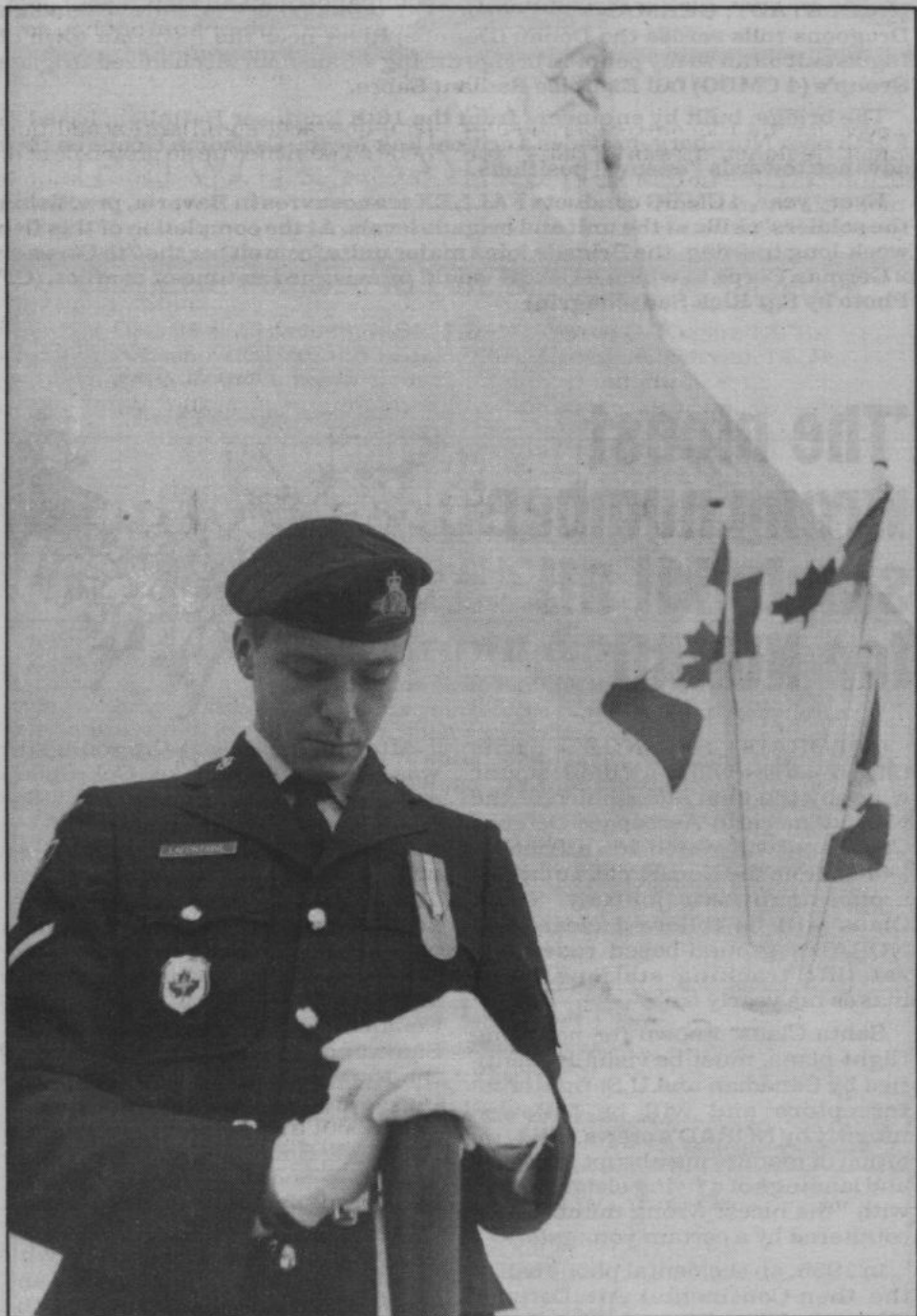

The past month has seen a superabundance of activity in the performing arts, with everything from grand opera down through gospel rock to pop stars such as Billy Joel. No one, in his right mind, could follow it all, let alone try to afford all this entertainment, so a few highlights are given below.

The opera Tosca in late November featured, not only an adult chorus, but also one made up of young boys with fine soprano voices. Singer Olivia Stapp in the title role was great, also the young Puerto Rican tenor, Antonio Barasorda, as her lover, and Victor Braun, as the evil Chief of Police. As always the story line is full of violence, jealousy, murder, and double-crossing, but the music makes it almost believable.

The Manitoba Theatre Centre opened "A Christmas Carol" on November 27th, and it runs for three more days, until the 20th of this month. There are difficulties in offering a play that has been literally done to death in so many past performances; stage, screen, radio and television.

With a cast of 27, playing many more parts, and some fine technical stunts, a revolving stage, and a lot of smoke and mirrors, the MTC makes a valiant try, which comes off most of the time. The eight-year-old critic sitting next to me was intrigued by the appearance and disappearance of various ghosts, and at Mr. Scrooge flying from his bed. I felt that Robert Haley in the role of the story teller, Charles Dickens, was weak, but the Robert Clother as Scrooge was excellent, as were a number of the others in the cast. Sets and costumes were top quality.

MTC redeemed itself with the Warehouse production "We Can't Pay? We Won't Pay!" which also runs until the 20th. If your drill instructor taught you a few bad words and you think crazy Italians are fun, try and catch this one. It is sheer farce, full of laughs and a bit of political sense. A balanced cast of three men and two women fill out the cast, and all are equally good. There is some strong language, but it is in the context of the story.

Yet another Italian comedy will next grace the Main Stage, as the 1753 show, Mirandolina opens on January 1st.

Upcoming for Christmas is the Royal Winnipeg Ballet with the circus ballet "The Big Top". Also on the program will be "Le Jazz Hot, Spring Waters, and Nuages". As a special tribute to the late Paddy Stone, local star and choreographer who recently passed away, his dance number "The Hands" will be presented.

