SCAN SEMINAR WORKSHOP

22-24 MAY 84

The transition from military to civilian life is not merely a process whereby the uniform is removed and "civies" are put on. 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THE COLONEL-IN-CHIEF

Lady Patricia was born in London on February 14, 1924, and christened Patricia Edwina Victoria. Her father was the late Earl Mountbatten of Burma (1900-1979) and her mother the late Countess Mountbatten of Burma, Edwina Ashley (1901-1960). Lady Patricia succeeded to her father's title after his assassination in 1979.

Following education in Malta, London and New York, Lady Patricia entered the Women's Royal Naval Service in 1943, as a signal rating. After serving in Combined Operations Bases in the UK she was commissioned as a Third Officer in 1945 and served as a Cypther Officer in England and in the Supreme Allied Headquarters, South East Asia.

On October 1946 Lady Patricia married John Knatchbull, the 7th Baron Brabourne, Lord Brabourne was then an officer in the Coldstream Guards and is a distinguished film producer. Notable productions include 'HMS Defiant', 'Romeo and Juliet', 'Tales of Beatrix Potter', 'Murder on the Orient Express', 'Death on the Nile', and 'The Mirror Crack'd'.

Lady Patricia and Lord Brabourne had five sons and two daughters. One of their twin sons, Nicholas, aged 14, was killed with his grandfather and grandmother (Lord Brabourne's mother).

The late Princess Patricia of Connaught (later Lady Patricia Ramsay), the first-Colonel-in-Chief of the Regiment, was godmother and cousin to Lady Patricia. Lady Patricia is also first cousin to Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh and godmother to Charles, Prince of Wales.

Lady Patricia was appointed Colonel-in-Chief of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry on June 14 1974, following the death of Lady Patricia Ramsay.

In addition to her Regimental duties Lady Patricia is a Magistrate and a Deputy Lieutenant in the County of Kent. Among her many appointments Lady Patricia is Vice Chairman of the British Red Cross Society, Deputy Vice Chairman of the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. Chairman of the Sir Ernest Cassel Educational Trust and Vice President of the national Childbirth Trust.

FAREWELL FALUTE FROM 2 PPCLI ON CBC MANTIOBA

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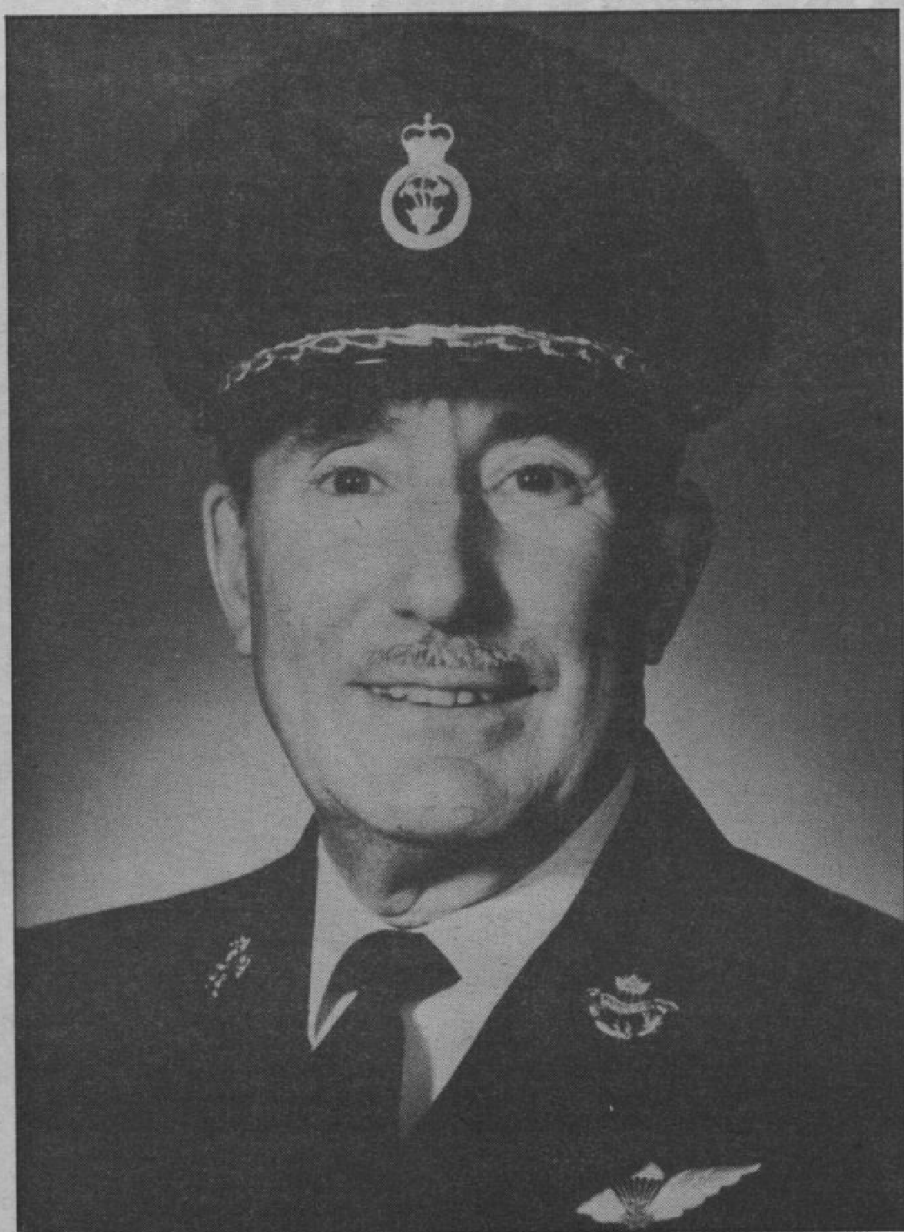
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HELEN

COLONEL OF THE REGIMENT



Colonel Sutherland was born in Nelson, British Columbia January 27th, 1924. He and his wife, Helen, have six children.

Colonel Sutherland served with the Calgary Tank Regiment, Non-Permanent Active from May 1941 until March 1943. He enlisted in the Canadian Army (Active) and was posted to Officer Training Corps, Brockville in January 1944, where he was commissioned Lieutenant (Royal Canadian Armoured Corps) in January 1945. Transferring to the Royal Canadian Infantry Corps in January 1945, he served on Regimental duties with Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry until November 1949, when he was posted to Headquarters Western Command for Employment as Personnel Officer at the Royal Canadian School of Military Engineering in Chilliwack B.C. In January 1951 he was promoted Captain and posted to Officer Candidate School as Adjutant in May 1951.

After returning from serving with Headquarters Base Units and the Third Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in the Far East, he was appointed Adjutant First Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in January 1954. On completion of Canadian Army Staff College in January 1955, he was posted to Headquarters First Canadian Infantry Brigade Group as General Staff Officer Third Grade in December 1955. He was promoted Acting Major in August 1957 and was appointed Deputy Assistant Quartermaster General, Headquarters Military Component, Canadian Delegation Vietnam. On return from Vietnam he was appointed Officer Commanding Headquarters Company, First Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and promoted Major in December 1958. In May 1961 he was posted to Headquarters Western Command and served in various appointments as General Staff Officer Second Grade. In January 1963, he was appointed General Staff Officer Second Grade at Target Area Headquarters, Edmonton.

Colonel Sutherland was posted to Canadian Forces Headquarters, General Service Branch, with Director Reserves (Army) as General Staff Officer Second Grade in August 1964. On promotion to Lieutenant-Colonel in August 1966 he was appointed Command Secretary Mobile Command Headquarters. In September 1966 he was posted to Canadian Forces Headquarters with Director General Operations Land as Section Head.

On promotion to his present rank of Colonel in February 1970, he was appointed Director of Operational Readiness Land in the Vice chief of Defence Staff Branch at Canadian Forces Headquarters, and in May 1971 was appointed Director of Sovereignty Planning. In May of the following year he was loaned to the Privy Council Office and in August 1974, he was appointed Senior Policy Analyst at National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa; Assistant Deputy Minister, Policy Branch, Chief Policy Planning, Directorate General Capabilities Planning, until his retirement in October 1975. Since his retirement, Colonel Sutherland has been employed with the Treasury Board - Temporary Assignment Program.

Colonel Sutherland was appointed Colonel of the Regiment on 6 July 1983.

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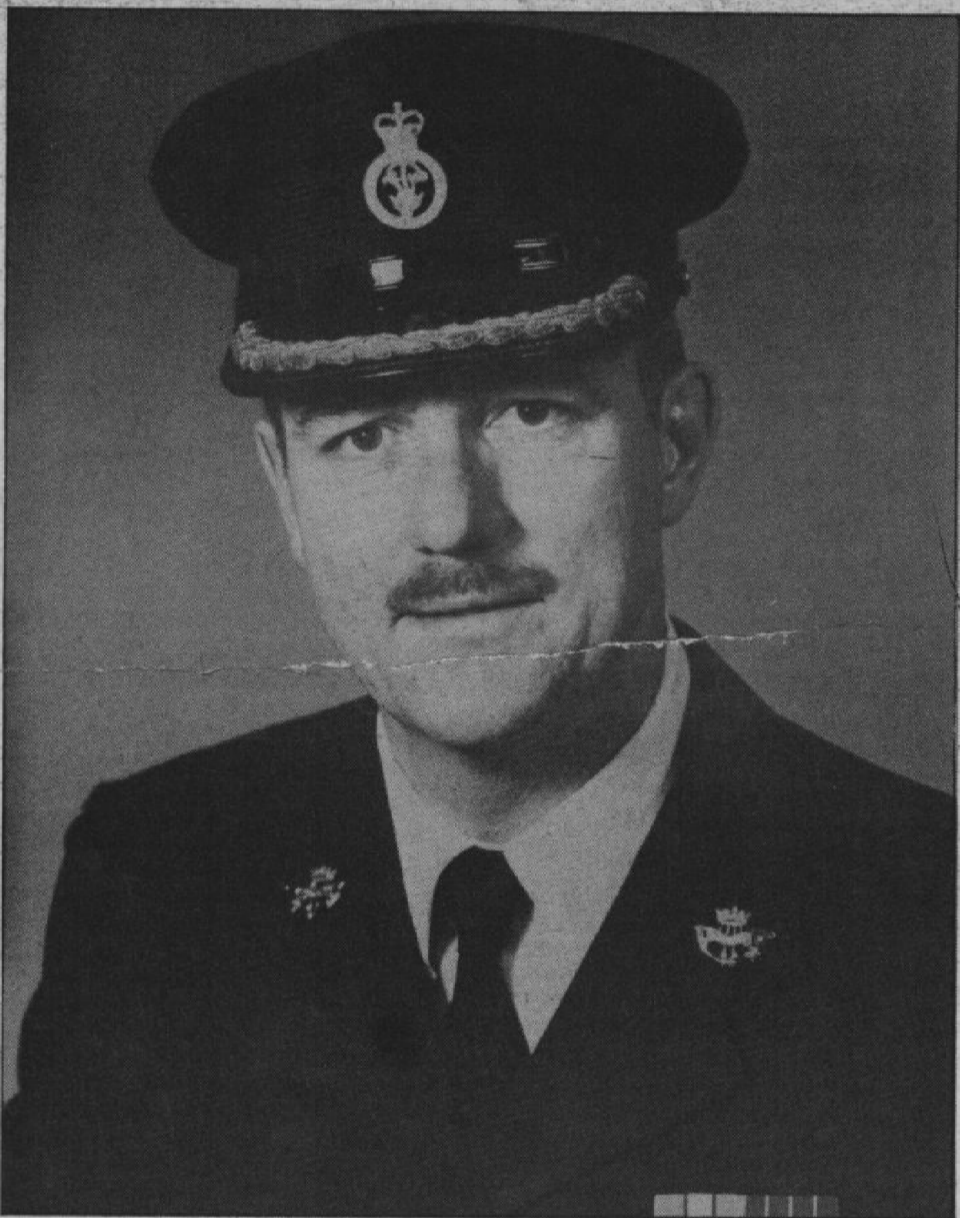
CHANGE OF COMMAND

Kapyong Barracks will be the scene of a handover of command ceremony on Sunday 27th May 1984. Command of the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry will be handed over to Lieutenant Colonel I. H. Gray from the outgoing Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel B. W. Ashton.

Lieutenant Colonel Ashton commanded the Battalion since June of 1982 in Winnipeg and as part of the United Nations Peacekeeping Force on the island of Cyprus. Lieutenant Colonel Ashton accompanied by his wife Carol, will be assuming new duties at the Army Combat Training Center at Canadian Forces Base Gagetown near Fredericton, New Brunswick.

