



## BLACK DEVILS PREPARE FOR CENTENNIAL REUNION

Winnipeg — Manitoba Militia District Headquarters has announced that Governor General Edward Schreyer will be in Winnipeg on Friday, October 14, to attend the Grand Reunion of current and former members of the Royal Winnipeg Rifles. The Regiment, now part of the Canadian Armed Forces' Militia, is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year.

The celebrations culminate with a number of special events during the October 14 - 16 weekend, most of them at Minto Armoury, 969 St. Matthews Avenue.

Lieutenant Colonel R.E. Werry, Commanding Officer of the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, said this week observances will get underway at 7:30 p.m. October 14 when about 1000 members, veterans and guests assemble at the Armoury to start celebrating the Regiment's 100th birthday.

The Governor General is scheduled to arrive at Minto Armoury shortly before 9:00 p.m. to review the unit and greet former members of the Little Black Devils who served their country in the Regiment either in active wartime service or as part of the Reserve establishment.

The Governor General will also officiate at the reopening of the renovated and expanded Royal Winnipeg Rifles Historical Museum, located in the Armoury, and attend an official buffet dinner and reception following the ceremony at the museum.

Lieutenant Colonel Werry said more than 100 members of the Rifles will assemble again at 8:00 a.m. Saturday, October 15 for a final rehearsal of the Military Tattoo scheduled for 2:00 p.m. until 3:30 p.m. Saturday on the parade square of the Armoury.

One of the highlights of the presentation will be a performance of the precision drum line team of the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, a Regular Force unit permanently stationed at

Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg.

Other military delegations attending the Tattoo will include elements of the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada, Toronto, The Brockville Rifles, Brockville, Ontario, the Royal Regina Rifles, and the 92nd Winnipeg Light Infantry Commemorative Regiment, a ceremonial unit raised by special government permission through the initiative of a number of Edmonton and Calgary businessmen several years ago.

The Toronto unit will perform Pioneer and Skirmishers' drill, while the Brockville delegation will demonstrate crash action drills during the Centennial Tattoo, firing 106 millimetre recoilless anti-tank rifles.

Members of the Royal Regina Rifles are scheduled to give a mortar demonstration.

The 92nd Winnipeg Light Infantry Commemorative Regiment will parade in Victorian era period uniforms complete with Martine-Henry rifles and is to perform Victorian era drill.

A delegation of the Royal Winnipeg Rifles' British sister regiment, The Royal Green Jackets, will also attend the Tattoo.

The centennial regiment will hold its official Centennial Dinner and Ball at the Westin Hotel starting at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, October 15. About 800 guests are expected for the event, which will be attended by Lieutenant Governor Pearl McGonigal of Manitoba and her husband. Diplomatic or consular representatives from France, Belgium and The Netherlands will be at the dinner, symbolizing the three countries within whose borders the Royal Winnipeg Rifles fought during the Second World War.

Celebrations will close with a memorial church service at Minto Armoury parade square at 10:15 a.m. Sunday, October 15, followed by a farewell luncheon for veterans of the unit and their guests.

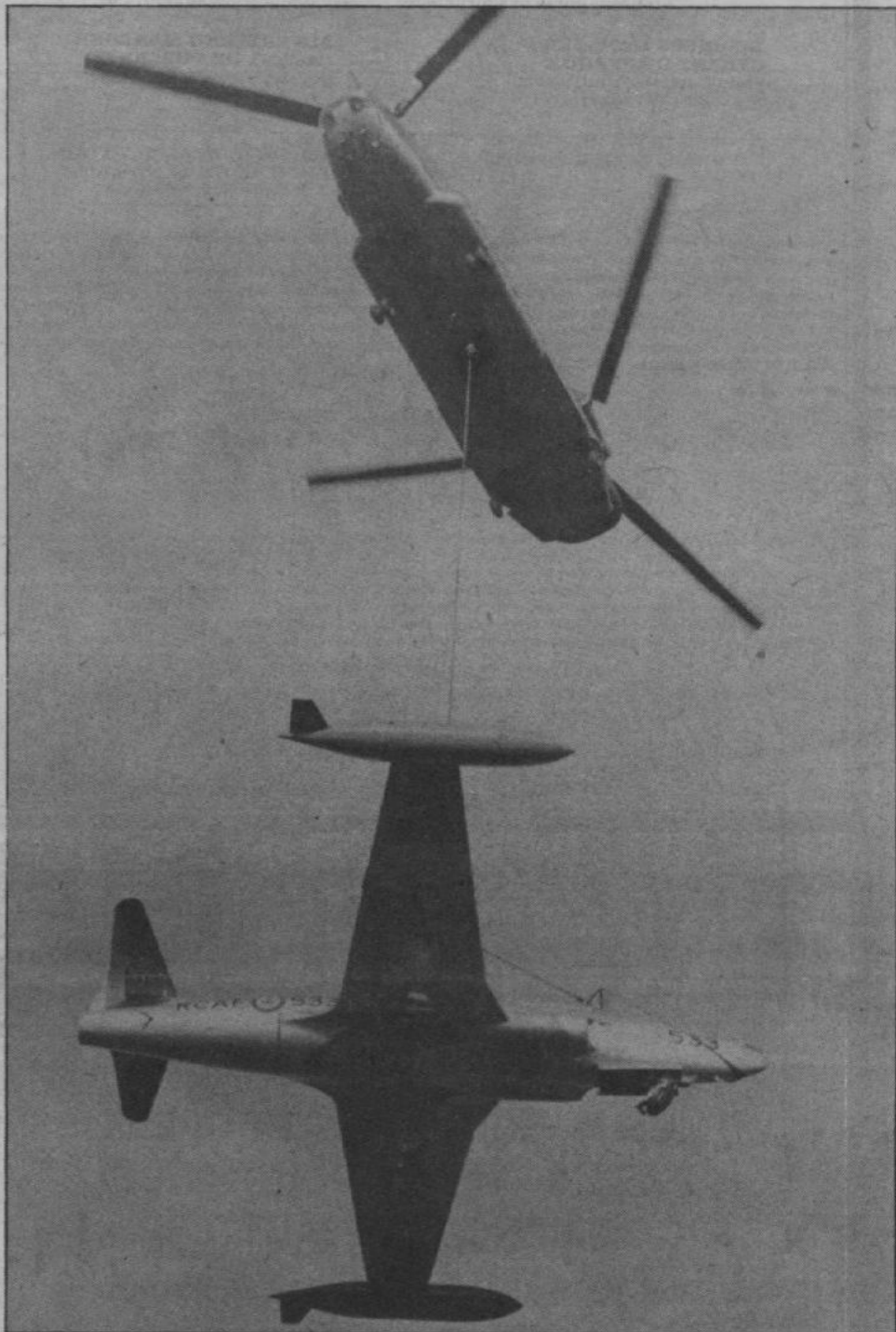
## ASTRA SAVINGS HOSTS 24th MILITARY CREDIT UNION CONFERENCE

