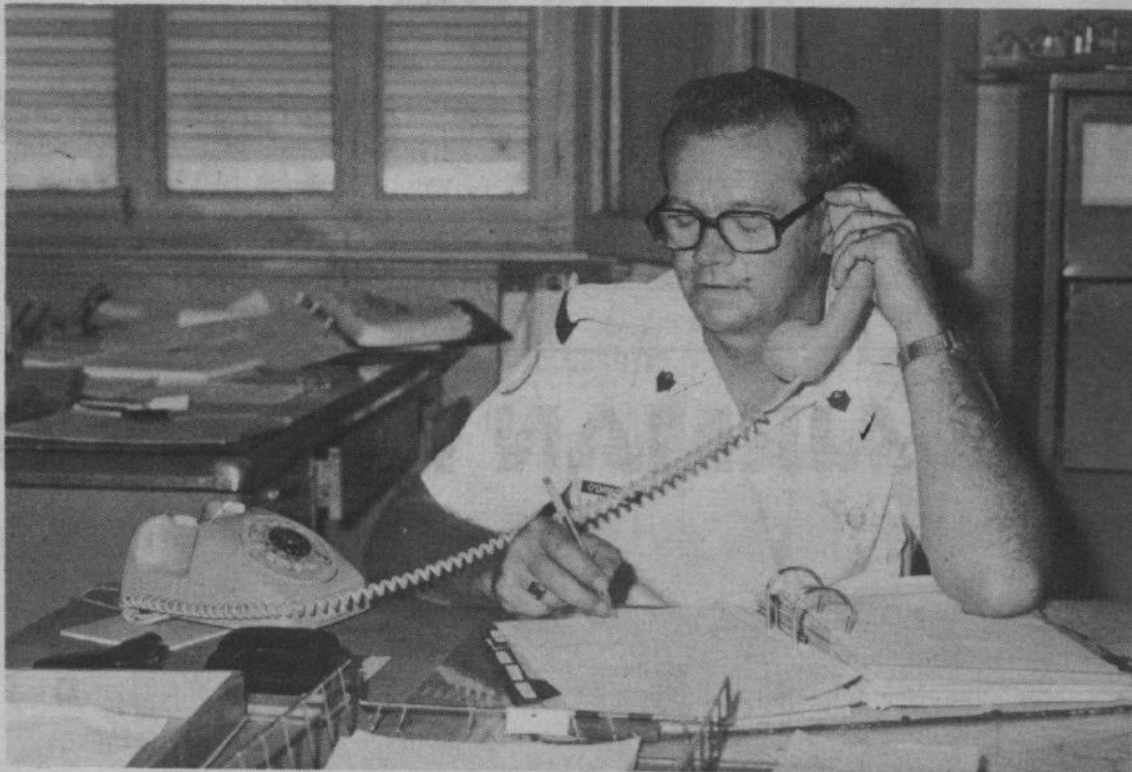

It was Friday, July 14, 1978 and it was the day scheduled for the change of command ceremony at CFB Winnipeg. Everything was in readiness, the troops had been smartly turned out on the flagbedecked parade ground, guests and spectators had gathered to witness the event and the band had already been heard several times. The weather was still cloudy and threatening, not a very nice way to begin as Base Commander of the finest Base in Canada — but, just as the car bearing the new base commander approached the parade ground, lo — “the clouds parted”, and the sun shone brightly for the rest of the day. Thus began the official change of command ceremony.

Without a doubt the parade held on July 14th to officially mark the change of command of CFB Winnipeg from COL D. M. McNaughton to COL J. R. Allingham was the finest held at CFB Winnipeg in recent years.

SMART was the word on the lips of the spectators. Everyone on parade exuded quiet pride and confidence, from PTE France Isabelle in the Honour Guard to CAPT P. J. Graves to the Base Commander himself. Obviously this smartness and sharpness on parade reflected the tender, loving care of the Base WO, CWO F. S. Dodd and his staff. It was the last parade CWO Dodd handled for CFB Winnipeg, although he was parade CWO for the Air Command change of command parade held August 10th.

