3 RCR participate in Waincon 88

CAMP WAINWRIGHT, ALTA — Following a final conference, range safety staff move out to join their assigned units during a live-fire combat team attack. All participants are members of 1 Canadian Brigade Group and were taking part in Waincon 88, a three-week army exercise, at Wainwright. The armour in this particular attack was supplied by Calgary's Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians) and the infantry were from Winnipeg's 3rd Battalion Royal Canadian Regiment. With the end of Waincon more than half the brigade moves to CFB Suffield for three more weeks of live-fire training at that base's field firing centre. More than 3,800 men and 1,200 vehicles from 1 Canadian Brigade Group in Calgary and the United States Army in Ft. Orde, California are participating in the exercise.

L'autonomie, c'est la vie! / Independence, that's living!

Cette semaine s'ouvre sur une vaste perspective. Bien des formes d'incapacités et différents genres d'obstacles seront à l'ordre du jour. Tous, à la grandeur du pays, sont invités à faire un effort particulier dans le cadre de cette semaine : associations de personnes handicapées, entreprises, groupes d'entraide, syndicats, gouvernements fédéral et provinciaux et les municipalités partout à travers le pays.

La proportion de personnes ayant une incapacité croît avec l'âge et, à l'heure actuelle, deux Canadiens âgés de 65 ans et plus sur cinq sont touchés. Il est donc tout à fait normal de penser que la plupart d'entre nous auront à composer avec une incapacité un jour ou l'autre. Alors, participons!

Cette semaine n'est pas consacrée à la collecte de fonds, mais aux initiatives individuelles, communautaires, municipales, provinciales et nationales visant à améliorer la qualité de vie de tous les Canadiens.

Pour atteindre cet objectif, il faudra *trouver* les obstacles qui isolent les personnes handicapées puis, *aplanir* ces obstacles. Nous n'y arriverons pas d'un seul coup, mais ça ne fait rien. Nous prendrons tout le temps qu'il faudra. Chaque année, nous aurons la possibilité de prendre du recul par rapport à ce qui s'est fait et de nous interroger sur ce que nous voulons. Tout le monde y gagnera. En aplanissant les obstacles qui empêchent les personnes handicapées de se livrer aux activités de la vie quotidienne, non seulement nous élargissons leurs horizons, mais nous enrichissons notre communauté de talents et d'énergies jusque-là inexploités.

This is a week with a broad vision. It is concerned with many types of disabilities and many types of barriers. The effort involves us all — associations of disabled persons, businesses, service clubs, organized labour, federal and provincial governments and municipalities across the land.

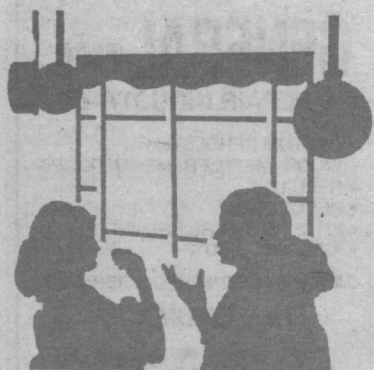
We all have good reason to be involved. The rate of disability increases with age, affecting two out of five Canadians aged 65 and over. At some time in our lives, most of us will be disabled in some way.

This is not a week for fund-raising. It is a week in which individuals, communities, provinces and the nation can improve the quality of life for all Canadians.

We can do this by *identifying* the barriers that isolate disabled persons, and *removing* those barriers. It won't happen all at once, but that's all right. This is a long-term project. Each year we'll have a chance to check back, to see how far we've come and where we want to go. It's a process in which everyone wins. By removing barriers that separate disabled persons from everyday activities, we widen not only their horizons, but the community's pool of talents and energy as well.

The Base Chief Said...

I have had a lot of good feedback from those attending, and a suggestion that I use that presentation as the basis of an article for Voxair. Considering that I can't think of anything else to write about as the deadline approaches, I think it's a great idea too.

I will include most of what I said, but I think it's prudent for me to edit some of my comments.

"Madame PMC, Col Reynolds, Col Ross, Major Westbrook, CWO Bradbury, and all my friends in Base Supply.

First of all let me say what an absolute honour it is for me to be your guest of honour at this mess dinner. Normally a person of my rank does not get to be a guest of honour unless he or she is retiring, or is posted. I want to ask the Base Commander, right here and now, do you know something that I don't?

Having the Base Commander here tonight reminds me of antiques. Not because of his age, but because his wife Penny, ran an antique business in the city for a bit.

