Forces Receive New Heavy Duty Trucks



OTTAWA—Defence Minister James Richardson says the Canadian Forces have received the bulk of 489 new five-ton trucks ordered 16 months ago, and all should be in service by next spring.

They will strengthen the military's heavy-duty truck fleet and replace 128 well-worn veterans that are being retired from service, some more than 20 years old.

The American-built trucks were purchased last year from the U.S. army for \$27.3 million, including spares, tools and manuals. First deliveries began last month.

The truck is the heart of the Forces' surface cargo-moving system and is ideally suited to Canada's rugged terrain.

The trucks will soon be distributed to bases and stations across Canada, including Reserve units. More than 100 are destined for units on NATO duty in Europe.

The trucks are equipped with an economical but powerful Cummins diesel engine, power steering and five-speed manual transmission. Cross-country payload of the six-axled vehicles is five tons, but they can easily handle 10 tons on the highway.

Ninety-two of the trucks are being modified in Canada for special purposes: 46 will be fitted with rear-mounted cranes, 16 are being tailored for bridging work, and 30 have already been converted into low-bed trailers for hauling.

Forces 1976 Pay Package Delayed

The following message has been received from the Chief of the Defence Staff. . .

Ottawa - "In past years the annual pay raise for most members of the Regular and Reserve Forces was announced in late September in advance of the 1 October effective date.

This year for the first time it is necessary that the proposed pay increase be approved by Anti-inflation board as well as the Treasury Board. Because of the new constraints guidelines and

regulations imposed by the Anti-Inflation Board we must know the movement of Consumer Price Index (CPI) from October, 1975 to the end of September, 1976 (12 months) as this index is one of the factors considered by the Anti-Inflation Board as part of the pay adjustment methodology. The 1976 consumer price index will not be available prior to 7 October, 1976.

Canada Trains Portuguese Troops At Lahr

OTTAWA—Defence Minister James Richardson announced that a memorandum of understanding has been signed in Brussels, by the Canadian and Portuguese Ambassadors to NATO, which makes provision for the training of small groups of Portuguese Military personnel with Canadas NATO Brigade Group in Lahr, West Germany.

This agreement follows negotiation between representatives of Portugal, Canada and the Federal Republic of Germany. Canada thereby joins other NATO Nations in helping Portugal to assume a more active military role in the alliance.

The first group joined 4 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group in Lahr, Germany, on September 26 to observe and start training.

Mr. Richardson, in expressing Canada's willingness to provide this training to one of our NATO Allies, emphasizing that the program envisaged is not large, but, will include training of similar groups from time to time as opportunities present themselves.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

In Praise Of The Ex-Servicemen

So! You're going to retire? No, bad opening - try again. Civvy Street, here I come! Yes, much better.

Why does a man retiring from military service present a picture in his own mind of a beggar with hat in hand saying, "Please, Mister, have you got a place for me, a spot where you can fit me in? Bull - the serviceman retiring today has so much to offer that he is completely misinformed if he believes people are going out of their way when they hire him.

NO ONE, least of all the skinflint owner of a business, or his representative, is going to hire anyone unless he expects to make a dollar out of him; and, boy, can they make money out of a man who is skilled in his field, trained to accept discipline, and oriented to self supervision - as any good military man is!

I'm not knocking the philosophy of life in Canada's society - I haven't the training nor the background knowledge to judge in an unprejudiced manner. All I can do is give my opinion and here it is.

A man TRAINED by the Armed Forces in the 50s is not the same type of person who is nowadays, "educated to achieve", or, "brought to self-awareness".

I retired from the Armed Forces in 1974 and was LOST! "What can I prove in civvy Street," I asked myself? "What do I know that they don't know better than I do?" was another question. Christ, I couldn't even make mini-warrant. Hell, I didn't even make sergeant. To make myself believe I was worthwhile, I earned a federal government ticket in my trade. I can now go into the world and say I am qualified in my trade. WOWEE!

But, you know what? That was simply an opener. My military experience is what has made me Plant Superintendent of Aero Tech Corporation.

No, my ticket doesn't hurt, but it wasn't what got me promoted to my present level. I was promoted because of my experience, then a willingness to take the responsibility to make a decision, and above all, a willingness to work without supervision.

As a result of my good military training, my boss trusts me because I am used to putting my name and signature to any work I do.

