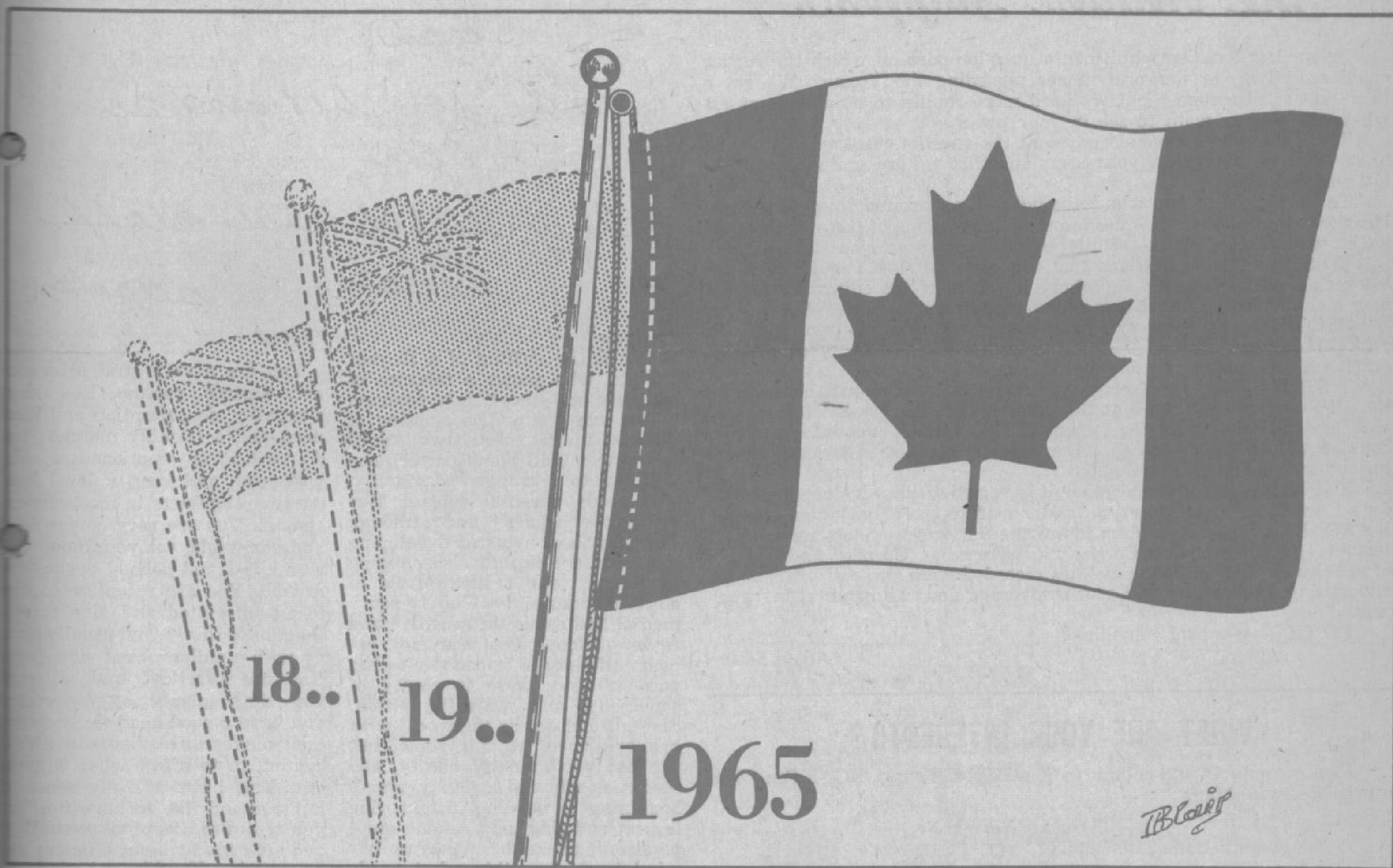

MAPLE LEAF FLAG OFFICIAL ON 15 FEB.



