## MARINE CORP APPOINTMENT

Washington, May 14 (MCNews) — Secretary of Defense Harold Brown announced today that the President has approved the nomination of LGEN Kenneth McLennan for appointment to general and assignment as the next Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

LGEN McLennan, who is currently serving as Deputy Chief of Staff for Manpower at Headquarters Marine Corps in Washington, will assume his new post July 1, following Senate confirmation.

The 53-year-old Marine, a native of Vancouver, British Columbia, in Canada, will replace GEN Robert H. Barrow, who will take over as the new Commandant for retiring GEN Louis H. Wilson, July 1.

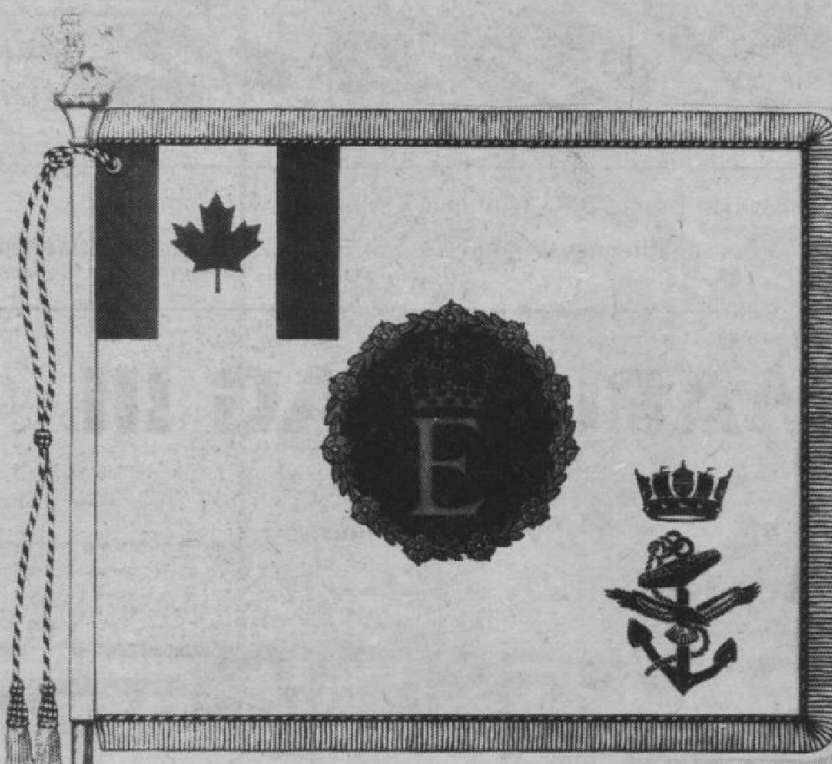

# QUEEN'S COLOUR PRESENTATION

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother, will present a new Queen's Colour to Maritime Command at a ceremonial parade on the Garrison Ground, Halifax, at 3:00 pm, Wednesday, 27 June, 1979.

While Army units have had colours or something equivalent, throughout recorded history, and ships have always worn identifying flags or ensigns, our Navy did not receive a special colour until after HM King George V had approved their use by the Royal Navy in 1924. The first two King's Colours, one each for the Atlantic and Pacific Commands were received in 1927. Colours were again presented by King George VI in Victoria during the Royal Visit in June, 1939. Our present Queen's Colours were presented by HM The Queen in Halifax on 1 August, 1959.

The new Queen's Colour is a



special naval jack of white silk, fringed with blue, with a Royal Cypher in gold on a blue disc within a floral chaplet, in the centre. The Queen's Colour is never paraded on board ship or on foreign territory, and is only paraded on shore for special ceremonial occasions involving royalty or the sovereign's representatives.

The ceremony this June will be a large one involving more than 700 officers and men of the Canadian Forces and the Naval Reserves from across Canada on parade. Honour will be paid to the old colour before it is finally marched off. The new colour will be consecrated by the Chaplains-General of the Canadian Forces before presentation by HM Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother. The parade will march past in review and there will be a flypast of Maritime aircraft.