I have a thorough knowledge of my job. That's something I picked up while going on a various courses in the Armed Forces and by being placed in such a great variety of jobs while "doing my time" in the military service. As a matter of fact, it is because I had so very many versions of my job already behind me that I can now supervise with more ability than the poor civvy who worked his way into a similar position through tact, hard work, and a nice personality!

The serviceman is well trained at great expense to the taxpayer - okay, stop jeering. I don't have the figures to prove it, but I do know from two years experience as Plant Superintendent when I hire an untrained man off the street, as compared to a kid with even only one year of technical school, I'm being foolish. I am now in a position where I do the hiring and firing, and I have to be able to justify my decisions to the boss - and the Labour Board.

I have to closely supervise every man who is not previously trained. This costs money since close supervision keeps me away from other work that needs to be done. Then by the time I have taught him to do a reasonably passable job I find that the others have not been as diligent as they might have been, and I must go over their work to ensure it will be passed by Quality control. Wouldn't it be easier and cheaper for me to hire a man TRAINED in the military to accept responsibility, and who has more knowledge the employment services?

Definitely! That's why half my staff has previous military experience, and if I could have sufficient control of who remains in my employ, all my personnel would have at least 10 years of a military background.

Why then should a ex-military man with many months of formal courses and many years of practical experience behind him believe that

Royal Canadian Legion Conducts 'Operation Service'

If you are a Canadian veteran or veteran's dependent, you may be eligible for a war service pension or allowance you didn't know about.

The Royal Canadian Legion says that, although it is 31 years since the end of World War II, there are thousands of veterans and their dependents who are not receiving a benefit or service they are entitled to - either because they did not know about it or because the eligibility rules have been changed.

During October and early November the Legion's 464,000 members are conducting "Operation Service" - a massive, house-to-house canvass across Canada to alert 1,245,000 ex-service people and their dependents to their rights and privileges under the Veterans Charter. Ex-service people who are not reached in this way are invited to get in touch with their nearest Legion branch for information about Operation Service.

Ten Straight Answers To Ten Common Questions

WHAT IS THE UNITED WAY?

First of all, what the United Way is not: it is not just a fund raising body; it is not just a service agency. The United Way is not an end, but a means.

Directed by a volunteer board representing all sectors of the community and staffed by a small core of administrative personnel, the United Way raises funds through one large, low-cost campaign, and then ensures the efficient use of donated funds through volunteer citizen review of allocations.

The United Way is, most simply, citizens working to ensure that community needs are met.

WHY DOESN'T THE GOVERNMENT PROVIDE THE NECESSARY SUPPORT FOR THESE AGENCIES?

Most of the United Way agencies do receive partial support from one or more levels of government. However, no government has sufficient resources to meet completely and quickly all community needs. Also important is the sense of direct individual responsibility for other members of the community that comes through United Way involvement.

HOW DO AGENCIES QUALIFY FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE UNITED WAY?

It should be a non-profit organization offering services that meet a genuine social need in the community. Management must be vested in a board of volunteers which effectively assumes responsibility and accountability to the public for administration of the agency's program. Of course, other qualifications are necessary.

WHO DECIDES WHERE THE MONEY GOES?

The Agency Relations Committee of the United Way, a committee made up of 80 concerned volunteer citizens, each spring studies the budgets and programs submitted by participating agencies, and makes

Between now and the end of October, canvassers will be inviting all Base personnel to donate to the United Way. This year's chairman for CFB Winnipeg is LT. Graham Keene who will be assisted by a co-ordinator representing each section on the base. These people and many others will be devoting much of their own time to make this campaign a success. They are well informed people who are only too happy to answer any questions that you may have.

In order to keep you the donors informed of where and how funds are utilized, the United Way has published two very informative pamphlets that will be distributed to you by your section representative. "Facts about the United Way" gives a brief outline of the organization and how funds are allocated and "Everything you wanted to know about us, but were afraid to ask" is a series of often asked questions with answers.

The United Way is NOT beyond criticism. It is run by humans and is subject to shortcomings just as any other organization. If you have any questions or statements concerning the United Way that you wish to have publically answered or clarified, please address them to LT. Keene ARTTU in writing, one week prior to publishing date of the VOXAIR.

The United Way goal set for Winnipeg is 4,109,645 dollars which is 6% more than was raised last year, which of course simply takes into account the increase in the cost of living over the last fiscal year.

