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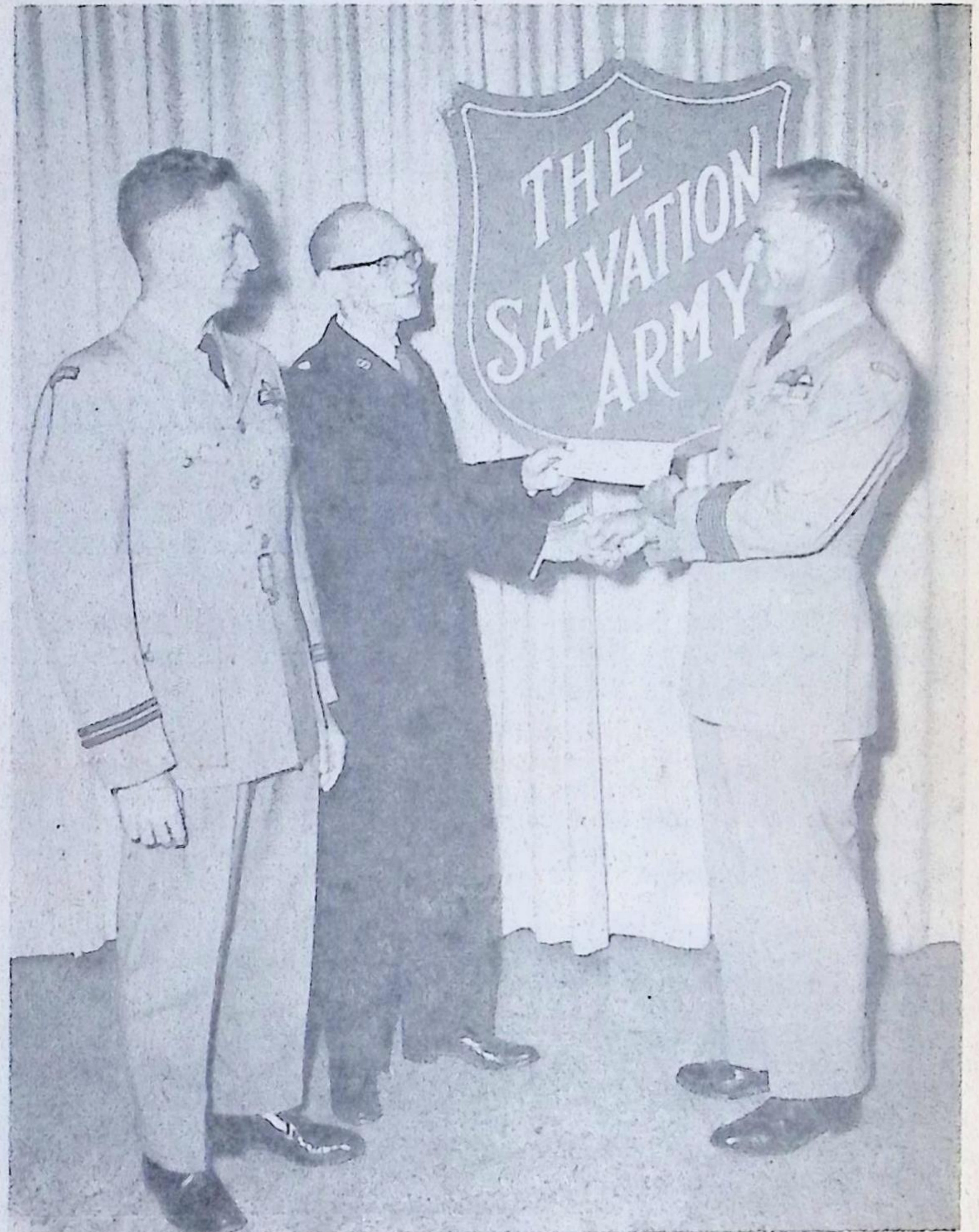

Military Exhibits In Exhibition

The 1961 Red River Exhibition will feature the largest combined military display ever seen in the Winnipeg area.