Evening shows run from December 26 to 30 at 8 pm, with matinees at 2 pm on the 27th, 28th and 31st. Tickets are \$9 to \$25, with discounts for children, students and seniors.

Other events in the Concert Hall include "Christmas Fantasy" with the Symphony Orchestra, special guests, and a sing-a-long, this on the 20th and 21st at 7:30 pm and a matinee on the 21st at 2 pm.

Over at the Gas Station Theatre on Osborne Street the Mermaid Theatre is running "Just So Stories" all this week for schools, but with public performances at the weekend on the 20th & 21st. These are the Kipling animal stories which have always been popular with the young ones. Prices are \$5 and for information you can call 947-0394.

At the end of the month the Contemporary Dances will offer "Camping Out: A Wilde Night with Liszt" as a New Year's celebration. This opens on December 31st and runs to January 10th. Tickets are \$9 for students and \$12 for adults through 452-1239.

The Air Reserve and You Article Two — Classes of service

Last issue we described a little about the Air Reserve and some general information on enrolment standards. Now let's get into a little more complicated subject, the classes of Reserve Service.

There are three classes, unimaginatively named A, B, and C. Class A service is used for unit parades and part-time work. It is the normal form of Reserve Service. A Reservist on Class A signs a daily attendance register for the number of hours on duty and is paid once monthly for the number of days and half-days worked in the previous month. A half-day's pay is awarded for two to six hours duty, while six to twenty-four hours duty in a calendar day merits a full day's pay. Since ARAF members work normal Service working hours a standard day is about 7½ hours.

Class B Service is a bit different. This is basically a short to medium term period of continuous service, 15 days to about six months. This type of service is used to send Reservists on courses, for direct support to the Regular Force, when part-time won't do, and for special projects. To explain, the Air Reserve sometimes sends a number of technicians and clerks to Europe each summer to work and learn on the bases at Lahr and

Baden-Soellingen. These Reservists are all on Class B. Similarly, Air Reserve units supplied volunteers to some events such as the Canada Summer Games also on Class B. Closer to home, a section on the base may need full-time help for a month or two so a Class A Reservist will be asked if he or she wants the full-time duty. A Class B Reservist receives the same daily rate of pay as on Class A, but is paid for every day of the Class B contract. Thus a Class A Reservist working 15 days in October would be paid for 15 days service but a Class B callout for the month of October would work about 22 days (Mon-Fri usually) and be paid for 31 days.

Then there is Class C Service. This is a medium to long-term class of service, three months to a year or more. In effect this type of service is a contract between the individual and DND, where the individual agrees to serve for a given period of time at an agreed-on rank. Because there are a number of oddities about Class C Service, particularly with regard to pensions, I think a separate article next issue is warranted.

Again a reminder, anyone interested in any of the three classes of service described should contact the ARAF office at 895-5764.

There's no life like it

In April of 1941 at the tender age of 18 and just fresh out of high school, I joined the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Having been born and brought up on a farm, the idea of belonging to a select glamorous group of people filled my head with visions of being an instant hero, irresistible to the fairer sex, and though I hate to admit it patriotism was one of the things farthest from my mind.

It was quite a shock when I reported to the Manning Depot, and quickly found out that an Airman Second Class (A.C.2) was one of the lowest forms of humanity that ever existed.

About one hundred and fifty of us poor lost souls were grouped together, issued uniforms, given military haircuts, and allocated living space in two barrack blocks. We were taught how to make a bed, scrub a floor, shine boots and buttons, press a uniform, and last but not least how to march for hours and hours carrying a backpack, and an old beat up Ross rifle. We marched and drilled for what seemed like an eternity, and every time I worked up the courage to ask our Squadron Corporal when my flying training was going to start, that worthy gentleman would always make reference to my inability to properly police a latrine, and always ended by saying that I was the scruffiest, most illiterate, pitiful specimen of a human being that it was his misfortune to try and command. Finally my recruit days ended, and with thirty five others we were posted to a wireless school to begin training as Wireless Operator Air Gunners.

I had been told when I enlisted that Pilots were in short supply, so when I got to Wireless School I requested and received an audience with the Adjutant to try and find out why I had not been selected for Pilot training.

The Adjutant, an ex school Principal bluntly informed me that Wireless Air Gunners were in demand at the present time, and if that didn't suit me, he was more than willing to send me back to Recruit Camp. I hastily assured this worthy gentleman that the possibility of becoming a Wireless Air gunner would fulfill my wildest dreams, and just to make sure this big Wheel knew I was serious, I mentioned that maybe Pilots were just glamor boys. Anyways after a session at Wireless school and a go at Bombing and Gunnery school the day arrived when a Wireless Air Gunner badge was pinned to my tunic, and I also received a promotion from Leading Aircraftsman to Sergeant.

After more training at an Operational Training School, the day arrived

when orders sending me Overseas were posted on the bulletin board. The journey overseas was by a ship called the Nieuw Amsterdam, and as I was boarding this ship I thought that if the Navy couldn't even spell (New) properly, this trip would not be a luxury cruise. How right I was in regards to the cruise, mainly because the weather was stormy, we were crowded together like sardines, and just as soon as somebody got seasick I would follow suit even though there was nothing in my stomach to throw up.

Anyways we finally made it, and I was posted to a Royal Air Force Squadron in Doncaster Yorkshire.

All thoughts of becoming a hero vanished as our Squadron was strictly air transport, and the aircraft were (D.C. 3's) Dakotas.

Even though I liked flying and still do, after a few months with trips to Italy, France, and you name it, there were many times when I wished that I had let the Adjutant at wireless school send me back to Recruit camp.

Finally our whole squadron got posted to Burma, and by this time I was now a Warrant Officer Second Class (W.O. 2) which was a great rank, as the Royal Air Force did not have such a classification, so rather than discriminate against me, they quit detailing me for Orderly Sgt. Duty Officer, and Guard Commander.

