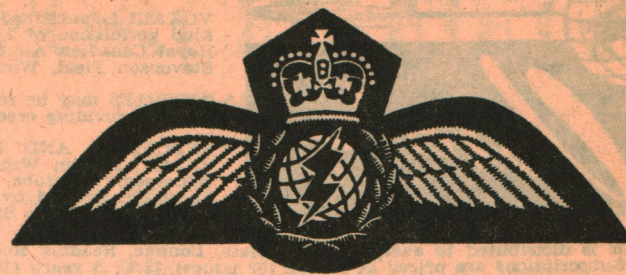

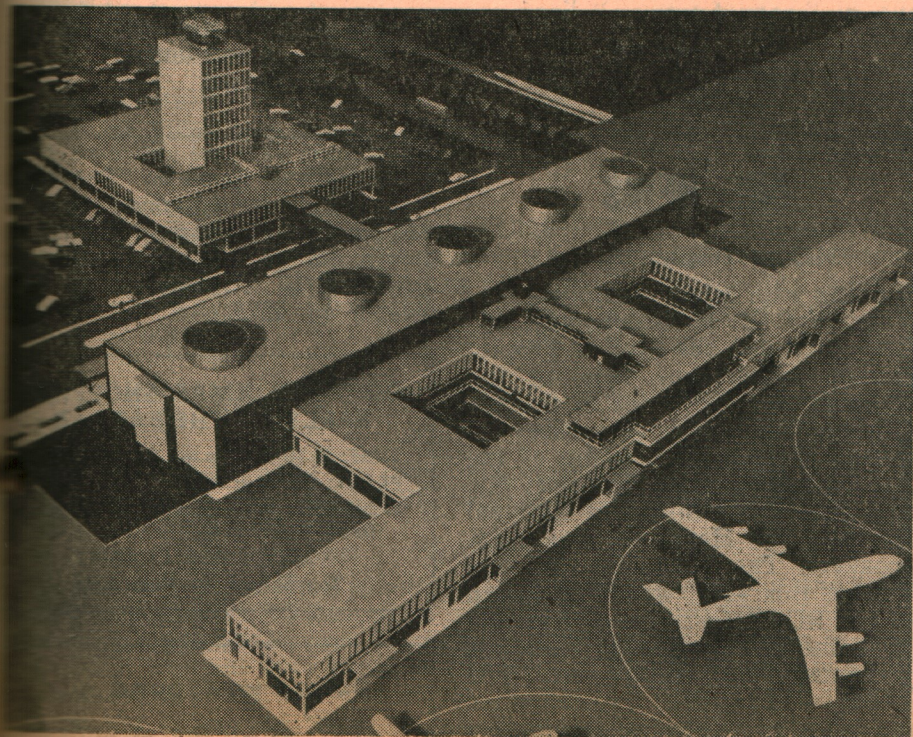

NEW AIR TERMINAL

The new Air Terminal Building being built for the Department of Transport at Winnipeg International Airport is scheduled for completion in 1964. But progress has been such that the project may be open as early as a year in advance, in 1963.

The overall project includes a separate power house building, roadway construction, aircraft parking aprons, taxi strips, and parking areas. Cost of the entire project, including the Air Terminal Building, has been estimated at approximately \$15 million.

Redevelopment of Winnipeg International Airport is one of a series of such projects undertaken by the Department of Transport in recent years. Already built and in use are new air terminal buildings at Gander, Nfld., Halifax, Montreal, Ottawa, Sault Ste. Marie, Windsor, Saskatoon and Regina. New buildings now are under construction in Toronto and Edmonton and plans are being prepared for another in Vancouver.

It consist of two units, one the terminal proper and the other housing aircraft control operations. Each unit will be two storeys high with the control tower rising an additional six storeys.

The two buildings permit separation of passenger flow, aircraft control operations and baggage handling.

The terminal section measures 200 by 625 feet, the equivalent of 10 city blocks. The operations section measures 170 by 200 feet. On the ground floor, the two buildings are separated by a roadway of seven traffic lanes. A bridge over the roadway connects the buildings at the second floor level. They

are also joined underground by a trucking tunnel.

The gross area of both buildings is 461,000 square feet. Design of the Air Terminal Building stresses easy access and speed in handling of passengers and baggage.

Passengers arriving to board aircraft will enter the ticket concourse directly from the approach road. Along the length of the concourse will be airline ticket counters with provisions for depositing baggage. The main waiting room on the second floor is reached by escalator from the main floor concourse.

Passengers will proceed on the upper floor from the main waiting room to one of eight aircraft positions.

Ultimately, additions to the main building can provide for a total of 20 aircraft positions.

Spectators will be able to watch from the roof as planes arrive and depart.

One of the many modern conveniences for passengers involves the delivery of baggage from aircraft. The baggage will be taken from aircraft by mobile conveyors. Baggage then goes to other conveyors which transport it to circular turntables, 25 feet in diameter. These turntables rotate slowly so

"My 3 Angels," a rollicking comedy about a trio of convicts in a French penal colony who earn themselves halos to wear with their stripes, will open a 4-day engagement at the RCAF Drama Club theatre beginning December 6. Robin Robertson, Jim Martin, and Pat McGee will portray the three engaging rogues who intrigue to set a naughty world to rights.

