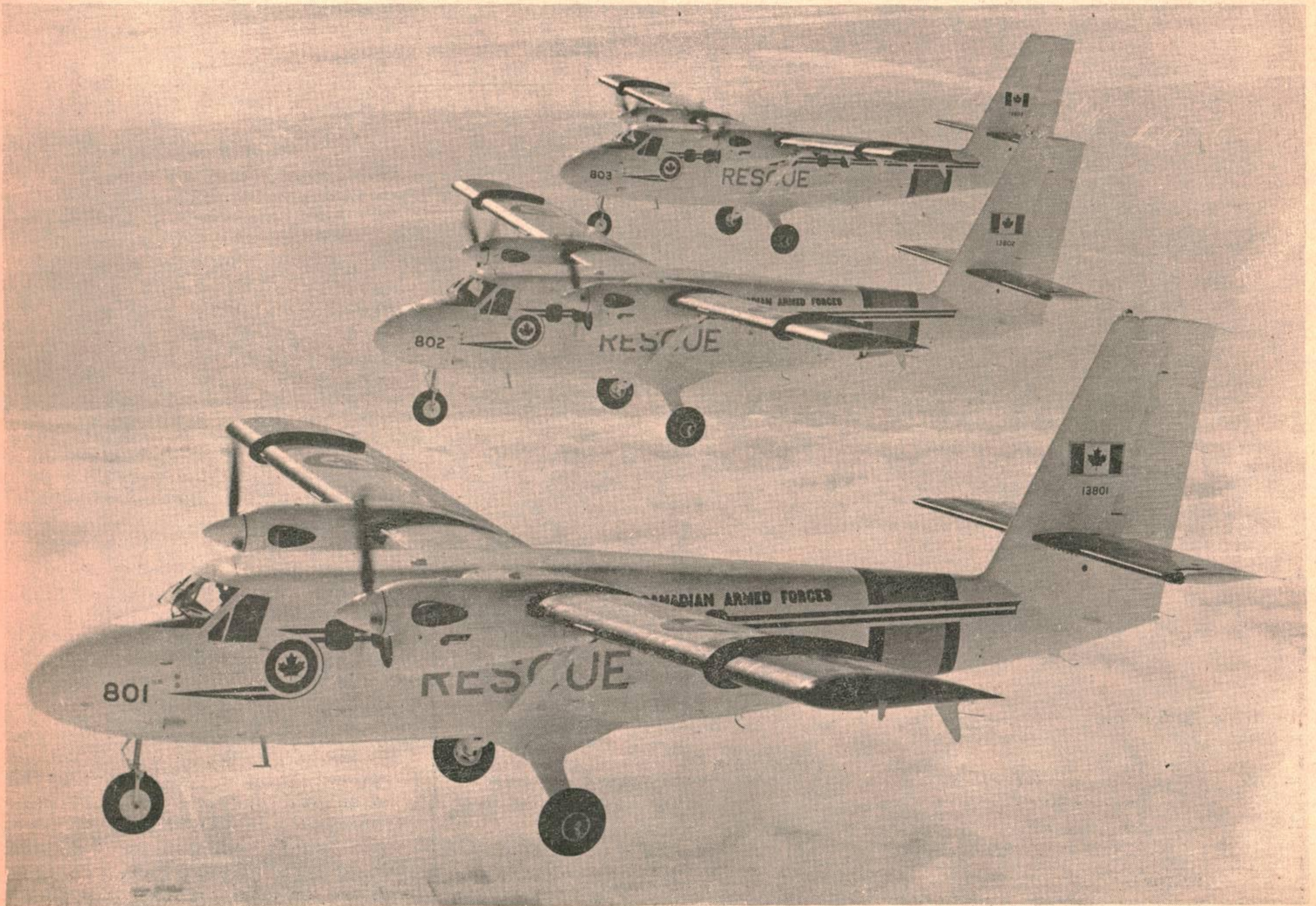
