Compulsory urine tests

CF gets tough on illicit drugs

"For years, the Canadian Forces have enjoyed a very strong national and international reputation. We are small; yet, we have always managed to make the Canadian Forces count in the eyes of Canadians and our Allies, mainly because of the high quality of our personnel. That is what we must protect."

This is the philosophy — expressed by BGen Pierre Lalonde, Director-General Personnel Careers (Other Ranks) — behind a new three-pronged program designed to more strictly enforce and increase the deterrent effect of the current CF drug policy which prohibits the use of illicit drugs by any member. The new program, expected to be implemented as soon as the necessary resources and regulations are in place, was announced in December by the Chief of the Defence Staff, Gen. Gérard Thériault.

According to Gen. Thériault, it is being introduced to deter any threat that drug use might impose to standards of health, productivity, personal efficiency and reliability, fitness, safety, security, morale and operational readiness within the Forces.

Main components of the proposal are more emphasis on the educational aspects of the existing drug and alcohol prevention program; a more active program of deterrence and investigation of drug usage, supported by an increased number of properly trained and equipped investigators; and the introduction into the Forces of a random, but compulsory, urinalysis program. The urine-testing is deemed as the least invasive and most specific means of detecting recent drug use.

Staffing currently is ongoing to put the program into place. Also, during this interim phase, CF personnel are being informed of the forthcoming emphasis on enforcement and deterrence.

"We don't want to take anyone by surprise," says BGen Lalonde. "Although we will resort to administrative and disciplinary measures, our aim is not to catch, or punish people. It is to discourage or prevent them from using drugs illegally."

Actual rates of non-medical use of drugs among CF members, determined

by survey in 1982, appeared to be very close to those prevailing across Canada. "We shouldn't be surprised by the incidence of drug use in the Forces because we draw our recruits from a population that is generally reflective of Canadian society," says the program spokesman. However, he continues, the facts remain that drugs are illegal, they are clearly prohibited under CF regulations and any use whatsoever within the Forces is considered incompatible with the effective discharge of military duties.

Reduced performance

"Drugs reduce an individual's performance and capabilities," says BGen Lalonde. He feels that because of the highly complex nature of the work of CF members, and particularly in light of their access to a variety of potentially dangerous weapons, it is especially important that members not be impaired.

Gen. Lalonde describes drugs as a solvent which, in other nations, have led to increased casualties in the field of battle. "Drugs unglue the homogeneity of the military team. In the military, everyone depends on everyone. We owe it to every individual to ensure that everyone is mentally and physically prepared to give his best support," he explains. "More important, we owe it to Canada to ensure that we field a force of people who are mentally and physically alert. Drug users are soft — they're losers and we don't want losers in the Forces." According to BGen Lalonde, "A user is a loser and in the Canadian Forces there is no place for losers" could be the theme of the new campaign against illicit drug use in the Forces.

The new program will focus on the establishment of extremely effective detection techniques. One technique proposed is the use, on a number of selected bases, of dogs trained in detecting illicit drugs. Another is the establishment of a central intelligence network to compile and disseminate drug information. As well, specialist investigative teams, working under cover with sophisticated equipment, will be employed regionally.

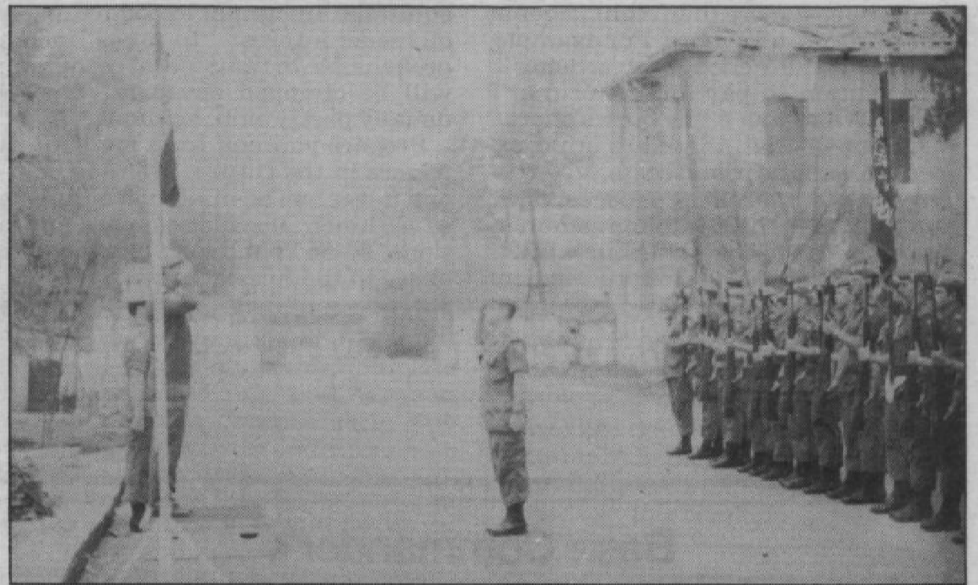

From Cyprus

3 RCR reports

The 15 hour flight to Cyprus was uneventful with the exception of a short stop in Lahr, West Germany for refuelling and a welcome stretch-break. Finally, in the late afternoon of 16 February, the Advance Party arrived at Larnaca International Airport. This was a great relief after the many weeks of administrative preparation and training leading up to the departure.

