Challengers Will Replace Falcons in EST Role

OTTAWA — Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of National Defence, (Hon.) Erik Nielsen, has announced that the Government intends to purchase between eight and 12 Challenger 600/601 aircraft from Canadair of Montreal, for the Canadian Forces.

Seven Challenger 600s will be based at CFB North Bay and used in the Electronic Support and Training (EST) role to train CF air, land and maritime units in recognizing and overcoming hostile jamming and other interference with electronic signals in wartime.

This is a vital consideration, given Warsaw Pact emphasis on electronic countermeasures to degrade or negate entirely NATO communications, radars and other electronic systems in wartime.

The current CF EST aircraft, the Falcon 20, lack the space and the electrical generating capacity to accommodate the array of equipment now necessary to adequately perform that role.

An additional Challenger 600 will serve as an airborne electronic test bed to evaluate various avionics and electronic equipment at the Aeronautical Engineering and Test Establishment, at CFB Cold Lake, in support of ongoing CF aircraft replacement programs.

Up to four Challenger 601s will be purchased to replace six aircraft of two other types currently in use in the administrative airlift role. Three Jetstars, purchased in the early 60's and three Falcon 20s would be retired after the new Challengers join the fleet.

Negotiation of prices and delivery schedule with Canadair will be finalized later this month.

Government Boosts CFE Strengthen by 1200

OTTAWA — Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of National Defence, Hon. Erik Nielsen, and the Secretary of State for External Affairs, Right Honourable Joe Clark, jointly announced today that the Secretary-General of NATO has been informed of the decision of the Government to take immediate steps to meet our NATO commitments.

One of these will be to increase the stationed strength of the Canadian Forces in Europe by an additional 1,200 military personnel.

This initiative will strengthen 4 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group based in Lahr, Federal Republic of Germany, and will increase its level of preparedness. Personnel will begin to move to Canadian Forces bases in Europe this summer; the last of the additional troops will be in place in the summer of 1986.

A second measure will be to specifically designate an infantry battalion group in Canada to fulfill our commitment to the Allied Command Europe Mobile Force, Land (AMF(L), a multi-national NATO deterrent force intended to reinforce Europe during a crisis.

The AMF(L) battalion now will be separate from the Canadian Air/Sea Transportable (CAST) Brigade Group, committed to reinforcing northern Norway. The Canadian commitment to CAST will be fully maintained.

Cost of these measures will be \$50 million in the first year, and about \$100 million per year when the full complement has been transferred to Europe.

Enhancement of Canada's air contribution to Allied Command Europe is, to a large extent, already being addressed in the program to equip the squadrons with CF-18s over the next three years.

Winnipeg Sea Cadets Sweep First Place in International Shoot

OTTAWA — Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps Crusader of Winnipeg has topped the Commonwealth in the 1984 small-bore rifle competition, beating out Britain, Australia and New Zealand.

This was announced by the Navy League of Canada, on learning results of the final adjudication of targets and score sheets by the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association.

Britain, Australia and New Zealand placed second, third and fourth, respectively.

Plaques for permanent retention by the winners are to be awarded.

Prairie Area Militiamen Will Battle "Enemy" Incursion

WINNIPEG — More than 200 members of Canadian Forces Militia units from Winnipeg, Portage la Prairie, Brandon, Flin Flon, Kenora and Thunder Bay will gather at Winnipeg's Minto Armoury for three days and two nights later this month to conduct the largest simulated military exercise held here in recent memory.

Dubbed Exercise Manitoba Midnight II by planners, the Command Post operation will start shortly after 7 p.m. on Friday, March 29, and end at noon on Sunday, March 31.

Manitoba Midnight will be based on a make-believe scenario involving a military incursion by an enemy force into parts of south-eastern Ontario.

Command Post Exercise participants here will react to hour-by-hour make-believe developments announced to them by central umpires

and make tactical decisions based on an army brigade level. Umpires then will calculate whether the players' decisions would have been likely to help them achieve set objectives.

The exercise will be conducted around the clock, involving command centres through the Armoury, including the main parade square.

Observers of the Command Post Exercise will include Brigadier-General J. C. Law, Commander of Prairie Militia Area, which comprises all Canadian Forces Militia units between Thunder Bay and the British Columbia border.

B. Gen. Law, who lives in Regina, will be joined by three officers of the 231st Engineer Battalion, North Dakota Army National Guard, from Grand Forks, who will spend the entire weekend at Minto Armoury.

My local branch has averaged one new manager a year since I've been in Winnipeg. You don't suppose that my accounts have had anything to do with the high turnover ... ?

