BASE PROTESTANT CHAPEL CLOSING CEREMONY

C.F.B. GIMLI..... A brief but touching service on Sunday, 14 March marked the official closing of C.F.B. Gimli's Protestant Chapel. The Reverend Doctor S.R. McLeod of Thunder Bay, Ontario, the first chaplain at C.F.B. Gimli, arriving in October 1943, gave the sermon.

Immediately following the benediction the close-out ceremony took place. The National Flag of Canada and the Canadian Forces Flag were removed from the altar, furled and cased and then marched off. During this ceremony a trumpeter played the Last Post. The photo above shows the ceremony just prior to the casing of the flags. Seventy Percent in CAF

OTTAWA (CFP)--Defensive driving is catching on. Of 212,192 qualified drivers in Canada today, the Canadian Armed Forces leads all sponsoring groups with 64,626 graduates in the Canada Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course.

Last year the coast-to-coast program graduated 93,000 drivers, 20,490 of whom were qualified

through the Canadian Forces, a national sponsor.

In 1969, 24,199 armed forces drivers of a national total of 72,000 were successful. The decline in graduate production of servicemen last year is attributed to the high percentage of service drivers already trained, the Canada Safety Council explains.

OTTAWA (CFP)--For an exhibition of precision flying and aerial wizardry a date with your television set March 20 will prove worthwhile.

On that date the CTV network will be airing the weekly ABC-TV's Wide World of Sports featuring the 1970 William Tell Air Defence Meet.

The competition, inaugurated in 1954, and staged in Florida, will see four Voodoo jets from 409 All-Weather Interceptor Squadron, C.F. B. Comox, B.C., competing with U. S. Air Defence Command and Air National Guard crews.

The competition evaluates the ability of crews to handle, maintain and load weapons under simulated combat conditions, and also determines the best aircrew and controller teams in the NORAD system.

409 Squadron's Voodoos were selected the best in Canada during national competition in early 1970.

It has come to my ears that several irate citizens from Riverton recently visited the Framfari offices with blood in their eye. It seems the full credit has never been given to our northern sister for the part played by pioneers in their immediate area in printing the original Framfari. Their claim that the original printing press was located in Lundi is absolutely correct according to W. Kristjanson's "The Icelandic People in Manitoba". My problem is that I don't know exactly where Lundi is or was located. I am told that this delegation has more information which they are invited to pass to the Framfari so that full credit may be given.

My main interest in their observation is that the name Framfari, having been dug out of the archives, dusted off and used once more, has become a household word in our area in our time, much as it was almost 100 years ago when the original paper was produced in Lundi. This sort of thing can be very satisfying to a struggling publisher. If Framfari has done nothing more than spark an interest in the history of our area, then indeed framfari (progress) has been made.

Dear Sir:

The Riverton Village Council at the February 15, 1971 council meeting granted approval to a proposal made by Thomas Jonasson to have a Framfari cairn erected in the Riverton Centennial Park. "FRAMFARI", the name of the first Icelandic language newspaper printed in North America in a log cabin in the Village of Riverton, then called Lundi, and also called Icelandic River, and referred to as River Settlement. The first issue of the original Framfari was dated September 1, 1877.

A Framfari Cairn Fund committee has been formed with nine members, Thomas A. Jonasson, Simbi Johnson, S.H. Briem, Siggie B. Johnson, H.G. Stadfeld, Halldor Bjornsson, L. Bergen, K. Thorarinson, W.A. Jonasson, who are diligently striving to secure funds for the Framfari cairn so further plans could be made for building the cairn as soon as the weather is favourable in the spring.

Those of the younger generation who are not familiar with the original Framfari newspaper printed at Riverton might be interested in the book by W. Kristjanson, "The Icelandic People in Manitoba". On page 58 may be found the account of the plan for beginning the original Framfari paper and on page 59 an illustration of the Framfari Share Certificate may be studied. On pages 252 and 253 may be found the account of how Logberg purchased the original Framfari printing press as well as the publishing rights of the Framfari paper. This may clear up any misunderstanding about the origin of the original Framfari.

