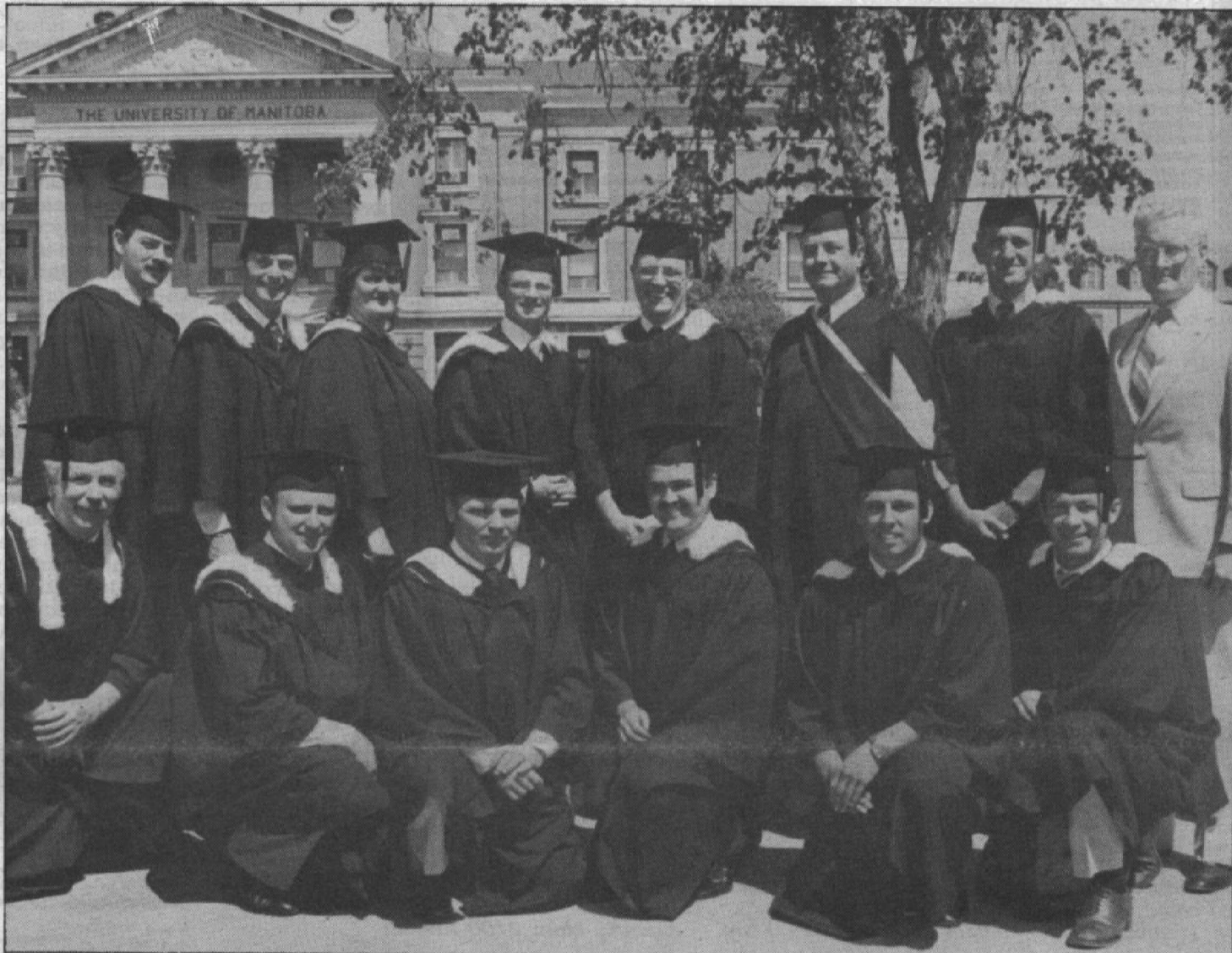
ACROSS THE FORCES

BRACELETS ARE IN — And this type could save your life. The CF provides free Medic-Alert bracelets and special wallet cards to servicemen and women who may need them. Forces members suffering from medical conditions including allergies or diabetes and those undergoing long-term anticoagulant therapy qualify for this benefit. Personnel on hazardous duties, such as divers and crew members of hyperbaric chambers, also qualify. Information on the issue of bracelets and cards is contained in CFAO 34-37 and CFMO 29-12 and medical inspection room or base hospital staff determine if there is a need. Members who qualify receive a stainless steel bracelet engraved with a serial number and medical condition. An accompanying wallet card lists a doctor's phone number and more medical information for reference during emergency. The Canadian Medic-Alert Foundation holds the information, which is updated during in-clearance procedures on posting.