I was still in Burma when V.E. day occurred, but it didn't matter at the time, because the Japanese were still fighting in the Burmese jungle, and the bullets they were using were just as deadly as ever.

To make a long story shorter I got back to Canada in late 1945, took my discharge and believe it or not re-enlisted less than a year later.

After twenty eight years in the military I applied for and obtained my release, and to this day I have never regretted one single moment of my military career.

As the military recruiter says, "There's no life like it", and I'll drink to that.

The bridge, built by engineers from the 16th Engineer Battalion, based in Furth near Nurnberg, provides a critical link for the Canadian troops as they advance towards "enemy" positions.

Every year, 4 CMBG conducts FALLEX manoeuvres in Bavaria, practising the soldiers' skills at the unit and brigade levels. At the completion of this five week-long training, the Brigade joins major units from either the 7th Corps or 2 German Corps to which 4 CMBG would be assigned in time of conflict. 'The nicest wrong number' started it all for NORAD



COLORADO SPRINGS — This Christmas Eve will mark the 31st year whereby the men and women of the North American Aerospace Defense Command will watch for a friendly launch from the North Pole. To ensure a once-again safe journey, Santa Claus will be followed closely by NORAD's ground-based radar and satellite tracking stations as he makes his yearly trek.

Santa Claus, known for not filing flight plans, must be visually identified by Canadian and U.S. fighter interceptors and will be followed intently by NORAD's crews. This tradition of monitoring abrupt take-offs and landings of a flying sleigh, began with "the nicest wrong number" encountered by a certain youngster.

In 1955, an accidental phone call to the then-Continental Air Defense Command here began the Santa Watch tradition.

A misprint in a local store's advertisement giving a telephone number for Santa Claus resulted in a call to now-retired Col. Harry Shoup, director of Combat Operations. When the colonel answered the commander in chief's "hot line," a small voice asked, "Is this one of Santa's helpers?"

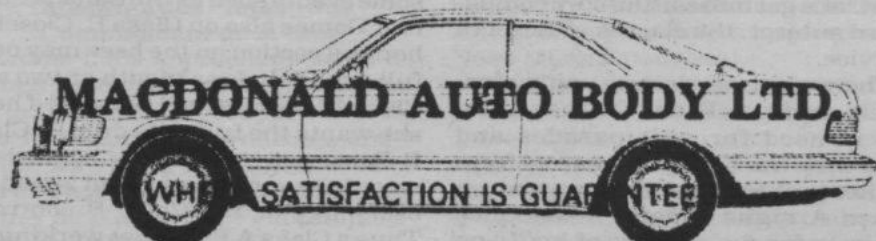
After realizing that the youngster was not playing a joke, Col. Shoup said, "This is Santa Claus." As other calls flooded the supposedly unlisted number, Col. Shoup designated an officer to handle the "Santa Line." That Christmas season, many youngsters shared their Christmas lists with a "special Santa helper."

Feeling the Christmas spirit after answering several calls, one of the Command Post's crew members drew Santa and his sleigh on the display of the North American continent. During a surprise visit to the Command Post about a week before Christmas Eve, Col. Shoup found the "Santa Tracking" and that's how NORAD began its special Christmas Eve watch.

Detecting the heat from Rudolph's red nose, the satellites, along with ground-based air defense radars and space surveillance sensors, plot the flight of Santa and his nine tiny reindeer across North America.

NORAD relays this special tracking information to worldwide radio stations and several television networks to let youngsters everywhere know that Santa's on his way!

An accidental call 31 years ago began a Christmas Eve tradition now enjoyed by kids from one to ninety-two!

Other startling revelations will follow, so to close here is Santa's trivial wish list for some of 14 Training Group's staffers:

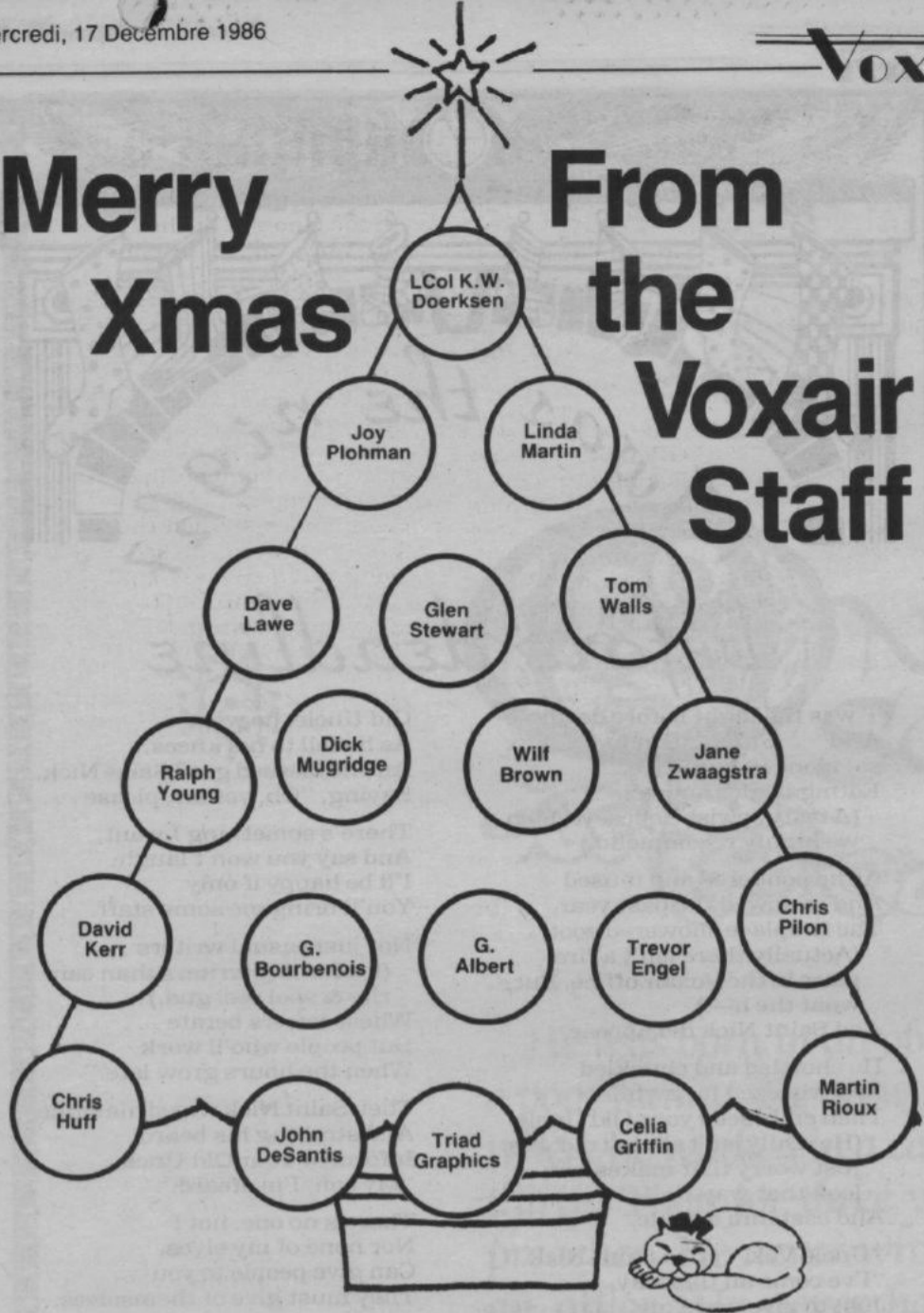
1. A used pickup truck big enough to haul a dead moose in.

