WARTIME AIRCREW REUNION

Winnipeg's Wartime Pilots' and Observers' Association is sponsoring another Commonwealth Wartime Aircrew Reunion, to be held in Winnipeg, September 18th to 21st, 1980, marking the 40th Anniversary of the Battle of Britain.

An outstanding evening of entertainment, to be held Friday, September 19th, is being planned in cooperation with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and the Philharmonic Choir. The theme is to be "Tribute". Commonwealth Wartime Aircrew salute the "Few" on the 40th Anniversary of the Battle of Britain.

This will be the third such affair convened at Winnipeg by the Wartime Pilots. It is expected that the 1980 Reunion will top the previous two by a considerable margin, and Winnipeg hotels and other businesses may find themselves catering to 4,000 or 5,000 Reunion registrants.

EDITORS COMMENTARY

On 8 November, the Western Canada Aviation Museum accepted the last aircraft registered to the TransAir Ltd fleet, as a lasting reminder of the Company's long history in Canadian aviation. The Aircraft, a deHavilland DH-82C 'Tiger Moth' registration C-GTAL and painted in TransAir colors, was rebuilt by Winnipeg-based staff of the soon to be merged companies — Pacific Western and TransAir.

If you would like to have SEC 5 on your records and PER, or if you have been away from school and would like to get back into the stream, consider Grade 12 equivalency testing.

General Education Development (GED) testing is administered by the Province of Manitoba Department of Education, and examines your reading skills and knowledge in 5 subject areas. Take advantage of this opportunity while you are here, not all provinces offer this program.

It only costs \$10.00 to write these tests which are held periodically at a number of locations in Winnipeg.

The next GED test sitting is the 7th and 8th of March 1980. Deadline for application is 22 February, and now is the time to begin your preparations.

SAFE DRIVING - THE POSITIVE CHOICE

Cars, trucks, buses, motorcycles and bicycles are part of our daily lives. Reliance on them to meet our transportation, commerce and recreational needs is unquestionable. Its been that way for a long time and in spite of energy problems it will stay that way for a long time to come.

There are hundreds of different makes and models of vehicles of various types of the road with an endless variety of human beings to drive them.

Traditional groupings such as the "young", "middleaged" and the "senior citizen" are far too broad to indicate the kinds of individual differences that have a direct bearing on driver capability and performance. For example, is the eighteen year old any more or less likely to be a good driver than the forty-eight year old if they are both beginners. Maybe yes, maybe no, but one thing is certain, its not age alone that makes the biggest difference.

To start us thinking, one should ask oneself the question, "Is my driving behaviour the same every day"? Or for that matter, "Are my attitudes toward other drivers and my level of skill as good at 6 PM or 11 PM as they were at 8 AM.

The qualities of a good driver are abundant and diverse. Some of the safest drivers on the road are the people who drive as a profession on all roads, at all hours and in all weather conditions. Like other professionals, their knowledge and skills are continuously improved through experience and training.

- A good driver must have:
 - Knowledge of traffic laws and regulations.
 - Knowledge of defensive driving practices and techniques.
 - Driving skills.
 - A vehicle that is mechanically fit and safe to drive.
 - Good physical and mental health within statutory bounds.

A positive attitude.

All of these are critical to safe driving but the most important ingredient is the driver's attitude. Even if a person rates high in all other good driver qualities, a poor or negative attitude could be disastrous.

Drivers are regularly exposed to circumstances that may effect their attitudes (good or bad) towards others. Here are just a few:

- Are we distracted by aches and pains?
- Is there some personal problem occupying our thoughts?
- Are we physically or mentally fatigued?
- Are we angry (about anything)?
- Before leaving for work was our association with others pleasant or unpleasant?
- Was it a good or bad day at work?
- Have we had too much to drink?
- How do we react to another driver who makes a driving error or is downright rude?
- The extent to which driving behaviour is influenced by these and other pressures should not be overlooked. We've all experienced at least some of them.

