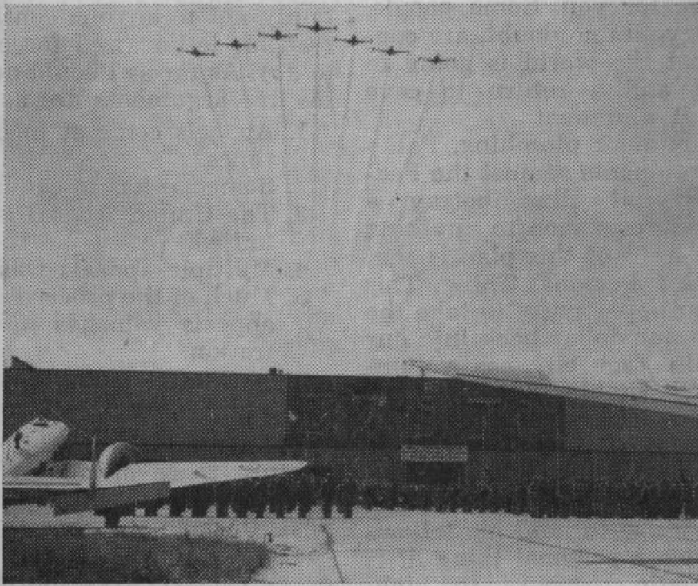

CAS On Farewell Visit

Last Friday, a bomb-burst etched into blue sky by smoke-trailing T-33 jet trainers climaxed ceremonies at RCAF Station Winnipeg when Air Marshal Hugh L. Campbell paid his farewell visit to the unit as Chief of the Air Staff.

The T-33s flew in from RCAF Station Gimli to take part in the event which also signified A/M Campbell's farewell visit to Training Command Headquarters here. A/M Campbell ends his 31 years

of service with the RCAF next month and will be succeeded by A/M. C. R. Dunlap.

A/M Campbell arrived in Winnipeg at 3 p.m. Friday afternoon and inspected a ceremonial parade that included about 400 personnel and two bands from units within Training Command.

Later the air marshal attended a reception in the officers' mess. He departed Winnipeg on Saturday morning.

RCAF Stn. Winnipeg Changes Command

RCAF Station Winnipeg bade farewell to its past Commanding Officer, Group Captain J. F. Mitchell, DFC, AFC, CD, on August 22, and welcomed the new station commander, Group Captain D. A. Willis, DFC, CD.

Group Captain Mitchell became Commanding Officer of RCAF Station Winnipeg in 1958. During his four years at Winnipeg he has seen a number of changes on the station: notably, the arrival of Training Command Headquarters from RCAF Station Trenton, the christening of Mawdesley Hall, the new ground school building of the Air Navigation School, and the development of Station Winnipeg as the crossroads of RCAF air traffic in Canada. Group Captain Mitchell's tenure of office has been characterized by his public spirit, which has made him a respected member of the community, and fostered excellent relations between his station and the people of Winnipeg.

Group Captain Mitchell has been transferred to the National Defence College, Kingston, Ont. He will take part in a year's course with other senior men from government and industry, on matters pertaining to the mobilization and direction of Canada's economy and resources in the event of a national emergency. When interviewed on the eve of his departure from Winnipeg the Group Captain stated, "Both Mrs. Mitchell and I have many regrets at leaving all our friends in the Winnipeg area. It has been an honour and a pleasure to have been a citizen of Manitoba for the past four years."

Group Captain Willis was born in St. Boniface, Manitoba and educated in Ontario Public and High Schools. He went to the U.K. in 1937 to serve with the RAF under RCAF auspices. At the outbreak of war he was a Squadron Navigation Officer with an RAF Squadron, and was awarded the DFC for outstanding devotion to duty in 1940. He was transferred in April 1943 to the Headquarters of the U.S. 8th Air Force as the RCAF Liaison Officer, and went in August 1944 to Calcutta as Staff Officer to Lt. Gen. Stratomeyer then Commander of Allied Forces there.