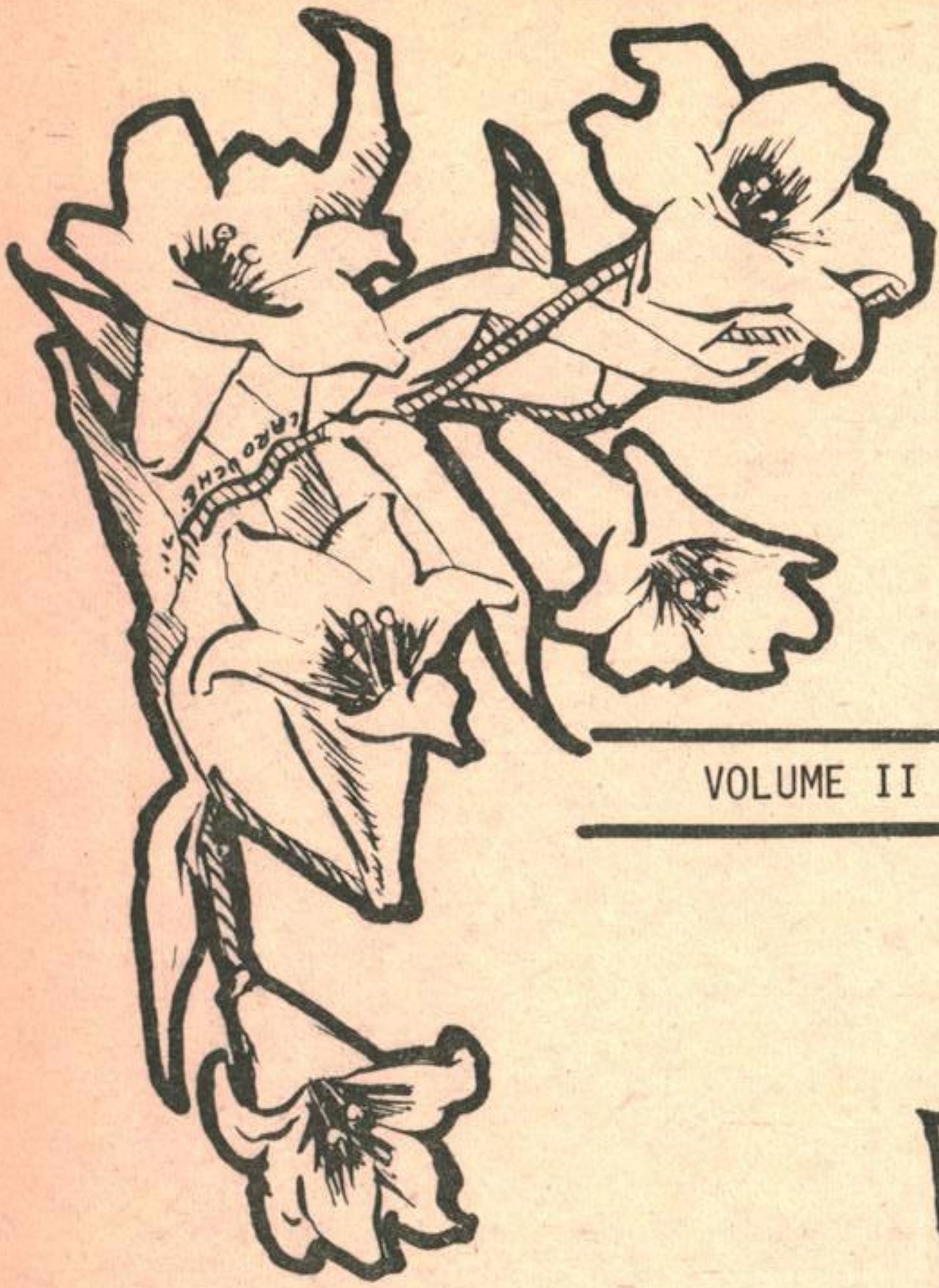