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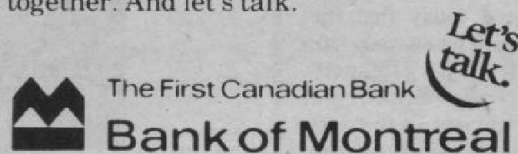
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## MILITARY POLICE NOTES

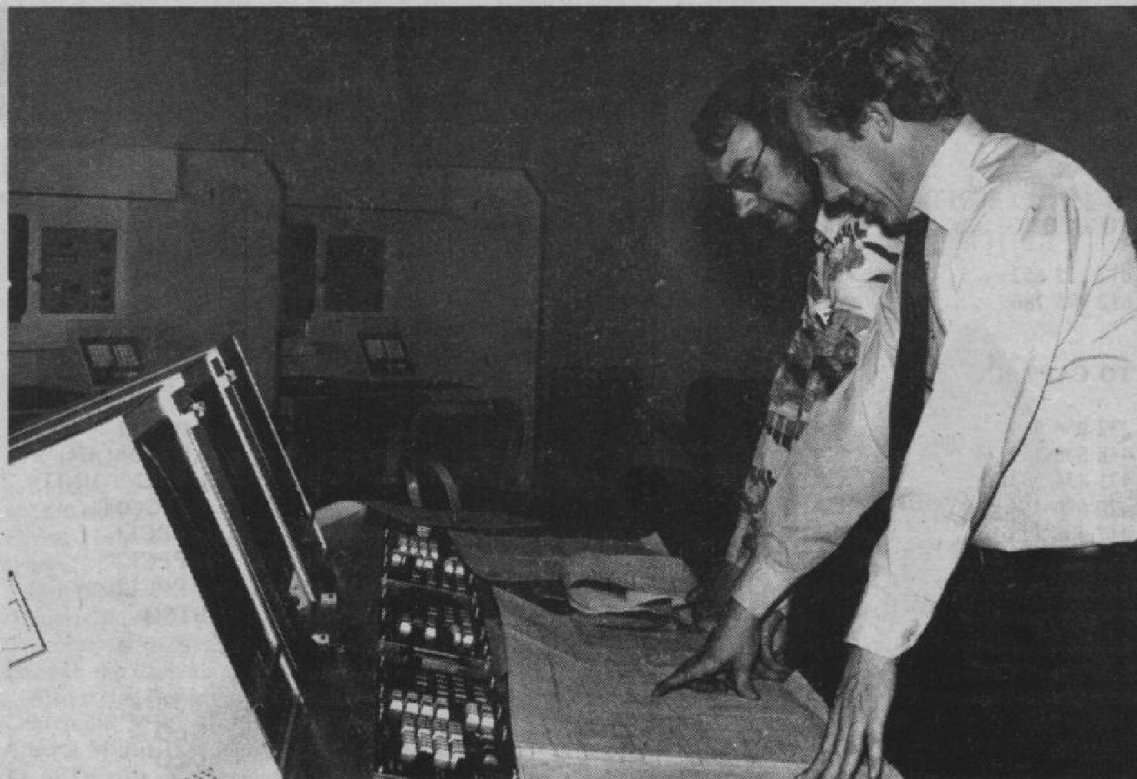

### CHICK FREAK OUT

Never before in the history of chart records has a song hit the top and dropped off, only to return to the top slot on three different occasions. Never before that is, until "Le Freak".

"Le Freak" by Chic has had a stranglehold on the charts, giving way only slightly to the Diamond/Streisand opus "You Don't Bring Me Flowers" and Rod Stewart's "Do You Think I'm Sexy". The "Freak" is doing to the single charts what "Saturday Night Fever" and "Grease" did to the album charts, totally dominating them.

