Largest move of Canadian troops to Europe since WWII

OTTAWA — The largest move of Canadian troops to Europe since the Second World War will take place this September when Canadian armed forces participate in a large-scale exercise with Norwegian armed forces in Northern Norway. More than 5,500 soldiers and 15,000 tonnes of equipment and supplies will be air and sea-lifted to Norway for "Exercise Brave Lion."

Consisting of brigade-level and division-level exercises, Brave Lion is designed to test plans for the deployment, reception and employment of the Canadian Air Sea Transportable (CAST) Brigade Group and a Rapid Reinforcement Squadron.

The CAST Brigade Group mission, which provides for the rapid reinforcement of NATO's Northern Flank (Norway) in time of crisis, was accepted by Canada in 1967. Five years later two air squadrons were committed. Although some units of the brigade group have gained experience in Norway during exercises with the Allied Command Europe Mobile Force (Land) and each of the two air squadrons has exercised in Norway on alternate years, this will be the first time that the entire force has deployed overseas.

The goals of Exercise Brave Lion are: to demonstrate NATO solidarity; to test plans for deployment, reception

and employment of the force; and, to test Canadian and Norwegian plans for supporting the force while in Norway.

The nucleus for the CAST Brigade Group is 5^e Groupe Brigade du Canada with headquarters at Valcartier, Que. It will be augmented by a Canadian support group, a medical group and a communications squadron. The Rapid Reinforcement Squadron will be comprised of CF-5 aircraft from 434 Tactical Fighter Sqn, Chatham, N.B.

OTTAWA — Le plus grand mouvement de troupes canadiennes vers l'Europe depuis la Seconde Guerre mondiale aura lieu en septembre prochain, alors que les Forces armées canadiennes participeront à de grandes manœuvres dans le nord de la Norvège. Plus de 5 500 militaires et 15 000 tonnes d'équipement et de fournitures seront transportés par avion ou par bateau pour supporter ces manœuvres, connues sous le nom de **Brave Lion**.

Ces manœuvres tenues aux niveaux de brigade et de division sont conçues pour mettre à l'essai des plans pour le déploiement, l'accueil et l'utilisation du Groupe-brigade canadien transportable par air et par mer (CAST) et d'un escadron d'intervention rapide.

La mission du Groupe-brigade

CAST qui est de fournir un renforcement rapide sur le flanc nord de l'OTAN (Norvège) en temps de crise a été acceptée par le Canada en 1967. Cinq ans plus tard, le Canada s'engageait à y fournir deux escadrons aériens. Certaines unités du groupe-brigade ont acquis de l'expérience en Norvège au cours d'exercices avec la Force mobile (Terre) du Commandement allié en Europe, et les deux escadrons aériens ont pu s'entraîner en Norvège tous les deux ans, en alternant à chaque année. Cependant, ce sera la première fois que la force entière sera déployée outre-mer.

Les objectifs de l'exercice **Brave Lion** sont les suivants: montrer la solidarité des pays de l'OTAN; mettre à l'essai des plans pour le déploiement, l'accueil et l'utilisation de la force; enfin, mettre à l'essai les plans canadiens et norvégiens pour le soutien de la force pendant son séjour en Norvège.

L'élément dominant du Groupe-brigade CAST est le 5^e Groupe-brigade du Canada, dont le quartier général est à Valcartier, Qué. Aux fins de l'exercice il sera augmenté d'un groupe canadien de soutien, d'un groupe médical et d'un escadron des communications. L'escadron d'intervention rapide composé de chasseurs CF-5 sera le 434^e Escadron d'appui tactique de Chatham (N.-B.).

Smoke Detectors: Does yours work?

It has been proven that smoke detectors save thousands of lives from being lost by fire each year. Regrettably many more are still being lost because the smoke detector failed to operate.

Smoke detectors will not operate if; the power to the detector has been shut off; batteries removed or allowed to go dead; or if covered with plastic, tape or dust.

MQ occupants are reminded that it is your responsibility to ensure the smoke detector in your home is maintained in good working order. This can be accomplished by cleaning and testing the device at monthly intervals.

