Community Service Award

It's that time again — time to begin thinking about Community Service Awards. As many will recall, the award program was initiated in early 1982 as a means of recognizing outstanding voluntary service to the Winnipeg Military Community. The program has proven to be extremely popular. Over the past two years 77 awards have been presented to deserving personnel. This year's awards will be presented by the B Comd at a special ceremony in the WOs' and Sgts' Mess on 9 June 1984.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE

All members of the CFB Winnipeg Military community are eligible to submit names of those they feel deserving of an award. Members of the Canadian Forces, DND civilians and their dependants are eligible for this award. Personnel may be appointed, elected or volunteered for the activity for which they are nominated, however, they should not have received any remuneration for performing that activity. Work performed must be totally voluntary and benevolent and outside the individual's normal work responsibility. Some suggested activities are scouts, guides, brownies, minor hockey, baseball, church activities, social clubs and family assistance groups, benevolent work for the community, etc. A per-

son may receive more than one award during each tour at CFB Winnipeg. Groups may also be nominated for an award as well.

NOMINATION PROCEDURES

Eligible personnel will be nominated by the community at large through the completion of a nomination form. Nomination forms appear in this issue and will appear again in the 3 Apr 85 edition. Forms will also be available through the Base Exchange outlets and Bldg 90 Recreation Centre. Simply complete the form and return it to the Chairman of the Selection Committee by the deadline date.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

The Chairman of the Selection Committee this year will be Major G.E. Holland, Base Personnel Administrative Officer. A representative from the two community councils and one from the recreation council will be on the Selection Committee. The remaining members of the Committee will be chosen by the Chairman and will be representative of the community at large.

Please fill out a nomination form and give a deserving member of the community a "pat on the back."

3rd Van Doos Replacing 1st RCR in Cyprus

OTTAWA — Canadian troops began their 43rd rotation to Cyprus during the period of February 26 - March 15, 1985.

The Third Battalion, Royal 22^e Regiment (3 R22^eR), based at CFB Valcartier, Que., will take up Canada's portion of the UN peacekeeping role on the island for a six-month tour.

The 425 members of 3 R22^eR, under the command of LCol Luc Bujold of Senneterre, Que., are replacing members of 1st Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment, who will return to their home base in London, Ont.

Air Command's 437 Transport Squadron, located at CFB Trenton, Ont., will fly the 3 R22^eR to Cyprus and bring home 1 RCR. This will be the fourth tour of duty on the Mediterranean island for the 3 R22^eR.

Canadian Forces personnel have been in Cyprus since March, 1964.

CFB Borden Under New Command

TORONTO — General Gérard C.E. Thériault, Chief of the Defence Staff, has announced the promotion of Colonel James I. Hanson, 46, of Ottawa, to the rank of brigadier-general, effective January 28, 1985.

Brig.-Gen. Hanson, formerly Commandant of the Canadian Forces School of Aerospace and Ordnance Engineering, assumed command of Canadian Forces Base Borden, Ontario, February 4.

New Rules Set For Vacating MQ's

Effective April 1, a new policy will come into effect which will have an impact on all members vacating married quarters. Under the new policy, the outgoing occupant is responsible for cleaning the married quarter and being present for the march-out inspection.

As a result, Base Accommodation no longer will be accepting agreements for married quarters to be cleaned after departure.

Outgoing occupants will remain free to make whatever arrangements they will with a cleaner of their choice to clean all or part of the married quarter; however this does not relieve the member from ensuring the house is clean and that he is present at the inspection. A list of recommended cleaners will be available in Base Ac-

commodation for those who want help preparing their MQ for inspection.

For those who live in Bulk Lease Houses who have been using their own electric stoves, now must have gas stoves reconnected at the time of their march-out inspection. They must produce proof, preferably a receipt, that the gas stove was reconnected by Furnasman Heating Limited. Failure to provide this proof will result in a charge of \$35.00 being made by a BDSR.

Outgoing personnel should make appointments for a MQ inspection as soon as possible after they have finalized arrangements with R & D for the pick up for their F & E.

