100th ANNIVERSARY

WINNIPEG — Members of seven Manitoba cadet corps took part in a centennial parade and demonstration in Assiniboine Park at 1:30 p.m., Saturday (June 9) to mark the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the Army Cadet League in Canada.

Corps from Winnipeg, Portage la Prairie and Stonewall, including cadets from Morris, took part.

To mark the centennial event, Premier Sterling Lyon issued a proclamation in which he said that "it is in the public interest that the work of cadets and their leaders be given official recognition," and the "thoughtful observance" of Army Cadet Day "is commended to all citizens of the Province."

Reviewing officer at the Saturday afternoon parade and demonstration was the deputy commander of Air Command Headquarters in Winnipeg, Major-General K.J. Thorneycroft. Accompanying him was the president of the Manitoba Army Cadet League, BGEN Charles J. Hamilton, a Winnipeg insurance executive.

The Army Cadet League is designed to teach leadership, an appreciation of citizenship, an enhanced degree of physical fitness and such skills as orienteering and outdoorsmanship. Each cadet corps is sponsored by a community organization such as a Militia unit, a community club or branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Membership is open to boys and girls 13 years of age and older. Members who complete initial training are eligible to attend summer camps across Canada and, in some cases, in foreign countries. Manitoba currently has 17 cadet corps, comprising about 700 members.

Corps taking part in the "parade in the park" Saturday afternoon were No. 19 Royal Canadian Artillery Corps, Portage la Prairie; No. 407 Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada, Winnipeg; No. 526 Winnipeg Grenadiers; No. 122 Fort Garry Horse, Winnipeg; No. 2497 Winnipeg Service Battalion; No. 2825 Stonewall (Royal Winnipeg Rifles) and No. 270 Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

CF MEMBER WINS

OTTAWA(CFP)—A member of the Canadian Forces has won the Financial Management Institute (FMI) writing award for 1979.

He is MGEN John Tucker of Toronto, currently chief, financial services at National Defence Headquarters (NDHQ), Ottawa. He becomes the first Forces' member to win the annual FMI-sponsored

writing competition, based on financial management, open to members of the association.

The winning article - "A Practical Approach to Work Planning in the Public Service" - was judged on its thoroughness of research, originality and creativity of thought, materiality and relevance of contents, and clarity of expression.

The FMI, an affiliate on the Federal Institute of Management, is an association of federal government officials in the financial administration and auditing groups and others employed or interested in financial management in the public service.

At a joint meeting of the FMI and the Institute of General Manage-

ment held in Ottawa on May 9, MGEN Tucker was recognized for his achievement by being presented with an Olympic coin and \$100.00.

MGEN Tucker's article will be published in a forthcoming issue of the Bureau of Management Consultant's publication, Optimum.

Aerospace Systems Course 31 is completed. It started in September with a heavy academic workload but the academics tapered off after Christmas. Granted that the workload didn't - it just changed direction from pure academics to application. The tours of course sounded like enforced relaxation until the continuous travel, endless briefings and the long waits in so many terminals brought reality home. And summarizing information gleaned from so many sources in concise reports proved difficult to achieve in the first draft - or second - or ...

The course project was presented to LGEN MacKenzie, BGEN Veronneau and representatives of sponsoring agencies in a symposium on the 18 - 19 June, 79. The study of CF requirements for vertical take-off and landing aircraft over the next two decades was well received and discussion with senior officers who have reached different conclusions or even the same conclusions with different arguments was the culmination of the course. After the Generals listened to the technical presentations they crossed the technical "t" with a reminder of current fiscal limitations.

Postings follow the completion. The USAF exchange officer soon becomes MAJ Cimino, and stays on staff to instruct ASC 32, as does CAPT Malcolm. CAPTs MacLean and Noseworthy move a little farther away - to offices within Aircom. CAPTs McLaughlin and Sexton are going the farthest - to Greenwood on

the Aurora simulator and in Base Ops respectively. Ottawa will see the majority of the course graduates with CAPTs Benson and Elieff going to DAR, CAPTs Johnson and Steele to DAP, CAPTs McKay and Watkin to DAASE, CAPT Gauin to DEEM and CAPT Luke to DAEM. Cold Lake and AETE is not the cold shoulder some think it to be, but CAPTs Helsby and Robichaud and their families will come to terms with the place with the knowledge that CAPT Sponder went the other way to Colorado Springs for an exchange position with the USAF.

The Aerospace Squadron staff is undergoing its annual shuffle to ensure that all aspects will be covered next year. MAJ Sharpe is in Europe preparing for the EW course the Squadron will become responsible for, and Al Wetzel is attending the School of Instructional Technique. After having instructed for a year ... OJT you know ... Al was wondering what they were trying to tell him.

