

## History of The Poppy

On November the 11th, Canadians all across the country will stop and remember the men who were killed in wars. There will be parades to memorials in cities, towns and villages. Then everybody will stand in silence as they remember the more than 112,000 brave Canadians who were killed.

That is why November the 11th is called Remembrance Day.

On that day everybody wears a poppy, a reminder of the blood-red flower which grew in the fields where many of these men died. Much of the fighting was done in a place called Flanders. This was during the war of 1914-1918. Every spring, the soldiers fighting in the trenches noticed the red flowers blooming on the battlegrounds. And as more and more of their friends were killed, the soldiers noticed that the poppies bloomed over the graves.

When the war was over and when the soldiers came home, they still thought of all their friends who were buried in Flanders. Each time they thought of the graves, they thought of poppies which grew around the graves. Then the men who came back from the war decided that they would wear a poppy each year to show that they still remember their friends.

November the 11th was the day on which the fighting stopped in 1918. The men who had been in the war picked that day each year to wear a poppy. Other people who had not been in the war, but who loved the soldiers who had been killed, also wanted to show that they remembered the dead. So they also wore a poppy.

### First Poppies

There were not enough real poppies to go around. Then some of the men who were wounded, and couldn't work at other jobs, began to make poppies out of cloth. That is why today everybody wears a poppy which is not a real flower but which reminds us of the flowers which grew over the graves of the men who died.

For many years after the first war, children stood with their parents on Remembrance Day. Everybody was silent, and everybody wore a poppy and they all thought hard about the men who were killed.

By the time many of the children grew up, there was another war. The boys who were now young men went to war. Many of them went to the same places as the men they used to remember. In the fighting in those places, a lot of the young men died.

When the second war was over, more people than ever wanted to wear a poppy: now there were more dead soldiers than ever to remember. There were also sailors and airmen. All of these people went to war to protect Canada. They went to war to protect the people who were in Canada then, and also the people who would be born in the future — people like yourselves. They died so that you could enjoy all the good things in your life. They died so that your home would be safe, so that you would be given a chance of going to school and going to the church of your choice. They also died so that you could make friends with whomever you please.

So perhaps you didn't know those men who died in war. But they knew you. They wanted you to live in peace.

Therefore, on Remembrance Day, when everybody wears a poppy and stands in silence it is like 'thank you' to those who died for us.

## Flower of Remembrance

Why was the poppy - the flower of the forgetfulness - chosen as the symbol of remembrance for Canada's war dead?

The poppy, an international symbol for those who died in war, also had international origins.

A writer first made the connection between the poppy and battlefield deaths during the Napoleonic wars of the early 19th century, remarking that fields that were barren before battle exploded with the blood-red flowers after the fighting ended.


Prior to the First World War few poppies grew in Flanders. During the tremendous bombardments of that war the chalk soils became rich in lime from rubble, allowing 'popaver rhoeas' to thrive. When the war ended the lime was quickly absorbed, and the poppy began to disappear again.

Lt.-Col. John McCrae, the Canadian doctor who wrote the poem IN FLANDER FIELDS, made the same connection 100 years later, and the scarlet poppy quickly became the symbol for soldiers who died in battle.


Three years later an American, Moina Michael, was working in a New York City YMCA canteen when she started wearing a poppy in memory of the millions who died on the battlefield. During a 1920 visit to the United States a French woman, Madame Guerin, learned of the custom. On her return to France she decided to use handmade poppies to raise money for destitute children in war-torn areas of the country. In November 1921, the first poppies were distributed in Canada.

However, thanks to the millions of Canadians who wear flowers each November, the little red plant has never died. And neither have Canadians' memories for 114,000 of their countrymen who died in battle.

The good news for this week is that Shakey's Pizza is opening a new restaurant on Portage Ave. right beside Beaver Lumber.

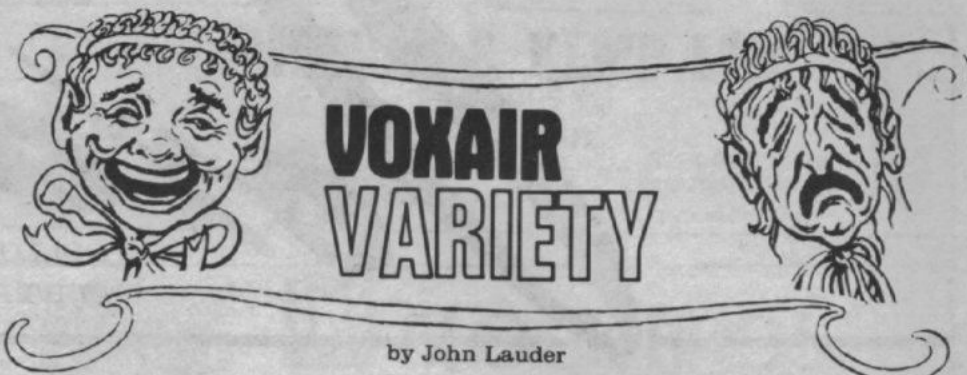

Amadeus the play versus the movie of the same name has been causing a stir in the Sunday paper. At the same time the heroics of actor Angelo Rizzos have got much space in both dailies. He plays Wolfgang A. Mozart in the current Manitoba Theatre Centre production and did a fine job in spite of a severe strept throat on the opening night.