To clean the detector simply vacuum the air inlets and to test, direct smoke into the detector chamber.

Any detector found to be unserviceable for reasons other than dead battery are to be reported to CE Work Control at 895-5207.

BLHU occupants are to replace dead batteries immediately. Replacement batteries can be obtained from the CE Tool Crib in Building 100.

The Base Fire Chief requests that you give a few minutes of your time today and at least once a month to ensure your smoke detector is working properly. It just may save you and your family.

CF-18's to Arctic for NORAD exercise

CFB NORTH BAY, ONT. — The first operational deployment of Canada's CF-18 fighter to the Canadian Arctic will take place on June 10, 1986. Four CF-18's, and pilots, along with approximately 50 maintenance and support personnel from 425 Sqn and CFB Bagotville, Que. will deploy to Frobisher Bay, N.W.T.

This deployment will be used to develop procedures for operating front-line fighter aircraft from Arctic bases in support of Canada's NORAD role. The pilots and aircraft will participate in a NORAD exercise during their stay in Frobisher Bay.

As an indicator of the Canadian Forces' one-force concept, one Dakota and crew from 402 (AR) Sqn Winnipeg will provide logistics support flights between Frobisher Bay and CFB Bagotville, in support of the CF-18 operations.

Search and Rescue support will be provided by 103 Rescue Unit based at CFB Gander, Nfld.

Some personnel will be pre-positioned in Frobisher Bay prior to the arrival of the CF-18's. They will be there to set up maintenance facilities and to install Mobile Arrestor Gear (MAG) on the runways. This gear will enable the fighters to use their tail hooks for stopping in emergency situations.

While in Frobisher Bay 425 Sqn will conduct local flying training, practice arctic navigation techniques and conduct air-to-air refuelling with a Boeing 707 tanker from 437 Sqn, CFB Trenton, Ont.

The Bull Pen Military Writing

At one time or another most service members are exposed to lectures on military writing. The student quickly learns that the object of military writing is to relate the message as completely as possible in as few words as possible. Military writers have gone to extravagant means to meet these requirements.

The usage of acronyms and abbreviations has run rampant throughout the system. Accordingly, the uninitiated are convinced that the military has an official language of its own. Such an assumption is somewhat justified, after all, where else but in the military would one find choice prose such as: "with regard to Ref A, Ref C is clear in this matter and should be read in conjunction with Ref D, however Ref B prevails."? The recipient of this message must now locate refs A, B, C and D. It would not be unusual for the reader to discover that the term NOTAL has been included in one of the references. In layman's language NOTAL means that not everyone on the mailing list of the correspondence in question was on the mailing list of the cited reference. CONFUSED? That's nothing! The persistent reader will eventually track down the pertinent references and make some sense out of the text.

The true artiste in the world of military writing can relate a message completely and concisely and in such a manner that the contents are totally obscure. One recent example of this artform follows: "Amend Ref A as follows: After quote shall communicate with unquote delete the next unquote, insert quote all unquote. Formal amendment to follow."

Believe it or not after several hours this cypher was solved and actioned. Of course such missives inspire thoughts of revenge. The reader can respond and justice will be done. Before long the battle lines are drawn and the war begins. The weapons are paper and pen and the strategy is to create work and frustration for the addressee. The winner produces the shortest and most obscure text usually accompanied by the longest list of references. Finally, when both sides are hopelessly confused, the negotiations begin. Somebody decides to make a phone call and usually the conversation terminates with "Oh! Well if that's what you meant that's no problem!"

Considering the difficulties encountered by most military members when faced with the maze of acronyms assigned to the myriad of departments in NDHQ it's a wonder any infiltrator could ever find the right office, never mind the right classified information.

Camping

Some hints that save lives

When camping out, special care with flammable liquids and open flames should be exercised at all times. Your Fire Chief recommends that:

- your tent should be of a flame-retardant fabric; a paraffin-coated cotton tent can burn up in a few minutes with someone trapped inside;
- your tent should have two exits, or a window sufficiently large to serve as a second exit. Also keep a sharp cutting tool in the tent to cut out an

exit in the walls in case fire obstructs the only exit;

- never use candles or matches in or near your tent; use flashlights only;
- when using electric heaters in your tent, keep them away from walls, pillows and camping chairs;
- a fire extinguisher and a portable smoke alarm detector should be a must in every camper's equipment; they could prove to be lifesavers by providing you those precious extra moments that allow an escape and survival.

