

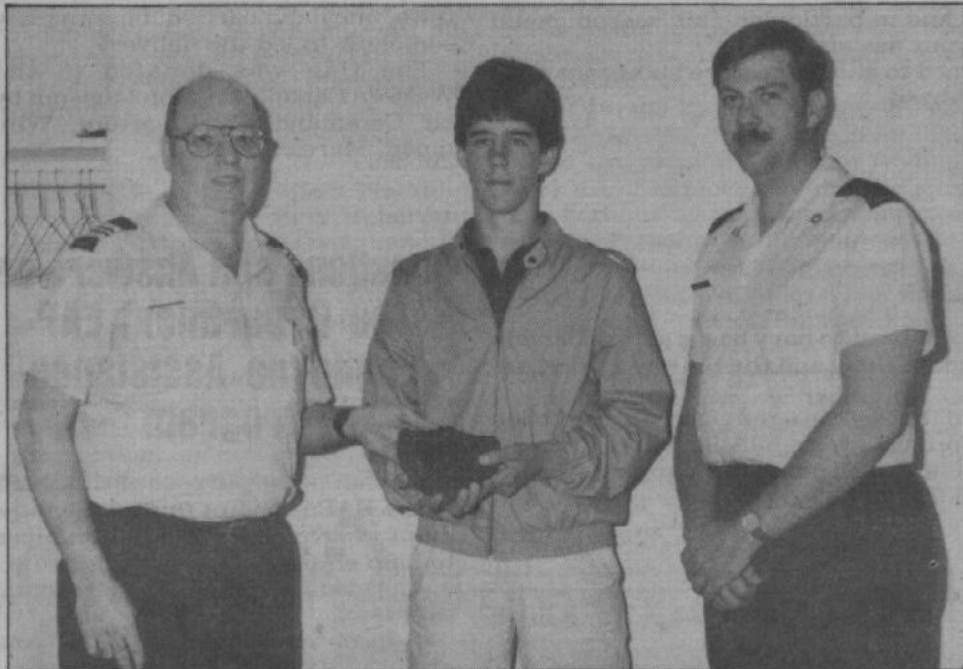

## Air Command Headquaraters Needs A Name

As some of your readers may already be aware, a new Headquarters building for Air Command is under construction at Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg just a few steps southwest of the current Headquarters. The current construction schedule calls for occupation of the new structure during the spring of 1986. A committee chaired by Major-General McNaughton, Deputy Commander of Air Command, has been formed to oversee all aspects of the transition to the new building. Considerable effort is being devoted to this project covering every aspect from computers, plants and decor to the detailed move schedule of individual offices.

The committee is also giving consideration to an official name for the new building and the purpose of this letter is to request your assistance in soliciting name suggestions. The enclosed information package has been prepared to outline the guidelines governing the naming of DND structures and the procedures for submission of proposed names.

If possible two printing periods, perhaps in your letters' section are proposed. The first in the near future to commence the request for submissions followed by a second in July to remind of the closing date.

The planned date for the official opening ceremonies for the new building is 1 April 1986 and activities connected with this newsworthy event will be well documented and of interest to your readers. ## SYEP 85

WINNIPEG — Sixty young Winnipeggers with a liking for physical activity and the great outdoors will find employment this summer as part of the Canadian Forces Student Youth Employment Program.

Slated for 4 July to 14 August, the program will afford participants six weeks of full-time work in the form of military training and pay at the rate of seven days per week for five days of work.

A recruiting official of Manitoba Militia District said this week about forty of the participants in this year's SYEP course have enrolled or are in the process of enrolling this week. Another twenty can still be enlisted.

Participants in the program will earn about \$1,300 during the six

weeks the program runs.

They will learn first aid skills, map-reading, camping, and receive basic military training which will qualify them for entry into regular Canadian Forces Militia units after the end of their course.

Militia district recruiters say most of the young people enrolling this spring for the July to August program have either had earlier contact with Militia units or were told about them by friends and relatives. Canada Manpower offices and high schools also made a number of referrals.