Lieutenant Colonel I. H. (Ian) Gray, who will be assuming the duties of Commanding Officer of 2 PPCLI has for the past four years held senior staff appointments at Army Headquarters in St. Hubert, Quebec. Lieutenant Colonel Gray will be accompanied by his wife Jan, son Travis and daughter Lisa.

2PPCLI will be departing for Canadian Forces Base Baden in the Federal Republic of Germany in June and July where it will take over operational duties from the Third Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment.

Lieutenant-Colonel Ashton began his military career in 1961 with 25 Field Squadron, RCE (Militia) in Edmonton. In 1963 he joined the Regular Army under the Officer Candidate Programme. Following his commissioning in 1964 he joined 2nd Battalion, The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada where he served as a platoon commander and Intelligence Officer in Calgary and Cyprus. From 1968 to 1970 he was employed as a staff officer in the Personnel Branch of Canadian Forces Headquarters in Ottawa. Joining Third Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in 1970, he served as a company second-in-command and company commander in Victoria and Cyprus before attending the Canadian Land Forces Command and Staff College in 1971. Following graduation in 1972 he was posted to First Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in Calgary where he served as Operations Officer until his posting to Headquarters, 1 Combat Group as GSO 3 Operations in 1973. After his promotion to Major in 1974 he returned to First Battalion as a Company Commander. In 1976 he attended College Militaire Royal de Saint-Jean, Quebec from which he graduated in 1978 having completed a degree in Administration. Following graduation he rejoined First Battalion as Deputy Commanding Officer serving in Cyprus and Calgary. In early 1980 he moved to Headquarters, 1st British Corps in Bielefeld, Federal Republic of Germany where he was employed in an exchange appointment as the GSO 2 Operations. Promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel in 1981, he was posted to National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa as a section head in the Military Plans and Operations Division. He assumed command of Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry on 30 June 1982 and commanded the Battalion during its tour of duty with the United Nations Force In Cyprus (UNICYP) from September 82 to March 83.

Lieutenant-Colonel Ashton married Carol (nee Kneeland), a native of Montreal, in 1965 and they have two children, Philip, 16 and Susan, 14.

After handing over command of the Battalion on 27 May 1984, Lieutenant-Colonel Ashton will assume his new duties as the Commanding Officer of the Infantry School at the Army Combat Training Center at Canadian Forces Base Gagetown near Fredericton, New Brunswick.

Chief Warrant Officer (CWO) Clarke began his military career in 1960 when he enrolled in the Canadian Army and joined the Canadian Guards. After completing basic training at the Guards Depot he was posted to the Second Battalion Canadian Guards in Petawawa where he was employed as a Guardsman in a rifle company.

Mr. Clarke was posted to Army Tactics and Organization Board (ATO) Petawawa where he was employed as a driver and in January, 1963 he attended a Junior NCO Course in Camp Picton, Ontario.

CWO Clarke was promoted to Corporal in September, 1964 and posted to the Second Battalion Canadian Guards where he was employed as a Section Commander. On return from Cyprus in 1966, he was posted to the Canadian Guards Depot Petawawa where he was employed as a squad instructor. In March 1968, he attended a Senior NCO Course in Petawawa and the Royal Canadian School of Infantry (RCS of I), Camp Borden, Ontario. Subsequently posted to Two Airborne Commando, The Canadian Airborne Regiment, Edmonton Alberta, he was employed as a Section Commander and the Senior Jumpmaster in D Company.

In December 1969, Mr. Clarke was promoted to Sergeant and re-badged to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. In September 1971, he was posted to Second Battalion in Winnipeg.

On return from Cyprus in March 1973, Mr. Clarke was promoted to Warrant Officer and employed as the Platoon Second-in-Command of Reconnaissance Platoon and in June 1974 was posted to Egypt as part of the United Nations Emergency Force (UNEF 2) and employed at United Nations Headquarters in Cairo and Ismailia.

CWO Clarke returned from Egypt and re-joined the Battalion in December 1974 where he was employed as the Platoon Commander of Mortar Platoon. He attended the Company Sergeant Majors Course in January 1976 at the Combat Arms School, Gagetown, New Brunswick and on completion of the course he was posted back to the Second Battalion.

CWO Clarke was employed in Cyprus as a Company Quartermaster Sergeant, as the Company Sergeant Major of C Company, and in September, 1977 was appointed Quartermaster Sergeant Instructor (QMSI) of the Second Battalion.

In March 1980, he was promoted to his present rank and posted to Mok Command Headquarters, Montreal, Quebec. In August, 1981 he was appointed as The Regimental Sergeant Major (RSM) of the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and posted back to Kapyong Barracks Winnipeg, Manitoba.

On termination of his tour as RSM 2 PPCLI, RSM Clarke will return Petawawa where he will become Force Sergeant-Major of the Special Service Force.

Mr. Clarke is married to Joan (nee Kennedy) and has four children.

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TAKING OVER LIEUTENANT COLONEL GRAY C.D.

Lieutenant-Colonel Gray was born in Victoria, British Columbia in 1945. He was raised and attended school in Vernon, B.C.; Dawson City in the Yukon, and in North Vancouver B.C. In 1963 he joined the Royal Canadian Navy as an officer cadet in the Regular Officer Training Plan. On graduation from the University of British Columbia with a B.A. in 1967, he transferred to the Canadian Army and was commissioned as an officer in the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

In 1967 he married Elizabeth Janis Henderson of North Vancouver. Following a year of training at the Combat Arms School in Camp Borden, he joined the First Battalion of the Regiment in Calgary as a mechanized rifle platoon commander. After a year with 1 PPCLI, he was posted in 1969 to 2 PPCLI in Hemer, West Germany. On the return of the Second Battalion to Canada in 1970, he joined the newly formed 3 Mechanized Commando and served in Baden-Soellingen until 1973 as a rifle and mortar platoon commander.

On returning to Canada in 1973, he served for three years on the Operations and Training Staff of Headquarters 1 Canadian Brigade Group in Calgary. He was promoted Major in 1975 and subsequently joined 2 PPCLI in Cyprus in 1976, as OC of a mechanized rifle company. Service with the Second Battalion continued until late 1978, during which time he also commanded the Administrative Company of the Battalion.

In 1979 he attended the Defence Services Staff College at Wellington, in southern India.

He returned to Canada in 1980 as a staff officer at Mobile Command Headquarters in Montreal. He was promoted Lieutenant-Colonel in 1981 and underwent a year of French Language training in the Montreal area, following which, he was posted back to Mobile Command Headquarters. Most recently he has served as the Senior Staff Officer Training Development and Senior Staff Officer Operational Training at FMC HQ.

Lieutenant-Colonel Gray will take command of the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry at Kapyong Barracks, in Winnipeg, on the 27th of May 1984. In June 1984 he will move with the Battalion to Baden-Soellingen in West Germany, where the Battalion will serve until 1988.

Lieutenant-Colonel and Mrs. Gray have two school-age children; a son Travis and a daughter Lisa.

CWO ED BASARABA, CD

Born in Fir Mountain, Saskatchewan on 18 December 1933 Mr. Basaraba was processed through Number 9 Personnel Depot in Regina and under took his recruit training at the PPCLI Depot Edmonton in December 1957.

Posted to the First Battalion in Victoria, British Columbia, Mr. Basaraba accompanied the Battalion to successive tours of Germany, Edmonton, Egypt, Cyprus and Calgary.

Promoted to Sergeant in 1969 CWO Basaraba continued to serve in successive senior NCO appointments and reached the rank of Warrant Officer in 1975. Promoted to Master Warrant Officer in August 1978 he was selected second tour in Egypt and appointed Company Sergeant Major on return to Calgary.

On moving to the Army Combat Training Center at Gagetown, New Brunswick CWO Basaraba became CSM Operations Division and NCO I/C Range and Training Area.

Mr. Basaraba was promoted to Chief Warrant Officer in January 1984 and will assume the duties of Regimental Sergeant Major of the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry on his posting to CFB Baden, Federal Republic of Germany.

REGIMENTAL BAND

The Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Band is stationed in Calgary, Alberta, where it has been since moving from Edmonton to amalgamate with the Lord Strathcona's Band in 1968.

The Band has toured extensively throughout many areas of the free world in support of Canadian troops abroad, as well as public relations visits to the U.S.A.

The Director of Music is Captain Ron Swaneveld. He started his musical career as a trainee at the Canadian Forces School of Music Victoria, B.C. in 1961, and after graduation two years later, spent most of his playing career with the Royal Canadian Artillery, and Stadacona Band. In 1976 he was selected for the Assistant Director of Music Course at the School of Music. Captain Swaneveld received his commission early in 1979 and was posted to the PPCLI Band in May 1980.

The assistant Director of Music, C.W.O. Brian Gossip is a staff arranger and Tenor Saxophonist of the band as well as Associate Conductor.

The Band will be performing in the Farewell to Winnipeg Tattoo presented by the Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry at the Winnipeg Arena on Friday the 25th of May at 6:30 o'clock P.M.

FREEDOM OF THE CITY

Since the Regiment's formation, it has served Canada and its citizens and has shown willing sacrifice by all ranks. The Regiment has been cited for extraordinary heroism and outstanding performance of combat duties in action. Some of its members have been awarded the Victoria Cross for conspicuous bravery. The Officers and Men of the Regiment have served diligently in United Nations peacekeeping missions throughout the world thus bringing distinction to the Regiment, Canada and all peace loving nations of the world.

On September 13th, 1982 the Commanding Officer did present himself and the members of the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry for inspection prior to their departure for United Nations duty in Cyprus.

Therefore, I, William Norrie, Q.C. Mayor of the City of Winnipeg, do hereby reaffirm and permit the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry to exercise their traditional right of the "Freedom of the City" and to march through the City with bayonets fixed, drums beating and colors flying.

In witness, whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and cause to be affixed the seal of the City of Winnipeg this 13th Day of September, in the Year of our Lord, Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-two.

The Second Battalion, on behalf of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Regiment, received The Freedom of the City of Winnipeg on 15 June 1972.

The Colonel of the Regiment was also named an Honorary Citizen of the City of Winnipeg in Tribute to the Regiment during the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of the Regiment in 1964.

In ancient times, armed troops were not welcome within the walls of

towns. Consequently, it became an honour and great distinction for a town to grant to a particular trusted military body the freedom to march through the streets "with drums beating, bayonets fixed and Colours flying". The granting of the Freedom of the City today, is the highest honour a municipality can grant to a Regiment.

The text of the Scroll granting the Regiment Freedom of the City of Winnipeg reads:

CITY OF WINNIPEG

Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry

The City of Winnipeg, in recognition of the long association which existed with Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry since the Regiment was stationed in Winnipeg in April of 1920 on their return from the First World War, wishes to pay tribute to the members of the Regiment who have brought distinction to Canadian Arms and to the preservation of peace and security in our Nation.

Therefore, I, Stephen Juba, on behalf of the City of Winnipeg and by the authority vested in me, do hereby grant to Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry to Freedom Of The City, whereby formed parties of the Regiment may march through the City with bayonets fixed, drums beating and Colours flying.

Proclaimed on the occasion of the Trooping of the Colour Ceremony in commemoration of the return of the Regiment to the City of Winnipeg.

God Save The Queen

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the seal of the City of Winnipeg this Fifteenth Day of June in the Year of our Lord, Nineteen Hundred and Seventy-two.