### C'EST CHIC

Chic's debut single "Dance, Dance, Dance (Yowsah, Yowsah, Yowsah)" broke open on the East and West coast for Chic in late '77. The song was a hit as a regular single and was Atlantic's first commercial 12-inch Disco Disc. About five months after release, "Dance" had attained gold status and was named the 'DiscoDisc' of 1977 by Nightfall Magazine Disco Awards. Their first

album "Chic" and the follow-up single "Everybody Dance" showed their disco power as they again pulled down gold certification.

The group toured with the O'Jays, Isley Brothers, Slave and Trammps and did tour of Rio De Janeiro and

Sao Paulo. All this was really only the lead up to what was waiting in the wings...

### SALES MONSTER

The single "Le Freak", already platinum numerous times over, is one of the sales builders incorporated into "C'est Chic" (Atlantic KSD-19209 manufactured and distributed in Canada by WEA), an album that has already moved a few million copies.

Chic is the brainchild of Bernard Edwards and Nile Rodgers, who wrote, arranged, conducted and produced "C'est Chic". Bernard, born in Greenville, North Carolina, and a New Yorker since age 10, played in PS 164's recorder band (in Brooklyn), played tenor sax in junior high and left the horn for electric bass when he enrolled in the Performing Arts High School. Nile, who hails from the Big Apple (NYC) moved through hard rock, classics and jazz and through his association with Bernard learned the finer points of R&B.

Forming the basis for Chic, Nile Rodgers and Bernard Edwards are joined on "C'est Chic" by vocalists Alta Anderson, Diva Gray, Luci Martin and Luther Vandross along with a fine bevy of musicians which includes Bernard on bass; Nile on guitar; Tony Thompson (drums); along with Robert Sabino, Andy Schwartz and numerous others on horns and strings.

The album itself is one of the most danceable sets to strike the charts in recent months. Along with the runaway "Le Freak", set also contains "I Want Your Love", "(Funny) Bone", "Savoir Faire" & "Happy Man".

# THE SKYHAWKS



OTTAWA — The Canadian Forces Parachute Team — The Skyhawks — are in the final stages of their training in Edmonton, preparing for their annual country wide series of precision free fall parachute jumping demonstrations scheduled for this spring, summer and fall.

They will be featured at 46 exhibitions, festivals and airshows between 6 May and the end of October. Last year they performed before an estimated two million spectators.

Since its formation in 1971, at Canadian Forces Base Edmonton, the site of the Canadian Airborne Centre (CABC) parachute school, the team has performed annually and its professionalism has impressed both civilian parachutists and the general public alike. Many of the team members are seasoned soldiers who also serve as parachute free-fall instructors at CABC and assist in the development of parachuting techniques which can be applied by Canada's Airborne Regiment.

Formed on a volunteer basis each year, team hopefuls are drawn from a wide variety of ranks, trades and classifications in the Regular and Reserve Force. They aim for a team composition of 12 regular members and four spares.

For the first time a sailor may make the team. Leading Seaman Paul Aikens, 20, of Pembroke, Ont. is on detached duty from the East coast destroyer HMCS Athabaskan, having gained his basic qualifications through the Canadian Sport Parachute Association.

Also trying out are two militiamen. They are CAPT Hal Skaarup, 27, of Centerville, N.B., a former Skyhawk, and currently a member of Northern Alberta Militia District headquarters in Edmonton, and CPL John Fraser, 30, of Trenton, N.S., a member of 1st Battalion, Nova Scotia Highlanders.

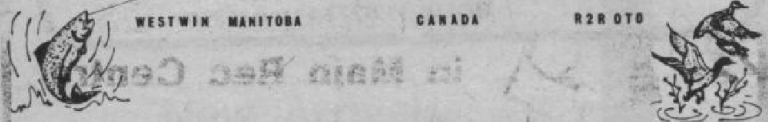
Team co-ordinator is CAPT Norm Greene, 38, of Moncton, N.B., a veteran parachutist. Team leader and the most experienced jumper, with over 1,000 parachute descents, is WO Tom Holland, 38, of Elliot Lake, Ont. Recently based with 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry at Winnipeg, he is now on staff at CABC.