In erecting a Framfari cairn in the Riverton Centennial Park we will not just be honouring those men who made such a noble effort to provide an official voice for the colony of "New Iceland" but will preserve for future generations some of the history of Riverton that was made by some of our first settlers with great sacrifice. With dedicated effort the Framfari cairn should stand as a noteworthy addition to the attractions already in the Riverton Centennial Park to be enjoyed by residents, visitors and tourists alike. 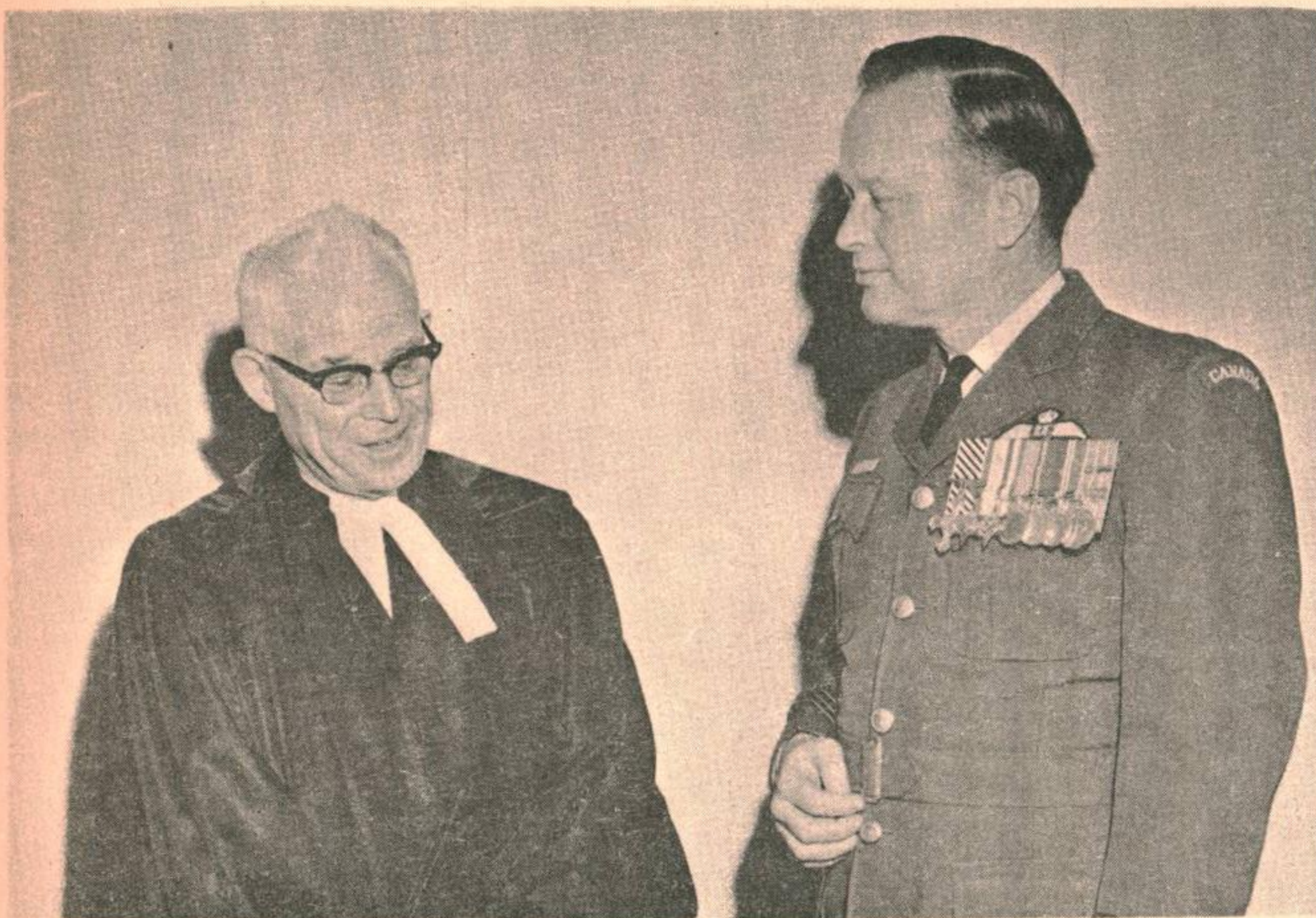

DOCTORS STUDY AERO MEDICINE

TORONTO, Ontario (CFP)--It's a long, arduous road to become a flight surgeon in the Canadian Armed Forces.

Six officers are seven weeks from the end of that road.

They are members of the flight surgeon's course here at the School of Aviation Medicine. Their graduation date is March 26. On that date they will be presented the highly coveted flight surgeon's badge.

Each is a qualified medical doctor with at least eight years of university learning.