HEADSETS ARE OUT — Listening to music on the move is out for people in uniform. Control guidelines have been implemented in the CF governing the wearing of commercial headsets. The items are defined in CFAO 66-5 as "any commercial radio receiver or tape player from which the user receives the transmission through any tupe of earphones or headset." Specifically, if you are on duty and must respond to traffic the headsets are out. Anyone operating DND mobile support equipment is also prohibited from wearing the devices. Generally, the CO of each base, station or establishment has been left to decide whether headsets can or cannot be used. While safety is a main concern, it is not the only consideration. Constant exposure to the high volumes that can be attained on the machines can cause a decrease in hearing ability. So, before you be-bop those duty hours away with your local DJ, check the CFAO and local regulations that cover the use of commercial headsets.

DID YOUR MOTHER WEAR ARMY BOOTS? — Women in Canadian military service is now the subject of two books and an upcoming Canadian War Museum exhibit. The Canadian Women's Army Corps (CWAX) is the subject of *Athene*, (goddess of war) *The Canadian Women's Army Corps — Their Story*, written by W. High Conrod. This book covers the CWAC organization from 1941 to 1946, postwar ex-CWAC achievements and examines the CWAC Militia up to unification in 1968. It is available at military and public libraries or through Writing and Editorial Services, P.O. Box 163, Dartmouth, N.S., B2Y 3Y3 for \$24.95. *Back the Attack* by Jean Bruce, a National Museums Canada employee, covers the roles of women in the Second World War. It's scheduled to be published next year by Macmillan of Canada. *Women at War* is an exhibit planned for 1984 by the Canadian War Museum. Designed completely by women, the exhibit will be located on the third floor of the museum in Ottawa. The display depicts women at war beginning with the Amazons and other legendary female warriors and continuing to the present.

851 Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron of Picton Ontario has in its possession one F86 Sabre Mark V Serial no. 23301. The squadron would like help getting information, documentation and parts in order to restore the Sabre to a display condition. I hope your readers will assist in this.

F86 no. 23301 was delivered to the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1954. No record is available of what it did or where it was until May 8, 1956 when it was delivered to 3146 TSD. Here it flew 29 hours before it was transferred on Nov 28, 1956 to 443 Sqn. Sea Island, which we believe was a reserve squadron. Here it logged 380 hours of flight time until its transfer to 6RD Detachment in London, Ont. on Sept. 18, 1958. It is not known how many hours where flown with 6RD before it was sent to Mountainview, Ontario for scrapping.

The Sabre, without its engine, was bought by Pinecrest Memorial School in 1971 for display purposes. The Sabre went on display for 11 years before being donated to 851 RC Air C Sqn. The jet had been severely vandalized and was becoming an eyesore. The Squadron wishes to restore the Sabre to show condition. It will be used as a teaching aid when completed.

There are several unanswered questions. Who flew the aircraft and where during its first 2 years and again at 6RD? What were its roles? Where is the remainder of the aircraft log and documentation? there are 506 out of a total of 900 flying hours unexplained. Most of the panels of the aircraft are punctured. Where can spare parts be found?

As you can appreciate, restoring this aircraft is going to be a major task and any help would be appreciated. If you or any of your readers have information, documentation or parts that would assist in this project please send them to:

Nineteen Eighty-four is the 60th anniversary of the Royal Canadian Air Force and CFB Trenton (the unofficial home of the RCAF) is celebrating this event with many activities.

On April 1st CFB Trenton opened the RCAF Memorial Library and paraded the new Air Command Flag. The museum contains many historic artifacts and memorabilia.

Trenton is also hosting an "RCAF" Homecoming Weekend" June 29 - July 1, 1984. Colonel G. R. J. King and his staff invite all ex-RCAF members and all past and present personnel who have been stationed in Trenton to "come on Home" for this important weekend.

August 25th will be CFB Trenton's Armed Forces Day '84 and Air Show commemorating the 60th Anniversary of the RCAF. Base Trenton opens its gates to the public at 9:30 a.m., the air show starts at 1:00 p.m. and the gates close at 5:00 p.m. There will be extensive ground displays and exhibits. Included in the airshow are the Great War Museum, the Canadian Warplane Heritage and a mass parachute drop by elements of the Canadian Airborne Battle Group from six CC130 Hercules aircraft in formation. Two features will be a Tutor Formation Aerobatic Team and the CF18, Canada's newest fighter aircraft.

