## CREDIT UNION TOPS \$1,000,000

RCAF Station Winnipeg's Astra Credit Union Society Limited, has passed the one million dollar mark in total assets according to the financial report of September 30, 1964.

The Astra Credit Union is a co-operative savings and loan association of over 1,800 service and civilian personnel employed at Station Winnipeg. It is an independent, non-profit corporation, chartered and supervised by the Manitoba Government, which is run by members exclusively for the benefit of members.

The idea of a credit union for air force people at Station Winnipeg came from Cpl. John Campbell who began to lay the necessary groundwork as early as 1957. Soon, he received material assistance from WO2 Brennan and F/L Dupre, both of whom had gained previous experience in the Credit Union Movement. The first few months were lean ones, as might be expected. However, with the aid of the dedicated officers and staff, the obvious advantages to be gained by following the Credit Union philosophy, and the support of the Commanding Officer at the time, G/C J. F. Mitchell, Astra grew and prospered.

The first manager was a man whose name has long been synonymous with Astra, Mr. Ray Bauschke. While he was working with it, his drive and incentive were responsible in a large way for Astra being the fastest growing Credit Union in Manitoba. Its charter was approved by the government in December of 1958 and by December 1960, it possessed assets

of over a quarter of a million dollars. Two years later, this had become half a million and, in less than another two years, assets had more than doubled to surpass the million dollar milestone.

Not until the formation of Astra did the people of this unit have a banking and loan institution that they could truly say was their own. Here, they are members and owners, not customers, where they can save their hard-earned money at excellent rates. Where else can one get a guaranteed interest rate of 6% annually on his savings with no contracts to sign, no minimum deposit required, and up to \$2,000 dollar-for-dollar life insurance at no cost just by being a member?

After beginning its life on the upper floor of Bldg. 17 (now the Community Centre), Astra relocated in somewhat cramped quarters in the old guardhouse at the Sharpe gate. In December of 1963, it moved to its present location in the basement of the Station Recreation Centre where its bright, modern offices provide an appropriate setting for the up-to-date services offered to its members.

In addition to savings, loans, chequing accounts, trust accounts, and individual life insurance, one may also obtain such information as—a used car evaluation in any of the provinces; interpretation of mortgages; a commissioner for oaths; a consumer's reference library; and unbiased financial counselling.

Loans are one of the services most in demand by Astra members. Almost three million dollars has been loaned out to people on this

unit for provident and productive purposes since 1958. By virtue of the low interest rates on loans, it is estimated that members have saved approximately \$250,000 in finance and loaning charges by dealing with Astra rather than with a variety of outside financial institutions. Additionally, all loans are life-insured at no extra cost. Applications for loans are judged by a credit committee of five members who are elected to this task. In all cases, the broadest consideration is given to applications and all information is held in the strictest confidence.

Since its inception, Astra has been affiliated with the Credit Union League of Manitoba and the Credit Union National Association with head offices in Madison, Wis. and Hamilton, Ontario. Provincial government auditors examine the books annually. In addition, an elected supervisory committee conducts a continual and exacting audit throughout the year.

Recently, a Promotion and Education Committee was formed from members of the Board of Directors, the Credit Committee and the Supervisory Committee. Its purpose is primarily to keep members informed of the policies, growth, services, and future developments of their Credit Union. Also, it proposes to inform non-members of the philosophy behind Credit Unions—the idea of self-help, self-ownership and sound financial management.

After Ray Bauschke left for a position of greater responsibility with the Co-operative Union, the managership was taken over by

Mr. Jack Brodie. Jack was formerly in charge of a large credit union in Fort William for a period of 15 years, and has continued to direct the service for which the Astra staff are renowned.

At the present time, the President of the Board of Directors is Sgt. Pat Supeene with Mr. Bob Silman as Vice-President and Cpl. Marc Gagnon as Secretary. Committee chairmen are F/L A. L. Sturgess (Credit), Cpl. Cal Shermehorn (Supervisory) and F/L Bill Jarvis (Promotion and Education).