Twin Otter

The Honourable Donald S. Macdonald, minister of national defence, announced today that the department of Supply and Services is purchasing eight light transport aircraft for the department of National Defence.

The aircraft, DHC-6 Twin Otters manufactured by de Havilland Aircraft of Canada, Toronto, will be used primarily in the search and rescue, and utility transport roles and in support of Canadian forces northern operations.

Two Twin Otters will be based at Canadian Forces Base Namao, Alta. and four at C.F.B. Trenton, Ont. Five of these aircraft will replace search and rescue Dakotas while the sixth, based at Trenton, Ont. will be assigned to support United Nations operations, replacing an existing Caribou aircraft. The remaining two Twin Otters will be based at Yellowknife, N.W.T. in support of the newly formed Northern Region Headquarters.

Delivery of the Twin Otters will start in May and be completed this August.

The Twin Otter is a twin-engined, light STOL (short take-off and landing) utility transport aircraft capable of carrying up to 20 passengers or almost 5,000 pounds of cargo. It is powered by two PT6A-27 turboprop engines, designed and built by United Aircraft of Canada, Longueuil, Que. The Twin Otter can operate on wheels, skis or floats as required.

The department of Supply and Services has awarded a contract valued at \$4.56 million to de Havilland Aircraft of Canada, Toronto, for the aircraft. In addition, various government furnished avionics, optional extra equipment and spare parts will be purchased later under this program.

Major H.P. (Hank) Funk, CD

Major Henry Peter "Hank" Funk, 47, son of Mrs. Katherine Funk of Coaldale, Alberta, and the late Mr. John J. Funk, died suddenly on Tuesday at Canadian Forces Base Gimli. Major Funk is survived by his beloved wife Ingrid (nee Holm Neilson), their six children, Deborah Lea, Douglas Robert, Harvey Henry, Kathryn Anne, Marilyn Joan, and Patricia Sharon.

The funeral service took place at 2:00 p.m. Thursday at the Protestant Chapel. Interment was at the Gimli Community Cemetery, Gimli.

Major Funk enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in March 1943 as an air gunner. While serving in Europe he completed a tour of operations with the Pathfinders and returned to Canada in the fall of 1945.

Following the war, Major Funk took a release from the service and re-enlisted in September 1953 as an accounts officer. Since then he has served at Calgary, Lachine, Goose Bay, Winnipeg and Gimli. Major Funk has been the base comptroller at Gimli since his arrival in September 1968.

Major Funk was an active participant in base curling activities and helped represent C.F.B. Gimli in many provincial bonspiels.

The staff and readers of Framfari extend to Ingrid, her children, Major Funk's mother and family our most sincere sympathies. We will all miss him both at work and off duty.

CANADIAN ARMED FORCES OFFICER REQUIREMENTS

Question No. 1,108--Mr. Forrestall:

What is the current requirement per year of new officers in the Armed Forces and, of these, how many at university graduate level?

Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of National Defence): In 1971-72, 749. Of these 358 will be graduating from subsidized university training plans and 140 will be commissioned from the ranks. Of the remaining 251 it is hoped as many as possible will be university graduates, or, as a minimum, hold a diploma from an accredited technological institute. Any additional requirements may be met by enrolling high school matriculants through the Officer Candidate Training Plan. Once the current force reduction has been accomplished it is estimated that the annual requirement for officers will be approximately 1,100 per year, 60% of whom we hope will be university graduates.

Mr. J.M. Forrestall (Dartmouth-Halifax East): I wonder if I may direct a further question to the Minister of National Defence.

Would he erase from the minds of all Canadians in a definitive way the implication or import of Mr. Levesque's statement? Rather than treating it lightly, would he give us a definite indication whether or not there are indications from studies that have been made of the presence of separatists in the armed forces?

Mr. Macdonald (Rosedale): As the hon. member knows, the question of security in the forces is kept under review at all times, and I repeat what I said a moment ago to the Leader of the Creditiste party, that we have no reason to believe that the statements made are accurate or indeed that there is any penetration whatsoever of the Canadian Armed Forces.

[Translation]

In reply to the hon. member for Joliette, I should like to say that, to my mind, it is not possible to be a member of the Canadian armed forces and a separatist at the same time.