I think I've missed only one telecast of the Academy Awards since I got my first TV set in 1955. I'm a dyed-in-the-wool movie fan and each year I subject myself to the usual marathon of self-indulgent "Thank you" speeches. This year as a distraction, I took note of the men's bow ties. Some were crooked, most were poorly tied, some looked like gift-wrap ribbon and most were any colour but black. PRINCE didn't wear one but his sparkly purple parka was an absolute dream (@=&±!).

Amadeus cleaned up, as expected with Best Picture, Best Actor and about half a dozen more awards. Not everyone's cup of tea but you really didn't expect something like Ghost Busters to win, did you?

My favourite film in the running was "The Killing Fields"... Pretty powerful stuff.

Shakey's Pizza on Portage Ave. is now open. I'm not a real aficionado of pizza but when the urge is there, I like a good one. Shakey's fills the bill.

We dropped in two days after their official opening to check the place out.

The building is brand new, and, as you would expect, spotless. The decor is bright and light with lots of stained glass, Tiffany lamps and shiny brass railings. Seating is provided in a variety of booths, tables and banquettes. The staff is pleasant and accommodating if somewhat inexperienced. Service was a little slow but we were prepared to make allowances for opening week jitters. The background music was typically drum dominated Rock and Roll but thankfully played at a very subdued volume level.

We opted for the Shakey's Special, (mushrooms on 1/2 only!). It was super. No complaints. All ingredients were fresh and readily identifiable, which is often not the case at some pizza parlors.

My wife ordered the House Red wine which was a bit on the fruity and sweet side. I considered the "Mug Of Beer" which is only 7 1/2 oz. and obviously shouldn't be called a Mug of beer, before ordering a regular bottle of Blue.

We'll be regular customers. We liked it.

The newly released movie "Mask" is worth a look.

Be forewarned, it's a tearjerker in places.

The story is based on the short life of a physically deformed boy and his drug-doing, biker bedding Mom. Cher plays the Mother, basically playing Cher in leather and denim, and incidentally, looking great in mini skirts. The Kid, Rocky, is sensitively played by Eric Stoltz under several pounds of makeup. If the real life relationship between mother and son even remotely parallels the movie story, it must have been pretty special.

I'm used to sitting among ignoramuses in theatres who feel they have to talk throughout the film. Not this time. The audience was quiet.

If the film accomplishes nothing else, it makes us look at ourselves and our reactions to people who "look different".

The bikers come across as real Teddy Bears but to develop the biker theme would have detracted from the kid. Sure, they are a rough bunch but they're part of a very touching scene at a carnival house of mirrors. Sam Elliott adds a sexy macho touch as a transient biker boyfriend to Cher, and an actor I haven't seen for years, Harry Carey Jr., turns up as the white haired bike gang president and friend of Rocky.

It's a good film. Take lots of Kleenex.

help in selling his skills to the average civilian employer.

— If you want to make a clean break with the past, vocational guidance tests are available.

— You can obtain assistance in the preparation and production of your resume.

— Can you teach an old dog new tricks? Of course, and those interested in academic upgrading should talk it over with the Base Personnel Selection Office.

— The largest employment service in the country is Canada Manpower. Your contact for the Manpower Centre nearest you is the Base Personnel Selection Office. It can start your first appointment off on the right foot with a special introduction.

It pays to start thinking about your retirement EARLY.

As a war widow, Easter always has had a very special meaning for me. Like many of your readers who have lost the ones who have meant the most to them, the message of Easter — new life, hope and renewal — has been a great comfort.

May I share with those readers a way I found to make the message of Easter even more meaningful and at the same time provide a continuing memorial and tribute to a loved one.

I do it by underwriting the cost of sight restoring, cataract operations on destitute blind people in the developing world. It only costs \$25 for the surgery, medicines, hospital care, cataract glasses, food while in hospital and follow-up care. AS you can understand, when a blind person receives the gift of sight it is for them the gift of a new life, almost a resurrection — in fact the once-blind call it "coming back from that other world."

If any of your readers would like to give someone "new life" for only \$25., I suggest that they send their cheque or money order to a Canadian charity that organizes these sight restorations — Operation Eyesight Universal, P.O. Box 123, Station M, Calgary, Alberta, T2P 2H6. This is a registered charity and contributions are tax deductible. Receipts for income tax purposes are issued right away.

I've been supporting Operation Eyesight for many years and have never ceased to wonder that they can do so much for so little. Your readers will receive a patient identification card showing the name, age, sex and address of the patient. This card is signed by the officiating surgeon.