After the war Group Captain Willis returned to Canada and a post at AFHQ. In 1949 he went to the Air Navigation School at Summerside, PEI, as Officer Commanding, later taking over Command of the Station itself. Following further staff positions in AFHQ and ADCHQ he attended the National Defence College at Kingston, Ont., and in 1959 was assigned to SHAPE (Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers in Europe) in Paris, France, as Branch Chief in the Air Defence Division. Group Captain Willis left SHAPE in July 1962 to assume command of RCAF Station Winnipeg.

Group Captain Willis married (Continued on page 3)

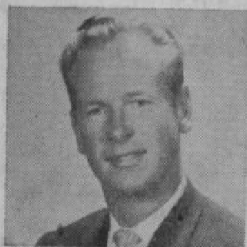

FEDERATED PAYROLL PLAN

I would like to reply to another who contributes to this column.

Dear Happy Pallbearer,

Your evident delight of the possibility of The Federated Payroll Plan dying quietly may be mistimed. There are some people who are not content to "leave well-enough alone." Doubtless you have noticed this. For the discomfort caused you by the automobile, the telephone, television, and indoor plumbing, I apologize on behalf of those who like to think of these advances as beneficial. There is some hope for you. Some people, friends of yours no doubt, are convinced that the world is going to the dogs, and a return to cave dwelling is imminent.

Happy outdoor plumbing, Pal.

Your arguments against the Federated Payroll Plan betray a thoughtless resistance to anything new. The basis of this plan is that Charity is a Personal Thing. This plan is our opportunity to take the control of our dollar back into our own hands. Each city has a number of Charitable Agencies, all clamouring for our money. In many cities these agencies are unable to ask for one dollar for all, instead they request twenty-five cents each. A man's desire to help his fellows is no longer a personal thing, it is an automatic response to high-pressure canvassing. I'm pointing out this basic fact, Happy Pallbearer, because I suspect that your experience in this field is limited.

Any RCAF installation is a natural target for a "Company Canvas," RCAF personnel are easily identified, corralled, and milked. Why should we let it happen to us? RCAF Station Winnipeg has the facilities to operate a first-class Group Charity Plan. I'm told that the accounts section is willing to make the necessary arrangements at little or no cost. Each member of The Federated Payroll Plan will have a vote in the distribution of funds. All charities have large organizations designed to collect money, the method doesn't matter. If those who give the money form a group that will ensure that things are done as donor wishes, I believe it to be a good idea. What do you think? Or do you?

P.S.—I hope that you will publish this letter. All too often it is only those who are against something that speak up. I want to vote a strong affirmative for the Federated Payroll Plan.

Firstly I would like to defend F/O Robertson from the attacks of his 'nom-de-plume'd opponent. He is at least prepared to put his name to his 'literary romps,' which though admittedly flowery make his point, whereas in five paragraphs of verbiage D.I.C. managed to convey that he did like the way our PRO writes, and that he was vaguely in favour of co-operative giving.

We are told by D.I.C. that there are five obvious facts which recommend such a method of charitable donating. Obvious to whom? Certainly not to anyone continuing to read his letter (as I forced myself to do). As far as I could determine his five arguments are as follows:

1. Appeals come at inconvenient times.
2. Someone has to canvass.
3. The United Appeal isn't united.
4. Multiple appeals waste time.
5. Much of the proceeds from appeals vanishes in administration.

To refute these quickly and precisely is not hard.

1. There must be a lot of appeals because there are many agencies to help—if they spread their appeals through the year, the load on the donor is not heavy, whilst every charity were told to collect only during one 'convenient' month, the canvassers would be falling over each other.
2. Yes. The personal touch will be difficult to replace.
3. No. The more effective and organized charities have found by standing on their own canopies they can get a larger contribution from the public than by sheltering under the umbrella of a United appeal.

4. A waste of time? I don't think so, for volunteers don't consider their time wasted.

5. Surely if money passes through three or four organizations on the way to the charity, each of them will have expenses, and will take their cut. However if we're able to give directly to the charity of our choice, these extraneous drains from our charity dollar will be avoided.

