CFB Winnipeg offers a challenge and opportunity in both work and play. Join in and make your stay rewarding and enjoyable.

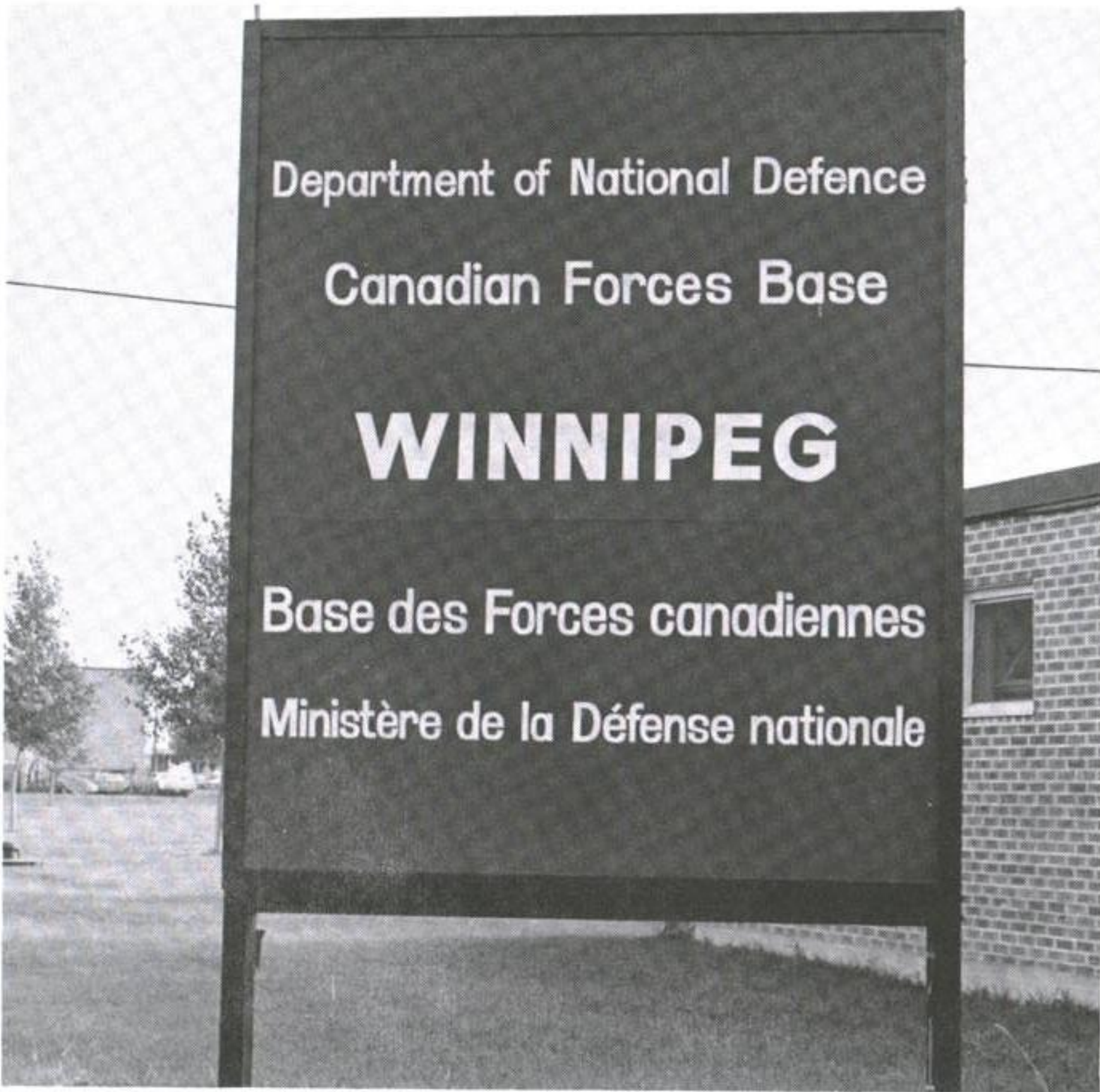

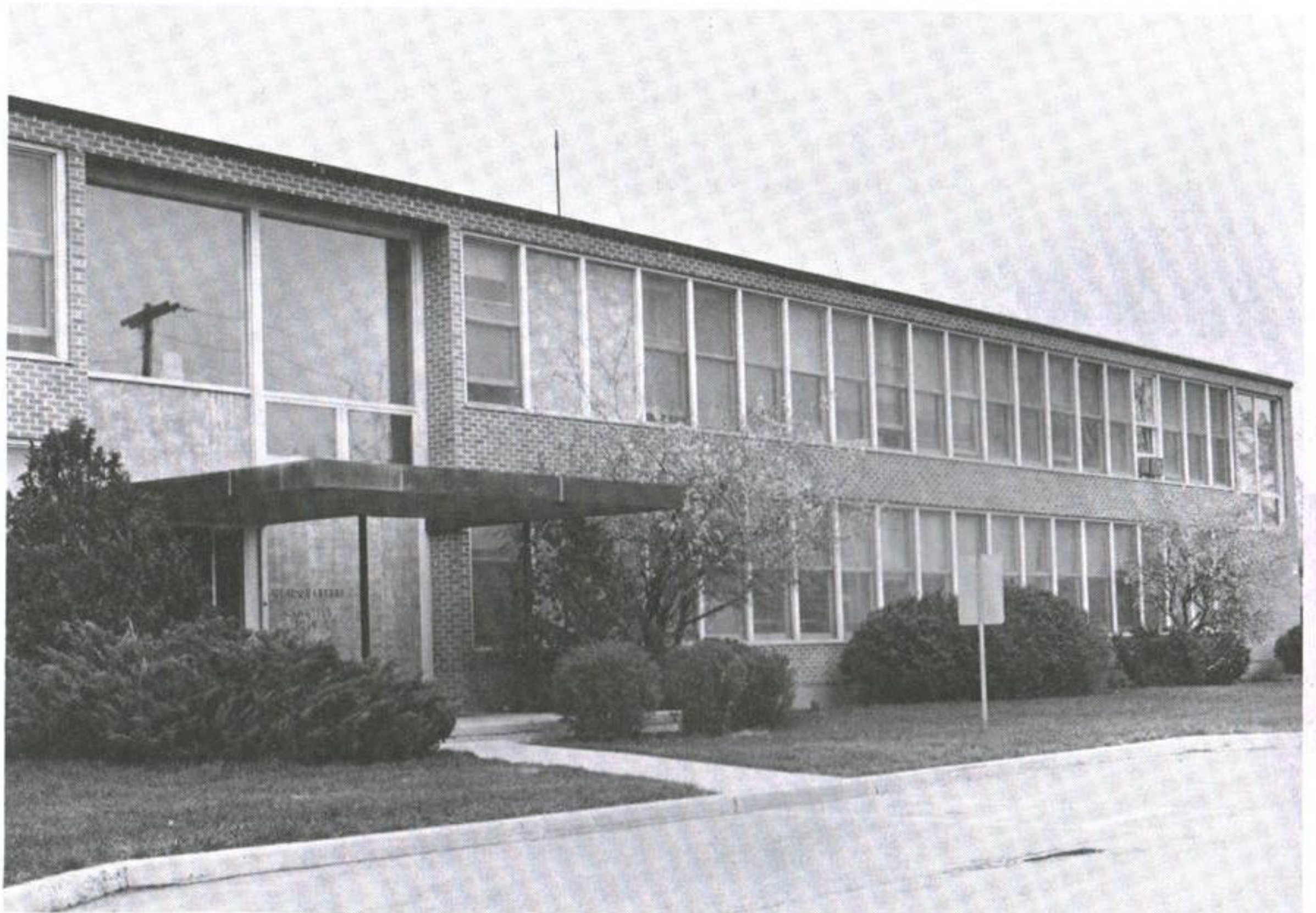

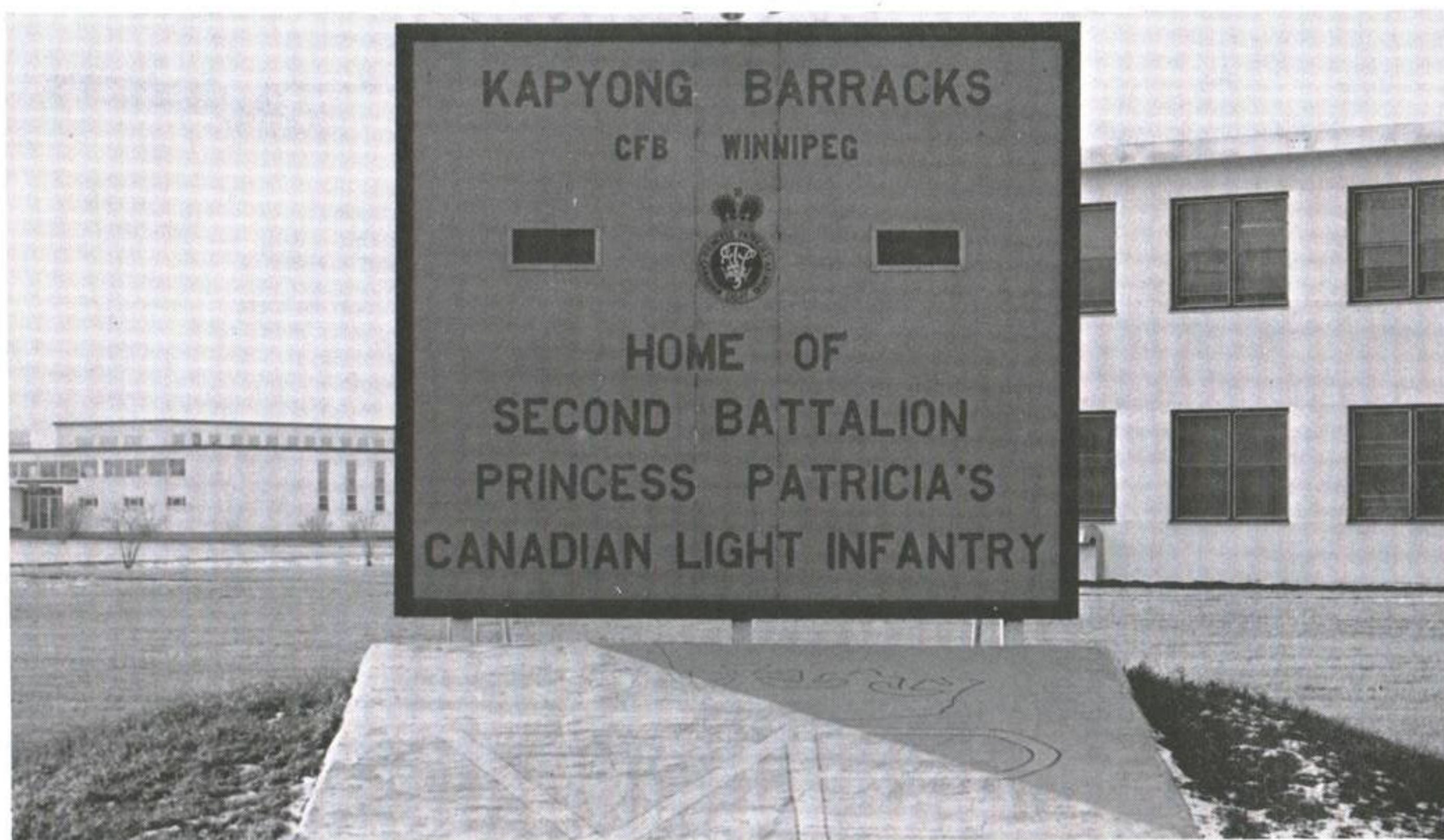
Entrance – North Site

CFB WINNIPEG'S HERITAGE

By way of background, you may wish to know that Canada's Armed Forces have a long and distinguished association with the Province of Manitoba and the City of Winnipeg.

On Land

Beginning with the British Regulars who were sent here to defend the trading posts of the Hudson's Bay Company, Winnipeg has long been identified with some of Canada's finest fighting regiments.

The 90th Rifle Battalion of Winnipeg was formed in 1883 and participated in the North West Rebellion against Louis Riel. It was subsequently renamed the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, gaining much fame as the "Little Black Devils".

Other notable regiments originating from Winnipeg and making their mark in two world wars are the Fort Garry Horse, the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, and the Winnipeg Grenadiers. On a per capita basis, Winnipeg soldiers won more Victoria Crosses during World War I than did those of any other city in Canada — three of them on one street alone.



On Sea

HMCS Chippawa, Winnipeg's dry frigate, is a Reserve naval establishment. Located here since 1923, it has trained many officers and men for the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN). It was initially charged with Reserve assignments and the outbreak of hostilities led to an enormous expansion in its recruiting activities: in fact, ten per cent of all men and women who served in the RCN during World War II were recruited in Winnipeg. Today, HMCS Chippawa continues with naval Reserve and cadet indoctrination and training activities.

In The Air

Air Force units have been stationed in and around Winnipeg since 1922. During pre-war years, RCAF units in the area were engaged in aerial survey, forestry patrol, and air mail deliveries. During World War II, the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan made Winnipeg one of the major centres of the RCAF for elementary flying, observer and wireless training. In addition, Winnipeg was a wartime centre for supply and repair depots, and ferry and inspection units.

With the outbreak of the Korean War in 1950 and the introduction of NATO aircrew training, Winnipeg facilities were expanded and became the centre of Radio Navigator training. Today, the Air Navigation School is affectionately looked upon as the "font" of all Radio Navigator knowledge in the Canadian Armed Forces. Another bond was added to this association of the Air Force with Winnipeg when Air Command Headquarters was established in Winnipeg on 2 September, 1975.



CFB WINNIPEG TODAY

Following the unification of the Canadian Armed Forces, a trend developed towards Base consolidation. Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg, Manitoba, was formed in November 1966 to administer and support the many integral and lodger units in the Winnipeg area.

Now, CFB Winnipeg is one of the largest bases in Canada, and is situated at the hub of communication and transportation networks. The Base consists of two sites: the former RCAF Station Winnipeg on the International Airport is known as the North Site and the former Fort Osborne Barracks in the city of Winnipeg is called the South Site.

The primary role of the Base is to provide the accommodation, messing, administration, and technical and comptroller services required to support the Regular and Reserve formations and units lodged on or otherwise associated with the Base.

The Base provides support to nine integral and seventeen lodger units of the Regular Force. In addition, it is responsible for such services as pay, rations, and vehicle maintenance to some 280 units of the Regular Force, Militia, Reserve, and cadet organizations scattered over an area stretching from Thunder Bay to CFB Shilo, and from the 49th Parallel to Cape Christian in the Arctic.

INTEGRAL UNITS



Air Command Headquarters

