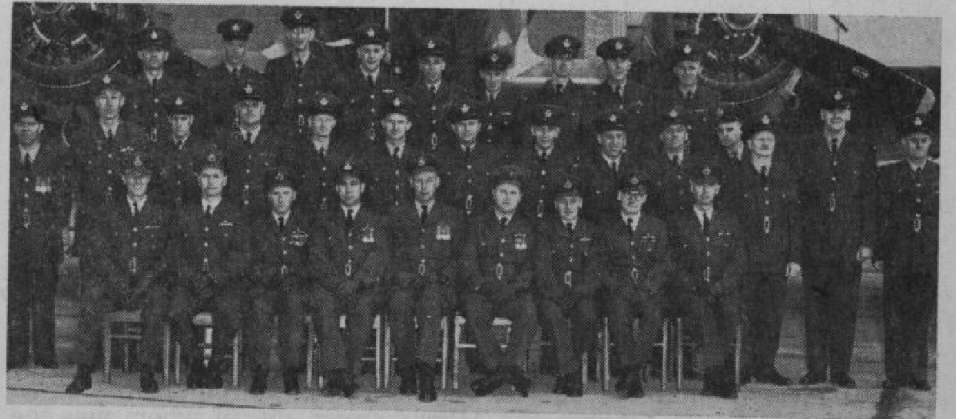

DUAL HANDOVER FOR AUXILIARY

These Clogs, or Klompens as the Dutch call them, were sent to the ladies of Winnipeg's RCAF Women's Auxiliary in appreciation of the support they gave to the squadron. Each member of the Squadron signed the shoes, and they were sent to Winnipeg in 1945 from Holland.

Personnel of No. 17 Wing Headquarters, RCAF Auxiliary, and No. 402 City of Winnipeg Auxiliary Squadron took part in a double hand-over of command at RCAF Station Winnipeg last Saturday evening.

In a formal Wing Ceremonial Parade, Group Captain D. M. Gray, CD took command of 17 Wing Headquarters from Group Captain S. Varnam, CD. After this part

of the ceremonies was completed, Wing Commander D. R. Scott, CD signed the papers that gave him command of No. 402 Squadron, and Wing Commander J. T. Patterson, the past Commanding Officer countersigned.

The parade then advanced in review order and gave the traditional Air Salute to the two retiring commanders.

Do You Know Your NATO

In this instalment we present the second part of the answer to the question: "How does NATO operate?"

The Military Committee is the senior military authority in NATO and reports directly to the Council. It is composed of the Chiefs-of-Staff of the member countries. The chairmanship of the Military Committee rotates annually in the alphabetical order of the countries.

Its executive agency is the Standing Group with Headquarters in Washington, D.C. It is composed of representatives of the Chiefs-of-Staff of France, the United Kingdom, and the United States. The chairmanship of the Standing Group rotates among the three countries.

The Standing Group is the body responsible for the highest strategic guidance of Allied NATO Forces. To ensure the integrated defense of the North Atlantic Treaty area, the Standing Group has the task of coordinating defense plans originating in NATO Commands and the Canada-United States Regional Planning Group, and of making appropriate recommendations thereon to the Military Committee and ultimately to the Council. The Standing Group is represented at the North Atlantic Council in Paris by a general officer, assisted by an Allied staff composed of officers drawn in rotation from all member nations, thus ensuring close cooperation between the NATO civilian and military authorities.

The Standing Group has also under its authority the NATO De-

fense College, and a number of specialized agencies situated in various NATO areas.

The Military Commands

The strategic area covered by the North Atlantic Treaty is divided to take account of geographical as well as political factors, among three Commands and a Regional Planning Group.

The forces of member countries are divided into forces assigned in peacetime to NATO Commands, forces earmarked for these Commands, and forces remaining under national command. The NATO Commands are responsible for the development of defense plans for their respective areas, for the determination of force requirements, and for the deployment and exercise of the forces under their Command. All their reports and recommendations regarding forces and their logistic support are referred to the Standing Group.

The organization of these Commands is flexible enough and the liaison between them close enough to allow for mutual support in the event of war, and the rapid shifting of the necessary land, sea, and air forces to meet any situation likely to confront the North Atlantic Community.