Twenty-one military units will participate in the exhibition parade on Saturday morning, June 24th, including marching units, bands, floats and many missile and gun displays.

The parade will also feature a fly-past of T33 "Silver Star" aircraft from RCAF Station Portage la Prairie. The fly-past will zoom over the Legislative Buildings in a north to south direction at 11:30 a.m., at which time the parade is scheduled to be passing the Legislative Buildings.

In the exhibition proper the Armed Forces displays will be bound in three double marquee tents located on the east side of the Winnipeg Football Stadium, between the Stadium and Empress Street.

The Royal Canadian Navy display at the exhibition will consist of a Banshee jet aircraft from HMCS Shearwater, Nova Scotia; a model of HMCS Bonaventure; an Air Defence display, and a large display depicting the Navy's anti-

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EDITORIAL CORNER

Tribute To Civilian Employee

Leaving his drawing board at Winnipeg this week, Mr. L. V. (Larry) Porter concludes fifteen years' service with the Civil Service of Canada, and a long career as a commercial artist.

Since 1950, he has been the chief graphic artist at RCAF Training Command Headquarters, first at Trenton, Ont., and for the past two years at Winnipeg.

Born in Dundee, Scotland in 1891, Mr. Porter emigrated at an early age and studied metallurgy and ornamental moulding in Montreal. He served overseas in the 13th Battalion Royal Highlanders during the First World War, and again as an instructor in the R.C.E.M.E. during the Second World War. In his career as a commercial artist, he worked as a freelance in Montreal for 39 years.

For his services in the Second World War, Mr. Porter received the United States Medal of Merit, awarded to civilians of allied countries for special contributions to the military effort.

Shortly after starting work for the RCAF graphic arts branch, Mr. Porter prepared and designed the layout for the first issue of Roundel, the Air Force magazine, in 1948. Since joining the staff of Training Command ten years ago, he has been responsible for producing all the posters, charts and illustrations used throughout the Command's air and ground training programmes.

His final, and one of his biggest jobs for the RCAF was the recently-completed graphic historical record of the service, in eighteen large panels, housed at Station Centralia, Ont.

In a farewell gathering at the Headquarters on Tuesday, Mr. Porter was presented with a silver tea service by Air Vice Marshal H. M. Carscallen, Air Officer Commanding, on behalf of the officer of Training Command, and a golf caddy cart by Group Captain R. E. Porter, Chief Ground Training Officer, on behalf of his colleagues in that branch.

On retirement, Mr. and Mrs. Porter will move to Montreal, where two of their sons, Robert Lister and Donald Bruce are living. A third son, James Mackenzie lives in Boston, Mass.

submarine role and their peace-time training programme.

The Canadian Army are not holding an Army Day this year as they have in the past. Their contribution to the Armed Forces display in the 1961 Exhibition is, however, outstanding and people who attended past Army Days should be equally impressed with the Army's contribution to the exhibition.

Their exhibits will include a para-jump display from the Canadian Joint Air Training Centre at Rivers, Man.; an arctic training display from Fort Churchill, Man.; an outstanding exhibit of guided missiles including the 'Honest John Rocket' and many others and either a H13 Helicopter or target Drone aircraft.

The Royal Canadian Air Force display will be centered on their role of Search and Rescue and will feature a large exhibit showing the National Search and Rescue organization and supported by a Para Rescue Display from 111 Composite Unit at RCAF Station Winnipeg.

In addition to the Search and Rescue exhibits the RCAF will also have on display a Training Command exhibit and a T33 Silver Star Training aircraft.

Military Retreat Services with the Traditional Flag lowering ceremony will be held each evening at the Armed Forces Display area at 7:30 p.m. with the exception of Armed Forces Day, June 27th, when the Retreat Service will be at 7:45 p.m.

The Retreat Services will be performed by the Apprentice Battery, Royal Canadian School of Artillery, Camp Shilo, on June 24th; Royal Canadian Horse Artillery Band on June 26th; a Tri-Service

Retreat on Armed Forces Day, June 27th, consisting of Royal Canadian Naval Reserve Band, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery Band and the RCAF Station Winnipeg Band; Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders on June 28th; RCAF Station Winnipeg Band and guard on June 29th and July 1st; and the Royal Canadian Navy Reserve Band on June 30th.

