Severance Pay as Taxable Income

The government has stated that effective Mar 88, severance pay will be considered as income for the purpose of determining Unemployment Insurance benefits. Initially this requirement was to be effective 31 Mar 85 however the government deferred the change until Mar 88. It must be emphasized that in this context severance pay is only used as income for the purpose of determining eligibility for Unemployment Insurance. It can still be rolled into an RRSP.

The second and more important point concerns severance pay and the rollover into an RRSP. At the present time the regulations governing the disposition of severance pay remain unchanged. Severance pay can be rolled over into an RRSP in an amount not to exceed \$2000 for each year of military service. For example, a member who receives 20 thousand dollars severance pay after 20 years service can place the full amount of severance pay into an RRSP without income tax implications. Should the member not elect to put the severance pay into an RRSP then the money will be considered taxable income in the year that it is received.

Discussion with Revenue Canada Taxation have confirmed that at this time there are no known proposals to change the rules concerning the rollover of severance pay into an RRSP. NDHQ continues to monitor the situation concerning severance pay and should any new proposals become known, they will be advised as quickly as possible. In the meantime, personnel would be ill-advised to make any career decisions based on rumoured changes to the current regulations.

Christmas is just around the corner – BRRR!

A parcel which rattles when picked up from under the Christmas tree may be tantalizing. Alas, it could also mean it was not properly packaged.

With the advent of Christmas, Canada Post wants to point out to its customers fragile articles should be mailed in strong, securely sealed containers. They should also be packed in lightweight cushioning material such as crumpled newsprint, foamed plastic or even plain popcorn.

Many gifts are purchased already parcelled in attractive display boxes which are meant for exactly that: display purposes. Such boxes offer little protection to the articles within, especially when travelling inside a mailbag with other parcels pressing against one another. The packaging must be strong enough to withstand the unavoidable bumps, knocks and jolts encountered in any travel whether by air, road or rail.

Corrugated, solid cardboard or fibreboard containers will offer protection against parcels breaking open as a result of pressure from without.

Boxes or other containers should be large enough to allow the use of a layer of about 5 cm (about two inches) of cushioning material between the contents and the container walls. If more than one item is included in the container, each item should be protected separately with cushioning material.

Soft parcels

When packing soft or unbreakable articles, a pair of sheets for example, good quality brown paper or sheet polyethylene should be used, preferably with an inner layer of corrugated cardboard, and sealed with strong adhesive tape. String should not be used to secure parcels. String is often broken when caught in various ways while parcels go through the mail-stream.

Sealing

Boxes should be firmly sealed along all seams with a good quality packaging tape. The larger and heavier the parcel, the wider and stronger the tape needs to be. Generally, the tape should be at least 4 cm wide.

Perishable Articles

Articles must be packed so that contents cannot leak out. The cover should be plainly marked "PERISHABLE".

Do not mail items which will not stand up to a journey of more than a day or two. Remember that perishables can be subjected to extremes of heat or cold in transit.

Liquids

Tins and bottles containing liquids must be securely closed and placed in a rigid box of cardboard or fibreboard with plenty of soft packing material which will be absorbent, such as sawdust or wadding, and must be of sufficient quantity to absorb all the liquid in case of breakage.

Proper Address

Be sure to use the Postal Code. All the mechanization and modernization that Canada Post has done over the past few years depends on proper use of the Postal Code. If the code is not there or cannot be read, your parcel will require additional sorting which can lead to delayed delivery.

If you are not using a typewriter to write your label, print the Postal Code clearly. Be sure that it appears as the last line of the address.

And just in case the addressee has lost your Postal Code, be sure that you include it on your return address.

Special Delivery

You may wish to send parcels or letters by Special Delivery. Special Delivery items receive special handling within the mail processing operations and are delivered with the first available despatch at their destination. In major centres Special Delivery service operates 14 hours a day, seven days a week.

Insurance

Cards and parcels can be insured against loss, theft and damage in the mail process. Most items can be insured inexpensively for up to \$1,000 coverage. Perishables and fragile objects are acceptable for insurance against loss only.

Be sure to mail on time

Be sure to mail your Christmas cards and first class parcels by De-

cember 17, 1986 for IN TOWN addresses and by December 12, 1986 for OUT OF TOWN addresses, including the United States. For other countries, deadlines vary for both the destination and the point of mailing. They may be obtained from your local post office.

Parcels generally take longer for delivery. Parcels not going first class should be mailed by December 15, for IN TOWN addresses and by December 8, for OUT OF TOWN addresses, including the United States.

Canada Post Corporation hopes that these tips will help make it a special Christmas for everyone on your list. If you have any questions do not hesitate to call Canada Post's Customer Service or ask at your local post office.

