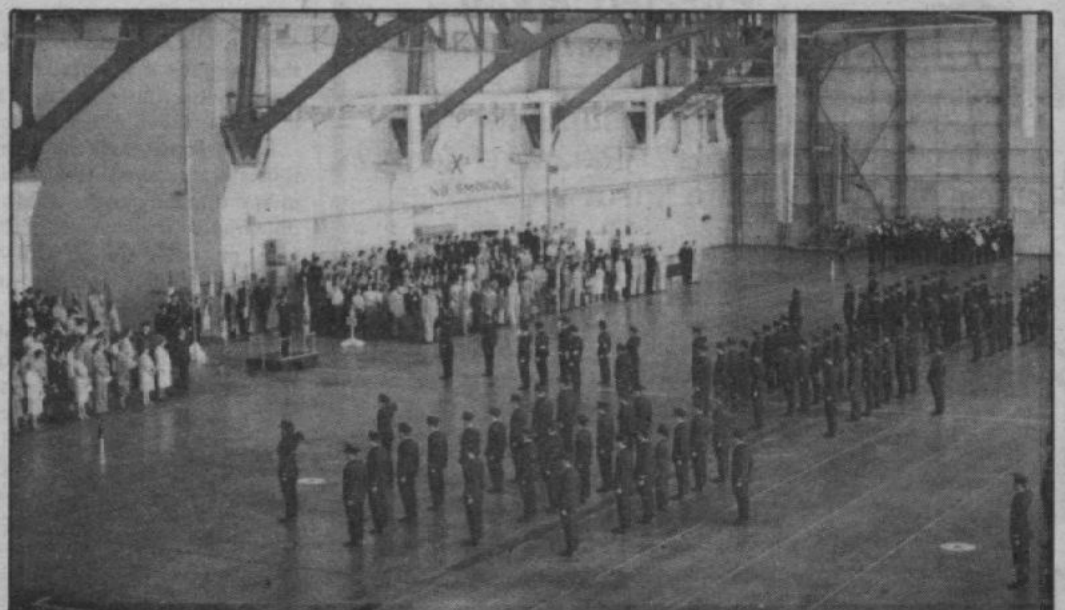

WINNIPEG—After serving his country in the armed forces for more than 30 years and having written millions of words to inform the Canadian public about the Canadian Forces, LCOL Carl L. Fitzpatrick began his terminal leave on July 20.

A frequent contributor to Sentinel Magazine and for several years the senior print news editor at defence information services at National Defence Headquarters, LCOL Fitzpatrick - better known as "Fitzzz" by his peers in the military and news media communities - began his military career at the age of 16 when he joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1943. His second World War experience included service on board HMCS Blairmore which performed minesweeping operations

off the coast of France in preparation for the D-Day invasion.

After the war, LCOL Fitzpatrick returned to his native Prince Edward Island where he completed his secondary education and proceeded to work for newspapers, radio stations and news wire services. But the military life was in LCOL Fitzpatrick's blood and in June, 1951 he rejoined Canada's armed forces, this time the Canadian Army. Following the completion of training at Armoured and Infantry Corps Schools at Camp Borden, Ont., and in various parts of Canada, he was transferred in October, 1952 to Army Headquarters, Ottawa, as a public relations officer. LCOL Fitzpatrick had now found his life's calling, a public relations/public

information officer in the armed forces. For the next 29 years LCOL Fitzpatrick served his country in this capacity.

During those 29 years he served in Korea (1953-54); Germany (1955-57); Egypt (1963-64) and South Vietnam (Jan-Jun 1973) as well as several tours in Ottawa, Gagetown and Winnipeg.

LCOL Fitzpatrick's final posting was in Winnipeg as the Senior Information Officer, Manitoba/Saskatchewan and Northwest Ontario Region.

LCOL Fitzpatrick and his wife, Nell, will remain in the Winnipeg area and pursue a second or third career.

Sovereign Viking

WINNIPEG—Kapyong Barracks, the home here of the 2nd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (2 PPCLI), is bristling with young soldiers carrying parkas, mukluks and toques. It's not a sign of an early winter for the Winnipeg area but rather that members of the unit are preparing to move approximately 2,500 kilometers north for the next two months.

2 PPCLI, supported by other regular and reserve units of the Canadian Forces, has been tasked by Mobile Command Headquarters, St. Hubert, Que., to conduct a Sovereign Viking Exercise near Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island from August 4 to October 10. The Sovereign Viking series of exercises are designed to develop concepts for arctic mechanized operations and to expose Mobile Command personnel to the expertise of northern people in the areas of survival and northern

technology. The first in this series of exercises was conducted in February and March, 1981 by the 12e Régiment blindé du Canada, the armoured regiment at Valcartier, Que.