In addition to the fly past over the Legislative Buildings during the opening parade, flying displays will be performed over the Exhibition grounds on June 27th, 28th, 30th and July 1st.

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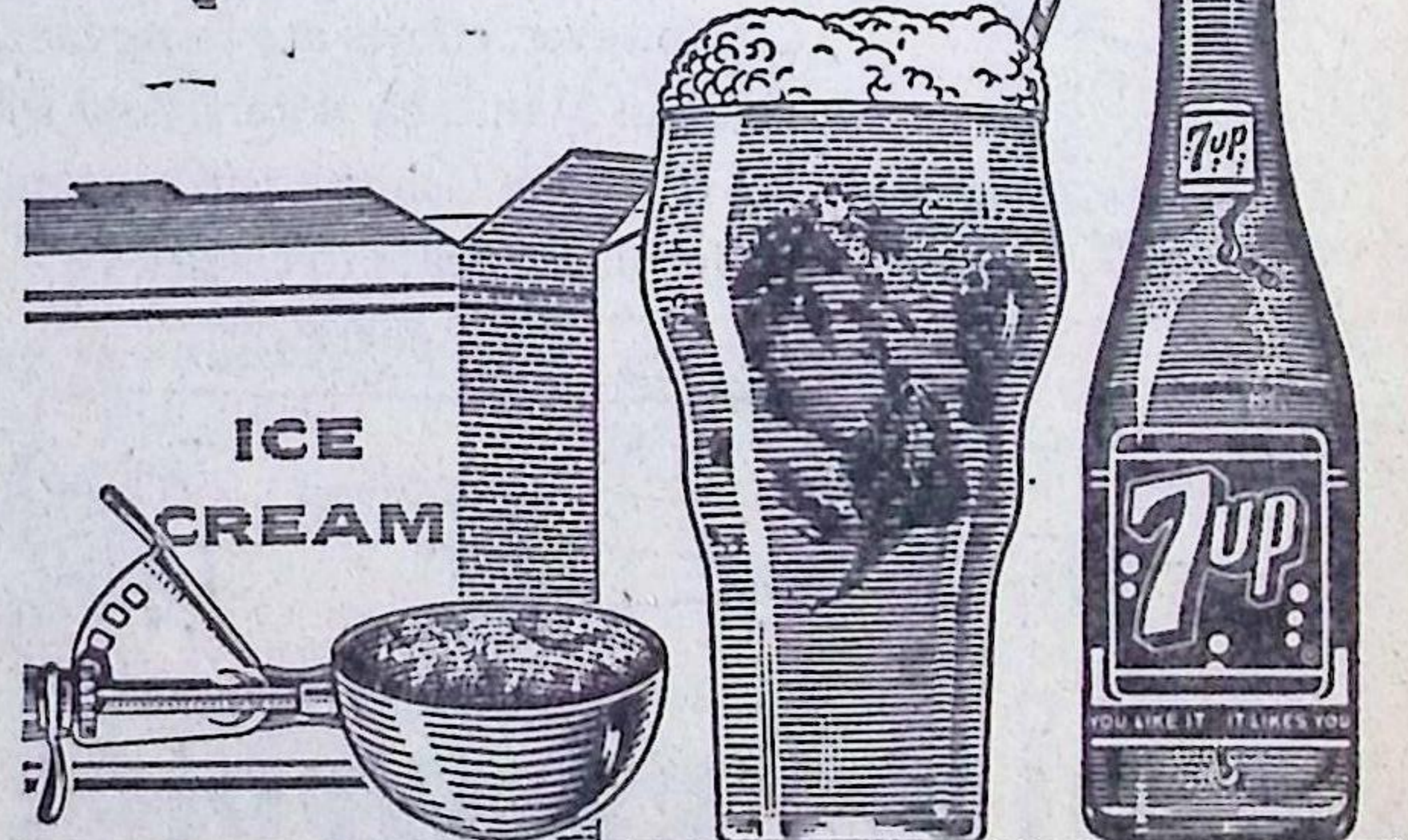
