RCAF Training Chief Visits Station

Air Marshal Sir Augustus Walker, Air Officer Commanding-in-Chief, RCAF Flying Training Command, and a group of 34 RAF officers visited RCAF Station Winnipeg and Training Command Headquarters here. The party arrived at noon last Wednesday from Ottawa aboard a Comet aircraft and were met by Air Vice Marshal H. M. Carscallen, Air Officer Commanding RCAF Training Command, and Group Captain D. A. Willis, Commanding Officer RCAF Station Winnipeg. They remained at the local air force unit until 3 p.m. Thursday, leaving then for the U.S. and visits to USAF installations. The RCAF group included members of a Specialist Navigation Course from the College of Air Warfare, together with officers from Flying Training Command, Air Ministry and Ministry of Aviation. Their activities here were centred mainly at the RCAF Central Navigation School where they received briefings on the role of CNS and its current projects.

CNS Host To RAF Specialist Nav. Course

The Central Navigation School was host to the No. 20 Specialist Navigation Course of the Royal Air Force when it visited RCAF Station Winnipeg on November 7, while touring Canada and the United States. Air Marshal Sir Augustus Walker, Air Officer Commanding-in-Chief of the Royal Air Force Flying Training Command and head of the visiting party, reviewed a Guard of Honour. AVM H. M. Carscallen, AOC Training Command, A/C J. A. Verner, Chief Staff Officer and Group Captain D. A. Willis, Commanding Officer,

Station Winnipeg, welcomed the visiting party.

The RAF SpecN course proceeded to the Officers' Mess where a series of lectures and discussions were presented to the RAF SpecN party by the OC of CNS, Wing Commander K. R. Greenway and officers of the staff. Emphasis was placed on the role of the Central Navigation School in the related fields of aeronautics and astronautics. By presenting some of the recent projects carried out by CNS, the CNS lecturers demonstrated the impact which the school has had upon RCAF navigation and the responsibility it has in keeping pace with the latest developments in navigation techniques. A topic of particular interest to the visitors was the main project conducted by the RCAF No. 14 SpecN course

LETTER TO 111KU SERVICING ON THE STOCKALL SEARCH

During the month of October, the four SAR aircraft from 111 KU were engaged on a search at Fort Nelson, B.C. Since 3 Oct '62, the following hours have been flown on these aircraft:

Dakota 568—149:35 hours
Dakota 559—101:05 hours
Albatross 9309—185:20 hours (not yet returned)
Albatross 9310—192:00 hours.

During this period, 4 Inspections on the Albatross and 2 on the Dakotas were carried out in the minimum of time to enable them to return to the search.

It is indeed satisfying to know that, in an emergency, the Repair

Do You Know Your NATO

This week we present the third and final part of our answer to the question: "How Does NATO Operate?"

The European Command

This Command covers the land area extending from the North Cape, Norway, to North Africa and from the Atlantic to the eastern border of Turkey, but excludes the United Kingdom, Portugal, and Algeria.

This area is under the Supreme Allied Commander Europe (SACEUR), whose headquarters, near Paris is known as SHAPE (Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe). Successive commanders of SHAPE have been:

- General Dwight D. Eisenhower (51-52)
- General Mathew B. Ridgeway (52-53)
- General Alfred M. Gruenther (53-56)
- General Lauris Norstad (56-62)

SACEUR is responsible under the general guidance of the Standing Group, for the defense of the Allied countries situated in the area under his Command against any attack, and would in time of war, control all land, sea, and air operations in this area.

Commands subordinate to SACEUR:

- Northern Europe Command HQ: KOLSAAS, Norway
- Central Europe Command HQ: FONTAINEBLEAU, France
- Southern Europe Command HQ: NAPLES, Italy
- Mediterranean Command HQ: MALTA

The Atlantic Ocean Command

This Command extends from the North Pole to the Tropic of Cancer and from the coastal waters of North America to those of Europe and Africa, including Portugal, except for the Channel and the British Isles.