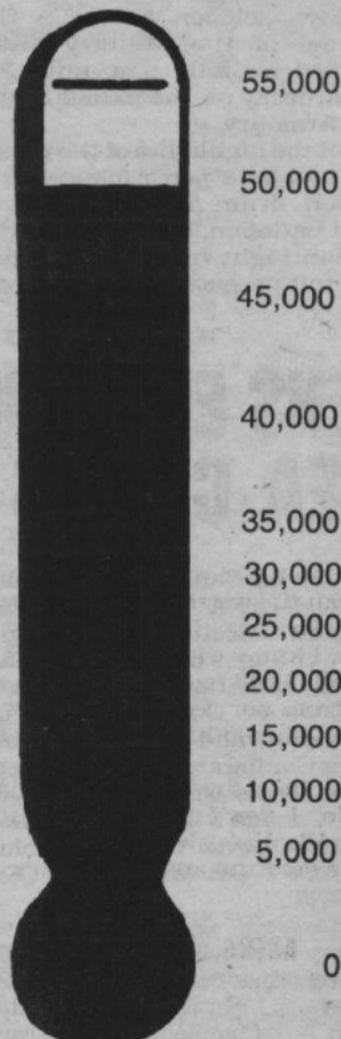

Montreal, September 13 — Bank of Montreal today reported that net income for the third quarter, ending July 31, 1983, was \$77.2 million, an increase of \$7.1 million or 10.2 per cent over the third quarter of 1982 and an increase of \$15.0 million or 24.1 per cent over the second quarter of 1983. Net income for the first nine months of 1983 was \$213.9 million, an increase of \$13.2 million or 6.6 per cent over the first nine months of 1982.