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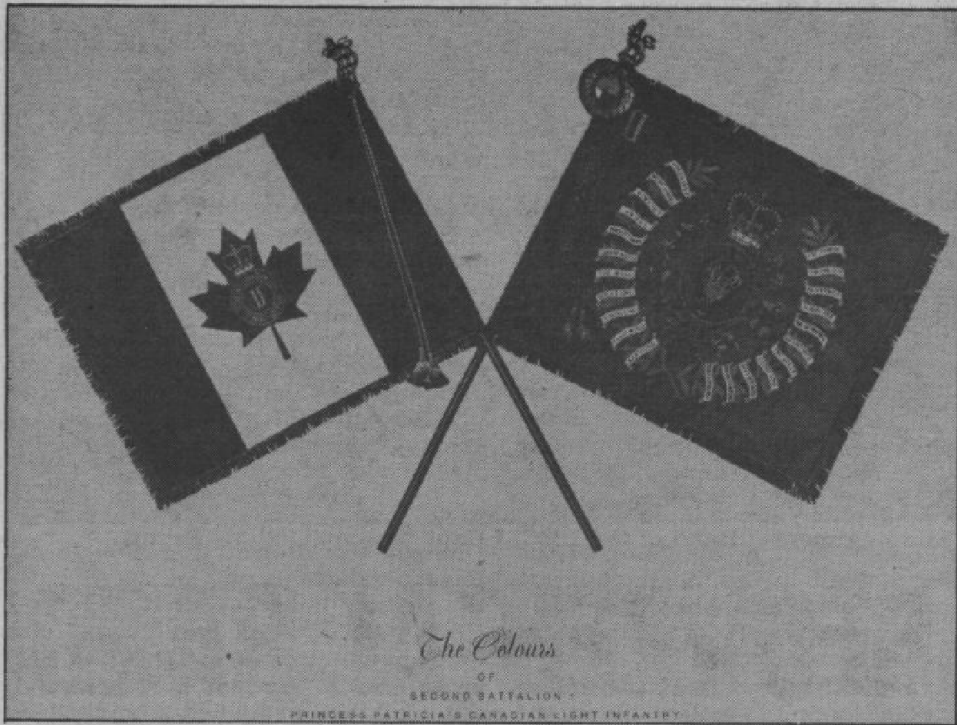
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THE COLORS



The Colours of Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

The Regiment has had, or is now carrying, a total of fifteen Camp, King's, Queen's and Regimental Colours.

The Original Colour

On the 23rd of August 1914, Her Royal Highness, Princess Patricia of Connaught, subsequently Lady Patricia Ramsay, presented to the Regiment a Camp Colour which she had designed and worked by hand. Because it was a Camp Colour, no formal regulations were broken when it was carried to France and remained with the Regiment throughout all actions that the Regiment took part in during the First World War.

Following the Second Battle of Ypres the Camp Colour was unofficially recognized as the Regimental Colour and afforded due respect and compliments. On the 28th of January 1919 at St. Leger, Belgium, the Flag was consecrated and officially became the first Regimental Colour.

The Original Colour, tattered, torn and shot through by shell and bullet, was encased and retired as the Regiment's most prized possession in 1922. It rests now in the Regimental Museum.

King's and Regimental Colours 1922 - 1934

In 1922 a facsimile of the Original Colour was obtained. This facsimile and a silk Union Jack were presented to the Regiment, at Winnipeg, Manitoba, by Viscount Byng of Vimy, Governor-General of Canada.

Unfortunately the Original Colour, its replica and the silk Union Jack could not be registered with the College of Heralds, although they were recognized as Colours. The replica and the silk Union Jack were laid up in All Saint's Church, Winnipeg, Manitoba, in 1934.

King's/Queen's and Regimental Colours 1934-1959

On the 14th of April 1934, the Earl of Bessborough, Governor-General of Canada, at a parade in the Minto Street Armouries, Winnipeg, Manitoba, presented the Regiment with Colours acceptable to the College of Heralds. The Regimental Colour had emblazoned on it the Battle Honours awarded to the Regiment for its actions during the First World War which had been gazetted in 1919. Upon the death of King George VI, and the accession of Queen Elizabeth II, the King's Colours became the Queen's Colour. These Colours became the Colours of First Battalion upon the formation of Second Battalion in 1950. These Colours were laid up on the 25th of November 1959, in St. Paul's Garrison Church, Esquimalt, British Columbia.

First Battalion Colours 1959 - 1977

Queen's and Regimental Colours, emblazoned with twenty-two Battle Honours were presented to the First Battalion, on the 17th of July 1959, by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in Victoria, British Columbia.

These Colours were retired on 8 May 1977 and laid up in the Regimental Museum.

First Battalion Colours 1977

On the 8th of May 1977 at McMahon Stadium, Calgary, Alberta the Colonel-in-Chief, The Lady Patricia Brabourne, CD, DL, JP presented new Queen's and Regimental Colours to her First Battalion. In this stand of Colours, the National Flag of Canada replaces the Union Jack as the basis of the Queen's Colour.

Second Battalion Colours 1953-1969

On the 11th of September 1953, in Currie Barracks, Calgary, Alberta, the Colonel-in-Chief, the late Lady Patricia Ramsay, VA, CI, CD, presented Queen's and Regimental Colours to the Second Battalion.

The United States Distinguished Unit Streamer was officially attached to the Regimental Colour, on the 9th of June 1956, by His Excellency Livingstone T. Merchant, United States Ambassador to Canada, at a parade in Currie Barracks, Calgary, Alberta.

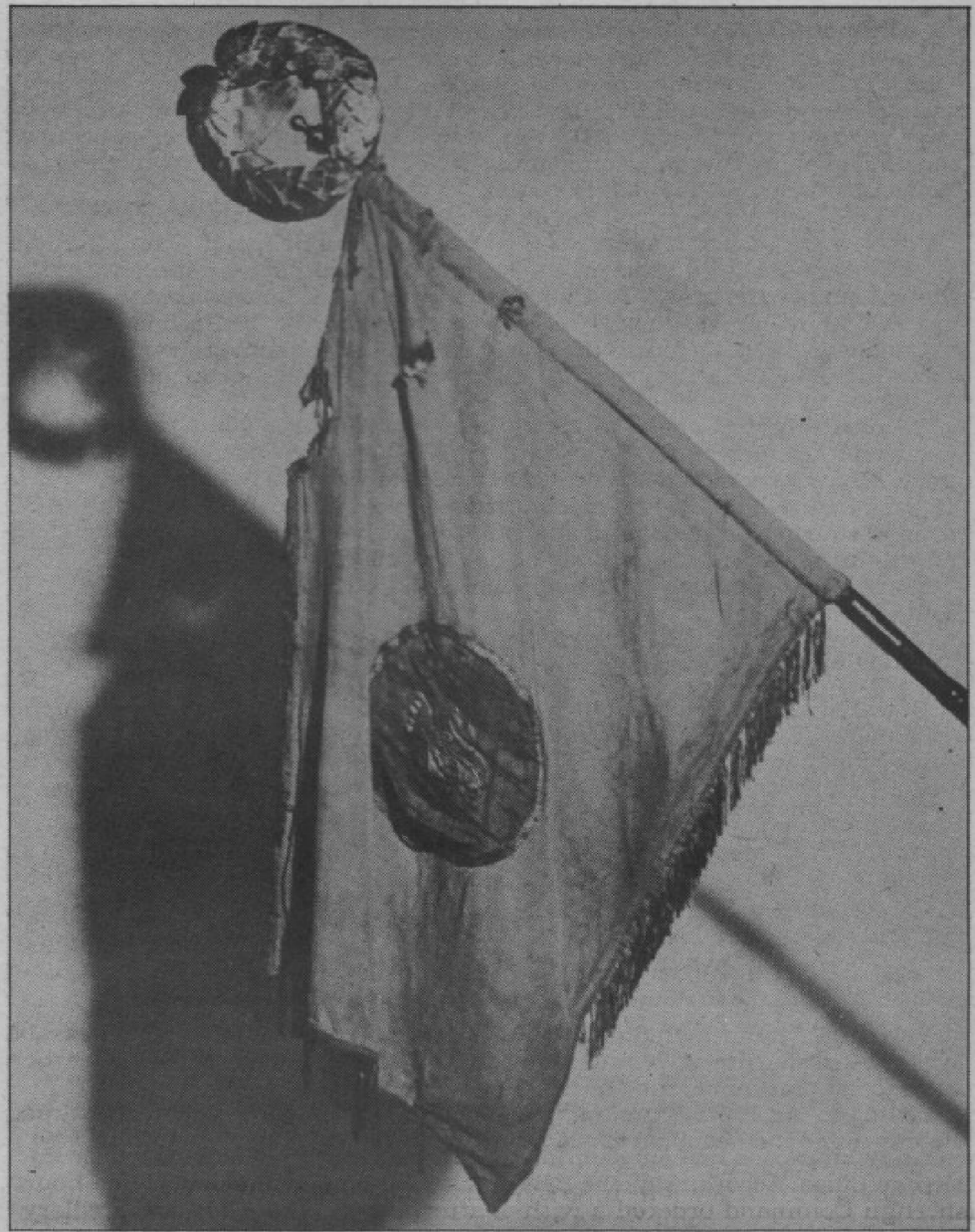
The Battle Honours for the Second World War and Korea were gazetted in 1957. Because the Regimental Colour of the Second Battalion was emblazoned with only the Battle Honours of the First World War the Colour was dispatched to the Royal School of Embroidery in England where the ten Honours of the Second World War and the two for the Korean conflict were emblazoned on it.

These Colours were laid up in the Regimental Museum in Currie Barracks, Calgary, Alberta, on the 14th of September 1969.

Second Battalion Colours 1969

The Second Battalion was presented its present Colours on the 5th of May 1969, by General J. V. Allard, CC, CBE, DSO, ED, CD, Chief of Defence Staff in Fort MacLeod, Germany.

The normal life span of Colours is a minimum of 15 years at which time they are replaced in the normal course of events and with due Ceremony of Presentation. On the occasion of this Presentation of Colours to the Second Battalion the National Flag of Canada replaced the Union Jack on the Queen's Colour.

BATTLE OF FREZENBERG 8TH OF MAY 1915

The Battle of Frezenberg was a critical action in the larger battle known as the Second Battle of Ypres.

The major encounter began with the German gas attacks against the 1st Canadian Division at Gravenstafel Ridge and St. Julien on April 22nd, 1915. Although the Canadians suffered heavily from the gas and were driven back towards Ypres, they did not collapse and by April 27th the German assault ground to a halt.

Stymied in their attempts on the north-west flank of Ypres, the Germans withdrew their shock troops and prepared for another thrust from a different direction, this time along the Menin and Passchendaele roads. This assault was planned for the 8th of May, 1915, and became known as the Battle of Frezenberg. Bellewaerde Ridge was the key to the entire action, and it was there that the Patricias made their stand.

For the Patricias, the defence at Bellewaerde was the culmination of a long tour in action. As members of the 80th Brigade of the British 27th Division, they moved into the line in front of Polygon Wood (GR 9933) on April 19th. Three days later, just to the north at St. Julien, the Canadian 1st Division began its stern test against the gas and the Germans. This battle did not overflow into the PPCLI area, but the serious situation required every reserve unit to be put into the breach. The Patricias were left in the trenches under heavy fire and without relief for sixteen days straight.

When the crisis to the north was over, the allied line was severely buckled. The Polygon Wood positions were now an exposed salient deep into German Lines. Accordingly, the British High Command ordered a withdrawal from Polygon Wood to the last piece of high ground before Ypres — Bellewaerde Ridge (GR 968335). This withdrawal was ordered to commence at 2000 hrs May 3rd.

As no trenches actually existed on the ridge and the general situation precluded any work parties from reserve units digging the new line, the Patricias were forced to send back all the men they could spare to work on the new position. However, the entrenchment was little more than a ditch when the night of the 3rd of May arrived.

The withdrawal was well executed, with rearguards in all the trenches keeping the Germans unaware of the activity until first light on May 4th. Immediately after the enemy dis-

coered that the allied units had withdrawn, they pushed forward and were soon digging themselves in on the reverse slope of Westhoek Ridge (GR 974337). To cover their entrenching troops, the Germans brought down heavy artillery fire on the Patricias on Bellewaerde Ridge. In the shallow trenches this proved devastating, and by the time the Patricias were relieved that night the unit had suffered 122 casualties — the greatest loss it ever received outside of a general action.

One of the casualties caused a great deal of concern, as Lieutenant Colonel Buller was wounded in the eye by a shell splinter during the withdrawal. Fortunately Major Hamilton Gault had returned to the unit on May 3rd and was available to command. He brought with him a few reinforcements, but the Patricias were still a tired understrength unit when they were called back to the line on the night of May 6/7.

The Patricias held 600 yards of a still-very-weak trench system which ran from a junction point on the right with the 4th King's Royal Rifle Corps (4KRR) at GR 969334 to a junction point with the 1st King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry (1 KO YLI) at a track at GR 969338. As dawn broke on May 8th, No. 1 and No. 2 Companies were in the forward trench, while Nos 3 and 4 were in the support line. Behind them was Bellewaerde Lake and no other prepared defences until one reached the "GHQ Line" at the outskirts of Ypres itself. The high ground of the ridge was the dominating feature on the allied side between the Passchendaele and Menin Roads.

