OTTAWA (CFP) — Prime Minister Pierre E. Trudeau has announced the appointment of Lieutenant-General Ramsey M. Withers, 49, of Toronto, as Chief of the Defence Staff and his promotion to the rank of general as of May 31.

He replaces Admiral Robert H. Falls who steps down from Canada's top military post on July 1st to become Chairman of NATO's military committee at NATO headquarters in Brussels, Belgium.

LGEN Withers attended Canadian Services College, Royal Roads, Victoria, and Royal Military College, Kingston from which he graduated with an electrical engineering diploma in 1952, and was commissioned in the Canadian Army.

As a member of the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals, he served in the Korean theatre with the 25th Canadian Infantry Brigade Group and 1er bataillon Royal 22e Régiment remaining until shortly after hostilities ended in 1953.

He then attended Queen's University, Kingston, obtaining a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering. Following graduation, he served first with the Royal Canadian School of Signals, then with The Royal Canadian Dragoons as their signals officer at Camp Petawawa, near Ottawa, and later in West Germany.

After completing Staff College at Kingston in 1961, LGEN Withers returned to West Germany to serve as a staff officer at Headquarters, 4 Canadian Infantry Brigade Group, Soest.

Following the completion of Joint Servicers Staff College in England in

February, 1964, he assumed command of 6 Signal Squadron, Camp Valcartier, Que.

He joined the integrated staff of the newly-formed Mobile Command Headquarters, Longueuil, near Montreal in August, 1965 and was promoted lieutenant-colonel the following April. His next move was to Canadian Forces Headquarters in Ottawa, where, in December, 1968, he was promoted colonel and appointed director, policy co-ordination and control.

In May, 1970, LGEN Withers was promoted brigadier-general and became the first officer enrolled after the Second World War to attain that rank. He was also appointed the first commander of the new Northern Region, with headquarters in Yellowknife, N.W.T.

After serving as director-general management information systems at National Defence headquarters in Ottawa, he was promoted major-general and named associate assistant deputy minister, policy. Command of Canadian Forces Europe, with headquarters in Lahr, West Germany followed in July, 1976.

He was promoted lieutenant-general June 15, 1977, returning to Ottawa on his appointment to vice-chief of the defence staff in early July.

LGEN Withers was appointed to the Order of Military Merit in the grade of Commander by the Governor-General, in December, 1977, in recognition of conspicuous merit and exceptional military service.

NOUVEAU CHEF DE L'ÉTAT-MAJOR DE LA DÉFENSE

OTTAWA (PFC) — Le premier ministre Pierre E. Trudeau a annoncé la nomination du lieutenant-général Ramsey M. Withers, âgé de 49 ans et originaire de Toronto, comme chef de l'état-major de la Défense et sa promotion au grade de général, à compter du 31 mai.

Il succède à l'amiral Robert H. Falls au poste le plus prestigieux de la hiérarchie militaire du Canada; ce dernier assumera à compter du 1er juillet la présidence du comité militaire de l'Otan, au siège de cet organisme, à Bruxelles (Belgique).

Le lieutenant-général Withers fréquente d'abord le Collège militaire Royal Roads de Victoria; en 1952, il obtient un diplôme en génie électrique du Royal Military College de Kingston et reçoit son brevet d'officier dans l'Armée canadienne.

En qualité de membre du Corps des transmissions royal canadien, il sert en Corée auprès du 25e Groupe-brigade d'infanterie et du 1er bataillon du Royal 22e Régiment jusqu'à la fin des hostilités, en 1953.

Il obtient par la suite un baccalauréat ès sciences (génie électrique) de l'Université Queen's. Il est affecté ensuite à l'École du Corps des transmissions royal canadien, puis au Royal Canadian Dragoons en tant qu'officier des transmissions et plus tard, en Allemagne de l'Ouest.

