## U of M program makes degrees avail to CF members, spouses

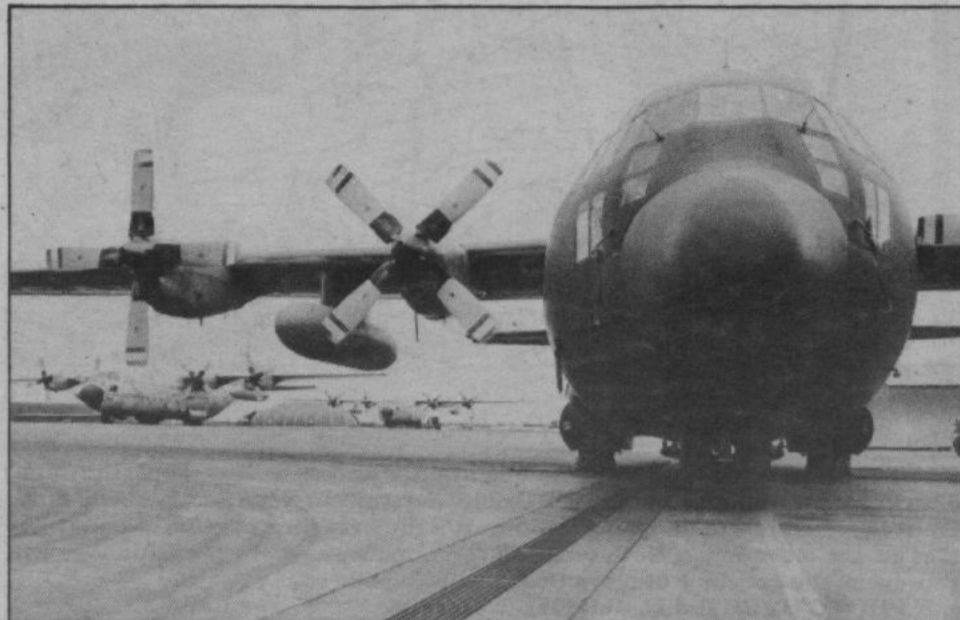
The University of Manitoba program for members of the Canadian Forces and their spouses is rated as a success story. With the May, 1986, convocation, more than 230 participants will have completed baccalaureate degrees, with seven going on to graduate studies completing masters degrees and one candidate earning a doctorate.

Graduate degrees all have been earned through on-campus study by students stationed in Winnipeg.

During the 12-year history of the program, about 3,500 members of the military community have undertaken studies. Approximately 20 per cent of those have been spouses of service members. During 1985-86, some 900 participants actively were pursuing studies.

The Canadian Forces University Program, first introduced in September, 1974, is a stepping stone for entry to the University Training Plans for officers and men (UTPO and UTPM). Each year, 25 to 40 program participants are selected for these plans. Estimates indicate that close to 200 candidates have been selected for full-time university attendance, while many others have been chosen for commissioning from the ranks.

## Militia announces summer Jobs for students

WINNIPEG — Headquarters Manitoba Militia District has announced it will increase summer employment for young Manitobans to 250 from 60 positions last year.

The expanded Summer Youth Employment Program, known this year as Manitoba Army Reserve Summer Training Plan, will run in conjunction with the SYEP of past years.

Young Manitobans enrolling in the program this year will work five-day weeks between July 3 and August 13 with a possible extension to August 25 for selected individuals who have the time for additional training at the Canadian Forces Training Centre in Dundurn, Saskatchewan.

Individuals who enrol will earn \$1,300 between July 3 and August 13, with additional pay for service in Dundurn.

The Summer Training Plan will involve a course in general military knowledge involving customs and tradition of the Canadian Forces, drill, weapons training, first aid and field craft involving outdoor survival skills, fitness training and practice of teamwork.

Program participants also will learn map and compass reading for cross-country navigation by day or night.

Anyone who has reached their 17th birthday before July 1, is under the age of 35 and is attending high school, community college, technical institute, university or other educational institution, may enrol by contacting Militia Headquarters at Minto Armoury, 969 St. Matthews Avenue, telephone 775-4113 or 775-4093. Deadline for enrolment is June 15, to allow time for medical examinations prior to program commencement.

