

SAR OPS TO GET BIG BOOST

WINNIPEG— Saving more lives, and drastically shrinking costs and other resources committed to the expensive search and rescue role in the bargain, is a dream about to materialize in the Canadian Forces.

That's the view of LGen Paul D. Manson, new commander of Air Command, who says it's "a subject that's very close to my heart."

Behind it all are an earth-orbiting search and rescue satellite (SARSAT), and the formation in Canada of two organizations called the Civil Air Search and Rescue Association (CASARA), and the Canadian Marine Rescue Association (CMRA).

SARSAT has been whirling around the globe for about a year now on a trial basis, with Canada, the U.S., France and the Soviet Union taking part. Already, says the general, "something like 40-50 lives have been saved in North America alone in the trial stage."

The CMRA now is functioning, and "we're just now to the point of instituting the parallel organization for civil aviation, CASARA," he said.

In his last appointment in Ottawa as chief of air doctrine and operations, Gen. Manson was also chairman of the interdepartmental committee on search and rescue in Canada, involving National Defence and the Ministry of Transport.

He adds that he was "sort of the godfather for search and rescue" in his previous job, and in his new one he'll "have a direct part to play in the operational side of much of search and rescue in Canada."

Success rate incredible

SARSAT pinpoints emergency beacons triggered by crashed aircraft and ships in distress anywhere in the world. He describes its success rate during the one year trial so far as "incredible."

The general said that "it's very well demonstrated that if a person injured

in a crash can be picked up in the first 12 hours or so, the chances of survival are very high. If there's much of a delay beyond that," he warned, "chances of survival drop very quickly."

That's one of the reasons SARSAT is so good, he said, "because it pinpoints these people almost instantaneously."

CASARA will be a very loose-knit organization, he explains, tying together local and provincial organizations, some of which already exist.

"Through this very small blanket organization, under the control of National Defence," he said, "we will be able to train civil pilots, observers and technicians to use the immense resources that we have in civil aviation to help us out with search and rescue."

"There's a side benefit to all this, too," he said, "and that is that civil pilots who are trained in search and rescue are bound to be more conscious of the need for safety, because they will see at first hand the results of bad airmanship, bad technical practices and so on."

"They'll be very conscious of that, and we think that's going to have a favorable impact on our search-and-rescue record."

He explained that DND and MOT are funding CASARA jointly, adding that MOT has the ultimate responsibility for safety in civil aviation. However, he indicated that CASARA operations virtually will come down to a 50-50 split between the two departments.

Issue is lives, not money

"The cost of CASARA is not going to be particularly high," he says. Most of the money will go towards training people who take part," meaning the civil operators. "We'll pay

Balanced forces; CF objective

WINNIPEG — Air Command has "done very well" in relationship to its sister commands, Maritime and Mobile, says its newly-appointed commander, LGen Paul D. Manson.

"But it's in everyone's best interests to have balanced forces," he pointed out.

"It is not in our best interests to have a really powerful air force and a weak army," he stressed. "We don't operate in isolation these days."

"All three services work in a very closely integrated way. That is the total objective for Canada."

As examples of big-ticket items, he referred to Air Command's acquisition of the CP-140 Aurora long-range patrol aircraft and the CF-18 fighter-interceptor.

"That doesn't mean that we can sit back for 10 years and coast," he said.

"We are in a period of financial restraint; all government departments are. We always feel that we could do more with more money, that's inevitable," he added.

"Air Command is striving along with its sister commands to compete for the available dollars in the defence budget," he said, but the people who make the best case are the ones who get the money.

"That's the way the system works; it's a pretty good system," he added.

MINISTER MAKES SHILO FIRST VISIT

BUCKLE UP BABY

Children are precious. We protect them in every way we can. We take them to the doctor for immunization shots, feed them nutritious food, dress them warmly in winter and teach them to look before crossing the road.

Yet many parents overlook a vitally important area of child safety when they do not provide adequate protection for children riding in a car.

Did you know that each year in Canada about 70 children under the age of five die, and that 4000 more are injured in motor vehicle collisions?