CFB Trenton has published a 72-page magazine saluting the 60th Anniversary of the RCAF. The magazine contains a brief history of the RCAF, Trenton and the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, articles describing Base Trenton and many frameable full-coloured, previously unpublished, aircraft photographs.

A Commemorative Poster will be available at Armed Forces Day on the 25th of August. The colour poster features artwork by the well-known artist, Steve Snider. Mr. Snider's artwork was featured on the 1983 Armed Forces Day Poster which won acclaim at the International Council of Airshows at El Paso, Texas.

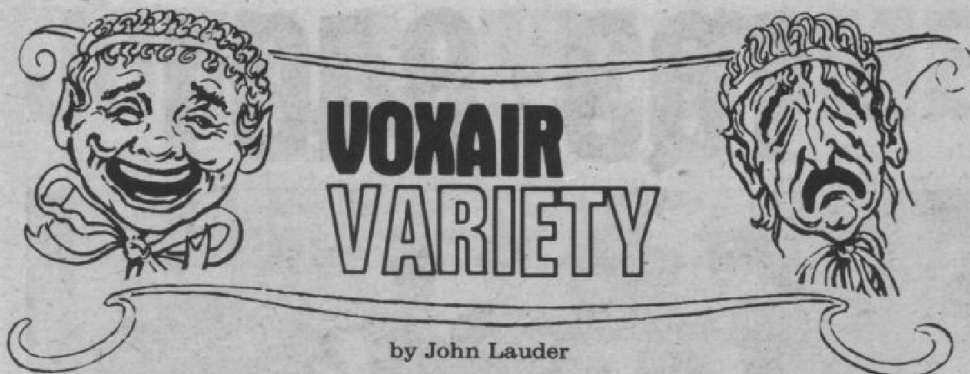

"Now you see it, now you don't" seems to be almost the motto of some of our local performing groups these days. Last week a poster and a brochure arrived in by mail extolling the merits of *Duddy*, the Mordecai Richler book about to become a Broadway musical. It was slated to open here on June 12th, before going on to bigger things, but unfortunately the next day the news came out that the show had been terminated. Apparently the backers ran out of money in the face of an unsympathetic Ottawa audience, so forget about Broadway. (Normal, for those NDHQ types).

Next, the Manitoba Theatre Centre got embroiled with consumers groups over their list of plays for next season. They listed the new Tom Stoppard play *The Real Thing* as a possible for next spring, only to find then the rights were not available. Thus the substitute is Noel Coward's *Hayfever*, a golden oldie, not the winner of five Tony awards, as was *Real Thing* in early June.

A while back the morning tabloid was trying to promote a Michael Jackson visit here — that is not going to show either, much to the sorrow of the kids. So it goes, or rather comes not.

But there will be some action here in both the near future and next winter. On Sunday, June 17th, you can see an Icelandic Pageant at the Concert Hall, or on the 18th and 19th you might want to take in "The Magical World of Royter" at the Hall, in aid of the Special Olympics Show Fund. There will be an International Band Festival on the 22nd, beginning at 7:30 a.m. for early birds, followed by "The Nylons" at 8:00 p.m. on the same day. Next day at the Concert Hall, once again, is the 9:00 a.m. opening of judging of the 1984 Provincial Men's and Women's body building championships, and at night a contemporary Christian Music Concert featuring "Leon Patillo". Then on the 27th Western fans can see Wilf Carter and Slim Witman.

Onward into July, the biggies are slated. Rainbow Stage will open the musical *Kismet* as the first production of its 30th season. Direction will be by Paddy Stone, a local boy who has made good in the U.K. and U.S.A. (He also tried to save the above mentioned *Duddy*, but without luck.) It is a lavish and historically successful show, having opened on the stage in 1911, made into a movie three times, in 1930, 1942, and 1955, and then produced as a TV spectacular in the 1960s. It opens on July 3rd and will run to the 21st. Tickets are now on sale at the usual outlets.

The second biggie will be the Folk Festival at Birds Hill Park (19 miles NE of downtown Winnipeg), which will feature a total of 110 acts and will run July 5th to 8th. A special event planned for this year is a family camping area where peace and quiet will be guaranteed. As folkies are not always noted for this kind of behavior, let's hope they are able to make this work.

"But how about next winter?" you ask. Plenty, if not too much to choose from. How about four operas for the price of three, some or all of five sets of symphony concerts — masterworks, family pops, kids music, musically speaking and other pops, with such guest conductors as Mehli Mehta, Otto-Werner Muller, Mitch Miller and Erich Kunzel? Then at the Theatre Centre six plays, opening with the great *Amadeus*, and including *Quartermaine's Terms*, a very fine tender comedy from London via Broadway. Last, but not least, the Ballet will be at home four times during the period October to April next year. More on all this later, as season tickets do save you money.