The morning of May 8th was unnaturally quiet. Suddenly, one hour after dawn, the German artillery opened fire. Patricia veterans later stated that it was the most intense shelling they suffered in the entire war. Soon the inadequate trenches began to collapse, and the number of casualties began to mount. At 0800 hrs Major Gault sent a message to 80th Brigade Headquarters informing them that he had only 160 men left in the front line, along with two machine guns.

Shortly after that message was sent, members of No 2 Company spotted the German infantry massing behind Westhoek Ridge for the attack. The Patricias manned the firing line and stopped the first wave just short of the Battalion's front line. However, the Germans managed to get two or three machine guns into a damaged

farmhouse just in front of the Canadian position, and soon a deadly rain of machine-gun fire was adding more men to the casualty list. With most of the trench blown away and no protection from the machine-gun fire, the few remaining men of No 1 Company and the right section of No 2 Company were forced back to the support line.

At 0900 hrs the main German assault came in. The few survivors left in No 2 Company stopped the Germans short of their positions, but the Germans were quick to establish themselves in No 1 Company's old trench on the right. No 2 Company was now completely enfiladed, and was forced to conduct a fighting withdrawal. Captain H. S. Dennison and Lieutenant D. A. Clarke, along with a handful of men, covered the company's withdrawal by staying in the forward trench. They were never heard from again. Among the withdrawing men was Private J. Bushby. He decided to stay behind to assist the wounded back to the support line. At one point Bushby fought off two of the enemy while a wounded comrade made his escape. Bushby then withdrew himself. By 1000 hrs the front line was abandoned.

At about this time, two other important developments took place. As the advance was halted, the Germans recommenced their heavy artillery barrage. Major Hamilton Gault was severely wounded, and command passed to Captain Agar Adamson. In addition, through the smoke of battle the Patricias could see elements of the 28th Division (to the north) moving back. The Patricias did not realize it, but their positions were becoming the last bulwark against a general German breakthrough between the Menin and Passchendaele Roads.

At 80th Brigade Headquarters on the railway line at GR 952338, it was becoming apparent that the line to the left of the PPCLI had collapsed. Accordingly a reserve battalion was brought into Railway Wood immediately in front of Brigade Headquarters, and the 4th Rifle Brigade was sent forward to aid the Patricias. The Rifle Brigade brought the PPCLI desperately-needed ammunition and two more machine guns, then moved to guard the Patricias' left flank. Here they could do no more than hold their positions as the German advance penetrated to the road junction at Potijze (GR 939344).

As the Germans made headway on the narrow front to the north, they made further efforts to widen the opening in the line. This of course meant removing the Patricias from Bellewaerde Ridge. The period from 1000 hrs to 1400 hrs was the crisis, as the heavy German barrage

methodically destroyed the support trench now serving as a front line. The shelling stopped only long enough to allow the German infantry to assault again. Several times they tried, and each time they were stopped. The Canadian machine-guns were repeatedly buried by exploding shells; but were dug out, remounted, and continued firing. Finally all the guns and crews were eliminated by direct hits from artillery.

By 1400 hrs the Battalion was in desperate straits. Trenches, machine-guns, all but five officers and 20% of the men were gone, and the left flank was open. However, both the PPCLI and the 4 KRR on the right managed to hold on. Just before 1500 hrs a reserve platoon brought forward some much-needed ammunition. The resupply timing was excellent, for at 1500 hrs the Germans made their final assault. With ammunition to spare, the Patricias stopped the attack.

Little by little, the initiative changed hands. At 1600 hrs, the 28th Division counter-attacked up the Passchendaele Road. By 1730 hrs the British had recaptured Verloren Hoek (GR 956350) and began the link-up with the units of the 27th Division on Bellewaerde Ridge. By nightfall the line had been completely stabilized.

With the coming of night, the Patricias began the grisly tasks of caring for the wounded and burying the dead. At 2330 hrs they were relieved, and the remaining four officers and 150 men withdrew to the town of Ypres. For them the battle was over.

During the Battle of Bellewaerde Ridge the patricias lost a total of 10 officers and 382 other ranks. As most of these were killed, it was the worst day in action the Regiment has ever experienced. Furthermore, if one considers the entire April-May action as one continuous battle, the unit had the dubious honor of suffering the heaviest casualties in the entire 27th Division — over 700 in three weeks. Bellewaerde was the grave of the "Originals" of the PPCLI.

The cost had been great, but the Patricias were successful. They had held their positions when almost all others had given way. Ypres was saved and the great reputation of the Regiment was made. During the next few months and years, many military leaders and writers would praise them for their actions on May 8th 1915. But for the survivors, the greatest praise of all came on that very same day. As the 154 weary Patricias marched back to Ypres that night, the rest of the 80th Brigade lined the road, took off their hats to the Ric-a-dam-doo, and cheered and cheered again.

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HISTORY OF THE REGIMENT

UNIT DESIGNATION

The designation of the Regiment is, "Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry". The authorized abbreviation is "PPCLI". The term "Patricias" is used informally. Although the Regiment bears the name "Light Infantry", it has never dressed in the traditional light infantry manner nor has it been employed as light infantry. The designation was chosen by the Founder to reflect the "irregular force" of his original idea, and succinctly captured the traditional philosophy of light troops, that of the "fighting, thinking soldier", epitomized by the original members and carried on by the Regiment ever since. The tangible connection with light infantry traditions rests solely with the "bugle horn" collar badges on a certain rifle green appointments used and worn from time to time.

SENIOR APPOINTMENTS

Colonel-in-Chief Her Royal Highness Princess Patricia of Connaught was appointed "Honorary" Colonel-in-Chief on the 22nd of February, 1918. Subsequent to her marriage on the 29th of February 1919 to Commander, later Admiral, the Honorable, the late, Sir Alexander Ramsay, QCVO, KCB, DSO, she became Lady Patricia Ramsay, having relinquished all Royal titles at her own request. She was later appointed Colonel-in-Chief and held the appointment until her death on the 12th of January, 1974.

The Countess Mountbatten of Burma, CD, JP, DL was appointed Colonel-in-Chief of the Regiment on the 15th of June, 1978. She is the elder daughter of the late Admiral of the Fleet, The Earl Mountbatten of Burma, KG, PC, GCB, QM, GCSI, GCIE, TCVO, DSO, and upon his death succeeded to his titles by special remainder. The Countess Mountbatten is a goddaughter and cousin of the late Lady Patricia Ramsay.

Colonel of the Regiment The Founder, Andrew Hamilton Gault, was appointed Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment in 1948 and the first Colonel of the Regiment in 1958. He served as Colonel of the Regiment until his death in November 1958. The present Colonel of the

Regiment is Colonel W. B. S. Sutherland, who was appointed on 7 July 1983. In the intervening years Major General C. B. Ware, DSO, CD and Major General G. G. Brown, CD have also served as Colonel of the Regiment.

FORMATION OF THE REGIMENT

The Founding On August 3, 1914 Mr. A. Hamilton Gault, a Montreal businessman, offered in the event of war, to raise and equip a battalion for overseas service. Three days later his offer was accepted. Her Royal Highness, Princess Patricia of Connaught had consented to give her name to the battalion to be composed largely of ex-servicemen returning to the Colours and to be commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel F. D. Farquhar, DSO, an officer of the Coldstream Guards, then serving as a Military Secretary to His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, Governor-General of Canada. On August 10th the Charter was signed and the following day mobilization began. The Charter was embodied in the Report of the Committee of the Privy Council of Canada, PC 2112 dated 14 August 1914, and constitutes the authority for the formation of the Regiment.

Certified copy of the Report of the Committee of the Privy Council approved by His Royal Highness the Governor-General on the 14th August 1914 from the Minister of Militia and Defence, recommending, with the approval of the Imperial Government, that authority be granted for the formation of a battalion under the style and title of "Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry".

That towards arming, clothing, equipping, paying, subsistence, transporting, and towards any other expense connected with the formation, training and maintenance of the Battalion, whether in or out of Canada, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars will be contributed by Captain Hamilton Gault of Montreal, the remainder being defrayed by the Department of Militia and Defence.

The Minister further recommends that authority be granted to the various branches of the Department of Militia and Defence to issue the arms, accoutrements, ammunition, vehicles, clothing, equipment, stationery

and other articles comprised in the "war outfit" of a battalion; to provide horses (riding and draught), and to issue such stores and supplies as may be required during the process of organization, at Ottawa or elsewhere.

That to enable officers, non-commissioned officers and men to join the battalion, transportation requisitions will be supplied to them by Officers Commanding Divisions and Districts; and the Quartermaster-General is hereby authorized to issue the necessary orders.

That the pay of all ranks will be at the same rate as that approved for the other battalions of the Canadian Expeditionary Force; and the Accountant and Paymaster General is hereby authorized to issue it from the date on which each officer is gazetted and each man attested.

That the principle of the financial relations between Captain Gault and the Department of Militia and Defence is that all payments will, in the first instance, be made by the Department, and that a total sum of one hundred thousand dollars will be received, subsequently, from Captain Gault.

That the foregoing arrangements are to hold good until the discharge of the officers and men after the return of the Battalion to Canada.

The Committee concur in the foregoing recommendations and submit the same for approval.

WORLD WAR I

By August 18th, mobilization was completed. Old soliders had flocked in from every part of Canada; out of 1,098 of all ranks, 1,049 had seen previous service. On September 27th the Battalion sailed from Quebec. In mid-November it was assigned to the 27th Division and allotted to the 80th Brigade, where it found as comrades the 3rd and 4th Battalions, King's Royal Rifles, 4th Battalion, The Rifle Brigade and the 2nd Battalion, The King's Shropshire Light Infantry. On December 20th the Regiment sailed for France, being the first Canadian combat unit to reach the theatre of operations. On Christmas Eve it arrived at Blaringham on the Flanders front and on January 6th it went into water-logged trenches at Vierstraat, as the southern caulk of the horse-shoe of the Ypres Salient.

After an abominable winter, during which Lieutenant-Colonel Farquhar was killed, Major Hamilton Gault wounded and Lieutenant-Colonel H. C. Buller, formerly Adjutant, and also of the Governor-General's Staff, assumed command, there came a fearful spring. Behind billowing clouds of poison gas the enemy struck at the Salient; the front barely held. On May 8th, when the line was taut to breaking, the Patricias took the shock in the fighting at Frezenberg at a cost of 10 officers and 392 other ranks.

Here Major Gault, while in command, was severely wounded for the second time. There followed an easy summer and autumn of rebuilding in quiet sectors around Armentiers and on the Somme. On November the 8th the patricias with deep regret said goodbye to their staunch British comrades of the 27th Division and returned to Flanders to be incorporated in the 7th Canadian Brigade of the newly arrived 3rd Canadian Division. their associates were The Royal Canadian Regiment, 42nd Battalion (Royal Highlanders of Canada) and the 49th (Edmonton) Battalion.

Another bleak winter in the Salient and fighting again raged in the spring. At Hooze and Sanctuary Wood the Patricias lost upward of 500 men, including Lieutenant-Colonel Buller, who was killed on a parapet in Sanctuary Wood. Major Hamilton

Gault in taking his third wound lost his leg, but he would not be denied; he soon was back on the Staff of the 3rd Canadian Division. Lieutenant Colonel R. T. Pelly took over command and the Patricias in September and October took their turns in the bloodbath of the Somme. The price of victory at Flers-Courcellette and at Regina Trench was 400 casualties. Thereafter Lieutenant Colonel A.S.A.M. Adamson assumed command. There followed a winter of alarms and excursions (in the form of trench raids) along the Crater Line at Arras. On Easter Monday 1917, the Patricias were in the van of the great assault which hurled the enemy from the bastion of Vimy Ridge.

Then came frustrated hopes. Russia collapsed and France all but followed suit; the British Empire armies shouldered the burden while the United States made ready. So back once more to the Salient and to a greater and more terrible battle. At the end of October, on the shell-torn approaches to Gravenstafel Ridge, the Patricias again gained and held their ground but at a cost of 24 officers and 419 men. Nearly half the casualties were fatal. Here Lieutenant H. McKenzie and Sergeant G. H. Mullin won the Victoria Cross.