The following situations are examples of how social or personal pressures can affect driving behaviour:

- A dangerous driving manoeuvre because of pressure.
- The family man who takes a chance on driving home from a cocktail party after drinking one too many.
- The mother who is taking the children to the dentist but doesn't buckle up the kids because she is late for the appointment and besides they are being noisy and troublesome.
- The young drivers who say, "Lets see how fast this thing will go".
- The macho types who want to show-off the acceleration of their shiny machines and scream ahead

before the red signal turns green.

An exchange of insulting and abusive language and gestures, perhaps with violence, stemming from a minor accident.

Let's be honest! It's not easy to be an alert, patient and courteous driver all the time. Anyone who drives has experienced frustration. However, if we are consciously aware of the need to control anger, to recognize potential pitfalls, and to understand the defences, then we will be able to act in positive ways to prevent dangerous conflicts.

Qualities such as courtesy, alertness and obedience to the law are critically important for the safety of all.

Remembering at all times the definition of Defensive Driving. "Defensive driving is driving to prevent accidents in spite of incorrect actions of others and adverse conditions".

"A preventable accident is one in which you failed to do everything you reasonably could have done to prevent it."

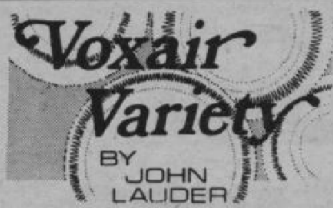
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QUEENS OF THE SKY

Audiences normally do not go to the theatre just to admire the scenery, but in the case of the current Manitoba Theatre Centre play, *Artichoke*, maybe they should. The stark beauty of the prairies is captured by designer Richard Roberts, who manages to crowd two farmsteads on the single stage, and yet evoke that feeling of endlessness found five miles outside of any prairie city. As the Bard says "the play's the things", and it should be so, but here the set is the prime thing.

Joanna Glass, the Saskatchewan author, who now wisely lives in New England, is a fine Canadian writer of one act plays. Here two short plays *Canadian Gothic/American Modern*, shown here some years ago, are two of the best ever of their kind. When she goes for a full length show, several acts, the action tends to bog down and in this instance tire the audience with one-line gags. The initial comedy became so overwhelmed by drama that the audience did not know whether to laugh or cry, so opted for the laughter.

Usually, MTC shows have fine leads and not always good minor players. In this case the minors came through the best — possible because they had the best lines. Walter Flanagan and Walter Massey, who acted as a Wayne and Shuster Greek chorus, got a lot of laughs. They initially spelled out the story, and became unwilling participants in the family problems of their neighbours. Not so good were the two principals, Patricia Hamilton as the frustrated farm wife, and John-Peter Linton as the going-over-the-hill academic, who seemed to be working too hard to portray the somewhat cardboard characters they represented. As both these actors have appeared here in other roles, and demonstrated great skill, the blame may in part be put on the author.

Canadian plays, particularly those with a prairie setting, are rare, and this one does make a noble attempt to provide a picture of life on the wheat farm. As in Mr. Shakespeare's plays, there were a few anachronisms. In this day of hydro and waterworks, I would doubt if windmills and kitchen pumps would be found on farms in the 70s, and the family Mercedes or Caddy would be the transport rather than taxis. Even in Winnipeg it is hard to get a taxi at times.

The first night crowd laughed and applauded long and loud, so maybe my view as a one-time prairie farm boy is out sync. Go and see this play, if only to enjoy the ingenious settings and lighting arrangements.

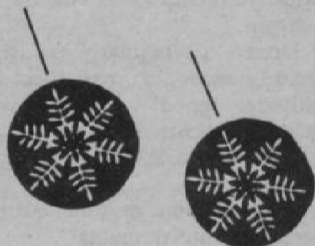

MAJOR RAOUL LUFBERY

When the U.S. entered the war, Americans in the French/American volunteer group, the *Lafayette Escadrille*, were transferred into the new U.S. Air Service. Raoul Lufbery, one of the *Escadrille's* most colorful aces, was commissioned as a major. At the time of his transfer, he had a confirmed score of 17 enemy airplanes. His friends believed his true score to be closer to 40 since many of his opponents had fallen too far behind enemy lines to be confirmed.