Cpl. Bill Capek, our station tailor, was born in the little town of Elk Ranch, Manitoba. He spent his early youth in the community helping his folks on the farm, except for a short stint in a bush camp near Dryden, Ont.

He started his Service Career in the Infantry in 1941 and received his early training in Winnipeg, Shilo, and Debart. He joined the Lake Superior Regiment and proceeded overseas. After D-Day Bill's regiment was in the thick of the fighting—on Normandy beach, and up the coast through Holland and Belgium reaching Germany in '45.

He returned to England that fall and was repatriated to Canada.

As a civilian, he decided on a tailoring career, and after a year in the school of tailoring he served an apprenticeship of 3½ years with a Winnipeg firm of custom tailoring. But he longed to return to the Service again, and early in '53 he was given the opportunity—this time with the "men in blue". He served at Aylmer, St. Jean, Winnipeg, Goose Bay, and then on a second tour overseas—this time at Metz, he did a lot of travelling, and was able to visit many neighboring countries and some of the old familiar places where he had served with the Army. He came back to Canada in '59 for a transfer to Winnipeg.

He is happy here in Winnipeg. Although his job as station tailor keeps him busy, he is able to pursue and enjoy the sport of curling and the art of square-dancing.

Bill says he must have been cut out to be a tailor—for while at the tailoring school, he met and married the pretty and talented Margaret Wilson. They are living at 90 Cornwall Blvd. and have two children, Donna Lee 12, and Glen Patrick.

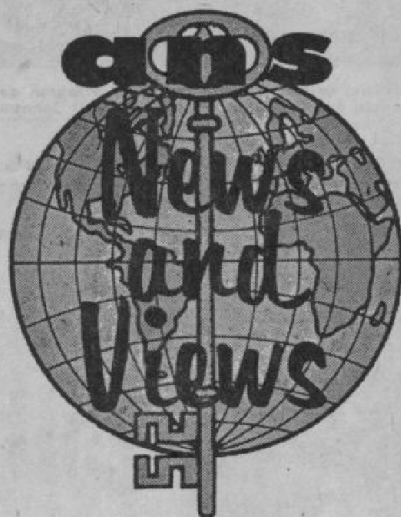
In Memoriam

Just forty-four years ago at eleven o'clock in the morning, an armistice was signed between the Allied powers, one of whom was the British Empire, and the defeated Central powers, of whom the leading nation was Germany. That was the war to end all wars and in the final accounting, it cost the Allies over twenty-two million dead.

Seventeen years ago, the victorious Allied powers again signed an Armistice with Germany, and this time the struggle was paid for with a total of over ten million dead.

Every year, on the anniversary of that first Armistice, at eleven o'clock in the morning, millions of people all over the world stop whatever they are doing, and bow their heads in respectful silence for two minutes. In this way, they and we are paying our homage to the gallant dead of both world wars. In many places commemorative services and military parades are held, but how often it is, that many people attend these from force of habit, or from duty. It is sad to recount, but the human memory often easily forgets the sacrifice that was made by these honoured dead, and today, it is often those among us who have been touched by personal loss, or personal experience and memory, who offer up the silent prayer of thanks.

It is not our intention to recriminate with regard to the human memory, but rather we should like to stress the fact that it is because these men and women who paid the supreme sacrifice, that we are in the position that we enjoy today. Therefore we owe them a debt of gratitude. For in falling, they have flung the torch to us, so that we might continue to maintain the flame of liberty and civil rights in which they believed and for which they fought. By their valor, they have won renown and respect for all of us. Let all of us therefore honor them, with pride in their achievements, in humbleness and with heartfelt gratitude.

The wearing of winter flying clothing became compulsory on the 5th November, for personnel flying in ANS aircraft.