February 15, 1965, will be a historic day for Canada. The new red and white Maple Leaf Flag will be raised for the first time officially at noon that Monday. The new Canadian flag will be raised on the Peace Tower of the Parliament Buildings in Ottawa and there are hopes for similar "first raisings" all across Canada on the same day.

The new flag, like most worthwhile national goals, was the product of a long and bitter battle in parliament. The longest session in parliament's history was needed to finally get the flag through the Commons, but its final acceptance was worth the wait for most Can-

Despite 33 days of flag filibustering by the opposition, the long wait for the selection committee's decision, and a last ditch amendment to change the flag recommendation to the Red Ensign, the flag resolution passed the Commons 163 to 78.

However, this result came about only after the government had resolved to invoke closure to end the opposition's refusal to let the majority rule. Closure meant that the flag resolution would be allowed to come to a vote after one more day of debate. Thus, early in the morning of Dec. 15, the long flag debate ended.

It was a dramatic moment in the

house as the vote was announced, and let loose an emotional scene seldom viewed from the spectators galleries.

For the staunch supporters of the Red Ensign, Monday will be a rather sad day, but as time passes and the distinctive Maple Leaf emblem becomes familiar, surely everyone will come to take it as a symbol of Canada. As the Prime Minister said, it is "a flag for the future that does not dishonour the past." The Red Ensign, however, will not pass completely from view. The Royal Canadian Legion will continue to fly the Ensign as it's official flag on Legion buildings.

What part the Red Ensign will

play in Monday's flag ceremonies is unknown, but the Ensign will probably be lowered from the Peace Tower with appropriate tributes to its long, though unofficial, tenure as Canada's flag. The Union Jack will have no part in the flag raising ceremonies but it will remain as a symbol of Canada's Commonwealth membership and of loyalty to the Queen.

It behooves members of the RCAF, the Army and Navy, to join with all Canadians in accepting and respecting the new Maple Leaf flag. As loyal and proud Canadians we owe this new flag our allegiance as it is the symbol of a progressive, confident and independent nation.