Another well-known figure at CFB Winnipeg also was on parade for the last time. MAJ Ted Selwyn, the Base Comptroller was called upon at the eleventh hour to perform the parade adjutant duties, and an excellent job he did.

Excellent music, under the direction of SGT J. C. Briand, was provided by the combined pipes and drums of CFB Portage la Prairie, 402 Air Reserve Squadron, and the 26th Field Artillery Band from Brandon, Manitoba. A fine example of inter-unit, Regular and Reserve cooperation.

Special guests included His Honor The Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, the Honorable F. L. Jobin, Mr. George Minaker, representing the Premier of Manitoba, Councillor Don Gerrie, representing the City of Winnipeg,

and LGEN W. K. Carr, Commander of Air Command.

A highlight of the day was the presentation by Councillor Gerrie of an Honorary Citizenship of the City of Winnipeg to CO D. M. McNaughton for his cooperation and support during his tour as base commander at CFB Winnipeg.

In his farewell speech, CO McNaughton, who is promoted and posted to Ottawa, said that he

was sad to go and had high praise for the good, dedicated and faithful workers at CFB Winnipeg.

CO Allingham spoke of his “eager anticipation” in assuming command of CFB Winnipeg and gave assurances that “service to all units would continue”. He noted that CFB Winnipeg was the Home of Air Command and hoped also that the military and civilian communities would continue to cooperate as always.

ENERGY CONSERVATION

DON'T JUST RECYCLE IT — USE IT!

OTTAWA — While everyone's running around collecting paper for recycling, do you ever wonder who uses it after recycling? Do you use it? Like most people, you probably don't know.

The general public, industry and government need to make a conscious effort and use more recycled paper according to Brian Kelly, a young research officer at the federal government's Office of Energy Conservation. Using recycled paper and creating a demand for recycled paper will bring about an energy saving, he says.

"According to one set of figures, a report for the Environmental Protection Agency in the States, it takes 70 per cent less energy to produce low-grade

paper from repulped waste paper than to produce it from unbleached wood pulp. For higher grade paper, where the waste paper has to be de-inked, the energy saving is less — 60 per cent. Other figures give a somewhat lower saving, but differences occur in the type of process involved."

Using recycled paper also helps save forest resources and eases the pollution problems of trying to dispose of paper by burning or burying it, Brian says.

"Recycling and reusing paper can bring real savings in energy, resources and in environmental pollution," Brian says. "But saving paper for recycling isn't enough. We need to make sure that the recycled paper is used."

AS SOUVENIRS AMMO SPELLS DISASTER

OTTAWA (CFP) — Being involved with Explosives Safety at NDHQ, we are automatically attracted to such newspaper headlines as "Souvenir shell explodes, injures three students" or "Device explodes in hand, Ottawa man loses finger". Both appeared in the local papers recently.

As the first incident was from a wire service story, it probably appeared in your local newspaper as well. In case you missed it, the bare facts are that a teacher brought back two items of ammunition from a stay in Africa. The teacher is quoted as saying that he obviously thought that they were defused and that he

wanted to keep them as souvenirs. Well, they weren't defused and one of them went off when it was dropped by a student.

Unfortunately, these types of accidents are not as rare as one might think. Take the case of the projectile that for years served as a door stop. That is, until a gust of wind blew the door against it and it exploded. Or how about the projectiles that served as mantel decorations until one of them fell off?

Over the years souvenirs lose their meaning, especially if they've been passed from person to person. During the same time the potential hazard of any explosive inside does not wear off;

in fact, in some cases the explosive becomes more sensitive to shock or static electricity.

We appeal to you for your own sake, to turn in any ammunition or explosive souvenirs to your local EOD centre. If you don't have a centre, call the MPs, they'll know what to do. Because any explosive inside may be sensitive, the EOD guys won't guarantee they can make it safe for you. If there is any doubt they'll blow it up. Only if they are absolutely sure that the item is inert or harmless will they return it to you. This is for their protection as well as yours. So, do it now, before you forget!