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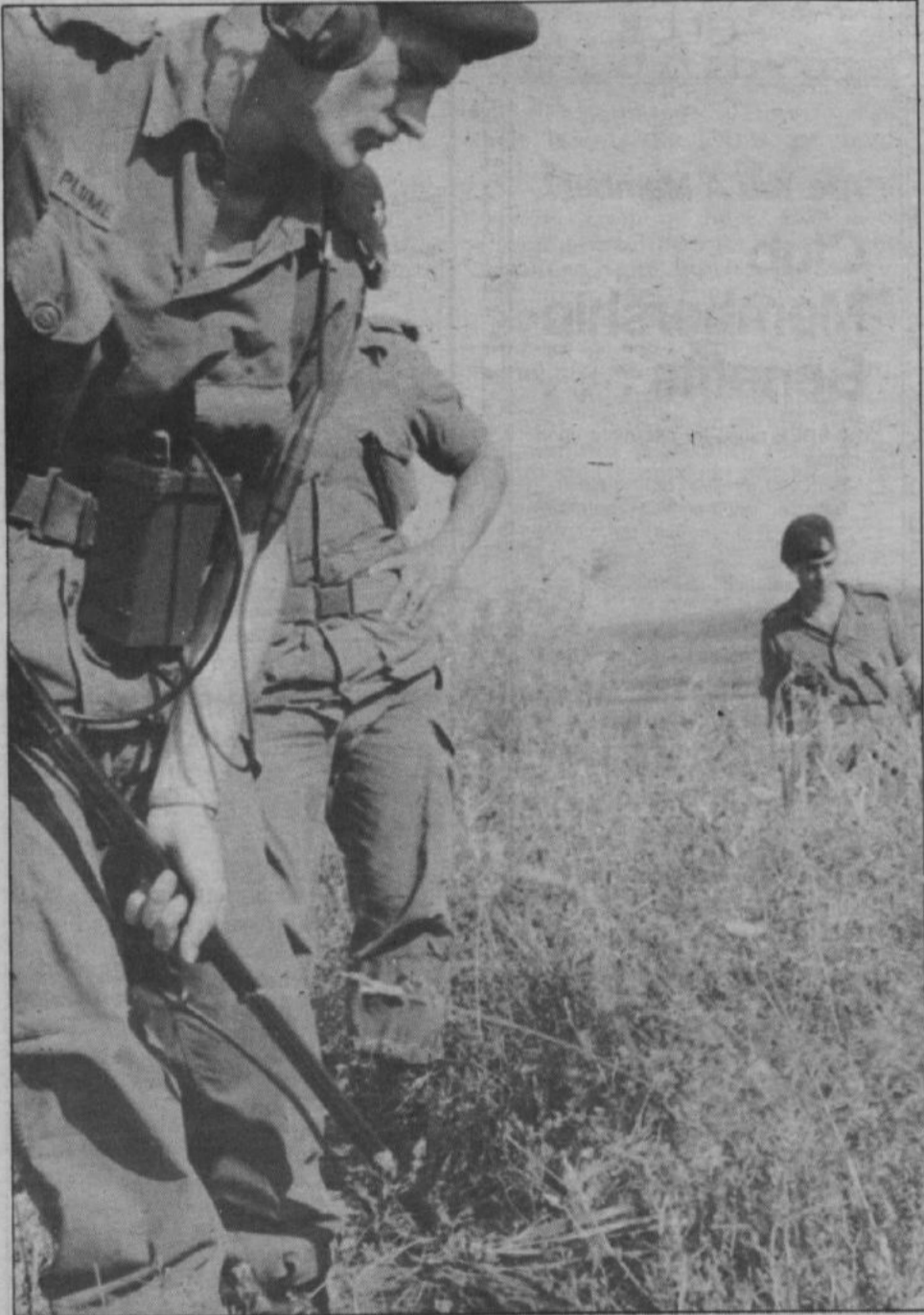