During the course, the doctors undergo intensive study and practical experiences to channel themselves into the highly specialized field of aviation medicine. They delve deeply into accident investigation, aviation toxicology, decompression sickness, hyperventilation and all the subjects which they must know intimately if they are to supervise the health standards of armed forces aircrew from day to day to prevent flying accidents.

The participants in high altitude decompression tests, and human centrifuge trials. They fly in just about every aircraft from single piston-engine to multiple jet. They complete flight medical examinations and determine stress factors involving air traffic control personnel.

Also on the present flight surgeon's course are two doctors of the federal department of national health and welfare. They are preparing to take the specialist's knowledge to the civilian side of flying. Doctor Marcel Clement of Dorion, Quebec, is employed in Montreal. Doctor Walter D. Trafton of North Vancouver works in Toronto.

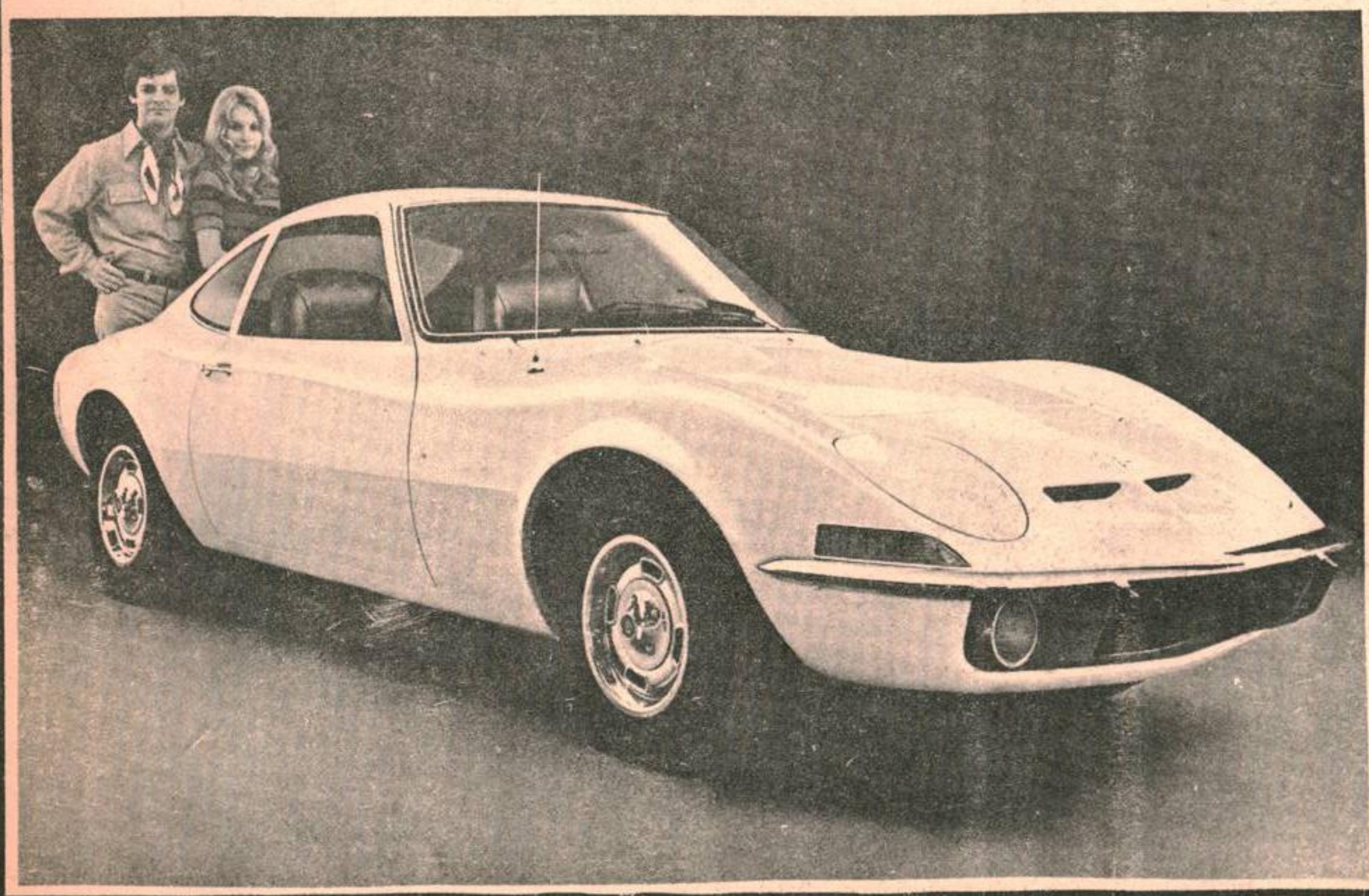

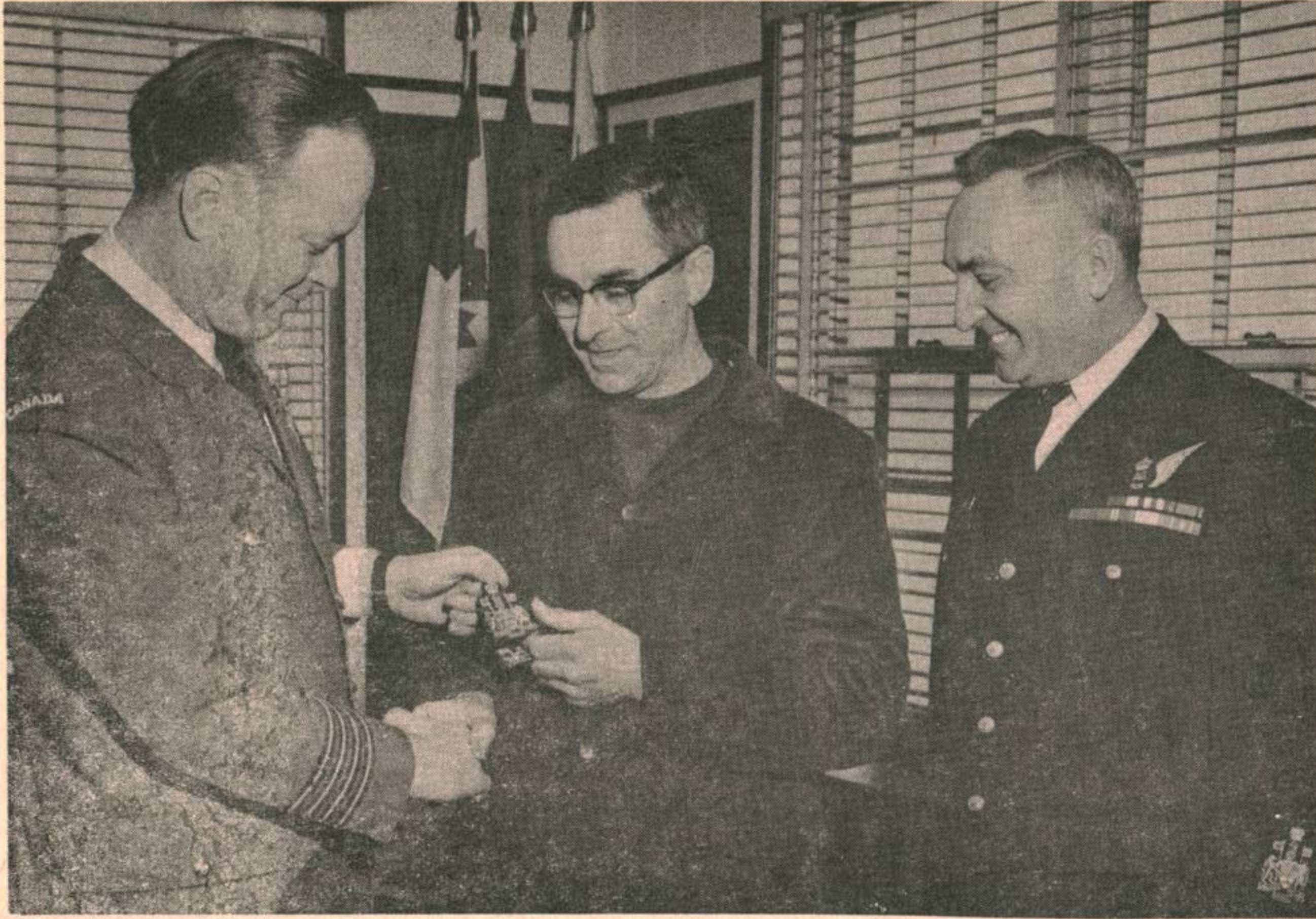

New Money Honey!

U.K. CHANGES CURRENCY

LONDON(CFP)--If you plan to visit the United Kingdom this year on leave or duty - beware - D-Day has arrived.

D-Day or Decimal Day (Feb. 15) marked the most extensive currency reform operation in the UK's history. It was the first currency change for Britain in more than 12 centuries.