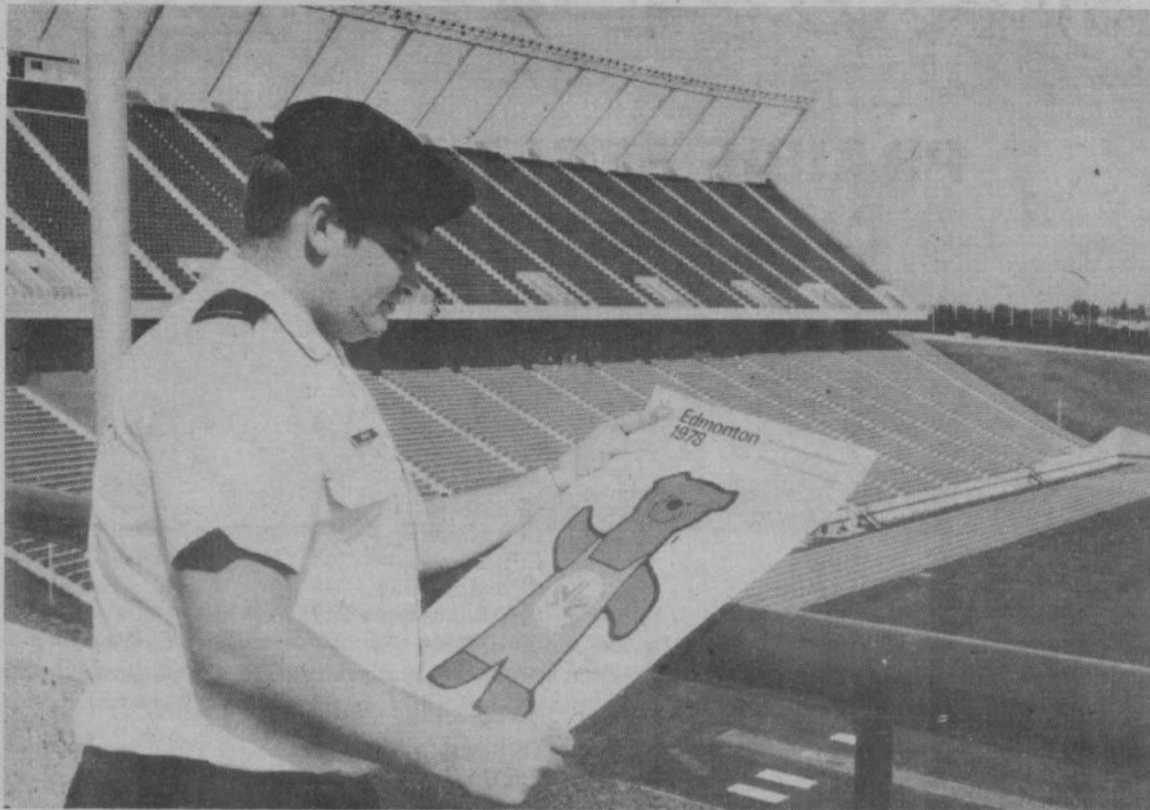

CELEBRATES 30th ANNIVERSARY

July 2, 1978 marked the commencement of the 30th year of training for the National Cadet Camp at Banff, Alberta.

The camp, originally entitled The Special Cadet Camp, was founded with tents on the Banff Indian Days' site in 1948, but moved to its present permanent location 1 mile NE of the site in 1951. The activities at the camp have undergone many changes since its inception.

In the beginning the camp was a reward experience for the top army cadets in Canada, but in recent years has developed into a working one that is a showpiece of Leadership and Challenge. The training of today includes Leadership, Watermanship, Mountain Climbing, and Glacierwork which is ideally suited to the area of the Banff National Park. Despite the many changes the basic concepts of the camp remains.

Physical fitness and park awareness are paramount in the program as in 1948 and the cream of the army cadet program (nowadays both male and female) are still the course participants. The bilingual concept of training remains, as the cadets and staff who attend are from all provinces in Canada. There is still regular force support in terms of administration, transport, food services, supply and maintenance, but the training has been taken over the Cadet Instructor's list which has proven to add diversity to the program.