Knowing that you have given someone "new life" is such a grand way to celebrate Easter.

WINNIPEG — Historic 402 Squadron, first RCAF unit to receive RCAF colors during the Second World War, has put out an appeal for WWII uniform items for a ceremonial guard of honor here in June in a dedication of an Avro Lancaster Mark X bomber by the Canadian Wartime Heritage of Hamilton, Ont.

The aircraft is being restored in the colors and markings of 419 Squadron, in which Winnipeg native, the late Pilot Officer Andrew Mynarski, lost his life and posthumously was awarded the British Commonwealth's highest award "for valor," the Victoria Cross, for actions during the 1939-45 conflict.

The 402 Squadron appeal is for RCAF and RAF No. 5 and 5A tunics, trousers and wedge or field caps. Items, borrowed will be catalogued, used for the ceremony only, then cleaned and returned to owners. Insignia and ribbons currently on uniforms will remain intact during their use.

Pilot Officer Mynarski's feat involved an attempt to release a fellow crew member jammed in the rear turret of a Lancaster bomber over France after the aircraft was hit by flak and the abandon order was given to the crew.

When his efforts failed, he stood at attention, saluted the trapped man and made a parachute exit. His 'chute failed to open and Mynarski was killed. The crew member survived to relate the story.

New Colonel Comandent for Dental

OTTAWA — The Chief of the Defence Staff, General Gérard C.E. Thériault, has announced the appointment of Brigadier-General (ret'd) W.R. Thompson, of Trenton, Ont., as Colonel Commandant of the Canadian Forces Dental Services.

Gen. Thompson's military career began in 1943 where he served with the Canadian Army as a dental assistant and subsequently qualified as a navigator in the Royal Canadian Air Force. Following the Second World War he graduated from the University of Toronto with a Doctor of Dental Surgery in 1949. He re-entered the Canadian Army during his final year of studies and on graduation began duty as a captain in the Royal Canadian Dental Corps.

Gen. Thompson is a certified specialist in oral and maxillofacial surgery, having received his training at Walter Reed Army Medical Centre in Washington, the University of Toronto, and the Toronto General Hospital.

He has served as base dental officer at Petawawa, St. Hubert, and Gagetown; as senior dental officer with 1 Fighter Wing in Marville, France and as an instructor at the Canadian Forces Dental Service School at CFB Borden. He also served with 25 Canadian Field Dental Unit in Korea.

From 1970-74 he was Commanding Officer of 13 Dental Unit at CFB Trenton. During this period he also served as oral surgeon for Kingston Military Hospital.

Gen. Thompson served on two occasions as a staff officer in the Division of dental Services at National Defence Headquarters. He was Director of Dental Treatment Services at NDHQ until he became Director-General of Dental Services in 1976.