The goal for CFB Winnipeg this year is 14,500 dollars. It is hoped that a great deal more will be collected and that participation will be at least as good as that of our civilian counterparts in Winnipeg.

recommendations to the Board of Trustees of the United Way, also composed of representative volunteers. Allocations are made on the basis of committee judgements - as to program and financial priorities.

WHAT IF I DON'T LIKE A PARTICULAR AGENCY?

With 60 agencies involved, it's natural that people know more about some than others. Remember that every United Way service fills a specific need or it wouldn't be included in the United Way. The Agency Relations Committee makes certain that every agency is doing an essential job capably.

WHY ARE THERE CAMPAIGNS OUTSIDE THE UNITED WAY?

Some agencies do not qualify for membership in the United Way. Others, who consider their services to be particularly important to the city, or who are affiliated with national research-oriented organizations, may wish to raise as much money as possible without the program and financial scrutiny that United Way agencies agree to.

WHY DO YOU ASK FOR A PLEDGE RATHER THAN A CASH DONATION?

Pledges make it possible for you to easily manage your financial contribution. For example, someone who does not feel able to give a \$24.00 cash donation when approached, may be glad to help by pledging \$2.00 of his/her monthly pay cheque.

WHY SHOULD WORKING WIVES CONTRIBUTE SEPARATELY FROM THEIR HUSBANDS?

The traditional United Way approach is based on giving what you feel you can afford according to your personal income and responsibilities. Usually, a family that has two incomes will feel able to make two donations.

WHAT DOES IT COST TO RAISE THE FUNDS?

United Way total costs (administration and campaign) are 8.7% of receipts, the second lowest in Canada. Campaign costs of smaller, one-cause fund drives range from 15 to 50%.

DOES LABOUR SUPPORT THE UNITED WAY?

Labour, like other sectors of the community, is active in support of the United Way, through donations and volunteer work. The Winnipeg Labour Council was, in fact, instrumental in the formation of the United Way in 1965. The Winnipeg Labour Council officially endorses the United Way. It encourages voluntary giving payroll deduction and recommends that all affiliated unions encourage their membership to support the United Way.

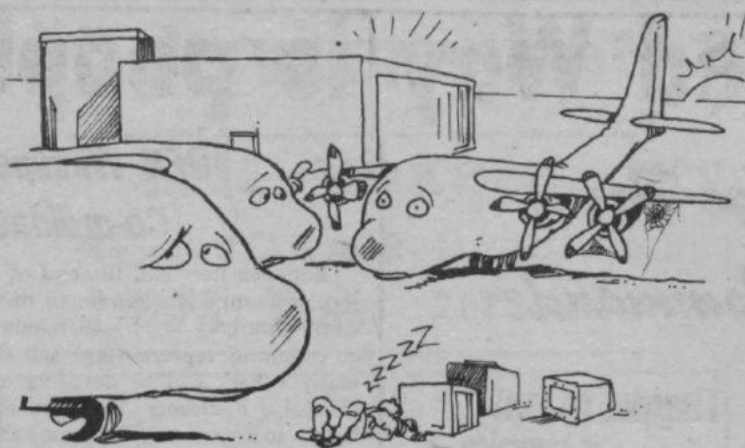

MAMS people will refuse to accept it and rightly so. I don't want an air incident raised against me or my crew. It's a lot of bloody paper-work to go through."

"I assume that MOV TRENTON has issued instructions and guidance to all concerned. That's their job, not mine."

"While we're on the subject of dangerous cargo, sir, I trust that the paratroops have been clearly briefed that their weapons are to be unloaded and their magazines secured in their little pockets and pouches?"

"Indeed they have. Questions Alpha Two?"

General Lett Takes Up NORAD Appointment



OTTAWA - Defence minister James Richardson announced the promotion of Brigadier-General K. C. Lett, 53, of Carp, Ont., to the rank of major-general.

Now serving as deputy chief of staff for operations at the 4th Allied Tactical Air Force Headquarters in Ramstein, Germany, he will take up a new appointment in October as deputy chief of staff for operations at the Headquarters of the North American Air Defence (NORAD) Command in Colorado Springs, Colo.

General Lett joined the RCAF in 1941, and flew Spitfires on fighter operations in England with 402 (City of Winnipeg) Squadron. He was released in September, 1945, and returned to civilian life.