A smash hit for 43 weeks in New York, and in many other cities where it subsequently toured, "My 3 Angels" was written by Sam and Bella Spewack, based on an original French comedy which was a great success in Paris where it was performed for over two years.

The locale of "My 3 Angels" is Cayenne, French Guiana, in 1910, a penal colony where prisoners are allowed the freedom of the island. Three of them, doing repair work on the community's modest general store, become vital influences in salvaging the precarious destiny of the shopkeeper and his family.

Two of the helpful criminals are gentlemanly murderers serving life terms and the leader of the group is a cheery embezzler of high resourcefulness.

When on Christmas Eve, the store and the finances of the honest, bumbling merchant, to be played by Cliff McDonald, are threatened by the arrival from France of his hearted relative, whose intent is to swindle the tradesman, the convicts quickly rally to their own ideas of justice.

By accomplishing "a perfect crime" these beneficent criminals succeed in neatly doing away with the evil menace, and also his most unpleasant cad of a nephew, who is dangerous to the happiness of the daughter of the house. It is

Spend Your Gun Dollar Wisely

Deer are the most popular big game animal to hunt in North America, and the majority of hunters have at least one firearm they consider their deer rifle. Those RCAF hunters in Manitoba who missed their deer this year have either themselves or their equipment to blame. If it is themselves, then "better luck next year" but if their pet rifle is not giving the performance required, then it may be time to invest a few dollars in something more suitable.

Calibres which were satisfactory around Trenton, Greenwood or where have you, are not necessarily the best for the varied type of shooting offered by this province. With an extremely wide variety of rifles available snap decisions when buying can lead to regret in months to follow.

Manitoba hunting can be broken down roughly into two types, open prairie shooting and bush shooting. Specific calibres are best for each type, but a good investment would be in one which is good under both conditions. Flat trajectory simplifies sighting and is very desirable for open shooting. To obtain this, high velocities are required. The higher the velocity the lighter the bullet that must be used as the casing size limits the powder charge. A light bullet at high velocity will not penetrate bush without breaking up. An extremely flat shooting calibre is then not compatible to bush shooting. In reverse, the slow moving, high momentum bush gun has such a poor trajectory over long distances, that large sighting allowances required make accurate shooting very unlikely.

The extremely flat shooting rifles for wide open spaces can also be classed as varmint rifles. Such calibres would be the .22 Hornet, .222 Remington, .220 Swift, .354 Winchester to name a few. The bullet weights vary from 50 to 100 grain, and the velocities can be pushed past 4,000 fps (.220 Swift). These rifles are quite capable of hitting deer up to and past 300 yds., but let one twig get in the way and you have converted your rifle into a shotgun.

On the other end of the scale the ponderous 12 gauge slug, time proven 30-30 and the newcomer .35 Remington can hit a lot of bush and keep on going to get your deer. A long shot would be 200 yds. with the average being less than 100 yds. As the majority of hunting outside of the prairies is in fairly heavy bush, the shots are fairly close, and a heavy slow moving bullet is required to penetrate to your animal.

The calibres in between the varminters and the bush rifles are the ones advocated as the best all around rifles for the serviceman. The two that are particularly recommended are the .270 and the 30.06. Both these calibres come in a wide range of bullet weights and velocities which allow them to be used effectively in all types of country. They have ample punch for deer and in the heavier weights are satisfactory for moose, elk, grizzly bear, etc. The cost of a standard rifle in this category is reasonable, as due to their wide appeal many of the fancy frills can be left off to keep the price down. A newcomer, the .308 also qualifies in this group.

The British .303 has not been mentioned but as it is a readily available calibre with the market flooded with war surplus rifles, a few words are noted on its behalf. A sportsized .303 with good sights (preferably telescopic) is an excellent deer rifle for average conditions. It has ample killing power and can reach out to 250 yds. without too much strain. Don't, however, expect to buy a 9.95 special and expect it to perform like a \$100.00 rifle without considerable rework.

A few comparisons are given between some of the calibres mentioned. Remember the following criteria:

- A high velocity gives flat trajectory.
- A heavy bullet has bush penetrating ability.
- High velocity plus a heavy bullet gives high energy.
- Higher the energy the better the knockdown power.
- Greater the knockdown, power, the more meat spoiled.

The selection of any rifle for any type of hunting is a compromise. When purchasing a new calibre consider the variables concerned, and by a process of elimination determine which is most satisfactory for your type of shooting. If you make the wrong decision, space in the "For Sale" section of Voxair is available on request.

