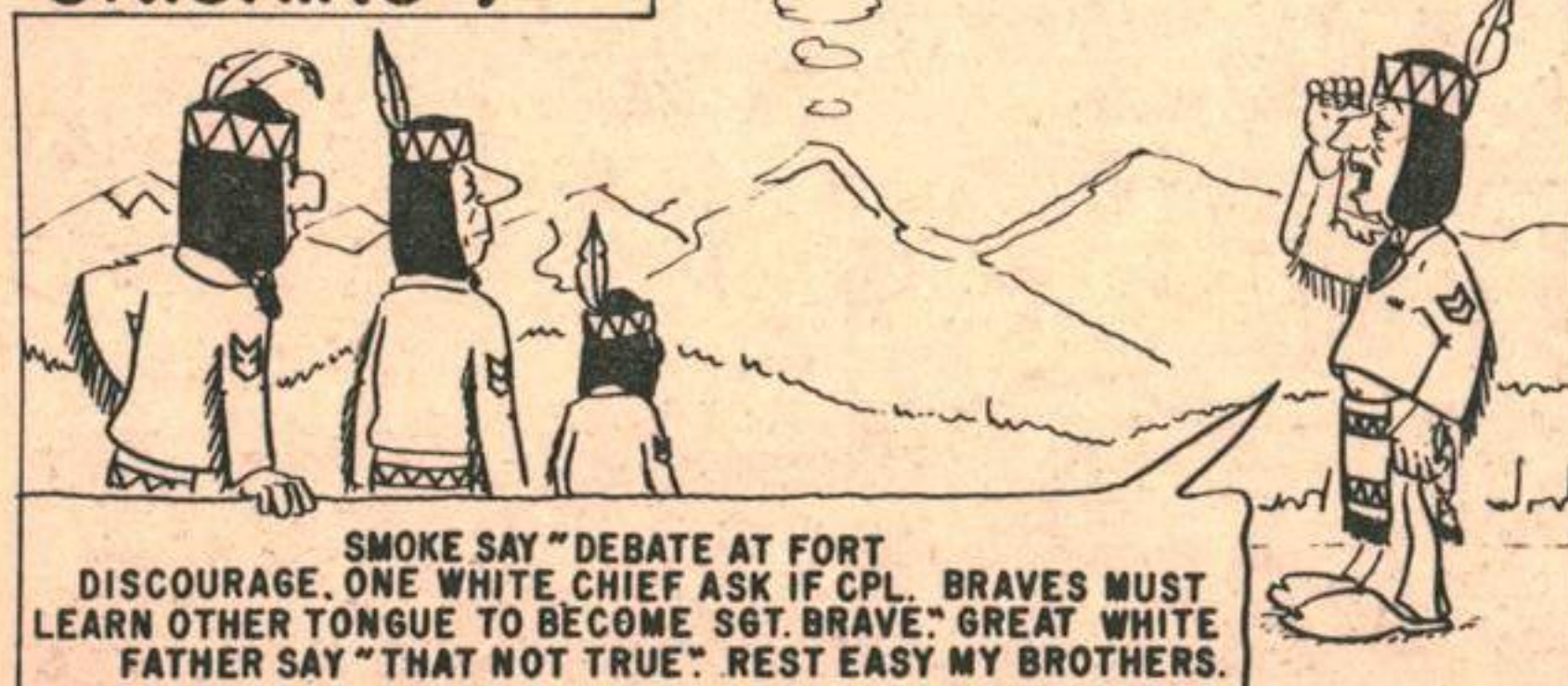

Medicare

MEDICARE COSTS DECREASE

OTTAWA(CFP)--Servicemen in Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia are now paying less for medical insurance coverage.

Since February 1, 1971, the federal government, as the employer, is splitting the premium costs of Medicare 50-50 with the subscriber.


For Ontario residents under the Ontario Health Services Insurance Plan (OHSIP) members with one dependent will now pay \$2.95, instead of \$3.86, with the government contributing another \$2.95.

Two-dependent members pay \$5.90 instead of \$8.27 and three-or-more dependent members pay \$7.37 instead of \$9.88.

In Alberta the rate for a member with one dependent drops from \$3.71 to \$2.87, while a member with more than one dependent will pay \$5.75 instead of \$6.63.

British Columbians will be charged \$2.50 instead of \$2.96 for a member with one dependent, while a two-dependent member is assessed \$5.00 instead of \$6.47.