On 2 September 1975, with the formation of Air Command, Air Command Headquarters was established in Winnipeg.

Under the Command of Lieutenant-General William K. Carr, Air Command will have control over air defence, air transport, and approximately thirty-eight bases and stations in all ten provinces, as well as four Northwest Territories sites of the Distant Early Warning (DEW) Line. Air Command exercises jurisdiction over air doctrine, flight safety, and common air policy matters, such as air training standards. It encompasses functions formerly performed by Air Defence and Air Transport Commands, and also conducts air training.

Air Command Headquarters which is located in bldg 2 on the north site, also assumes the regional responsibilities for Prairie Region.



Canadian Forces Air Navigation School

For over twenty years, Winnipeg has been the centre of navigation training in Canada. The Canadian Forces Air Navigation School continues in this central role by providing both basic and advanced training in disciplines related to air navigation. CFANS is comprised of three squadrons.

The Navigation Squadron provides basic navigation training to wings standard for ROTP summer students in phases programmed with their academic year and for OCTP candidates. Concurrently, commissioned officers are cross trained from radio officer status to the air navigator classification. In addition, the Navigation Squadron conducts navigation refresher courses for experienced personnel.

The Training Standards Squadron develops Course Training Standards and Course Training Plans, ensures that the training is implemented accordingly, and prepares

and maintains the student reference manuals. In addition, the Standards Squadron conducts the Navigation Instructors Course for new staff members and provides follow on monitoring to ensure that navigation instructing and training remains at a high standard.

The Aerospace Squadron conducts three Staff Air Navigator Courses and one Aerospace Systems Course a year. The Staff Air Navigator Course prepares selected navigators for staff, training and operational positions that require a background in modern avionics systems, an understanding of project and personnel management techniques, as well as operational experience. The year-long Aerospace Systems Course provides selected aircrew and technical officers with post graduate training to enable them to fill appointments associated with the formulation of operational requirements and with the analysis, evaluation, and acquisition of aero-space systems.



429 (Composite) Squadron

No. 16 Hangar on the west ramp of Stevenson Field, now known as the Winnipeg International Airport, is the home of 429 (Composite) Squadron. CFB Winnipeg stores, maintains and repairs the Hercules, Silver Star and Dakota Aircraft which are on squadron strength.

429 (Composite) Squadron has been tasked with the following roles:

- provide aircraft and crews as required by CFANS for navigation training;
- conduct the Instrument Check Pilots' Course;
- support Air Command air transport commitments as required by the Commander, Air Command;
- prepare and distribute instrument rating examinations for the Canadian Forces;
- develop and maintain the Manual of Instrument Flight Procedures;
- provide support for Search and Rescue operations;
- provide crews and aircraft for air cadet familiarization flying;
- provide crews and aircraft for staff navigator and staff pilot proficiency flying;
- VIP flying.

The major role of the Squadron remains, as ever, the flying of the triangular routes on navigation "details".



Canadian Forces School of Aeromedical Training

The Aero Medical Training Unit provides basic and refresher training for aircrew personnel in the physiological problems associated with high altitude and high-speed flight. Simulated ejections, high altitude ascents, explosive decompression, parachute descents, and water survival are all essential aspects of flight safety.



Air Command Band

Since its formation in 1947, the Air Command Band has attained a prominent position in musical circles.