Then came the year of full acquittance. The Patricias were not engaged in the furious battle which stemmed the last and greatest enemy assault but on August the 8th ("the black day" of the German Army), when thirty Allied divisions swept in counter-attack across the Picardy ridges, they once more were in the van. That evening, for the first time in the War, they were in open country and Lieutenant-Colonel Hamilton Gault, who was never far away, came riding up across the fields to cheer them on. There was bitter fighting still to come - at Parvillers, where Sergeant R. Spall died in winning the Victoria Cross, at the breaking of the Drocourt-Queant switch line and at the forcing of the Canal-du-Nord defences, where that great soldier and almost legendary figure, Lieutenant-Colonel C. J. T. Stewart DSO, who had taken over command from Lieutenant-Colonel Adamson in March 1918, was killed on the approaches to Poulton Wood. In smashing through the last German defence lines the Patricias suffered 55 casualties. The end was near. At 0200 hours on the 11th of November, Company of the Regiment entered Mons, where the "Old Contemptibles" of the British Expeditionary Force first met the enemy. Nineteen hours later the bugles blew Armistice.

Between the World Wars On March 21st 1919, the Regiment was reconstituted as a unit of the Permanent Active Militia. During the period from reactivation until April 1920, Battalion Headquarters was located in Toronto, "B" Company in London and "D" Company was formed in Esquimalt, British Columbia, and brought to Toronto in August 1919.

In April 1920, "A" and "D" Companies, with Battalion Headquarters were established in Fort Osborne Barracks, Winnipeg, Manitoba and "B" Company in Work Point Barracks, Esquimalt, British Columbia.

In 1924 "D" Company was disbanded and the Regiment remained in Winnipeg and in Esquimalt until the start of the Second World War.

THE SECOND WORLD WAR

The Regiment was mobilized for active service on 1 September 1939. Recruited in Winnipeg and Vancouver Island, the Battalion was brought up to strength in October and conc

trated in Winnipeg under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel W. G. Colquhoun, MC. The Regiment departed from Winnipeg on 17 December and sailed from Halifax on 21 December 1939, on the ORAMA as part of the 1st Canadian Infantry Division.

On arrival in Scotland the Regiment moved to Aldershot Command and spent New Year's Eve in Cove, England. Three years were spent in coastal defence and training in much of the United Kingdom.

On 10 July 1943, 1st Canadian Infantry Division landed in Sicily as part of the 8th Army. After the short Sicilian Campaign, the Regiment landed and fought in Italy from September 1943 to March 1945.

Victory in Europe found the Battalion in Holland. The Regiment fought throughout World War II as part of the 2nd Brigade with its old friends, the Loyal Edmonton Regiment (formerly 49th Bn) and the Seaforth Highlanders of Canada from Vancouver.

On 1 June 1945, a new battalion of the Regiment was authorized to form part of the Canadian Pacific Force in the Campaign against Japan. Its official designation was 1st Canadian Infantry Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, 2nd Canadian Infantry Regiment. The Battalion assembled at Camp Shilo and then moved to Camp MacDonald for training. After the destruction of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, in early August by atomic bombs, and Japan's subsequent surrender on 15 August the Pacific Force was disbanded. Until a decision was reached to form a Permanent Force the holding establishment was named the "Interim Force". Because of this change a new battalion was redesignated on 2 September 1945, as the 2nd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

In the meantime, the Regiment's battalion in Europe, very much understrength, returned to Winnipeg in October 1945, and was demobilized.

In 1946, the "Interim Force" was gradually abolished in order to reconstitute the Canadian Army Active Force. The existing battalion became once again a component of the "peacetime" Army and on 1 March 1947, the battalion was redesignated Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

POST SECOND WORLD WAR
The Regiment moved from Camp MacDonald to Shilo, Manitoba, in January 1946, and to Calgary, Alberta on 10 June, 1946.

The arrival of the Patricia's in Calgary marked the beginning of a pleasant period in the history of the Regiment. Currie Barracks, located in the South-West Corner of the foothills city, became the "Home Station" of the Regiment.

In 1948, the Patricia's became Canada's first peacetime airborne battalion. The Regiment formed part of the nation's "Mobile Striking Force" which later became known as the Defence of Canada Force.

KOREA
On 15 August 1950, Second Battalion of the Regiment was formed as part of the Canadian Army Special Force. On the same date, the serving unit was designated First Battalion.

Second Battalion trained at Sarcee and Wainwright. On 26 November, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel J. R. Stone, DSO, MC, the Battalion sailed from Seattle, Washington, on the PRIVATE JOE P. MARTINEZ bound for Pusan, Korea.

A Presidential Unit Citation was won at Kapyong, Korea on 25 April 1951, by Second Battalion, while serving with the 27th British Commonwealth Brigade. Transferred to 25 Canadian Infantry Brigade of the British Commonwealth Division, the Battalion completed its tour of duty in the fall of 1951.

Second Battalion was relieved in Korea by the First Battalion and

returned to Calgary to take over the airborne role.

On 30 November 1950, a Third Battalion of the Regiment was formed. The battalion trained in Wainwright, Camp Borden and Ipperwash. It provided reinforcements for both Second and First Battalion during their tours of duty in Korea.

POST KOREA

During the summer of 1953, First Battalion, Second Battalion (Airborne) and the Regimental Depot were in service together at Currie Barracks, Calgary, Alberta. In September, the Colonel-in-Chief reviewed her Regiment, (less Third Battalion, which was still in the Korean Theatre), when a large number of the "Old Guard", veterans of World Wars I and II, were present. After twelve months active service the Third Battalion was reduced to nil strength on 8 January 1954. Selected officers and men were transferred to the Second Battalion, Canadian Regiment of Guards.

In October 1953, Second Battalion departed for service in Germany to join the 1st Brigade as part of Canada's contribution to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

During the intervening years the Battalions of the Regiment have continued to serve Canada honourably with NATO in Europe and UN peacekeeping duties in Cyprus and the Middle East. The Third Battalion was formed at Work Point Barracks, Esquimalt, British Columbia on 26 April 1970, when The First Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles of Canada was redesignated as a Patricia Battalion. The present units and locations of the Regiment are:

Regimental Headquarters - Calgary, Alta. First Battalion - Calgary, Alta. Second Battalion - Winnipeg, Man. Third Battalion - Esquimalt, B.C. the Loyal Edmonton Regiment (4 PPCLI) - Edmonton, Alta. The Patricia Battle School - Camp Wainwright. The Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Band - Calgary, Alta. Infantry Regimental Museum - Calgary, Alta.

SALUTE TO WINNIPEG

The Second Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (2 PPCLI) will present a MILITARY TATTOO in a farewell salute to the citizens of the City of Winnipeg which has been the home of the Battalion for the last fourteen years.

2 PPCLI, famous for distinguished service during the Korean Conflict, is leaving Winnipeg to take up operational duties in southern Germany this summer, where it will replace the Third Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment (3RCR). 3 RCR will take up residence at Kapyong Barracks, Winnipeg at the corner of Grant Ave. and Kenaston Blvd.

The general public is invited to line the route and give the unit an appreciative send off before the unit departs Winnipeg to take up operational duties in the Federal Republic of Germany.

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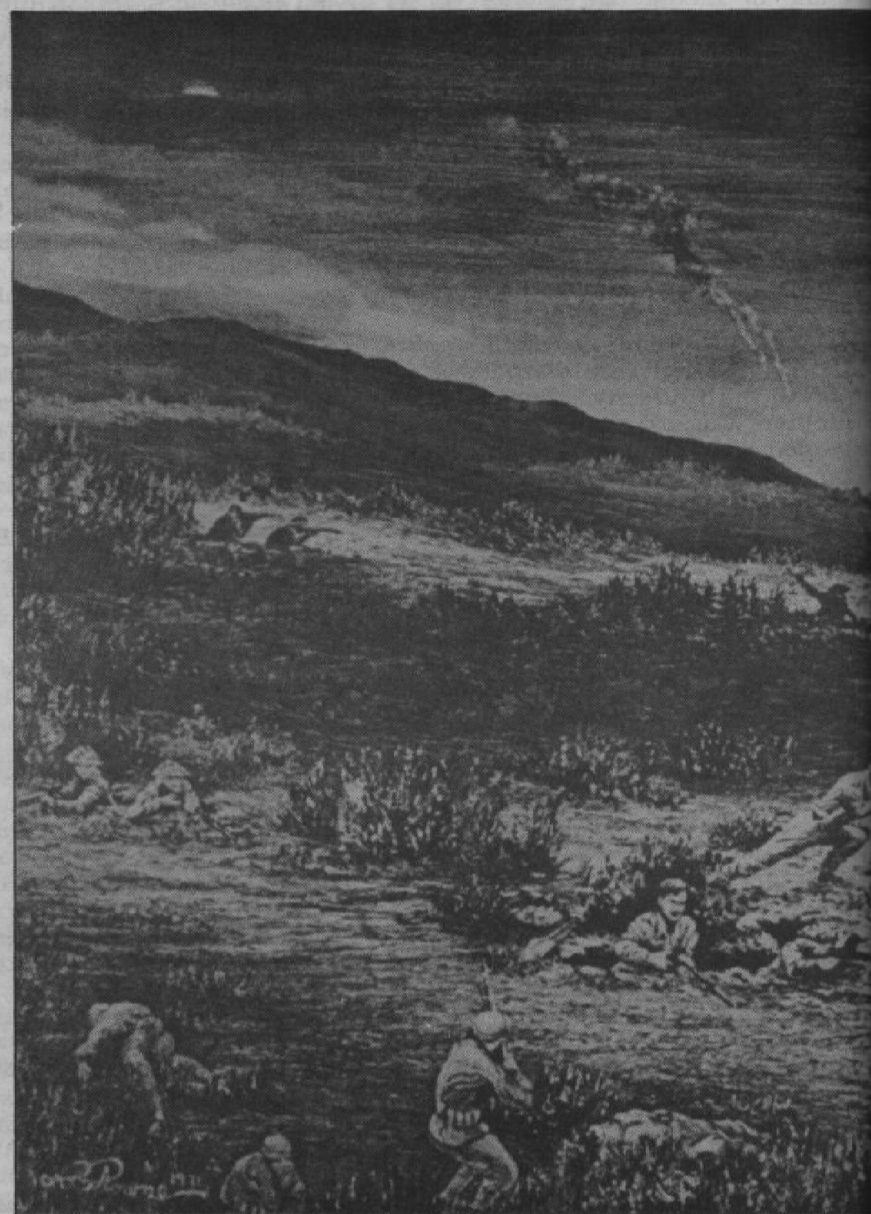

which was the Battle of Frezenberg, 8 May 1915.

At the outbreak of the Second World War the Regiment sailed overseas with the 1st Canadian Infantry Division in December 1939. There followed three years of training in England. At last, in July 1943, the Regiment sailed from Scotland to join the forces massing for the invasion of Sicily. From the assault landing on July 10th, 1943, until its transfer to North West Europe in March 1945, the Regiment engraved in Italy a record that was as glorious in accomplishment as it was tragic in losses. The Regiment ended the War as part of First Canadian Army, fighting in the final campaign in Holland and Germany.

When the Korean conflict broke out in 1950, the Regiment was expanded to three battalions. The Second Battalion sailed for Korea as Canada's contribution to the United Nations Force in November of that year. During that year the 2nd Patricias gained the unique distinction of being the first and only Canadian unit to win a United States Presidential Unit Citation for its stand against the Chinese at Kapyong on the 25th of April 1951.

In 1969 the Home Station of the Regiment moved from the Hamilton Gault Barracks in Edmonton to Currie Barracks in Calgary, where it remains today. Currently the 1st Battalion is at the Home Station in Calgary, the Second Battalion is at Kapyong Barracks in Winnipeg, and the Third Battalion is at Work Point Barracks in Victoria.

The Second Battalion has served at Kapyong Barracks since 1970 when it returned from Germany. Since that time the Battalion has served on three United Nations tours in Cyprus, the most recent from September 1982 to April 1983. The Battalion leaves Winnipeg during the period 15 June - 16 July to take up new duties for four years with Canadian Forces Europe in Baden-Soellingen, West Germany. The Third Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment will succeed the Battalion at Kapyong Barracks.