The body of a child is different from the adult in a number of ways. The skull is softer and much larger in proportion to the rest of the body. The rib cage is thinner and more elastic. The young child's prominent abdomen provides only limited protection to the large internal organs. Unlike the adult, the child has a pelvis with broad gentle contours. The prominent crests which can provide an anchor point and contact area for the lap belt do not develop until approximately age 10. These factors make it important that special consideration be given to providing crash protection

for the infant and child.

The small child's heavy head and fragile skull make him very likely to suffer serious head injuries even in a low-speed accident. Also, children are often allowed to ride in positions in the car which greatly increase their chances of injury. If there is a crash or a sudden stop, a youngster standing on the seat becomes a missile striking some part of the vehicle's interior; a child leaning out a window will be wholly or partially ejected, and a baby sitting on an adult's lap can be crushed against the dashboard or seat back.

As in many other situations, children need the care and protection of a responsible adult when riding in a car. A child seated in the appropriate restraint device is safe and well cared for; an unrestrained child has been neglected and is in danger.

UNICEF MARKS 29th YEAR

1983 marks the 29th year that Canadian children will Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund. Last year the Hallowe'en campaign raised 1.7 million dollars to benefit needy children in 112 countries.

When you give to UNICEF, best known and most successful of the UN's many agencies, the world's poorest children receive the basic necessities of life — food, clean water, medicine and education. In many countries around the world, the very question of survival is one that children face every day.



their fuel and oil, extra insurance costs and out-of-pocket expenses for taking part in searches," he explained.

He regards the cost as very small compared to what the Armed Forces now spend on searching for lost aircraft. Although it's going to be an efficient way of operating, he emphasized that "the principal purpose is not to save money, but lives."

He said that the aim is to get all the provinces and all civil aviation organizations within the country working together, using common standards, common training and so on. But, he said, it's going to be very much a decentralized organization. "We don't want to run the whole thing from Ottawa; let the people who know best how to do it, operate it."

He said that eight or nine of the provinces already have in place the essence of a civil-air-patrol type of organization, and we're working very hard to get all the provinces and the territories involved.

New top airman speaks out

WINNIPEG — Top priority of Air Command's new commander, LGen Paul D. Manson, is to keep the organization "at a very high state of operational readiness." Period.

"We are in a very critical period of history right now," he says, "at a time when deterrence, which is our business, must be kept to the forefront.

"The cost of failure of deterrence is very, very high," he said.

Specific areas of priorities he touched on were that the Command "must maintain its equipment at a high state of readiness; people must be kept highly trained and well motivated; the organization must be efficient; and resources must be used as efficiently as possible."

These things have got to be the highest set of priorities, he said.

"There are other challenges, specific and general, facing Air Command right now," he said. "One of the most interesting ones for me, personally," he added, "is the bringing into service of our new fleet of fighter aircraft, the CF-18."

"We're moving very quickly on it; the pilots who are flying the airplane at Cold Lake, who are learning to instruct on the aircraft, in preparation for the first group of student pilots, are as enthusiastic about the airplane as they can possible be."

T-birds & Daks won't wear out

Asked if there were any Air Command aircraft currently in use that will need replacement, the general said "none imminently." He said that the DC-3 Dakota, "that venerable old bird, is still good enough to continue flying well for a number of years."

Referring to the T-33 Silver Star jet, introduced in the 1950s, he said that "it's going to be around, as far as we know, until about 1995, because there is nothing wrong with the airplane; it's still doing quite a good job."

"There are no aircraft in the inventory," he said, "that we will have to take out of service within the next few years because of maintenance and logistics problems."