## Feds move to beef up Air Search and Rescure

OTTAWA — Defence Minister Erik Nielsen and Transport Minister Don Mazankowski have signed a memorandum of understanding that officially implements civil aviation support to the national search-and-rescue system.

Objective of the agreement with the Civil Air Search and Rescue Association (CASARA) is to preserve life and property by promoting aviation safety education and by securing civilian air search support services to augment search and rescue units of the Canadian Forces.

Establishment of CASARA is a major step in the revitalized government program to harness the talent, energy and resources of many to provide the national search and rescue system with an additional capability. When fully operational, it is anticipated that CASARA will provide 1,500 aircraft and 6,000 motivated and safety-conscious search and rescue volunteers.

The inaugural meeting of the national chapter of CASARA was opened April 29, 1986 in Ottawa by Major-General Larry Ashley, Chairman of the Interdepartmental Committee on Search and Rescue, and Mr. Claude

LaFrance, Transport Canada's Assistant Deputy Minister of Aviation.

Representatives of the 10 provinces and two territories discussed the relationship between the civil volunteer organizations and their federal sponsors. The first day's session ended with the election of a board of directors and a national executive headed by Robert Goldie, air chief for the Provincial Emergency Program in British Columbia.

Under the terms of a memorandum, CASARA agrees to promote participation in search-and-rescue training programs offered by the Department of National Defence, to promote participation in aviation safety education programs offered by the Ministry of Transport, and to encourage a search-and-rescue support services capability and participation by civilian members and member organizations.

Formation of the Civil Air Search and Rescue Association is an important step towards co-ordinating all available search-and-rescue capable air resources to improve Canada's national search and rescue system. Availability of these aircraft and trained crews will greatly assist in the conduct of search operations.

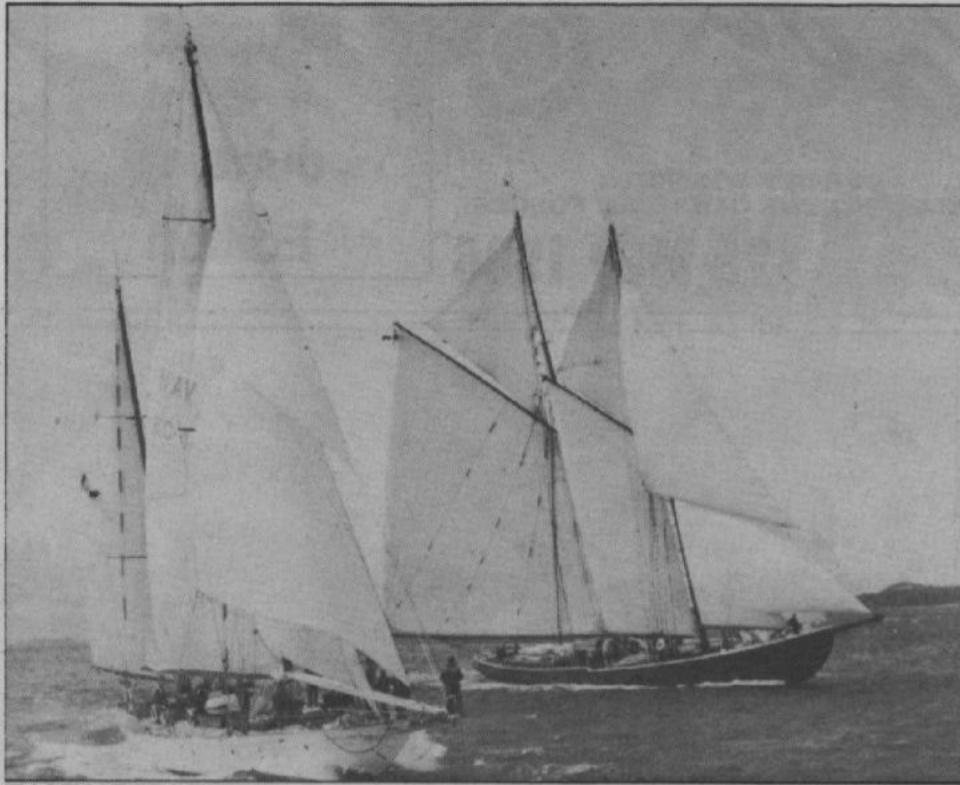

The program came about following the approval of a proposal initiated by the University of Manitoba. The original three-year agreement between the university and DND since has been renewed three times for three-year periods. A fourth renewal extending it beyond September 1, 1986, currently is being negotiated.