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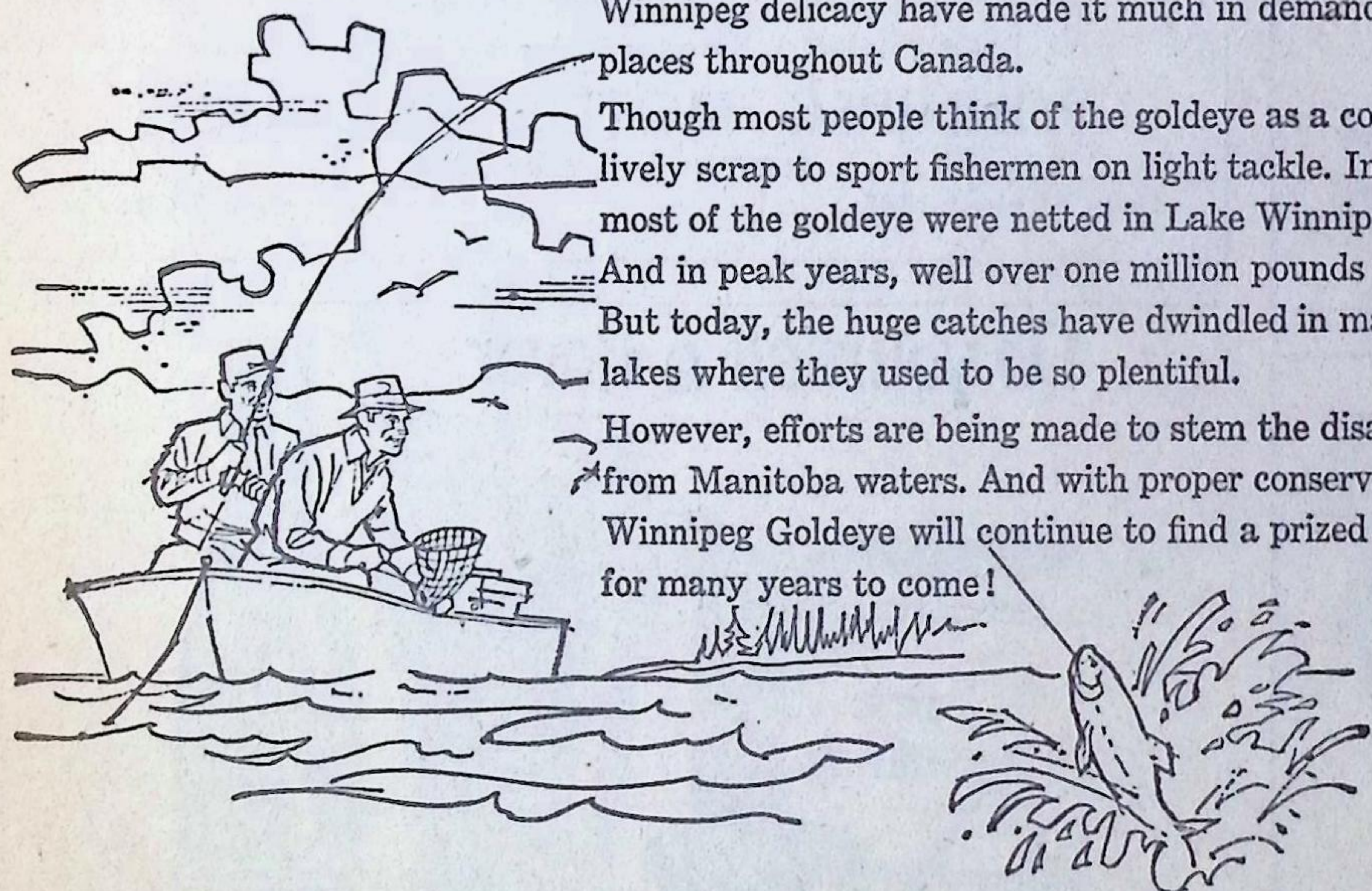
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The superb, smoky flavour and deep, reddish-gold colour of this native Winnipeg delicacy have made it much in demand in the finest dining places throughout Canada.

