THE PEACE OF MIND BOOM

Various types of insurance are offered to the customer by the different lending institutions. The object of course, is to ensure that your debts are paid in full should you meet with sudden misfortune or even death.

One credit life insurance company wrote a "Peace of Mind" policy for a member of the local constabulary who had a penchant for Russian roulette. During a demonstration he loaded the cylinder with one round, spun it, and blew his brains out. The insurance company ruled that they would return the premium to his widow, claiming that "Peace of Mind" insurance did not cover self-destruction.

Credit life insurance has opened the way for one of the most lucrative forms of debt merchandising. Every debtor fears that, should he die before his debts are paid, his family will be held responsible. Rather than proving a deterrent, credit life insurance is helping creditors sell more debt. However, the major issue is the coverage the debtor receives for the premium he pays. A few loaning institutions do include the cost of credit life insurance at no extra charge, however most of the major Finance Companies add it on to the cost of the loan.

Compare the price and benefits. One chartered bank includes life insurance on the loan and their policy reads "Provided the loan is in good standing at the time of death, the bank first applies all credits in the debtors deposit account against said loan, and the balance is provided for under a group policy." Astra Credit Union's policy reads as follows. "The member must be physically able to perform his normal duties at the time the loan is granted" and I would further venture to say that Cuna Mutual, the Credit Union Insurance Company, is most lenient in payment of claims. The cost of this insurance, as well as the \$1 for \$1 is absorbed by the Credit Union insurance on Shares and Deposits. Finance Companies, who in the first instance charge anywhere from 2 to 4 times the interest charged by Credit Unions or Banks, add the cost of credit life insurance to the loan. In most cases the charge to the customer is 50% more than the cost to the Finance Company. Secondly, the Finance Companies normally receive a kickback or rebate on premiums paid from their Credit Life Insurance Companies. These rebates may run as high as 40% of total premiums submitted. As you can

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Hats Off To The Ladies

Sun. morning, Aug. 6, at 0800 hours saw the beginning of the Marathon Swim Competition, to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of women in the airforce. The object of the competition, sponsored by AFHQ, was to swim from Montreal to LeHavre or farther. This was to be accomplished by the combined effort of all WP on the station. Each WP swam as far as possible during the week Aug. 6-Aug. 12. A formula was used to calculate the marathon mileage. It was the goal of Stn. Winnipeg to swim 81 miles in order to complete the distance to LeHavre. This is one mile per WP on the station.

AW P. Neilson splashed off on Sunday morning and before the morning was over had completed 1 mile. She was soon joined by Cpl. K. Robinson and Cpl. B. Leong. Before the day was over, the marathon was well under way.

As the week progressed, 24 females joined the team. Those participating were easily recognized by straight, wet hair, chlorinated, blood-shot eyes, and a tired water-logged appearance. In spite of this, all those who came out to swim, enjoyed the fun and had a real sense of accomplishment as the lengths and miles rolled by.

By Wednesday the total was up to 39 miles, Thursday it was raised to 59 miles, Friday the total reached 76 miles and at the completion of the meet on Saturday, Aug. 12 at 2300 hours, the total distance reached 99 miles 1,010 yards, or a total of 7,010 lengths of the pool. A very fine showing for the 24 females who were swimming.

Cpl. K. E. Robinson must be congratulated for her long and continuous effort throughout the week. She swam 1,729 lengths or 24 miles 985 yards. This was the longest distance for Stn. Winnipeg. Her longest swim at one time was over 2 miles.

Cpl. N. Rogers won top honours for her longest distance swim at one time — 300 lengths (4 miles, 460 yards). A very commendable performance.

The competition of Stn. Winnipeg was a marvellous success and much praise should be given to the girls who came out to swim. It was evident that the "Esprit De Corp" exists among the girls with a few service years, rather than among those who have been in the airforce for only a short time. Perhaps these airwomen will become more enthusiastic as they gain service years.

