On the authority of the base commander, Col. S.E. McGowan, military police have had signs erected at all vehicle-entry points at CFB Winnipeg, both north and south sites.

The signs specify speed limits — 50 kph unless otherwise posted; parking — designated and signed areas only; visitors — must report to military police for a pass; and warning — persons, property and vehicles are liable to search on entering and leaving a DND establishment.

Individuals in contravention of these regulations are liable to prosecution under the Government Property Traffic Regulations and the Defence Establishment Trespass Regulations.

Army Goes to War in Wainwright

WAINWRIGHT, Alta. — More than 13,000 service men and women will spend two months in Alberta on Exercise Rendez-vous 85 (RV 85), coming from military units from across Canada.

They now are concentrated in Wainwright, Suffield, and Dundurn, Sask., for the largest in this series of bi-annual military exercises.

The commander of Mobile Command, LGen Charles Belzile, says that "participants have been brought together to ensure that the state of training of units is such that they can fulfill all their assigned roles and the expectations of this country."

The Rendez-vous exercise has been expanded so that a full divisional-size organization is not only deployed, but fully exercised and tested in a realistic way, with a sizeable "enemy" force.

Main aim of the exercise, says LCol Bill McGill, SSO for operations and training at Mobile Command, is to train all formations and units in all phases of war. Progressive training up to the brigade level has been completed and the units now have split into opposing forces.

RV 85 will culminate in mid-June with a full battle group live-firing exercise. A 25-kilometre assault course will be established, using fixed targets. In rotation, each infantry battalion will advance, supported by various affiliated units of artillery, armour and engineers, as well as helicopter and fighter aircraft.

First-time use of new field hospital

vide care for as many as 50 surgical patients a day. Its main function is to provide first-care, stabilize injured personnel and move them to more permanent facilities.

RV 85 also provides the opportunity to integrate Reservists with the Regular Force. More than 870 of them are working in the exercise at all levels, providing vital services. Women — 220 of them — also are participating in a variety of tasks, such as financial and supply clerks to maintenance operators and signal staff officers.

Officials say that an important facet of the exercise is to train and practise various staffs and supporting service formations in moving, maintaining and supply large groups of people in a demanding environment.

Almost 2.5 million meals will be consumed by the end of the exercise. The "cupboard" includes 1,200,000 eggs, 540,000 litres of milk and about 9,000 kilograms of peanut butter.

Consumption of fuel is in the order of 4.5-million litres of diesel fuel and 3.5 million litres of gasoline. Just to move to the exercise, more than 900 railway cars and more than 160 aircraft flights were used. This is in addition to the nearby units which motored to the exercise area.

If the modular tentage employed on RV 85 was connected together, it would stretch for more than six miles.

Spotting an abnormality on a taxiing C-130 Hercules transport aircraft and promptly reporting it has earned Dean Donegan, a heavy equipment operator with Base Transport, a commendation from base authorities and a "For Professionalism" award from the Directorate of Flight Safety, NDHQ, Ottawa.

Donegan had just finished an unloading job near Hangar 16 and while waiting for a Herc to pass clear of the exit route he spotted a small panel flapping on the side of number four engine.

He immediately backed up to the hangar's servicing blister and had a warning passed to the aircraft via base operations.

The aircraft was recalled, the engines shut down and the panel fastened. The aircraft was restarted and continued safely on its mission.

Had the situation gone unnoticed, it could have resulted in damage to the Herc and a possible hazard to the crew.

Base flight safety officials say that Donegan "showed exceptional awareness in detecting the hazard, as well as the courage of his convictions," in his actions.

They saluted Donegan for his professional performance, saying he "demonstrated that flight safety really is everyone's business."

CFS Inuvik to Close

OTTAWA — Defence Minister Erik Nielsen has announced the upcoming closure of Canadian Forces Station (CFS) Inuvik (N.W.T.) The closure will be phased in over an 18-month period.

CFS Inuvik is part of the Canadian Forces Supplementary Radio System. The decision to close CFS Inuvik follows a review of the total communications research program as a result of changed communications requirements.

Redistribution of some Inuvik-based personnel and equipment elsewhere in the system will make that station redundant to Departmental needs. The remainder of the personnel now will be assigned to other tasks throughout the Forces.

CFS Inuvik employs some 260 military personnel and 16 civilians. A reduction of about 70 military personnel is planned for the summer of 1985 with the remainder leaving the following year. Civilian layoffs are not likely to occur until mid-1986.