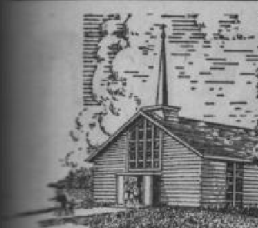
Visiting VIP

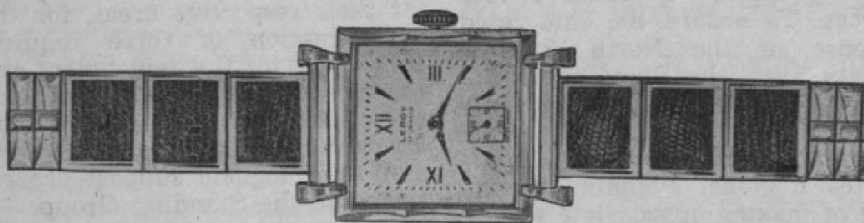

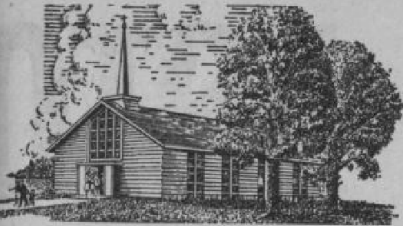

TIPS FOR BABYSITTERS

Baby-sitting is a job of such im-
portance that you should be willing
to furnish certificates of good
health and good character to any
mother who wishes to hire you.

To appreciate the importance of
baby-sitting, you will look on it
as a serious occupation, not merely
a way of earning a little money
without much effort. You will
think of the children in your care
first. While it is quite in order to
take a good deal of your homework,
and you will likely have time to
work on it, it is wiser to have fin-
ished ahead of time all that needs
doing for the next day and to plan
to work on some less urgent assign-
ment. Then if the children take up
more of your time than usual, you
will not feel rushed for fear your
homework may not be done in
time.

You would not think of telephon-
ing at the last minute that you
could not come just because some-
thing more interesting to do had
turned up. Of course if you wake
up with a bad cold the morning of
the day you have promised to baby-
sit, you will try to have a friend
you can recommend to take your
place. If not, you will let the
mother know as soon as possible,
because she will not want to run
the risk of the children catching
the cold from you. You will cer-
tainly be on time. The parents'
evening may be spoiled if they are
delayed by the baby-sitter's tardi-
ness.

By the way you act while in
charge of another person's home,
you will reveal much of the kind of
boy or girl you are. It is one thing
to explore the house, preferably in
the mother's company, to learn
where the children's rooms are,
where supplies for the children are