The band was originally formed in Edmonton as the North West Air Command Band and has since gone through several name changes and moves. On 2 September, 1975 the band came under the auspices of the newly formed Air Command and bears that title today... Performing throughout Europe, Africa, and the United States at such celebrations as the Seattle World's Fair, the Band has served as a 'Canadian ambassador of goodwill'. During Centennial Year,

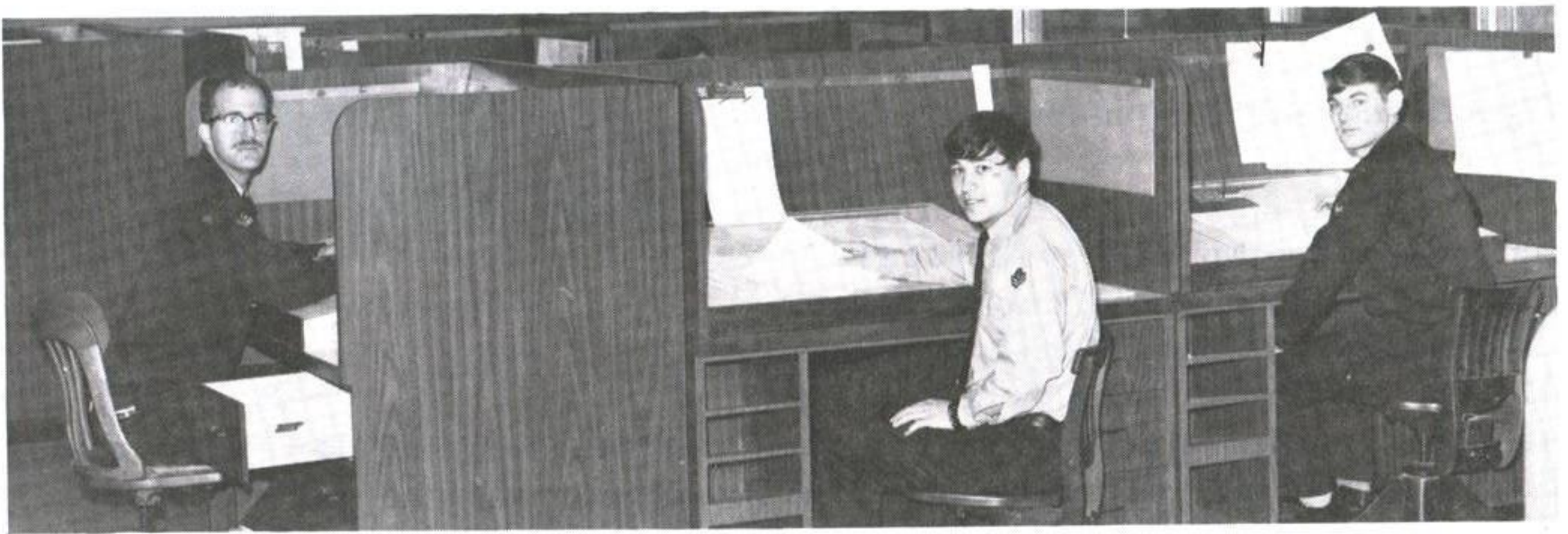
the Band participated in 147 performances of the Canadian Armed Forces Tattoo before an audience of more than a million. Today, the Air Command Band performs at a variety of functions ranging from state ceremonies to symphonic concerts and as dance and salon ensembles.



Canadian Forces School of Meteorology

The Canadian Forces School of Meteorology is a newcomer to CFB Winnipeg. A long time resident of CFB Trenton, the School moved to CFB Winnipeg on 1 Aug 74 and is located in Building 84.

The primary role of the School is to develop, conduct and validate Meteorological Technician Training. Technicians are trained to observe and record atmospheric phenomena, brief aircrew and provide meteorological advice to operational Commanders of land, sea and air elements.

In addition the School also provides:

- a. operational training for meteorologists;
- b. first line management training for meteorologist supervisors; and
- c. meteorological instructors to Air Traffic Control Company of CFSAOE Borden.

With a staff of four civilian meteorologists and nine CF technicians an average of 150 students are trained at the School each year.

Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry

Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry was formed in August, 1914 to serve in World War I. During that war, the Regiment fought in every major battle from the spring of 1915 to the armistice. Three members won Victoria Crosses.

After World War I, the Regiment became part of the regular army. At that time, it began its association with Winnipeg when Headquarters Coy and A Coy were stationed at Fort Osborne Barracks. The Regiment left Winnipeg in 1939 to serve in World War II and, during the next six years, it fought in Sicily, Italy and Holland.

When the Korean War broke out in 1950, a second battalion was added to the Regiment. This battalion won the United States Presidential Unit Citation for its gallant defence at Kapyong in April, 1951. It is the only Canadian Unit to be honoured with this award.

Transportation

Off Base

Transportation to and from airports and other points in the city will be by commercial transport for ranks below Colonel.

Transport for officers of Colonel rank and above will be provided. Prior notice is preferred.

On Base/Inter site

A base taxi service operates from the base dispatcher at local 208. This service provides three vehicles during normal work hours (0800-1600) to all points on the base, both north and south sites. Pick up may be arranged by calling dispatcher in advance.

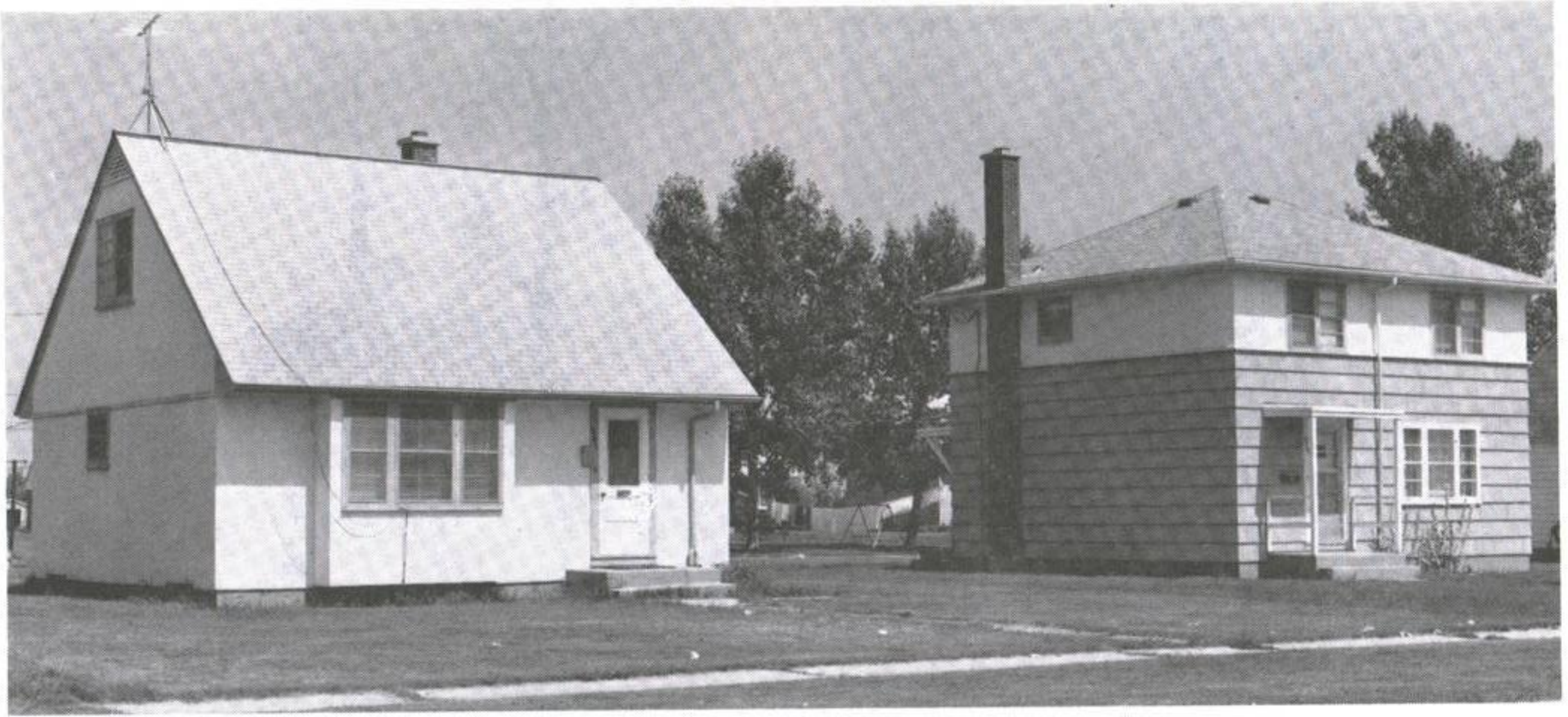
Direct telephone lines to taxis are available at the air movement section in 16 Hangar or call the dispatcher to arrange taxi service.

Accommodation

One of the first concerns upon reporting to CFB Winnipeg will be to find suitable accommodation. For single personnel, relatively new and modern barrack blocks are provided on both the North and South Sites. Of the approximately 2,300 families based at CFB Winnipeg, however, less than one half can be accommodated in married quarters; the remainder are required to find suitable off-base housing.

On the North Site, situated in three separate areas, there are 409 Bulk Lease Housing Units for all ranks up to Captain, 112 Multiple Dual Purpose Row Units for Sergeants and below, and 105 PMQs for WO and above. On the South Site, there are 362 PMQs for all ranks.

The Base Housing Officer, located in Building 86, administers the allocation of PMQs.



Permanent Married Quarters

There is no military trailer park for mobile homes in Winnipeg, but the Base Housing Officer has a list of all the civilian-operated trailer parks in the area.

Although Winnipeg is not considered a high-rent area, it will probably be found that housing rentals in Winnipeg are near those of other large Canadian cities. Cheaper rates can be found in areas removed from the Base.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Chapel Services

CFB Winnipeg has four chapels — a Protestant and a Roman Catholic Chapel at each site.

In addition to regular religious services, the chapels host Chapel Committees, Protestant Ladies Guilds, Catholic Women's Leagues, and regular Sunday School Classes.

A Nursery is available Sundays in the Protestant Chapels for the 1100 hours service only.