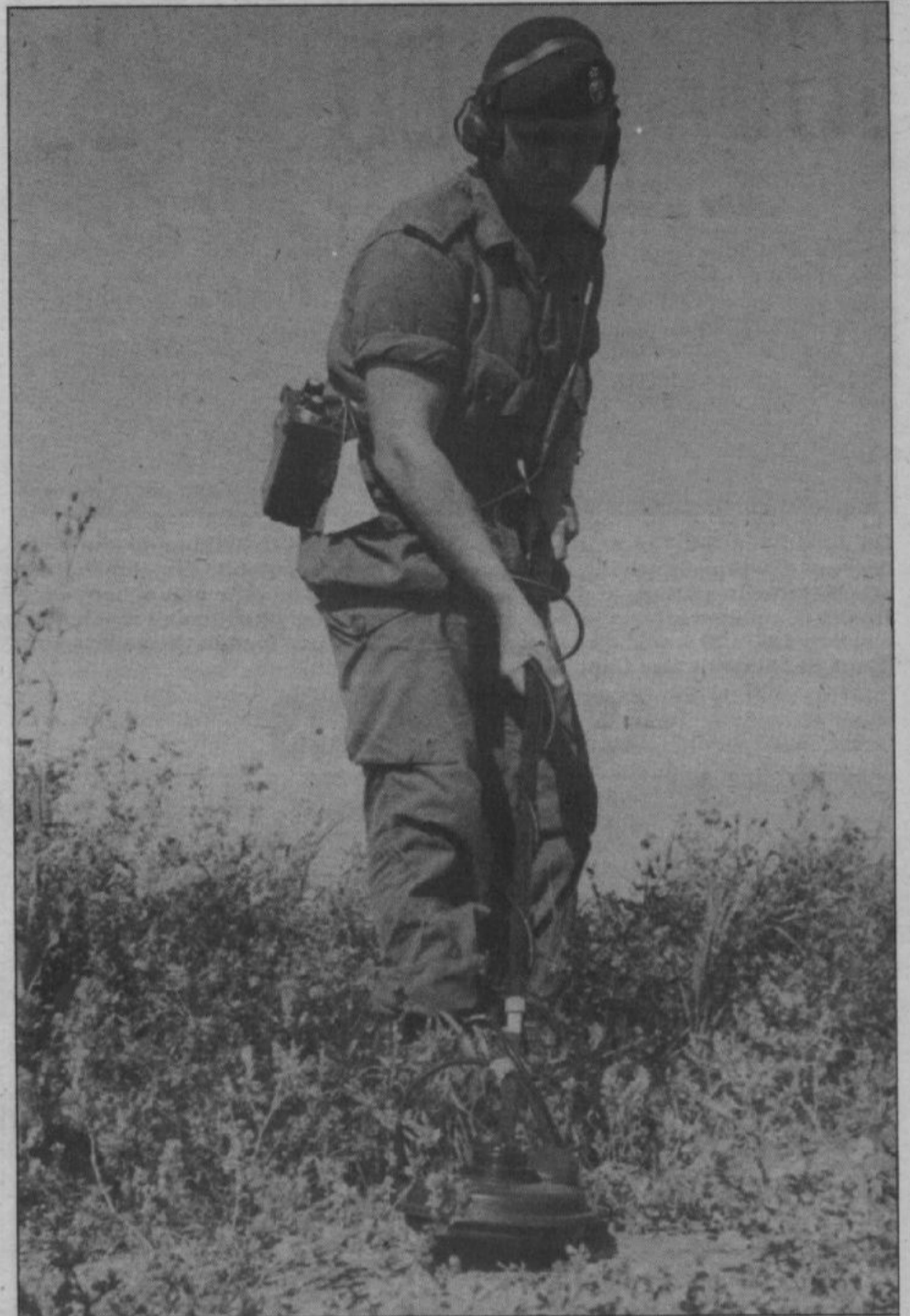
# PPCLI AT OAK HAMMOCK MARSH

More than 65 members of the 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry cleared Second World War practice bombs from the wildlife management area of Oak Hammock Marsh near Stonewall. Using an APC to pull a disc, the Princess Pats plowed designated areas of the 733-hectare marsh but no live ammunition was found. Nevertheless, during the two-week operation which started on August 15, more than 100 exploded bombs were removed along with a few pounds of bottle caps, cans, shrapnel and assorted debris. "Public access and dykes have been

thoroughly searched" says Lt.-Col. Barry Ashton, commander 2 PPCLI, "and the operation gave the soldiers a chance to acquire hands-on-experience with equipment such as mine detectors." It has been a rough two weeks for the Patricias who worked under a sun that stubbornly held at 30°C and above. Volksmarching is a **family oriented activity** and many parents carry infants in "back packs" or push them in strollers when the terrain permits. Youngsters walk the short distances and senior citizens participate regularly. Runners/joggers usually start when the event opens to have a "clear track" uninterrupted by walkers.

**HOW DO YOU PARTICIPATE IN A VOLKSMARCH?** Pre-register in **advance** thus reserving a Start Card for a medal. This saves paying a late registration fee on the day of the Volksmarch and insures an award medal is reserved for you.

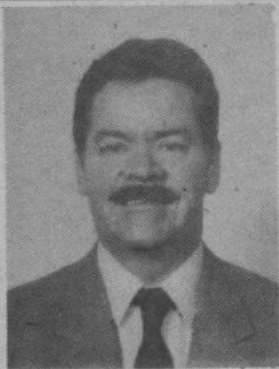

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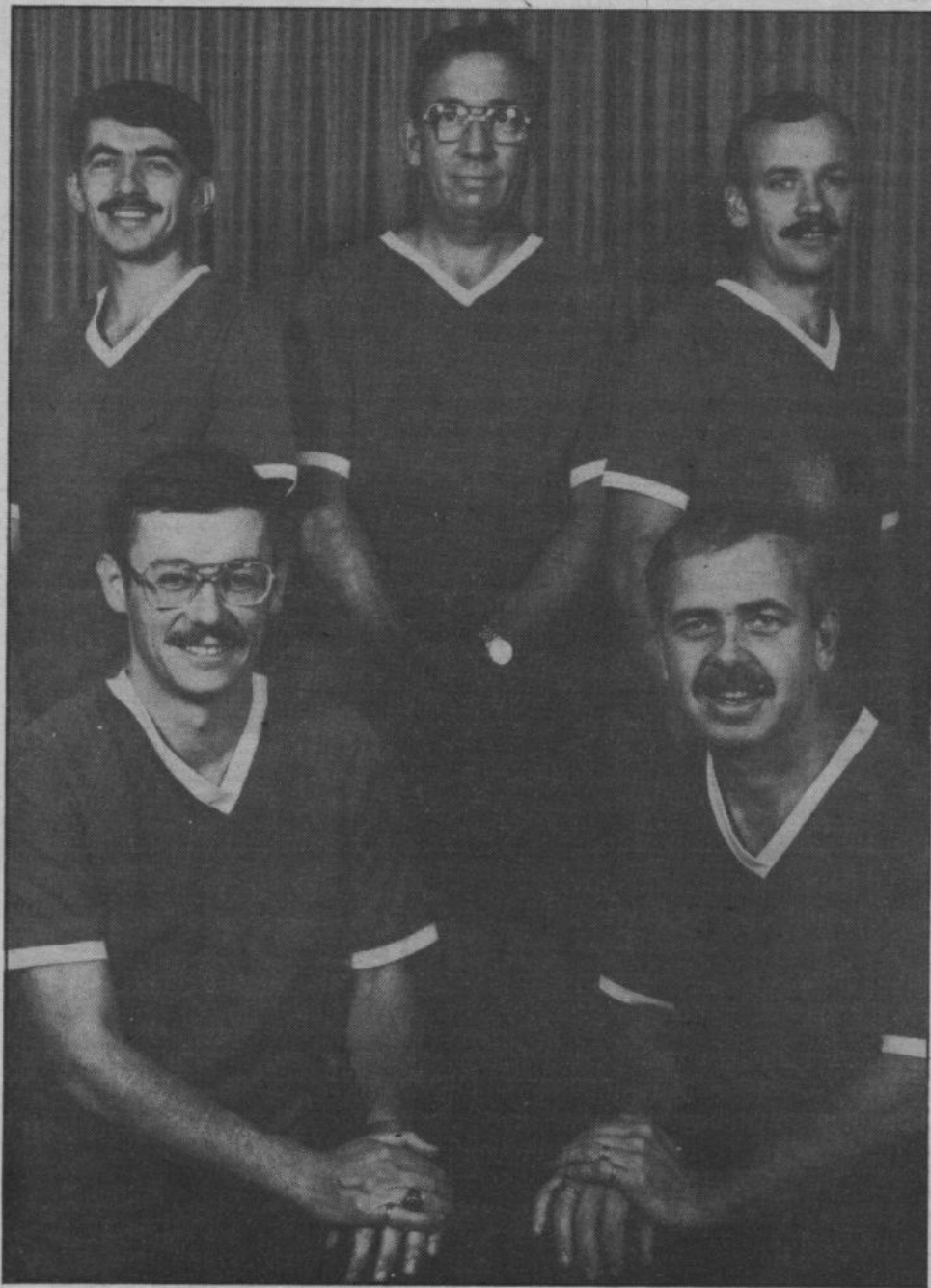