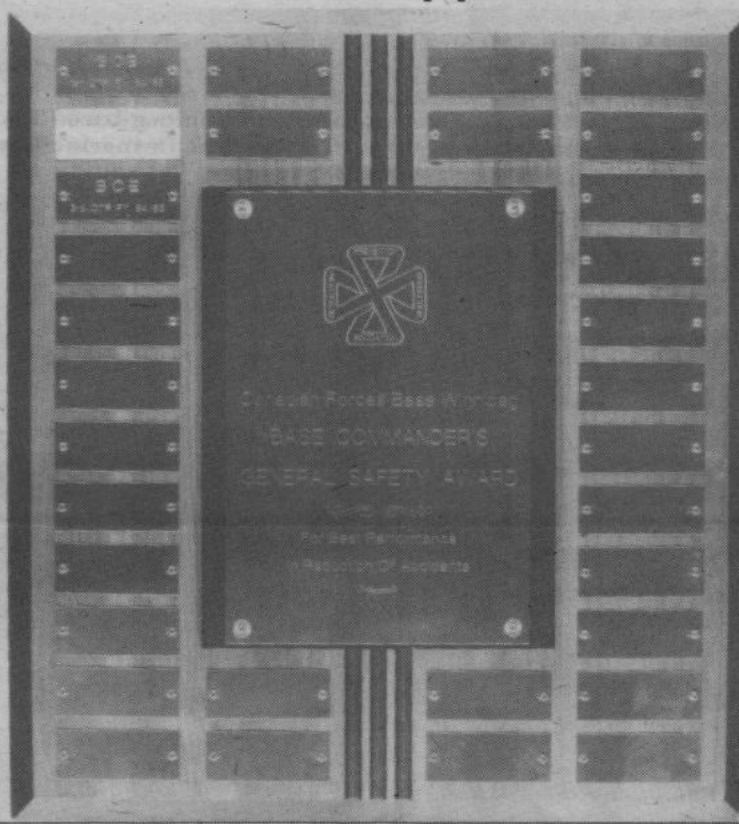

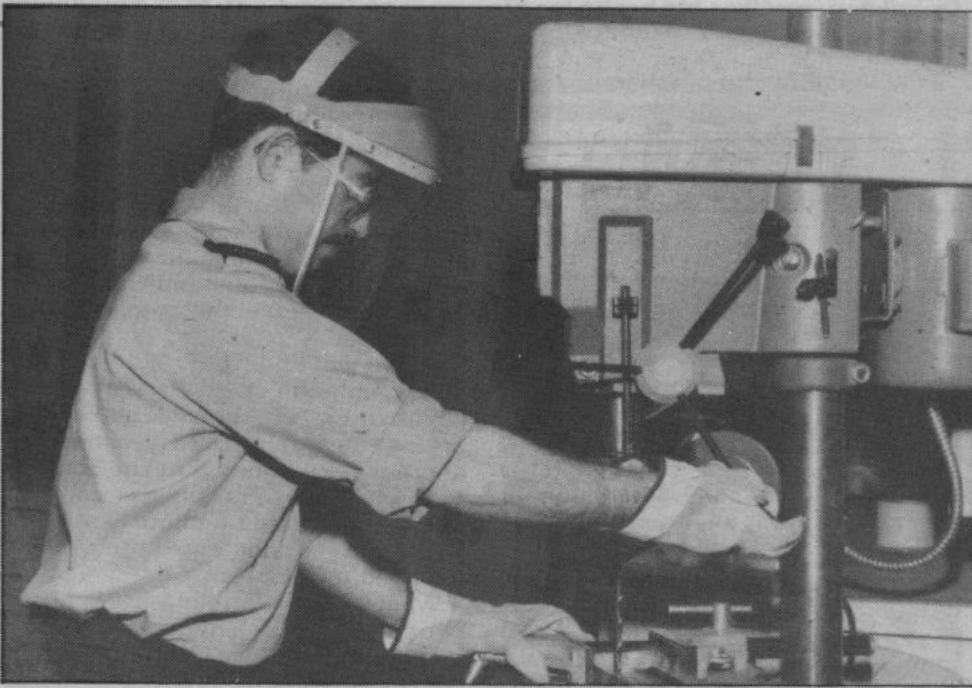

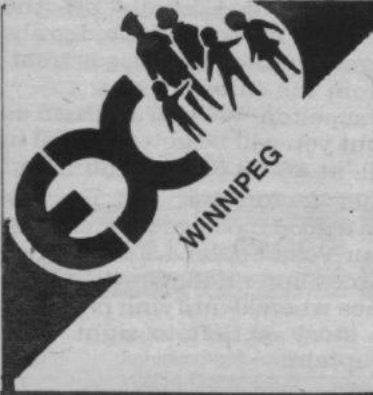



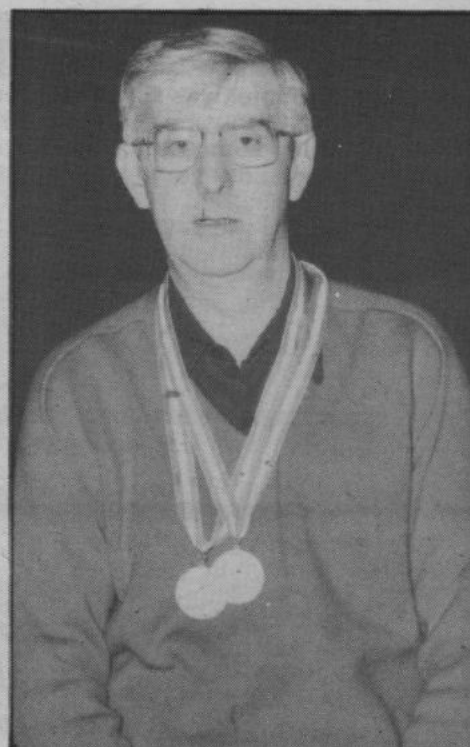

Fitness: The Facts

Fitness: Does it have to hurt?

It's the oldest fitness myth in the world that the tougher the activity the better it is for you. It's simply not true.