Though most people think of the goldeye as a commercial fish, it gives a lively scrap to sport fishermen on light tackle. In the early 1920's, most of the goldeye were netted in Lake Winnipeg and Lake Winnipegosis. And in peak years, well over one million pounds were taken annually. But today, the huge catches have dwindled in many of the lakes where they used to be so plentiful.

However, efforts are being made to stem the disappearance of these fish from Manitoba waters. And with proper conservation, the famed Winnipeg Goldeye will continue to find a prized place on Canadian tables for many years to come!



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Letter to the Editor

June 19, 1961

Chapel News,

Dear Sir:

I have come across an old "Vox-air" dated May 12, 1961. On reading page 6 I note how only 150-200 new ministers are available in the Protestant denominations. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints proclaims itself to be the original church Christ established, restored to the earth, as was prophesied by Isaiah. The church has a turnover of over 8,000 missionaries a year, from the ages of 19 to 26, men and women, who go out two by two at their own expense, to teach the complete gospel as taught by Christ. None of these young people smoke or drink, keep the Ten Commandments absolutely and love life. I was United Church all my life and was very faithful. I learned more in the one hour the Missionaries were at our house that first night than I learned all my life in the United. This is why the Protestants aren't getting new ministers. The Godhead is basic to religion and yet the Protestants can't understand it. The true Church is a layman's church—from age 12 on, we are missionaries although we don't knock on doors. We can answer questions for any one, truthfully, logically. No mystery. We had 76,000 converts from churches last year—this number is entirely adult, as children under age of 8 have no sin and are not baptized. We expect to convert one million this year. These are the latter days as you know and it is prophesied the true Church will fill the earth—Dan. 2: 34-35.

This was just one case in the game where loose playing cost runs. This type of play was prominent in the game for the Stn. team.

Doug Webber started on the hill for the local team and lasted until the sixth when Maki came in to crush a PB rally. Webber struck out 3, walked 2 and gave up 6 hits. Maki struck out 2, walked none and also gave up 6 hits. Boutet just faced the two men. The losing team out-hit the winners 15-12.

Greg Cummings, Ed Wadman and Bill Boran all slugged out three hits apiece to lead the RCAF team on the offense, King also contributed with a home run.

The team now holds a disappointing 3 and 5 won-loss record, which puts them in sixth spot in the eight-team circuit.

We know most of the players on the team are working hard to improve but it looks to us as though they are just not strong enough this year to make a serious bid—even for the play-offs. This is a very inconsistent club, one which very seldom plays well together and mental errors still play the biggest role.

CRICKET

The RCAF cricket team played the Winnipeg Cricket Club on 17 June in the first round of a sudden death game for the Fort Garry Cup and were defeated 71-34 for 9 wickets.

The Fort Garry Cup games are played with a maximum limit of 24 overs for each team. Such a limitation creates a highly competitive game and quite often a fast scoring one because the team at bat must net a lot of runs in a comparatively short time. Alternatively, the team in the field must be sharp and on their toes in order to cut off the runs.

The RCAF team were drawn to play against the strongest team in the league. The Winnipeg club is packed with the best cricketers in Manitoba and would present formidable opposition for any team. Every member of this team is capable of scoring a lot of runs and the fielding side is staffed with top rate bowlers. Frank Gamaldo for one, a first class cricketer from Trinidad, is perhaps the fastest and most deadly bowler in Canada.

The RCAF fielded first and played a perfect game, dismissing the Winnipeg club for 71 runs. The RCAF bowling was steady and accurate, and as a result only 3.2 runs per over were scored. Snell and Hardy opened the bowling and Bowes relieved Hardy after eight overs. Hardy took 4 wickets for 30 runs and Bowes 4 for 13 in only 3 overs. Captain of the team, Peter Thorpe was brilliant behind the wickets, stumping one man and taking two hot catches. Thorpe set a defensive, open field which proved to be the strategy necessary.