He re-joined the RCAF in 1948, and, after various flying duties in Canada, served with Canada's NATO air division in Germany and France.

He attended RCAF Staff College in Toronto in 1959, and a year later was named Officer Commanding No. 6 Strike Reconnaissance training unit at Cold Lake, Alta.

In 1964 he returned to Germany as Chief Operations Officer at 3 Fighter Wing, Zweibrücken, and then was moved to 1 Air Division Headquarters in Metz, France.

He was promoted to Group Captain in September, 1966, and appointed Commander of CFB Comox. In 1969 he attended the National Defence College, Kingston, Ont., and then was posted to 24 NORAD Region, Great Falls, Mont., as Director of Exercise and Evaluation.

He was promoted to Brigadier-General in July, 1972, and appointed Chief of Staff, Training, at Training Command Headquarters Winnipeg. He returned to Germany in 1974 to assume his present position.

MOVIE REVIEW

"THE SEA WINS"

There are three stories in THE SAILOR WHO FELL FROM GRACE WITH THE SEA, the British-made film by director Lewis John Carlino: there is the story of the Widow, the story of the Widow's Son, and the story of the Sailor. These are not, of course, three independent stories only loosely connected; rather they are personal stories that are very much interwoven because the lives of the people are very much mutually involved.

Out of this comes the complexity, the fascination, the mystery, the suspense which characterizes this very fine cinema entertainment. For us whose regular diet is film-fare from the U.S. of A., this film awakens our taste for a kind of cinema which only the British can make. The fact that we now seldom have British films to savour, makes this film all the more delightful.

Who can handle the sea in film like the British! it has mystery and beauty; it is at once a lover and a threat. Who can handle children in film like the British! more than precocious, the children have a life and dimension all their own, independent of adults. Who can make even a simple story complex and gripping, like the British! not everything is said clearly and openly within the first ten minutes of the film; rather the story is mysteriously revealed to us only slowly and with great restraint.

Director Carlino has made a film exquisitely beautiful in its visuals and sound. Restraint marks the precise camera work, the soft lighting, the unobtrusive editing and the subtle sound. Yet, in all of this, he has introduced enough of a climate of "something" impending, that we cannot completely settle in comfortably. Nor does he give away clues too flippantly throughout the film. We are kept enjoying, yet wondering; happy, yet fearful.

THE SAILOR WHO FELL FROM GRACE WITH THE SEA could be called a love story, for it deals with the relationship of a young and beautiful love-starved Widow and the handsome and rugged Sailor she meets accidentally. His first love has been the Sea, but the newly found love will interrupt this; hence, some of the meaning in the title. But there is more.

The relationship of the Widow and the Sailor, and that of the Sailor and the Sea are made more complex by the relationship of the Widow's Son with each of them, namely the Widow, the Sailor and the Sea. The film turns from love story to thriller as it draws to its abrupt ending. This ending will disturb the audience, no doubt. (A very vocal audience will even exclaim and protest loudly at the ending.)

Sarah Miles, an excellent actress, portrays with passion, the beautiful even voluptuous Widow caught in the small and rugged sea-coast village. Kris Kristofferson plays the American Sailor, by chance come into this little private world. Unfortunately his acting is not very good, and beside the other talented performers he limps in the role. Yet he looks the part, and so his physical attributes gloss over the other inadequacies.

There is an interestingly universal dimension to this film in that it is not clearly locked into time and geography; though it is obviously England and today, it could be anywhere and anytime. This very technique helps add dimension to this story of three people, some place, some time, and the Sea. (The film is currently showing at Garrick One in downtown Winnipeg.)