Xmas Tree safety should top Christmas list

Ironically, there is an increase in home fires and related deaths during the traditionally joyous Christmas Season, due to the age-old problem of carelessness and to the built-in fire hazards associated with Christmas decorations. Everyone should ensure that his or her holiday is free from fire. Fire safety precautions should head the list of every sensible family's precautions for Christmas. There is no place like home for the holidays; there is no place like home for Christmas fire hazards.

Fire can be your enemy and Christmas decorations add an extra danger. So be extra careful during this festive season. Do not give fire a chance to start. Here is what your Fire Chief says:

"Keep your Christmas tree in a sturdy container with water and check the level every day. Tie the tree securely. Check all sets of Christmas lights for worn insulation, loose sockets, etc. Turn off all indoor tree and decorative lights before you leave the house or retire for the night. Never use lighted candles on a tree or near any evergreen decorations and remember outdoor lights require special wiring. Pick up the wrappings on Christmas morning when opening the gifts. Never burn wrappings, cartons, etc. in the fireplace. Finally, keep matches away from the children and do not let them play too close to the tree."

Captains Bob Sutherley and Tim Sexsmith were next to venture forth on the African Trainer Scheduled

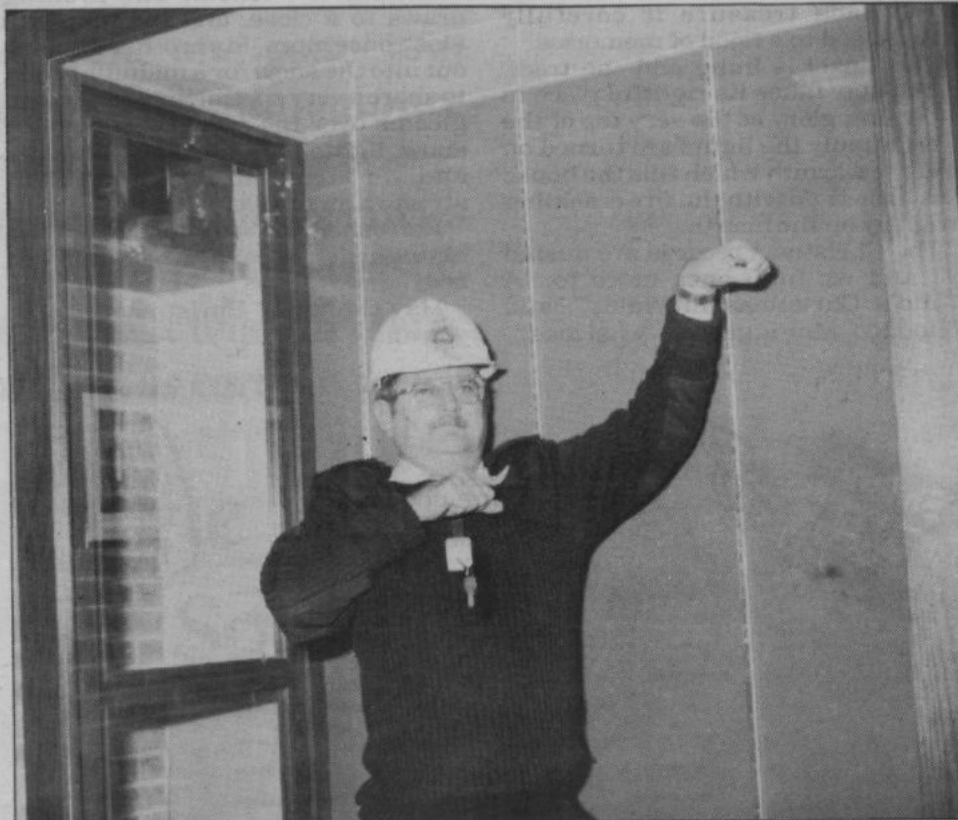
Flight 595. Both pilots get a good show for planning since there was only one RON in Africa.