For years Britain's money has confounded and confused hordes of visitors and has been described as characteristically eccentric. What sense can visitors make out of a system where shillings were totalled by 20 and pennies by twelves? Who could solve the mysteries of guineas (21 shillings) florins (two shillings) half-pennies and crowns?

A decimal currency system for Britain is not a new idea. The first parliamentary discussions on the decimal system date back to 1824. The U.S. abandoned the pound in 1792 in favour of the 100-cent dollar. France went on the decimal system a year later. While the rest of the world went to decimals Britain staunchly held out. But in March 1966 the British government yielded and declared its determination to adopt a 100-penny pound within five years.

On D-Day the government's plans went into effect. The pound, now worth about \$2.50, was divided into 100 new pence with each pence worth about 2.4 cents. Coins in use are: half-penny (pronounced 'hape-nee') one penny (2.4 cents) two penny (4.8 cents) five penny (about 12 cents) ten pence (about 24 cents) and the 50 pence piece (about \$1.20).

Paper money now in circulation consists of 1, 5, 10 and 20 pound notes. One pound is worth about \$2.40.

So, servicemen and their dependents who plan to visit Britain should do so fully armed with new conversion tables. As one of the British advertising slogans says, "Think Decimal - That Way You'll Find the Shopping Easy".

Outside World

JOB INTERVIEW IMPORTANT

OTTAWA (CFP)--The outside world to someone seeking his first job at the moment of retirement can offer a number of surprises. After twenty-five years, we know our own worth and have a good idea of the kind of work we want as a civilian. The mechanics seem straight-forward enough, such as studying the job market, preparing a career resume and making contact with employers. But simply going through the motions of applying for a job is not enough and success or failure may hinge on the little things. Consider the employment interview.

The employment interview can be crucial. What are the factors which affect decision making during the interview. Here are a few points to ponder:

- Interviewers will usually have a stereotype of what they consider a good candidate should be and will attempt to match you with this stereotype. Most civilian firms do not need a parade square type.

- First impressions in an interview can influence the outcome of the interview. The suit you wear, the way you walk into the office, your handshake are all factors that will often decide the success of the interview.
- Interviewers are more influenced by unfavourable than favourable information during an interview. An interviewer is trying to look for your faults simply to protect himself. He has to answer to management for a bad applicant. Be careful not to venture into areas that could put you in an unfavourable light during your interview.

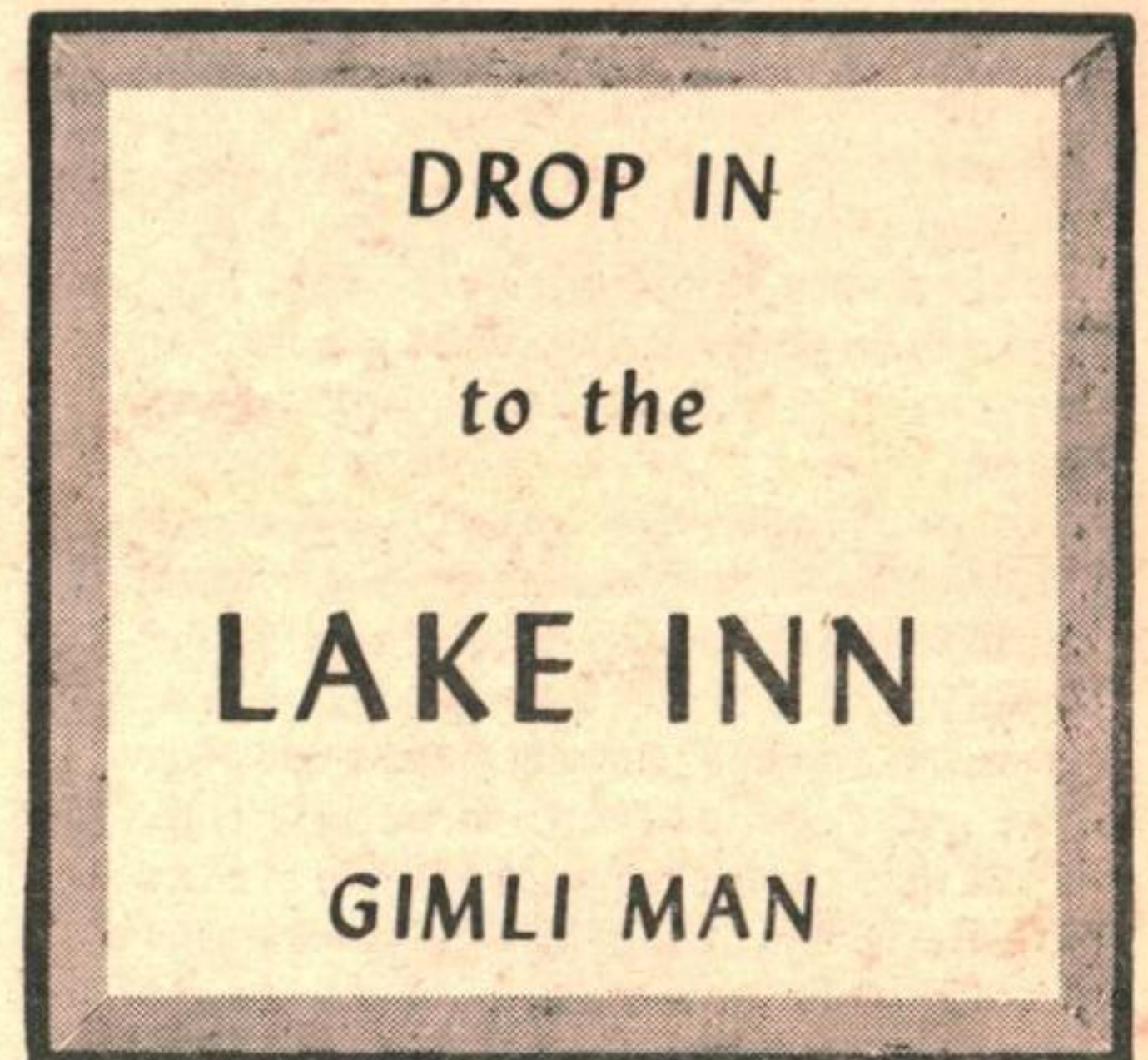
Finding a job is too important to leave to chance. Attention to small details is important in avoiding unpleasant surprises.