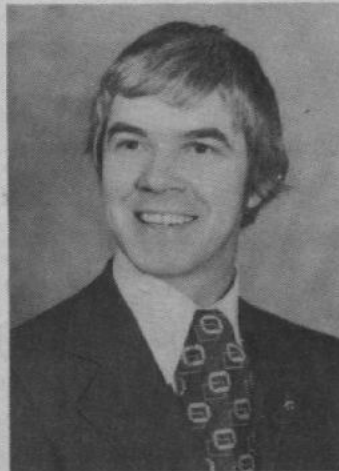

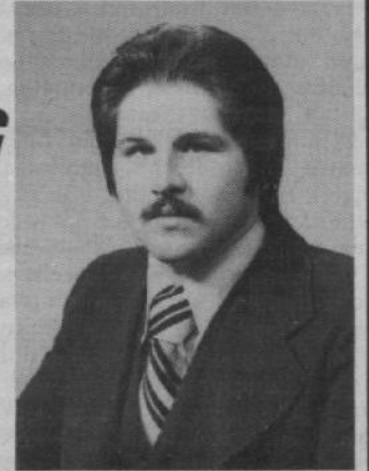

REHRUCKEN AND SAUERBRATEN

If travel 'broadens', travel to West Germany not only tends to expand one's global outlook, but also one's waistline. It's done with style, however, and the memories certainly make up for the unpleasant prospect of contemplating a diet again.

The West Germans don't believe in just three meals a day — they have at least four: breakfast, dinner, afternoon coffee (with cakes and torten and biscuits and whipping cream etc) and supper (often a cold meal, served with a nice cool beer, of course).

The mid-day dinner is the main meal of the day, after which it is customary to sleep for an hour or two. This, of course, aids the putting-on-weight process, not to mention the wines that go with any good dinner.

German restaurants take great trouble with their meals — preparation, service and atmosphere alike. No crowding of tables, no dingy, stingy lighting, no paper napkins or disposable dishes, no frozen butter or stale bread (as mentioned in a recent list of complaints about Winnipeg restaurants in a Free Press column).

We had a leisurely dinner in a village restaurant with friends on one occasion. We had phoned ahead of time to make sure they had venison (Rehrücken), for which this place is well-known, and this turned out to be one of the memorable meals we had on this holiday. The proprietress herself served us — a hefty woman whose presence and appearance helped to create just the right atmosphere. After a delicious soup, we were treated to fresh, delicately cooked vegetables, most likely grown in the restaurant's own garden, and around the roast, baked bananas, stewed pears with cranberries — lusciously arranged like a glossy picture in a Women's magazine cooking section. The platters and bowls laden with this hot, appetizing food were brought in and placed on a side table, and from there the cheerful, apple-cheeked, white-aproned lady served each of us. None of those impersonal pre-measured portions, but individual servings to each person's liking and capacity. After a while, she would come back to fill our plates again and to replenish our wine glasses.

What surprised us was that dining out is not as expensive as we had expected. After all, Europeans groan about inflation just as much as we do in Canada. Yet we once paid 38 dollars for a dinner for five, including wine, beer, etc (German dining restaurants don't offer cocktails before dinner, as a rule). Some of us had Irish Coffee afterwards. The portions are all too generous — no wonder people gain weight on those European holidays. You hate to leave anything on your plate, which is not considered polite to do, and they apparently haven't heard of doggie bags.

When we went out for our big reunion dinner — again in a small-town restaurant — the young owner went all out to give us a regal reception. Candles and the best table linens were laid out on a huge table. The menu read like an encyclopedia of gourmet dishes, and in addition, the proprietor informed us that he happened to have some nice pieces of game, in case anyone were interested. I asked him suspiciously if it was frozen and would be chased through the micro-wave oven. He looked quite offended and assured me that everything was fresh and would be cooked properly. It would take time, but it would be good. And so it was. Of the eleven people in our group, almost everyone ordered something different: Snails, Wiener Schnitzel, Trout Blue, Sauerbraten, Ragoût Fin, Filet of Venison, Leg of Hare in Sour Cream, and so on. It did take a good while, but everything was cooked and timed to perfection. When the waiter brought the wine, he announced that its temperature was fifteen degrees and asked if that was all right before he proceeded to let us taste it. Later they soaked the wine labels off the bottles and presented them to us as souvenirs of the occasion.

Admittedly, this was a special occasion, and you probably won't get such red-carpet treatment as a stranger in a big-city restaurant, but in most places — city, town or village — you do get excellent service and delicious food and drink. They don't need the gimmicks and frills that some North American restaurants seem to find necessary to attract customers: the Europeans have the advantage of a built-in authenticity. They simply attend to their job of cooking and serving good food.

The eleven pounds I gained were worth it.

THE SUN COLLECTION BY BARRY SWEENEY
 RCA Records recently released an album titled "The Sun Collection" (KPM 1-0153) a collection of material cut by Elvis Presley for the Sun record label in the mid-fifties.