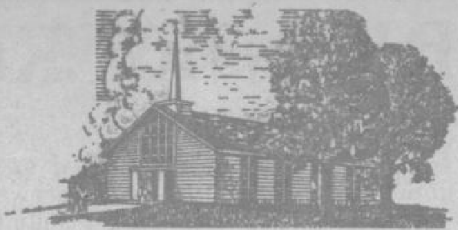

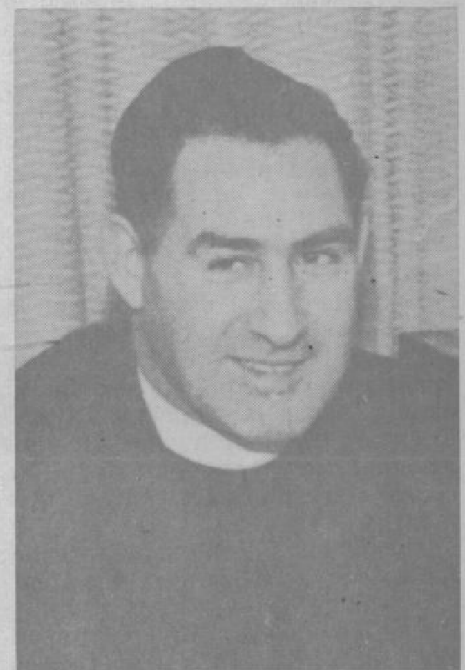

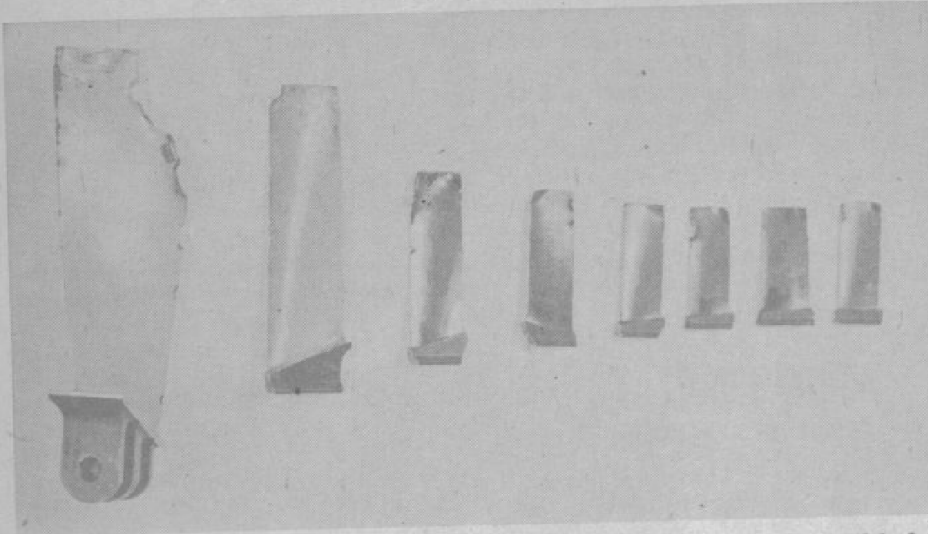

FLIGHT SAFETY NOTES



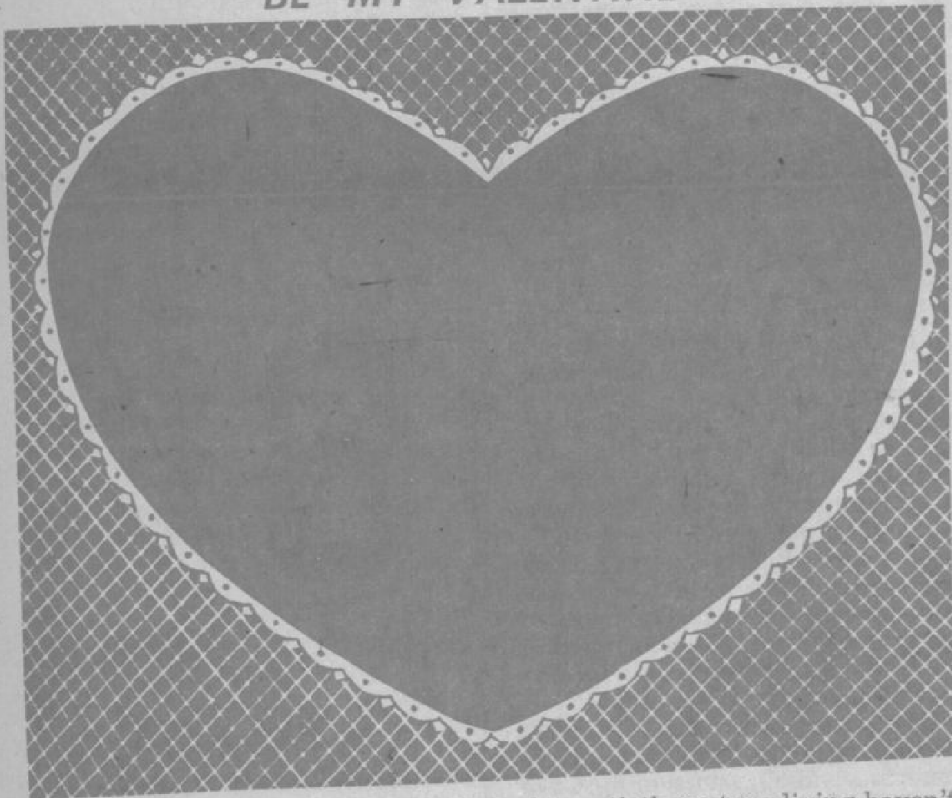
The above photograph shows the damage to the compressor blades of a Tutor engine.

All this damage was caused by a loose screw in the airframe, being injected. More and more we are finding that FOD is caused by items being left in the airframe during maintenance. Sooner or later, a piece of locking wire or a cotter pin will shake itself down into the engine intake.

Contrary to popular belief, the T33 and Tutor engines will not easily pick up FOD from the ramp. You will now hear the expression, "the Tutor can't even pick up cornflakes."