The scheduled performances represent only a fraction of those requested, but the Skyhawk scheduler at Mobile Command headquarters in Montreal has again tried to be fair in distributing the shows across Canada.

CAPT Greene said, "We'd like to do more, but can only make a limited number of appearances. We regret that many requests have had to be turned down, but the men feel even worse when the show has been arranged, they are on location and weather cancels it. They are extremely keen, but safety comes first".

Twin Otters and Dakotas from the Regular and Reserve squadrons at Edmonton and Winnipeg or single engined Otters from the Reserve squadrons at Montreal or Toronto are used to transport them between shows and to take them to their normal jump altitude of 1,525 metres (5,000 feet).

waterfowl, wildlife and forests.

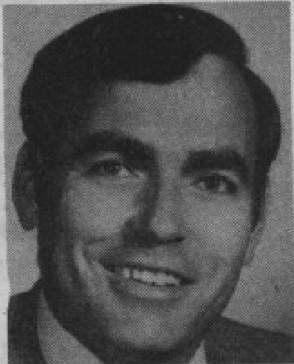

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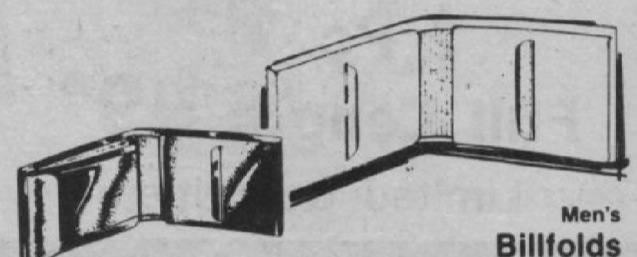
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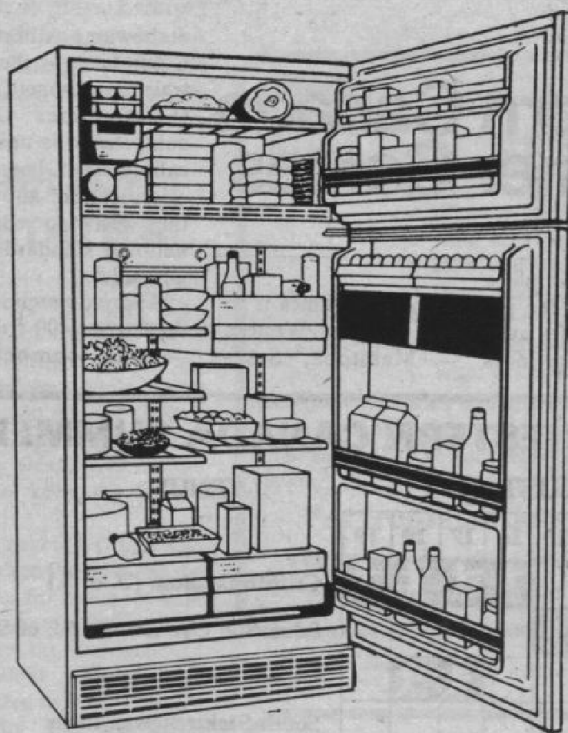
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## EARLY BIRD GOLF CLASSIC

August 12th - 19th are "Fun & Games" Days for Saskatoon because that's when the second-ever Western Canada Summer Games take place. The purpose of the Games is to offer athletes in the Four Western Provinces — Manitoba, Sask-

atchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia — the opportunity to train and compete in the 23 sports of the Summer Olympics. This competition is unique as it is a top calibre event, based on an open age classification, allowing the "best in the west" to compete on international standards in the Summer Olympics.