Presley, on the strength of the material and early releases on Sun, went over to RCA when they purchased his contract for the unheard of price of \$35,000. That figure, of course, is a few million dollars away from the astronomical contracts signed by today's rock artists, but in the mid-fifties a contract of that size, for a virtually unknown artist, was to say the very least, an unheard of amount to pay.

THE SUN SESSIONS

Legend has it that Elvis went into the Sun studios, paid for his own session and cut a song for his mother's birthday, "That's All Right, Mama". In actual fact, the first songs put on wax by Presley were "My Happiness" and "That's When Your Heartaches Begin" which were the songs given to his mother for a birthday present.

The first songs were cut in 1953 and in January '54, Elvis returned to cut a couple of tunes, this time "Casual Love" and "I'll Never Stand In Your Way" with both tunes being cut in less than half an hour. About eight months later Phillips called Presley and a disastrous session proved that "Without You" and "Rag Mop" were not the songs that would propel the soon-to-be-star to stardom.

The next step was to arrange a meeting between Elvis and a guitar picker, Scotty Moore. After a couple hours of trying to get a couple of songs to sound right, Scotty's neighbor, Bill Black, dropped into the house, figured the kid (Elvis) did not impress him and left. The following day, Presley was back in the Sun studios to cut more songs. It actually took quite a while to get the sound right, the delivery correct and match the song with the singer, but they were on the right track.

THAT'S ALL RIGHT, MAMA

During a break in the sessions, Presley jumped up, grabbed the mike and started to sing, Bill Black started to play bass and Scotty Moore laid down some guitar licks and before you knew it, "That's All Right, Mama" was on tape. Looking for something to back the song with, they decided on Bill Moore's "Blue Moon Of Kentucky". After airplay, the phones lit up and the record went on to sell somewhere around 20,000 copies, a far cry from what was to come.

The unfortunate part of the record is that it would take a book to tell the whole story. The early songs, like: "Good Rockin' Tonight", "Milkcow Blues Boogie" and "Mystery Train" were recorded and when performed in public, the teen-agers became hysterical, it was the beginning of the music form that would be known as rock'n'roll, and it was the beginning of music's regal legend Elvis Presley.

The "Sun Collection" is an uncluttered, true sound of what it was all about. RCA kept the album mono and it's better that way, it is not electronically reprocessed for stereo, which would only kill the true sounds. The set should become a collector's item and it's well worth the bucks. Other songs in the set, include: "Just Because", "Trying To Get To You", "Baby, Let's Play House" and "Just Because".

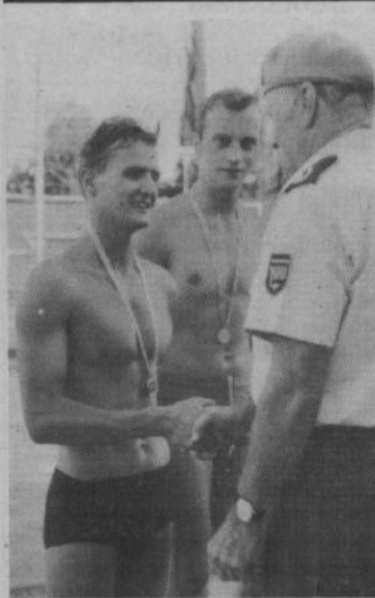
Mr. McKinnon was in Cyprus from 24 August to 29 August.