## SAFETY TIPS FOR RUNNERS

Running differs from other kinds of vigorous physical exercise because it is often performed in a hostile environment — on public roadways, where tragic consequences can result.

When runners discuss the hazards of the road, they talk about the "crazy drivers" with whom they must contend — drivers who at best ignore runners' welfare and at worst take deliberate aim at them.

Motorists, on the other hand, blame "crazy runners" for their tendency to appear unexpectedly on roadways, causing motorists to swerve dangerously to avoid colliding with them.

The facts are, that drivers and runners contribute equally to the initiation of collisions. But no matter who is responsible for a collision, it is the runner who is vulnerable to serious injury. Just as there are measures to protect the runner from overuse injuries, there are — precautions a runner can take to ensure this safety while running on public roadways.

If possible, avoid the problem by not running on roadways, use off-road routes whenever possible. If sidewalks are available, use these even though concrete is harder on a runner's legs than asphalt.

If you must use the roads, choose routes with little traffic. Wide roads, roads with wide shoulders and roads with no major thoroughfares.

Run against, rather than with traffic. You can better anticipate and react to vehicles when running against traffic.

Run on the shoulder or close enough to the edge of the road so that vehicles do not have to alter their paths. Stay as far as possible from the paths of vehicles. The roadway surface may be more level than the

shoulder, but this is not a good enough reason to risk calamity.

When running with others along a road side, run single file to keep all runners away from the paths of cars.

Give way to vehicles at Intersections unless it is absolutely clear that you have the right of way, the motorist has stopped and sees you, and then act accordingly. Don't run across an inter-section in front of a car stopped at a stop sign unless you are sure the motorist sees you and expects you to cross. Even in this situation, it would be wise to stop or to run behind the car.

Always give way to vehicles turning across your path — both oncoming, and vehicles travelling in the same direction you are. An especially dangerous situation when running against traffic occurs as the runner approaches a car preparing to make a right turn. In this case, the motorist will be scanning for traffic coming from the left and may not even look to the right until he is well into the turn.

Avoid running on roads in non-daylight hours. If you must, wear light coloured clothing or reflective materials and remember, at night all guide lines for sharing the road with motorists become doubly important.

*Be Alert — Always* Runners cannot afford to become inattentive. They must anticipate potentially dangerous situations and be ready to deal with them. This may not make for the most relaxed and enjoyable runs, but vigilance is the price we must pay for running the roads with vehicular traffic. All runners should consider the risk of a crippling or fatal injury in a collision with a motor vehicle. Knowing that the danger exists is the first step to safety.

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## SCHOOL BUS SAFETY WEEK

Can you answer "Yes" to all these questions?

- when you are driving, are you always particularly cautious in school zones?
- do you come to a full stop when a school bus with flashing lights is encountered?
- do you wait until the flashing lights of the bus have been turned off before starting to move your vehicle in either direction?

If you answer yes to all these questions, you are on the right way to guide those who might have answered differently. But no matter if you answered "yes" or "no", we need your help to make people aware of the facts during the School Bus Safety Week 17-23 Oct. We know you have another minute, so let's keep reading to verify your knowledge about this very important topic.

Do you know that, based on the latest available Canadian statistics a student fatality is four times as likely to happen before boarding and after leaving the bus then while inside the

bus? We also find that 86% of all school bus accidents involved a bus and another vehicle. What can you do about it?

Being aware of these few statistics, you now have the opportunity to help prevent these unnecessary accidents.