That bit of left over dough somehow gets shaped into someone's initials. Thimble cookies and melt-in-your-mouth short-bread spring from metal tins. Mincemeat tarts and rich plum pudding are lovingly prepared by Grandmother. A box of tangerines each wrapped in crinkly green paper is a holiday must.

One magical day in mid-December, the house is transformed. Bright felt runners hang with bold coloured balls. Gaily coloured birds flock to slender white painted tree branches. The large rubber plant and jade trees suddenly sport tiny pheasants and grouse. The antique cutlery holder is filled with cards and greetings from around the world. The bowl of nuts is placed with the silver nut cracker.

Three venerable straw camels and a straw star occupy their rightful spot, as do a small wooden angel choir and a tiny town of houses from my grandfather's childhood days.

Even through the worst blizzard of the season, Mother & I sally forth to get the tree. A little man in the grocery store parking lot nods knowingly, and then in the driving snow we carefully examine nearly every tree in the lot. It's a serious business selecting just the right tree. The heavenly smell of spruce once again fills the house.

Checking strands of Christmas tree lights, as the magic of transforming the tree begins. Handmade wooden cookie cutters, hand knit woollen animals from Peru, crystal birds from Sweden, tiny orange paper birds & golden fold-out angels from Copenhagen, glass icicles, straw animals, dough figures, a camel from Morocco, tiny mukluks from Baffin Island, wooden toys from Germany, a knight in shining armour, elves, sleighs, and a miniature nutcracker all adorn the tree. Each treasure is carefully unwrapped to a flood of memories.

The tinsel is hung and the traditional star takes its rightful place in crowning glory at the very top of the tree. Finally the lights are turned on and the warmth which fills the house has little to do with the fire crackling brightly on the hearth.

Throughout the holiday season, our family is visited by a little fellow called ULF, a lively Christmas elf who can't spell very well. He manages to be up before everyone, brushing the snow off the car before Father goes to work, doing the dishes, shovelling the driveway & steps, shining the silver and filling the wood box. A new ornament always finds its way onto the tree courtesy of ULF, and Father's leather golf bag gets its annual cleaning & oiling. ULF is indeed an expression of the true meaning of Christmas.

Bottom drawers and dark closets finally give up their secret packages. Mother always creates beautifully wrapped parcels. And then there are the creations of my absent-minded professor father. We never cease to be amazed at his creative powers, he always seems to leave wrapping until Christmas Eve. Hours later he emerges from his study with an array of creations - the firecracker theme, the tinfoil covered lump, the green garbage bag or the brown envelope. It just wouldn't be the same without the mystery of Father's wrappings.

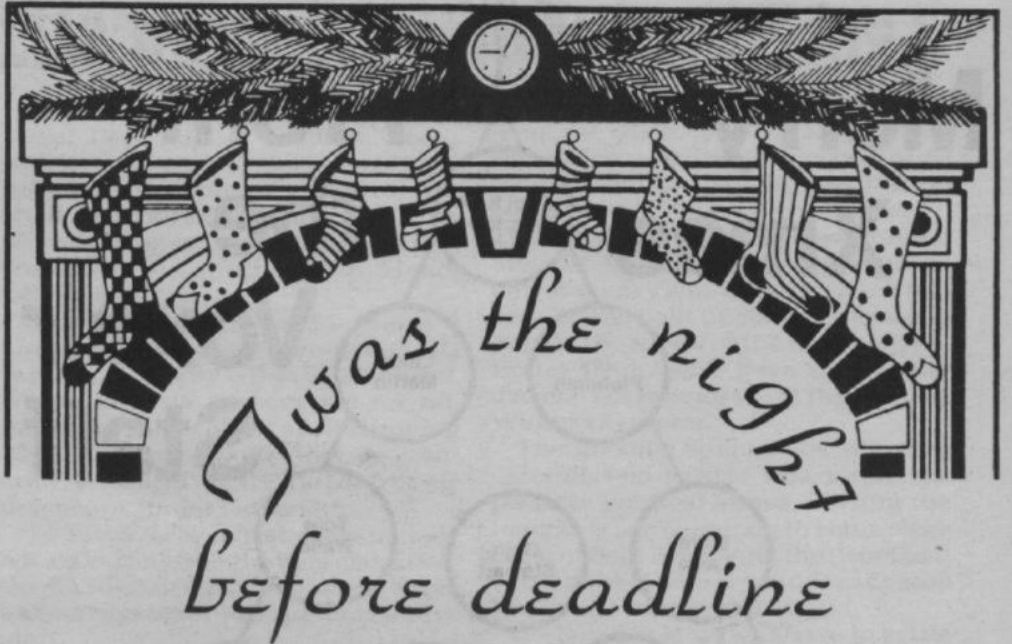

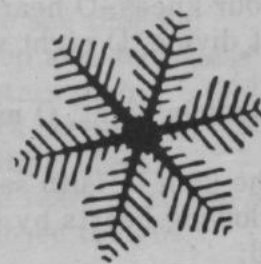

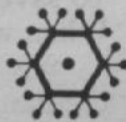

Join our 'Great Canadian Family'

The following are actual successful cases without names whereby the Legion was able to assist peacetime service personnel.

1. A young lieutenant came to us who was being medically discharged. He had been a passenger in an ammunition truck which rolled over, crushing his spine. He was initially paralyzed from the waist down but now walks with two canes. Pension had already been granted in this case however the applicant was uncertain as to the status of his claim. A pension medical examination was arranged which resulted in a 100% assessment. He has a wife and two young children. The 1986 rates gave him a pension payment of \$1,757.55 a month. Because of the 100% assessment we applied for and got exceptional incapacity allowance, clothing allowance and attendance allowance. He had been released under QR&O 15.01 item 3(b). Again, because of the 100% assessment of disability, we helped him make representation to DND for a 3(a) release which meant his annuity was immediately indexed.