As I said last week, we do need our giving organized, we do know our social responsibilities, let's choose our charities and support them.

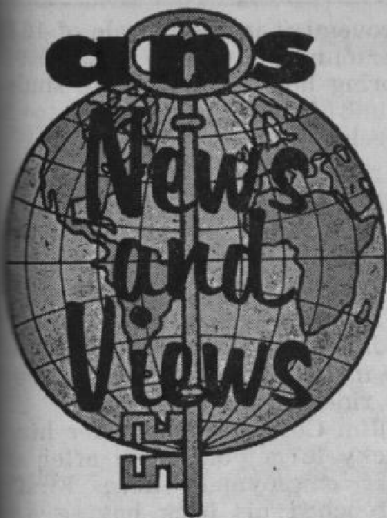

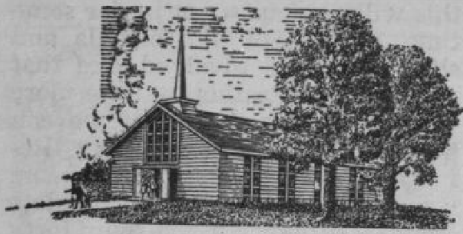

RCAF SWIMMING MARATHON 7 TO 12 AUGUST

Splash—and they were off on the longest swim ever to be held at Stn. Winnipeg. Length after length of continuous swimming, and even though our fair station only elaborated with 133 swimmers, our figures totalled and grew. After the first day it looked as though we could cinch the swim as our boys rattled off 50 miles—3,169 lengths. The second day was even better with 50.7 miles and the third day the laps scored its highest total with 50.9 miles. Friday could have been the 13th as our 75-ft. or 25-yd. laps retarded to a slow 23 miles and Saturday even worse. Records were being broken by the individual swimmers, but only a few personnel showed and our week-end totals were dismantled to only 16 miles and a final total of 213.8 miles. How this total will stand in the cross Canada totals is hard to say, but our individual totals will stagger the judges. LAC Dick Kensett led the way with a marvelous 1,700 lengths, and having a single continuous swim of 422 laps. This works out to an average of 4 miles per day, which in any man's language is a lot of swimming.

The remaining of the top eight performed excellent distances as well, with LAC Husband DR leading the way with 1,200 lengths, F/O Banks 707, F/O Bowman 700, F/C Vikan 634, Cpl. Schilds 600, Cpl. Grace 410 and Cpl McInnes 370. When next year's marathon

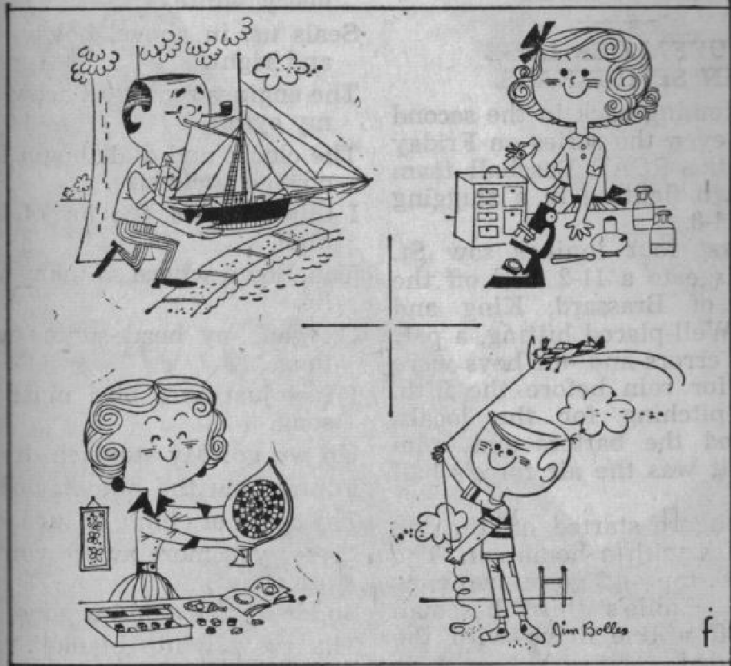