Mr. E.B. Osler (Winnipeg South Centre): I would like the Minister of National Defence to assure us that he is taking legal steps to safeguard the good name of all French-speaking people in our armed forces, who serve loyally and do a wonderful job for us, against the slanderous statements of this chuckler from east of here who poses as a political leader.

Mr. Macdonald (Rosedale): Mr. Speaker, I can only reaffirm what I have just said, that we have no reason whatsoever to believe that there is the slightest support for the accuracy of the allegations which Mr. Levesque has made now on several occasions.

Cold Lake Joins TC

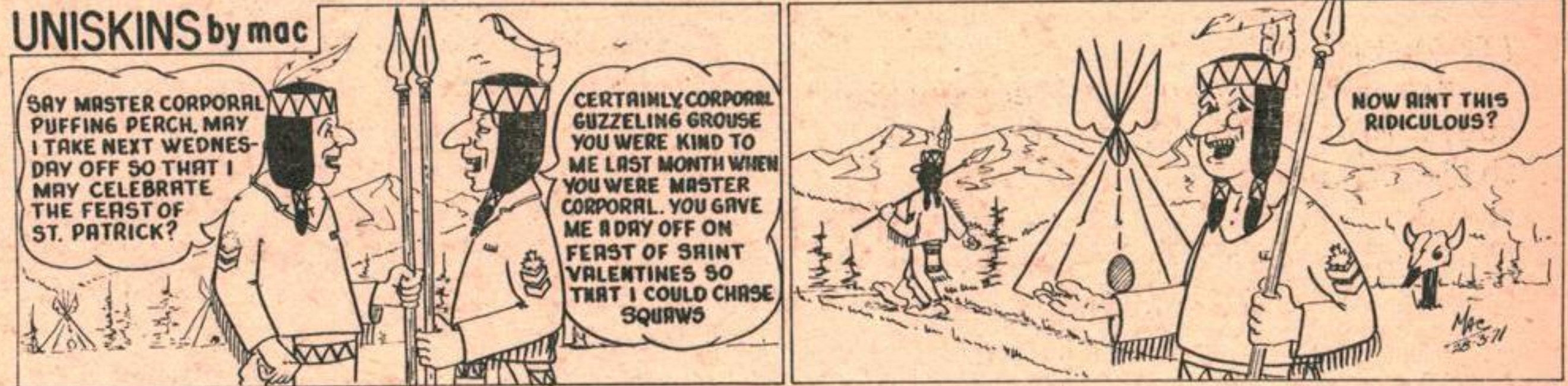
EDMONTON, ALBERTA, March 31 -- Effective April 1, 1971 Canadian Forces Base Cold Lake became the responsibility of Training Command, Winnipeg. Up to now the destiny of the base has been guided by Air Defence Command, North Bay, Ont.


According to Colonel W.H. Vincent, base commander, there will be little outward differences in day-to-day operations. "It's an administrative change; he commented, "brought about by recent re-grouping of other armed forces organizations".

Lodger units on the base will continue to be the direct responsibility of their respective commands. Only two, 42 Radar Squadron and the Satellite Tracking unit, belong to Air Defence Command.

A new unit, the Flying Training School, is scheduled to commence operating this summer. All pilots of the Canadian armed forces will win their "wings" there before going on to advanced flying courses.

HOUSE OF COMMONS DEBATES Cont'd....

QUEBEC--ALLEGED PRESENCE OF SEPARATISTS IN CANADIAN ARMED FORCES

[Translation]

Mr. Real Caouette (Temiscamisque): Mr. Speaker, after having called upon Voltaire and Shakespeare, I think you are right in finding it proper to call upon the member for Temiscamisque.

In view of the statement that Mr. Rene Levesque made yesterday in Regina, to the effect that some Canadian armed forces units based in Quebec are teeming with separatist, is the Minister of National Defence aware of the existence of separatist elements in the armed forces units based in Quebec and is his department inquiring to see whether Mr. Rene Levesque's allegations are true?