2. A Warrant Officer in Gaagetown read in the Legion Magazine that, while still serving, he could apply for a decision on a pension claim. He had been told that he could not until he was released. He wrote directly to us wanting to claim for a bad knee. We reviewed his file and found evidence that he had injured the knee on duty and that he also had a hearing problem — he was a Gunner. He now holds a pension entitlement for both conditions at 10% and will retire in the Fall of 1986. His pension begins the day following release.

3. A LCol hurt his hip in Egypt. He now has pension entitlement and is now drawing his pension as it was granted under the provisions of 12(1) of the Pension Act — incurred while serving in a special duty area. He has two years before he reaches compulsory retirement age and will continue to draw his disability pension as well as superannuation.

4. A young officer injured his back when his parachute did not deploy

properly. He is a Career Officer and has no intention of release. He now has pension entitlement and has been advised that his disability may be fairly high. He has remustered and although still serving, is considering returning to University. In the event that he wishes to take his release, he will begin receiving pension payments.

5. A peacetime sailor who was involved in an accident aboard ship was discharged two years after the accident with no pension awarded. On reviewing the medical files, the Legion Service Officer suspected that the cause of release was directly related to the accident. The case went through first application and entitlement board appeal with the final outcome being the ex-serviceman and his family receiving \$750.00 per month. Since the transaction was almost two years from the date the claim was registered, the family also received a retroactive payment of approximately \$14,000 tax free.

6. A Fighterpilot ejected from a T-33 in the 1960's. He was hospitalized and discharged with what appeared to be no serious injuries. Three years later a medical examination revealed that he had suffered a spinal fracture which became bothersome to him with age. While still serving the gentleman approached the Legion for advice as to what action he might take. A first application was submitted and the applicant was awarded an entitlement amounting to \$350.00 per month which he began to draw on his release from the service augmenting a 35 year pension. During the process, the service officer discovered that due to flying noisy aircraft, this individual had faulty hearing and he received an additional \$75.00 per month and entitlement to be supplied with a hearing aid and batteries.

The above are only a few samples of the work carried out by the Royal Canadian Legion on behalf of service personnel and their dependants. With that in mind, we would ask you to help maintain a strong membership by joining our "Great Canadian Family".

His task was to ensure that the 5000 Canadian Forces personnel, including 434 Squadron, engaged in the exercise were supplied with a daily food allowance comparable to the Canadian ration.

Good diet may reduce risk of some cancer

The Canadian Cancer Society has issued daily dietary Guidelines to help you reduce your risk of cancer. Research has estimated that as much as 80 per cent of cancers are caused by environmental and life style factors. In Canada, diet is the lifestyle factor associated with the highest number of cancer deaths, about 32 per cent more than smoking which accounts for about 30 per cent. When we talk about diet, we don't mean the chemicals or the insecticide. It is the foods themselves. An example would be food high in fats may increase cancer risk of the breast, prostate and colon.

Here are the dietary guidelines recommended by Canada's Food Guide and issued by the Canadian Cancer Society:

1. Reduce your fat intake: choose lean cuts of meat, trim all visible fat and eat smaller portions. Remove skin from chicken and choose white flesh. Cut down on rich sauces and gravies. Use less butter, margarine and oil in cooking. Avoid foods high in fats such as mayonnaise and potato chips. Use skim or two per cent milk. Avoid rich desserts.
2. Eat fibre rich foods; fibre can be found in cereals, fruits and vegetables. Fibre supplements are not the answer. Use them only if your doctor has prescribed them. Here are some excellent sources of fibre: All Bran, Grape Nuts, canned baked beans, lima beans, dried prunes, dried apricot and dried figs.
3. Fruits and vegetables: the Canada Food Guide recommends four

to five servings of fruits and vegetables. Food rich in carotene and Vitamin C may lower the risk of gastric and esophageal cancers. The Cancer Society does not recommend vitamin A or C in the form of supplements or pills. Foods rich in carotene are cantaloupe, carrots, broccoli, mangoes, spinach, sweet potatoes, and squash. Food rich in Vitamin C are apple juice, broccoli, brussel sprouts, citrus fruits, green and red peppers and strawberries.

4. Keep weight close to ideal by following the recommendations to reduce fat, increase fibre, eat sufficient fruits and vegetables and exercise.
5. Limit your alcohol consumption and if you also smoke you increase the risk of cancers of the mouth, larynx, esophagus and upper respiratory tract.
6. Reduce consumption of smoked, nitrate-cured and salted food like smoked ham, smoked fish, cold cuts, sausages. These foods seem to be associated with the risk of esophageal and stomach cancers. These foods are high in fat and salt which is linked to cancer and hypertension.

On Monday afternoon November 3, 1986, Lt Col Vogt and a USAF KC-135 crew (Boeing 707) from Castle AFB California, arrived at Canadian Forces Base Winnipeg to visit the Instrument Check Pilot School (ICPS). Since 1981 the ICPS candidates on course together with the staff have visited the Strategic Air Command Flight Instrument Center at Castle and exchanged ideas on instrument flight procedures. Often, refuelling flights were programmed for our Canadian troops over the beautiful state of California, always in the most appealing of weather and temperatures.

Here in Winnipeg, after receiving familiarization flights in the Jet Ranger, Dakota and Tutor aircraft, our American friends visited the ICPS premises and discussed some areas of common concern on instrument flying. They even brought their own training aids for a demonstration-lecture on runway approach lights, pilot's spatial orientation and false illusions during low weather landings.

From a noise-emitting gas expansion capsule to a full scale-down model of all of USA's airport-light system, Maj R.D. Williams with the help of his original training aids, made a fantastic delivery of a typical lesson plan. Further to this, a refuelling flight was organized to fly the ICPS candidates over the state of Kansas. A few Canadian pilots had the opportunity to experience a refuelling operation.