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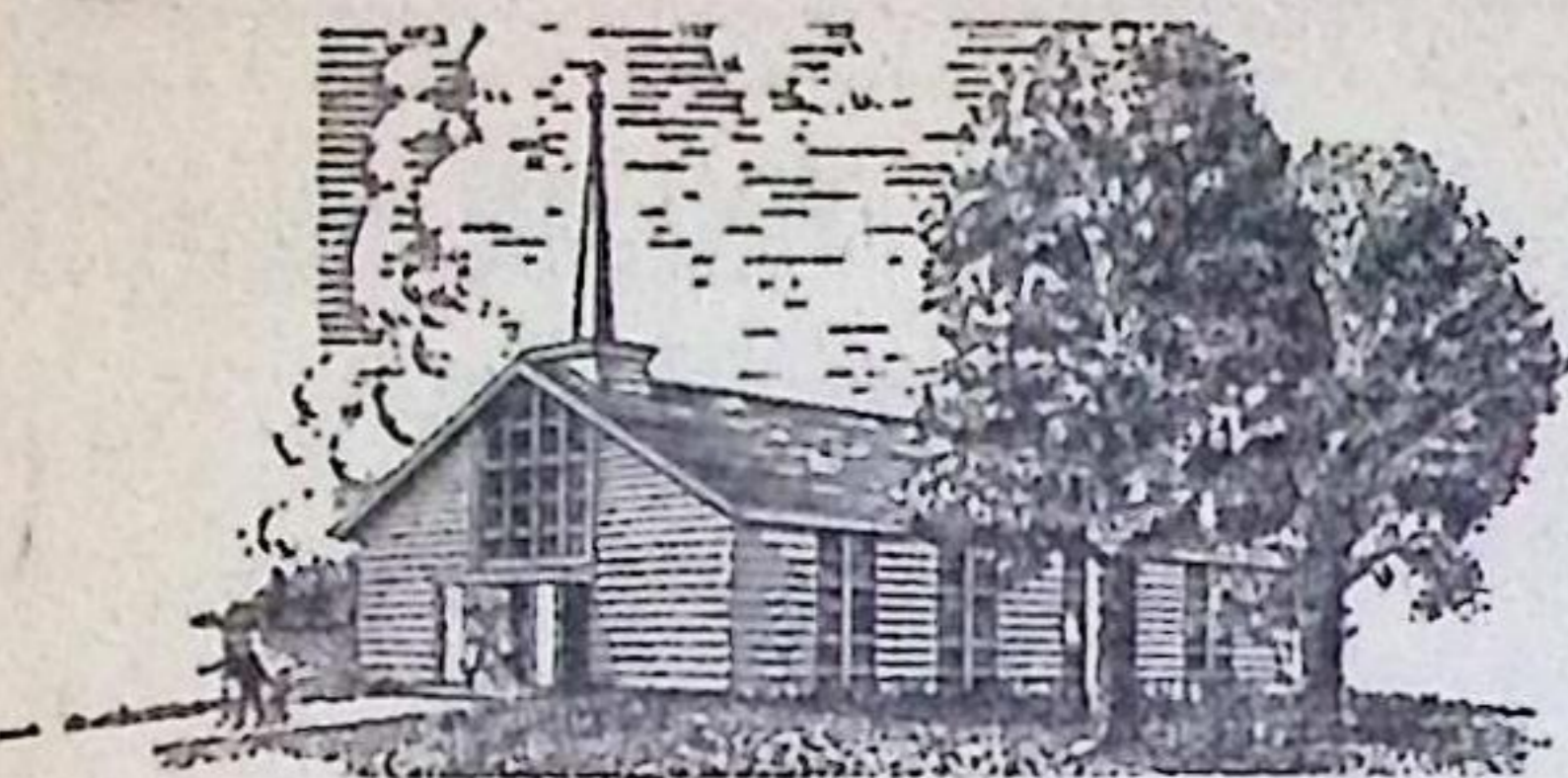