Hon. Donald Macdonald (Minister of National Defence): Mr. Speaker, a few weeks ago, I had the opportunity to say that we had complete trust in the Canadian armed forces, particularly the French-speaking units. But in Ottawa a few days ago, Mr. Levesque talked about a straitjacket and to me his comments tend to indicate that his friends are the ones who should use a straitjacket on him.

Mr. Roch La Salle (Joliette): Mr. Speaker, I should like to put a supplementary question to the Minister of National Defence.

With regard to the question of the hon. member for Temiscamisque, I should like to ask the minister whether, even if he were to admit that there are separatists in the army, he feels that on those grounds they are not entitled to be members of the Canadian armed forces.

[Translation]

Mr. George Valade (Sainte-Marie): Mr. Speaker, I have a supplementary for the Minister of National Defence.

In view of the statement made in the House by the Minister of Labour during the debate on the War Measures Act to the effect that members of the FLQ should not be mistaken for members of the Parti Quebecois, could the minister reaffirm that those who would be acknowledged as members of the Parti Quebecois would not be accepted in the Armed Forces?

Mr. Macdonald (Rosedale): In my opinion, Mr. Speaker, it is impossible for a separatist to take the oath of the Armed Forces and at the same time be a separatist.

[English]

Mr. Speaker: The Chair will recognize the hon. member for Ontario as the last member to ask a supplementary question on this subject. We are still on supplementary questions to the first question. We are not proceeding very expeditiously.

Mr. Norman Cafik (Ontario): Would the Minister of National Defence take steps to provide to Mr. Levesque an opportunity to supply the names of such alleged separatists in our forces, in other words, ask him to put up or shut up?

An hon. Member: Take your own advice.

