RCAF CUBS ROMP AT CAMP GILWELL

The cubs of A and B packs arrived at Camp on Sunday, July 12, and were assigned to their tents. The leaders, who arrived the day before to set up the camp site, showed the parents around the camp and all thought it was an ideal place.

After the boys had been assigned to the tents. They were given camp and swimming instructions by Camp Akela, Ron Leneveu. The boys and leaders then went for a swim, where appetites were sharpened for a waiting supper of roast beef, potatoes, vegetables and dessert cooked by KAA, Murray Clark.

The supper dishes were washed by the duty six, while the rest of the cubs went to prepare their tents. As evening settled over the camp, the flag lowering ceremony was held, and prayers were said, after which everyone got ready for camp fire. This brought the first evening to a close and everyone was off to bed.

Monday morning bright and early, started out as one of the typical days in cub camp. The boys were roused from bed at 0730 and after washing and dressing, they hung out their sleeping bags to air. At 0815, the boys sat down to a welcomed breakfast of pancakes, cereal, toast, peanut butter and jam. Feeling quite contented, the duty six, which was Shawnee, were soon let down a little as they were detailed to wash up the dishes, while the rest went back

to their tents to brush their teeth and clean up the tent area for inspection.

With everything in tip top shape, the flag raising ceremony was conducted, and a hike organized. This hike was carried out over a distance of 1½ miles and during the hike the boys collected various shells from around the shore, wood specimens and odd shaped rocks for their own collections and for proficiency badges.

Returning to camp at 1100, the boys retired to their tents to prepare for a swim. After an hours frolic in the water, the boys, tired as they were, made short work of the lunch which was awaiting them. After eating, the duty six began the chore, which Mom handles at home, of dish washing. The rest of the boys went back to their tents for an hours rest and relaxation until 1445.

A bit refreshed, craft period kept them occupied for an hour after which time they played at games such as soccer, baseball, etc. This hour of sports had them once again eyeing the nearby beach and at 1600 they all "hit the water" so to speak, with a splash. Once again feeling on top of the world, the boys returned to their tents to get dressed, make up their beds for the night, and prepare for supper which was served at 1730.

With the dinner dishes washed up, the boys spent an hour in free time doing what they wished such

as playing tag, making bows and arrows, and fashioning tomahawks from stones and wood.

At 1930, the flag lowering ceremony was held and evening prayers were said.

Camp fire was held at 1945, at which time each one of the boys acted a skit and sang a song.

A growing boy must have food, and the boys in cubs are no exception to the rule. At 2040, they proceeded to the cook shack for a late snack and then at 2130, all were off to bed.

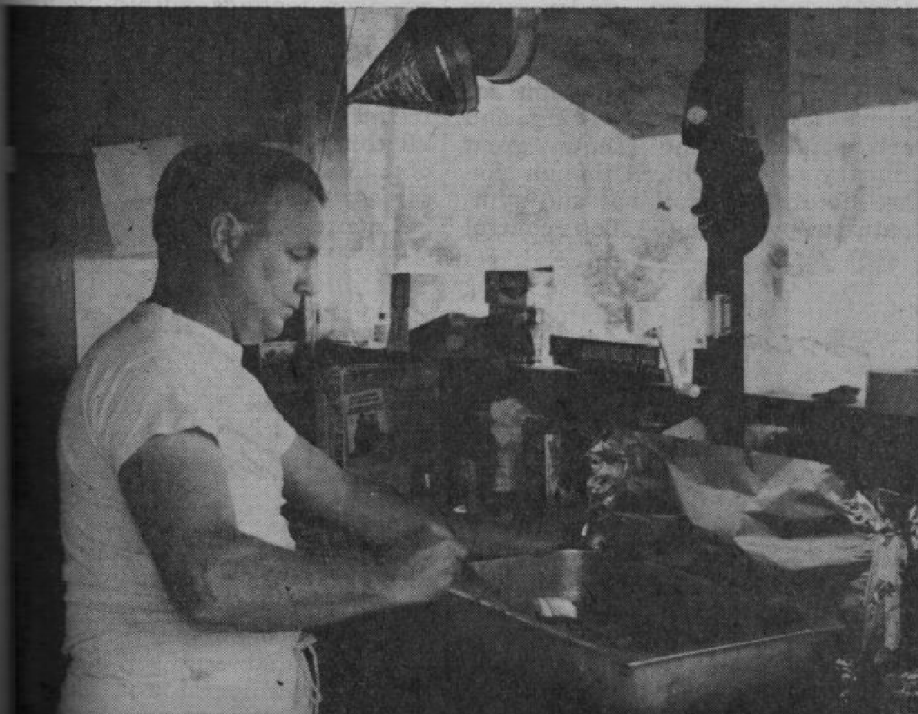
Each day was generally the same except that the morning periods were spent doing different cub requirements such as nature study,