Of course, any activity must be for a certain minimum intensity and duration before it can stimulate fitness growth. But the fact is that activity reaches the benefit threshold long before it reaches the pain threshold. Pushing until it hurts adds nothing to fitness benefits, and can lead to injury and discouragement. Pain or serious discomfort resulting from activity is a signal from your body that you're working too hard.

So learn to listen to your body. When you are active you can expect your heart and breathing rate to quicken as your cardio-vascular system works to deliver extra oxygen to your muscles. But you should never be working so hard that your pulse is galloping and your breathing becomes difficult. You will sweat as your body heats up from exertion. But you should not get so over-heated that you become dizzy or faint. When you first become active you might experience a little soreness or stiffness as your muscles and joints adjust. But continuing or severe pain means that you're pushing them too far.

If your body is giving you alarming signals, ease off and give it a break. You should always be able to enjoy your efforts, they should never become an uncomfortable chore. For activity to do you the most good you must 'train, not strain' for fitness.

The Employee Assistance Program

1. Because it is a joint Labour-Management program, the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) requires the informed and active support of LMRC's at the local level. This letter is intended to give LMRC's guidance with respect to their responsibility for supporting the implementation of an effective EAP at the base/station/unit level.

2. This letter will touch on four main components of the EAP:
 a. at the local EAP Committee;
 b. the training of supervisors;
 c. the appointment and training of referral agents (RA's); and
 d. selection criteria for RA's.

3. The Local EAP Committee. Your local EAP committee is charged with implementing an effective program at your unit. Because the EAP is intended to be a neutral or non-partisan program which can benefit both labour and management, the local EAP needs the encouragement and support of your LMRC. To work effectively, the EAP Committee requires:

- a. the use of a relatively private office and a private phone line;
- b. a secure filing cabinet/drawer for each RA;
- c. time off from regular duties to enable RA's to attend to their EAP responsibilities, which should normally involve a maximum of one half day per week (It is understood that individual RA's will endeavour, whenever possible, to cluster their weekly EAP activities on a specific half day, so as to minimize disruption to the performance of their primary duties.); and

d. small amounts of local funding for supplies.

4. It is also recommended that your LMRC provide some sort of formal recognition to RA's who have served in this important, voluntary role for more than one year.

5. Training of Supervisors. Supervisors of civilian personnel must be trained concerning the EAP and their role in it. It has been agreed that local Drug Education Coordinators will include an EAP module in the Drug and Alcohol Prevention courses which are offered periodically to supervisors, and that some local union executive members will be invited to take advantage of this training. RA's are trained to present this EAP training module, and have the materials required for this purpose. If regularly scheduled Drug and Alcohol Prevention Courses will not permit early exposure of supervisors and some union officials to the EAP training module, management should consider authorizing EAP Committees to set up special sessions for this purpose. A one-hour training session should suffice.

6. Appointment and Training of RA's. The appointment and training of RA's involves:

- a. consultation at the local LMRC as to how many RA's are required;
- b. nomination of proposed RA's, by either union or management;
- c. screening of all nominees by the LMRC;
- d. approval of each RA candidate by the Base/Station/Unit Commander; and
- e. a three-day RA training course for selected RA's.

7. Training courses for RA's are given three times a year, in October, January and May, subject to there being sufficient demand. Names and mailing addresses of approved RA candidates should be forwarded to the Regional (DND) EAP Coordinator as early as possible to permit efficient course loading, and prior distribution of pre-reading material to candidates.

8. Selection Criteria for RA's. Due to the importance of the EAP and the sensitivity of the RA's role, it is essential that RA's be selected with care. All RA's require the confidence of both union and management in regards to their personal suitability and qualifications, as well as their ability to play a neutral role in a joint program. Consequently any nominee is subject to disqualification by union or management. LMRC's are requested to ensure that RA nominees are selected in accordance with the following criteria:

- respected by peers;
- able to keep confidences;
- free from serious active personal problems;
- maturity

In deciding how many RA's are required, a minimum of two should be appointed, since this will give troubled employees a measure of choice. Additional RA's may be appointed as the need becomes apparent.

9. It is advisable to have both sexes represented among each unit's nominees. It should also be remembered that military RA appointees may be at a disadvantage when meeting with employees, in that under QR&O's they have somewhat less personal discretion concerning the reporting of certain types of personal problems that civilian RA's. Consequently, some units may decide to limit the role of military RA's in the program to administration, promotion and training. They could function well as EAP chairpersons without being involved in meeting with troubled employees. Finally, steps must be taken to ensure that all RA's involved in assisting troubled employees are security cleared to the CONFIDENTIAL level.