En 1961, au terme de ses études au Collège d'état-major de l'Armée canadienne de Kingston, le lieutenant-général retourne en Allemagne de l'Ouest en qualité d'officier d'état-major, au quartier général du 4e Groupe-brigade d'infanterie canadienne, à Soest.

Après avoir terminé le cours du Collège interarmes d'état-major, en

Angleterre, en février 1964, il prend le commandement du 6e Escadron des transmissions au Camp Valcartier (Québec).

En août 1965, il est affecté à l'état-major de la Force mobile, qui vient d'être constitué à Longueuil, près de Montréal et il est promu lieutenant-colonel en avril, l'année suivante. Il passe ensuite au Quartier général des Forces canadiennes, à Ottawa, où, en décembre 1968, il est promu colonel et nommé directeur des politiques (coordination et contrôle).

En mai 1970, le lieutenant-général Withers est promu brigadier-général devenant ainsi le premier officier enrôlé après la Deuxième Guerre mondiale à être élevé à ce grade. Il devient par la même occasion le premier commandant de la nouvelle Région du Nord, dont le quartier général se trouve à Yellowknife (T.N.-O.).

de directeur-général des systèmes d'information gestionnelle, au Quartier général de la Défense nationale, il est promu major-général et nommé sous-ministre adjoint associé (politiques). Par la suite, en juillet 1976, il prend le commandement des Forces canadiennes en Europe, dont le quartier général est à Lahr en Allemagne de l'Ouest.

Il est promu lieutenant-général le 15 juin 1977 et revient à Ottawa comme vice-chef de l'état-major de la Défense, au début de juillet, la même année.

En décembre 1977, le lieutenant-général Withers s'est vu décerner par le gouverneur général le grade de commandeur de l'Ordre du mérite militaire, en reconnaissance de son insigne mérite et de son service militaire exceptionnel.

At present there are approximately 400 military personnel involved in the Recruiting organization. These 400 men and women could be classed as full-time recruiters. However, as of 29 February 1980 there were actually 80,294 recruiters in the Canadian Forces. 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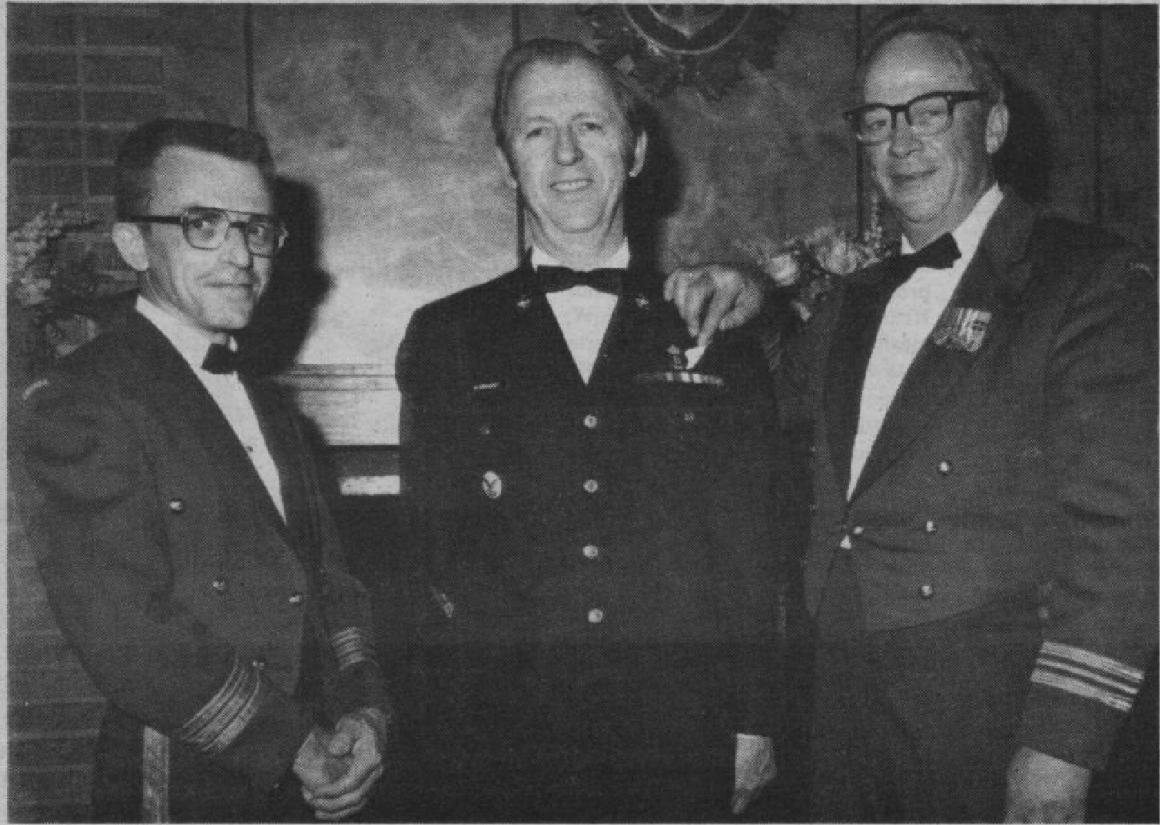