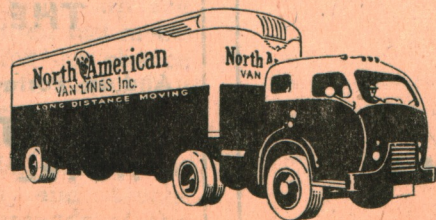

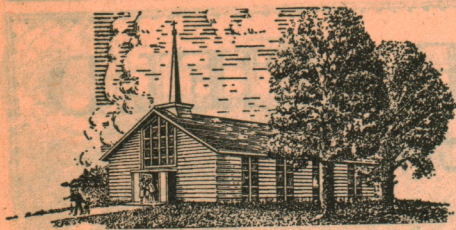

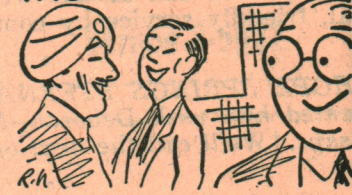
Disputes between neighbors are as old as any other age. Here are some suggested reasons and remedies.

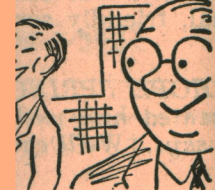

that the baggage comes within easy reach of passengers.

Facilities to be located off the main waiting room include a dining room, coffee shop, bank, nursery, barber shop, and short-stay roomette accommodation for passengers who must wait several hours for connections.

Car parking will accommodate 750 cars, with an additional 300 parking spaces for staff. The Air Terminal design also allows the future addition of a triple-deck parking building with direct access from the top deck to future second floor ticket counters and waiting areas. Some time in the future, passenger loading will be from the second floor level by means of covered telescoping units which will connect to loading doors of aircraft.

The Air Terminal Building is designed to reduce noise of aircraft and the smell of jet fuel as much as possible. All public, office and operational spaces are fully air-conditioned.

The 150-foot-high tower will permit visual contact with aircraft anywhere on the ground.

The new Air Terminal Building

is of structural steel with a double-glazed stainless steel and glass curtain wall and exterior cladding of Manitoba Tyndall stone.

About 250 men are now employed at the site with another 100 men on the power house. The total number of men employed on the Air Terminal, including those in fabricating plants and supply companies, is estimated at about 1,000.

The Power House is scheduled for completion by Dec. 31, 1961 but steam is expected to be available by Nov. 15 so that work can continue throughout the winter on the Air Terminal Building.

Again you will have to take the unselfish attitude. That is a dime a day when the health of your family is involved. No candidate in this course can achieve complete success unless he has purchased one of these cookware sets.

As a final step in this lesson, you might consider the purchase of an automatic clothes dryer. This will eliminate heavy lifting, and the possibility of your wife freezing her hands and catching her death of cold hanging damp clothes on an outside line. While you are at it, you should consider getting an automatic washer and the money which you can save on the wear and tear on clothing through this modern clothes-washing method might be sufficient to meet the monthly payments.

question is this: "Who'd we get to do all the work while we're busy judging the culinary arts of the girls?" Sounds like lots of fun anyway!

Thirdly, one of the most brilliant ideas to appear in a long time: Study this suggestion very carefully, reader, because it certainly has its merits and deserves all of your attention. We "airframe drivers" at ANS periodically have the problem of maintaining the proper 15 minutes of lateral separation between each aircraft on navigation details, due mainly to fluctuations of actual tracks and airspeeds flown. We also run into the problem of loss of communication between each aircraft due to intermittent radio contact. To solve both of these situations, a very unique idea has been worked out. The so-

lution is to compute the actual distance involved to keep the aircraft 15 minutes behind each other. Then attach a comparable length of stout string between each one. Thus, to maintain the proper separation, one would simply need to keep the string taut. Problem solved.

And finally, the communication problem: Again, the answer is very simple and straightforward. A few pulleys could be added to the before-mentioned system, and neatly typewritten notes passed along the string in much the same manner as one reels in the clothes off the clothes-line. The idea certainly has its good points, but just how could we explain to AMC the order for 440 miles of stout string?

'Nuff said!

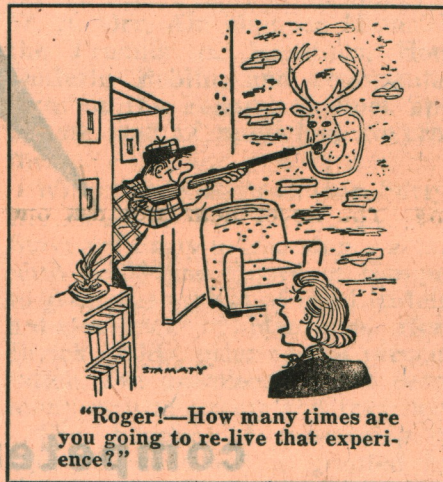

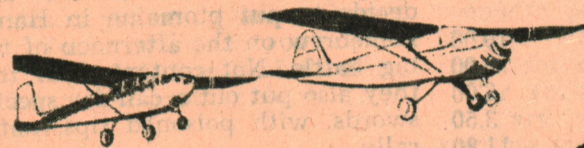

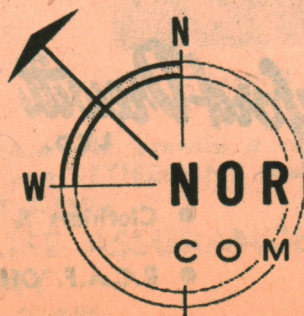