Anyway, according to statistics, last year over 13 million Canadian families paid a lot of money for things that looked funny and didn't work. Three million of those were antiques...the rest were college students.

For you MCpls, Cpls, and Ptes, don't fall into the trap of believing that your Sgts, WOs, and Officers are the ones who have to come up with the ideas either. Who better than you, the person who serves the customer, to recognize the problem, and make those recommendations?

Don't bitch just for the sake of bitching either. Any fool can bitch. If you have a criticism, you should also have a suggested solution to fix it.

You have a lot to be proud of in Base Supply, and that's from the top down, or the bottom up, whichever way you see things.

Although you might not see him as often as you should, you and I are losing one of the most knowledgeable officers it's been my pleasure to serve in a long time — that person is the BISO, LCol Ross. Not only does he know your section, the people, the system, the problems, and your accomplishments. He has the same knowledge of all his sections — he is a remarkable officer who I shall miss, and I think you will also.

I'd like to congratulate CWO Bradbury on his new appointment as the ADM (Mat) CCWO. Well done Brad, it's a big feather in your hat, and I want to wish you all the luck in the world. You'll do well, and I know our paths will cross again sometime. CWO Bradbury has been one of my best supporters, and I have appreciated everything he's done for me personally, and for the office of BCWO.

I could list a great number of other people who deserve recognition. MWO Flemming, WO Lavallee, and Sgt O'Brien on their recent promotions. Well done to all of you.

Good luck and much happiness to Pte Dave Etmanski on your upcoming wedding. My best wishes to Pte Kathy Greer-Hulme on her posting to Germany with her new spouse. All the best to both of you. To Sgt Gladys Chaulk, I wish you God Speed, and a safe tour of duty in Cyprus. Come back safe and sound Gladys.

You know I've been accused of picking on Base Supply. It's simply not true. I know how that idea might have come about, and I'd like an opportunity to explain.

It comes from the fact that everytime I'm looking for someone to do a difficult job for the Base, and I'm looking for a certain type of individual to do that job, I go through a process of elimination. When I get down to a short list, it has always included people from Base Supply. That's because you have so many competent people, who have the confidence in themselves that they can do the job.

then get yourself ready for that next higher rank.

I really have to wonder sometimes if most of us have lost the art of feeling good about the job we do. Is there no longer any job satisfaction left? Do you young people even know what job satisfaction means?

Can't you get off on knowing that you've helped someone? I can, and I do. I hope you can too.

I want to tell you about a chap I know very well. It's sort of a happy, sad story. But I think it's worth telling.

At about 23 years of age, and six years in the forces, this fellow really didn't think that he would get beyond corporal. He was happy and accepted that as his fate. However, through some hard work, he made it to Sgt at the age of 27. Then the light went on in his head. He counted on his fingers, and figured, that if he worked hard enough he could make Chief. And so it began.

He did work hard, devoting himself 100% to the job, working 10-12 hour days. He had a very supportive wife, and three children, who knew that they came second in his life, and as long as they were not demanding any of his time, he could continue to devote himself to his ambition. After five years of hard work, the fruits of his labour paid off. He was promoted to warrant officer.

This new warrant officer and his wife were both from Nova Scotia, and like a good many Maritimers there was this inner feeling to return to the Maritimes. He realized that if he were to go to places like Greenwood, or Cornwallis, he might get swallowed up, and not have the chance to shine. He also knew that in his trade, those people who had volunteered to go to sea, were getting promoted. So, he volunteered to go to sea. Kill two birds with one stone, get the wife off his back, and further his career. Those of you who have been to sea know that you spend a good deal of time away from home. His tour was no different. But, it was good because now he could devote more time to his job, and not have to be concerned about the family.

After completing a cycle on the ship, he realized the wisdom of his decision. He was promoted to MWO. Nothing could stop him now.

However, with the rank comes more responsibility. Now he was working 16 hour days. Not only that, but he was bringing work home with him. No person can keep up a steady diet of those kind of hours, and this fellow experienced what is commonly referred to as "Burnout". He came to the decision that his mental well being was not worth the effort that was required of him. So he requested to be posted, and it was done.