Voxair Variety

It is getting to be that time of year when the performing arts move outdoors to Rainbow Stage, the Assiniboine Park, and the resort areas on Lake Winnipeg. The Opera, and the Manitoba Theatre Centre gave us their final offerings of the season in late April, although MTC's Dracula will run until 17th May.

The opera was *Turandot*, the Italian version of life in Imperial China. Spectacular in setting, with a cast of thousands in very colourful costumes, this opera was enjoyed by full houses for all the three performances. Imported singers Galina Savova, Herman Malamood, Maria Pellegrini and the rest were all in fine voice, as was the local chorus. The ratio of coolies to mandarins in ancient China seems to have been very similar to that in the present-day Canadian Public Service, and director Irving Guttman is to be commended for the effective crowd scenes, and the controlled traffic flow on several levels of the stage at once. All in all, a fine ending for an interesting season of opera.

Equally fine was the final production of the Manitoba Theatre Centre. Some critics felt that *Dracula* had no bite, but to me the lack of bite was one reason for its success. After all, the movies can show close-ups of blood sucking activities, but the stage must project ideas and emotions. In spite of being based on a 1897 novel, via a 1927 play, the action was modern enough to keep the first night audience alert and awake, and the well designed magic efforts from Brian Glow, a Winnipeg magician, were excellent.

As always, the acting on the Main Stage was first-class. Frank Moore had a difficult part as the Count of the title, and made the best of his good-guy, bad-guy lines. Milton Selzer, always a fine performer here, came across as the solid Dutch professor who outwits the villain in the end. And Tom McBeath, as the lunatic who climbed up and down walls while devouring insects, got laughs every time he appeared. All the rest were more than adequate in their parts, while sets and costumes by Peter Wingate, were most fitting to the mood of the play. Ignore the critics, and listen to your friends, if tickets are available, get to see this final shot of live stage.

When Harry Belafonte moves out of the Concert Hall next week, the CBC Orchestra will move in for a concert conducted by Boris Brodt, with guest pianist Robert Silverman, on the 23rd. The CBC group will offer another concert on the 30th, this time with Ruben Gurevich as conductor, and violinist Chantel Juillet as guest. Meanwhile the O. Koshetz Memorial Choir will offer a Ukrainian tribute to the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra on 25th May. All three of these concerts go at 8:30 a.m., and are very reasonably priced.

