Air Command gets New Boss

Takes over June 13

Air Command's current deputy commander, Major-General Donald M. McNaughton, 51, will be promoted to lieutenant-general and appointed commander of Air Command.

He succeeds Lieutenant-General Paul D. Manson, 50, who returns to Ottawa to become Assistant Deputy Minister for Personnel.

Date of the change is June 13.

Air Command's commander-designate was born in Perth, Ont., March 7, 1934, and graduated from Perth Collegiate Institute in 1951. He enrolled in the Royal Canadian Air Force in March, 1952, and, following pilot training, was assigned flying duties in Centralia and Trenton, Ont., until 1958.

From 1959-63, he flew F-86 fighter aircraft with 439 Fighter Squadron in Marville, France. On return to Canada he became chief flying instructor at Gimli, Man., until 1966. During this tour of duty he commanded the first squadron to be equipped with Tutor aircraft as a basic trainer.

In 1966-67, Gen. McNaughton attended the Canadian Army Staff College, Kingston, Ont., and on graduation was employed as a senior staff officer at Mobile Command Headquarters, St. Hubert, P.Q. In 1969 he returned to Kingston as a member of the directing staff of the Canadian Land Forces Command and Staff College.

Trained with RAF

He returned to flying assignments in May, 1972, with courses on the CH-136 Kiowa and CH-135 Twin Huey helicopters. From December, 1972, until June, 1973, he was a student at the Royal Air Force Air Warfare College in England, and, on return to Canada, took command of 427 Tactical Helicopter Squadron at CFB Petawawa, Ont.

He was promoted to the rank of colonel July 1, 1974, and posted to Mobile Command Headquarters, St. Hubert, as Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations Support.

From August, 1975, until July, 1977, Gen. McNaughton was Deputy Commander of 10 Tactical Air Group at St. Hubert, during which he also spent six months in Egypt as Deputy Commander of the Canadian Contingent, United Nations Emergency Force, Middle East.

In July, 1977, he was appointed Commander of CFB Winnipeg, and a year later was promoted to the rank of brigadier-general to become Director-General, Air Doctrine and Operations, at National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa. Three years later he was appointed Commander of 10 Tactical Air Group at St. Hubert's.

Promotion to the rank of major-general followed July 23, 1982, when

he became Deputy Commander of Air Command in Winnipeg. Gen. McNaughton was appointed to the Order of Military Merit in the grade of Commander, December 23, 1983.

He is married to Frances Jean Finkle of Belleville, Ont. They have two children, Jean, and a son, Ian.

Gen. Garland Returning

Other promotions and appointments announced by Deputy Prime Minister and Defence Minister Erik Nielsen were:

Maj.-Gen. David F. Garland, 50, will return to Air Command Headquarters in Winnipeg as deputy commander. Currently, he commands Air Transport Group in Trenton. He previously served at Air Command Headquarters as DCOS Operations.

Maj. Gen. R. Percival Pattee, 50, will become assistant chief of staff, Intelligence Division, at SHAPE in

Mons, Belgium.

Brig.-Gen. J.M. Lioniel Bourgeois, 51, will be promoted to major-general and appointed Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations at NORAD Headquarters in Colorado Springs.

Brig.-Gen. David Battye, 47, will become Program Manager for the Northern Warning System at NDHQ, Ottawa.

Brig.-Gen. Ronald L. Bell, 51, will take up new duties as Deputy Commander of 25 NORAD Region at McChord A.F.B.

Brig.-Gen. J.J. Yvon Durocher, 44, now Director-General, Information, at NDHQ, will take over as Director-General Organization and Manpower at NDHQ. His successor as DG Info will be Brig.-Gen. Terrance F. Liston, 46.

Colonel Peter J. Taggart, 45, formerly DCOS IP&R at Air Command headquarters, will be promoted to brigadier-general and appointed Commandant of the Canadian Forces Staff College in Toronto.

Colonel Colin J. Campbell, a former Air Command R.C. Chaplain at Air Command Headquarters, will be promoted to brigadier-general and appointed Chaplain-General (RC) at NDHQ, Ottawa.

Plans change for Hornet introduction

Plans for the deployment of CF-18 aircraft in Canada and Europe have been changed, NDHQ has announced.

Alterations include manning three NATO squadrons before a second NORAD squadron is formed; delaying the introduction of regular CF-18 operations at CFB Comox, B.C.; and examining options which would permit an increase in the number of pilots on each course at 410 Operational Training Squadron at CFB Cold Lake, Alta.