Operated under federal jurisdiction, the Student Youth Employment Program will employ more than 1,000 young people in all parts of the country this summer.

## The Flag That Almost Made It Into Space

This flag of Canadian Forces' Air Command was destined to be carried into space by Canada's first astronaut, Commander Marc Garneau, CD, aboard the U.S. space shuttle Challenger, Oct. 1, 1984.

On the mission, he flew 5.6 million kilometres, circling the globe 132 times.

But the flag was destined to remain earth-bound, because Murphy's Law somehow intervened.

Despite the precautions of foarwarding two flags from Winnipeg to Ottawa, one hand-carried, bureaucracy somehow foiled the delivery.

The flag was donated to the Western Canada Aviation Museum by air Command Headquarters, Winnipeg, March 15, 1985.

## Questions and Answers on The Department EAP Employee Assistance Program

1. What is the purpose of the EAP? The EAP is a joint union-management program which was developed to help employees. It is designed to:

- provide a sympathetic listening ear;

The Department of National Defence recognizes that it has a responsibility to promote the health and well-being of its staff. It also has a direct interest in keeping its employees healthy and happy — because healthy and happy employees are likely to be more efficient and productive.

Most of the unions affiliated with the Department enthusiastically support the program. They believe that it will provide valuable assistance to troubled employees without causing any risk of threat to their job security or chances of future transfer or promotion. It should in fact enable some employees to keep jobs or save careers which would otherwise be in jeopardy.

Signs indicate a difficult task for job seekers in Canada.

High unemployment is a reflection of the general slowdown in the economy. A slowdown expressed in terms of fewer houses being built, cutbacks in factory production and of course, the human reality of more and more people looking for work. Some of us can afford to be smug but not those approaching retirement.

The serviceperson approaching retirement now needs, as never before, to take a long hard look at the situation. Naturally the economic situation is going to affect planning but there are a number of important advantages that should be taken into account. For example:

— One of the most important advantages is time. The serviceperson approaching retirement has in most cases the time to prepare for a second career because they are told when they will be entering the labour force. The civilian is rarely given twelve month's notice.

— A second advantage is one of flexibility. Since retirement is available on 30 days notice during the last year of service without penalty against a pension, they can choose the moment of release.

— A third advantage is a serviceperson's marketable skills and experience. Some find it difficult selling these skills to an employer but the firm base to build on is without question there.

— Fourth, the serviceperson approaching retirement has mobility. When the crunch comes in finding work they can move to where the jobs are without eating up their own moeny. Personal circumstances dictate this choice but this is a real advantage when compared to most other people looking for work.

All of these advantages add up to a brighter and stronger outlook for the retiring serviceperson. The secret is early planning and careful preparation. None of us wants to be part of the unemployment statistics.

# FIRE PREVENTION NEWS

## Gas Barbeques

Now that the barbeque season is upon us, it would be a good time to review some of the "dos and don'ts" of barbeque use and also pass on some of the information on gas barbeques.

Barbeques should not be placed closer than five feet from buildings. Starting fluids should never be added to burning coals. They should not be used in confined spaces such as basements or garages, not only because of the fire hazard involved but also because they produce poisonous carbon monoxide gases.

Small children and pets should be kept away from the barbeque to avoid tipping it or getting burned. The use of barbeques on balconies is a dangerous practice due to confined space and the hazards involved in the use of starting fluids. They can produce carbon monoxide gas in an apartment as well as smoke nuisance to your neighbours. Ash should be disposed of in covered metal containers. Electric starters and solid fuel pellets are probably the safest methods of starting barbeques.

If you are contemplating buying a gas barbeque, here are some hints you may find useful: If consumers don't purchase a heavy duty gas barbeque, they may find that the bottom will fall out after the first year. Although all gas barbeques are made of cast iron, not all are heavy duty. When buying a gas barbeque, a consumer should check and compare several of the features. One area to check is the shape of the gas burners. It is essential that the burners are shaped into the corners of the model, or large areas will not get any heat.

