### '64 Jamesport Trophy Won By St. James

Thousands of years ago, according to Greek mythology, a bird was consumed by flames only to rise again from its own ashes. This bird was called the Phoenix and it is symbolized on the trophy for which RCAF teams will compete on Monday morning, the 16th of March, when the RCAF Curling Championship opens at Station Winnipeg.

Eleven teams from Canada and the Division will be arriving at Station Winnipeg this weekend, all with one direct aim. To take home the Phoenix Trophy and the prestige that goes with winning the "RCAF Curling Champions." While the name of the winner will remain in doubt for several days to come, there are some facts available based on past competitions from which we can make predictions. The curlers participating in the championship have reached the finals by being named zone winners according to their geographical location. Theirs is not an easy task, and the up-

coming competition will prove even more difficult than their qualifying round. We, therefore, can expect to see some of the finest curling possible in this year's final.

As in the "Brier," the pressure on each individual will increase until it reaches a peak; who it may affect is unpredictable. From past competitions we have observed many outstanding examples of determination and sportsmanship amongst the competitors. As this will be the first truly service-wide curling competition (now that Air Division

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Orange Coconut Chews

- 1/4 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 cup coconut
1 cup chopped dates
Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

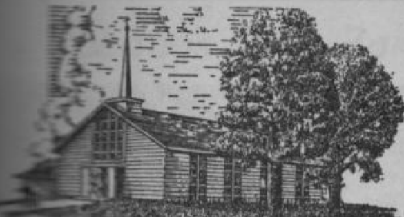
Melt butter in saucepan. Remove from heat. Stir in brown sugar. Blend in egg, vanilla and orange rind. Measure flour, salt and baking powder onto waxed paper. Stir thoroughly to blend. Stir in butter, sugar mixture. Stir in coconut and dates. Spread in greased 7" x 11" pan. Bake for 15 minutes. When cool, cut in squares.

### RCAF CHAMPIONSHIPS

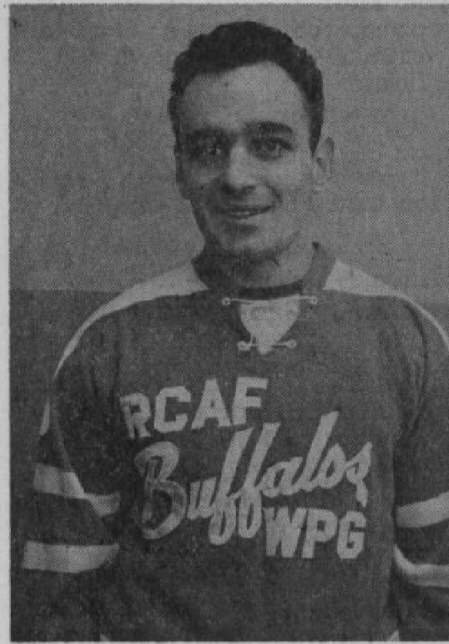

Usually this column would be somewhat longer, but the information (Continued on page 6)

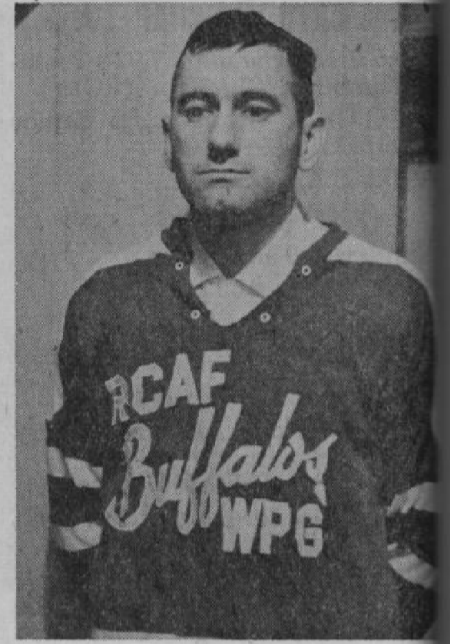
## WINNIPEG BUFFALOS

In all the games the Buffalos played I could count the number of spectators that came to the game from the Station on both hands. 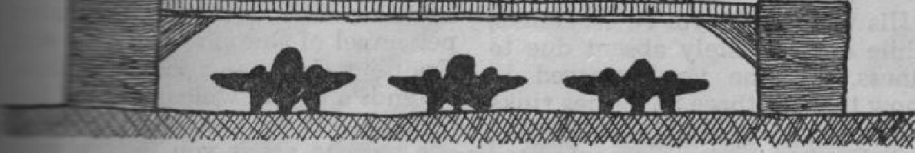

## SERVICE BRIEFING

NAVY CAN'T AWAIT

VICTORIA—This is the opinion of retired Rear-Admiral P. D. Budge, now executive secretary of the Navy League of Canada, whose navy career spanned 30 years. Admiral Budge is in Victoria to attend a western regional meeting of Navy League presidents in the Empress Hotel. "It might well be

that the hydrofoil is the ideal vessel, if we are to continue as an anti-submarine fleet," he said. "But it will take 10 to 15 years to find out. Meanwhile, the navy needs replacements for worn-out ships. Construction should be commenced at once." Admiral Budge believes the GP frigate is the best answer to the navy's needs yet suggested—but only if Canada is to continue to specialize in anti-submarine warfare.

## U.S. RAY GUN CAN BURN, BLIND ENEMY

BOSTON—A lightweight Laser rifle, which shoots a destructive ray instead of bullets, has been developed by Maser Optics, Inc., and turned over to the army. The rifle's ray, the firm said, is not enough to inflict serious bodily harm but could set fire to a soldier's clothes. It could also blind someone at ranges of up to a mile. The weapon can fire at least one burst of light every 10 seconds and has a life-time capability of 10,000 pulses or flashes.

## CARIBOU FOR AUSTRALIA

The first of 18 twin engine DHC-4 Caribou aircraft for the Royal Australian Air Force was handed over during a brief ceremony at the Downsview, Ontario, plant of de Havilland Aircraft of Canada on February 24, 1964. Deliveries on the remaining 17 aircraft will be made throughout the year.

## FORCES PAY ALLOWANCES CUT

OTTAWA—The estimates tabled by Finance Minister Gordon recently show a decrease of \$109,000,000, but not all of this is a saving to the taxpayer, since some supplementary estimates are anticipated and close to \$20,000,000 is not really being saved, but transferred to other departments. In the armed forces themselves, reductions occur in pay and allowances to personnel. The strengths of all three services have been allowed to decline, so that less money is being spent despite pay increases last year. Navy pay drops from \$93,442,000 to \$89,210,000; Army pay from \$206,365,000 to \$199,500,000; Air Force pay from \$248,923,000 to \$246,647,000. This provides a total saving in excess of \$14,000,000. No new major equipment or construction programs are planned, but current programs are being continued.