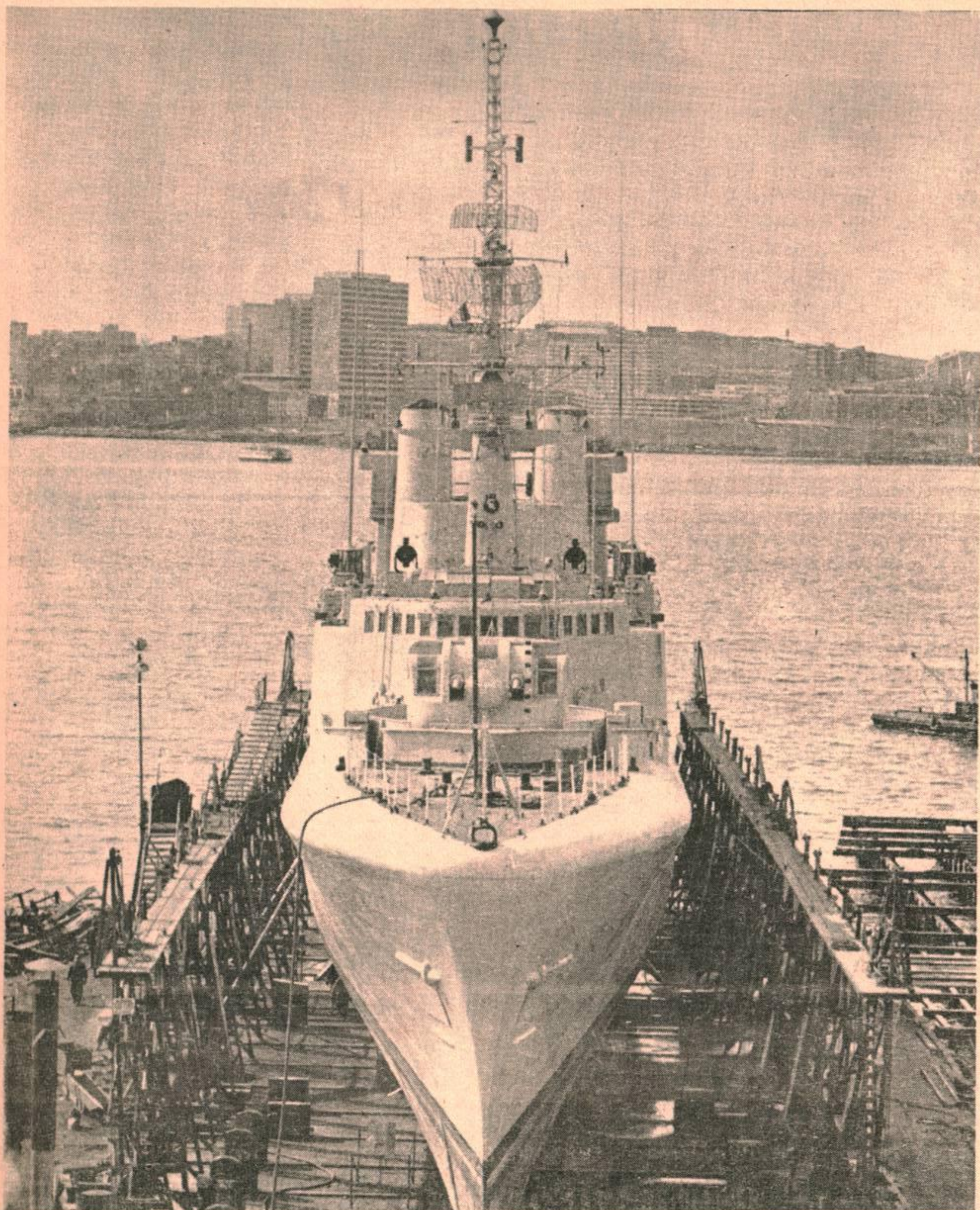

Canada at War

CANADA'S WAR POLICIES PUBLISHED

OTTAWA (CFP)--Colonel C.P. Stacey's long-awaited "Arms, men and Governments" - The War Policies of Canada, 1939-1945, has been published by the Queen's Printer. The book describes almost every aspect of Canadian War Policy, and is based on the exhaustive use of available sources, including many collections of papers that have never been used before. Col. Stacey has consulted the confidential records of the Canadian government, and the private papers of many senior statesmen and officers.

The book examines pre-war planning, the nature and working of the Canadian government in wartime, and Canada's relationship with allied nations. The author has drawn extensively on the MacKenzie King diary and papers to illustrate and explain the relationship between the Canadian Prime Minister and President Roosevelt; he has examined the controversial retirement of General McNaughton; and he has gone into the so-called "Canadianization" of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

A section of manpower and conscription affords, among other things, a detailed account of the inner history of the famous conscription crisis of 1944. The final portion of the book deals with supply and development; it includes an exposition, largely based on sources hitherto unused, of Canada's wartime connection with the development of atomic energy.

Col. Stacey himself is the dean of Canadian military historians. From 1940 until 1959 he was responsible for the preparation and writing of the official histories of the Canadian army, including "Six Years of War" and "The Victory Campaign". In 1964 he returned to Ottawa to take charge of the newly integrated directorate of history for its first two years. Apart from this period, since 1959 he has been on the faculty of the University of Toronto. He has been engaged in the preparation of the present volume since 1959.

Hercs Flexible

OTTAWA(CFP)--Every successful operation requires flexibility. This is a military maxim which air transport squadrons endorse by proudly pointing out the C130E Hercules aircraft.

436 "Elephant" squadron, based at Uplands, and 435 "Chinthe" squadron at Namao, in Alberta provide the muscle and versatility to Air Transport Command.

The Hercules can be used economically on short hops or trans-continental routes. It can operate from short strips, with bulky loads and a minimum of ground support equipment for cargo handling. A Hercules can land on an unprepared surface such as clay, sand, or sod. It can and does carry anything from people to pills.

Statistics are usually dull but those of the Hercules are quoted by air crew with the same awe most people render to the "vital" statistics of Miss America. In fact, the Hercules figures can often literally be a matter of life and death.

In Pakistan, Biafra, and Peru the thread of life to thousands depended on the capabilities of the "herc".

The big bird can carry 94 personnel, or 64 paratroopers, or 72 litters, or 45,000 pounds of freight. It has a range of 4,500 miles at a speed of 300 knots and puts down where many other aircraft can't.

Only 23 aircraft, but the two Hercules squadrons make their presence known around the world.