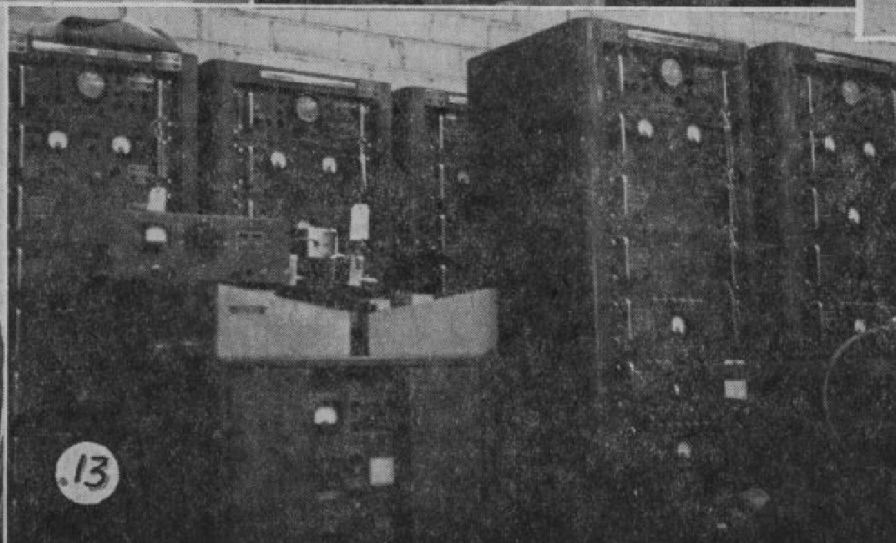
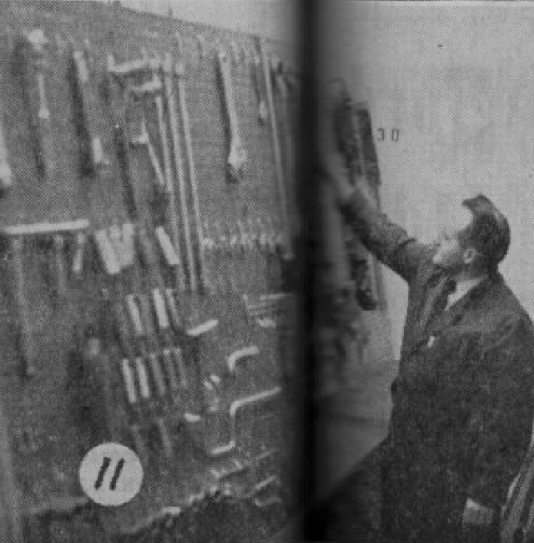
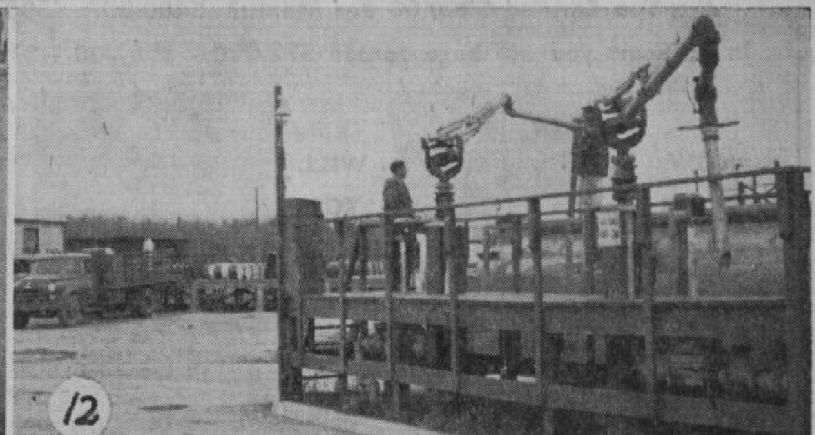
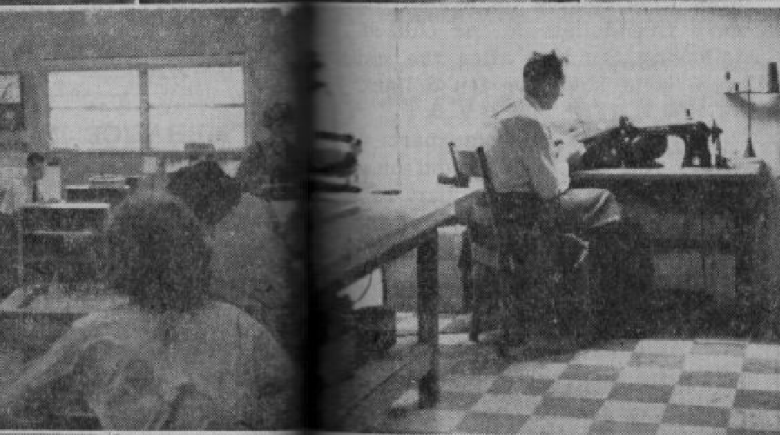
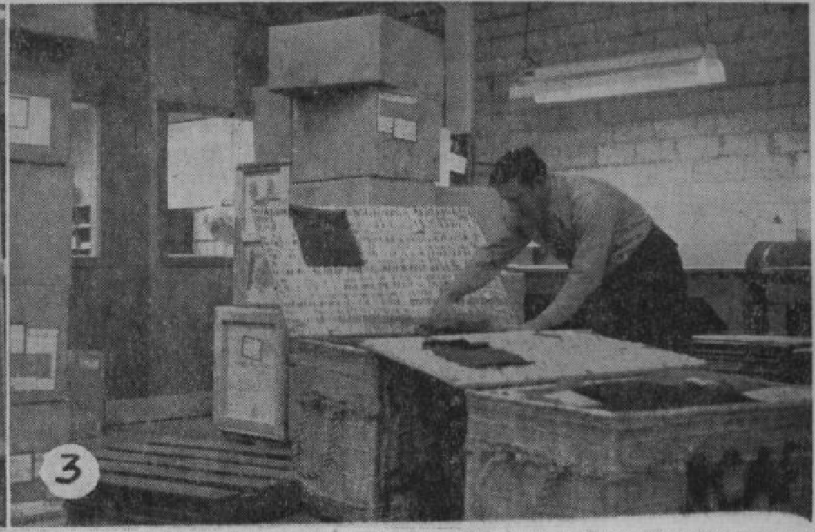
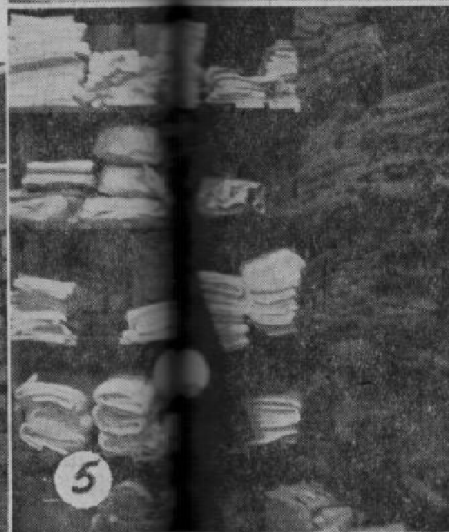
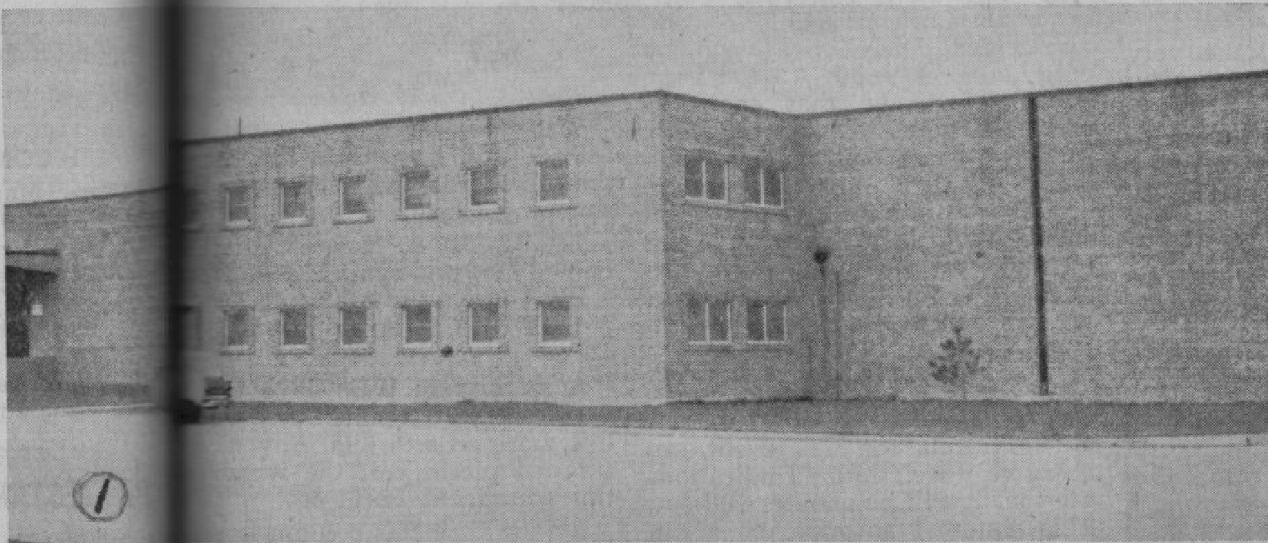
The Supply Section, in service parlance, is the Department Store of Stn. On this page, some attempt has been made to photograph a few of the services provided by the Supply Section. There are many more left uncovered, which through lack of space could not be included.