Approximately 1600 athletes — that's over 400 from each province — will compete in archery,

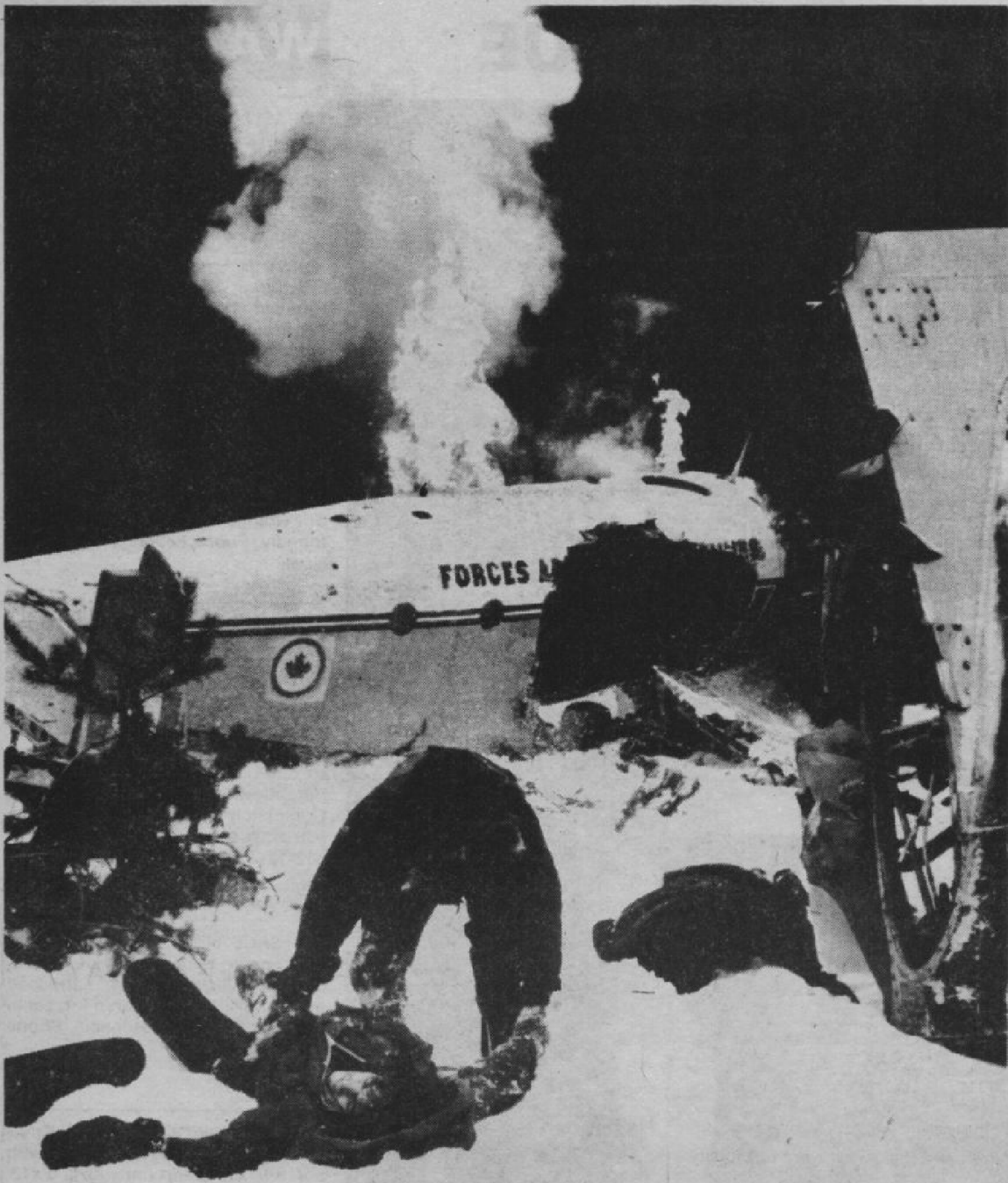
basketball, boxing, canoeing, cycling, diving, equestrian, fencing, field hockey, gymnastics, judo, modern pentathlon, rowing, shooting, soccer, swimming, team handball, track and field, volleyball, water polo, weightlifting, wrestling and yachting. As recognition plays a key part in the Games, all athletes receive a Silver Award of Achievement signifying they did take part. Athletes placing first in their event receive the Gold Award

of Excellence.