Thirty-two years ago, almost to the date of this Voxair issue, I stood before the RCAF recruiting officer in Winnipeg and swore allegiance to Her Majesty and commenced by first five year hitch. My old RCAF regimental number appears on the kit bag at the head of this column. Doesn't seem like 32 years but now two silver rosettes decorate the old C.D. I have to believe it. MOTORCYCLE TRAINING COURSE

The Manitoba Safety Council (MSC), in cooperation with the Canada Safety Council and endorsed by the Motor Vehicle Branch, provides an excellent Motorcycle Training Course designed for both beginner and veteran riders.

The Base General Safety Officer (BGSO) has negotiated a special arrangement with the MSC to conduct a course exclusively for military personnel at a rate of \$55.00 per student, a 42% per student, a 42% reduction from the regular \$95.00.

The Motorcycle Training Course for Military Personnel will be conducted at CFB Winnipeg (South) Bldg C1 on the weekends of 7, 8, 14, and 15 Jul 84 and will consist of about 5 hours of classroom and 16 hours of "on-bike" training. In addition to the basics for beginners, the course covers advanced skills such as pattern riding, obstacle negotiation, adverse conditions, etc.

Motorcycles, gas and oil, insurance, expert instruction, and written materials are provided by the MSC. The students need only provide themselves with a helmet and sturdy boots, gloves, pants, and jacket. The student must obtain a Beginner's Permit from the Motor Vehicle Branch, unless they are already licenced Class 6.

Motorcycling can be fun as a sport and practical as a means of transportation. It also involves a great deal of risk — much more so than operating a car. The accident statistics prove this beyond a doubt. The knowledge and skill acquired through training can greatly reduce that risk not only for beginners but for the experienced riders who have learned "on their own".

The Base Commander and the General Safety Officer strongly endorse the MSC Motorcycle Training Course and encourage both new and experienced motorcyclists on the Base to take advantage of this special opportunity for military personnel.

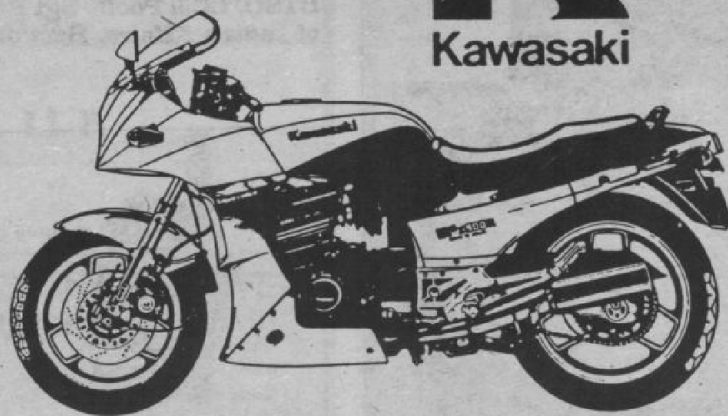

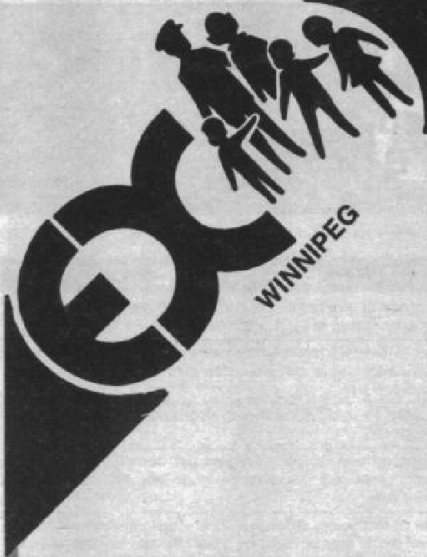

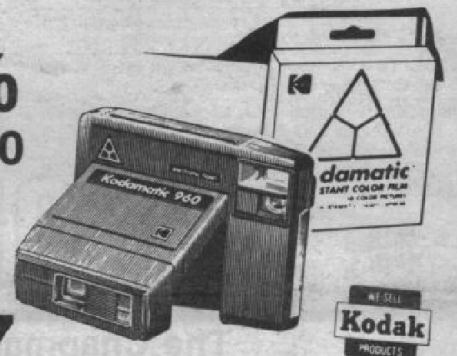