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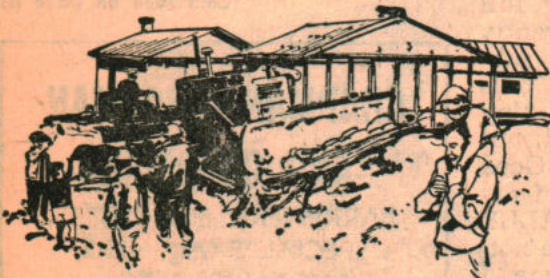

readily see, selling Credit Life Insurance is just as important and rewarding to Finance Companies as granting a loan at usurious rates of interest. Rather than purchase credit life insurance from a finance company, you could achieve the same benefit at approximately 1/4 the cost by buying a straight term insurance policy from a local insurance company for the period of your loan.

There are approximately three plans offered in Credit Life Insurance today:

(a) *Ordinary death benefits:* Upon the death of the debtor, his unpaid loan balance is paid to the creditor by the insurance company.

(b) *Level Benefit:* The debtor borrows \$1000.00 from A.B.C. Finance Company. He has paid back \$400.00 when he died. The insurance company pays the A.B.C. Finance Company \$600.00 to clear the debt, and \$400.00 to debtor's family, exactly the amount he had paid the finance company. The cost of this plan is twice the cost of (a).

(c) *Disability Debt Insurance:* Under this plan an installment buyer must be disabled for 4 months before the insurance becomes effective. His payments are then refunded to him in cash, and the insurance company continues to make his payments, even up to the end of the contract.

The biggest abuse is that in most cases, customers are not even told that they are being sold credit life insurance. The premiums are skillfully hidden in a maze of finance, service and other charges. The crafty finance company may even add in all three insurance plans and charge the customer accordingly.

These are some of the abuses in credit life insurance, but considering the rapid acceptance of credit life insurance in almost every loaning institution, department store, etc., it is evident that the peace of mind boom has just begun.

TRACK & FIELD

STN. BASEBALL OBITUARY

Two defeats for the Stn. Baseball Team in their final two outings of the season, combined with three consecutive victories for the St. Emile Braves advanced the Braves into the 4th and last playoff position in the Winnipeg Inter-Parochial Baseball League standings.

Consequently, the RCAF club ended up as spectators at the opening of the semi-final playoff series held last Sunday at Provencher Park in St. Boniface. In these semis the first place St. Claude Royals and third place St. Boniface Native Sons emerged as victors and shall meet this weekend for league supremacy.

In their final game of the season, the locals, who showed up with only 10 players went down to a 4-1 defeat at the hands of Sacred Heart at Transcona Stadium.

Paul Angers pitched most of the game for the winners, limiting the airmen to three singles in an out-

standing pitching performance. Garnie Boutet went the route for the losers and although giving up only 6 hits was the victim of mental errors from his team-mates.

In one instance, an RCAF batter's failure to run out a missed third strike was followed by a walk and a base hit and cut short a potential rally for the Stn. Another play of question occurred in the 4th inning, with the bases loaded for Sacred Heart, a sure double play ground ball was hit to our shortstop who somehow ran and covered second base instead of fielding the ball, resulting in a cheap hit and the first two runs scoring for the eventual winners. 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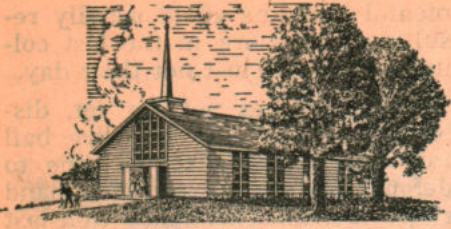

LOADING THE '44

The ability of a Canadair Forty Four to airlift two complete F-104G supersonic tactical aircraft was proved by recent loading demonstrations at Montreal.

International government, airline and industry observers watched as two F-104 fuselages with their engines, two tail units and two sets of wings were loaded smoothly through the open swing-tail of a Forty Four to prove the practicality and feasibility of airlifting F-104s across the Atlantic.

This method of transportation offers rapid and economical shipment of complete F-104s to NATO nations to meet urgent delivery schedules, makes possible the supply of major sub-assemblies to meet production shortages in Europe and provides for the quick return of large airframe parts or engines for overhaul and repair.