### Credits granted military training

The U of M program is one-of-a-kind in Canada because of the advantages it offers. Students can be granted up to a maximum of 30 hours of credit, equivalent to one year of study toward Bachelor of Arts (general) degree, in recognition of military training and service. A second advantage of the program, also available to spouses, is a provision that allows a reduction — on an individual student basis — of the normal residence requirement for graduation when commitments to the service prevent a student from meeting this requirement. This means a student does not have to attend on-campus classes to meet the residence requirements, but can do so through correspondence study.

As well, once a candidate becomes a University of Manitoba regular student, permission to attend on-campus or correspondence classes at another university can be requested. Credit in this case is added to the student's Manitoba record after completion of the approved course and the submission of a transcript.

Students who remain in the Manitoba program and attend universities elsewhere as visiting students do not have to worry about whether credits can be transferred from one university to another, or if they can meet the residence requirement for graduation when they are posted elsewhere — it is part of the Manitoba Program.

For those lucky enough to be transferred to CFB Lahr or Baden-Soellingen, the University of Manitoba offers on-base instruction at both locations during the regular session (October-April) and the summer inter-session (April-June). On-base courses in Europe are popular and normally 150 students attend classes there each year. Several candidates have completed their entire degree during their tour at Lahr or Baden.

The University of Manitoba Program employs a full-time coordinator who is available to assist students with any problems they may encounter. Major (ret'd) Michael J. Piercy has been the coordinator since the program began and provides potential students with application material, answer questions, offer guidance in the selection of study programs, provides information on degree requirements, transfer of credit, and certification for UTPM - UTPO, as well as help with difficulties that may arise in admissions and registrations.

Those contemplating enrolling in studies beginning in September, should note that July 2nd is the deadline for admission applications. For courses starting in January, the cut-off date is Nov. 2, 1986. Candidates who have attended another university should submit applications one month earlier and a transcript of marks should be ordered from the registrar's office to be mailed directly to the admissions office at the University of Manitoba.

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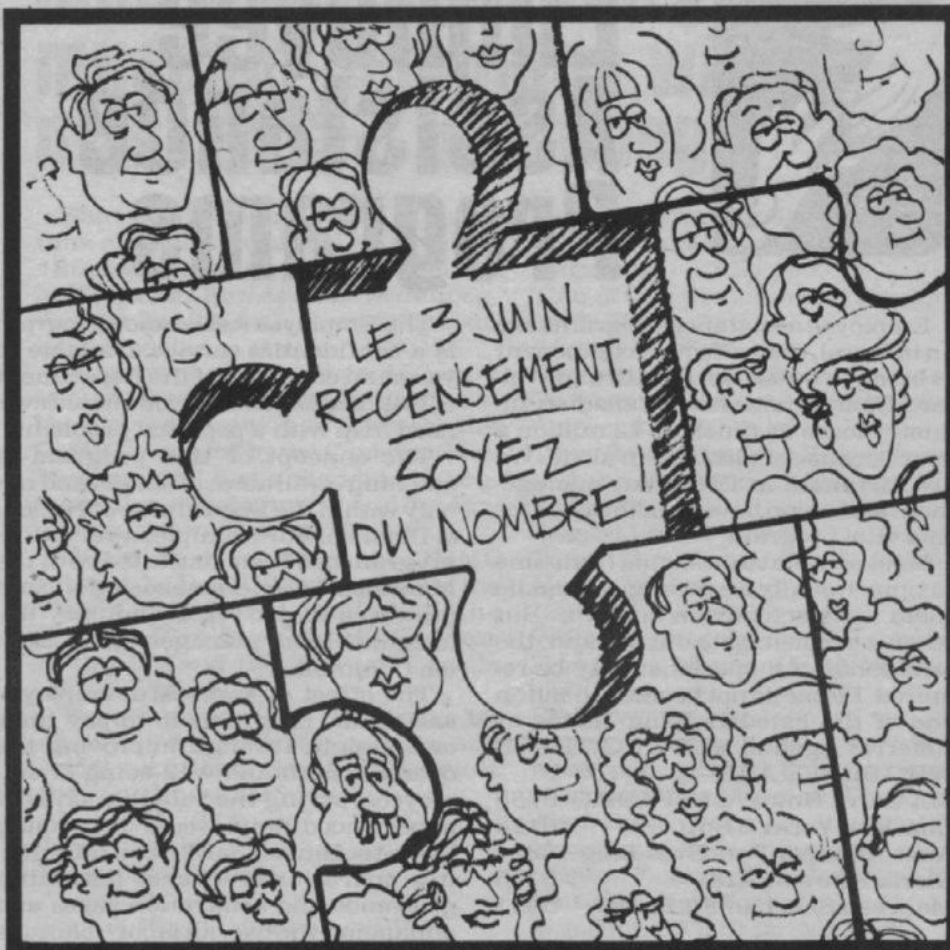
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# Employee Assistance Programs