Not having yet seen the movie, but only the play, complete with Mr. Rizzos brave act, your humble correspondent can state that this is an excellent show. Unfortunately it will close this Saturday night, so hurry.

# SCAN CORNER Salary

According to an old saying, "money makes the world go round". Salary must be an important consideration to every serviceman planning a move into the outside world. While we know exactly what our earnings are now, some find it hard to project their worth into the civilian market.

Employers decide upon the salary range for a particular job, based upon the employment and the responsibilities built into the position. You can be placed within a salary range. This means presenting your qualifications and experience in such a way that acceptance is at the upper salary limit. This is your aim.

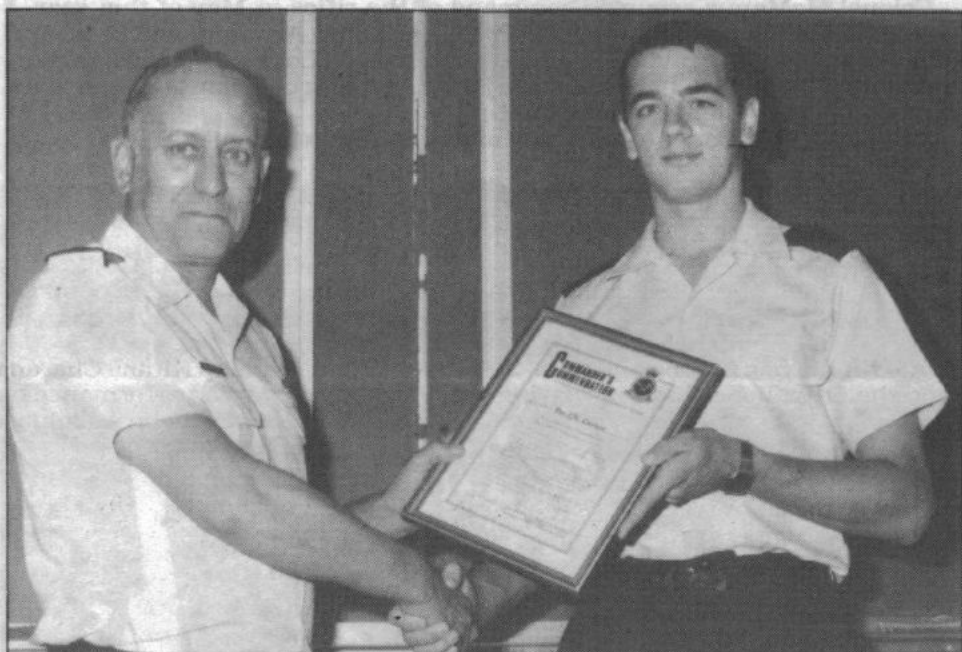
Remember, however, you are an unknown quantity to the employer. The fact one is willing to prove his

worth could be more positive in the long run. Entry is the key and the possibility of a regular salary review is an important consideration.

Experience has shown that a lateral shift into civilian life from the military is a rare accomplishment and a serviceman earning \$24,000 now should think of \$22,000 as an entry salary. When too much emphasis is placed upon unrealistic starting salaries there is a danger that one is simply cut off from the employment market. Make allowance for the chance to prove how good you are.

Entry is even more important if it provides opportunities to show your worth. Don't price yourself out of the job market.

# Remembrance Day at War Memorial

OTTAWA — The annual Remembrance Day Ceremony at the National War Memorial will take place at 11:00 a.m. on 11 November. The ceremony is organized and directed by The Royal Canadian Legion on behalf of the Government of Canada.

During the ceremony, the Governor General will place a wreath on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen, the Prime Minister on behalf of the people of Canada, the Minister of Veterans Affairs on behalf of his department, the Chief of the Defence Staff on behalf of the Canadian Armed Forces, and the Dominion President of The Royal Canadian Legion, Steve Dunsdon, on behalf of all Canadian veterans.

Included in the vice-regal party will be Mrs. Olive Hunter of Summerland, British Columbia, age 87, a Silver Cross Mother whose son was killed on active service with the R.C.A.F. She will place a wreath on behalf of Canadian Motherhood.

The winners of the Legion's National Literary and Poster Contest, Bonnie Turner of Seaforth, Ontario, Nancy Underhill of Campbellton, New Brunswick and Mike Stubljar of Mississauga, Ontario will place a wreath on behalf of Canadian youth, assisted by a Girl Guide of Canada, Andrea Hagglund.

Wreaths will also be placed by members of the Diplomatic Corps, many organizations and by the general public.

Also participating in the ceremony will be The Royal Canadian Legion colour party, veterans from the national capital area, and members of the regular and reserve armed forces.