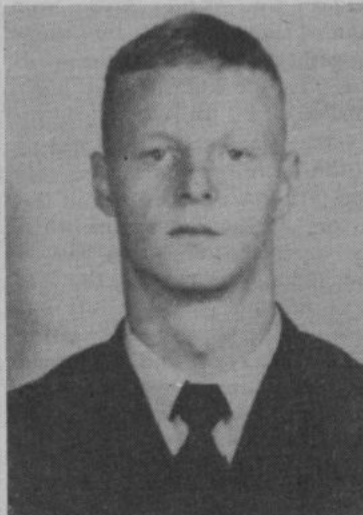

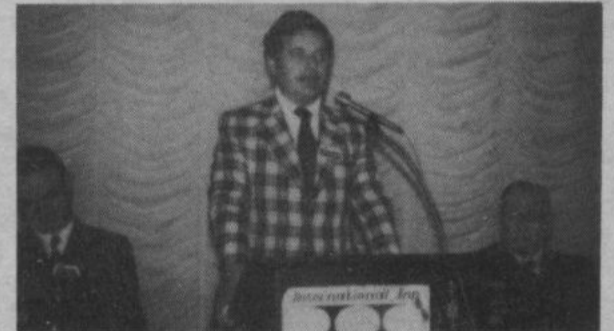

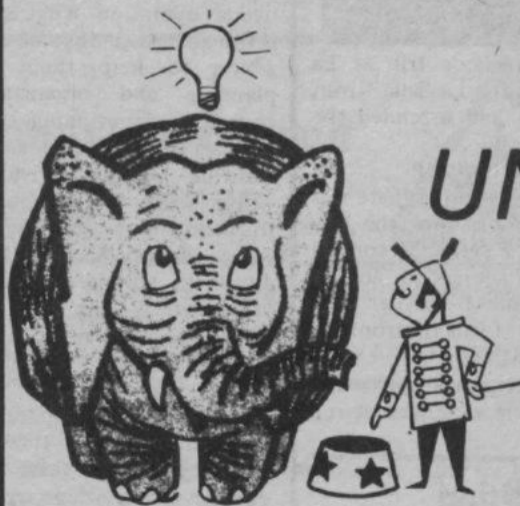

Air Command New Chiefs of Staff Appointed

Chief of Staff Operations Brigadier-General R. R. Barber, CD

Brigadier-General R. Russel Barber was born in Brandon, Manitoba, in 1926 and completed schooling in Maryfield, Saskatchewan.

General Barber enrolled in the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1943, and was trained as an air gunner. He returned from overseas and was released from the RCAF in September 1945. He re-enrolled in May 1946 to train as a Radar Technician at Clinton, Ontario and in October of the same year he transferred to the Regular Force. The following year he graduated as a Radio Navigator.

Following tours of duty as Radio Navigator with 414 and 435 Squadrons at RCAF Stations Rockcliffe and Edmonton, in June 1952 he was appointed Navigation Leader at No. 4 Transport Operational Training Unit at RCAF Station Lachine, Quebec; two years later he was named Deputy Staff Officer, Navigation and Radio Officer Training at Headquarters RCAF Training Command, Trenton, Ontario.

In September 1956 he was appointed Department Head, Electronics Department, Central Navigation School, RCAF Station Winnipeg, Man. In 1959 he was appointed Navigation and Electronics Instructor with the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado. Returning to Canada he became Staff Officer Radio and Navigation Officer Training at Headquarters Air Transport Command, Trenton, Ont.

In 1963 he attended the RCAF Staff College in Toronto after which he became a member of the directing staff at the RCAF Staff School in Toronto. This tour was followed by three years as Commanding Officer of Canadian Forces Station, Alsask, Sask., after which he became Senior Staff Officer Plans and Requirements at Headquarters Air Defence Command, North Bay, Ontario.

On promotion to Colonel he was posted to National Defence Headquarters as Director of Air Plans and remained at this post prior to being named Base Commander, Canadian Forces Base Toronto in February 1975.

Colonel Barber was promoted to the rank of Brigadier-General 15 July 1976 and appointed Chief of Staff Operations at Air Command Headquarters in Winnipeg, 26 July 1976.

Brigadier-General Barber is the son of Mrs. W. C. Barber of Maryfield, Sask. and is married to the former Shirley Bearance of Welwyn, Sask.

Chief of Staff Support Brigadier-General P. Maxwell, CD

OTTAWA — Defence minister James Richardson announced today that Colonel Patrick Maxwell, 48, of Viscount, Sask., will be promoted to the rank of Brigadier-General and appointed Chief of Staff, Support, for Air Command Headquarters, Winnipeg, in September.

He succeeds BGEN. James West, 52, of Vancouver, who becomes Director-General of Materiel, Administration and Programs at National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa.

In his last post General Maxwell was Director of the Canadian Forces Exchange System (CANEX), which retail outlets and other services for military personnel at bases and stations in Canada and overseas.

He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1949, after graduating from Royal Roads Military College, Victoria, B.C. For the next three years he held various positions as a supply officer and instructor.

In 1953 he was posted as senior supply officer to 2 Fighter Wing, Grostenquin, France, and 18 months later became Command Staff and Supply Officer at 1 Air Division Headquarters, Metz, France.