Adult or old enough to be responsible, you have the greatest influence on the attitudes and behaviour of children. You have this influence because children do not have the advantage of being able to draw on years of experience to help them in their decision-making. They are not always careful about the traffic danger of crossing any road, when boarding or leaving a school bus or even when playing in the school yard.

"MIND THAT CHILD", this year's theme, is designed to help everyone become aware of the potential for accidents. It is hoped that military and civilians personnel as well as their dependants will take a few minutes to "mind that child", and assist in achieving an "accident-free" school year.

# ABDOMINAL MUSCLES IMPORTANT SAY PERI STAFF

It is important that we have strong abdominal muscles because they support and protect some of our most vital organs. Our abdominal — pelvic cavity contains the liver, gall bladder, stomach, intestines, pancreas, spleen, bladder and kidneys.

Strong abdominal muscles support the all-important membranes that keep these organs in place and enable them to function properly. They give support to the lower spine, and help to avoid or eliminate lower-back pain, and can prevent or clear up some of the complications of constipation.

We can build and maintain a flat stomach by doing a few abdomen-strengthening exercises every day. But as with any exercise, program, the exact amount you start with depends on your age, willingness, and physical condition.

Start slowly and consult your physician or phys-ed expert for a range of exercises from very simple to rather difficult. If you can't do them all, do those you can, and don't worry about the rest. If your muscles feel stiff, or if there is some soreness, then you did too much.

Before you begin, measure your girth at the level of your navel with your stomach relaxed. Now pull your stomach in as far as you can, and measure it again. Record both measurements. Do this once a month, preferably on the same date. It may be a month or more before you see any improvement. Keep at it. Your looks and your health are important.

CAUTION: In doing exercises that involve the lower back it is very im-

portant to keep the curve of the lower back as flat as possible; also try to breathe regularly and slowly as you perform your exercises. Holding your breath while exercising may put an unnecessary strain on your heart.

Here are three exercises to help get you started:

1. Stand, feet placed shoulder width apart, arms stretched sideward and parallel to the floor, elbows straight. Slowly twist the trunk as far to the right as possible, stretch, pulling the right arm back, and the left arm around to the right, return to starting position, and repeat exercise now twisting to the left. Keep the feet planted firmly.

2. Lie on your back, legs bent, with the knees pointed at the ceiling, feet flat on the floor, hands on the back of your head, fingers interlocked. Slowly sit up (exhale as you do) and place the head between the knees. Inhale as you start back slowly to starting position; it may help to place your feet under a piece of heavy furniture, such as a dresser or couch.

3. Stand, feet wide apart (comfortable), arms over head, shoulder width apart. Rapidly swing your upper body forward and down, while bending your knees. Reach back through the legs, and touch the floor as far back as possible (comfortable). Swing your upper body back to the starting position. Increase the repeats to a level that feels comfortable to you. Start more slowly, not more than ten repeats each exercise.

# BORDER CROSSING

"Your passport, please. Thank you. Your papers are in order. You may proceed. Next . . . The deutschmark in American dollars? The deutschmark is quoted at \$31.10 per hundred."

The year was 1956. The month was August. The border station at Rosenheim, nestled in the foothills of the Austrian Alps on the road between Salzburg and Munich, was doing a brisk business, and the air rang with questions and answers. The border officials were rushed almost off their feet, for the day had been fair, and it seemed as if everybody wanted to cross into Germany on that particular day at that particular point.

One car stood out from among the others. It was a small, compact British car, black in colour, with four young girls inside. The car had British licence plates, but from their accent the girls were anything but English. American, more likely, or perhaps Canadian. One of them, a tall brunette, who knew a little German, was talking to the customs inspector, in a mixture of her own language and his. They seemed to be arguing about something, for finally the customs man called one of his colleagues over.

"But I don't see why I can't take her across the border" the tall girl said. "She's perfectly healthy; she's been vaccinated with all the latest shots. She won't harm anyone."

At this, the subject of their altercation poked her head out of the wicker basket in which she had been lying. "She" was a cat, a lovely tortoise shell cat, quite small, and very delicately marked. She looked at the customs officials, pushed her pink nose into their hands, and purred.

"I'm sorry, Fraulein, but the regulations do not allow animals to enter the country without a period of quarantine. Your cat will have to comply with the regulations, or you will not be allowed to proceed."

The girl seemed to be almost in tears, but she turned to her friends, and after a short conference, they came to an agreement. The cat would be left behind. The customs officials greeted this surrender with relief, and after a cursory inspection of the luggage rack on top of the car, and an equally cursory inspection of the girls' passports — they were Canadian, by the way — waved the car through.

The tall brunette, who was also the driver on this occasion, continued down the winding mountain highway until she came to a secluded side road. She pulled into this, drove down it

some little distance, and once sure that she was safe from observation, came to a stop.

"We've done it," she cried jubilantly, "we've done it." And with that she got out of the car, took out the key to the trunk, unlocked it, flung aside a rug which was covering an indeterminate object, and said, "It's alright, Jozsef, you're safe now. You can get out."

At her words a young man of about twenty-two uncoiled himself from the floor of the trunk and climbed stiffly to the ground. Seen in broad daylight his face was markedly slavic. He was, in fact, Hungarian, and he was in full flight from his native Hungary.