Our assurance for a few enter-

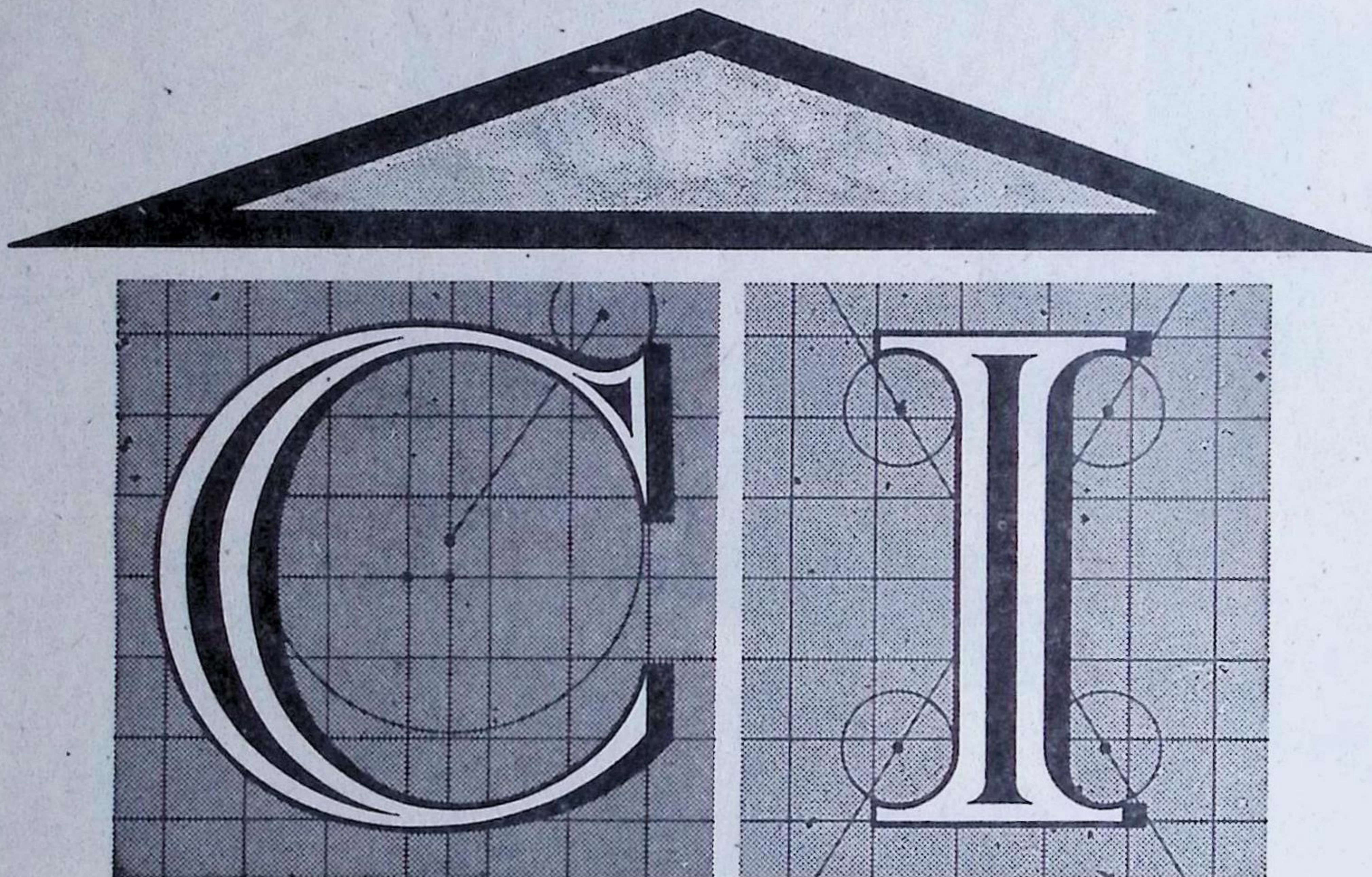
taining evenings, enthusiastic directors, cast, crews and lots of hard work.