An Awakening**OF
SOCIAL CONSCIOUSNESS**

In Latin America a promising and fairly general effort is taking place toward the education of the people. Several countries, particularly in the last ten years, have promoted schooling to an advanced degree; but, in a number of regions a large proportion of the people are still without any schooling.

In 1947, at Sutatenza, Colombia, a priest inaugurated teaching by radio with incalculable results. But he could only reach some of the people and education remained only partial; people's minds were not aroused to the why of learning, the savoir faire of knowledge of how to apply it. They were content to read what others wrote, to accept their ideas naively and to remain dependent. Awareness of this dependence, to know the meaning of underdevelopment in order to desire development and to seek the means of achieving it within one's self and one's surroundings, to become the agent of one's improvement, rather than to be subject to others or to expect it from them, to be able to make decisions because one knows what and why one decides -- on these essentials rest the conditions for the development of the whole man. It is easy to imagine that this brings about a coming to grips with conscience -- perhaps even a CRISIS of conscience.

It is this method of education which Paul Freire, a Brazilian intellectual invented, experimented with and popularized first, in his own country and then elsewhere. In 1962 he announced the news that an adult could be taught to read and write in a period of 50 hours. He proved his theory at the University of Recife through experimentation of his method. The government of Brazil soon entrusted him with the task of teaching reading and writing to the whole country. However, in 1964 the new government suspected him of subversive designs and he was exiled. Chili offered him protection and work. Following this, UNESCO and the World Council of Churches recognized this method and retained his services.

By placing each individual face to face with the realities of life, the consequences of his attitude and his actions, Freire led his disciples to re-think particularly all levels of their

personal activities, both in the social and religious areas.

By realizing his total dependence, even his slavery, his lack of participation in creativity, man is led to desire his interior freedom (superstitions, ignorance) as well as exterior freedom (nature - droughts, floods, etc.) and he learns to defend himself against those who would easily exploit his dependence. Knowing that he is not a slave because he is ignorant, but ignorant because he is enslaved, the Brazilian was first led to a desire for freedom and then to a desire for learning. This two-fold stage of the same process was called "Awakening of Social Consciousness".

The first step is to realize that man is different from the nature surrounding him; that he is not its slave, but its developer; that he has been the victim of customs (traditions) and that he must change his ways. He must understand that because for centuries his ancestors followed certain customs he is not bound to act in the same manner. He then reaches the point where he wishes to make use of nature for his own needs, which is called "culture". Paul Freire tells them: "It is your task to help nature and nature will help you." He teaches them about the different things in the world around them (water, trees, clouds, storms) of culture (house, road, bricks, clothing). On the one hand it comes easily; on the other it implies work, imagination, human activity. Man then soon realizes that it takes time - too much time - to construct a road or erect a house alone and from this stems the need to join with other men to accomplish this single task. Great, as well as small accomplishments have required a uniting of men; it is the first step in glancing back at the past to understand that man has a history -- a history which he, moreover, has written himself by his own actions.

When man has recognized the sad consequences of his isolation and what he could accomplish in common with other men he is led to the choice of a word which expresses this action to be performed and this need. This word, he wishes to know how to read it, to write it after he has learned to say it. To this first word he joins others: for instance the word 'house' is connected with the words poverty, water, hygiene, taxes, sickness, promiscuity, etc. Man learns how to know and express his actual situation, his problems,

his responsibilities. Knowledge of reading and writing results in the realization of his state and the means of expressing it.

Feeling himself responsible and co-responsible, man learns the meaning of liberty -- its limits and its possibilities. In his mind he begins to build a more humane society. Being co-responsible leads man to become co-operator.

Let us add that his relationship with God will also be deeply affected. From one of fear, of mystery and of magic, his relationship with God becomes personal, an invitation to love, to hope, to sharing. God seen as the Father becomes the model for man, the Father of the family. God enters into human relationships; He influences them and makes them better. The church, seen as the family of the children of God becomes the vehicle of charity and source of complete development.

And this, briefly, is Paul Freire's revolution -- that of an "awakening of consciousness", which tends to liberate the most precious of earthly riches: MAN!