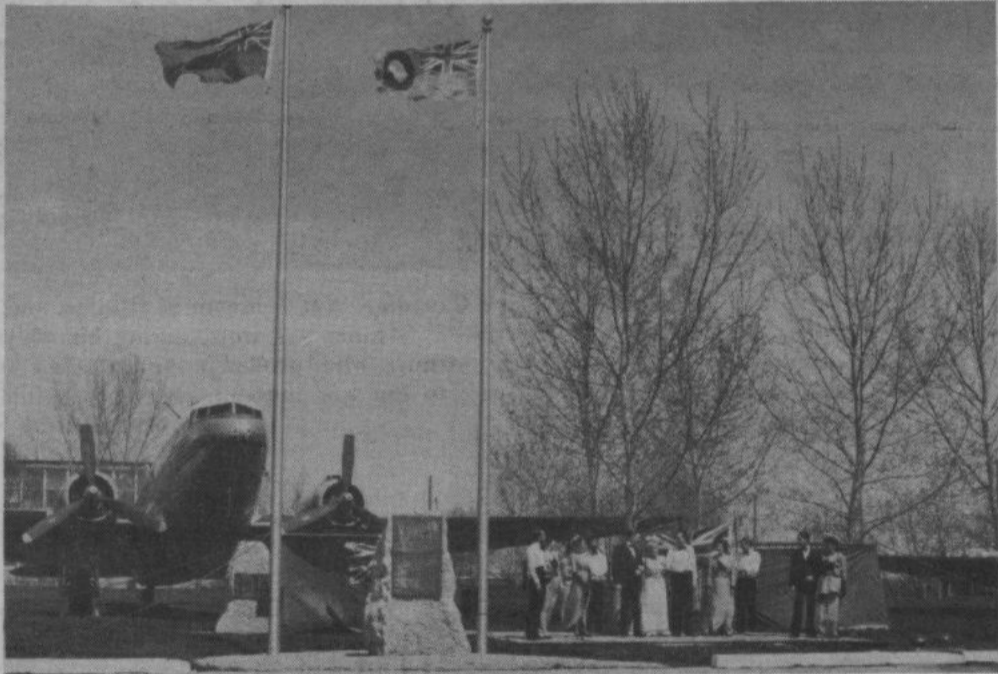
141 YEARS SERVICE

VISIT VENUS WITH BONEY M

The electronic voice welcomes the listener on the first flight to Venus. As the 'voice' counts down through ignition and liftoff, the background vocals blend in as the music starts. Boney M has arrived.

Maizie Williams, Liz Mitchell, Marcia Barrett and Bobby Farrell, better known as Boney M are probably the slickest produced, most imaginative group to hit the charts since KISS. Their music is smoothly textured with excellent counterpoint harmonies and incredible backing musically and electronically.

RASPUTIN

Boney M is the brainchild of producer Frank Farian who brought the members together and saw them go through the hit stages of "Daddy Cool", "Ma Baker" and their album "Love For Sale".

Their current album "Nightflight to Venus" (Atlantic KSD-50498 - marketed in Canada by WEA Music) is a testimonial to the brilliance of Farian and the individual members of Boney M.

After being one of the biggest groups in Europe, Boney M tackled the socialist world of the USSR. While they were prohibited from playing their runaway smash "Rasputin", the story of the Russian monk that rose to



political prominence under the Czar, the quartet managed to cut a swath through the red (no pun intended) tape and turn on Moscovites with a dazzling show that had them boogeying in the aisles. They did a turn away business throughout their Russian stint, but that's nothing new to Boney M they also did the same thing in Yugoslavia and Hungary, along with all of Europe, the Middle East and Africa.

EXPLOSIVE

Boney M is as explosive on wax as they are on stage and their "Nightflight to Venus" is an example of their blow you away talents. Opening with the "Venus" track, Boney M segue into the "Rasputin" story and groove their way through "Painter Man" and "He Was A Steppenwolf".

Somewhat surprising is their disco version of Roger Miller's classic "King Of The Road". This cut is done with the female vocal lead while Bobby Farrell comes in on the chorus. Beautiful effect. They render their already proven hit "Rivers of Babylon" and use sound effects to good advantage as they take the listener on a trip through a "Voodoonight".

"Brown Girl In The Ring" is a happy-go-lucky tune that moves with an infectious beat and could be a hit in any format. Set rounds out with "Never Change Lovers in the Middle of the Night" and Neil Young's golden "Heart of Gold" which is opened with harmonica and then joined by solo lead and harmony vocals. One of the best albums of the year!!