If the barbeque grills are not flexible, in the height at which they can sit, there should be at least a six-to-eight inch space between the burners and the food in order to avoid flare ups.

Grills vary in material from model to model, with the majority having cast aluminum grills. Better models have a porcelain finish aluminum. All models of gas barbeques are equipped with either white brick or black lava rocks. The black lava rocks are the substance that absorbs the grease, turning it to smoke and supplying the food's barbeque flavour.

Black Black lava rocks usually are better than white because they are more porous and absorb the grease more fully, creating more smoke. The lava rocks are positioned on the burners to take the place of charcoal.

Your Fire Chief cautions that charcoal not be used in a gas barbeque because the bottom will burn out. The lava rocks are permanent and do not need to be replaced. Also, before using the barbeque, check all fittings and connections carefully for gas leaks.

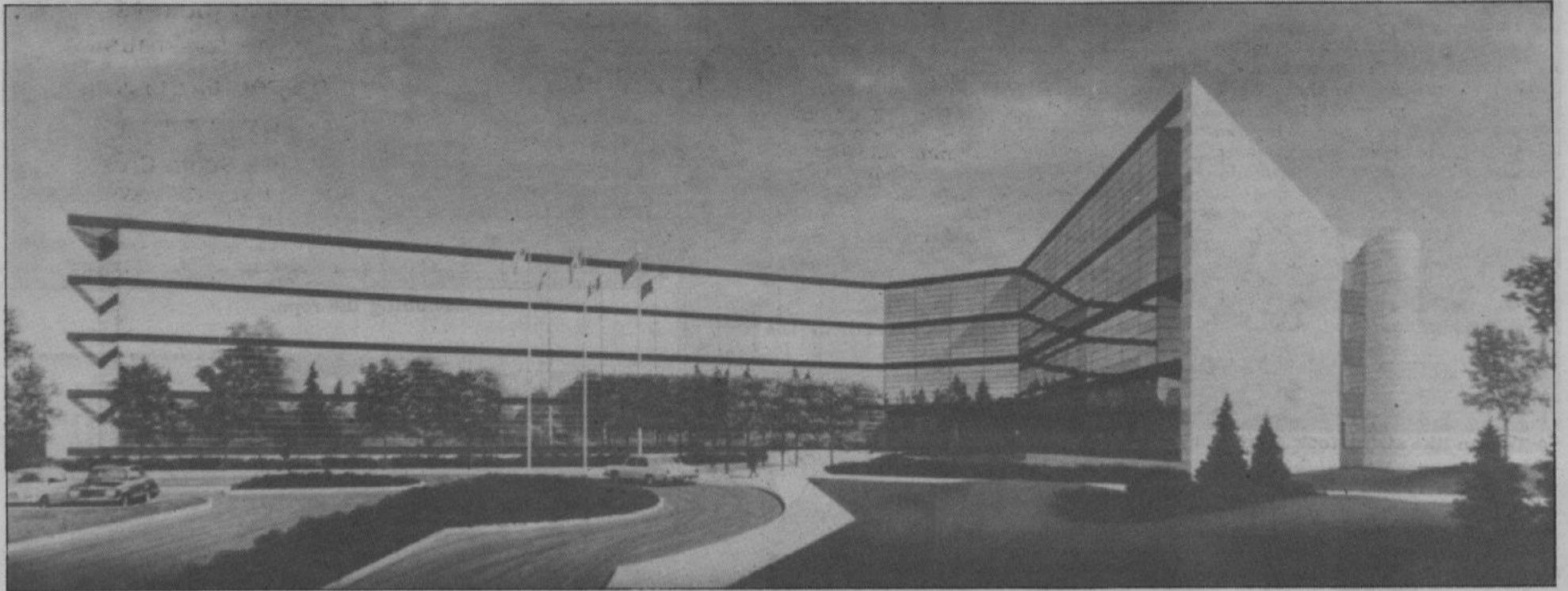

# RV - Tone Down

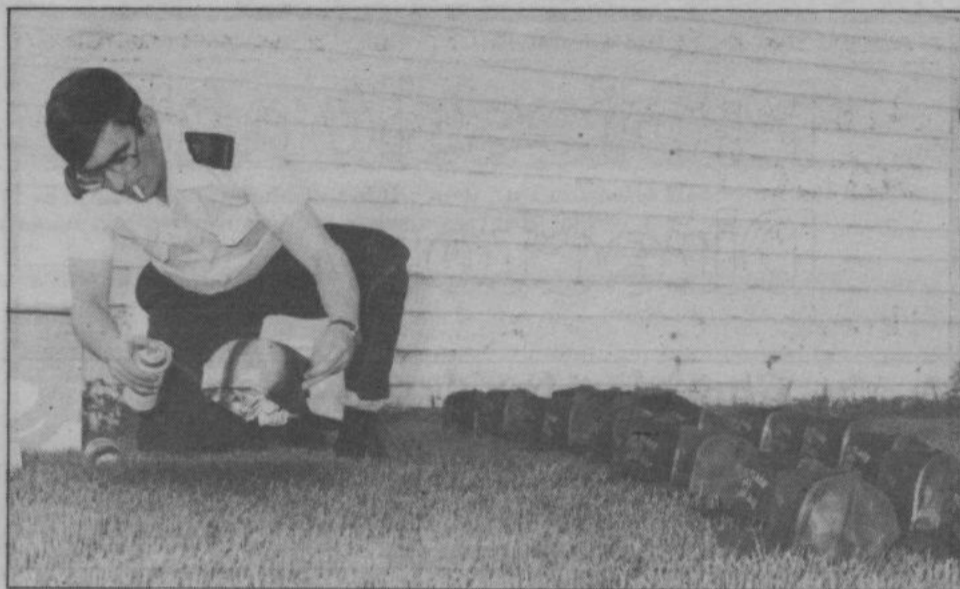

# R.W.R. Ceremonial Parade

Sixty members of The Royal Winnipeg Rifles, and sixteen members of the Toronto based Royal Regiment of Canada, participated in a ceremonial parade on May 12 1985 to honour the casualties of the North West Rebellion. The date was of significance to both regiments, as both were gazetted the battle Honour "Batoche," and the 12th of May was the actual date of the battle which ended the NW Rebellion.