House of Commons Debates

However, none of these occasions has been quite so pleasant as the one that presents itself today because this is the first occasion on which I have the opportunity to extend a double welcome.

Just a few days ago in this chamber we happily welcomed our annual floral notification that spring was born anew in British Columbia and would soon be moving eastward. This floral gift always cheers us up after a long, hard winter. Today we happily welcome the arrival of another much more significant gift from that province, and we must extend our thanks to the Prime Minister for the part he played in acquiring this gift and transporting it to Ottawa. The fact that he was able to make it a surprise gift is, of course, a tribute to his artistic ingenuity.

should deal with this matter.

The Leader of the Opposition spoke of a question of privilege. It may be a question of privilege; it may be a point of order. However, I do want to give a solemn assurance to the House, on behalf of the individual concerned, that there will not be a repetition of the incident so touchingly recalled the other day by the right hon. member of Prince Albert. I do not know how I shall reconcile this undertaking with the suggestion made by the spokesman for the New Democratic Party. If an appearance is made I shall make sure it is silent, but I think I can also assure the House that it will probably be the only occasion on which I will be able to ensure such silence.

I should add, Mr. Speaker, that my joy during the past few days has been sobered considerably by the sudden death on Saturday of Ab Douglas. Ab brought with him to the House in 1968 a degree of dignity, an unquestioned integrity and a sense of devotion to duty which soon won him the respect and friendship of all hon. members. I found when I visited Ab's family in his riding not so many months ago that

this same respect and friendship were very evident amongst his neighbours. I think we all realize that when Ab Douglas spoke in this House he did so in the perspective of countless generations of men who have tilled the soil and who understand the honesty and the beauty of nature's work.

I wish to join with all other hon. members who have already offered their sincere condolences to Mrs. Douglas and her children.

PPCLI Bursaries

CALGARY(CFP)--The wives club of the 1st Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry is once again offering bursaries to children of serving Patricias or former members of the battalion or of any corps which served with the unit since 1950.

Canada's initial contribution to the Korean conflict was the despatch of three destroyers, the Athabaskan, Cayuga and Sioux, which saw action in Korean waters beginning in August, 1950. First land element subjected to fire was the 2nd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, which landed at Pusan December 18, 1950.

Two \$150.00 bursaries will be awarded to the selected boy and girl to assist them in the post secondary fields of technical or applied arts.