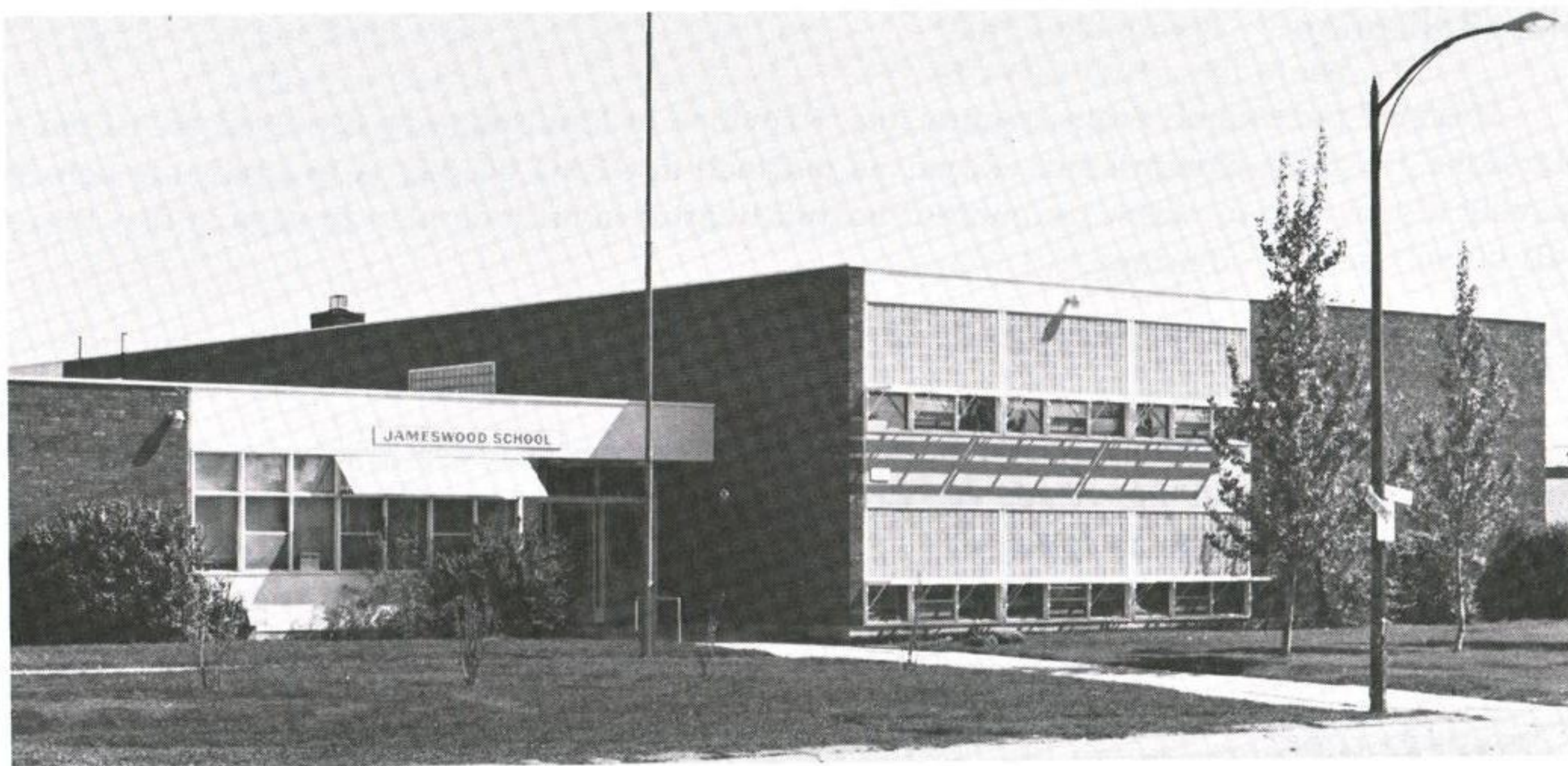

Public Schools

North Site. Dependents attend one of eight schools in the St. James school district. Each school has specific boundaries which determine where the dependents will attend. Normally it will be the school nearest the residence.

The children in Multiple Row (MDPR) and Bulk Lease Units (BLHU) attend kindergarten to grade 6 at Jameswood school and grades 7 to 9 at Golden Gate Junior High. PMQ residents attend either Strathmillian (Kindergarten to grade 7) or Linwood (Kindergarten to grade 6 and Deer Lodge Junior High for grades 7 to 9). High school students attend Silver Heights, St. James Collegiate or Sturgeon Creek School for grades 10 to 12, depending on location of their residence and the academic program.

Parents who wish to send their children to private or parochial schools must assume the full cost of schooling.



Jameswood Public School

South Site. Dependents attend kindergarten to grade 6 at Carpathia School and grades 7 to 9 at J.B. Mitchell Junior High. Kelvin and Grant Park High Schools provide grades 10 to 12. All these schools are in Winnipeg School Division No. 1.

There are various private and parochial schools available near the South Site. Members who choose to send their children to private or parochial schools must accept complete liability for the payment of tuition fees. They are, however, eligible to receive reimbursement up to the amount that would have been paid (NRSF rate) on their behalf had their children attended a school under the jurisdiction of the Winnipeg School Division No. 1. Parents are advised in September each year of the current NRSF rate.

Hospitalization

Married personnel from outside the Province of Manitoba are required to fill out a Manitoba Hospital Commission Form as outlined in CFAO 56-32. It is advisable before leaving a province to check its current hospitalization insurance plan to ensure that there will be no lapse in coverage.

Climate

The winters in Winnipeg are quite severe. The temperature is often well below the zero-degree mark and high winds add greatly to the chill factor. Winnipeg's temperature and precipitation data is as follows:

Barber Shops

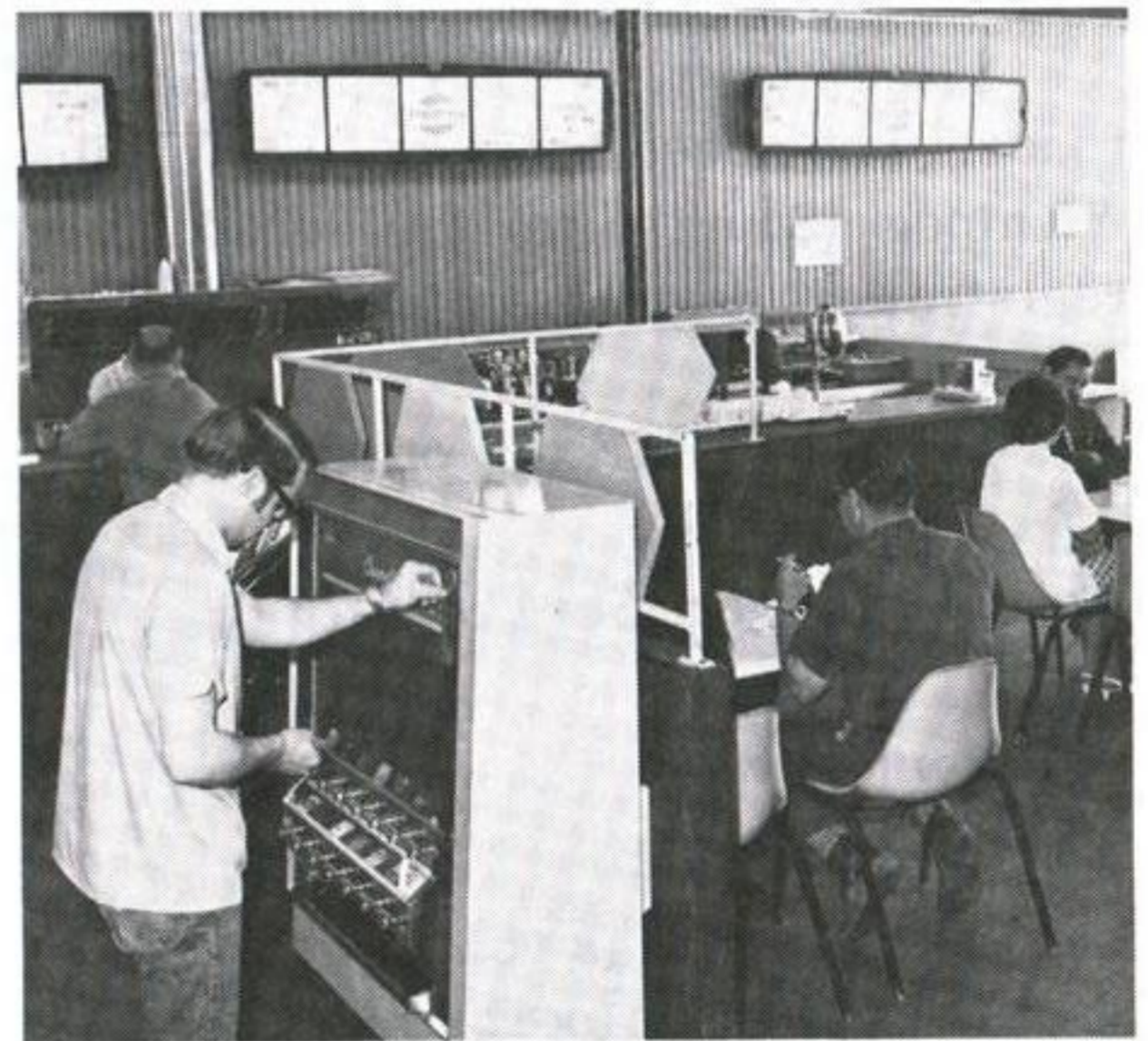
Base Cinema

Its two or three major productions each year, as well as its annual children's play at Christmas time, receive wide coverage in the local news media. Housed in Building 22 on the North Site, Studio 22 is always eager to meet newcomers interested in amateur theatre work.