All Christmas cards for destinations in Canada and U.S.A. must be sealed.

Rates:

Postal rates for Canada: 29¢ for all Christmas cards in special envelopes bearing a printed matrix on which the addressee's postal code must be "ticked". Precoded 29¢ stamps for these envelopes will be sold in booklets of ten. 34¢ for all letters up to 30g.

Postal rates for U.S.A. 39¢ for all letters and sealed Christmas cards up to 30g.

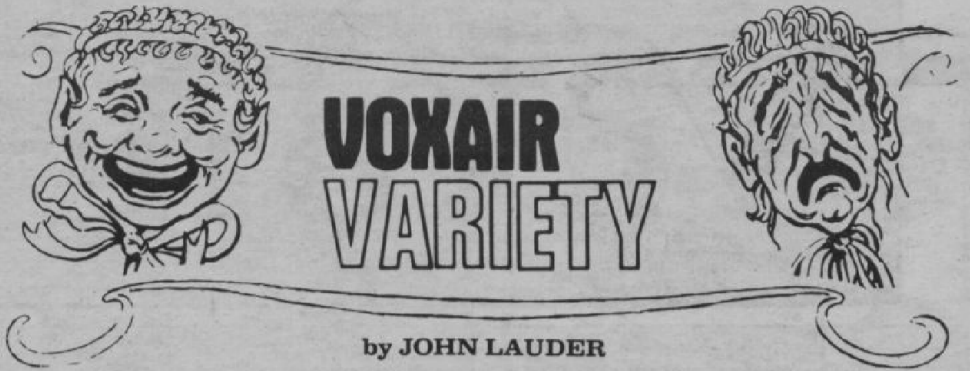
Fortunately, the new BComd and BAdmO are two of our most staunch supporters and are both very eager to see more sections become involved with the paper.

If you enjoy symphony music, the Centennial Concert Hall is the place to be for the next two weeks. Gimli Motorsport Park may Host Player's Challenge Series

It has been a booming year for motorsport in Canada, two new racing series have helped to make it one of the best years yet. The Player's Challenge Series is for stock Camaro Z28s and Firebird Trans-Ams with factory sealed motors. With over \$200,000 in prize money and national television coverage, GM of Canada expected thirty to forty cars to enter the first year, but 74 cars entered making it one of the most popular racing series in North America. Richard Spenard of Belleville Ontario the late Gilles Villeneuve's old Formula Atlantic teammate is leading the series.

The other new series is the Rothmans-Porsche Challenge where stock Porsche 944s are used. Kees Nierop of Kelowna BC is leading the series, Kees has a lot of experience driving Porsches as a few years back he took one to victory in the 12 Hours of Sebring. The Canadian Tire Formula 2000 series is going strong with large grids and is also being lead by Richard Spenard. One of the most promising drivers in the Formula 2000 series is 17 year old Paul Tracy Scarborough, Ontario. The three time Canadian Karting Champion also won

the Canadian Formula Ford Championship last year and his most recent credits include a second place finish in a Canadian Tire Formula 2000 race and a Can-Am win at Mosport.

For those who can't afford a Camaro, Firebird or a Porsche there is the Honda/Michelin Series using stock Honda Civics, Lindsay Riddell of Pierrefonds, Quebec is leading the series. Unfortunately all these series are in Eastern Canada. There is a possibility that the Player's Challenge Series will go on the road next year across Canada and one of their stops would be Gimli Motorsport Park in Gimli, Manitoba.

GMP has started a lot of renovations over the last two years including new modern washrooms, concession stands, track entrance and landscaping for better viewing and with a beach just a few miles away it would be one of the nicer stops on the circuit. A Western Honda/Michelin race would probably be one of the supporting events as there is enough Honda/Michelin cars in Western Canada to start a Western series.

