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# THE END OF THE RAINBOW —

"It's not what I expected." "I want to return to school and finish my education." "I can use my trade on civvy street and make lots of money." Sound familiar? It does to section heads. These excuses are used over and over again on release requests. Why? Why does a young man leave the service after only one or two years? Poor management? Possibly in a small number of cases, but there are just too many leaving to blame it all on the bosses. Poor environment? Definitely not. The service offers better working conditions and better facilities than any civilian firm. But the blame must be placed somewhere. The buck must be passed. Where should the axe fall?

I feel that it should fall on society. Because Canadian society is ceasing to produce men. The age between puberty (about thirteen) and adulthood (about eighteen) is called adolescence. It is a period of adjustment. A time when the child finally becomes adult, the boy becomes a man. At least that's the way it used to be.

Ten years ago an eighteen year old joining the Armed Forces could be counted on to do a man's job. He recognized and accepted responsibility. He knew that to survive one must eat and to eat one must work. His average education was grade ten. He could read, write and count, but above all, he could think. Nobody coddled him through high school. His parents had not supplied him with a fat allowance weekly. He earned his way

with summer jobs. In short when he joined the service, he was prepared to work. He committed himself by contract to perform for a certain period of time and he honoured that contract. Society has produced a disciplined individual. In the last ten years parents and schools have failed miserably in producing a responsible, disciplined citizen. The sixties began a wave of permissiveness that has reached fantastic proportions. Urbanization, Industrialization, and inflation have caused more and more mothers to seek employment outside the home.

We have been warned by countless educators that discipline and learning do not go together. Our affluent society has produced piles of surplus cash. Our mass media has played up the good life way out of proportion. We have "Cradle to grave security", with higher baby bonuses, unemployment and welfare benefits, medicare, old age pensions, etc.

Society has provided the copouts, and parents and teachers have accepted them. It is much easier to raise children if you do not have to discipline them. It is much easier to teach children if you don't have to grade them, merely pass them on to the next plateau. Society has proclaimed that children should have the same rights as adults. Unfortunately, nobody has the time to instruct them on the use of those rights.

The end result — students graduate from high school with no understand-

ing of the work ethic, very little formal education, absolutely no sense of responsibility. Adolescence is a period when the youth requires guidance. He has been given none. He has been left to fend for himself. He lives the good life with no responsibility or discipline. His cash is handed over by guilty parents who don't have time for him in this fast-paced world. Until his school days are over he has no idea what work is. He has only a vague idea that it is part of living and so, "What the hell", let's give it a try.

So he joins the Canadian Armed Forces. All of a sudden money is not so plentiful, he has to rise at an early hour, he has to work five days a week, he has responsibility, and shock of all shocks, when he does not fulfill his responsibilities, he is disciplined.

For a youth to go to an ordinary civilian job is shock enough but to join the Armed Forces must be devastating. Because the Armed Forces wants men. We advertise for men and when a person signs up we expect a man.

So the recruit says, "It's not what I expected." Believe me, I've asked them just what do they expect. The closest I can come to an answer, is that most expect large pay raises, yearly promotions, jobs that they choose for themselves, and of course postings on demand. They do not expect to serve a period of apprenticeship doing routine tasks. They expect adventure. They have little or no reality about the working world.

So the recruit says, "I want to return

to school and finish my education." Why not? That is where he was safe. No decisions to make, money, clothes, and food supplied by parents and certainly no boring, routine work to do, or responsibility either, Childhood was safe, so back to childhood where the bad man can't yell at him. So the recruit says "I can use my trade on civvy street and make lots of money."

First, if he can get a job with his trade, yes, the money is invariably better. But promotions are scarce and apprenticeships are much longer than in the service. The routine he hates is endless, the adventure he craves is much more illusive if not totally lacking. If all it takes is money to make him a man, then he better grab the brass ring.