Post Office

A Post Office is operated in the North Site Recreation Centre. There is also a mail room located in Building 61 on the North Site. The unit mail room on the South Site is located in Building B-3.

Use of POMV

Automobiles. Personnel are permitted to drive properly licensed and insured vehicles on Base. On arrival at CFB Winnipeg, all personnel are to report to the Base Military Police in Bldg 95 to register motor vehicles. A current drivers license and vehicle registration along with valid PL and PD insurance are required to obtain a decal. The Manitoba Highway Traffic Act gives an individual 90 days to change over vehicle registration and drivers license.

Speed Limits. CFB Winnipeg speed limits are posted at entrance gates and on most roads. The speed limit on CFB Winnipeg (North Site) varies from 20 to 30 MPH. On CFB Winnipeg (South Site) the speed limit is 15 MPH. Detailed traffic, parking and vehicle registration regulations are included in Base Standing Orders Articles 29.08 and 29.081.

Parking. Parking on CFB Winnipeg is permitted in approved parking areas only.

Building B-18. The North Site Manager can be reached at 888-5982. It should be noted that the gasoline pumps close one-half hour earlier than the Auto Club itself.

Voxair is the unofficial newspaper of CFB Winnipeg, and is normally published every second Wednesday. Since its inception in 1952, it has been heralded as one of the most popular Canadian Forces newspapers. It is distributed to all PMQ's, Base sections, and most other Canadian Forces Bases and Stations free of charge. Voxair is produced by volunteers through submissions of the many sections and organizations of CFB Winnipeg, and is an NPF supported activity.

Laundry and Dry Cleaning

Washing machines and dryers are installed in all barrack blocks.

Dry cleaning service is available in officers' quarters. Clothes for dry cleaning are to be clearly marked with name, rank, barrack block number, and room number. After they are cleaned, the clothes are returned to the laundry room.

No dry cleaning service is provided in the Sgts' and Junior Ranks' quarters, but commercial cleaners may be called into the quarters for pick-up and delivery.

Recreation Centre – North Site

WINNIPEG

During your stay in Winnipeg, you may find time to enjoy the cultural and recreational amenities of the city. Winnipeg, the capital of the Province of Manitoba, is situated at the junction of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers, 40 miles south of Lake Winnipeg and 60 miles north of the boundary of the USA. The city lies almost mid-way between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans at an altitude of 712 feet above sea level. From a Hudson's Bay Company trading post (Fort Garry) in 1870 with a population of 215, Winnipeg has grown into a city with over 500,000 residents in its metropolitan area.

Winnipeg's geographical position places it at the cross-roads of Canada's commerce and travel, astride a main artery of business with the United States. Railway lines, terminals, highways, airlines, water transport, and extensive warehousing facilities provide unique opportunities for manufacturers and wholesalers to serve the prosperous market extending from the head of the Great Lakes to the Rocky Mountains.

Winnipeg is the financial, commercial, wholesale, and manufacturing centre of the mid-west and has become the greatest grain centre on the American continent. Its residents also benefit from the current and potential development of the area's trade in mineral, petroleum, forest, fish and fur products. This trade, with its resultant influx of population, has resulted in the growth of a city of standing and importance that is exceeded by only three cities in Canada.

Legislative Building

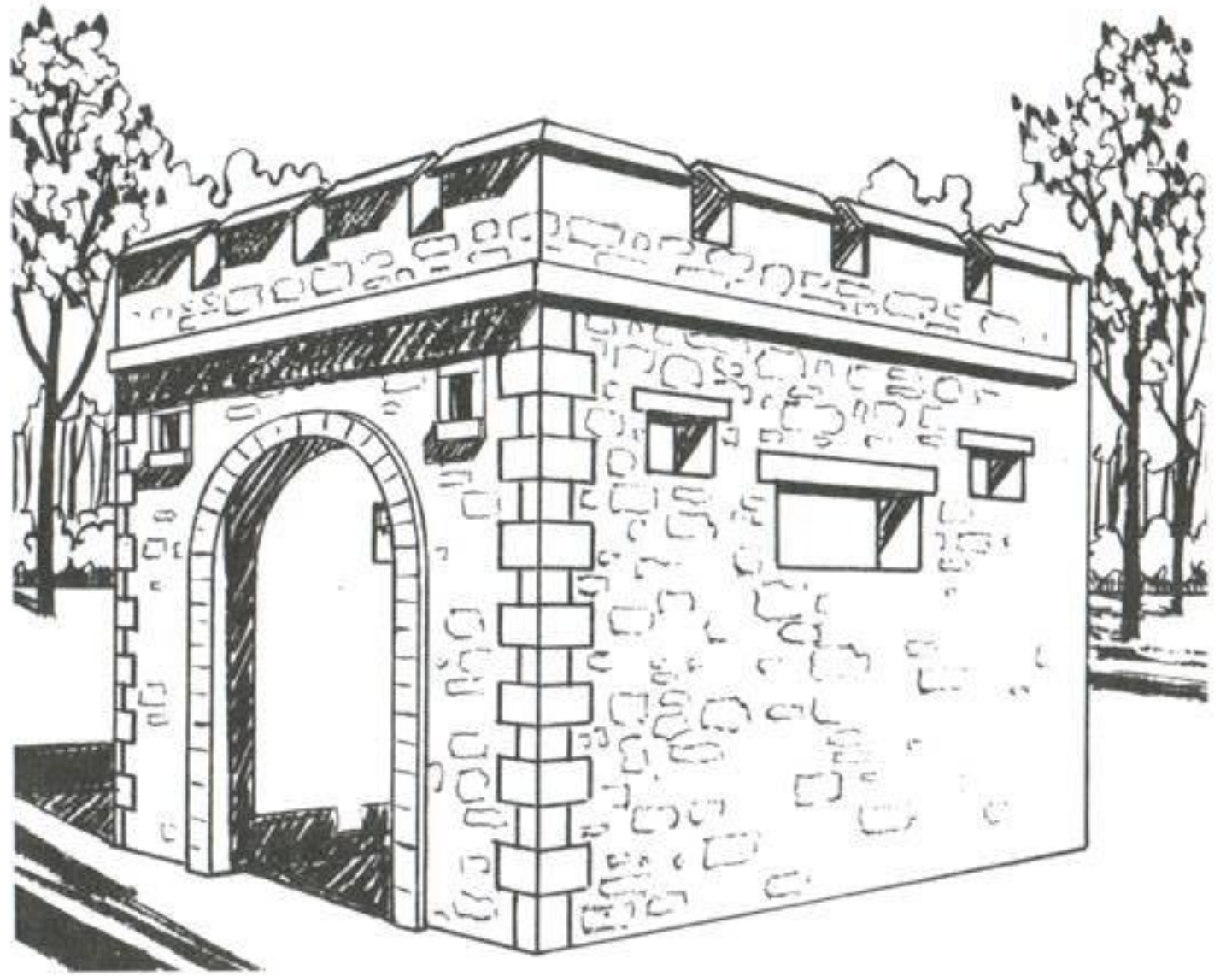
This building, housing the legislative and administrative branches of Manitoba's government, towers high above the city. The building is regarded as one of the finest neo-classical structures in the world; its bold lines and imposing dimensions, drawn from both ancient and modern sources, are dominated by the classical forms of Greece and Rome. The building is surmounted by the 'Golden Boy', symbol of enterprise and eternal youth; this 5-ton casting, by the French sculptor



Gardet, rose from the rubble of a foundry in France to cross the Atlantic several times as ballast in a troop carrier of the Great War before arriving safely in Winnipeg, its new permanent home. The Manitoba Legislative Building is open to the public with guided tours during weekdays from 0900 to 1600 hours.

Upper Fort Garry

This fort was built in 1835 at the junction of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers. For many years it was the Hudson's Bay Company's headquarters in Western Canada. For nine months it was occupied by Louis Riel's provisional government. In 1882, it was demolished except for the northern gateway. Today the gateway stands in Fort Garry Park opposite the CNR station on Main Street near Broadway. A plaque inside narrates the fort's colourful history.