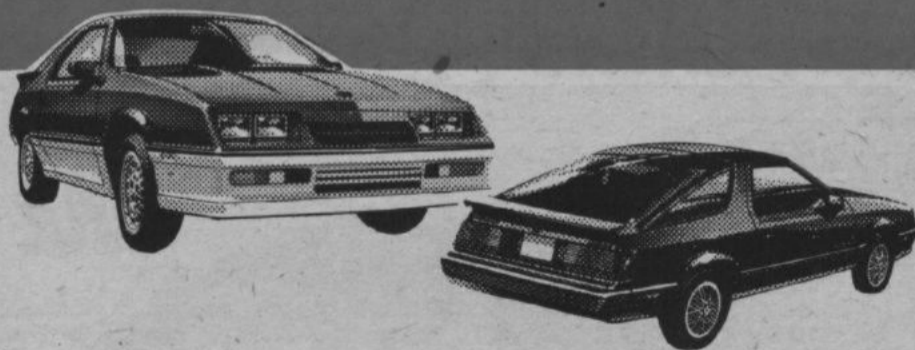

84 SAVINGS BONDS ANNOUNCED

CANADA SAVINGS BONDS

The 1984 Canada Savings Bond campaign is underway and is proving to be as popular as it has been in previous years.

This year's interest rate is 9.5%. The minimum rate guaranteed for the next six years is 7%. This rate will be re-evaluated in succeeding years and adjusted upwards if necessary to match interest rates at the time. It will never be adjusted down, however.

RETURN ON OUTSTANDING ISSUES

1982 Series of CSB's now earn 9.5% for the year beginning Nov 1, 1983. Unmatured issues up to and including the 1981 series continue to earn their guaranteed minimum rate of 10.5%, so don't sell these particular series to buy the 1983 series. The way in which the higher return is payable depends upon the dating of the series.

SERIES DATED BEFORE 1977

Holders of these Series will receive the higher return in the form of a cash bonus payable on the maturity date of the Bonds. Bondholders who redeem these Bonds prior to maturity will not be entitled to the cash bonus, but only to the original return payable, as printed on the bond certificates. Bondholders may however, continue to cash interest coupons or cheques each year and remain entitled to the cash bonus.

For income tax purposes bondholders may treat cash bonus payments when received either as interest income or as a capital gain. The bonus is eligible for inclusion in the \$1,000 interest, dividends and capital gains deduction.

SERIES DATED 1977 TO 1982

For Series dated 1977 to 1982 the higher annual rates will apply instead of the rates printed on the bond certificates.

ADVANTAGES

Canada Savings Bonds have many advantages:

- They are an excellent forced savings plan which can help you put aside money for either a planned expense (e.g. Christmas shopping) or an emergency. This

aspect is especially beneficial if you have difficulty putting aside a little bit from each paycheque.

- They are the safest Canadian investment as they are backed by the entire resources of Canada.
- They are a very liquid investment in that they can be cashed at any time.
- They can be bought by payroll deductions, with the interest expense entered as an income tax deduction.
- They are the only fixed term investment with the possibility of the interest rate increasing throughout the term. (The interest rate was increased four times three years ago).

CSBs are now on sale through the payroll deduction plan to regular force military personnel, Class "C" reserves and DND civilian employees. Cash sales will NOT be available through your section/unit canvasser. For this type of CSB, go to a commercial financial institute.

The CSBs are available in denominations of \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000 with a per person limit of \$50,000. on payroll deduction plan, and \$50,000. by cash purchase. (This latter figure includes those purchased in the payroll deduction plan).

DEADLINE DATES

Act quickly as there are deadline dates for CSBs. DND civilian employees have two options. The first option has a deadline of 22 November 1983. This involves payments over 10 months. The second option is available until 13 December 1983, but involves deductions over nine months (i.e. higher deductions per month). Military personnel will continue to use the 12-month deduction plan with a deadline date of 18 November 1983.

You should soon be contacted by your unit/section CSB representative to offer you the opportunity to purchase CSBs. For further information, contact your section/unit CSB representative or call the Base Canada Savings Bond coordinator — Lt Dave Mahaffey, 429 (T) Sqn, Loc 401/429.

