FLYERS PRESSED BY COURSE 90

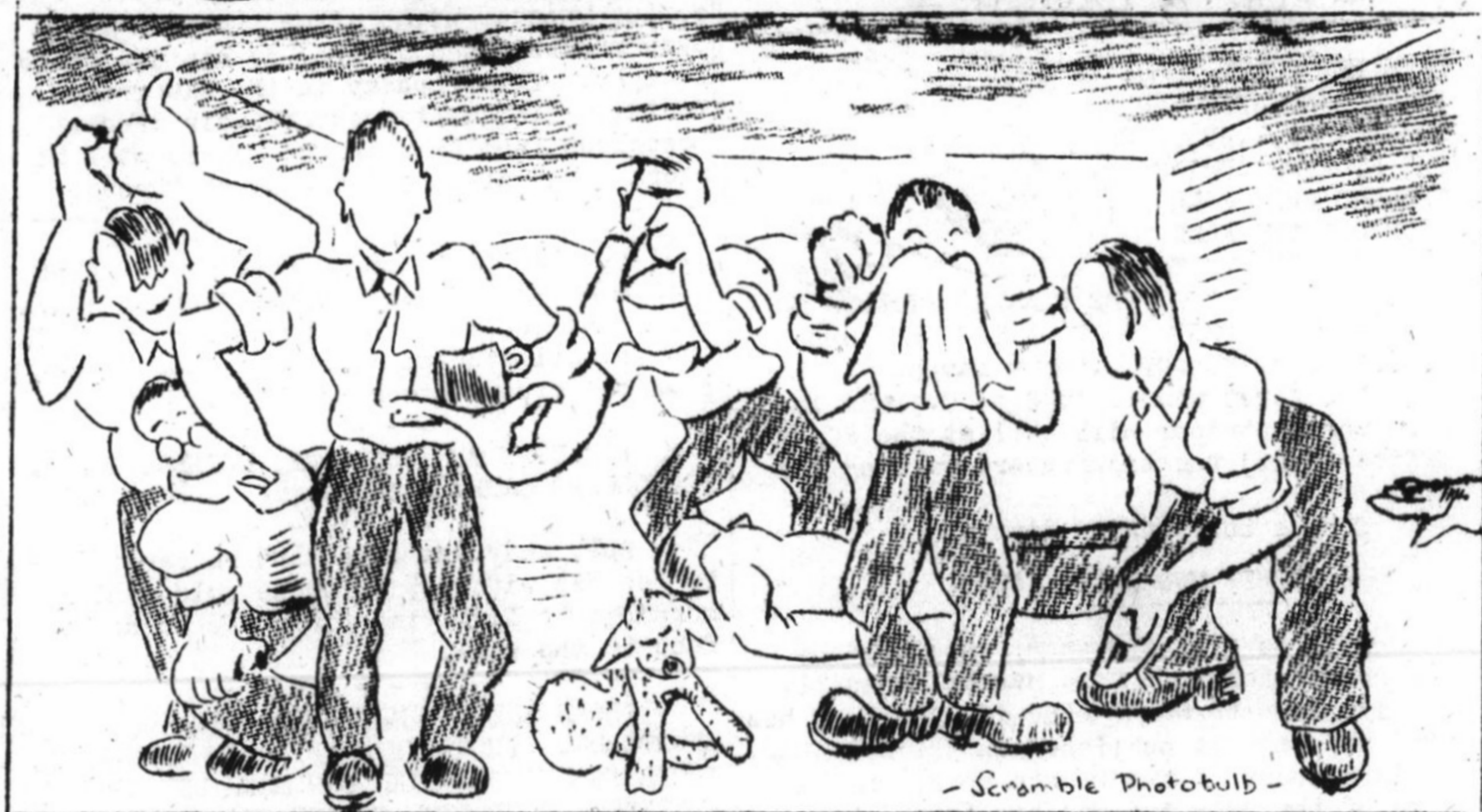

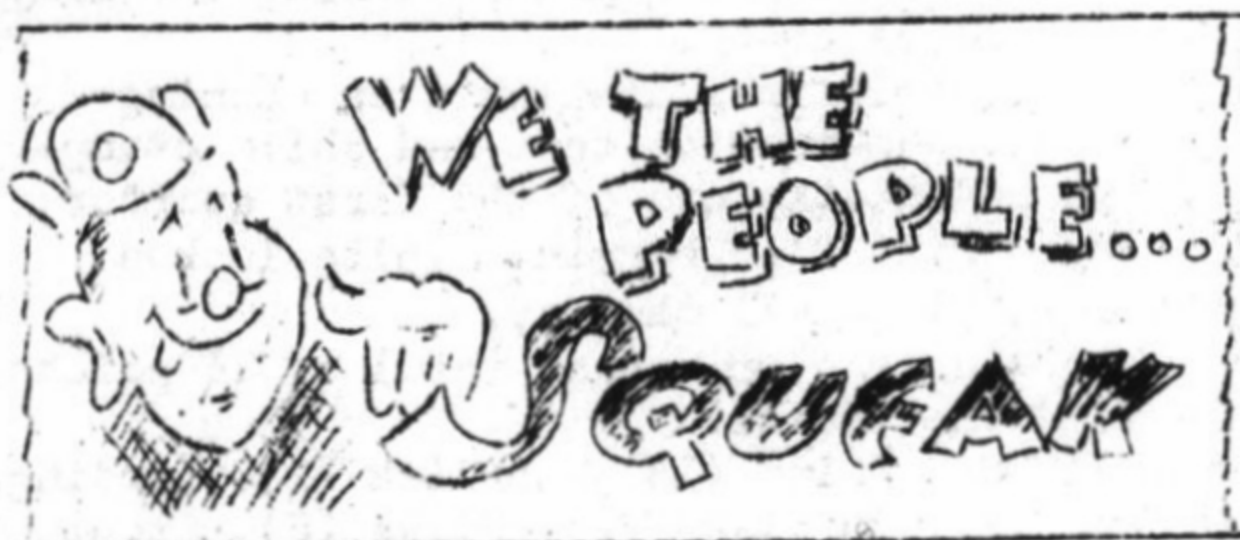

RAF BENEVOLENT FUND

It would seem to be apparent that many R.A.F. personnel in Canada are not aware of the facilities that are available for their assistance from the R.A.F. Benevolent Fund whilst they are in the Dominion.

A.F.R.O. 1648 d/13 August 1943 contains instructions that A.F.R.O. 1408 d/23 July 1943, which sets out full details of the manner in which applications for relief are to be submitted.