The Saskatchewan Department of Culture and Youth proposed the concept of the Western Canada Summer Games back in 1973. The other four Western governments unanimously agreed upon the idea and the first games were held in Regina in 1975. Once again, it is Saskatchewan good fortune to host the second-ever Western Canada Summer Games in Saskatoon, August 12th - 19th!

 **CBC " THE FIGHTING MEN "**

In this dramatic rescue scene from the CBC Film Festival presentation *The Fighting Men* (to be telecast Tuesday June 26 at 9 p.m. on the network) two Canadian servicemen who have been at bitter odds because of their different cultural backgrounds find that in order to survive in the wilderness after their plane crashes they must submerge their differences and work together. 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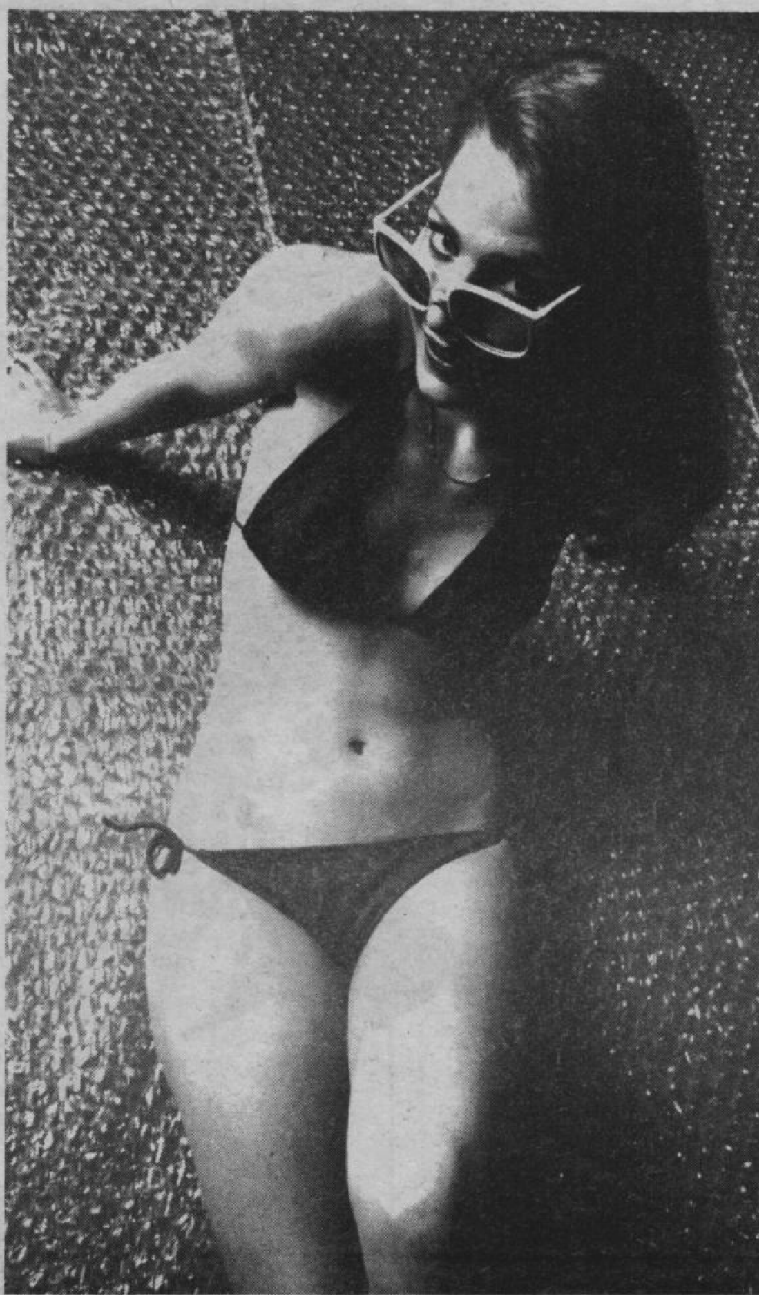
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