VOLKSMARCH

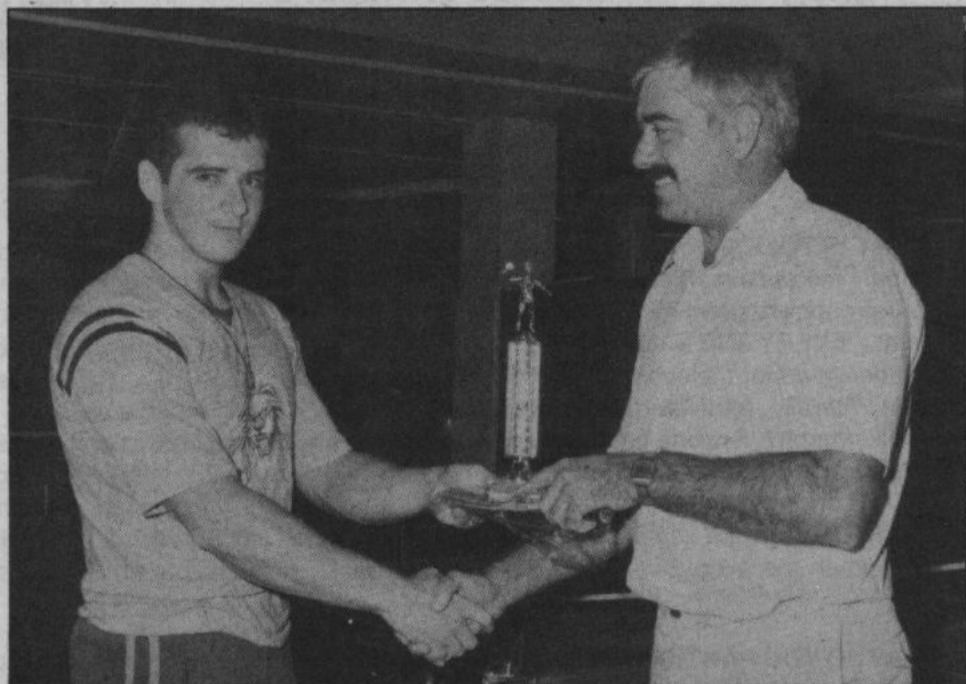

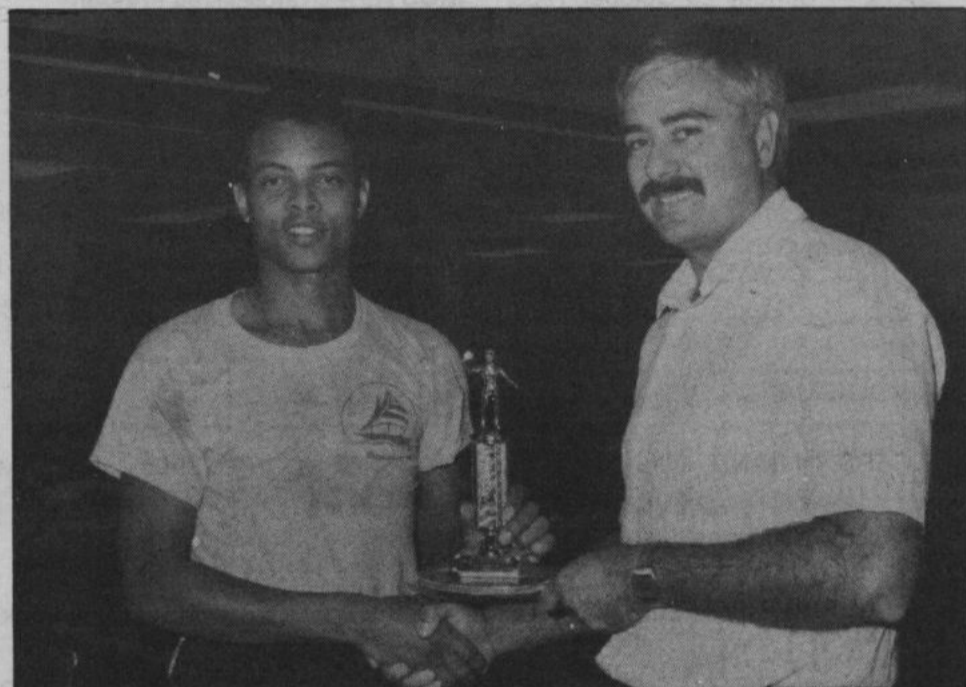