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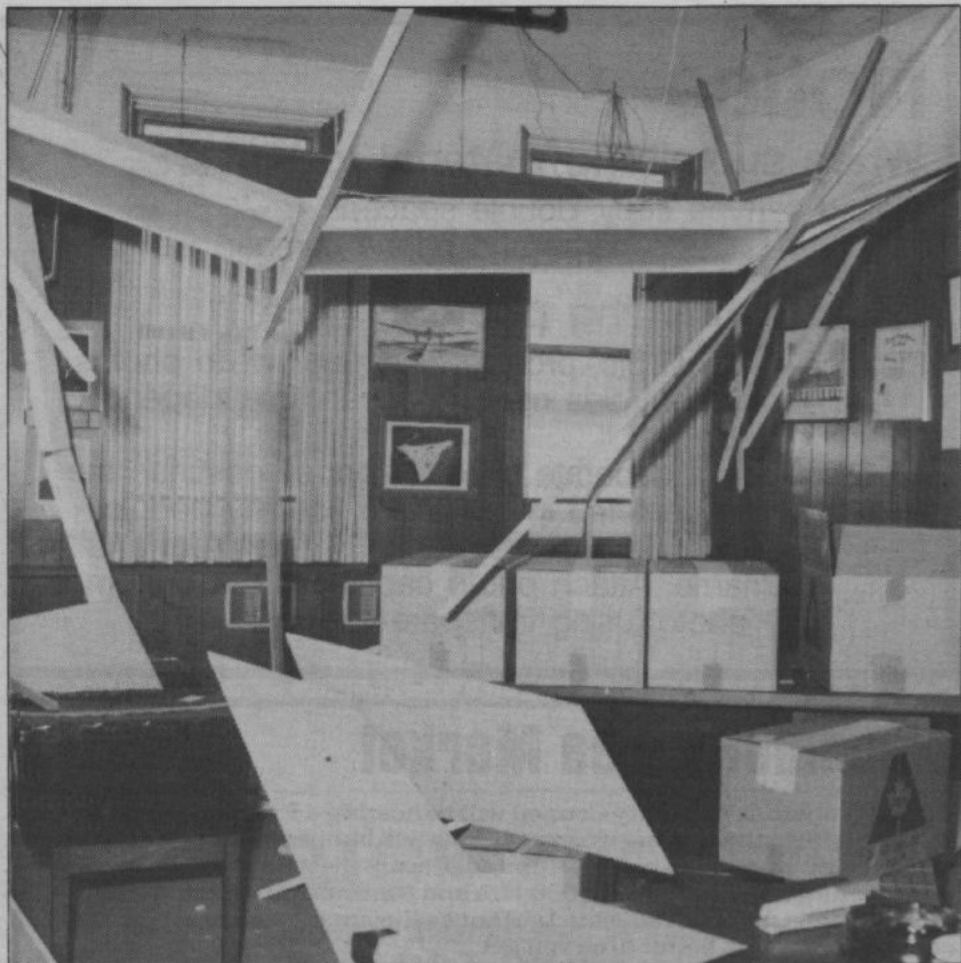

Its graduates have to meet the standards for Child Care Workers set out in legislation. Mrs. Dary feels that, for students whose ambition is to work in this field after graduation, this course will be both an opportunity and a challenge.