The above will be included in the next amendment to Married Quarter Orders.

Mirrors on the ceiling next? I see that waterbeds are now legal in P.M.Q.'s.

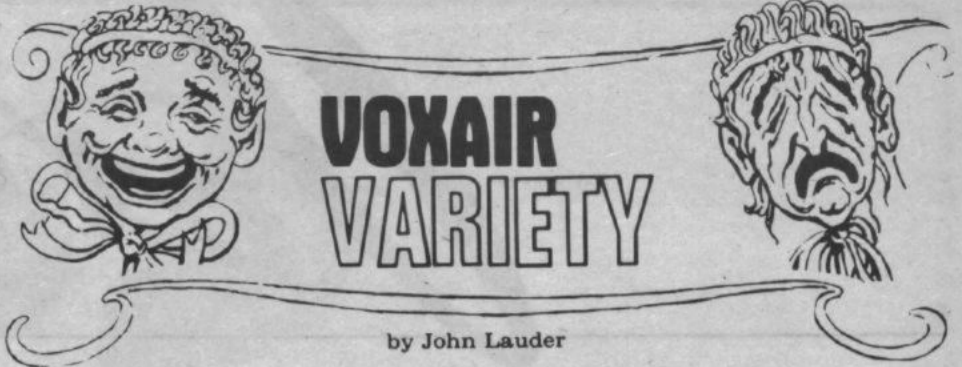

Bridges To The Outside World

Networking is the name of the game when it comes to finding work in the outside world. It means knowing potential employers in order to sell your skills to them. Some, when faced with this problem, have been known to panic — jump on the proverbial horse and ride off in all directions.

This is not the answer. The answer is to cultivate every possible bridge to the outside world. These bridges include friends and associates, newspaper advertisements, public and private agencies, club memberships and your assessment of where the jobs are. As you build these bridges you establish a "NETWORK" of contacts that can be followed as you move into the outside world.

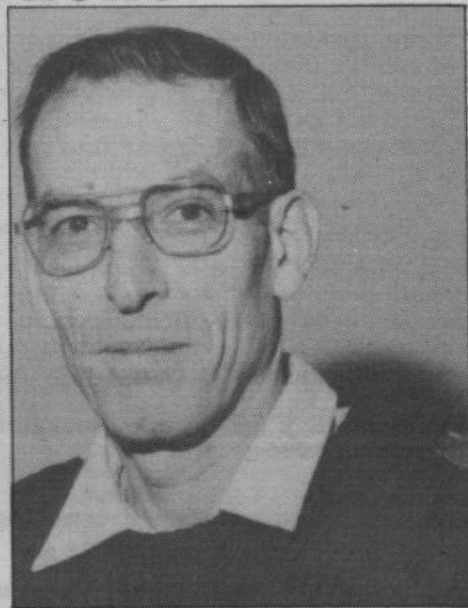
The Canada Employment and Immigration Commission (CEIC) is one of these bridges. This is a govern-

ment agency operating centres throughout Canada and is in the business of bridging the gap between the employer and the person looking for a job. How can they help you? Briefly:

- a. the CEIC counsellor at the manpower centre near you knows the local employment picture,
- b. a clearance system is available which enables you to find out about jobs in other parts of the country; and
- c. if upgrading of skills or occupational retraining is indicated the manpower counsellor can complete all arrangements.

The CEIC is important because it is a joint sponsor with DND of the second Career Assistance Network (SCAN) Program, which is designed to assist servicepeople in establishing themselves in the "outside world" after they leave the CF.

Nutrition and Sports Performance

Athletes who believe that there is a magical diet that can give them a competitive edge in sports may be spending excessive amounts of money and endangering their health.

Provincial nutrition authorities and research has shown that a normal diet emphasizing regular eating times, sufficient fluid intake, food variety and an energy intake in keeping with energy expended, provides the best basis for good performance.

Athletes could use from 3,000 - 5,000 calories a day depending upon their activities. A person exercising for an hour daily, in contrast, might require 2,000 to 2,500 calories for weight maintenance.