On the eve of the outbreak of World War I, Captain Andrew Hamilton Gault of Montreal proposed the formation of a regiment to the government and offered to contribute 100,000 dollars to assist in equipping it. Her Royal Highness Princess Patricia of Connaught, the daughter of Canada's Governor General, consented to give her name to the Regiment - Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

The Regiment went into action in France on the 24th of December 1914 as a part of the British 27th Division. Under British command until December 1915, the Regiment took part in many famous battles, the foremost of

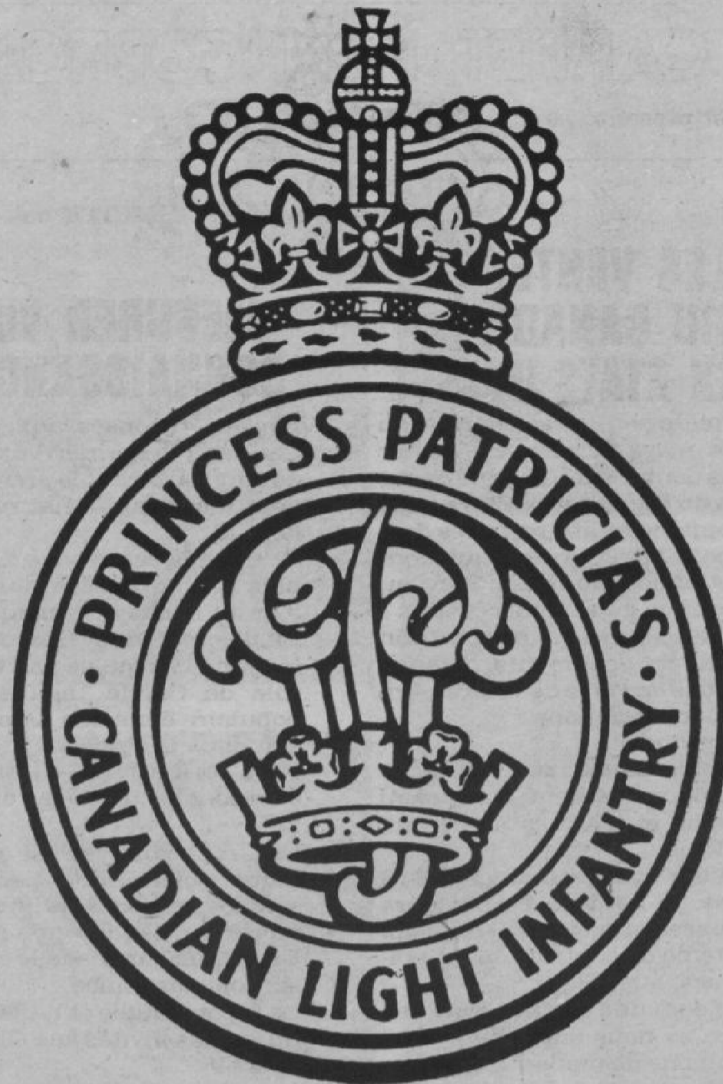
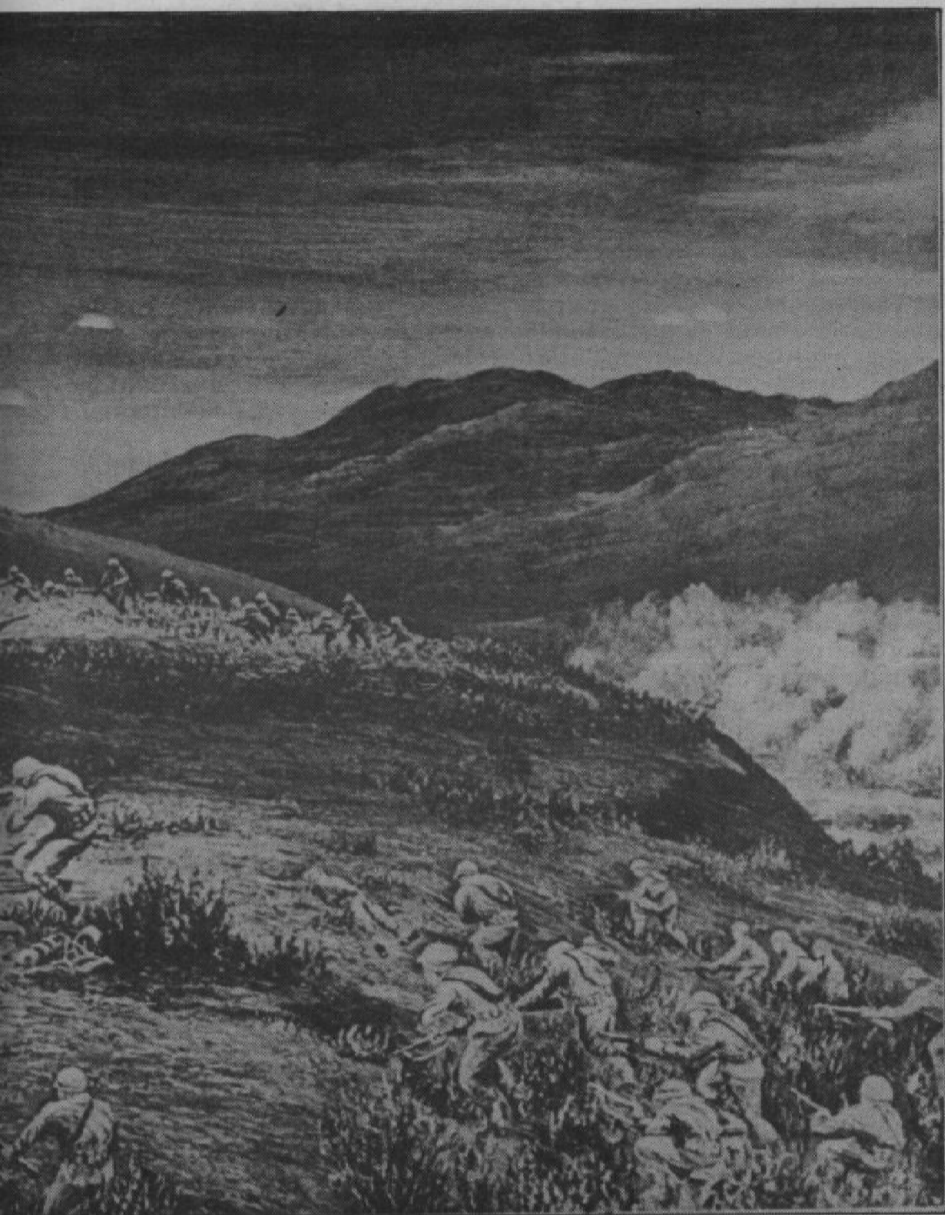

The units displayed exceptional resistance and penetrated to the area north of Kapyong. Early on the 24th of April, the 3D BATTALION, ROYAL CANADIAN TANK BATTALION, supported all units to the full extent and assisted in evacuating the wounded. Troops from the 3D BATTALION infiltrated with the withdrawing force and trumpets. The forward elements were completely destroyed. Again and again the enemy threw waves of troops at the outer defense, but each time the courageous, brave and gallant soldiers held their defensive positions and repulsed the thrusts. Towards the close of the second day, the seriousness of the break-through on the central front of these heroic and courageous soldiers. The 3D BATTALION, PRINCESS PATRICIA'S CANADIAN LIGHT INFANTRY displayed such gallantry, determination and esprit de corps under the most difficult and hazardous conditions as to set them apart and distinguish their achievements they have brought distinguished credit to the Canadian name.

ROYAL AUSTRALIAN REGIMENT

PRINCESS PATRICIA'S CANADIAN LIGHT INFANTRY

72ND HEAVY TANK BATTALION (UNITED STATES)

For gallant performance of combat duties in action against the armed enemy on the night of 24/25 April 1951. The enemy had broken through the main line of defense. The units listed above were deployed to stem the assault. The ROYAL AUSTRALIAN REGIMENT, Moved to the right flank of the enemy on the Nhon River. The 2D BATTALION, PRINCESS PATRICIA'S CANADIAN LIGHT INFANTRY, held Hill 677 on the left flank. COMPANY A, 72D HEAVY TANK BATTALION, used its full strength and in addition, kept the main roads open to the retreating division which passed through the sector which enabled the enemy to retreat. The enemy attacked savagely under the clangor of bugles and the sound of the enemy surrounded going through the first day and into the second. The gallant defenders, and many times succeeded in penetrating the enemy's front. The gallant and determined soldiers repulsed the fanatical attack. Critical supplies were dropped by air to the encircled units. The gallant and indefatigable persistence, and the heavy tolls of the enemy. In some instances when the enemy fired friendly artillery fire on their own positions in repelling the enemy break-through had been stopped. The units had been changed from default to victory by the gallant stand of the ROYAL AUSTRALIAN REGIMENT, PRINCESS PATRICIA'S CANADIAN LIGHT INFANTRY, and COMPANY A, 72 HEAVY TANK BATTALION, in accomplishing their mission under extremely difficult conditions. The units, and other units participating in the campaign, and by their gallant actions, their homelands, and all freedom-loving nations.

UNIT CITATION

The United States Distinguished Unit Citation, commonly referred to as the Presidential Unit Citation, was awarded to the Second Battalion for its stand at the Battle of Kapyong, Korea, on the night of the 24/25 of April 1951.

The text of the Citation follows this item.

A blue streamer with "Kapyong, Korea", embroidered in white, is fastened at the top of the pike on the Regimental Colour carried by Second Battalion and is known as the Distinguished Unit Streamer.

An emblem, a ribbon of the same blue as the streamer, mounted within a rectangular gold wreath frame, is worn on both shoulders of the uniform immediately below the unit shoulder title. This emblem is known as the distinguished Unit Emblem.

Officers and men who were on strength of Second Battalion, or were permanently attached as on War Establishment, on the date of the Battle of Kapyong, 25th of April 1951, shall wear the emblem as a permanent part of their uniform.

Officers and men who are subsequently posted on strength of Second Battalion who were not present with Second Battalion at the time of the Battle of Kapyong shall wear the emblem as a temporary part of their uniform, only for so long as they remain on the strength of Second Battalion.

Officers and men who were on strength of Second Battalion or were permanently attached as on War Establishment on the date of the Battle of Kapyong but who were subsequently posted or transferred to another component of the Canadian Forces shall wear the emblem as a permanent part of their uniform.

En première page de son édition du samedi 24 mars dernier, Le Devoir dévoile des données intéressantes sur les ventes du Canada aux Etats-Unis dans le domaine militaire, faites durant l'année 1983. Pour ceux qui n'ont pu lire cet article de Gilles Provost, voici en bref ce qu'il nous révèle.

D'abord les sources d'information proviennent de documents obtenus du Pentagone en vertu de la loi américaine sur l'information. Ils révèlent que:

- au total, le Canada a vendu pour \$9.2 millions (argent américain) de canons et d'armes à feu aux Etats-Unis;
- nous l'avez vendu pour \$18 millions de liquides propulseurs pour fusées et, pour \$13 millions de système de contrôle de tir, colimateurs, etc.;
- dans le domaine du transport, les américains nous ont acheté pour \$17 millions de moteur à turbine, des instruments de navigation et des radars (\$9.4 millions), des systèmes hydrauliques d'avions (\$8 millions), des pièces d'aéronefs (\$2.6 millions) et des systèmes de conditionnement d'air pour avions (\$2.9 millions);
- les exportations canadiennes dans le domaine de brouillage électronique s'élevaient à plus de \$5 millions;
- les militaires américains ont payé, en 1983, \$3.6 millions à NORDAIR pour le transport de passagers vers leur postes de radar dans l'Arctique, \$2.2 millions à Pacific Western, \$5.9 millions à Northwest Transportation;
- au total, 40% des achats militaires américains au Canada, furent effectués par l'armée de terre, 22% par l'aviation, 8% par l'Agence de logistique militaire. Les registres américains signalent que nous leur avons vendu pour \$23.5 million de systèmes sonores sous-marins.

"Les importants échanges de matériel militaire entre le Canada et les Etats-Unis découlent directement des ententes sur le partage de la production de défense que le Canada et les Etats-Unis ont conclue en 1959 et périodiquement renouvelées par la suite, parfois en en élargissant la portée."

"Le gouvernement canadien s'est engagé à établir un important programme de subventions militaires pour que notre industrie puisse offrir "des prix compétitifs" outre frontière. Le Defence Industry Productivity Program distribuait l'an dernier quelques centaines de millions de dollars en subvention. Pour sa part, la Corporation commerciale canadienne est chargé de stimuler nos exportations d'armement en servant d'intermédiaire auprès des acheteurs américains ou étrangers. Il s'agit d'une compagnie de la Couronne dont presque tous les employés sont en réalité des fonctionnaires "prêtés" par le Ministère de l'Industrie et du Commerce. (C'est ce ministère qui diffuse l'information sur les marchés militaires et, qui diffuse à l'étranger un catalogue illustré de notre productivité d'armement)."

En bref, d'après les documents de référence, le Canada a vendu plus de \$50 millions d'armement aux Etats-Unis en 1983. Par contre, le gouvernement canadien estimait l'an dernier que ses exportations militaires totales vers les Etats-Unis excédaient le milliard de dollars. Les chiffres ci-haut mentionnés sont donc extrêmement conservateurs.