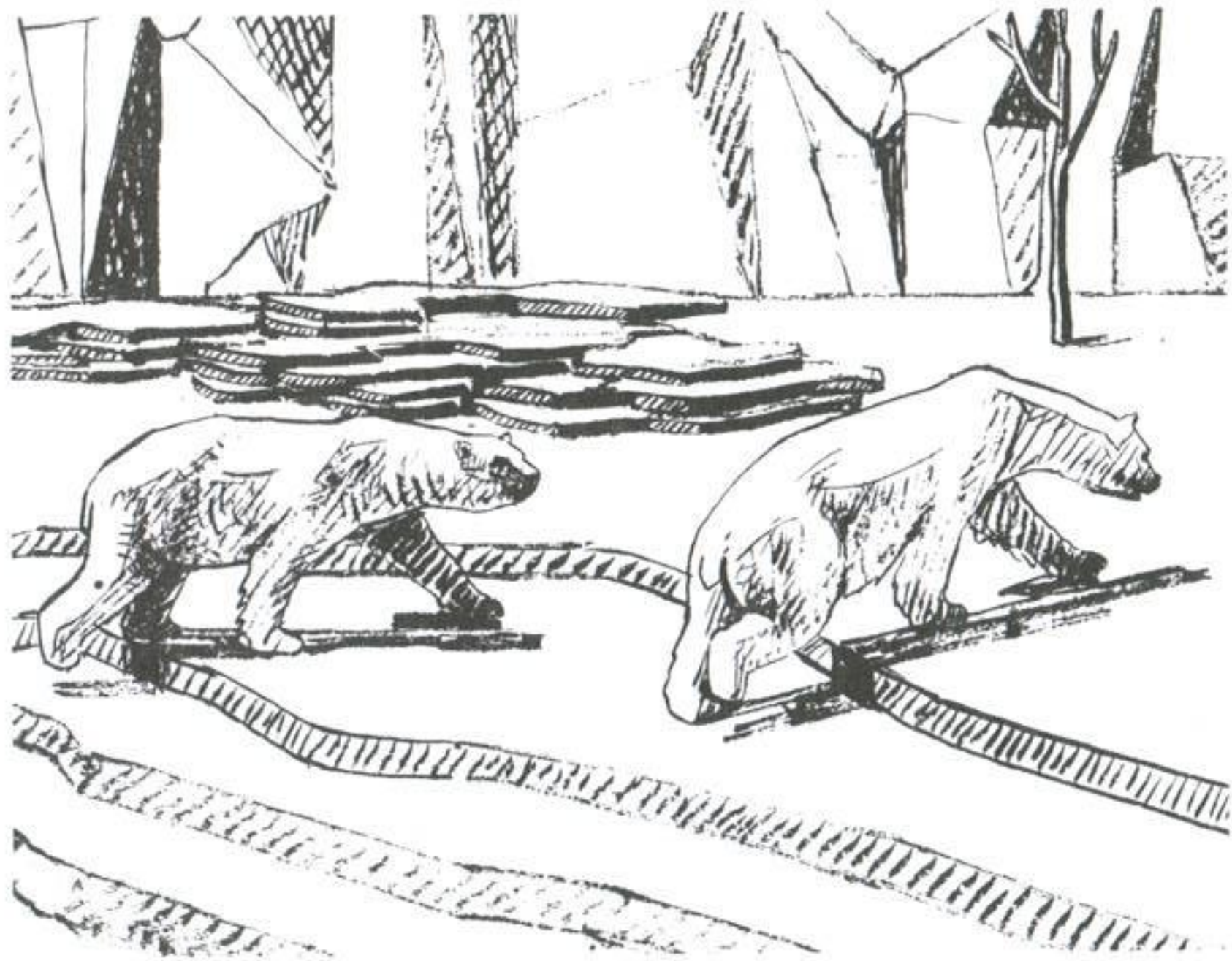


Lower Fort Garry

This fort, built as a replacement for the original built by early traders, was erected in 1831 and is commonly referred to as 'The Stone Fort'; it still stands 19 miles north of Winnipeg beside Highway 9. It became a social centre for district traders and voyageurs dancing to the skirl of bagpipes and fiddle music. The fort is open to visitors and is a must for those interested in the early history of the province.

Assiniboine Park

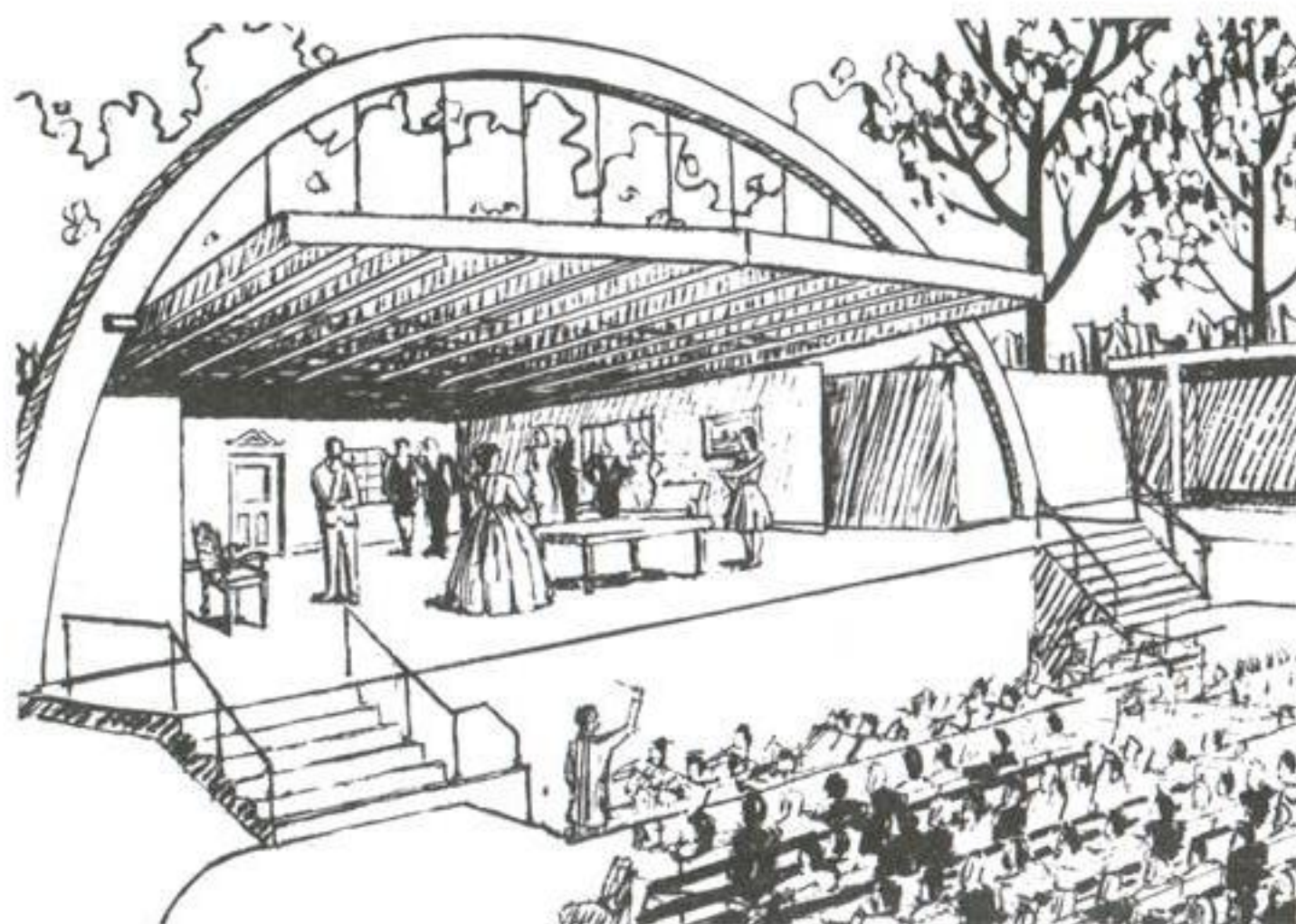
This park, situated on the banks of the Assiniboine River, has an area of 362 acres, is five miles from downtown Winnipeg, and is the largest and one of the most beautiful parks in the city. The park, which is readily accessible by public transportation, contains miles of driveways and walkways through expansive fields providing for athletic and picnic areas. Also the park contains a zoo inhabited by a fine collection of wild animals including lions, polar bears, deer, elk, and buffalo. A duck



pond inhabited by many species of waterfowl, a beaver pond, an English Garden with flowering shrubs and ornamental trees, and a Conservatory providing a year-round profusion of blossoms of tropical vegetation, are all further highlights of this magnificent park.

Rainbow Stage

This is Winnipeg's outdoor theatre and is located in Kildonan Park. The first concert was presented by the Kitsilano Boys' Band from British Columbia in 1953. Today, the Winnipeg Summer Theater Association, which was organized in 1956, presents professional productions of world-famous musicals such as 'South Pacific', 'Kiss Me Kate', and 'Carousel'.