MAJ G.A.P. (Pierre) LaChapelle, 2 PPCLI exercise commander, explained that his mission is to conduct a series of reconnaissance patrols in the high arctic utilizing M-113 armoured personnel carriers and CH-135 Twin Huey helicopters. In addition, the exercise commander and his staff will be providing support to biologists from St. John's Memorial University; the University of Windsor and Laval University, who will be studying marine and plant life on Cornwallis Island.

During the exercise, 2 PPCLI, a unit of 1 Canadian Brigade Group commanded by BGEN J.A. Cotter, will be supported by 1 Field Ambulance and 1 Service Battalion

from Calgary; 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron from Edmonton; the 1st Canadian Signal Regiment from Kingston, Ont., and members of militia units from the Atlantic Region, Montreal and Toronto.

Members of the Canadian Rangers, a sub-component of the Reserve Force, who are recruited for their vast knowledge of the area in which they live and for their special skills in arctic and sub-arctic operations, will be employed during the exercise as guides, interpreters and liaison officers with the local communities.

Exercise participants and their equipment, including armoured personnel carriers, will be transported to Resolute Bay by C-130 Hercules aircraft from 435 Transport Squadron, Edmonton and 436 Transport Squadron, Trenton, Ont. Weekly resupply flights will be flown by 429 Transport Squadron, Winnipeg.

Why Is My Pay

"Up"

And

"Down"

"My pay has been up and down for the past 12 months and outside of the Personal Exemption increase in January, UIC rebate in February, pay raise in April, MQ increase in May, Incentive in June, a fine in August, allotment in September, SDA/CS in October, a new Savings Bond in November and the SISIP increase in December, I just can't understand what you guys are doing!" Sound totally ridiculous? Does it sound familiar? Indeed it does, but it is also typical of the normal pay account.

As can be seen from the chart below, rarely does a month go by when there is not a change made to your monthly pay and allowances, and there are numerous reasons why your pay is Up and Down.

This article is not meant to be all inclusive, nor is it meant to discourage individual pay enquiries; but it is meant to give you some insight into the real world of the Pay Office and why your pay is rarely the same from one month to the next. As a rule of thumb adjustments to the Pay Accounts for various functions will be actioned as indicated below:

- a. Pay Incentives—are usually reflected in your pay in the month following the month in which the incentive is due;
- b. Promotions—are actioned to the pay account in the month the BOR takes UPDT action (the pay office reacts only as a result of the UPDT entry) and should be reflected in your pay approximately three weeks later;
- c. Mess Dues—usually actioned to the pay account in the month the acquittance roll is received from the Messes;
- d. Credit/Debits actioned automatically by Computer-UIC credits/debits will usually be reflected in the Pay Guide when a new Computer Pay Guide is received from NDHQ and may reflect a two or three month CR/DR as applicable; and
- e. Time Lags—Approximately, a three week time lag exists from the time an entry is actioned to your pay account until that entry is reflected in your actual pay. It can further take one to four months for a particular transaction to be reflected in your next computerized Pay Guide which are forwarded to the Pay Office from NDHQ in January, May and September. The following chart reflects the month in which your pay should reflect a particular change.

If you are going on leave, or wish to change your banking arrangements, please give the Pay Office approximately three weeks notice as the payroll process begins approximately three weeks prior to each and every pay day.

If you should have a pay problem, come to the Pay Office in Bldg 84 and speak to your Section Finance Clerk. If you are not satisfied with His/ her answers ask to speak to the NCO i/c. Specific enquiries concerning a member's pay will not be conducted over the telephone.

Expanding Reserves

DUNDURN, Sask.—The Chief of all Canadian Reserve Forces said here Friday he would favor expanding the manpower strength of Militia, as well as Air and Navy Reserves, significantly as a way of providing for the nation's defence readiness during peacetime.

MGEN John Dunn, a Sherbrooke, P.Q., insurance broker in civilian life, said during an interview expanding Reserve strength beyond the current 21,372 positions for officers and men would be both economical and democratic as an approach aimed at beefing up this country's preparedness.

MGEN Dunn did not elaborate on the size of expansion he envisions or whether it will become federal government policy.

"A country such as ours can't afford a large, standing military force," MGEN Dunn said. "The next best thing is to increase Reserve strength and involve more young people as voluntary, part-time soldiers."

MGEN Dunn said he learned during a visit to Australia late last winter that Reserve forces in that country had been increased in size to 30,000 from 16,000 in one year. All earnings of Australian Reserve soldiers are income-tax exempt.

Doubling Reserve strength has been expected to take several years, according to initial Australian government plans, MGEN Dunn said. The tax exemption policy is largely credited with achieving the objective in only one year.

MGEN Dunn said a policy such as this would bring more young people in their early 20s into Reserve units. "The matter of earning \$2,000-3,000 tax-free a year makes a difference. And people in their early 20s are more likely to be in permanent jobs, married, with young families and in the process of buying a home. They are also more likely to stay with us for a longer time than what we are experiencing now."