Sources say the steps were necessary because the original implementation time-table proved to be unattainable because of the complexities of introducing a sophisticated weapons system, compounded by delays in receiving unique CF-18 maintenance equipment.

This has meant returning aircraft components to the manufacturer which otherwise would have been repaired locally. These factors, combined with the cracks discovered in vertical stabilizers, have limited the number of aircraft available for training.

409 Squadron NATO-bound

The new schedule will extend the implementation phase and will contain the following elements:

- pilots from 425 Squadron, who have graduated recently from the CF-18 course, will assume their air defence role with NORAD at CFB Bagotville, P.Q.

- 409 Squadron, already operational on the CF-18 at Cold Lake, will move to the CFB Baden-Soellingen, Germany, to form the first of three NATO-dedicated squadrons of 1 Canadian Air Group (1 CAG);

- the second and third squadrons of 1 CAG will undergo CF-18 training in Cold Lake and return to Europe in 1985 and 1986 respectively;

- the second NORAD squadron will complete its CF-18 course during the latter part of 1986 and take up its air defence role at CFB Cold Lake in mid-1987; and

- CF-18 operations from CFB Comox will be delayed until late 1987.

Will meet NATO milestone

The modifications will permit the Canadian Forces to meet the original milestone of introducing the CF-18 into Europe in 1985. No. 410 Squadron, the CF18 training unit based at CFB Cold Lake, has the capability to provide aircraft and trained aircrew to NORAD in times of increased alert.

While the contribution of CF-18 aircraft will remain at a reduced level for a longer period of time, the allies are fully aware of the difficulties in implementing new and sophisticated equipment programs and have already planned for reduced Canadian participation during the introduction of the CF-18.

While some delays in the CF-18 training program are related to tail cracks, adjustments announced are primarily linked to the implementation plan itself.

EDITORIAL

Where are we going to be May 11 and 30 - and why?

Elsewhere in this Voxair edition, readers will find two "ads" devoted to a "Big Band Ball" and a "Gala Concert."

They take place at CFB Winnipeg May 11 and Winnipeg's Centennial Concert Hall, May 30, respectively.

Both events will feature performers with credentials that rate with any in the world of entertainment. That, alone, is worth the admission price. But, read on.

If, for a moment, you will pretend that you or a member of your family suddenly lost the gift of sight and that these performers are entertaining to raise money to help restore that gift, you would be scrambling for tickets and pleading with friends to support this cause.

A sightless existence could strike anyone, anytime, including you. Helping people in this predicament for the past 28 years has been the Canadian Forces' Military Police Fund for Blind Children.

Since its founding in 1957, it has raised more than \$850,000 and donated it all in aid of restoring sight to blind children. This year, with your help and compassion, they hope to push that sum over the \$1-million mark.

Some background facts

This fund was founded by one James Riley Stone, now a retired member of the Canadian Forces living in B.C. He started off as a private and eventually rose to the rank of colonel. He fought in Italy, Northwest Europe and Korea, winning decorations along the way because of his leadership and compassion for those he considered that he was privileged to command.

He's quite a guy. For instance, when he was in Korea as commanding officer of the first Canadian unit to arrive there, the 2nd Battalion, PPCLI, some members of his battalion got to drinking "hooch" made by Korean farmers in rice paddies out of some pretty vile ingredients. Drano and the like.

Some of his troops went blind and died painful deaths. To him, these events were not just another statistic a CO had to report to higher authorities. His solution was simple, direct and dramatically effective.

The body of the next soldier to die from drinking this concoction was presented with due dignity in front of the entire battalion and each member was required to walk past and gaze at the remains.

"Hooch" sales of Korean farmer-bootleggers slumped drastically.

Under his command, the battalion won the U.S. Presidential Citation at the Battle of Kapyong. No other Canadian unit ever has been permitted to accept this honor.

With Korea behind him, he returned to Canada and eventually was called upon to become the Provost Marshal of the Canadian Army. He immediately announced to his people that henceforth army policemen no longer would be called "meat-heads," but "Stone-heads."

But, "Big Jim" Stone was to suffer a personal tragedy at home when a beloved daughter was afflicted with eye cancer, suffering blindness and eventual death.

Shortly thereafter, he contacted organizations struggling to help blind children. He found out that many children less fortunate than his daughter who, through lack of funds, were unable to enjoy even the simple comforts. He was distressed that some even lacked funds to return home now and again to visit parents.

That's when he went to his military policemen and the supposed hard noses of the army responded then and there and the Military Police Fund for Blind Children was born.