For the member with three or more dependents the monthly charge will be \$6.25, a saving of \$1.38.

CFR PLANS

CFR PLANS ANNOUNCED

OTTAWA(CFP)--Nominations for commissioning from the ranks for 1971-72 are now being accepted by CFHQ.

This year, 15 trade classifications will be considered in the CFR programme.

They are: armour, artillery, infantry, maritime surface and sub-surface, maritime engineering, air traffic controller, communications/electronics engineering, land ordnance engineering, military engineering, dental associate, medical associate, security, personnel support -- food service, personnel support -- administration and personnel support -- physical education and recreation.

Pre-requisites, according to CFAO 11-9, which outline the entire commissioning process, include at least Grade 12 Ontario education or its equivalent and specified medical and age requirements.

The maximum age limit is 41 as of April 8, 1971, but can be raised in certain circumstances, except in the air traffic controller trade. This trade will not accept applicants over 34 years of age as of April 8, 1971.

Nominations, according to CAN-FORGEN 248 November 27, must be submitted to the applicable commissioning from the ranks selection unit, accompanied by the commander's letter of recommendation, to reach CFHQ/DPCA by April 8, 1971.

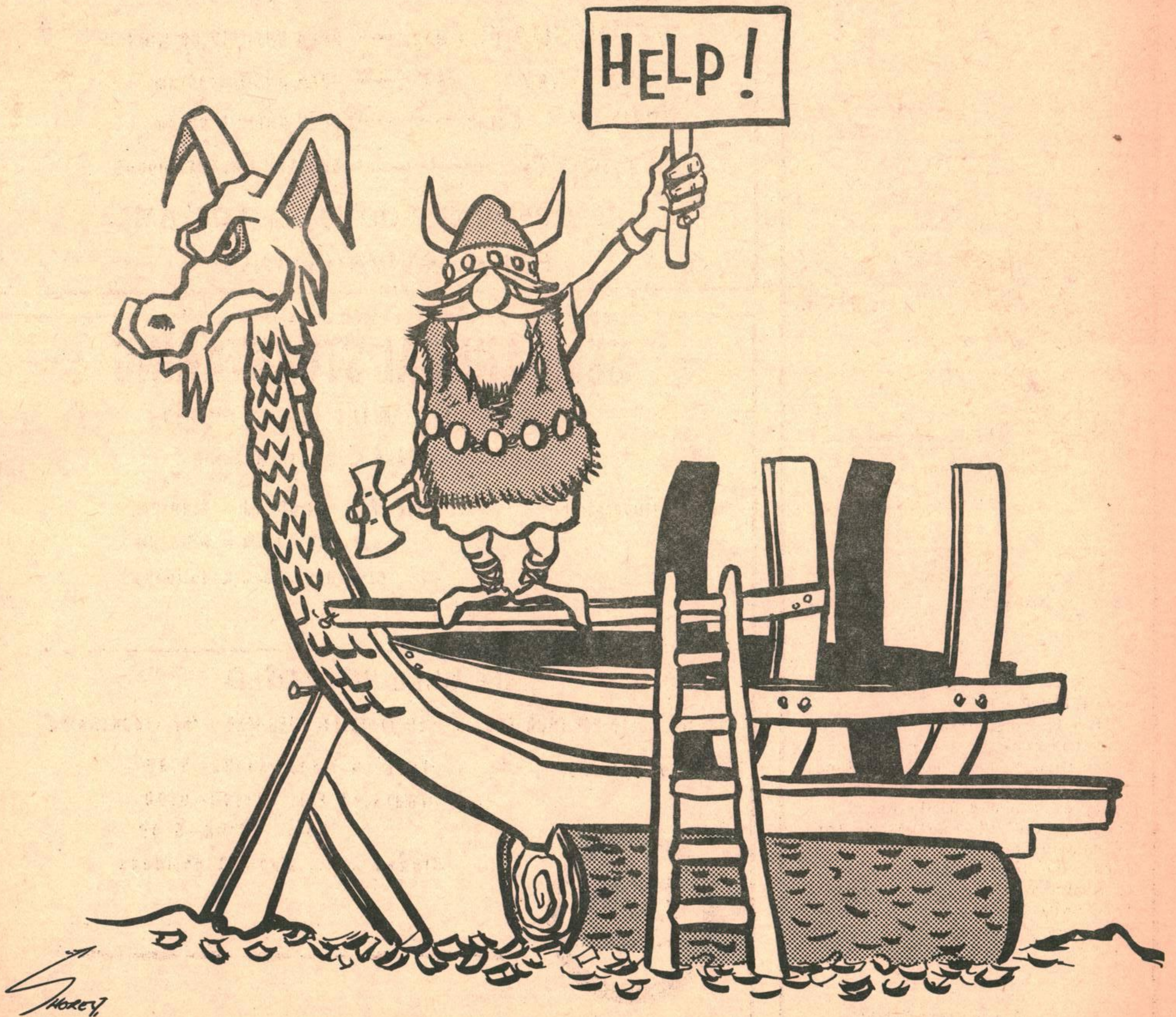

What Is A Rivet?

A rivet is a short metallic pin, passed through a hole to keep two pieces of metal or wood together. It is formed with a head which is hammered after insertion to clinch and keep the two pieces together.

Modern rivets are fired from a rivet gun by men in most shipyards and even women were riveters during the war (remember "Rosie the Riveter") when ships and planes were needed so suddenly.

A Viking rivet had to be hand forged in a smithy. This was formed by lining a sand hole with

slate, to hold the fire and anvil, close by a steam of water. The Vikings were the first people to smelt iron and hammer out rivets and sword blades and metal items they needed. They used hog iron mixed with charcoal, used an axe to hammer the metal. For every Viking ship they built the smithy had to produce three to four thousand iron rivets.

Traces of slag and areas of natural hog iron show us today where they were able to use this method.

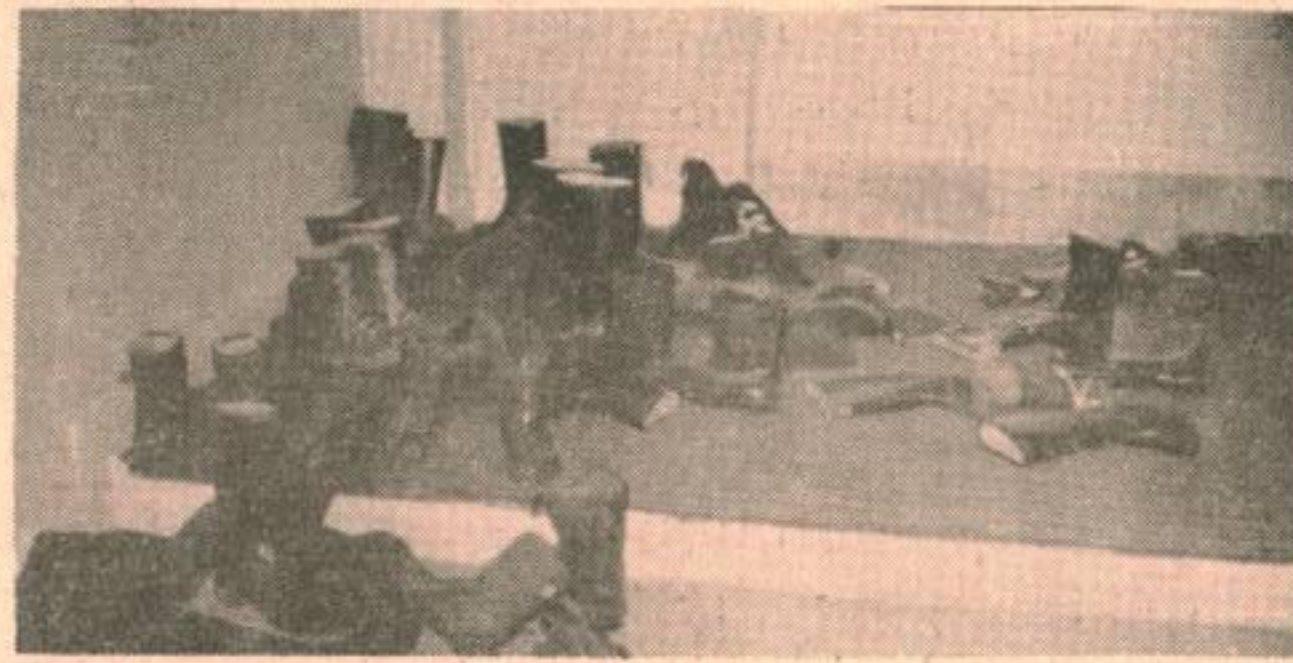

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# CONSUMERS' NEWS AND VIEWS

by CONSUMERS' ASSOCIATION OF CANADA

Question: how many consumers are there in Canada?