In a recent case of FOD on a Tutor, a small piece of wire was seen to be sucked out of the electronics compartment cooling vents in the nose, directly back into the engine intake. Every tradesmen working on the aircraft can help prevent FOD by keeping the whole airframe free of loose objects.

U.S. CAR TRADE PACT WON'T CUT PRICES

Excerpts from the Toronto Star, January 7, 1965

OTTAWA (CP) — Car prices in Canada are unlikely to change much, if at all, in the period immediately following the Canadian-U.S. deal for free trade in new cars and parts.

Ultimately, the Canadian consumer would benefit from somewhat lower prices, authorities here said yesterday. But suggestions of big price cuts right away have been branded "ridiculous".

However, abolition of the Canadian tariff on imported U.S. auto parts would not likely have much retail-price effect by itself, information said.

"In fact, we don't foresee any immediate price difference at all", said one source close to the Canadian negotiating team.

Thus even if Canadian tariffs on all parts going into new car production were completely abolished,

they could enter Canada at a price that might scuttle the market for cars produced in Canada by the subsidiaries of the American producers.

Observers here doubt that the auto industry would attempt such a move because it could well endanger not only their huge investment in Canadian plants, but also the commitment they must make on their Canadian production volume. Such a step would wreck the price structure that in fact enables them to produce cars in Canada.

SEES PRICE RISE

In Toronto, Earl K. Brownridge, president of the Motor Vehicles Manufacturers Association, said speculation about a possible car price reduction is "wishful thinking".

In fact, he added, there was greater chance of a price increase in the immediate future despite any Canada-U.S. trade agreement.

His statement, however, did not rule out the possibility of price reduction on a long-term basis. "Many things have to be done over a long period in order to realize the benefits of the program to Canadian automobile and truck buyers," he said.

Meanwhile, Mr. Brownridge said, inflationary forces in labor contracts and possible steel price increases mean higher automotive prices in Canada, much before the economics of an agreement could be felt.

PLAY IT SAFE

All it takes is a little square of ice in the right spot to immobilize the biggest automobile. The ice can form under the wheels while the car is parked. Be ready for it. Carry some sand, a few old sacks or a length of chicken wire to provide traction. Another ice-driving tip: spinning the wheel is no way to get off that ice or out of snow. Gently and slowly is the way, warns the Canadian Highway Safety Council.

It's human nature for a pedestrian to recognize and try to stand on his so-called rights in traffic, but he ought to remember two important facts: first, an automobile vastly outweighs him; second, an automobile is a machine whose operator can suddenly lose control. If you're walking in front of motor traffic, never rely entirely on the manners of the driver or the ability of the vehicle to respond to its brakes. It doesn't take three guesses to figure who would suffer the most in a pedestrian-automobile collision.

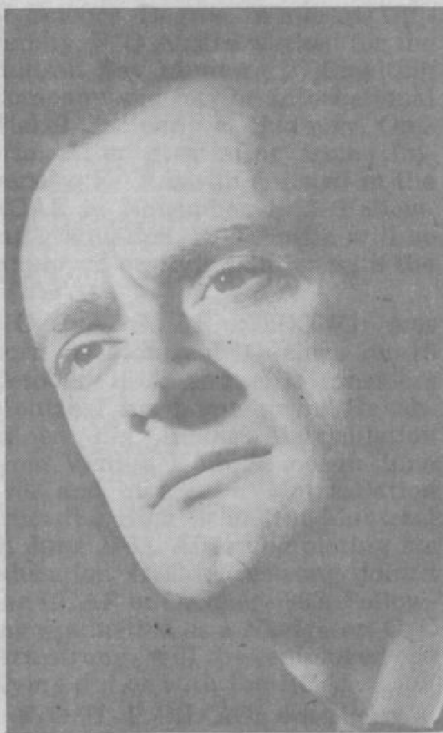
Also playing dual roles will be Keith Mills, Ken Carpenter and John Hogarth. John Buchanan plays the innkeeper.

33 MILITARY OFFICIALS TO TOUR B.C.

VICTORIA — They are all students at the National Defence College at Kingston, Ont. The visit is part of a familiarization tour for defence college students of military and industrial establishments in Canada and the U.S. Heading the group will be Major General C. B. Ware, commandant of the defence college. Other students represent the three Canadian armed forces, Royal Navy, Royal Air Force, United States navy, army and air force, 10 Canadian government departments and the British foreign office.