This area is under the Supreme Allied Commander Atlantic (SACLANT) whose headquarters is at Norfolk, Virginia, U.S.A. Successive commanders have been:

- Admiral Lynde D. McCormick (52-54)
- Admiral Jerauld Wright (54-60)
- Admiral Robert L. Denison (60-62)

Like SACEUR, SACLANT is directly responsible to the Standing Group, and is in charge of the Allied Command of the North Atlantic Ocean area. He has no forces permanently attached to his Command in peacetime. However, for training purposes and in the event of war, forces earmarked by the nations involved, are assigned to his direction.

Commands subordinate to SACLANT:

- Western Atlantic Area Command
- Striking Fleet Atlantic HQ: NORFLOK, Va., U.S.A.
- Eastern Atlantic Area Command
- Eastern Atlantic Area Air Command HQ: NORTHWOOD, United Kingdom

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EDITORIAL CORNER

It Can't Happen Here

Complacency to danger is natural to a human. He is inherently convinced that danger is something that happens to somebody else. Probably that is why a human suffers so greatly from shock when peril catches up with him suddenly. "Why did it have to happen to me?" is so common an expression it has become a cliché.

Danger is everybody's companion. No place is safe. No device has been invented to protect a human from all peril. Devices have been invented to protect a human from many of the menaces that surround him day and night. But the very nature of the human being leaves him apathetic to these devices as he creates around him a mental curtain of disbelief in danger to himself.

The motorist is one of the strongest examples of this. He thinks nothing of switching on a powerful motor so he can drive a two-ton collection of metal up to 70 miles an hour in the immediate presence of hundreds of other powerful, heavy machines travelling as fast. None of these machines can think or react. He is in sole control of his machine as only the other drivers are in control of their machines. Normally, he places explicit and whole trust in those other drivers and has no doubt at all of his own abilities.

He drives past the scene of a disastrous crash.

"Tsk. Tsk," he says.

Too bad, he thinks. He shrinks at the sight of bodies lying on the pavement, twisted and smashed vehicles, bleeding and stunned people, and drives on as though he had witnessed something in another world. He has no thought of connecting himself, his passengers and his vehicle with that accident, but there is a connection.

Only he can stop it. Only he can cause it. It is his responsibility and his alone. Nobody else can do it for him.

Car manufacturers try to package the driver in safety by depressing steering wheels, cushioning instrument panels, making door locks safer, installing seat belt brackets, providing better braking systems, building stronger frames and so on. There are other devices the driver can procure as additional equipment to help keep him safe.

But only he can prevent the accident that would make these devices work. Only he has the brain, the control.

The driver can have the power of life or death. Are you that driver?

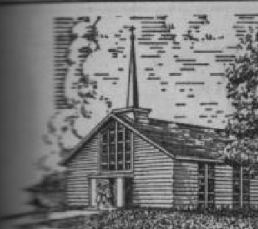
Yorkshire, and in the following spring he saw duty with Coastal Command in Banff, Scotland.