Some students realize that responsibility and self discipline are necessary to ensure a transition from adolescent to adult. Unfortunately, the ranks of those who care are dwindling. This is readily apparent in the modern Armed Forces.

For every three youths that enlist one is a man. The old saying used to be "Two out of three ain't bad," "It's now "One out of three if you're lucky." I fear for the 1980s.

To the young servicemen who have not realized it yet, the Canadian Dream is a television myth, there is no pie in the sky, the end of the rainbow is only a muddy piece of ground.

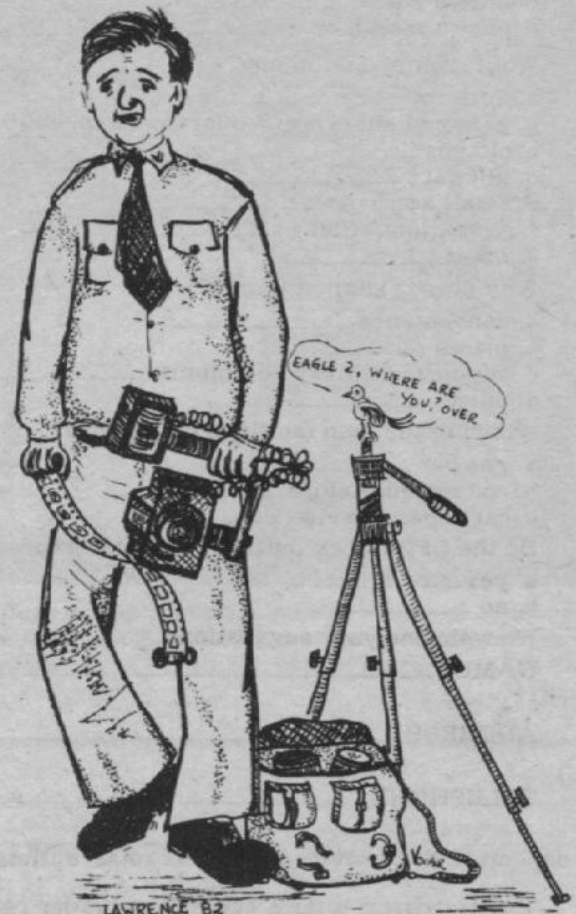

# BASE & STATION FUNDS

## General

- The Base/Station Fund is the local agency charged with the responsibility of administering all non-public property including the design, development and delivery of adequate facilities, services and programs to meet the needs of the total military community. The concept of a centralized Base Fund administering all non-public property, except that administered through messes, is governed by CFAOs.
- CFP 110 outlines the policy governing operation of Personnel Support Programs in the Canadian Forces. The principle employed in determining public and non-public areas of responsibility lies in the following rationale:
  - The Department of National Defence should provide Canadian Forces Personnel, their dependents and civilian residents on a Base with opportunities for positive health building recreation activities comparable with those provided from municipal or provincial government funds in progressive civilian communities;
  - Members of the Canadian Forces and residents of Married Quarters communities, as citizens should expect to provide from their own resources, those facilities and services not provided at the local government level to the citizens of a progressive Canadian community; and
  - The social, welfare and recreational needs on Canadian Forces establishments can be met most economically and effectively by planned and cooperative use of all available public and non-public resources.
- Base Funds have the following sources of non-public revenue:
  - Net profit from CANEX outlets;
  - A percentage of gross sales from all bar operations where the B Comd determines that such a levy is in the best interests of the community;
  - Direct charges, fees and levies related to activities, services and programs authorized by the Base Fund; and
  - Loans and grants from CFCF.

4. Additionally, Base Fund administers public fund grants and allowances such as the Physical Fitness Maintenance Grant, Library Grants and Band Grants, etc.