Early in 1918, Lufbery was given command of the 94th Aero Squadron, then the 95th Aero Squadron. He led the first flight of USAS fighters over the front lines in March and continued to go out on patrols regularly until his death on May 19. On that day, Lufbery took off in pursuit of an Albatros reconnaissance airplane over the Nancy area. He was hit in the ensuing fight and his Nieuport flamed. Preferring to jump rather than burn, Lufbery leaped to his death in the village of Maron, France.

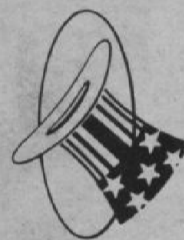


CAPTAIN EDWARD V. RICKENBACKER

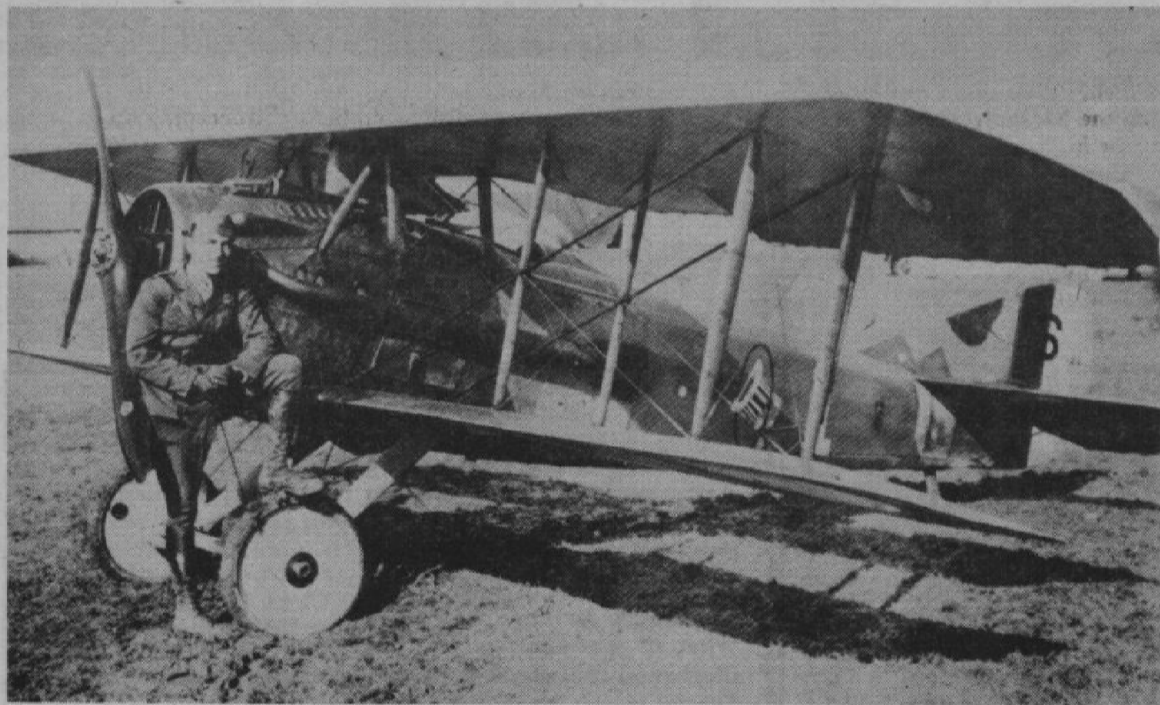
Eddie Rickenbacker was famous long before he learned to fly. Before the war, he was one of America's top race car drivers. In 1914 he set a world's speed record of 134 mph in his Blitzen-Benz racing car.

Meeting General Pershing in Washington, Rickenbacker accepted Pershing's invitation to enlist and go to France as his chauffeur. After several months with Pershing, Rickenbacker transferred to the Aviation Instruction Center at Tours, France. In a very short time, he soloed and was assigned to the 94th Aero Squadron. On March 19, 1918, he accompanied Raoul Lufbery on the first American sortie over enemy lines.