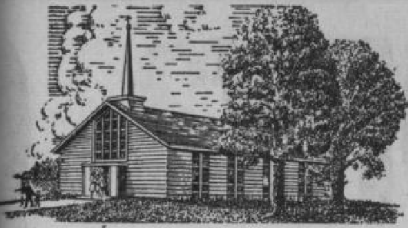

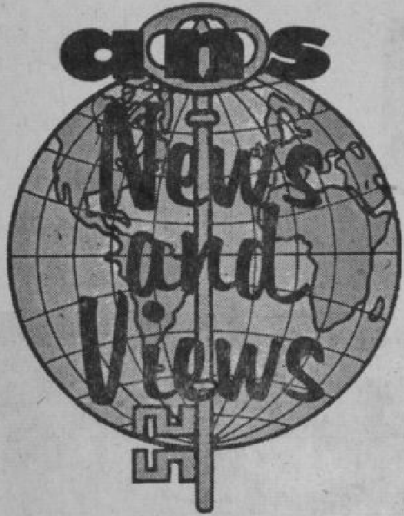

The RCAF's Expanding Role

Although the RCAF is a comparatively small Air Force, its "Peacetime" personnel are "getting to know" many countries and peoples that have not seen Canadians since World War II. In addition to our European establishments, there is the 115 Communications Flight, which takes care of the UN troops in Egypt. Two RCAF Otters with air and ground crews are providing air lift support for the UN administration in New Guinea. Air Force Headquarters announced last week that six RCAF Dakotas have been despatched to India. Although the RCAF Hercules aircraft are few in number, the aircrew flying them are doing a magnificent flying job airlifting aircraft and heavy freight to Alert at the top of the world or to far off sweltering New Guinea. The long range RCAF Yukon aircraft used on routine trans-Atlantic hops, occasionally extend their flights to include emergency flights to Iran or other countries requiring Canadian assistance. And let's not forget the dependable North Star Aircraft which is still being used. Although the operating funds for the RCAF have been drastically

cut, the operational role of our Air Force continues to grow and spread its wings still further afield.

which graduated in July of this year. A reception was given in honour of the visitors in the evening at the Officers' Mess.

On the morning of 8 November two lectures were presented—"The Changing Shape of RCAF Radio Navigator Training and Education" and "The CF104 Weapons System." The first lecture pointed out the difference between training and education of aircrew personnel. Training, it was shown, is conducted at the wings level, operational training units and on conversion courses, whereas education is the prime responsibility of the Central Navigation School which conducts the Specialist Navigation Course, and Staff courses; all post graduate studies for Radio Navigator aircrew personnel.

The visit was concluded by a visit to Mawdesley Hall before the RAF visitors departed for the United States. The RCAF No. 15 SpecN course will visit the RAF at the College of Air Warfare, Manby, in February of 1963 when it will make a three-week tour of Europe.

A note of interest to RCAF personnel is that the RAF Staff Navigator Course will be located with the Specialist Navigation Course at Manby as of February 1963. This arrangement is similar to the one at the Central Navigation School.

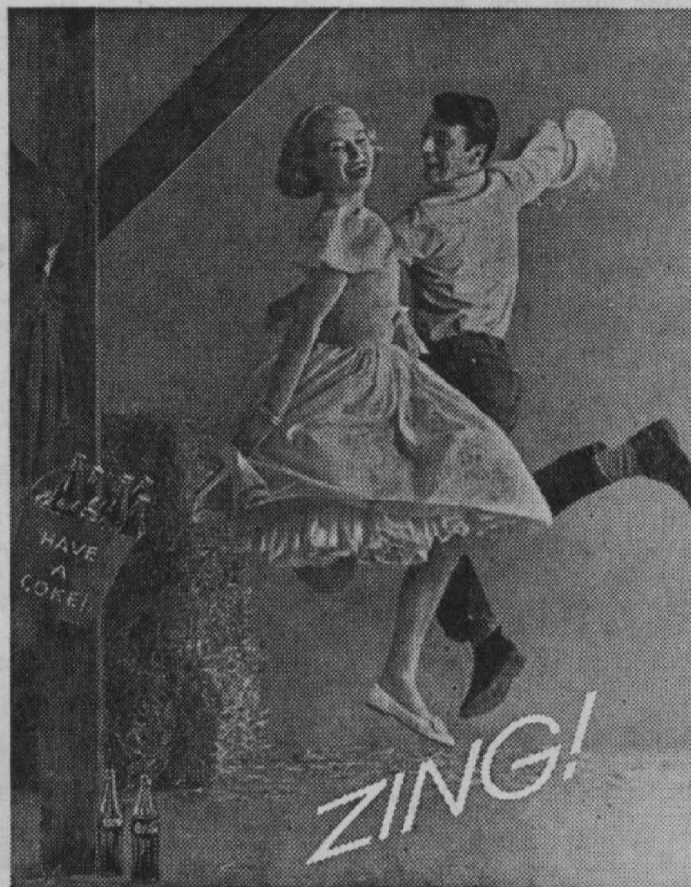