## Function

- Because of the unique nature and needs of each military location, it is not possible to give a specific definition of a Base Fund beyond that indicated at para 1. In general, however, the major activity of current base fund operations is in providing support to ensure that the level of services meets the needs of a military community in the following areas:
  - Municipal Services;
  - Military Sports Programs; and
  - Community Services.
- A representative tally of services could include any or all of the following with specific examples from virtually every Base in the CF:
  - existing facility upkeep and renovations;
  - development and construction of recreation and resale facilities;
  - payment of operating staff for recreational facilities and/or programs;
  - underwriting the cost of operation of recreational facilities during the formation organization period;
  - interest-free loans to clubs or organizations for capital expenses, renovations or major purchases;
  - common administrative services, eg clerical, financial accounting, etc.; and
  - providing guidance and direction for short and long term planning through the medium of the base fund budget.
- In addition to the CFCF assistance provided to CANEX and Messes the FY 80/81 Base Fund Capital Expenditure Program included support for 13 Recreation Facility projects valued at \$1,216,800 of which \$364,900 was in the form of CFCF loans. These projects included such items as outdoor swimming pools, recreation and community centres, bowling alleys, ski clubs and curling clubs.
- The following is a recapitulation of Base/Station Fund activity for FY 80:

**FIRE PREVENTION NEWS**

**LEARN NOT TO BURN  
 COULD YOU ESCAPE?**

Without taking time to think it over, could you name two ways out of each room in your house, especially bedrooms.

If not, start pre-planning for emergency escape in case of fire by working out an alternate exit from every room, such as a window leading onto a porch roof or directly above shrubbery which would break a fall.

Because most home fires breaks out at night, it's essential to hold back fires by sleeping with bedroom doors closed, to pre-arrange a signal which will arouse and alert the household, and to have a well rehearsed escape plan. Teach everyone to test for heat outside his bedroom by feeling the upper part of his closed door — IF the door seems hot, keep it closed, sound the alert, and immediately use a pre-planned alternate exit.

Keep exits free. People have a tendency to forget their back door, where an accumulation of snow would make it impossible to use in case of emergency.

Arrange for help in escaping for young children and aged or infirm persons. Decide on an outside meeting place where every one will go for a "HEAD COUNT". Plan to call the Fire Dept. from a neighbor's home, NOT from your own telephone if your house is on fire. "911"

Finally, impress upon everyone, especially the children, the need to strictly OBEY the rule "ONCE OUT, STAY OUT". No toy or treasure and not even the family pet is worth risking a human life in its rescue.

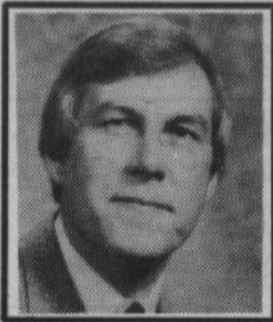

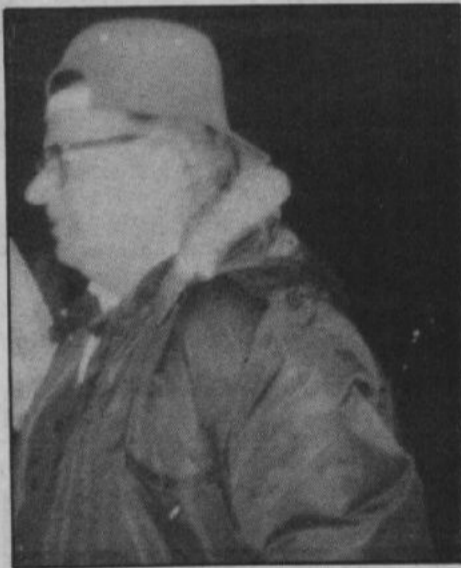
## SENIOR LADIES CURLING

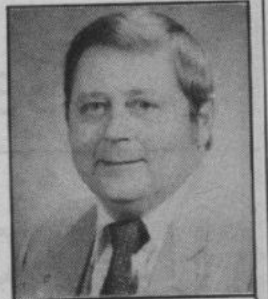