In its 30 years of operations BNACC, as it is affectionately known by the cadets and staff, has seen over 10,000 young Canadians pass through its gates. 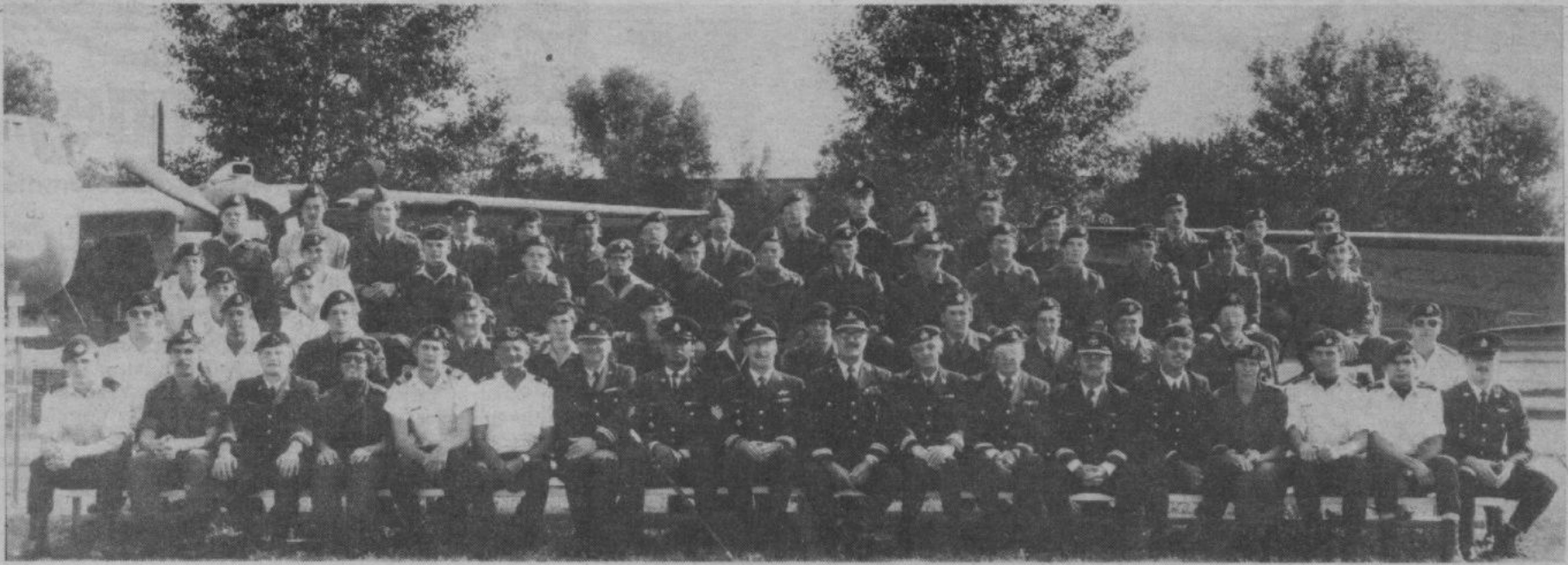

WILL THE REAL ELVIS COSTELLO

An overnight sensation is something that is often heard about, and more often than not, written about by members of the press. Upon deeper examination one finds that quite often the supposed overnight sensation is one that worked on the periphery of the spotlight for numerous years.

Elvis Costello would seem by all outward appearances to be a true overnight sensation. Very little of the real Elvis Costello has been revealed to the press. What is known is that Costello has a real name of Declan McManus who at one time worked as a computer operator in an Elizabeth Arden factory in England. His father, Ross McManus, had been the singer in a British dance band in the 40s and 50s and Elvis, who is somewhere in his early to mid-twenties, started singing and songwriting about eight years ago.

LESS THAN ZERO

After trying unsuccessfully for over a year to push his demo tapes, was finally signed to Stiff Records in August 1976. He is distributed in Canada by CBS. It was his first record, "Less Than Zero", that started the attention that has swirled around him. To show what kind of drawing power this new artist has ... he played the prestigious El Mocambo in Toronto, where people started to line up shortly after lunch for his 11 PM show. The line was estimated at somewhere around a thousand or more people, all trying for seats in the El Mocambo's 320-seat capacity room that would showcase Costello's talents.