Object of the loading demonstrations, which were made with two different and equally successful methods, was to establish the unique capability of the Forty Four to perform this important task.

The Forty Four is in production at Canadair Limited, the Canadian subsidiary of General Dynamics Corporation. The turboprop-powered airplane is now in regular transatlantic service with Seaboard World Airlines, and in transpacific and U.S.-transcontinental operation with The Flying Tiger Line. Slick Airways will take delivery of Forty Fours in the Fall.

Canadair is also building 200 CF-104s (Canadian version of the F-104G) for the Royal Canadian Air Force air division serving with NATO forces in Europe and, the first of these flew in May. In addition, the company is making major airframe components of the F-104G for West Germany, Belgium, the Netherlands and Italy, and for the F-104J program in Japan.

KHRUSHCHEV ASKS BERLIN CONFERENCE

Soviet Premier Khrushchev has combined a proposal for a conference on Berlin with the warning that Soviet divisions may mass on the West European frontiers as a precautionary defence measure. In a television speech keyed to the triumphal return of Major Gherman S. Titov from his space flight, the Russian leader reaffirmed his intention to end Allied occupation rights in West Berlin through a German peace treaty. This statement taken together with the declaration of willingness to negotiate made by the Western foreign ministers in Paris suggested that fresh diplomatic exchanges might be in the offing on a possible basis for new talks on Berlin and Germany. It was thought unlikely that any such conference could materialize before the West German elections in September and possibly not until after the 22nd Congress of the Soviet Communist Party in October. The Soviet government will watch developments and act in accordance with the manner in which the situation shapes up, Khrushchev said. He added: "It may be that we shall have to in-

crease in the future the numerical strength of the army on the western frontiers by moving divisions from other parts of the Soviet Union."

RED SUPERBOMB COULD DESTROY ALL GERMANY, KHRUSHCHEV SAYS

Premier Nikita Khrushchev warned that Germany would be blotted out if the Bonn Government tried to reunify the country by force. In an impromptu speech at a Kremlin reception honoring Major Gherman S. Titov, the second Russian astronaut, Mr. Khrushchev said the Soviet Union had the capability of constructing a rocket with an explosive warhead equivalent to 100,000,000 tons of TNT. Mr. Khrushchev reiterated his determination to sign a peace treaty that would seal the decision of Germany. Asserting that such a treaty, which would terminate Allied occupation rights in West Berlin, was essential to peace, the Soviet leader told the Western powers: "No threats will intimidate us and we will sign a peace treaty with Germany."

RODGERS AND HAMMERSTEIN'S SOUTH PACIFIC NOW PLAYING RAINBOW

Rodgers and Hammerstein's smash musical hit opened at Rainbow Stage last Wednesday and is this season's final offering by the Winnipeg Summer Theatre Association.

Adapted from James Michener's Pulitzer prize-winning book, "Tales of the South Pacific," this fabulous musical won a Pulitzer Prize of its own, as well as the Drama Critics' Award and many other honours too numerous to mention.

South Pacific tells the story of a Navy nurse from Arkansas who falls in love with a French planter on a Pacific Island during the war, and also of a young Marine lieutenant's attachment to a native girl.

Jan Rubes, Czechoslovakian-born basso, stars as Emile De Becque, the French planter. Mr. Rubes has

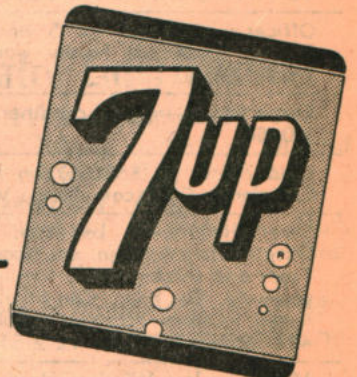

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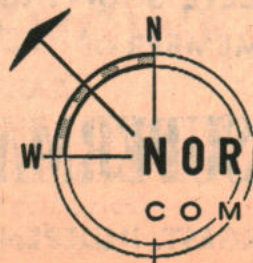
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