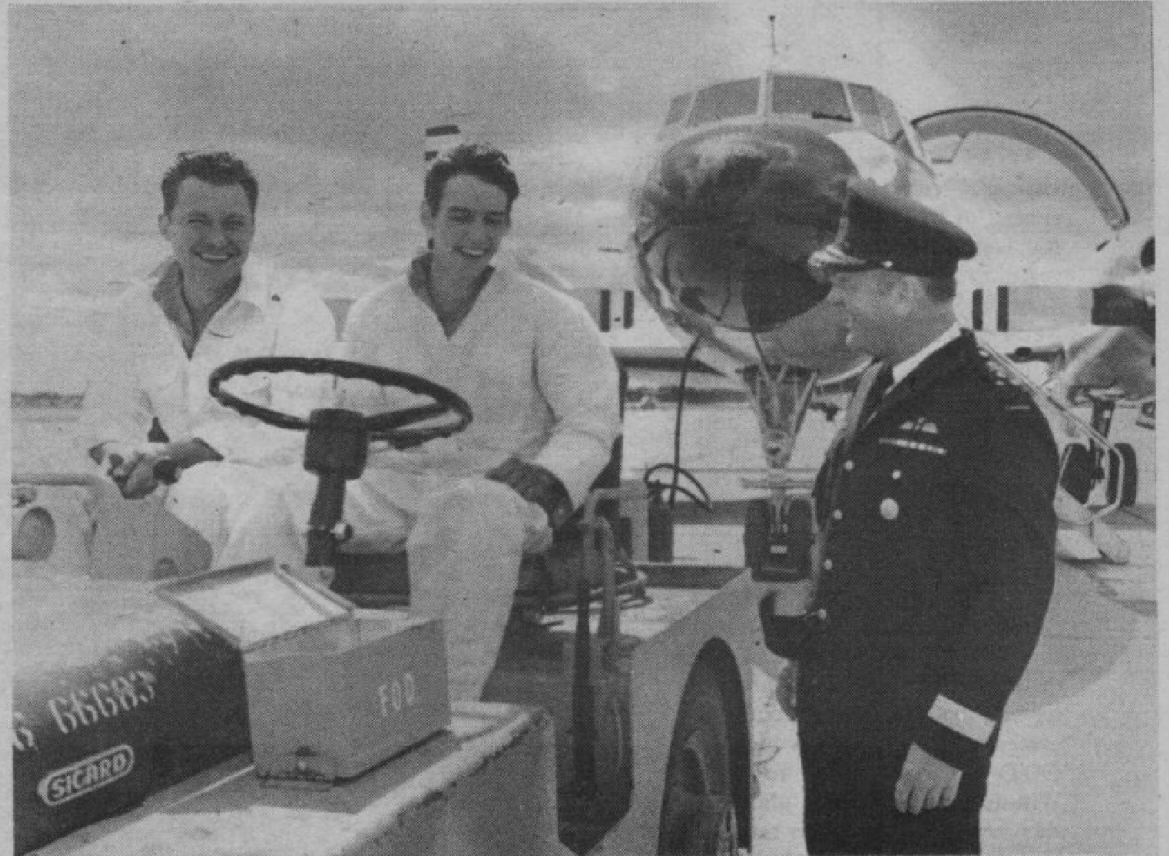

HEY! You Looking For Trouble? (by Barry Sweeney)

The latest band of merry rockers to emerge on the entertainment scene is, believe it or not, Toronto. As Westerners are just a little bit tired of hearing anything that smacks of Ontario, maybe they, like the rest of the country and parts of the States, will give a listen to a band that has a shot at the top.

The six member group (two girls, four guys) consists of Nicki Costello (bass); Jimmy Fox (drums), Sheron Alton (guitar); Scott Kreyer (keyboards); Brian Allen (guitar) and can you believe a name like Holly Woods, who sings some top notch lead vocals. The group is managed by Dixon/Propas/Ziner who also have The Raes, rockers Chilliwack and country/rocking Good Brothers in their talent stable.