Statistics revealed earlier by BGEN J.A. Cowan, Director-General of Reserves and Cadets at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa, indicated that 30-35 per cent of Reservists leave the service within two years of entering.

MGEN Dunn succeeded MGEN Richard Rohmer of Toronto earlier this year as Chief of Reserves of the Canadian Armed Forces.

Both MGEN Dunn and BGEN Cowan were in Dundurn in July to visit Militia units from the area between Thunder Bay and the British Columbia border, during their annual one-week summer exercise.

ROTP

WINNIPEG—First step leading to university degrees and careers as commissioned officers in the Canadian Armed Forces was taken by 22 selected young men from Manitoba and northwest Ontario in a Winnipeg ceremony, held Wednesday July 15 at HMCS Chippawa (51 Smith St.).

Before invited guests and parents, candidates were formally enrolled as officer cadets under the regular officer training plan (ROTP).

The plan, which provides the principal source of highly qualified future officers, particularly in the operational and technical fields, incorporates both military and academic training at Canada's three military colleges and at selected universities.

On July 16, the 22 new officer cadets went to Canadian Forces Base Chilliwack, B.C. for the basic officer training course. On completion of the course in late August, nine participants in the program will go to Royal Roads Military College, Victoria, B.C., eight to the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., and the remainder will attend either civilian universities or military colleges.

The attesting officer at Wednesday's enrolment ceremony was the Director of Personnel Careers Other Ranks at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa, Colonel J.A.R. Gardam.

CHANGE OF REGIMENTAL SERGEANT MAJOR PARADE

On 20 July 81, LCOL J.S. Bremner, Commanding Officer of the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, presided over the Change of Regimental Sergeant-Majors at the Unit. The ceremony saw CWO (RSM) G.R. Smith turn over to CWO (RSM) J.M. Clarke.

RSM Smith enrolled in the Canadian Army in 1953 as a member of the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada. Since then he has seen service in Korea, Cyprus and all parts of Canada both as a Queen's Own and later as a member of the PPCLI. Mr Smith served as the Regimental Sergeant-Major of 2PPCLI from 1979 to present. He will be leaving Winnipeg to assume the position of Brigade RSM at 1 Canadian Brigade Group Headquarters, CFB Calgary.

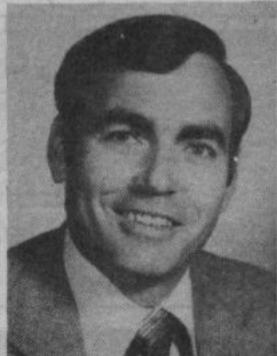

14 Training Group Inauguration

WINNIPEG—Ceremonies marking the inauguration of Air Command's 14 Training Group took place at Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg on Wednesday, August 5, at 2 p.m.

During the ceremonies, attended by the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, the Honorable F.L. Jobin, representatives of the federal, provincial and municipal governments and other dignitaries and invited guests, the Commander of Air Command, LGEN Kenneth E. Lewis, confirmed the appointment of BGEN Richard P. Pattee as the commander of the group.

The formation of 14 Training Group was announced last February by Defence Minister Gilles Lamontagne. 14 Training Group will have its headquarters in Winnipeg and will comprise those Air Command units which have air training, except operational training, as their primary function. These units include: Canadian Forces Bases Moose Jaw, Sask., Portage la Prairie, Man., Toronto and Winnipeg; the Canadian Forces (CF) Aircrew Selection Centre, Toronto; Central Flying School, Winnipeg; the CF Air Navigation School, Winnipeg; the CF School of Meteorology, Winnipeg; 3 CF Flying Training School, Portage la Prairie; 2 CF Flying Training School, Moose Jaw; 431 Air Demonstration Squadron (Snowbirds), Moose Jaw; the CF Survival Training School, Edmonton; and, the CF Junior Leader Schools at CFBs Penhold, Alta. and Summerside, P.E.I.

The Group has been designated 14 Training Group to establish a firm link with the past and carry forward a proud RCAF tradition. Following the Second World War, Canada undertook to train North Atlantic Treaty Organization aircrew personnel. This agreement required the reactivation of some training facilities in the Prairie Provinces and on August 1, 1951, No. 14 (Training) Group was formed to administer these facilities and to conduct and control the training on behalf of the RCAF. The Group performed its role with distinction for eight years until it was absorbed into the RCAF Training Command in 1959.

Among the honored guests attending Wednesday's ceremonies was a former commander of the RCAF's No. 14 (Training) Group, Air Commodore (ret'd) H.H.C. Rutledge, OBE, CD, of Ottawa.

Music for the occasion was provided by the Canadian Forces Central Band, Ottawa, under the direction of Major Derrek Stannard.