To top it all, on Friday the day of departure, Lt Col Vogt and his crew discovered an oil leak during start-up of the "Strato Tanker". This delay was just long enough for our California friends to witness the worst Winnipeg snowstorm in years - some say since 1935. 35.1 cm (13.8") of snow fell down that day, a real injection of taste of "The True North Strong and Free"!

All around it was an excellent visit and a chance to acquire a broader knowledge of flying aircraft on instruments, and a chance to make friends with our neighbours to the south.

Community involvement on the rise - Good News!

The concept of community based crime prevention is not new in Manitoba. Manitoba was the first Province of Canada to announce the dedication of November as "Crime Prevention Month" in order to focus attention on the need for a province-wide network of organizations, groups and agencies working together for crime prevention.

The high level of continued participation over the past four years has highlighted the need which exists in both rural and urban communities for crime prevention. Crime Prevention programmes such as Neighbourhood Watch, Vandalism Prevention, Block Parents, Seniors Programmes and Programmes for Missing Children, to name only a few, have proven their effectiveness in many areas of Manitoba.

The Crime Prevention Core Committee agrees that crime prevention must be a community based concept in order to be successful. All citizens must work together with law enforcement departments. They must become involved in crime prevention in order to make their communities a safe place to live and work.

Congratulations from the Military Police Section for your involvement in the community. Your efforts in crime prevention are greatly appreciated and help make your community a safe place to live.