At war's end, Rickenbacker had been in combat less than a year, but he had accumulated scores faster than any other U.S. pilot except Frank Luke. Claiming his first victory in April, he was an ace by the end of May. At this point he was afflicted with a serious ear infection and was withheld from combat until September. During the last two weeks of September he downed six aircraft. For this he received the Medal of Honor and on September 25 was given command of the 94th Squadron. When the war ended, Rickenbacker had downed four balloons and 22 aircraft to become America's leading ace and most celebrated hero of World War I.

ARMY CADETS CELEBRATE CENTENNIAL

OTTAWA—Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps across Canada will be celebrating their centennial 28 November with a variety of commemorative events.

Prince Phillip, Colonel-in-Chief will issue a special Order of The Day and the Governor General will attend an open house at the Ottawa Garrison 1 December. In addition, the Lieutenants-Governor of New Brunswick and Quebec have declared Army Cadet Week. Other events including Freedom of the City parades, open houses, presentation of souvenir scrolls and albums have taken place since summer and will continue through the year.

The Royal Canadian Army Cadets (RC Army C) originated in 1879 under Militia General Order Number 18 which authorized the formation of "Associations for Drill in Educational Institutions" for young men over 14 years of age.

Modern cadet units were begun in

1898 when an agreement was reached with Ontario and the designation "Cadet Corps" was used for the first time. In 1909, Lord Strathcona, then High Commissioner for Canada in Great Britain, became interested in promoting cadet training in Canada. He established a trust fund to teach military drill and rifle shooting and foster patriotism to instil in youth that the first duty of a free citizen is to be prepared to defend his country.

During the First World War the cadet movement thrived and 40,000 ex-cadets voluntarily enlisted. After the war however, a period of apathy existed and the cadet movement suffered.

In 1942 the title "Royal" was conferred by His Majesty King George VI and the designation Royal Canadian Army Cadets was authorized. By the end of the Second World War a total of 115,000 cadets were enrolled and a survey indicated

that more than 124,000 ex-cadets had volunteered to serve their country with the Navy, Army, Air Force and Merchant Marine.

Following the war the RC Army C underwent changes to improve the training and equipment of cadets. Recently a new uniform was introduced, and girls were officially allowed into the movement.

The history of the RC Army C is still being made and the movement continues to provide a challenging and rewarding experience for Canadian youth. It is also succeeding in its aim to develop the attributes of good citizenship and leadership and promote physical fitness and stimulate interest in the Canadian Forces.

The Royal Canadian Army Cadets are proud of their heritage and strive to uphold the motto "ACER ACERPORI" (AS THE MAPLE...SO THE SAPPLING).



"Is Everything All Right"

There was a time when Winnipeg restaurateurs considered it de rigeur to feature waiters with European accents, who could intimidate you if you ordered the wrong wine. I suppose this was to give the place a continental flair. Those who couldn't afford the imports or didn't have an image to uphold blatantly hired high-school kids who wore blue jeans and were innocents when it came to serving food. They would be friendly enough as they reached across in front of your face and plonked down a dish you hadn't ordered. "There you go," was their standard expression, served with a smile. Later, they were taught the other standard phrase with which to treat the clientele: "Is Everything All Right?" This is not always inflected in tone as a question, but more the way one says, "How are you," as one hurries through a revolving door greeting an acquaintance who will be lost to sight in a second (or like the "have a nice day", automatically offered to each customer at the supermarket cash register). I am not sure they really want to know whether everything is all right, or that they expect anybody to take them up on it and say, "No, everything is NOT all right," when it isn't.

I clench my teeth every time a waiter confronts me with his "Is Everything All Right." I wish they would at least vary the wording a bit, so it would sound more sincere: "Is the soup satisfactory?" they might say, or "Did you like the salad?", or "Is it adequate? Acceptable? Agreeable? To your taste? Okay?" But only once, please.