Shortly after he hit these shores, CBS launched a massive promotional campaign which

resulted in his debut album, "My Aim Is True" (PC 35037) rapidly grabbing chart attention and quickly resulting in a gold record.

THIS YEAR'S MODEL

With the release of his second album, "This Year's Model" (PC 35331) Elvis Costello would appear to be well on his way to a second gold album. The set is basic rock with an uncluttered sound with all the songs coming from the pen of Costello.

Opening with "No Action", a straight ahead rocker with solid vocal harmonies and good percussive beat. If this one hasn't already been released, it probably will be. Fan reaction should force this one to become a single winner. Action gets slowed somewhat with "This Year's Girl" and remains reasonably mid-tempo with "The Beat".

"Pump It Up" could become a monster hit and should definitely generate sales excitement over AOR (album oriented rock) outlets. Tempo shifts to laid-back with "Little Triggers". Best tracks include: "Radio Radio" and "Pump It Up". Good graphics and the gathering mystique of Costello should all help to push this one to golden plateau.



STAR AWARDED

OTTAWA(CFP)—On June 19 in Nicosia, Cyprus, Canadian External Affairs Minister Donald Jamieson presented the Star of Courage to the widow of Andrea Kariolou who drowned on Apr. 24, 1977 attempting to save the life of a Canadian serviceman serving with the United Nations Forces in Cyprus (UNFICYP).

The posthumous award was received by Mrs. Tasoula Kariolou. Her husband, a professional diver, lost his life trying to provide emergency air from his own tank to SGT André Dupont, a reservist from the 8th Medical Company of Sherbrooke, Que., whose air supply had run out 30 metres below the surface off the southern coast of Cyprus. Despite Kariolou's valiant efforts

SGT Dupont also died.

The investiture took place at a reception hosted by the Canadian High Commissioner Edward Lee and attended by the Canadian commander CO C. V. Carlson, commander Nicosai sector, LCOL L. W. Mackenzie and high ranking UNFICYP members, as well as ambassadors and senior Greek Cypriot government officials.

Andreas Kariolou was known and loved by hundreds of Canadian servicemen who have served in Cyprus with UNFICYP. His chartered scuba diving service had been utilized from 1964 until his untimely death. To those who knew him it came as no surprise that he had sacrificed his life attempting to rescue a drowning diver.

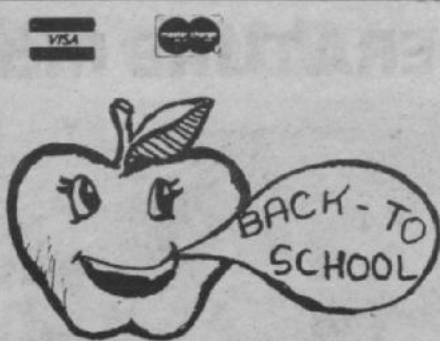

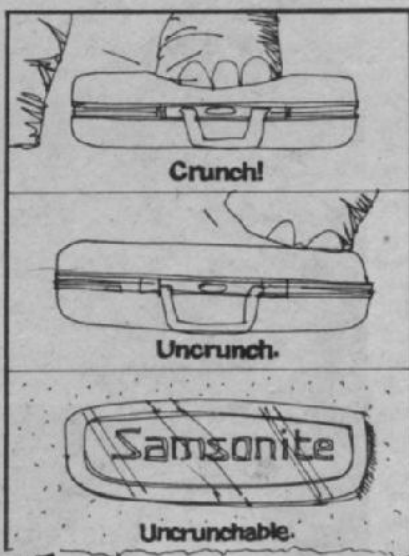

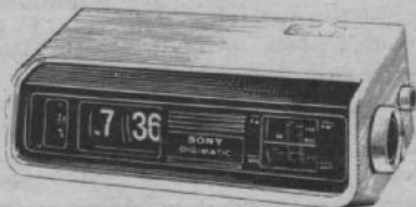