Its activities became so widespread that today it is recognized as the only strictly military charity, now well known to the Canadian ophthalmological community. Its aims are to help blind children who lack funds and the mere necessities of life.

The fund now raises money through bingos, rock-a-thons, draws and auctions at CF bases and stations. But, there is another aspect to the Fund and its operation. Military police have been getting involved, personally, with blind children. They visit them at hospitals and schools and invite them to CF bases and stations.

You have to see the joy on the faces of these youngsters when they receive such visits. They touch the service people, feel their uniforms and insignia and ask a thousand questions.

For the love of whatever you hold sacred, if you can't attend these functions on May 11 and 14, drop off at the gate house and help a blind child smile by leaving a buck or two.

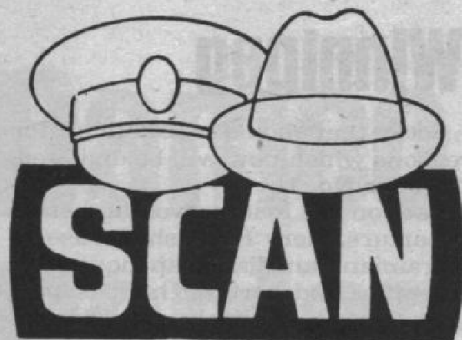

Don't waste rehab leave!

Thinking of rehabilitation leave as a grand excuse for a holiday? The swing through Canada, visiting relatives, can be very tempting when one is drawing full pay without responsibilities. You could be wrong to think this way. Let me explain.

During the final months of your service, while completing preparations and planning for retirement, a momentum is built up which we call a job campaign. There are letters to write, contacts to be made, interviews with employers and a hundred other details to be completed. You are organized and in high gear, mentally ready for the challenge of finding the right job in the outside world.

Break this momentum with a holiday and what happens? The pattern of your planning now is lost, because you have to re-establish all of your former contacts. Remember, you have been away from your friends for several months and are starting from scratch without the firm base of your present employment.

The use of a telephone can even be a problem when working out of your home, especially when your spouse wants to run the vacuum cleaner. Finally, the greatest danger is that panic will set in when no job seems in sight, your leads have turned sour and rehabilitation leave is running out. Faced with a 50 per cent drop in income, some take the first job that is offered.

The answer: don't waste a single moment of your rehabilitation leave. Keep up the momentum of your job campaign. Rehabilitation leave is like an insurance policy and, who knows, the holiday the year after may be better than you think.

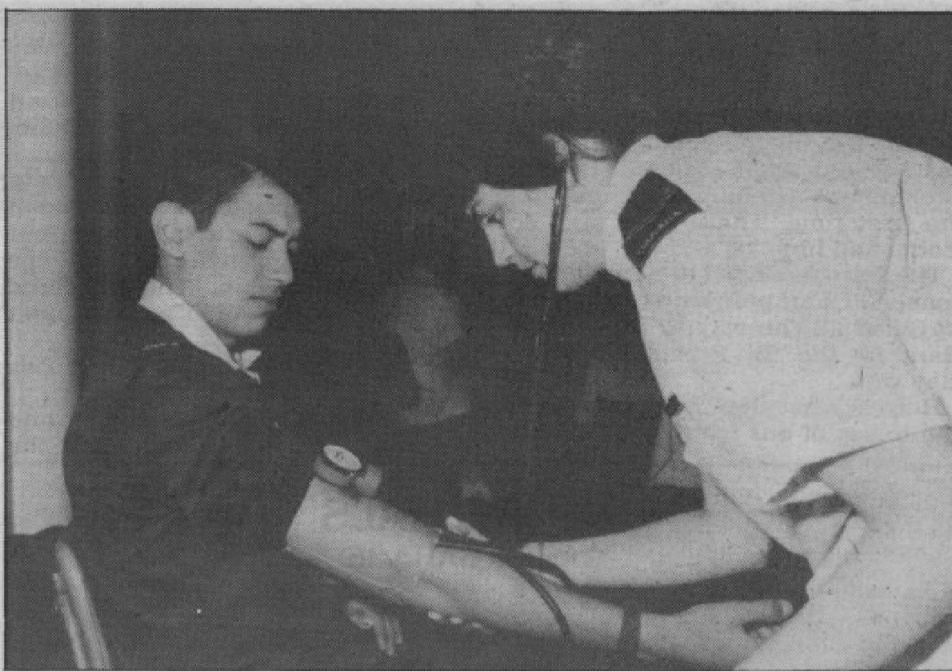
