## CCSP MEANS You

Do you know what CCSP means—what the organization is—how it works—and why?

The CCSP was inaugurated in fall of 1962 at TCHQ and RCAF Winnipeg as a payroll deduction plan for raising funds for charities. The broad objectives of the plan are:

to reduce the man hour losses occasioned by the organization of numerous charitable campaigns through the year, and to enable RCAF personnel, through group giving, to make really worthwhile contributions to local charities.

The system operates by means of a voluntary membership of RCAF personnel who have authorized the PAO to make a regular monthly pay deduction which is carried into CCSP funds. The only overhead is the cost of printing the necessary forms and membership

cards. The CCSP committee consists of regular members representing TCHQ, Lodger Units, and the various sections of Station Winnipeg. The Chaplains, and representatives of the Sgts.' Mess, Cpls.' Club and Club 61 are ex officio members. All the paper work required to record authorized donations, deduct charges from individual pay accounts, maintain auditable accounts of all funds received and paid out, etc., is processed by Accounts Section personnel. The provision of all services from our own station resources has kept the total administration costs, including the initial printing of stationery to set up the Charities Plan, at less than 1% of the total donations received. This is substantially less than the administrative cost incurred by similar plans in civilian organizations which usually exceed 8%.

### TWO CIGARETTES A DAY

Do you think the cost of two cigarettes a day is excessive? If you smoke at all it is something that you probably never consider, that is all we suggest as a contribution to the CCSP if you are already participating. If all the service personnel who do not support our Charities Plan would authorize a monthly pay deduction equivalent to two cigarettes per day, we could increase our financial assistance to charitable organizations to \$25,000.00 next year. No one would consider a premium of

\$1.00 per month to be an excessive amount to pay as an insurance policy. Yet organized group giving to respectable charitable organizations is in a sense a form of insurance. Without regular financial support the charitable organizations would be unable to continue their work. By our help now we can ensure that their facilities and assistance will be available to all of us and our families in the event that we too some day may require a helping hand.

You will see from the summary of operations for the 11 months of the current year that the CCSP is growing very gradually. Donations received since the project was started have reached \$22,814.01. A total of \$22,133.89 has been forwarded to enable the charitable organizations to continue to provide help in many forms to people not so fortunate as ourselves.

The only distressing feature of the CCSP is our failure to convince a large number of service personnel, who have declined to participate in this plan, of the advantages which accrue to our Service and to all of us. It is appreciated that many are active in charitable organizations in their local area and already donate their time and money. However, many others are not participating in any way.

It is emphasized that no attempt has been or will be made to coerce personnel into giving in accordance with a scale based on salary or any other *Guide for Giving*. Your conscience is the only guide we suggest. The CCSP organization

tion exists, and the record is clear of what has been accomplished by approximately 50% of our service personnel. If you belong to the half who are not participating, do not feel that a donation of 50 cents or \$1.00 a month would make very little difference. Don't wait for the next man, contact your section representative or the Accounts Section and sign a pledge card now. If everyone would make this small effort we could DOUBLE our next year's donations to our local charities, therefore your donation could make a great deal of difference and is required.

Only one annual campaign is now held on behalf of the Federal Service Division Community Chest. This campaign will commence on 28 Sep. '64. Members of the CCSP will not be canvassed and the following donations have been made on their behalf:

- (a) an immediate donation of \$800.00 from funds on hand;
- (b) a pledge of \$6,500.00 from next year's payroll donations.

Here is a sample from a boy of 14, and I thought it might be interesting to discuss "young writing." How much can we get from the answer is a surprising amount. Certainly there may be some apparent inaccuracies. From 13 or 14, for several years, a boy (or girl) trying to find his (or her) feet in the adult world. His character beginning to "jell," and in the process there will often be dramatic changes, and these can occur and recur at alarmingly short intervals. (Believe me I speak from experience!) He is very emotional, his parents may expect a few storms at this age, but he is showing signs of developing good control, and the phase will pass. He is talkative, but not overly so, and very truthful; he is modest, and reserved with strangers, slow perhaps in making friends, but generous and loyal when the friendship is made.

civilian personnel will be canvassed individually. The need for financial support of the Community Chest is greater than ever. Service and civilian personnel may make their contributions either by cash or cheque in favour of the Community Chest of Greater Winnipeg. Alternatively, service personnel whose pay records are maintained by RCAF Station Winnipeg may elect to participate in the CCSP by a monthly pay deduction or authorize a monthly pay deduction in favour of the Community Chest only. In the latter event the CCSP payroll deduction card should be completed and endorsed "For Community Chest only." Pledges made in this manner will be deducted from pay accounts monthly and a cheque for the total amount forwarded to the treasurer of the Federal Services Division. The total remitted will be advised to the donors in Voxair each month.