OTTAWA — Seven components of The Royal Canadian Regiment, including its Winnipeg-based 3rd Battalion, have put out a country-wide appeal to all members to donate items of military memorabilia for an auction.

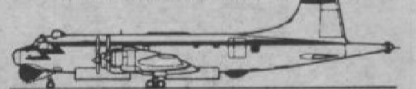

The outside world represents a challenge to service people approaching retirement. The question of age is part of this challenge because, like it or not, in the eyes of many employers the retiring service person is an older worker.

In a period of tight economic conditions, more older workers are finding themselves on the employment market. It is not only the young who are looking for work.

What special problems must the older worker face?

Many business firms pursue a policy of promotion from within and for this reason job openings for outsiders are only at the entry level. Starting out at the bottom of the ladder is difficult for the person past 40.

Company pension schemes can be so rigid that they exclude the older worker. Discrimination because of age, of course, is against the law, but some employers do display their own built-in biases in their hiring practices. Yes, the problem of age is very real and must be overcome by everyone moving into the outside world.

What can we do about it?

The first and most important step is to recognize that the problem exists. Careful preparation and planning are needed in presenting your experience and qualifications. If you stand head and shoulders above all other applicants for the job, age will be secondary. Second, be flexible and be willing to prove your competence. You must be willing to put on overalls perhaps and go back to the shop floor. Promotion to foreman or supervisor will come soon enough.

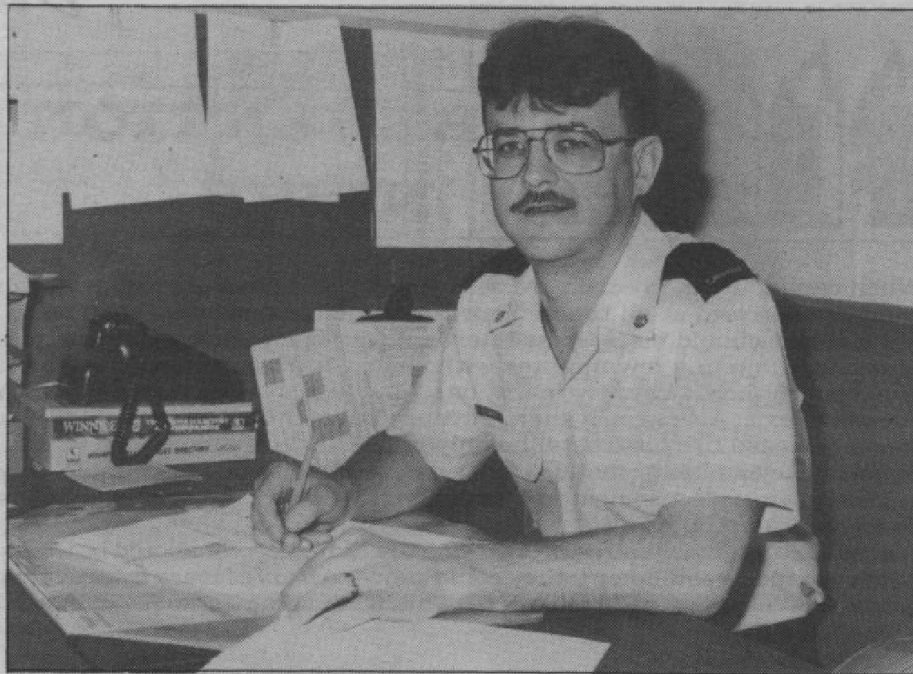
Finally, give up the notion that you are a tired old person looking for a safe haven. The career you are looking for will last at least 20 years and requires the same drive and initiative

as was shown in your service career. This is something that means more than age to the employer.

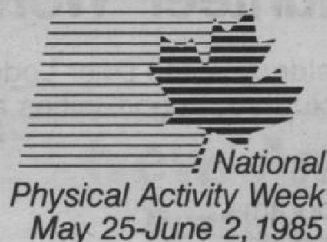

FIRE PREVENTION NEWS

When camping out, special care with flammable liquids and open flames should be exercised at all times. Your Fire Chief recommends that:

- Your tent should be of flame-retardant fabric; a paraffin-coated cotton tent can burn up in a few minutes with someone trapped inside;
- Your tent should have two exits, or a window sufficiently large to serve as a second exit. Also keep a sharp cutting tool in the tent to cut an exit in the walls in case fire obstructs the only exit;
- never use candles or matches in or near your tent; use flashlights only;
- When using electric heaters in your tent, keep them away from walls, pillows and camping chairs;
- A fire extinguisher and a portable smoke-alarm detector should be a must in every camper's equipment; they could prove to be lifesavers by providing you those precious extra moments that allow an escape and survival.