**Car Maintenance Tips**

**The Fuel System**

The fuel system includes the fuel tank, fuel line, fuel pump, fuel filter and carburetor and literally goes from one end of the vehicle to the other. The fuel tank, which is usually located at the rear of the vehicle, holds a supply of fuel (usually gasoline), which is pumped to the carburetor to be prepared for the engine. Most vehicles today are designed to run on unleaded gasoline. Vehicles with diesel engines require special diesel fuel. Do not use gasoline in a diesel engine or diesel fuel in a gasoline engine.

A float inside the fuel tank measures the level of fuel and sends a signal to the fuel gauge on the instrument panel, so that the driver knows how much fuel is left in the tank.

**THE FUEL PUMP:** The fuel pump moves fuel from the tank to the carburetor, via a connecting tube. There is a filter on this tube or line, usually located close to or in the carburetor, to screen out dirt or rust particles. This filter should be replaced periodically. The fuel pump may be located in the engine compartment or in the fuel tank.

**THE AIR CLEANER:** The air cleaner filters the air going into the carburetor to remove harmful dust and dirt. It is usually positioned immediately above the carburetor. The actual filtration is done by a replaceable filter which is located under the cover of the air cleaner. It too should be replaced periodically, especially if you drive in dusty conditions.

**THE CARBURATOR:** The carburetor is one of the most important components of your vehicle, for it converts gasoline into a useable form and also provides the driver with a means of controlling the speed of the engine and the vehicle.

Clean air from the air cleaner is drawn through a narrow throat in the carburetor called the venturi. This air flow creates a partial vacuum which draws a fine spray of gasoline into the venturi, where it is mixed with the air. About 15 parts of air to each part of gasoline is the usual mixture. This mixture flows into the intake manifold, which is basically a pipe with branches running to each cylinder in the engine.

Engine speed is controlled by the throttle, which acts like a door between the carburetor and the intake manifold. When you step on the accelerator, connections to the throttle make it open wider and more fuel-air mixture is allowed to enter the intake manifold. When you take your foot off the accelerator, the throttle "door" closes, to reduce the flow of the fuel-air mixture and slow the engine.

The carburetor is set to mix fuel and air in a ratio of one part fuel to 15 parts air. Under some conditions, the engine needs a richer mixture, that is, more gasoline in the mix, and that adjustment is done by the choke.

The choke acts in much the same way as a throttle. It is located near the top of the carburetor and controls the flow of in-coming air. When the choke valve is partially closed, it shuts off part of the air flow and causes the fuel to flow more freely, creating the richer mixture. Today, vehicles have an automatic choke that is opened and closed by a thermostat, so you automatically get a richer mixture when the engine is started in cold weather.

When you accelerate to pull into fast-moving traffic or pass another vehicle, the engine needs a richer mixture to prevent hesitation and deliver a smooth surge of power. The accelerating pump provides this richer mixture. It is a small piston or diaphragm inside the carburetor. The piston causes a few extra drops of fuel to be sprayed into the carburetor as the accelerator is pressed down. That is why 'jack rabbit' starts increase fuel consumption dramatically. Not all vehicles have carburetors. All diesel engines and some high performance gasoline engines use a totally different system of distributing fuel and air to the cylinders. It is called fuel injection. Fuel is piped directly to the cylinder head or the manifold and injected into the combustion chamber.

It is a more sophisticated system and helps to deliver higher levels of performance from smaller displacement engines.

**SIGN AND SIGNALS:** When your gasoline mileage drops or when performance is sluggish, have your air cleaner and carburetor checked. The filter may be clogged and need to be replaced. If your car is older, the internal parts could be worn and need to be repaired.