SE TIRER C'EST TRES IMPORTANT

Le moyen le plus efficace de prévenir les blessures en cours d'entraînement physique et sportif, c'est de bien étirer ses muscles.

Lorsqu'on omet de s'étirer avant de fournir un grand effort physique, les muscles s'en trouvent légèrement endommagés, raccourcissent et durcissent durant la cicatrisation et deviennent de ce fait plus vulnérables aux lésions plus graves.

C'est la raison pour laquelle les athlètes qui négligent d'étirer leurs muscles manquent de souplesse et sont plus souvent victimes de blessures. Dans les sports où intervient la course, les deux muscles qui "claquent" le plus souvent sont les tendons des jarrets, sur la face postérieure des cuisses, et les muscles du mollet, à l'arrière de la jambe.

Nos programmes d'instruction comportent rarement des étirements et un bon échauffement: c'est le jeu, le sport ou la compétition qui nous intéresse, ou bien nous avons peur de manquer de temps pour la séance d'entraînement.

Cette absence d'échauffement préalable, qui entraîne le "surmenage" des muscles et des jointures, constitue l'une des causes principales des blessures en cours d'activités physiques et sportives. Le fait de s'étirer et de s'échauffer augmente l'irrigation des muscles et leur température s'élève. Ils sont ainsi plus souples et sont moins vulnérables aux lésions.

On évitera de perdre son temps à pratiquer exclusivement la gymnastique suédoise qui ne donne pas forcément les résultats escomptés, c'est-à-dire l'assouplissement ou le raffermissement des muscles, ou ne les fait pas travailler de la même manière que la pratique d'un sport ou d'un jeu. Une période d'étirement devrait de toute façon précéder les exercices de gymnastique afin d'accélérer le rythme cardiaque et le préparer ainsi à une plus grande activité.

La période d'étirement et d'échauffement devra comporter deux phases: étirer d'abord les muscles raides ou courbaturés, s'échauffer ensuite en pratiquant les mêmes mouvements qu'en cours d'activité. Commencer lentement et augmenter graduellement l'intensité de l'exercice. Les coureurs maintiendront un rythme lent pendant quelques minutes avant d'accélérer. Les joueurs de hockey feront 10 à 15 fois le tour de la patinoire avant la partie. Les joueurs de tennis et de badminton feront quelques échanges pendant 10 minutes.

Le secret d'un bon échauffement réside dans l'accélération graduelle du rythme, ce qui permet aux muscles de s'échauffer en douceur et prévient les risques d'accident. On ne devra donc pas tout miser sur l'entraînement au point de négliger de s'étirer et de s'échauffer.

"SE SENTIR BIEN DANS SA PEAU"

L'étirement et l'échauffement des muscles sont à la base même du mouvement. Cela permet de se détendre, de se régénérer, mentalement et physiquement, de prévenir les blessures et les douleurs que peuvent entraîner les activités sportives. Cela favorise également l'assouplissement des muscles raides et tendus. Bref l'étirement développe l'endurance, la patience et le goût de pratiquer une activité physique, de se sentir "bien dans sa peau".

Il importe d'apprendre soi-même les nombreux bienfaits de l'étirement et de l'échauffement des muscles, qui ne se limitent pas simplement à la prévention des accidents, comme on aurait tendance à le penser. Seules les personnes qui ont effectivement expérimenté certains de ces autres bienfaits peuvent nous convaincre que l'étirement représente beaucoup plus qu'une simple méthode de prévention.

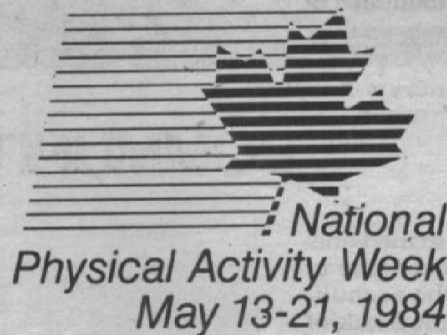
Même ceux qui pratiquent un sport ne demandant pas un gros effort physique ont été victimes de blessures, et c'est souvent ce qui les décourage de continuer. Bon nombre d'entre nous ont connu de mauvaises expériences au cours d'activités physiques et sportives, souvent à l'origine d'une barrière mentale qui nous empêche de refaire de l'exercice. Cette barrière se traduit souvent par un sentiment de tension physique et mentale.

Cette tension limite le plaisir du mouvement et le goût de développer son potentiel. Elle disparaît avec la pratique de l'étirement et de l'échauffement régulier des muscles.

Alors, ayez l'esprit ouvert et étirez vos muscles, par mesure de précaution mais aussi pour mieux profiter de la vie. Le corps vaut la peine qu'on en prenne soin si l'on aime se sentir "bien dans sa peau".

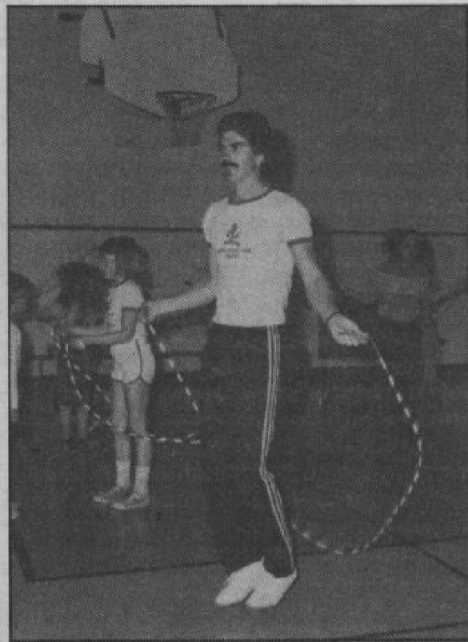

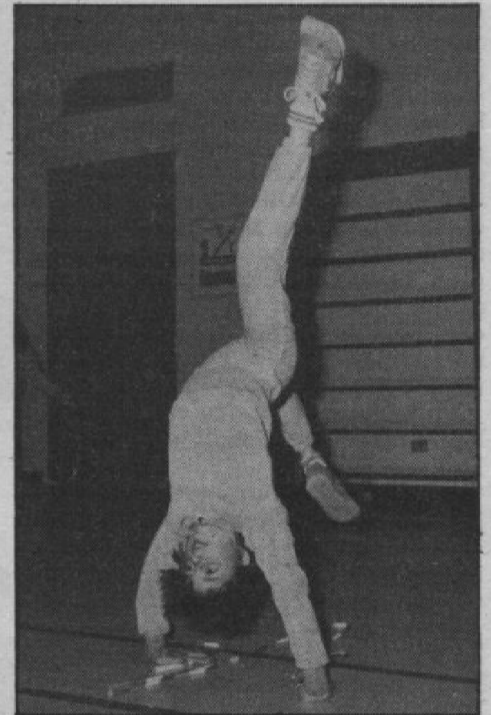

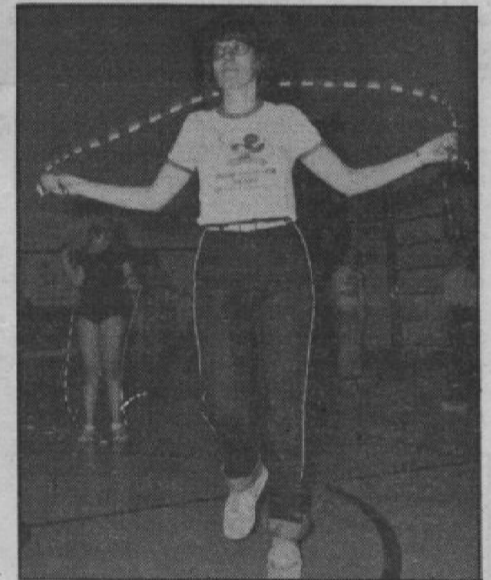

After a second place finish in the first heat, due to a faulty shifter, Ed Masiuk took control of the second heat from the start. He relinquished command only briefly during the last lap, finishing three seconds a head of his closest competitor.

His combined standing gave him a first place overall and the trophy for the oldtimer category. His success has given him hopes and valuable points towards the Provincial Championship for 1984.