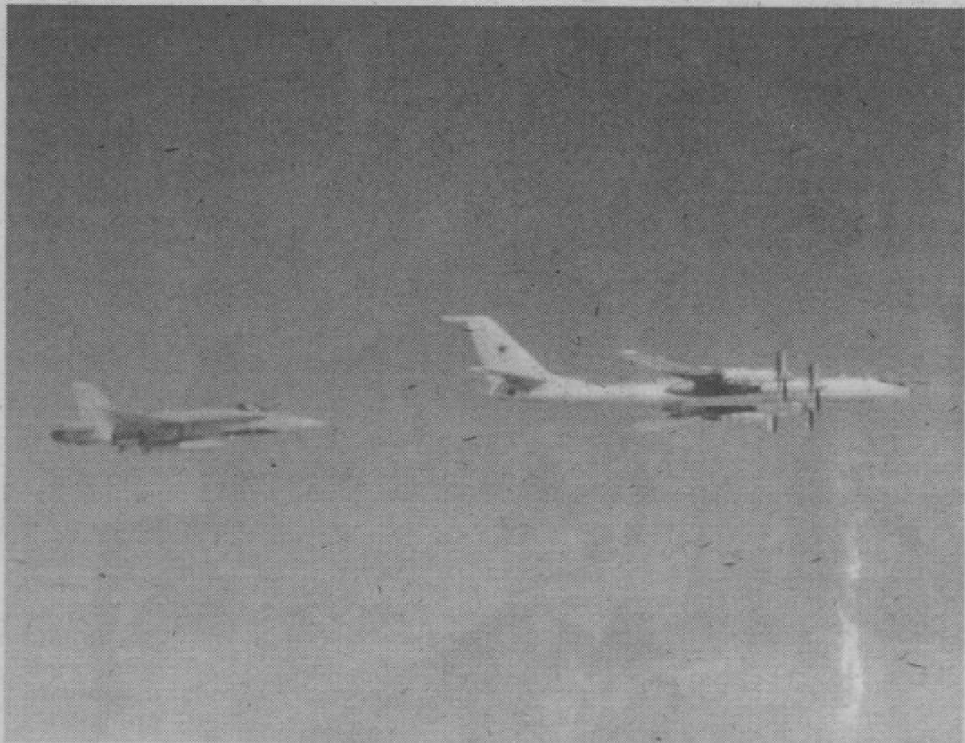

Canadian CF-18's out hunting for "Bear" again

CFB NORTH BAY, Ont. — Canadian Forces jet fighters intercepted two Soviet military aircraft off the east coast of Newfoundland on June 10.

According to the North American Aerospace Defence Command, the aircraft were detected when they entered the Canadian Air Defence Identification Zone without notification.

The intercept was carried out by two CF-18 fighter interceptors of the 425 Squadron, CFB Bagotville, Que.

The pilots of the interceptors identified the Soviet planes as TU-95 Bear "F". The Bear "F" is a long range anti-submarine aircraft.

The Soviet aircraft remained over international waters and at no time did they penetrate Canadian airspace, according to NORAD.

Soviet military aircraft periodically penetrate the Canada Air Defence Identification Zone on missions to and from Cuba. When this occurs they are detected, and intercepted by fighter aircraft under operational control of Canadian NORAD Region at North Bay.

Air defence fighter interceptor aircraft, which stand on 24-hour alert, are ready to be scrambled on short notice if an incoming aircraft is detected and cannot be correlated with a flight plan.

The fighter interceptor force carries out the NORAD task of controlling access to sovereign airspace of Canada and the United States in peacetime and would provide defence against an attack from bombers and cruise missiles in the event of hostilities.