His name was Jozsef Sandor. He had, like so many Hungarians in the summer of 1956, seen trouble looming, and being a resourceful young man, had determined to leave Budapest, where he lived alone, and to make his way to Munich, where his married sister lived. He was unable to obtain papers to cross the border legally, so one dark night he had slipped across the Austro-Hungarian frontier, and had made his way to Vienna. There he went to the Hotel Adlerhof, which he knew was run by a proprietor who spoke both Hungarian and German. It was there that he met the four Canadian girls, who were touring Europe that summer. Jozsef spoke a little English. He made his plight known to the quartet, and told them he needed help in getting to Munich. Once there, he said, he could get in touch with his sister, and go to a refugee camp until his papers could be obtained. The girls were at first hesitant, but after much consultation, decided to risk ferrying him across the border in the trunk of their car. But how to avoid a complete search of the car at the border? It was then that the proprietor's wife suggested the tortoise shell cat as a decoy. The cat was one of five or six belonging to the hotel, and could easily be spared. If the attention of the border officials was diverted, the conspirators reasoned, the guards might not think to look in the trunk of the car.

In effect, this was what happened. The border crossing was accomplished without detection of the hidden passenger, and the girls carried Jozsef on to Munich, where he was able to get in touch with his sister.

Jozsef reached Munich safely. The four young Canadian girls returned to Canada unscathed. The only unknown in this equation is the fate of the tortoise shell cat, and that is probably buried forever in oblivion.

## NEW COMMANDER FOR PRAIRIE MILITIA

A senior civil servant in the Saskatchewan government, Brig. Gen. John C. Law of Regina has assumed command of the Prairie Area Militia, a command involving 28 militia units from Thunder Bay, Ont. to the B.C. border.

Law, who is Saskatchewan's associate deputy minister of supply and services, was formally installed in the military post at a change of command parade Aug. 20th at the Militia Training Centre in Dundurn, Sask. He succeeds Brig. Gen. M.D. Paine of Saskatoon who held the command for the past three years. Paine is an architect in Saskatoon.

Law, 51, retired in 1977 as a colonel in the Canadian Armed Forces, transferring to the Militia. In 1980 he became commander of the Saskatchewan Militia District. Born in Canora, Sask., Law entered the RCAF as a flight cadet in 1951 rising to colonel and becoming deputy chief of staff logistics for Air Command. He was a staff officer on the team charged with responsibility of integration of the Canadian Forces in 1968. He was also a chief instructor of the Canadian Forces School of Administration and Logistics. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the Royal Military College in 1955 and a Master of Science degree from the U.S. Air Force Institute of Technology in 1964.

Law and his wife, the former Kathleen Lynch have three children, John of Winnipeg, and Scott and Colleen both of Regina.

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# COOK'S DELIGHT



## Chili Supreme

- 500 g (1 lb) ground beef
- 1 large onion
- ½ cup chopped green pepper
- ¼ cup All-Bran cereal
- 1 tbsp chili powder or to taste
- 1 (14-oz) can tomato sauce
- 1 (14-oz) can tomatoes
- 1 (14-oz) can Libby's Red Kidney Beans
- 1 (14-oz) can Libby's Deep-Browned Beans
- pinch garlic powder
- salt to taste

In large saucepan cook ground beef, onion and green pepper until meat is browned, stirring frequently. Drain off excess fat. Stir in remaining ingredients. Cover and cook over low heat about one hour. Stir occasionally. Makes 6 servings.

## SPICED TEA TODDY

- 4 cups boiling water
- 8 teabags
- 4 cups apple juice
- 4 whole cloves
- 2 whole cinnamon sticks
- ½ cup brown sugar
- 1 orange, cut into 8 wedges
- 8 whole cloves
- cinnamon sticks (optional)

Pour boiling water over tea bags. Cover and let steep 5 minutes. Remove tea bags. Meanwhile, combine apple juice, 4 cloves, 2 cinnamon sticks and brown sugar in saucepan. Simmer 5 minutes to blend flavours. Combine with tea. Serve in warm mugs. Garnish each mug with an orange wedge that has a whole clove stuck in the skin. Use a cinnamon stick as a stirrer. Makes 8 cups.

Note: For a "spirited" version, add 1 cup port wine to apple juice mixture and heat.

## SHRIMP CURRY CREPES

If you are hosting the Grey Cup Party this year, choose a menu that can be prepared well in advance, otherwise you'll be watching the dinner while everyone else watches the game. Remember that your guests will probably be snacking most of the afternoon, so a light, buffet-style meal would be most appropriate.