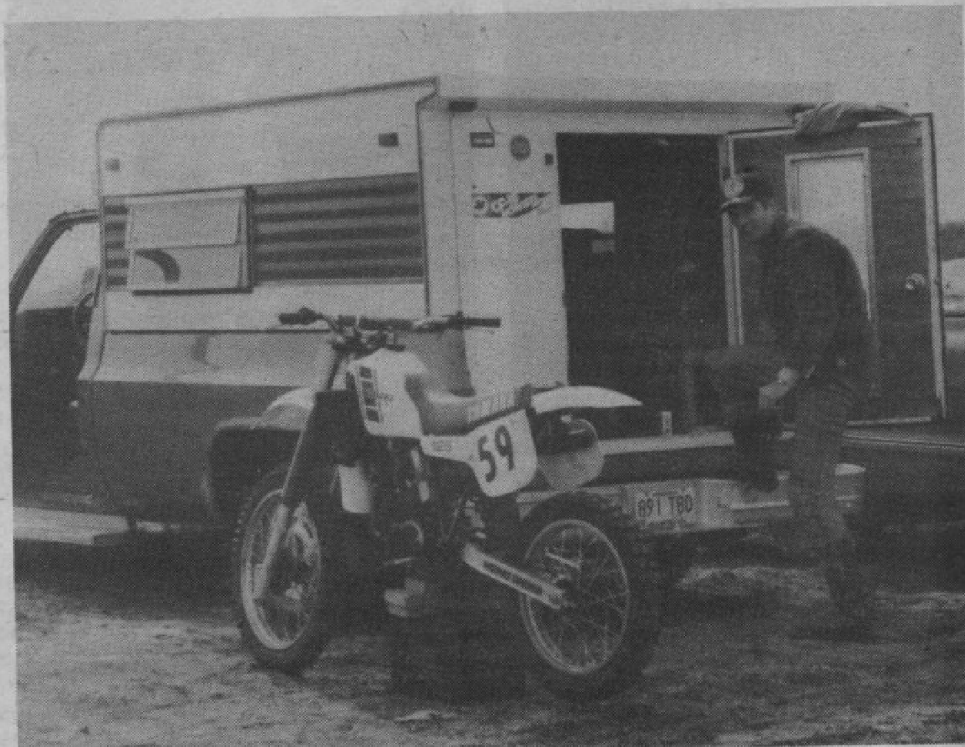
SMALL CRAFT SURVIVAL PROGRAM LEVELS

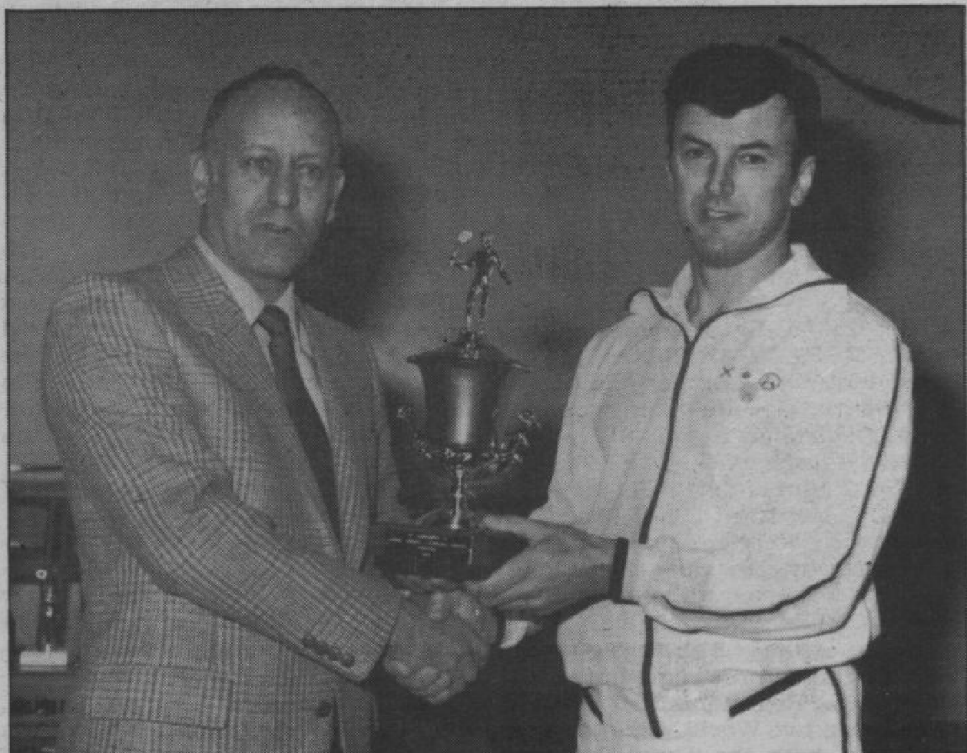

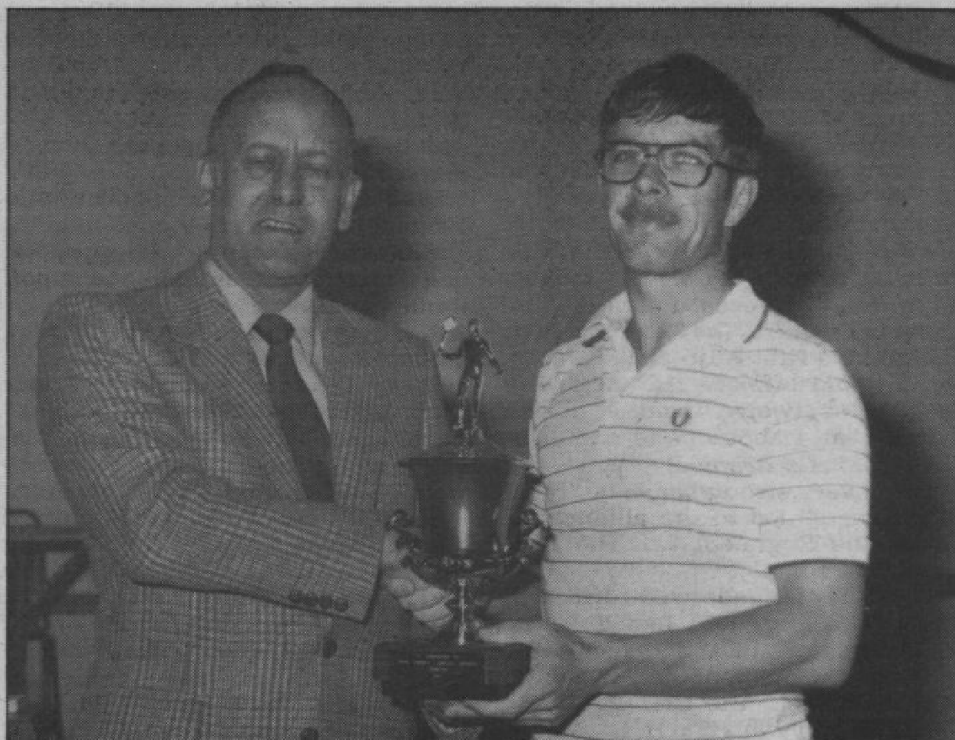

REGIMENTAL ALLIANCES AND AFFILIATIONS

Allied Regiment — The Royal Green Jackets.

In 1924 authority was given for the alliance of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry with The Rifle Brigade (Prince Consort's Own).

Common associations in this case were many. The Duke of Connaught, formerly a Rifle Brigade Officer who had served in Canada, was Canada's Governor-General from 1911 to 1916. He was Colonel-in-Chief of the Rifle Brigade for sixty years. His youngest daughter, Princess Patricia, had given her name to the Regiment. The Regiment's first Adjutant was a Rifle Brigade officer. The Regiment fought for twelve months during World War I shoulder to shoulder, with the Rifle Brigade.

These very strong bonds of "family interests" led to the alliance between the Regiment and the Rifle Brigade.

The Rifle Brigade was formed in 1800. The Regiment had a distinguished record of active service including Copenhagen, the Peninsular War, Waterloo, the Crimea, South Africa, World War I and II. It was garrisoned in Canada at Fort Henry from 1847 to 1849 and from 1850 to 1852.

As a result of the British Army cuts in strength and changes in establishments, the Rifle Brigade was brigad-

ed with the King's Royal Rifle Corps and the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry (43rd and 52nd). The official designations for the Battalions were:

1st Royal Green Jackets (43rd and 52nd)

2nd Royal Green Jackets (King's Royal Rifle Corps)

3rd Royal Green Jackets (The Rifle Brigade)

Former regimental designations were dropped from the battalion names in 1969.

Allied Regiment — The Royal Australian Regiment

On the 6th of September 1977, Her Majesty approved the institution of an alliance between the Royal Australian Regiment and Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

The Association began in Korea and the bond was cemented at Kapyong during the night of 24th/25th April 1951 when the Third Battalion RAR, the Second Battalion PPCLI and A Company, 72nd Heavy Tank Battalion (US) each won the Presidential Unit Citation while serving with the 27th British Commonwealth Brigade.

The Royal Australian Regiment was formed in 1945 and has seen distinguished service in Korea 1950-1956, Malaya and Borneo 1955-1966, and Vietnam 1965-1973.

At the conclusion of the commitment to Vietnam and the cessation of National Service in 1973, The Royal Australian Regiment was reduced from nine to six Battalions. In order to preserve the traditions and customs of all nine Battalions, several Battalions were linked as follows:

a. 2 RAR and 4 RAR formed 2/4 RAR;

b. 5 RAR and 7 RAR formed 5/7 RAR; and

c. 8 RAR and 9 RAR formed 8/9 RAR.

The linked Battalions, together with 1 RAR, 3 RAR, 6 RAR, 10 Independent Rifle Company RAR and Regimental Headquarters from the Royal Australian Regiment.

Affiliated Regiment — The Loyal Edmonton Regiment (4PPCLI)

On October 19th, 1954, The Loyal Edmonton Regiment was affiliated with Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry as the Third Battalion, in accordance with Canadian Army policy to affiliate Militia regiments with Regular Force regiments.

The two Regiments had fought together in two World Wars and conveniently, both the Third Battalion and the Regimental Home Station were located in Edmonton from 1957 to 1968.

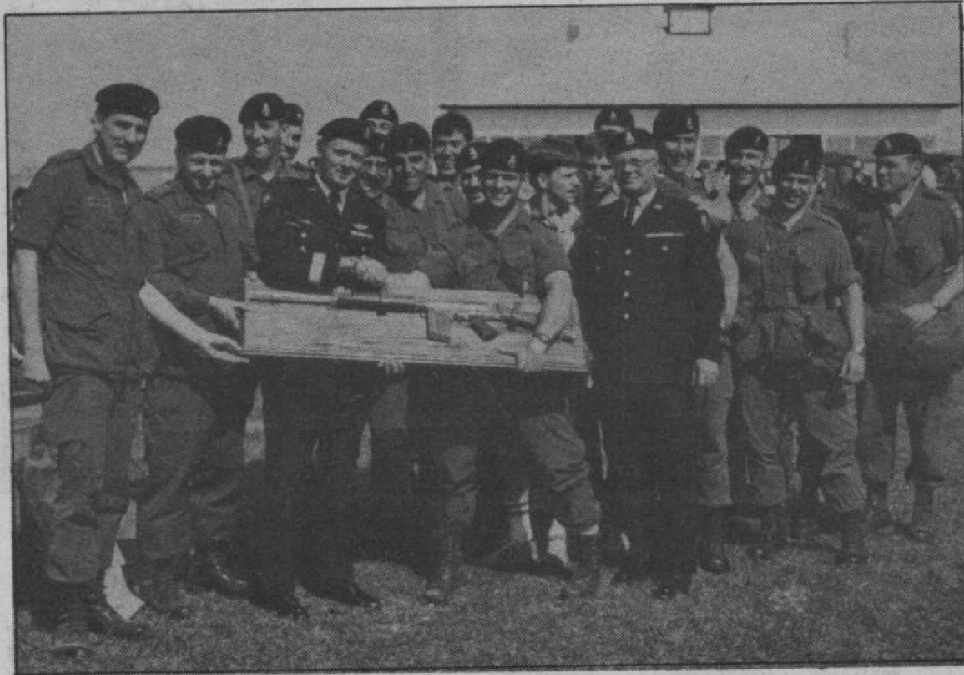
The 49th Battalion was formed in

Edmonton for overseas service on 4 January 1915 under command of Lieutenant-Colonel W. A. Griesbach (later Major-General W. A. Griesbach, CB, CMG, DSO, VD). After World War I, the 49th Battalion passed out of existence on 22 March 1919, when the unit was disbanded upon its return to Edmonton announced on 22 March 1920, with the 1st Battalion, The Edmonton Regiment to form part of the Non-Permanent Active Militia and to perpetuate the 49th Battalion, CEF. After the outbreak of World War II, a war substantive battalion was raised and went overseas as part of the Canadian Active Service Force, while a reserve battalion remained in Edmonton. The change in name from the Edmonton Regiment to The Loyal Edmonton Regiment was effective 7 July 1943.

After World War II the service battalion of the Regiment was demobilized. The Regiment is now a member of the Canadian Armed Forces (Reserve Force) stationed in Edmonton.

In the general announcement, made of the 19th of September 1969, advising the designation of a Third Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in the Order of Battle, The Loyal Edmonton Regiment was redesignated (4 PPCLI).

DRIVE THAT BODY



"At 300m you will see a large prominent copse of trees on the left side of the track, we'll start marching there." As the platoon commander quickly catches his breath, the soldiers of the platoon push on with a slow, steady running pace. This pattern of running and marching was to be repeated many times throughout the second phase of the 2 PPCLI Annual March and Shoot Competition held on 5 May.

The ten competing platoons were required to complete all four phases of the competition as follows:

1. Obstacle course crossing at Kapyong Barracks.
2. Forced march westward along Wilkes Road to the perimeter highway and then north to St. Charles Range, a distance of 18 km.
3. Run-ups from the 400 m firing point with 30 rounds of ammunition.
4. Detailed inspection of all personal equipment.

Each phase was completed with each soldier in full fighting order including FN-CI rifle. In addition, each

platoon carried a 77-SET manpack radio. A separate score was allocated for each phase and the aggregate decided the winning platoon.

The March and Shoot Competition requires team work, a good knowledge of basic infantry skills and stamina on the part of all platoon members. The competition is now an annual event with the dedication of a trophy by the Commanding Officer, LCol BW Ahston, and the Regimental Sergeant-Major, CWO JM Clarke.

The competition took most of the day to complete but with a family day concurrently organized at St. Charles Range, there was plenty of food and drink available for all competitors and spectators.

BGen Sharpe, Commander of 1 Canadian Brigade Group, was present to see the platoons off the start line and to present the winning platoon, 9 Platoon, C Coy, 2 PPCLI with their trophy.

Preparations for the next annual March and Shoot are already well underway, if only in spirit.

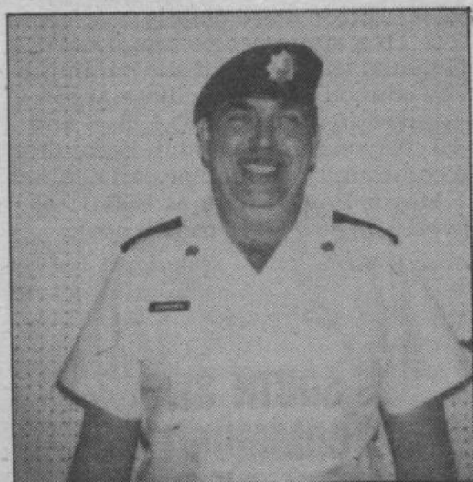

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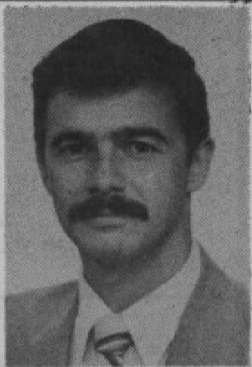
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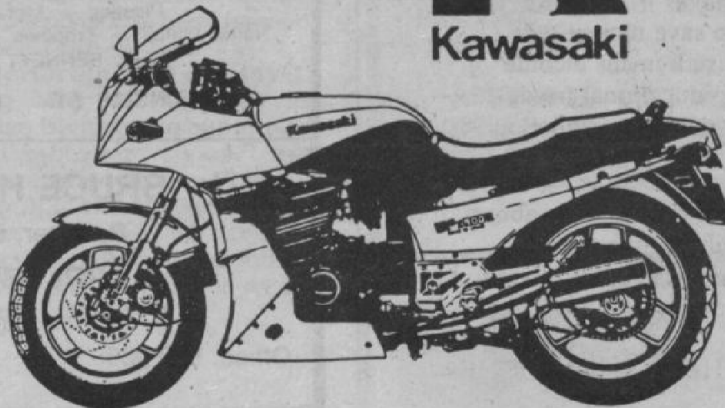
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