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Hazardous waffle grill recalled immediately

Toronto, Ontario, June, 1986: Owners of Toastess Waffle/Grill/Sandwich Maker, Model 575 should stop using them immediately because of a potential shock hazard. The units concerned are stamped on the underside — Model 575, 120V, 1000W, Toastess Inc. No other models are affected.

Investigation has revealed that some units have an internal wire that may contact the heating surface, resulting in melting of the wire insulation and energizing the enclosure with 120 volts. In consultation with CSA, Toastess Inc. is implementing a voluntary recall of all 24,100 units produced since July, 1985. They will inspect the units in question and modify or replace, as may be required. Units should be carefully packaged and returned by PARCEL POST to:

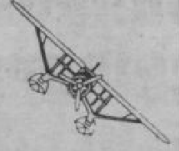

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Canadian Forces Postal Service celebrates 75th Anniversary with new stamp commemoration

OTTAWA — A 34-cent stamp has been issued by Canada Post to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Canadian Forces Postal Service.

The stamp design, by Montreal graphic artist Jacques DesRosiers, features an authentic Second World War Field Post Office cancellation. It is superimposed on a photograph of that period showing military personnel receiving mail. The top portion of the stamp shows Canadian infantrymen in Cambrai, France, during the First World War.

The Canadian Postal Corps was approved as a unit within the militia on May 3, 1911. In 1961, Queen Elizabeth bestowed the title "Royal" on the Canadian Postal Corps. With the unification of Canada's military forces in 1968, the CRPC became the Canadian Forces Postal Service.

The Canadian Postal Corps maintained a vital link between armed forces personnel and their loved ones at home during both World Wars and the Korean War. Today, the same service is provided to those stationed in restricted military zones in Canada, Europe and wherever Canadians serve in United Nations peacekeeping operations.

75^e Anniversaire
th Anniversary



A 34-cent stamp marking the 75th anniversary of the Canadian Forces Postal Service was unveiled on May 9, 1986, at National Defence Headquarters, Ottawa, by Col Isidore Popowych, Director General Transport and Mr. Andre Villeneuve, Vice-president of the Corporate Communications Department for Canada Post Corporation.

OTTAWA — Un timbre de 34 cents commémorant le 75^e anniversaire du Service postal des Forces canadiennes a récemment été émis par la Société canadienne des Postes.

Conçu par le graphiste montréalais Jacques DesRosiers, le timbre montre une oblitération postale d'un bureau de poste de campagne au cours de la Deuxième Guerre mondiale. Elle est surimposée sur une photo montrant des militaires recevant leur courrier. Dans la partie supérieure du timbre-poste, on voit des fantassins canadiens à Cambrai, en France, au cours de la Première Guerre mondiale.

Le Corps Postal canadien a été formé au sein de la milice le 3 mai 1911. En 1961, la Reine Elizabeth a accordé le préfixe Royal au Corps Postal canadien. A l'unification des Forces armées canadiennes en 1968, le CRPC devient le Service postal des Forces canadiennes.

Le Corps Postal canadien a maintenu un important lien entre les militaires et leurs êtres chers durant les deux grandes guerres et la guerre de Corée. Le même genre de service est offert aujourd'hui aux militaires basés dans les zones militaires d'accès restreint tant au Canada qu'en Europe ou à tout autre endroit où des Canadiens se trouvent présentement dans le cadre d'opérations du maintien de la paix des Nations-Unies.

It's not too late to be counted

WINNIPEG — G. Jerry Page, Regional Director of Statistics Canada for Manitoba, Southern Saskatchewan and Northwestern Ontario wants to assure Canadians that it's not too late to be counted in the 1986 census. "The census count is still in progress and householders and farm operators who have not yet completed their questionnaires are encouraged to do so," said Mr. Page.

In major urban centres with a population in excess of 10,000, completed questionnaires should be mailed back in the postage-paid envelope provided. It's essential that Canadians are aware that even though the June 3 reference date has passed, it's not too late to mail back their questionnaires," said Mr. Page.

"In smaller urban centres and rural communities, completed questionnaires should be held for the census

representative to pick up." Mr. Page explained that some representatives have large areas to cover, but that they are in the field now and will be in each neighbourhood to pick up completed forms.