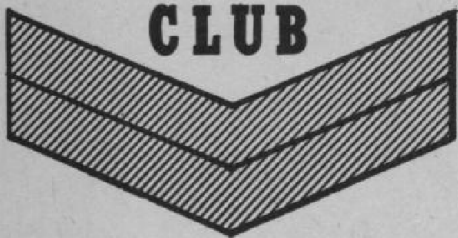

kept, how stove and furnace work and where the light switches are. It is quite another thing to disrespect the privacy of your employer's home by looking into desk and bureau drawers when the family is away and the children asleep. Just idle curiosity, but not mannerly! Wait to be invited to use the radio or television and be sure you are shown how to operate them properly. If you are the usual healthy teenager, always hungry, bring your own snack unless you have been definitely invited to help yourself. Do not spend the whole night on the telephone. If the

telephone rings, answer it unless you are busy with the children, and take any message down in writing. What about having a friend to sit with you? Certainly you are not entitled to give a party in someone else's home. If the house is in a lonesome spot, you might arrange with the parents that you could bring a friend. Your own parents should know of such plans, too. The most satisfactory arrangement probably is to come alone and busy yourself with homework if you have any free time. Come provided with a pad and pencil to write down detailed instructions. Remember to bring a flash light just in case you might be left in the dark with a frightened child. Bring along a game or two suited to the ages of children you are going to mind. These simple preparations will impress the parents that you are a capable young person, and they will leave you in charge with confidence.