Approximately 150 navy, army and air force cadets will also attend.

The 21-gun salute will be fired by the 30th Field Regiment, RCA (M).

Music for the ceremony will be provided by the Central Band of the Canadian Armed Forces CFB Ottawa, the Cameron Highlanders and CFB Ottawa Pipe Bands, the band of the Governor General's Foot Guards, HMCS Carleton Band, the RCSCC Falkland Band, and the Central Choir of the Ottawa Board of Education.

The parade is under the command of Lieutenant Colonel T. Findley.

There will be national coverage of the ceremony on radio and television.

**Sarex  
 Winners**

OTTAWA — Canadian Forces pararescue specialists won three of five international trophies at the 1984 SAREX competition. The event, held at Eglin Air Force Base, Fort Walton Beach, Florida, from September 21-28 brought two hundred Canadian and American search and rescue (SAR) personnel together for a week of competition in skills such as medical aid, parajumping and search exercises.

Members of 103 Rescue Unit, CFB Gander, Nfld., edged out eleven U.S. and Canadian teams to win the Saunders-Mackenzie Award as the best team in the overall competition. The Allison Cup, awarded to the best parajump team, was also won by 103 Rescue Unit. The team representing 424 Squadron, CFB Trenton, Ont., brought home the SAREX Trophy given to the best team in the SAR event.

The US Air Force's 55 Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Service (ARRS) Squadron, Eglin AFB, won the Sullivan Cup for the best medical team.

Individual awards such as the Pararescue Memorial Trophy for the best jumper of the meet was awarded to Sergeant J.L. Ergish of 303 ARBS, March AFB, Riverside, Calif. Master Corporal R.J. Mondeville of 440 Squadron, CFB Edmonton won the Warrant Officer Trophy given to the best CF parajumper.

The Armstrong Proficiency Trophy awarded to the best CF team was also won by 103 Rescue Unit. Other Canadian Teams participating in this year's SAREX included 442 Squadron, CFB Comox, B.C., 435 Student Training Squadron and 440 Squadron both from CFB Edmonton and 413 Squadron from CFB Summerside, P.E.I.

The SAREX competition, held each year since 1976, allows representatives from both nations the opportunity to meet and discuss developments unique to their profession.

**Royal Winnipeg  
 Rifles Receive  
 New C.O.**

WINNIPEG — The Royal Winnipeg Rifles, a Canadian Forces Militia unit based at Winnipeg's Minto Armoury, received a new Commanding Officer this Saturday, October 20.

He is Lieutenant-Colonel Burton Frank Waters, 45, a market development officer for the Manitoba Department of Agriculture in civilian life.

Colonel Waters takes over command of The Royal Winnipeg Rifles from Lieutenant-Colonel John Patrick McManus, 43, who moved to south Bend, Indiana earlier this year where he works as a management consultant.

Colonel Waters' military career began with the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1956. In 1960 he transferred to The Royal Winnipeg rifles as a Second Lieutenant and, after a period of absence, was promoted to Captain in March of 1972 and to Major in April of 1978, becoming Deputy Commanding Officer under Colonel McManus.

Colonel Waters was appointed acting Commanding Officer last May. Colonel McManus joined the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in 1960 and in subsequent years served with his unit in Germany and Cyprus. In 1970 he was posted to the Combat Arms School as an instructor and in his last year there as a Standards Specialist. In 1972 Colonel McManus was posted as Base Defence Force Officer in Halifax and two years later he served with the International Truth Control and Supervisory Commission in Vietnam. He transferred to the Militia in 1980, joining The Royal Winnipeg Rifles as a Special Projects Officer and being promoted to Major in February of 1981.

Colonel McManus assumed command of the rifles in May of this year. Saturday's Change of Command Parade at Minto Armoury will be attended by Brigadier-General R. S. Malone, the Honorary Colonel of The Royal Winnipeg Rifles, and by Colonel (Senator) Gildas Molgat of Winnipeg, who is the unit's Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel.

The Change of Command Parade starts at the Armoury at 2 p.m.

# Canada Savings Bonds

The 1984 Canada Savings Bonds campaign is underway and is proving to be as popular as ever.

This year's interest rate is 11.25% for the first year and 7% is the minimum rate guaranteed for the subsequent years.

### RETURN ON OUTSTANDING ISSUES

Effective June 1 1984, the rate of return on Series 37 (1982/83) and Series 38 (1983/84) has been increased to 10.25% from 9.25% for the five-month period ending October 31, 1984.

There are no changes to the other outstanding unmatured series. These bonds continue to earn interest at the rate of 10.25% per annum for the year ending October 31, 1984 and this rate is the minimum for subsequent years to maturity.

### DEADLINE DATES


Act quickly as there are deadline dates for CSB's. Military personnel use a 12-month deduction plan with a deadline date of 12 November 1984. DND civilian employees have two options. Option I involves a 10-month deduction plan with a deadline of 21 November 1984. Option 2 involves a 9-month deduction plan with a deadline of 26 November 1984.