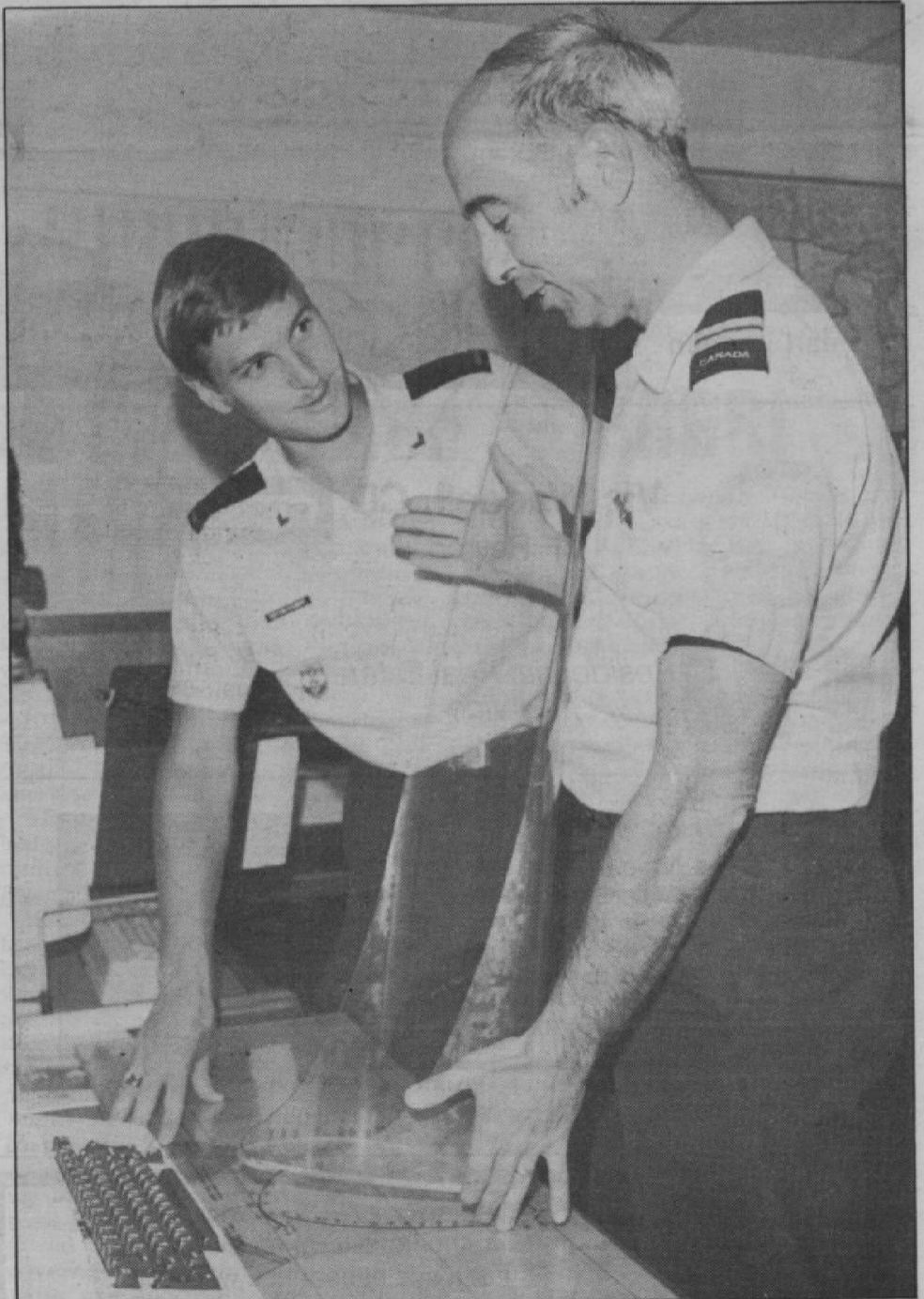

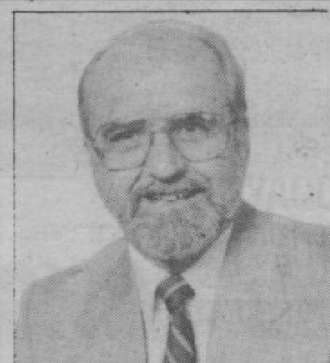

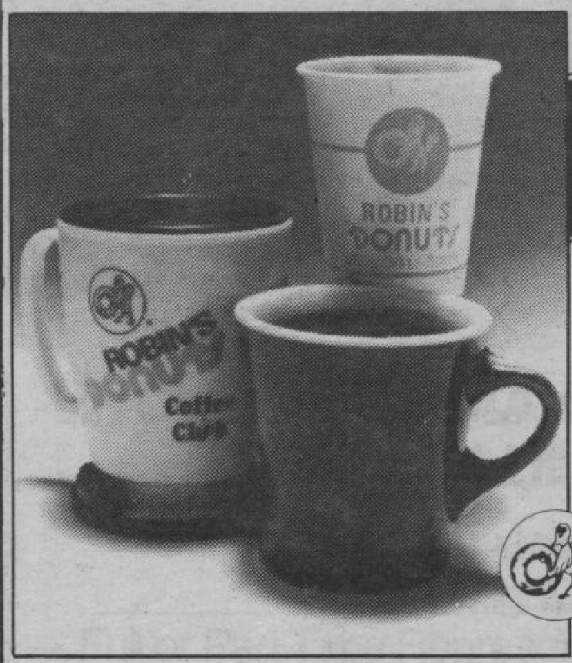