Whole grain breads, cereals, pasta and fruit (all containing carbohydrates) should provide 50-60% of required daily energy intake, 12-15% of daily food energy intake should come from meats (to provide protein) and the 30-35% remaining daily energy intake should be provided by fats (eg margarine, fat in meats and dairy products).

There are several dietary myths concerning certain foods that will increase athletic performance. It has been suggested that an increased amount of protein from meat and other sources will increase muscle mass. There has been no experimental evidence supporting this claim.

If an athlete is increasing his food intake sufficiently to meet the energy he is expending, he should be increasing the recommended number of daily servings in each of the food groups listed in Canada's Food Guide proportionately. The four food groups are milk and milk products, bread and cereals, fruit and vegetables, meat and alternates. Each food group contributes a number of specific essential nutrients. One does not need vitamin or nutrient supplements since more food is being eaten to meet increased energy needs. The foods that supply extra energy (from all 4 food groups) are rich in the nutrients that are needed for training and competition.

Water intake is essential for the performance of physical activity and will prevent dehydration. In an endurance event 100-200 ml of water at 10-15 minute intervals is better than large amounts every hour. Before the event sufficient water should be ingested (approximately 600 ml). After competition athletes should continue to drink fluid to replace losses.

Athletes are often concerned about salt (sodium chloride) losses due to profuse sweating. It is not necessary to take salt tablets since a well-balanced diet generally supplies adequate amounts of salt. These tablets could place an increased load on the kidneys and contribute to dehydration.

Meals should be consumed 3-4 hours before an event to ensure that the stomach is empty before exercising. This prevents the competition of digestion and absorption of food and nutrients in the stomach with muscle metabolism for the blood supply. This pre-event meal should be high in carbohydrates and low in fibre and fat.

BPERO Speaks Out of Fitness, Nutrition

Fitness training cannot have maximum impact if the individual is not eating the appropriate quality, quantities and varieties of food.

Food provides the necessary ingredients, such as vitamins and minerals, which are necessary to convert fuel to energy and provide the building blocks on which body cells, tissues, and ultimately the body are formed.

"He's always eating but he never gains weight." "She eats very little but can't seem to lose a pound." These are comments often heard in training

areas. The control of excess weight has often been thought to be solely a dietary adjustment. However, exercise is now being considered an equally important factor to effective weight control, loss or gain.

Research suggests that obese people do not necessarily eat more than others; — that individuals' metabolic rates — (that is how fast the body consumes calories) and, therefore, levels of energy expenditure — vary widely; — that age causes the metabolism to slow down; — and that moderate exercise can curb appetite.

Dieters have long contended that an increase in physical activity results in an increase of appetite. However, it has been shown that moderate exercise does not affect the desire for additional caloric intake and may, in fact, result in the desire for fewer calories.

Another factor which suggests the positive attributes of exercise is its effect on basal metabolic rate (BMR). As with many other bodily functions, as we grow older our BMR slows down. Our bodies require fewer calories or food energy to carry out its functions. As a result, if we continue to eat the same number of calories after our BMR slows down, more fat-padding will occur.

Exercise results in an increase of BMR during the activity, thereby consuming more calories. There is evidence indicating that there is an increased metabolic rate which outlasts the exercise. Therefore, if one considers BMR as a thermostat, then perhaps it is possible to turn up the control and use up more calories. The result is that more calories will be consumed and not stored in our bodies.

The relationship between nutrition and physical fitness cannot be overlooked. During nutrition month, take advantage of the opportunity to meet your PERI staff and your Food Service organization.

Good luck in meeting your fitness and nutrition goals.

Westwin Community Council Married Quarters Assessment Program

In order to accomplish this, a volunteer council consisting of twenty members has been established. Meetings are held monthly on the second Tuesday of each month at 62 Braintree Crescent.

The recent establishment of the CFB Winnipeg Recreation Council has caused some confusion among Married Quarter residents concerning the role that each plays in the community and also whether there is a need for the MQ Assessment Program of \$1.00 per month.