Toronto, the name actually came about because two members of the group and all three members of the management firm are from that city, are somewhat reminiscent of Heart. Not just because of the up-front work of the females, (Heart has the Wilson sisters, Ann and Nancy) but,

some of the stylish guitar work of Sheron Alton and Ms. Woods' vocals are bound to conjure up certain comparisons. Toronto is actually a very talented band with abilities as musicians, vocalists and songwriters. There stage wise savvy was shown with a landslide of positive press coverage when they worked as opening act for Chilliwack during their recent 45 city tour.

The album "Toronto" (Solid Gold Records SCR 1000—marketed in Canada by A&M Records) is an impressive display of gutsy rock punctuated with rocking guitar riffs and counterbalanced with expressive emotional ballads. For a debut, Toronto are already miles ahead of numerous supposedly established acts.

The group opens with their latest single "Even The Score" which is a straight ahead rocker that fits nicely into the mainstream pop groove that features some slick production work by Bill Henderson and Brian MacLeod. Tune rocks out with a punchy flavor, but is heightened by a

smooth delivery and rounded out with good percussion. "You Better Run" uses a lot of keyboards and drums and Holly's lead vocals come across crystal clear, while "5035" is a tune that has the ingredients to jump out of the set and hit the charts. 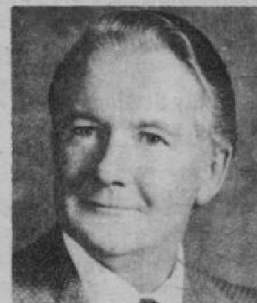

Vacation Travel

Manitobans planning vacation travel to the United States now have access to a new toll-free telephone number for advance information on U.S. holiday destinations and tourist attractions.

The number, 1-800-663-9278, connects callers with the InfoRoad USA office in Vancouver, operated by the United States Travel Service. Callers will be able to obtain, from the InfoRoad counsellor, immediate and up-to-date information on travel routes, destinations and tourist attractions in the United States. Maps, brochures and other literature are also available, at no cost, from the InfoRoad USA office.

The InfoRoad toll-free number will be in operation weekdays from 11 a.m. until 7 p.m., Manitoba time. InfoRoad only provides tourist information on United States and does not make travel bookings or reservations.

Visitors to the United States may also obtain advance travel information by writing: InforRoad USA, 3rd floor, 1199 West Hastings St., Vancouver, B.C. V6E 2Y4.

70th Naval Anniversary

OTTAWA — Regular and Reserve naval personnel across the country will mark the 70th anniversary of naval service in Canada this summer with many special events.

The anniversary marks the passing in Parliament of the Naval Service Bill on May 4, 1910, which gave birth to the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN). The Act established a permanent Naval force, a reserve and a volunteer reserve.

At Halifax, the anniversary will form a large part of the province's Super Summer 80. Most events there are scheduled for the first week in July highlighted by the Nova Scotia Tattoo which this year has a naval theme with four consecutive daily performances. On July 3 the Canadian Navy will be granted the "Freedom of the City" by Halifax city officials. Following the presentation about 700 naval personnel with accompanying bands will march through the city, as several naval ships sail past the harbour, while Maritime Air Group aircraft based at Shearwater fly past in salute overhead. Saturday, July 5 is designated "Navy Day" with

"open house" at most naval establishments.

At the West Coast, with the main activities at Esquimalt, near Victoria, gala events are also planned. These include a Fleet Regatta on June 27, a marching pageant on June 29, a marching pageant on June 29, plus participation in Canada Day activities, a day which will also be designated as Armed Forces Day in the area. To better acquaint the public with Canada's naval forces, a six-day "open house" of a West Coast destroyer alongside in the inner harbour at Victoria will be observed.

Reserve Naval Divisions across Canada, the Navy League of Canada and other naval associations will also be conducting special activities in local areas.

Earlier last month naval historians and ex-naval personnel gathered for a highly successful conference at Royal Roads Military College in Victoria where 17 papers covering the entire history of the RCN were presented to spur further historical research on this topic in this anniversary year.
