I love the Air Force.

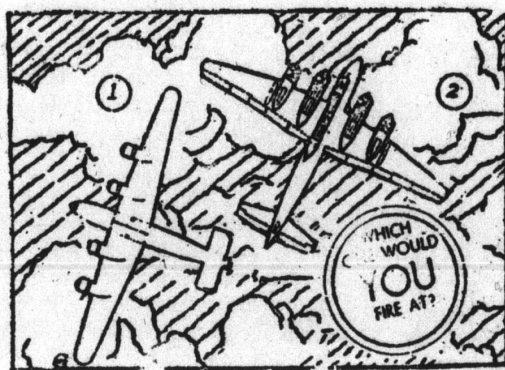

**FIRE AT NO. 2:** It's the Nazi's Fw.200K "Kurier" a low-wing heavy bomber powered with four engines. The long, pointed nose of the fuselage extends forward of the underslung engine nacelles. Its wings are equally tapered. The tapered tailplane has a single rudder.

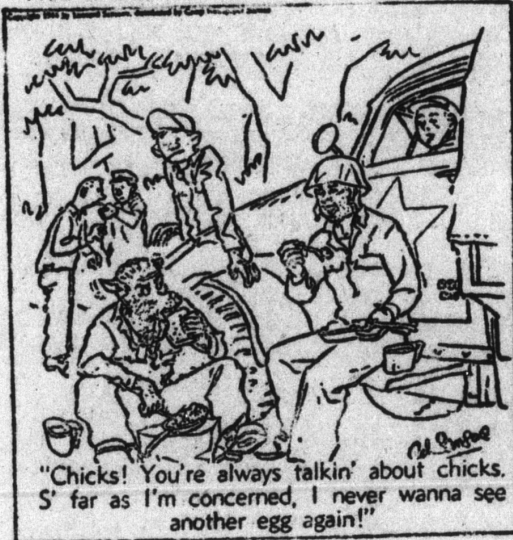