RCAF ARGUS DETACHMENT ARRIVES IN PUERTO RICO

HALIFAX CP — The Royal Canadian Navy said yesterday the second detachment of RCAF Argus anti-submarine aircraft has arrived in Puerto Rico for participation in exercise "Maple Spring." The four aircraft forming the detachment are from 415 Squadron based at Summerside, P.E.I., with about 200 RCAF air and ground crew personnel. They replaced three Argus aircraft which formed the first detachment and returned to Summerside. Commodore J. C. O'Brien, senior Canadian officer afloat (Atlantic) and commander of Canadian forces participating in the exercises, described the exercise results to date as excellent.

PROVIDER'S PRECIOUS LOAD—BOOKS

HALIFAX — The navy's fleet replenishment vessel Provider, will live up to her name when she leaves Halifax today with a precious cargo of 74 cartons of assorted books and school supplies for the children of Bridgetown, Barbados. These unusual provisions are the results of a collection campaign carried on by citizens of Annapolis, Kings and Digby Counties, after listening to an urgent appeal for assistance by Wallace Barteaux, formerly a resident of Kentville,

and now professor at Erdiston Teacher's College in the Barbados capital. The next problem was transportation. For a while it looked as if the project must face defeat. Then the Navy came through with permission to utilize its "Grey Funnel Line" to promote the cause of education.

RCMP GET PAY INCREASES

OTTAWA (CP) — Pay raises of eight to nine per cent were announced recently for non-commissioned officers and constables in the RCMP.

The new maximum pay ranges from \$4,180 annually for a third-class constable to \$8,045 for corps sergeant-major. The former range was \$3,760 to \$7,365.

The general increase is retroactive to April 1, 1964, and affects about 95 per cent of the 7,000-odd members of the force.

Not affected are about 170 commissioned officers, special constables and civilian employees.

Third-class constables will be paid \$4,180 a year, increased from \$3,760. Second-class constables will receive \$4,380, instead of \$3,960.

New rates for constables, with old rates in brackets, are: first year \$4,580 (\$4,160), second year \$4,780 (\$4,360), third year \$5,000 (\$4,560), fourth year \$5,240 (\$4,760), fifth year \$5,540 (\$5,060).

Discretionary constables will receive \$5,660 instead of \$5,180.

Corporals in their first year will receive \$6,050 instead of \$5,530, and in the second year \$6,235 instead of \$5,715.

Sergeants will receive \$6,645 instead of \$6,065 the first year. In the second year they will get \$7,015, increased from \$6,435.

Staff sergeants, first year, will receive \$7,270 and in the second year \$7,570. They received \$6,690 in both years under the old pay scale.

Staff sergeant-majors will receive \$7,860 instead of \$7,220.

MALAYSIA IS WARY ON SUKARNO MOVE

KUALA LUMPUR — ASKS CEASE FIRE AS PROOF OF INDONESIA'S PEACEFUL INTENT — A Government statement noted the "desire so piously expressed by President Sukarno" of Indonesia, who suggested yesterday that an African-Asian group or the United Nations investigate whether the North Borneo states of Sarawak and Sabah want to remain in Malaysia. The Malaysian statement said: "After experience of a series of abortive peace talks with Indonesia, Malaysia naturally would rather see a genuine demonstration of the professed desire rather than hear mere expressions of it."

U.S. GIVING SAIGON NEW MILITARY AID

SAIGON — INCREASE, FIRST IN A MONTH, WILL LET VIETNAM ENLARGE FORCES BY 100,000 MEN — Maxwell D. Taylor, the United States Ambassador, was understood to have informed the Government that Washington was ready to underwrite an increase of 100,000 men in the South Vietnamese armed forces, bringing their strength to 660,000. Ambassador Taylor has told Premier Tran Van Huong that the aid increase should be put into effect as soon as possible, now that Saigon has resolved the political crisis that arose from the military uprising of Dec. 20.