In the fall of 1963, for the first time, all Federal Government employees, Civil Servants and Military, were combined in the Federal Services Division of the Community Chest. Responsibility for the organization, direction and operation of last year's campaign covering approximately 11,000 personnel in this area was vested in the RCAF, specifically the AOC of Training Command.

On 6 Nov. '63 Group Captain James A. Stephens, 1963 Chairman of the Community Chest Federal Service Division, officially announced the completion of that division's canvass. The returns for the first year during which local Federal Government, Crown Corporations, RCMP, Armed Services and civilian Department of National Defence personnel had organized their own internal Community Chest campaign totalled \$25,855.00. This total included a pledge of \$6,100.00 on behalf of the participants in the RCAF Winnipeg Community Charities Support Plan. This pledge has now been fully paid.

The Chairman for the 1964 Federal Service Division Community Chest Campaign is Mr. W. E. Fenn, Department of Transport. Canvassing will commence on 28 Sep. '64 and organizers have been appointed in all sections.

Although Welfare Minister La Marsh announced at the annual meeting of the Canadian Welfare Council on 2 June '64, that federal Civil Servants would be able, in future, to have contributions to community welfare campaigns deducted from their pay cheques, she also said that this new feature would not be put into operation until after 31 Dec. '64. It is regretted, therefore, that civilian employees may only make their contributions by cash or cheque.

This year an immediate cash donation of \$800.00 has been made on behalf of the members of the CCSP as the first contribution to the Federal Service Division Community Chest Campaign. An additional amount of \$6,500.00 has been pledged to be paid during the coming year as CCSP payroll deductions are processed each month.

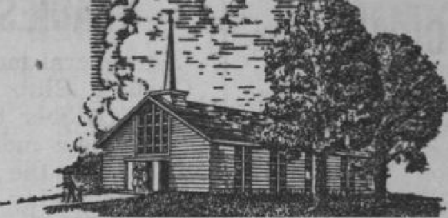

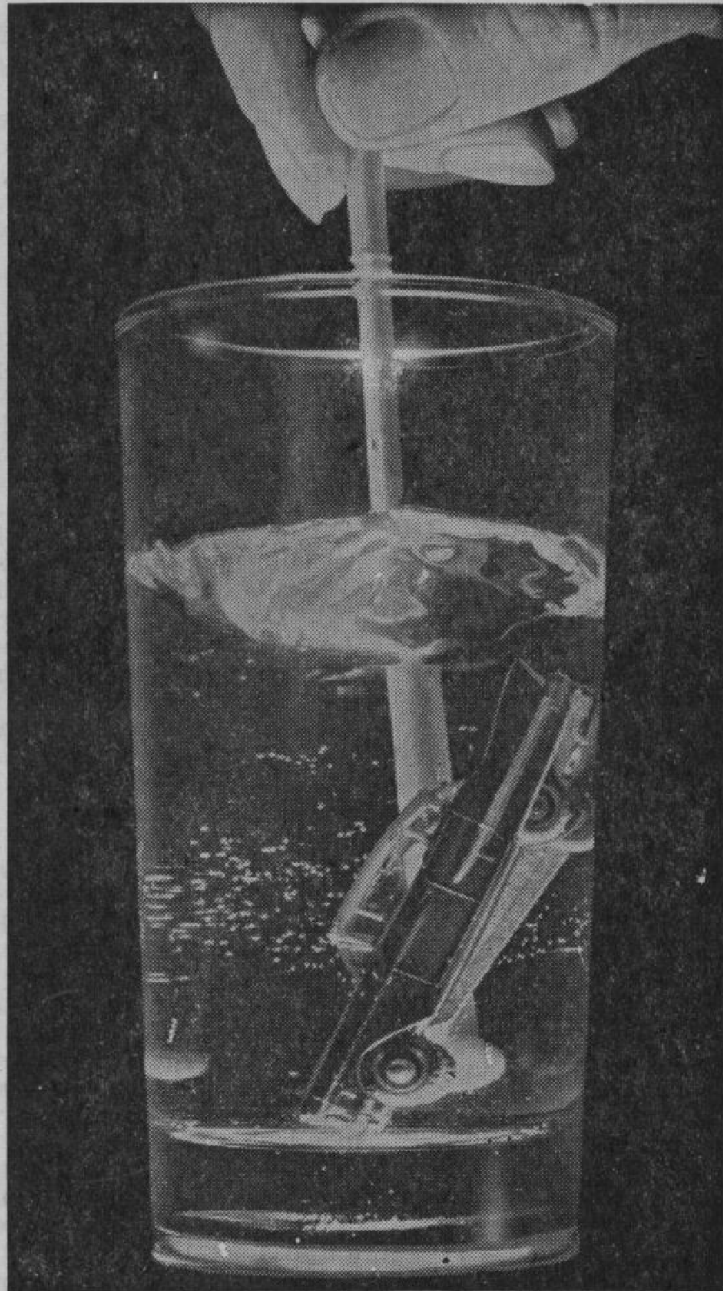