The Shrimp Curry Crêpes certainly are the answer. The crêpes can be made up to three days in advance, stacked and refrigerated. Even store them in the freezer up to 6 months. Make the filling early in the day and reheat five minutes before serving time.

| ½ cup chopped onions                    | 125 mL |
| ½ cup diced celery                      | 125 mL |
| 1½ cups apples, peeled, diced and cored | 375 mL |
| 2 tsp. curry powder                     | 10 mL  |
| ¼ cup flour                             | 50 mL  |
| 1 cup water                             | 250 mL |
| 1 cup chicken broth                     | 250 mL |
| ½ tsp. salt                             | 2 mL   |
| 2 7 oz. cans medium shrimps             | 200 g  |
| ¼ cup heavy cream                       | 125 mL |

Melt butter over low heat in medium saucepan. Add onion and celery; cook until tender, stirring, about 5 minutes. Add apples and curry powder; cook 5 more minutes. Over low heat, stir in flour until blended. Gradually stir in 1 cup water, chicken broth and salt, stirring until thickened and smooth. Just before serving, add shrimp and cream, heat through, and spoon about ¼ cup (50 mL) of the mixture in each crêpe.

Note: Chicken broth can be made by dissolving 1 boullion cube in 1 cup (250 mL) boiling water.

## CRÊPES

- |                        |        |
|------------------------|--------|
| 4 eggs                 | 4      |
| ¼ tsp. salt            | 1 mL   |
| 2 cups flour           | 500 mL |
| 2 cups milk            | 500 mL |
| 3 tbsp. butter, melted | 50 mL  |

Beat eggs and salt in medium mixing bowl. Gradually add flour and milk alternately to eggs, beating until smooth. Add melted butter and continue beating until batter is uniform. Let stand 1 hour. Heat a 6-7 inch (15-17 cm) oiled pan. Use a ¼ cup (50 mL) measure for pouring batter. Tilt the pan so the batter is spread evenly. Turn to brown both sides. Stack on a plate until ready to use.

Makes 20-25 crêpes, or 6 main course servings.

A popular drink in restaurants, here's how to prepare it at home!

- Combine:
- 1 mug of hot tea
  - 1 oz Amaretto
  - 1 oz Grand Marnier

### SCOTTISH McTEA

- Combine:
- 1 mug of hot tea
  - 1 oz Scotch
  - 1 tbsp honey

### HOT RUM TEA

- Combine:
- 1 mug of hot tea
  - 1 oz white or light rum
  - sugar to taste
  - and add a cinnamon stick, if you like.

### SKIER'S SMOOTHIE

- Combine:
- 1 mug of hot tea
  - 1 oz Galliano
  - add an orange or lemon slice

### WINE TEA

- Combine:
- ½ mug of hot tea
  - ½ mug of hot red wine
  - slice of lemon and sugar to taste.

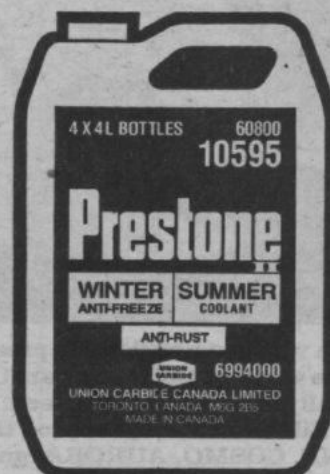

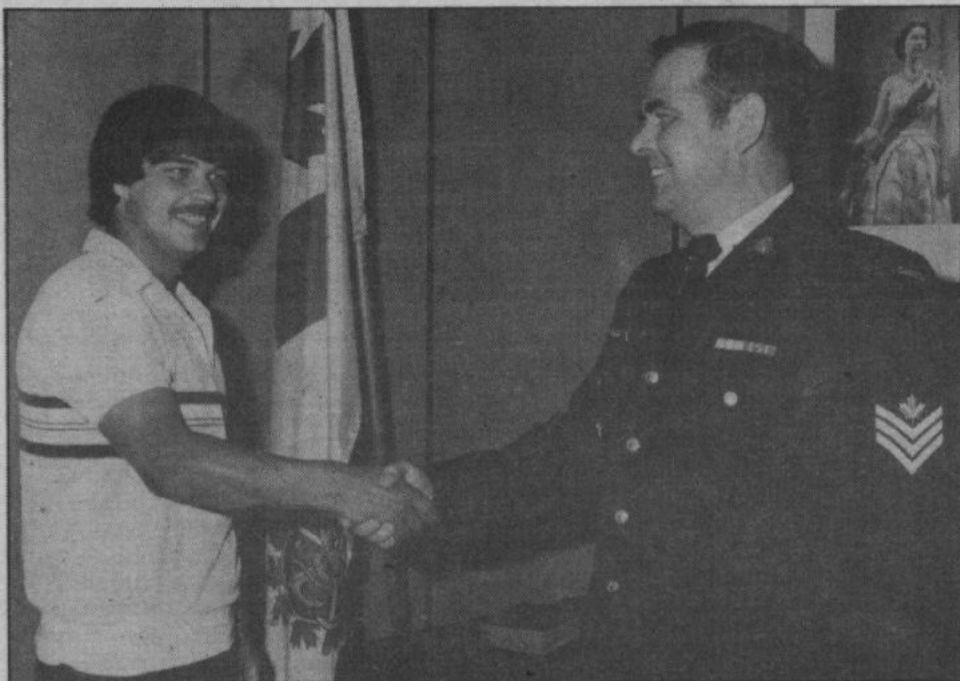
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# SHAKES N' TAKES