This was only the second time a contingent of the "Royals" have visited Winnipeg, the first being 100 years ago as they passed through on their way to Saskatchewan. Their traditional dress of scarlets and bear skin headdress were a marked contrast to the Rifle's traditional rifle green uniforms. Some adjustments to the ceremony were necessary, as the Royals were not used to the Rifle's quick step and unique manual of arms.

The focal point of the parade was the 1885 Mounment, which was raised by the grateful citizens of Winnipeg to the 90th Battalion of Rifles, the forerunner of the present Royal Winnipeg Rifles. Wreaths were laid by both Regiments, followed by three volleys. The Commanding Officer of the Rifles, LCol B. F. Waters, CD took the salute, as the Rifles doubled past and the Royals marched past in quick time, to conclude the ceremony.

Those who know the history of the "Little Black Devils," nickname The Royal Winnipeg Rifles have been known by since the NW Rebellion, when Gabriel Dumont, the Metis General, awed by the cool steady advance of the Rifles, remarked, "The Red-coats we know, but who are those little black devils?", will enjoy one local wags remark "The little black devils we know, but who are these Red-coats?"

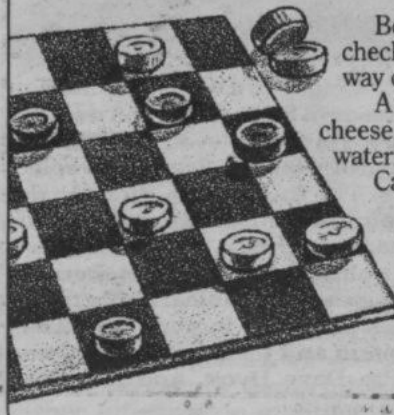