There is a new breed of waiters now in some restaurants. These people are unashamedly Canadian and apparently trained here. They have no Parisian accent, but they know the rules of serving a meal properly.

We had dinner at *Matheos* in Charleswood recently; it was our first time there. Our waiter was a model of politeness and expertise in handling orders and dishes — serving food from the right and clearing away from the left. Obviously he was a recent graduate from a school of restaurant art and craft. Mind you, he must have had some early on-the-job training in one of the minor steak houses, because every time he set down a plate or a glass or a bowl — impeccably in the proper place — he said, "Here you go, Ma'm."

Matheos is a pleasant dining spot. The tables are spaced well apart and focus on the fireplace in the centre of the large dining room. Stone slabs alternate with wood panels on the walls, but there is no pretense of imitating a particular style. The effect is just that of a warm, comfortable place to eat, without too much togetherness with the people at the next table.

Steaks, ribs, and seafood are the proclaimed specialties of the house, but the menu also lists a few Greek dishes. Whenever I find it on a menu, I order *souvlaki* (shish kebab). Even though this is a Greek specialty, you don't compare the *souvlaki* you get in a Winnipeg restaurant to the *souvlaki* you ate in a Greek taverna: you compare it to the *souvlaki* you had in other Canadian restaurants. The reason is that during the tourist season, Greek tavernas string any kind of meat that is handy on a skewer and turn out *souvlaki* in large batches, feeding the curiosity and appetites of hungry tourists, whom they never see again. As a result, the quality varies.

The local restaurants specializing in ethnic dishes, on the other hand, have to try harder to please the palates of a discriminating and demanding clientele of sophisticated gourmets, and so they out-pizza the Italians and out-chop-suey the Chinese. This is why you also get such super *souvlaki* in some Winnipeg restaurants. Some use only choice pork loin, others make it with lamb. *Matheos* chooses beef tenderloin, with a special blend of spices. It was one of the best *souvlakis* I have ever eaten — this side of Athens or anywhere in Greece — and my dinner companion concurred. It was served with a generous amount of well-prepared rice and fresh beans and carrots — simply delicious. Unfortunately, they have given up stocking the Greek *Retsina* wine that goes so well with Greek food, but they say they had too many comebacks on that. (*Retsina* is a wine for which one develops and cultivates a taste gradually and slowly — the first time it tastes like pine-needles soaked in turpentine to some people).

The claim chowder that started the meal was delicately seasoned, and I was pleased to find that the chef makes his own savory dressing to complement the tasty mixture of his salad. After all these palatable morsels, there was no room for dessert, but we settled back for a leisurely cognac and liqueur, respectively.

A restaurant should not be judged by its minor imperfections, such as the wine is a degree or two too warm, or that the Grand Marnier is served in brandy snifters, but by the quality of the food and the service.

Assessed in that spirit, *Matheos* is a fine restaurant to go back to — it is at 3227 Roblin Boulevard — even if the waiter did come around three times to ask: "Is everything all right?"

Dylan's Slow Train On Hit Track

Born Robert Allen Zimmerman, Bob Dylan is probably the one man who shaped the course that popular music took. Born in Duluth, Minnesota, Dylan dropped out of university to become a folk singer. He moved to New York in 1960 and after being discovered and signed to Columbia gave his first concert in the Carnegie Recital Hall to slightly more than 50 people. By contrast, he recorded his recently certified platinum album "Budokhan" in front of thousands of people.

Dylan is as close to a legend as there is to be found in pop music. He has written some of the biggest hits ever, including "Blowing In The Wind", "Mr. Tambourine Man" and numerous others. Backed by The Band (once known as Levon and the Hawks when they backed Ronnie Hawkins) he tours so successfully and as he said in 'the times they are a changing' Dylan was an acoustic folkie who plugged in, switched on and went electric. He changed his styles through "Highway 61 Revisited", "Blonde on Blonde", "Nashville Skyline" and "Blood On The Tracks". He was involved in a motorcycle accident, in which he was thought to have suffered a broken neck. Last year



he released an almost four hour movie "Renaldo and Clara" and people still talk about his Rolling Thunder Revue.