Once on the ground, Maj A.A. Peterson, the Deputy Commanding Officer of 3RCR, led the Advance Party off the airplane to be greeted by LCol R.B. Mitchell, Commanding Officer of 2 RCHA, the outgoing contingent. From that point on, the members of 3 RCR began the work which they would be doing until September, 1986.

During any handover or change of command of this nature, there are many details involved and this was no exception. There were many notes to study and a vast amount of information to be absorbed at all levels in order to properly carry out the duties of the Canadian Contingent in Cyprus.

As much detail as possible regarding the recent past and present situation in Cyprus was passed on to the new arrivals. The UN Contingents from five other countries introduced themselves, so that working together in the near future would be easier. Tours of surrounding training and recreational areas were conducted. Introductions also were made to the Turkish Cypriot and Greek Cypriot Commanders to establish a good working relationship for future negotiations.

Hundreds attend blood pressure clinics

During the months of February and March, a total of seven Blood Pressure Clinics were held in key areas on CFB Winnipeg, and the program was a huge success.

Between 400-500 examinations were conducted, and seven individuals were advised to consult their doctors.

One of the clinics took place during lunch time in B-21. There it was found that people who exercise have normal

blood pressures. It also was noticed that during coffee breaks, blood pressures were elevated slightly, attributed to coffee and cigarette intake.

The word is "change your habits, have an apple or a bran muffin during breaks. Reduce your stress. Quit smoking. Keep your weight under control.

"Value yourself. Your health is precious."

Behind all the meetings, briefings and introductions the soldier also were beginning to learn the daily routine. Organizing transport when and where required, allocating living quarters, monitoring radio frequencies and running the laundry service were just some of the tasks involved.

With so much new to learn, the invaluable experience passed on by the outgoing units (2 RCHA and 3 CDO from Petawawa) was greatly appreciated. They were the source of information that got 3 RCR's tour off to an excellent beginning. Although eager to return to Canada, their knowledge and experience was passed on so that in a short time 3 RCR was ready to assume operational command of Sector Four.

Official Change of Command from LCol R.B. Mitchell to LCol J.S. Cox took place in the early morning of 6 March 1986 at Wolsley Barracks. MGen Greindl, the Commander of the United Nations Force in Cyprus, inspected the parade and reminded everyone about the importance of UN-FICYP. Finally, best wishes were exchanged between the outgoing and incoming contingents.

The first flight of the main body of 3 RCR arrived that afternoon and they wasted no time in beginning their assigned tasks. Three days later, Main 2 brought the last flight of 3 RCR soldiers to Cyprus and returned to Canada with the remaining members of 2 RCHA.

Some "pet oxen" may be gored

CF "choppers" now winging it over the Sinai Desert

Members and augmentees of CFB Edmonton's 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron now are deployed to their new home at El Gorah air base in Egypt.

It's the headquarters of a Multinational Force and Observers (MFO) in the Sinai Desert, 40 km east of El Arish, two-and-a-half hours by road from Tel Aviv and five hours from Cairo.

The 135 Canadians, including 12 servicewomen, have replaced an Australian unit in the rotary-wing aviation role in the MFO. Job of the MFO is to ensure continued peace between the former belligerents, Israel and Egypt.

Apart from the nine CH-135 Twin-Huey helicopters, Canada also is filling seven staff positions in the MFO

headquarters. Senior among these is Col. Lou Cuppens, former deputy commander of 10 Tactical Air Group in Montreal. Major Jerry Fryer is 408's Huey flight commander.

The helicopter units will rotate every six months. Next in line is 427 Tactical Helicopter Squadron, CFB Petawawa, which will take on desert duty in September.

Task of the Canadian helicopter unit is to provide tactical airlift for units making up the force. Included are moving patrols in and out of the desert, re-supply, rotating outposts, casualty evacuation and air patrols.

About 4,000 members of the MFO stand between similar sized units of Israeli and Egyptian soldiers.

Compulsory urinalysis

Enforcement will be enhanced with the introduction of compulsory urinalysis throughout the Forces. Personnel, selected at random, will be required to submit to periodical urinetesting under a new CFAO now being developed.