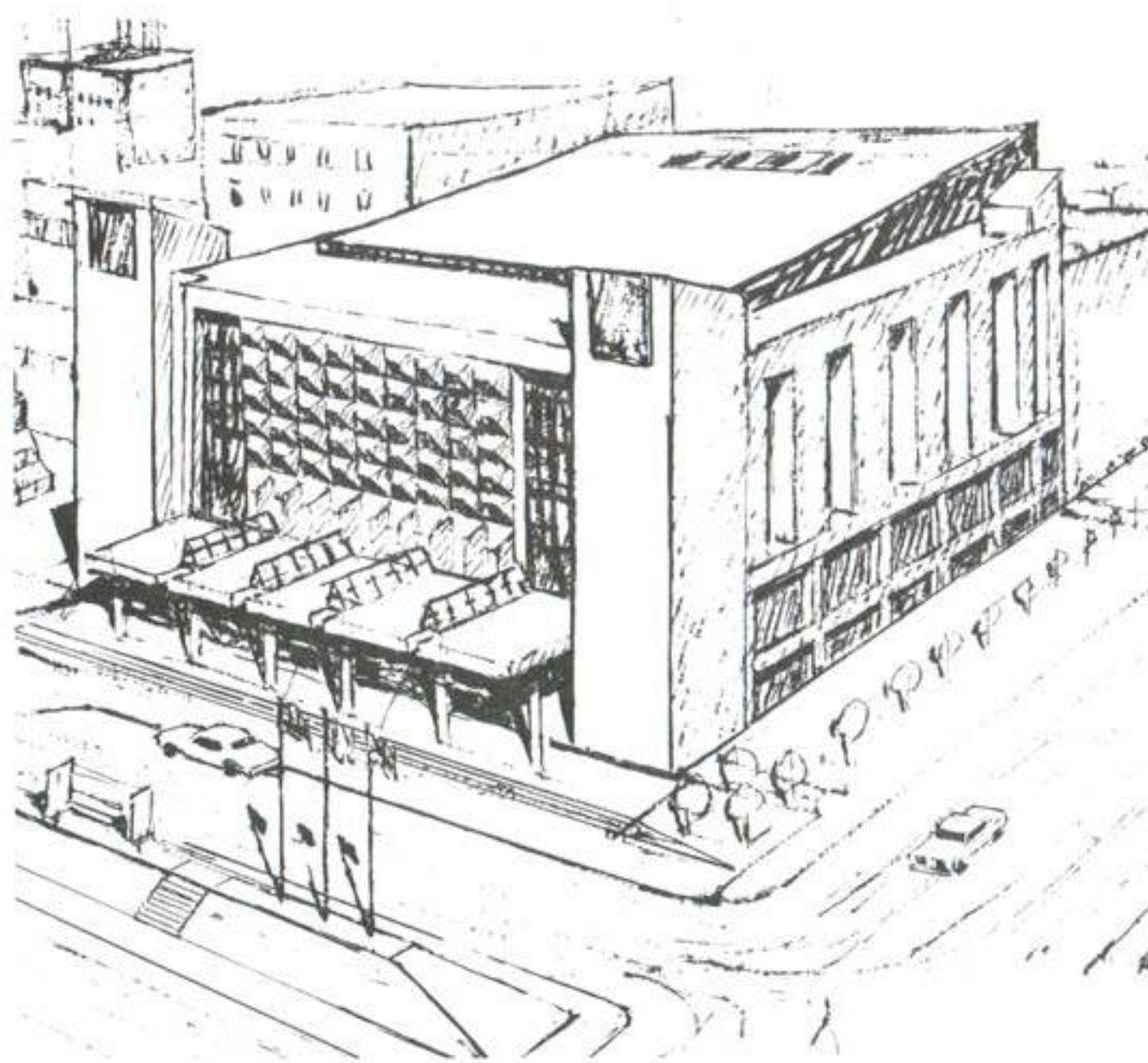


Royal Winnipeg Ballet

The Royal Winnipeg Ballet is Canada's first ballet company, and the oldest continually operating ballet company in North America. In addition to performances in Winnipeg, the company has performed in 70 other cities including three tours in the United States. On the occasion of 'Royal Recognition' in 1953, the late Randolph Patton wrote "The Royal Winnipeg Ballet of Canada enjoys an unusual degree of artistic security because it is the flowering of a thorough devotion to artistic discipline, and because of that devotion it has a bright future".

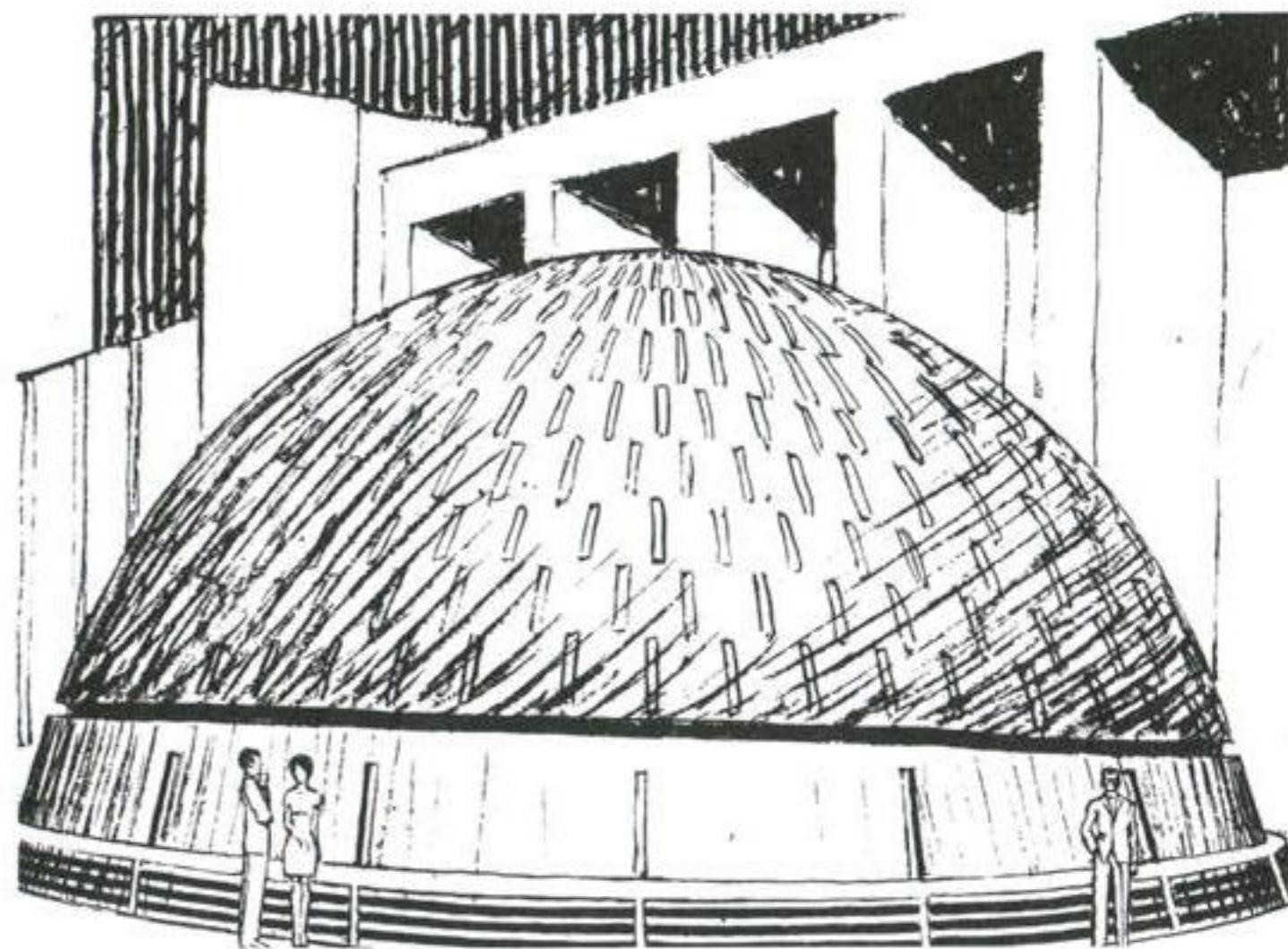
Centennial Concert Hall

This ultra-modern concert hall of 2,200 seats is a part of a large complex known as the Centennial Centre. Incorporating such design features as a hydraulically-operated orchestra pit, a mobile acoustical symphony shell, and mechanically-operated sound dampening curtains which provide acoustical excellence throughout the hall without the aid of artificial volume control, the Centennial Concert Hall will present many of the arts to Manitobans. It is the home of the Manitoba Theatre Centre, the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, and the Royal Winnipeg Ballet.



Centennial Planetarium

This planetarium of 287 seats, is also an integral part of the Centennial Centre. The planetarium simulates comets flashing across the ceiling, thunderstorms, northern lights viewed from the Arctic Circle, and an astronomer's view of much of the universe. This is scientific entertainment with a lecture on astronomy, astro-physics, or space science.