I suppose it's all preamble and you're only as good as your last record. Well Dylan's last record at "Budokhan" was excellent and this time around he's flying with "Slow Train Coming" (Columbia FC 36120).

Bob made one of his extremely rare TV appearances recently on Saturday Night Live and sang the lead off track to his "Slow Train", "Gotta Serve Somebody".

Backed by Barry Beckett on keyboards and Dire Straits members Pick Withers (drums) and Mark Knopfler (guitar), the Muscle Shoals Horns and Tim Drummond on Bass with background vocals by Carolyn Dennis, Helena Springs and Regina Havis, Dylan has put together a compelling set of self penned tunes.

The nine song set runs the musical gamut from "Precious Angel" and "Slow Train" through "Gotta Change My Way Of Thinking", "When He Returns" and "Do Right To Me Baby".

Highlight of the set is the lead-off track "Gotta Serve Somebody".

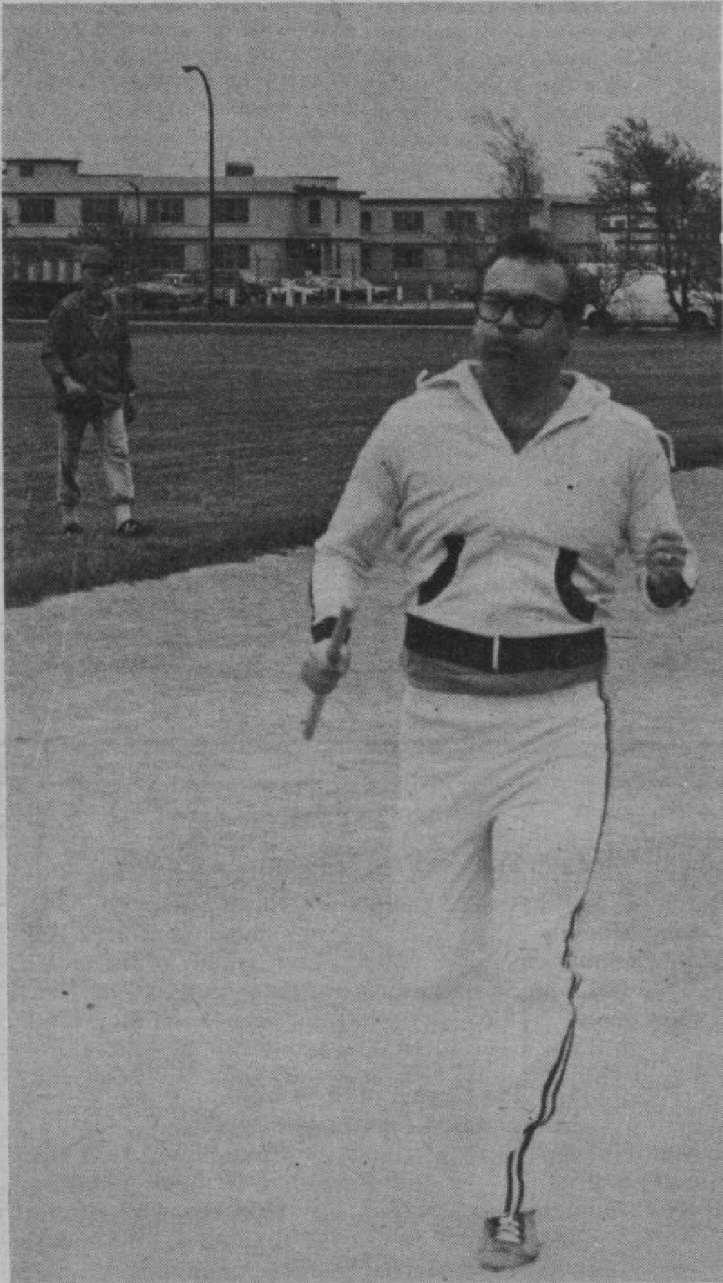