Though the regimen of mandatory testing will not begin until later this year, a preliminary "blind" trial was conducted in February at CFB Borden. Some 550 members, whose names were not recorded, were tested at that time to provide updated information on the levels of illicit drug use in the CF today and to allow preliminary testing of urinalysis procedures and equipment.

When compulsory urinalysis is implemented, National Defence Headquarters, in concert with the chain of command, will plan the number of samples and the locations of testing on a yearly basis. Units will collect the samples and processing will be done through the Military Police network.

Current disciplinary and administrative procedures will be applied for members whose urinalyses show evidence of drug use.

Responsibility for these measures will lie with the commanding officer, in consultation with senior commanders and the Judge Advocate General. Refusing to undergo urinalysis will also subject a member to disciplinary action by his commanding officer for disobeying a lawful military command. "In simple terms, our enhanced ability to detect drug use will mean that service personnel who use drugs are playing Russian roulette with their careers," explains BGen Lalonde. "The odds of detection will be high."

BGen Lalonde sees compulsory urinalysis as benefitting the great majority of Canadian Forces personnel who do not want to use drugs. "Though these members have already made their choice, it is sometimes difficult for them to hold to it because of the great social pressure on them to use drugs," he says. "Compulsory urinalysis means they no longer will have to justify their non-use in terms of per-

sonal choice." According to the general, the U.S. Navy and Army found their members who wanted a drug-free environment were well supported by their urinalysis program.

Enhanced education

BGen Lalonde also sees the enhancement of the educational aspect of the current drug and alcohol prevention program as a positive approach. Drug education will be targeted towards junior ranks and to members in positions of leadership. In the words of BGen Lalonde, "it will also be directed to the generation that has difficulty distinguishing a marijuana plant from a fir tree" and yet has supervising and enforcement responsibilities. Curricula of two types of educational teams, one didactic and the other participatory, are being developed now. This will lead to the development and dissemination of materials to units and schools. Specialist instructors may be used in addition to trained unit instructors.

In the interim, according to CDS direction, commanders are placing new emphasis on their existing drug programs by using their current resources of drug education units, base drug education officers and military police to their best advantage.

BGen Lalonde emphasizes that the new program simply underscores the importance in the Canadian Forces of ensuring the total capability of military personnel to effectively discharge their military duties in accordance with their training.

qualified YETP platoons from the Regimental Battle School in Petawawa. M Company started off with a Driver Track course which qualified 87 of the new soldiers to drive the M113 Armoured Personnel Carrier. Their tireless efforts on behalf of dependants in support of the priority 2G leave programme have proven quite successful.

On 15 March, while using a rope traverse at OP Bastion, LCol Cox was injured when the equipment malfunctioned and he fell 30 feet. Despite a magnificently executed airborne roll, the CO suffered a fractured pelvis. He was subsequently evacuated to NDMC, Ottawa, where, following minor surgery, he now monitors the Battalion's progress in Cyprus and Winnipeg from his Temporary Command Post in Room 532. He will be there for about two months. In his absence, the Battalion is being ably led by LCol Al Peterson, promoted to that rank 21 Mar 86. Rear Party remains under the stewardship of Maj Tom Geburt.

Left behind in Winnipeg, when the Main 2 flight left, was a Rear Party of about 200 people, which quickly grew to almost 300 with the addition of TQ3

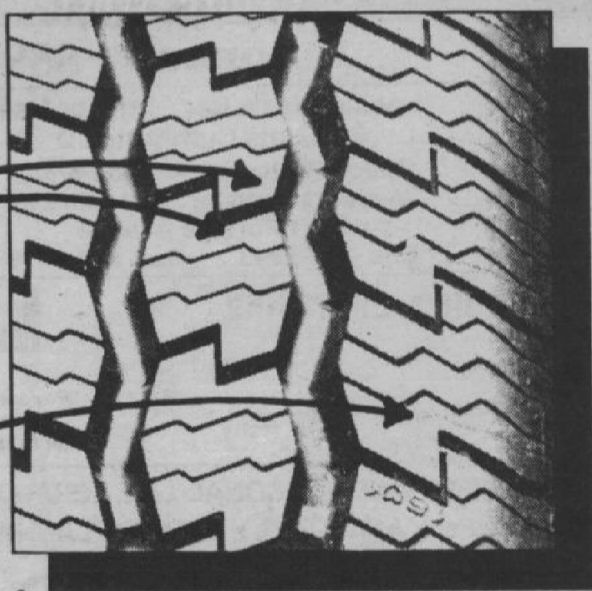

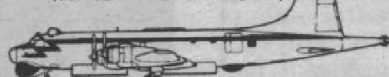