In June, 1956, he returned to Ottawa as section head, Jet Aircraft and Support Procurement Section, at Air Force Headquarters. In August, 1959, he began a year's study at RCAF staff college in Toronto. He was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in 1963.

In August, 1965, after holding a series of appointments in Ottawa, he was appointed Commanding Officer of 1 RCAF Requirements Units, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

He was promoted to the rank of Colonel in August, 1967, and in September began a year's study

at National Defence College, in Kingston. A year later he was seconded to the Treasury Board in Ottawa as a materiel management advisor.

In June, 1970, he was appointed Commanding Officer of the Canadian Forces Supply Depot in Montreal.

In June, 1975, following a series of staff appointments in Ottawa, he became director of CANEX.

General Maxwell is married to the former Barbara Meagher of Ottawa.

Fire Prevention Week: October 3-9

Home Sweet Home? Not Always

More than 700 Canadians will die from fire in 1976 and 9 out of 10 of these will be the result of fires in the home. So says Major Bill MacDonald, President of the Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs and a senior executive in the fire fighting services at the Department of National Defence, Ottawa.

His estimate may be conservative. The latest available figures point up a 5 year average of 770 fire deaths, with 1974 reaching an all time high when the death toll was 920.

Major MacDonald goes on to say, "There will be more than 70,000 fires in 1976 and about 68% of these will occur in somebody's home. The chances are your family will experience one serious fire in this generation. It is high time we woke up to reality. The residential inferno is the most terrifying."

The figures are alarming but the public goes on its merry way.

The kitchen is by far the most dangerous area, but the incidence of fire in bedrooms and basements or lockers is very high. Most are caused by carelessness or lack of knowledge as to proper fire prevention procedures.

Dwelling occupants can increase their chances of fire safety by learning good, common sense fire prevention habits and of life expectancy by knowing in advance the procedures to follow in case of fire. Fire departments are anxious to advise their citizens on both points and in many, many communities home inspections are available for the asking, without any obligation. Just a telephone call will start the ball rolling and you'll get professional advice free.

A very forward step in home safety is a complete sprinkler system in all areas, plus a smoke detector for early warning, in the hallway outside sleeping areas. The installation charges are comparatively nominal, estimated on a square footage basis at about one third the cost of wall to wall carpeting. The rewards in family safety can be great.

Fire strikes fast and the first few minutes, even seconds are so very important. That is when the action starts and is another reason for stressing the in home use of Smoke Detectors, to give you and your family that early warning, to save you those first few precious minutes that may save your lives.

Imagine you have just discovered a fire in your house quickly, do you know what to do ?

Home Sweet Home... FIRE PREVENTION IS OUR BUSINESS

The saving of lives is the first concern of fire fighters, hence the heavy emphasis placed on escape plans, fire warning devices, etc. But fire prevention programs are essentially set up to do what the name implies, minimize fire hazards by teaching good fire safety practices and building a much broader awareness as to the perils of fire. The aim is to help people help themselves but there is a real public responsibility involved. The fire services can help make your home a safer place but only you can keep it safe.

A Few Safety Hints

1. Know how to escape "Blind" from every room. Black smoke can mask exits and toxic gasses confuse your thinking. Have regular escape drills. PLAN TO LIVE.
2. Make a map of your house or dwelling, showing emergency escape plans. Make sure your family, baby sitter and even overnight guests are familiar with it. Note... Put emphasis on BABY SITTERS. Remember, they're not as familiar with the surroundings as you are.
3. Never underestimate fire or allow it to come between you and escape. Fight only the smallest fires, after everyone is evacuated and the Fire Department has been notified.
4. "Products of combustion" (Smoke) Detectors should be considered in your Home safety plans. They are designed to give early warning. At the first signal of smoke or fire shout a warning to all the others.
5. In planning your escape, remember heat and gases push up, superheating stairways and halls. Never open a door without testing it first. If the top of the door or knob feels hot, the hall outside may be impassable.
6. Plan your escape possibilities well. Determine the best and quickest way to reach the ground and safety.
7. Make your escape plans now and practice them until they become second nature.

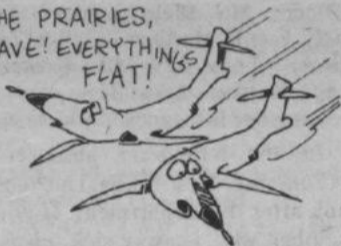