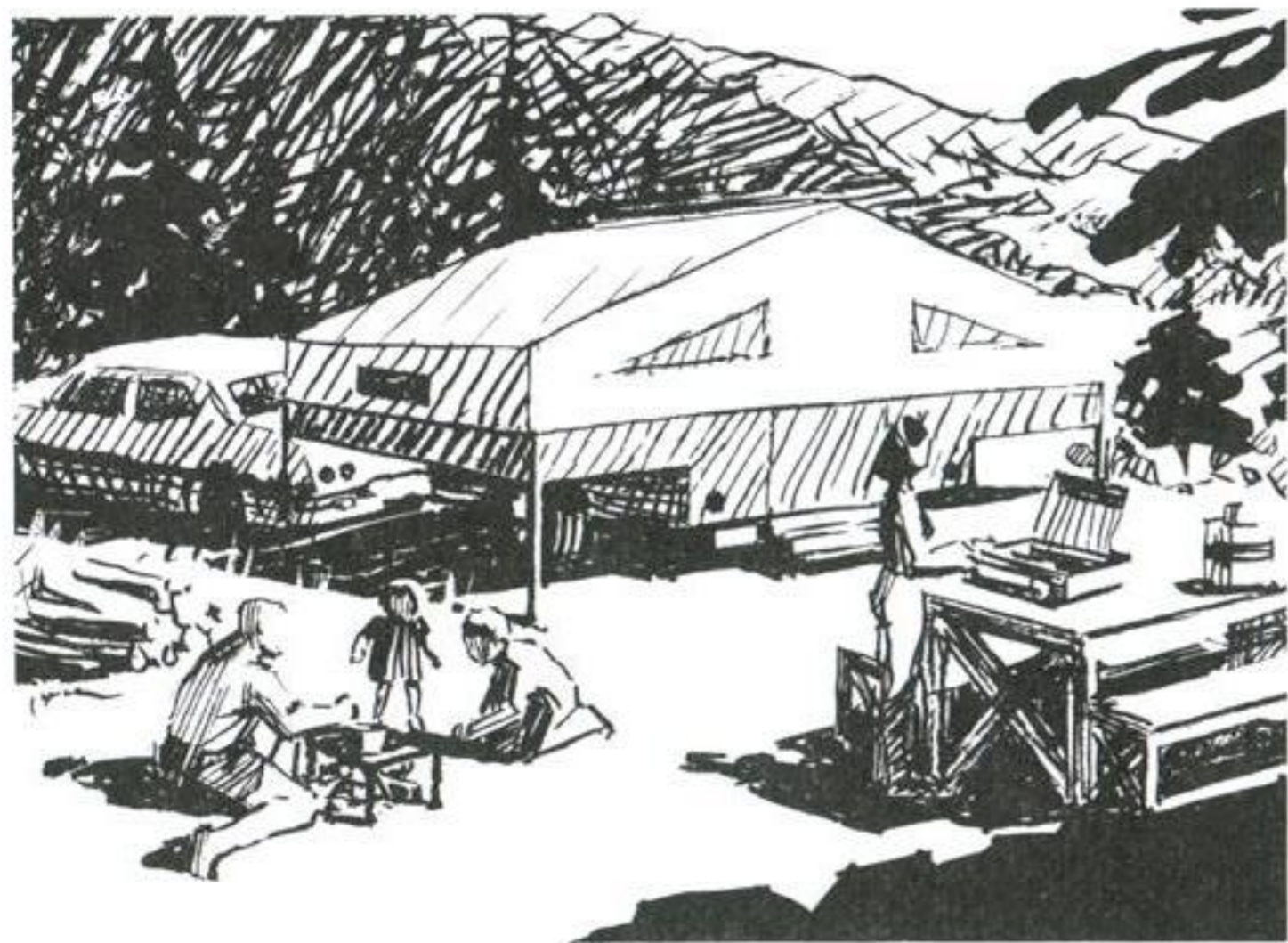


Manitoba Theatre Centre

Featuring international talent, the Manitoba Theatre Centre presents superb theatrical entertainment. One of the finest regional theatres in North America, it offers such major productions as 'Fiddler on the roof' and 'Funny Girl' to Manitobans in the Centennial Concert Hall. Although season subscribers to the series occupy a large percentage of the seats, tickets to this broad dimension in entertainment are available on an individual basis.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA

A newcomer to the prairies might envisage Manitoba as consisting of miles of flat wheat fields interrupted only by miles of burnt and rolling grasslands. In fact, Manitoba possess a varied geography, and although the above description applies to a small portion of it, nearly one fifth of Manitoba is covered by water. These waterways, including Lake Winnipeg, Lake Manitoba, and the Nelson and Churchill Rivers,



all drain into Hudson Bay. A triangular-shaped block of land covering the southern portion of Manitoba comprises the agricultural area; this land was originally either prairie or mixed prairie and light timber. The northern three-fifths of the province, lying within the Precambrian belt, is very rugged with numerous lakes, extensive swamps, and large rock out-croppings. It has a forest cover consisting mainly of spruce extending north into the tundra. This northern portion of the province provides some of the most

senic parts of Manitoba, and is well stocked with fish, game, and fur-bearing animals. With such a rich natural resource it is not surprising that Manitoba is the mid-Canada



playground both in summer and in winter. All Manitoba highways lead to parks. At present there are nine designated provincial parks and one National Park which provide an endless variety in scenery, wildlife, and sporting activities. Facilities range from near-wilderness camping for those who seek solitude, to fully serviced campgrounds for those requiring modern conveniences.

Duck Mountain Provincial Park, in the heart of the Province's best spruce of forests, has many deep cold lakes com-

binning excellent photographic and angling opportunities. Duck Mountain is also home for a large elk population, the annually sought prize of local big-game hunters.

Manitoba is also famous as the Canadian "Duck Factory" on the Mississippi and Central Waterfowl Flyways



of North America. In recent years more than 40,000 game-bird hunters have taken more than a half million waterfowl and native grouse.



Angling is an increasingly popular sport in Manitoba both in summer and in winter. Sport anglers annually take a catch of about five million pounds. Pickerel, northern pike, and lake trout are the principal sport fish. In 1967 more than 900 Master Angler awards were made to fishermen who caught fish of trophy size.

DRUG EDUCATION PROGRAM

In February, 1971, the Canadian Armed Forces established a national Drug Education Program to provide factual information on the pharmacological, medical, psychological, legal and social aspects of drug use.

The program is based on the knowledge that drug education is an important preventive measure. It affirms that the personal decision as to whether or not drugs will be improperly used, is more likely to be wiser if made in the light of full knowledge of what is involved. Organizers of the program stress that Service members and their dependants are entitled access to the most accurate and complete information available on the subject.

CFB Winnipeg has a Drug Education Committee responsible to implement the drug education program in the Winnipeg area. This committee is made up of volunteer members who have received formal drug education and who are available (upon request) to present formal and/or informal lecture-discussions on the subject of drug education.

Information on this subject is available from unit drug education representatives.

AL-ANON

Are you living with (or near) a severe drinking problem? Is someone very close to you seriously affecting your life because of the domination of alcohol in theirs? If so, Al-Anon Family Groups may be able to help.

Al-Anon Family Groups are a fellowship of relatives and friends of alcoholics who share their experience, strength and hope in order to solve common problems and to help others do the same.

Alcoholism is recognized as a family disease which impairs the mental (and often the physical) health of the family as well as that of the alcoholic. Members of Al-Anon Family Groups seek, through regular meetings, to help the relatives of alcoholics by learning the facts about alcoholism as an illness and about the treatment processes.

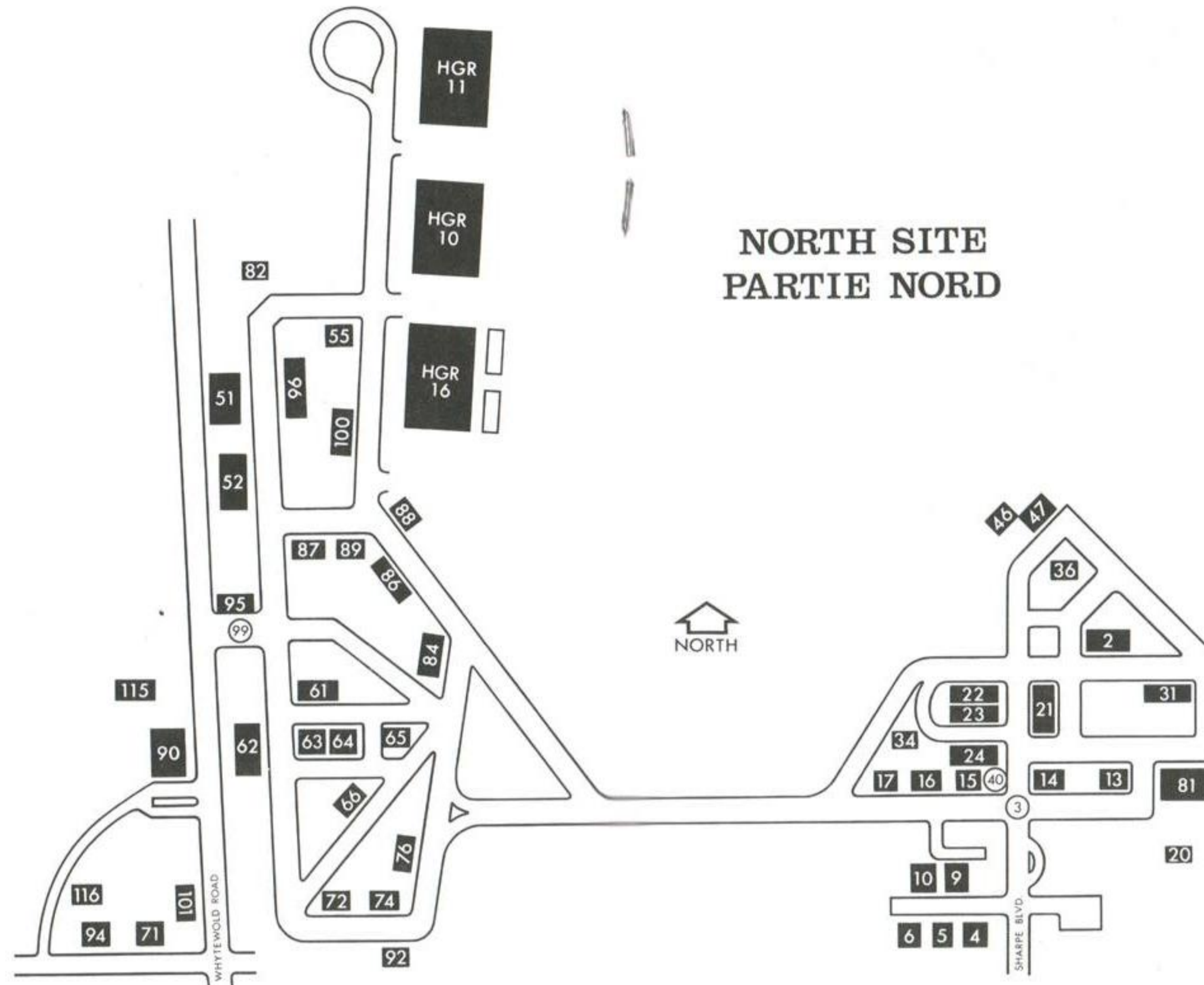