OIL OVERFILLING MAY CAUSE PROBLEMS

QUESTION: I find that some garages, when doing an oil and filter change, will put in as much as one full quart of oil over the full mark on my dip stick. They say it will not harm the engine, but my automotive owner's manual says in big letters: "DON'T OVERFILL." What harm can it do?

ANSWER: You are right to be concerned about how much oil your garage is adding to your crankcase, because at the very least it can cause minor problems in the operation of your engine, and it possibly can do major damage.

Oil is stored at the bottom of an engine in an area called an oil pan, which is designed to hold a certain amount of reserve oil that guarantees the engine an adequate supply in almost any operating condition.

But if the oil reaches too high a level, it can be splashed excessively by the engine's moving parts, particularly the crankshaft. The oil will splash upward and get inside the cylinder, causing oil fouling the spark plugs. That could cost you a tuneup.

Worse yet, if highly agitated and foamed oil is drawn into the oil pump and distributed through various oil passages, it can cause the formation of air pockets that can starve the upper engine of lubrication.

Overfilling is not uncommon because most garages add oil in one-quart quantities, even though manufacturers specify oil capacity in tenths of a quart.

If you think a garage has over-filled your engine, have the oil drained and refill the engine. A shortcut would be to simply remove and drain the oil filter which holds about a quart of oil.

QUESTION: I own a 1980 Toyota Corolla with an automatic transmission. It is getting poor fuel economy. At least, I think so. In the first year I owned it, the car got 29.4 miles per gallon in all-city driving. Now, it's getting only 17.5 miles. Is that normal?

Normally, fuel economy improves after the first 12,000 miles and then should remain about the same for 50,000 miles or more. With the proper care and maintenance, an engine and transmission should last more than 100,000 miles with only minor loss of power and fuel economy.

The least costly source of the problem might be a dirty air cleaner, which can starve an engine of air and cause it to burn more gasoline. Next, have your mechanic look at the ignition system, including the possibility of dirty spark plugs. You might also have a problem with your choke or carburetor.

QUESTION: My 1974 Plymouth Duster has severe front-end shaking when I drive faster than 50 miles per hour. It seems to lessen somewhat at 60 miles per hour. An alignment and wheel balancing did not seem to help. What should I do next?

ANSWER: You should have your front end thoroughly checked for any loose parts, such as tie-rod ends, ball joints and steering arms. A loose front end will not stay aligned.

If that checks out, you should have your tires spin-balanced while they are on the car. If the problem remains, possibly a moving part is out of balance, such as your drive shaft.

Frezenberg After 70 Years

Infantry Gets New Colonel

OTTAWA — General Gérard C. E. Thériault, Chief of the Defence Staff, has announced the appointment of Major-General Herbert Pitts (Retired) as Colonel Commandant of the Infantry Branch of the Canadian Forces. The three-year appointment was effective May 14.

General Pitts replaces Major-General William Leonard, who has held the position since 1981.

A native of Nelson, B.C., General Pitts was commissioned in 1952 following graduation from the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont. He served initially as a member of the Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians), transferring to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry in 1953.

He was awarded the Military Cross for gallantry in action during the Korean conflict. Shortly after his return from Korea he transferred to the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada and rose to command the 1st Battalion of the regiment from 1967 to 1969. He also commanded the Canadian Airborne Regiment from 1971 to 1973 and currently is Colonel of the Canadian Airborne Regiment.

General Pitts then served as Chief of Land Doctrine and Operations at National Defence Headquarters in Ottawa until 1976. He later served as Director-General Bilingualism and Biculturalism until his retirement in 1978.

General Pitts resides in Lombardy, Ont., and is active in many civic and military national associations.

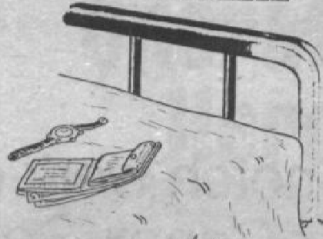