Another indication of Astra's progressive thinking was its conception of an annual conference to be held for Credit Unions organized by all three armed services across Canada. As a result, in 1960 and 1961, Station Winnipeg hosted the first and second annual Military Credit Union Conferences. These and subsequent meetings have provided discussions of common purposes and problems which have resulted in an invaluable exchange of ideas to benefit policies and operations.

What can the future hold for such a successful organization?

Although Astra is proud of its present membership of over 1,800 persons, there is still a vast potential available at Station Winnipeg. A continuing effort on the part of members and elected volunteers, applying the principles of financial self-aid, shall continue to play a major role in improving the economic and social well-being of service personnel through their own Credit Union.

F/L B. C. BELL, the new Editor, trained as a pilot in 1954 and was transferred to 444 Sqn. 4(F) Wing B. Baden flying F-86 Sabres in 1955. In April 1958 he joined the RCAF Advisory Group at Oldenburg, where the German Air Force opened a Weapons and Tactics school using Canadian-built Sabres.

In 1960 F/L Bell returned to Canada as an instructor on T-33 a/c at Portage la Prairie. After three years with the AFS he attended the No. 16 Aerospace Systems course at CNS Winnipeg. Upon completion of the course, he was transferred to CFS.

F/L A. J. LEGG, the retiring Editor, is a marine navigator who joined the RCAF in 1953. He graduated as a Transport Navigator in 1954 and served with 408 Photo Squadron at Rockcliffe before converting to interceptor work in 1956. He was stationed at Montreal with 425 and 416 Squadrons, returning to Winnipeg as an instructor in 1958. Having completed two instructional tours at Air Navigation and Central Navigation Schools, he is proceeding to Bagotville for operational training with Air Defence Command.

F/L G. A. DAWSON, the retiring Advertising Manager, of Rossland, BC, joined the RCAF in May 1954 and after training as an Airborne Interception Officer flew with the RCAF's No. 409 All Weather Interceptor Squadron at Comox, BC.

He was transferred in 1958 to Winnipeg for post graduate training, and later joined the staff of ANS. In Sept. 1960 F/L Dawson was transferred to CNS as Examination and Flying Co-ordinator.

F/O HUBBS, the new Advertising Manager, enlisted in the RCAF in October 1942 and graduated as a Wireless Air Gunner at Mossbank in January 1944. He served in No. 8 (BR) Squadron at Port Hardy and Pat Bay, going overseas in September 1944.

He was released at the war's end but re-enlisted in the Flying Control Branch in 1946. He was stationed at Centralia until 1949 when he was transferred to Fort Nelson. For several years he alternated between Fort Nelson and Edmonton before taking the GCA course.

After a short spell in Gimli he was transferred to 2 Wing, returning to Gimli in 1960.

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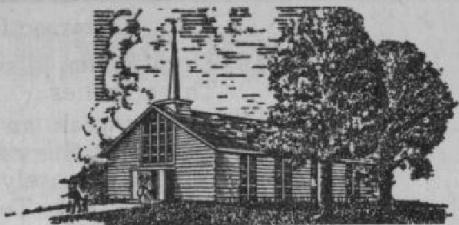

## THE PADRE'S PORTION

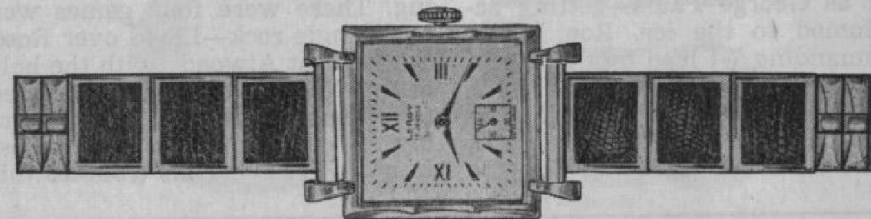

"He gets paid for it, let him do it." This is a modern attitude which we may feel and have heard expressed many times. The argument goes something like this—a bottle has been smashed on the road and someone stops to pick it up while his friend objects—"Hey, let the street sweeper clean that up, that's what they're getting paid for!"

But the Christian Church down through the centuries has made its mark on the world because of men, women and young people who have neither asked nor wanted any more reward than to be of service to their Lord and Master. Thanks be to God for such as these.