CHARITY PLAN

The current drive of the Station Winnipeg Community Charities Support Plan promises to surpass all previous campaigns for charitable purposes in the Station's past, according to figures released by the committee responsible for conducting the canvass.

To date pledges, in the form of payroll deduction authorizations and cash donations, total \$7,723.40 with nearly a third of the personnel at Station Winnipeg and Training Command Headquarters to be heard from as yet.

Committee members are also hopeful that many of those who have elected not to contribute for the time being will change their minds in view of the response from other station personnel.

Station authorities pointed out that the amount pledged to date is already in excess of the total amount raised by the station for all charities last year. In this respect, the plan is already well on the way to achieving one of its principal objectives; to obtain worthwhile sums to contribute to local charities without the need for repeated drives, social functions and other man-hour consuming activities.

"We are convinced," said the Chairman of the CCSP committee, "that we have hit upon an excellent plan. Furthermore, we are sure that many of those who have not signed up with the plan, when they see the results being achieved, will change their minds and elect to become members. We feel, however, that one point requires clari-

fication. Many seem to have the idea, probably because our campaign is running at the same time as the local Red Feather drive, that this is a Community Chest thing only. This is not so. The plan is designed to support local charities generally and the money collected will be distributed among many. Any feeling people may have that by supporting the CCSP they are not helping their community charities is incorrect. Contributions by the plan will support a host of charitable, youth and other welfare organizations, all of which are local. Thus a small but regular monthly contribution through the plan will probably accomplish more for their community charities than a single direct donation of a dollar or two."

Campaign figures released to date indicate that approximately one half of station personnel have decided to join the plan, but the proportions vary from section to section and among different groups. Thus, for example, of the officers canvassed so far, 81% have signed up. In many cases, contributions in excess of \$75.00 per year have been pledged while some exceed the \$100 mark.

"The example set by these people is one deserving great praise and credit," the CCSP Chairman said. "When viewed in this light, it is almost certain that nearly half the station will not wish to feel that it is getting a 'free ride' on the shoulders of the other half, and so we anticipate that the percentage joining the plan will increase as time goes on. We want everyone to know that they can change their minds and join the CCSP any time they wish. They can obtain applications and membership cards from Pay Accounts anytime."

XMAS MAILING INSTRUCTIONS

The mailing dates as advertised, are FINAL dates when we can guarantee delivery before Xmas, but the wise mailer should try to post his parcels and cards before the final date.

Parcels should be well wrapped and tied with a good stout string. As an extra service this office will tie up parcels for anyone who cannot do so themselves.

Parcels should also have the address of the parcel in the lower right hand corner, exactly the same as if they were addressing a letter, and should be addressed on both sides with the return address in the upper left hand corner. Parcels wrapped in fancy Xmas paper is not practicable, for the paper is too easily torn and it is difficult for the address to be seen.

This office will be pleased to insure all parcels, and we would like to remind the public that this service is free in Canada, up to the value of Fifty Dollars: \$50.00. Unfortunately there is NO insurance on parcels for the Armed Services Overseas, but these parcels are processed through the Forces and MUST be addressed to the Armed Services member of the family, with his rank and if possible, his regimental number.

This office has supplies of all customs labels and forms necessary for any country in the world and will be pleased to give them to anyone requiring them. As it is necessary to list the contents of all parcels leaving the country, it is advisable to pick up the customs labels before hand, for speedier service at the office.

There are "green and white" leaflets of labels to be used on bundles of Christmas cards and we ask the Public to please use them by separating their "out of town" cards from the "local" cards, and posting them in a bundle, with the appropriate label on top.

Christmas, is a happy time and it would be a shame to spoil it for someone dear if your parcel to them is not received in time. We are ready and willing to help in any way possible and with mutual co-operation we will have the time and opportunity to provide the best service.