In some remote areas, Canadians may be concerned that their forms haven't yet been delivered. In these areas canvassers will conduct personal interviews with householders. "Canvassing began on June 3 and continues for 2-3 weeks", stated Mr. Page.

Mr. Page stressed that all Canadians will definitely be counted. "We're very pleased with the initial response. At this stage it appears that the 1986 census will be a resounding success. The thanks must go to Canadians who cooperated and cared enough to count themselves in," Mr. Page concluded.

Waincon over for another year — Nato forces going home

CAMP WAINWRIGHT, ALTA — It's all over. Waincon 86, 1 CBG's annual concentration, is now history and the more than 5,500 participants have begun other tasks. Most Canadian troops have returned to their home stations across the western provinces and are preparing for summer leave for summer taskings. The American armoured troopers from Fort Benning Georgia, staying at Wainwright till mid-June, are perfecting the tech-

73 Communications Group Change of Command Parade

Monday 9 June 1986 was the occasion of the Change of Command Parade for 73 Communication Group. Lieutenant Colonel E.J. Sim CD assumed command from Lieutenant T.G. Senft CD. Brigadier General J.G. Leech CD, Commander of Communication Command, presided over the event which was also attended by Her Honour Pearl McGonigal the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Manitoba. Her Honour Mrs. McGonigal is the Honorary Colonel of 735

(Winnipeg) Communication Regiment, one of the Communication Reserve units in 73 Communication Group.

The 100 man parade included members from all units, both Regular Force and Communication Reserve, of 73 Communication Group: 731 Communication Squadron Shilo; 733 Communication Squadron Winnipeg; 734 (Regina) Communication Squadron; 735 (Winnipeg) Communication Regiment; 736 (Thunder Bay) Communica-

tion Squadron; 737 (Saskatoon) Communication Troop and 73 Communication Group Headquarters Winnipeg. The Pipes and Drums of the 3rd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment provided excellent accompaniment to the parade.

With an overall strength of approximately 500 personnel, 73 Communication Group has the overall responsibility for the provision of strategic and infrastructure communications services to Department of National Defence installations in Northwest Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and those parts of the Northwest Territories due north of those areas. The services provided include such communication systems as telephone, static radio, mobile radio, narrative message, facsimile and data. The personnel and equipment resources of 73 Communication Group units are capable of providing services in both the tactical (field) and the non-tactical (strategic) role. They can also be tasked to provide emergency communications services to the Regional Commander (Commander, Air Command) and to provide communications training and services to the Commander of Militia Area Prairie.

The competition is sponsored by the International Sports Council, a body designated to promote physical fitness, military sport and friendship through sport. The Canadian Forces joined the 7-member organization in 1985. Since that time Canadian military athletes have participated in biathlons, x-cross country racing, shooting and parachuting championships. Volleyball is the first team sport Canada has entered since joining the membership.

The 13 team members were chosen by taking the best players available in the Canadian Forces. For this reason, the players come from across the country and represent all components of the CF.

The team gathered in Winnipeg 10-14 June for a 4-day training camp, their one and only chance to play and practice together before heading for Colorado. Team Captain, Major Vic Trnavskis said they will be competing against teams who have trained and played together for a long time and some Olympic class athletes. Keeping that in mind he says he hopes the Canadian team will be reasonably competitive on this, their first outing and that the venture will result in a consistent training program to work towards formation of a national team for future competitions.

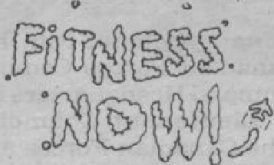

Getting into a gym may seem a nuisance or unnecessary to some people. However, the benefits of a regular, intense exercise last a lifetime — and only you can do it.