If your engine fails to start after the first few turns of the starter, the engine may be 'flooded' and you will notice the smell of gasoline. Turn off the ignition and wait a few minutes, then try again. Usually the 'flooded' engine can be cleared by pressing **AND HOLDING** the Accelerator to the floor while the starter turns. See your cars individual owners manual for more details.

Keep your fuel tank full, especially during the winter months. A full tank will help to minimize the possibility of moisture condensing in the tank and eventually the fuel lines. It will also help to keep more weight in the rear end for better balance and control. In very cold weather, a little gasoline antifreeze added to your fuel is a good idea.

Read your owners manual. You will learn a great deal about your vehicle and how to get the most out of it. It will provide specific information about proper cold weather starting, clearing a 'flooded' engine, hot weather starting and the correct type of fuel to be used.

If your vehicle has a trip mileage indicator, use it every time you fill up. That way you will be able to keep track of your fuel consumption and have early warning of fuel system problems.

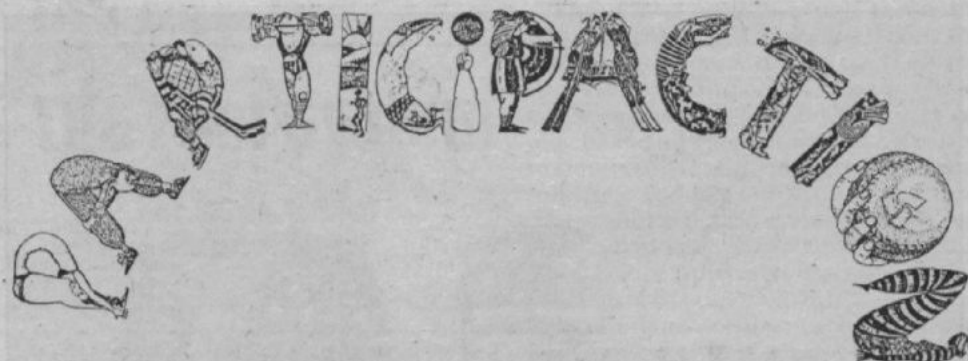

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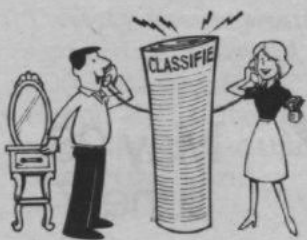

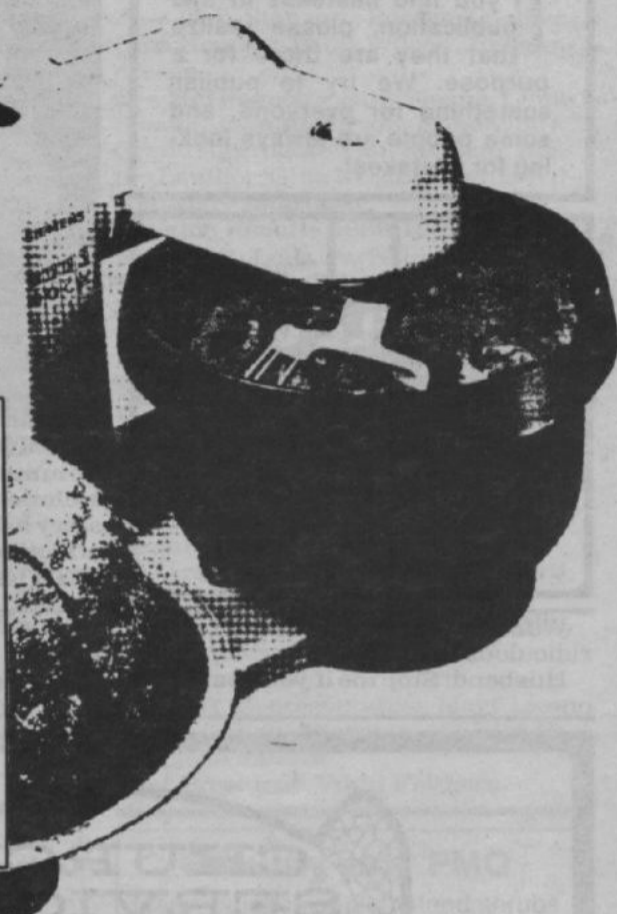