Answer: precisely the equivalent of the Canadian population at any given moment.

In other words, everyone is a consumer from birth to death. And that is the whole point of Consumer Week in Canada which is from March 1-6 this year.

Consumers' Association of Canada (CAC) sponsors this week to highlight the fact that consumers are the economy itself. Without them there would be no economy.

CAC is the only organized body of consumers which represents everyone in contacts with governments and industry. Since it was formed in 1947 it has brought about changes in labelling of drugs, household chemicals, children's clothing, fabrics and foods, as well as being instrumental in the introduction of consumer protective legislation.

This year the 65,000-member organization is offering leadership in rejection of non-returnable beverage containers which CAC consider a major land pollutant in

the nation. This view is being emphasized during Consumer Week in addition to the slogan, "Consumers Count!"

In announcing the campaign, CAC president Jean M. Jones said that for the past few years the organization's emphasis during Consumer Week in Canada has concentrated upon consumer education and co-operation with industry and governments. This year, she continued, "We hope to demonstrate the real power of organized consumers across Canada by exerting purchasing pressure against non-returnable beverage containers."

The CAS president, in calling attention to the Association's long-standing requests for legislation to ban non-returnable beverage containers, stated: "We feel that banning of non-returnable glass containers solely, would be an unfair competitive advantage to the manufacturers of cans, resulting in the probable increase of canned beverage containers, without solving the basic problem."

It was pointed out that CAC's objection to non-returnable beverage containers included beer, wine and spirits containers and not only soft drinks.

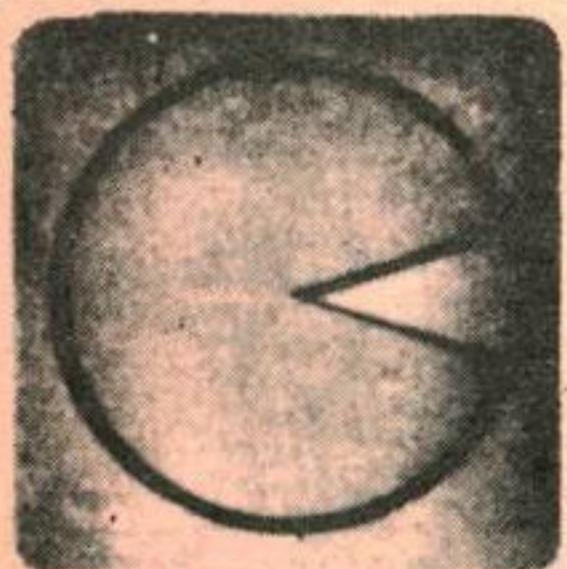
The association's basic recommendation is that legislation is required for beverages to be sold in standard returnable containers, with a significant deposit which will ensure their return.

## The Christian Life.

### CONSCIENCE AND COMMANDMENTS

There are many reasons why at the present time greater stress is laid on the personal verdict of conscience. There is a growing sense of the uniqueness of each man and of his situation. And we are living in a special period of transition when our sense of values is being very definitely renovated.

The question is all the more urgent where an antiquated sense of values is also an over-narrow one, or when laws which reflect an antiquated notion have gone too deeply into details. In such cases it is our duty to take counsel with our own instinct of faith, our own sense of what is good. (This of course, will not be a solitary process. In the community of God, indeed, in the whole of mankind, one asks for advice, one discusses matters with others and one notes how a new notion takes form in consciences.)

Hence, we find ourselves today faced with a very special task. On the one hand, the government of the community continues to call for humility and obedience, virtues without which the Christian spirit and peace cannot exist: "Think not that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets", said Christ (Mt. 5:17). On the other hand, we have the duty, as friends of God, with tranquil and courageous consciences, to consult men of good will and not to evade the responsibility of personal decision where this is called for. This is the attitude which Jesus called for when he said: "Have you not read what David did, when he was hungry, and those who were with him; how he entered the house of God and ate the bread of the Presence, which it was not lawful for him to eat, but only for the priests?" (Mt. 12:3-4). Then there is the fact, that Jesus himself did not regard the commandments as rootless, isolated precepts, merely dictated by an arbitrary command of God. He shows that at the heart of the commandments there is a living core from which each has value and significance. This he does when he says, "On these two commandments depend all the law