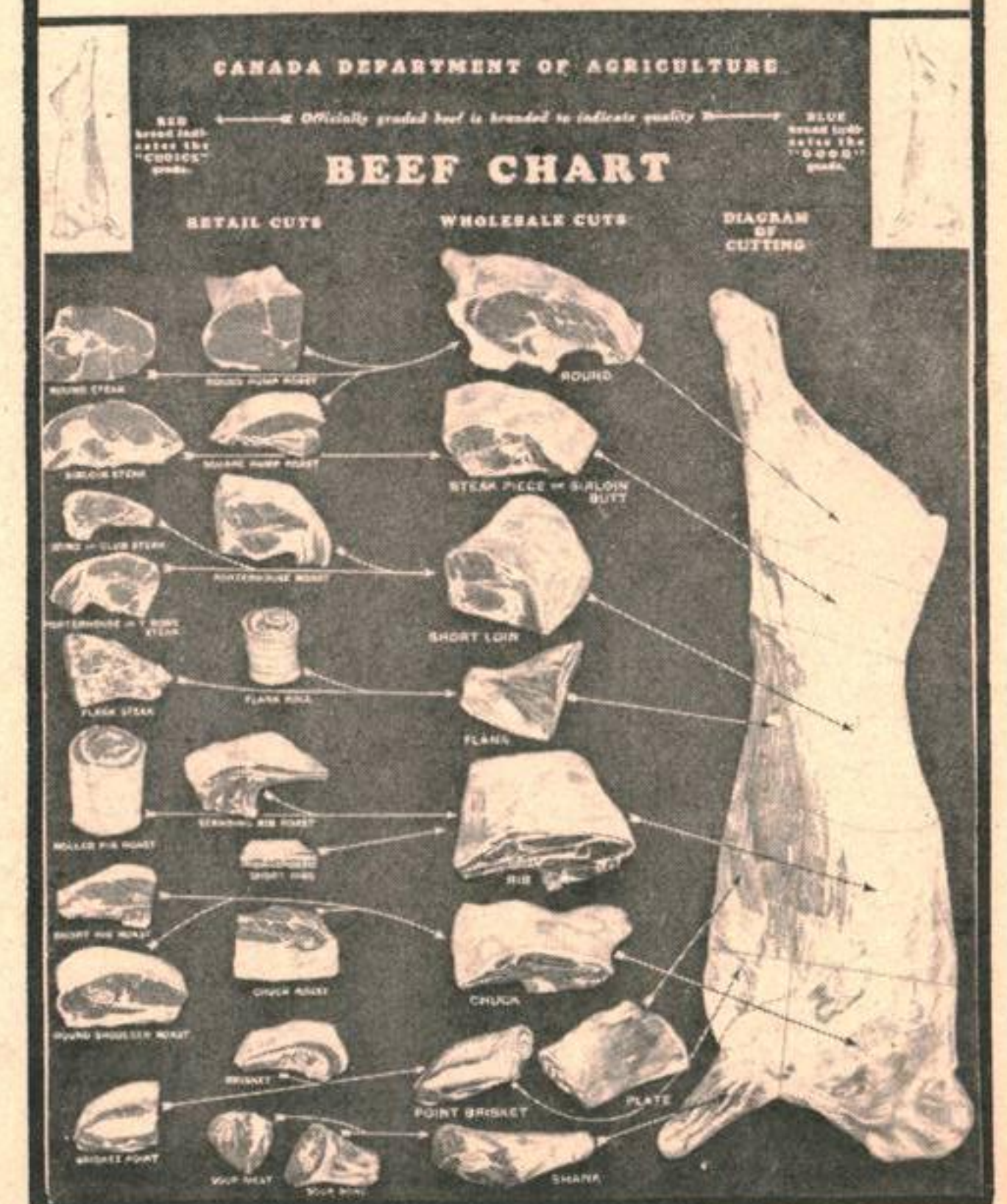

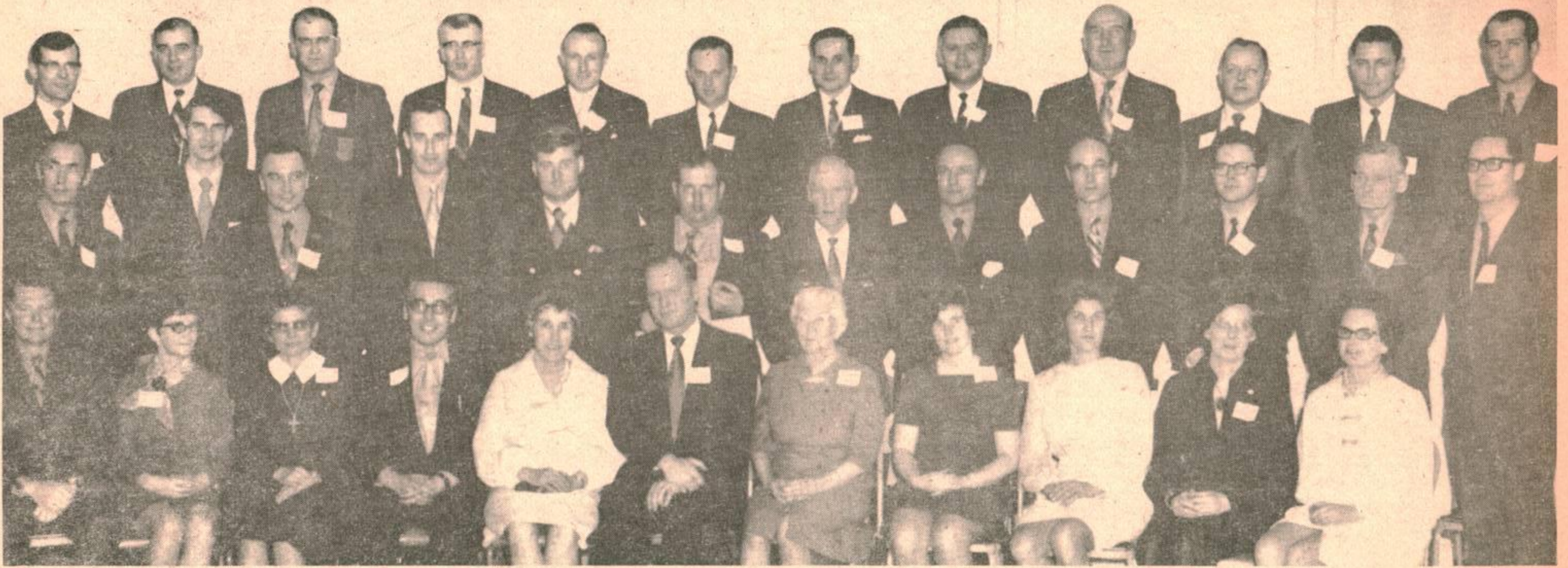

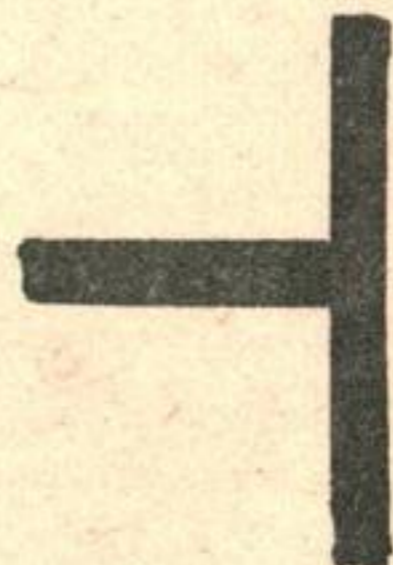

THE LAYMAN AND THE CHURCH

In the church, the "layman" is a term used to denote someone who is not a member of the clergy. When we speak of the ministry of the laity, we are speaking of the ministry of all those who have not been ordained as ministers of Word and Sacrament.

All too often we think and speak as if the ministry is the unique function of the ordained clergy. Such an attitude is not only wrong, it is harmful, for the essence of the church's mission in the world is the ministry of the laity.

A clergyman is either very blind or very naive if he doesn't realize that the effectiveness of

his personal ministry is contingent upon the effectiveness of those who work and cooperate with him in the endeavour to make the church effective and relevant in the community as a whole. To put it more bluntly, if I couldn't depend upon concerned and active laymen, my work would be hampered to the point where I would probably give up.

The ministry of the church is the ministry of the congregation. The people in the congregation can make the church effective or sterile. If the laity, the people of the congregation, are prepared to give of themselves to make the community a better place in which to live, than the church is effective in the community. If the laity allow themselves to become just an inward looking, self-perpetuating club and assume no responsibility in the community, then the church is useless. The church can be an effective force in the community only if church members are involved in community activity.

It helps if the minister himself is actively involved in the community. However, if the laity fulfill their ministry in the community the church can be a vital force even if the minister is useless, for the essence of the church's mission is the ministry of the laity.