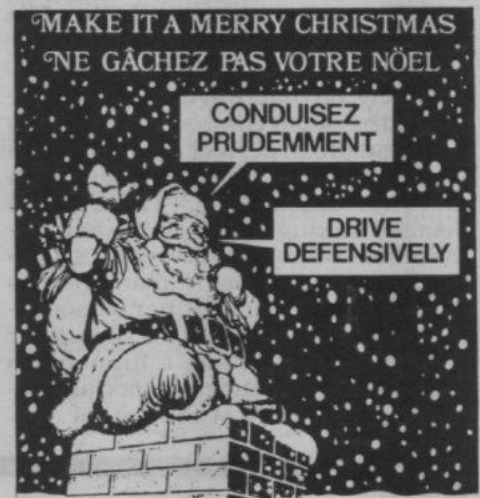

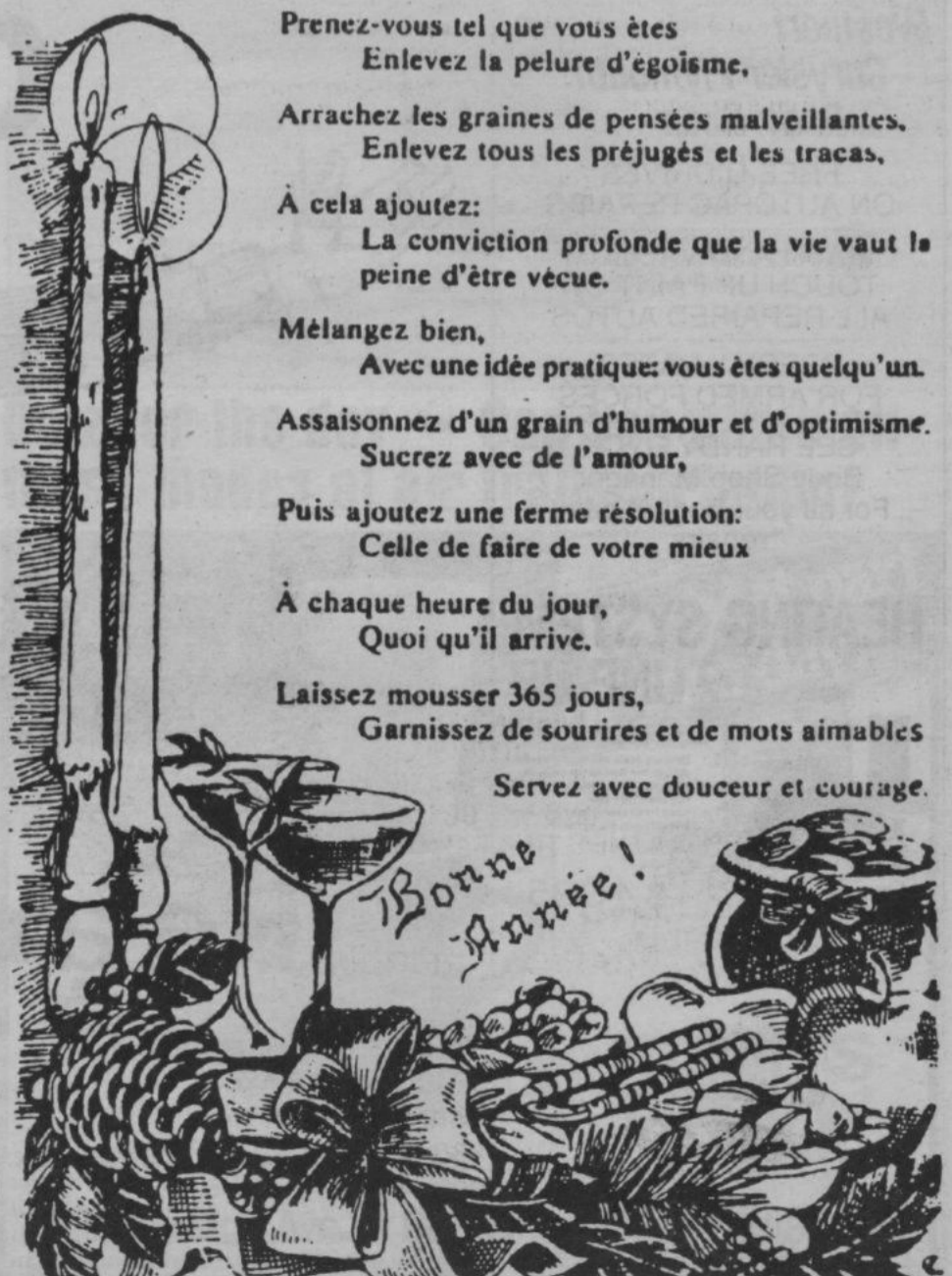

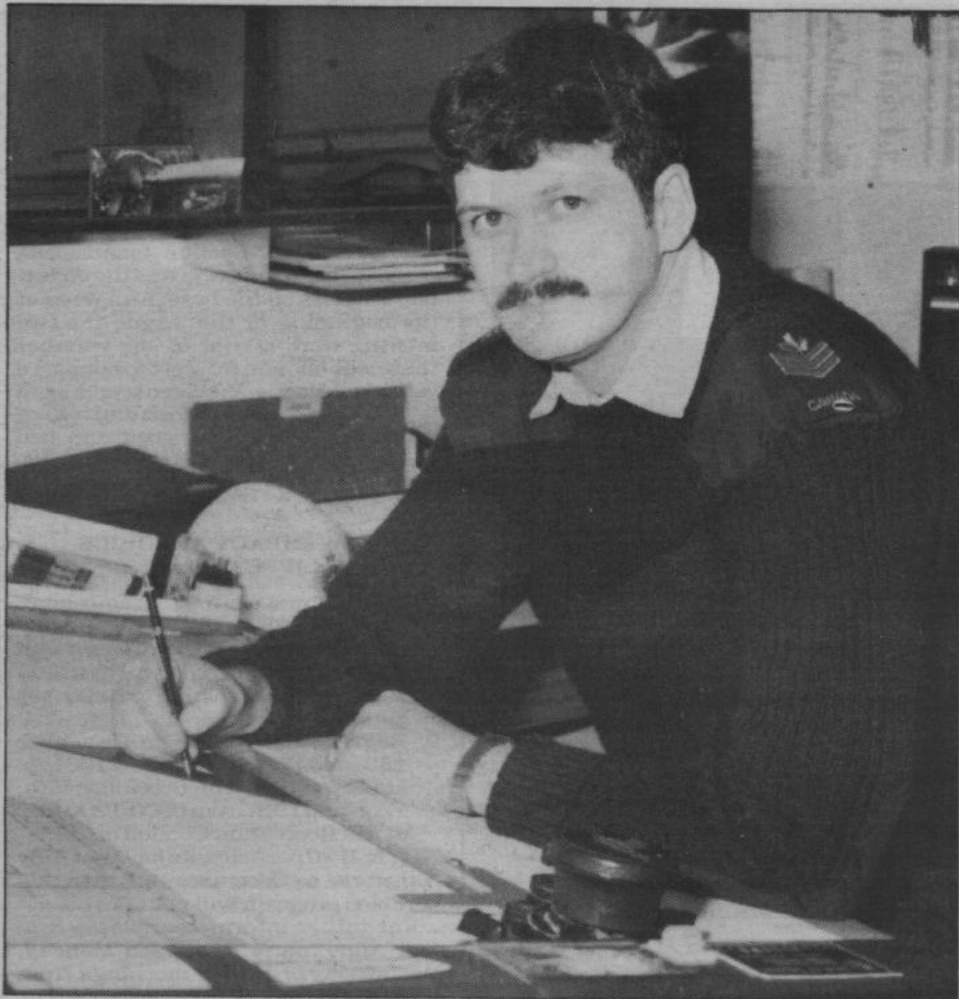

WHAT WOULD YOU DO IF . . . Someone was smashing your car's windshield. . . ? OR . . . Someone was trying to demolish your fence. . . ? OR . . . Someone was misusing or abusing the equipment in one of your community playgrounds . . . ? OR . . . maybe it has already happened . . . ? IF SO . . . what did you do about it . . . ?

The five playgrounds that are located in your community are there for YOUR children's enjoyment, and children must be able to play in them without getting hurt in the process as a result of the equipment being unsafe because of vandalism. Even though children can overdo it when they are playing (in these cases all they need is a firm reminder, from an older person, of what they can and cannot do in the playgrounds) the real vandals are not young children, but a few irresponsible teenagers and adults. Vandalism is a crime which, if you witness it, you should report to the authorities. Being part of any Community should inspire its share of moral obligations and among others, to protect and care for

the Community's property. The Concise Oxford dictionary gives us these definitions of the word COMMUNITY: "joint ownership or liability; state of being shared or held in common; fellowship; organized political, municipal, or social body of people living in same locality; body of people having religion, profession, etc in common."

The South Site Community Council is responsible for the Maintenance of the five playgrounds in the south site area. Two of those Playgrounds are particularly vulnerable to vandalism; Carpathia, Corydon, Doncaster, Ubique probably because they are located at the limits of the MQ area.

The money for the maintenance of the given playgrounds comes for the most part from that \$1.00 given monthly by some of the Residents. So it's your money, it's your playgrounds, it's your decision . . .

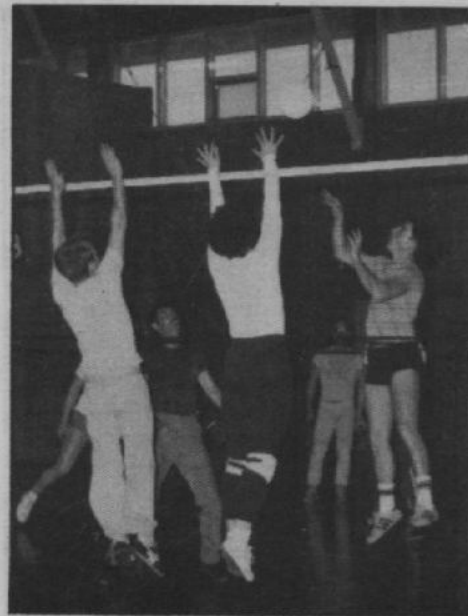

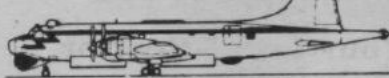