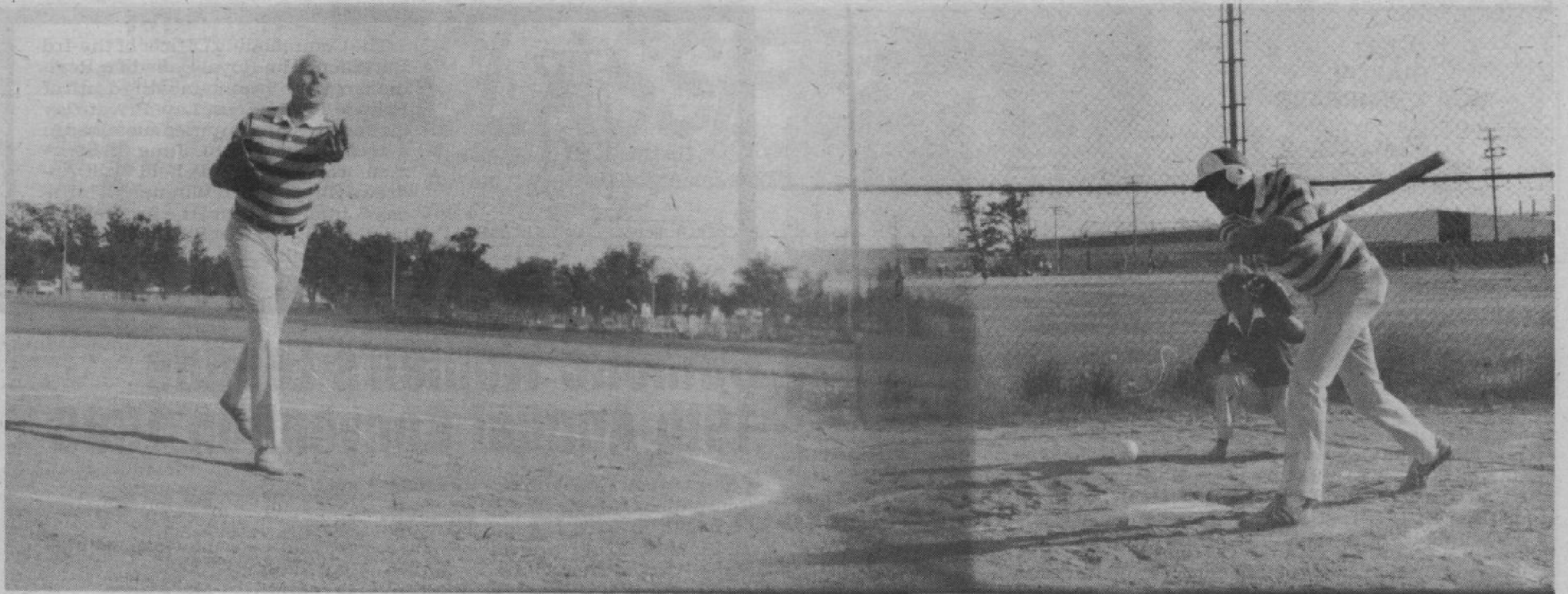

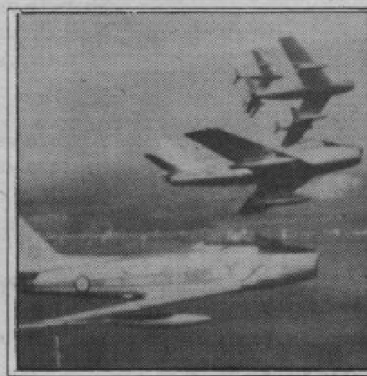

THE CANADAIR SABRE

As well the book covers the Overseas Ferry Unit, CEPE, the auxiliaries and test flying.

Besides the RCAF, *The Canadair Sabre* deals with the other air forces that flew the mighty "Sword." The RAF and Luftwaffe are treated in separate chapters, and "Sabres Around the World" covers such operators as Italy, Turkey, South Africa and Colombia. The short-lived Israeli Air Force episode is included, and the Pakistan Air Force Sabre 6s in combat against Hunters, Gnats and MiG-21s in the 1971 war with India. Among the various little-known aspects are Sabre 4s with the UN Congo operation in 1963 and with the Honduras Air Force in more recent years. The book concludes with the many Sabre 5s and 6s still flying on the civil scene. The appendices include a massive list of all 1815 aircraft, with particulars for each, squadron lists, diagrams, maps, poems, a list of over 500 Category "A" Sabre crashes (all operators) and a beautiful set of fold-out line drawings of various marks.