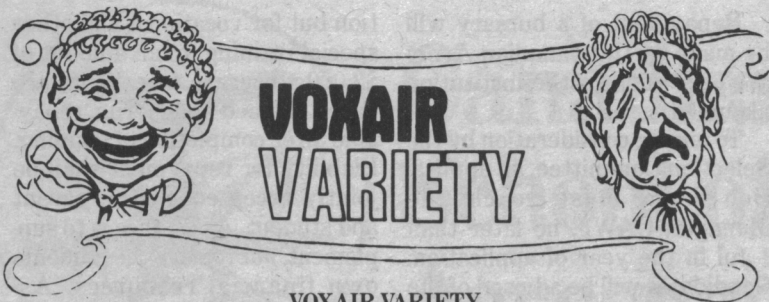

Advance tickets from 453-4785.

This being my obit to Vox Variety, I would like to use the old Academy Award stunt and thank a few people who have helped much over the years. There are about a zillion Vox Editors who have corrected my spelling, puzzled over my terrible typing, and generally helped muchly. Of the PR people around town it may be unfair to single anyone out, but there are five I particularly want to thank. Lendre Rodgers Kerns of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, who has now gone on to the bigger things in Minnesota; Pat Elsworth and Syd Scott of the Manitoba Theatre Centre; and Darlene Ronald and Max Tapper of the Winnipeg Symphony. All have provided much info and co-operated with the weird and wonderful Voxair deadlines. (These, we hope, now a thing of the past, with the two-week schedule back in vogue.)

And for the future? Well we obviously need a replacement. All I can promise is big parties, many freebees, and a chance to meet the stars. Contact Jane, or one of the other Editors listed at the bottom of page two. It really has been fun, and it will be fun for you!

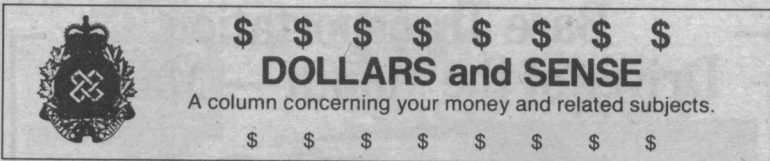

Educational Assistance

As the 1988/89 academic year fast approaches, students and families alike scramble to develop a financial plan that will enable them to cope with skyrocketing education costs.

The need to develop a sound financial plan cannot be overstated. It is not uncommon for the costs associated with further education to be beyond the resources of many of our retired and serving military personnel.

The purpose of this article therefore is to briefly summarize the education support programs offered by the various Benevolent Funds.

THE EDUCATION ASSISTANCE LOAN PROGRAM is operated under the auspices of the Board of Directors of the *Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF)*. Its goal is to encourage post secondary education to the Baccalaureate level.

Application Criteria. A minimum of ten years Regular Force Military service or be the widow/widower of a former member who served a minimum

of ten years. The applicant must be currently serving in the CF or service terminated after 31 Jan 68 and capable of repaying the loan without self-imposing financial stress.

The dependants for whom the funds will be used must be less than 26 years old, be enrolled (or will be) in a full time study program at an accredited post secondary institute (part time studies and/or evening courses are not eligible) and, are not subsidized under CFAO 54-5 (Education of Children-Canada).

Although intended for the dependant, loans to former serving members or the widow/widower of a former member will be \$1,200 per dependant to a maximum of \$2,400 or two dependants per family. Separate applications must be made for each dependant and the loan awarded for the year of application only in amounts of \$300, \$600, \$900 and \$1,200. The selection of recipients will be made by CFPAF and the applicant advised by mail not later than 15 August.

Applicants will be required to repay the loan over a 12-month period, in monthly instalments commencing 30 Sep. Repayment will include a portion of the service charge of \$3 per year per \$100 loaned, using the pay allotment system, pension assignment or post-dated cheques. **APPLICATION MUST BE POSTMARKED NO LATER THAN 30 JUN.**

Eligibility for the following three programs apply to dependants of former members, who have served between 1 Oct 46 and 31 Jan 68 in one of the three Canadian Armed Services.

CANADIAN ARMY WELFARE FUND BURSARIES. To obtain a post-secondary education primarily for tuition and purchase of textbooks. Eligible educational institutions shall be limited to Canadian universities and colleges, community colleges or technical schools requiring not less than two years leading to a certificate, diploma or degree. The selection will be made on financial need, scholarship ability and length of service in the Canadian Army (Regular). Recipients must be prepared to enter educational establishments on a full time basis in the year of application, (part time or evening not admissible) and; on selection recipients must submit proof of admission and intention to attend. Students must complete successfully, on first writing each of the subjects taken in any academic year in order to be considered for further assistance.

Repayment of a bursary will be made by the Canadian Army Welfare Fund to the institution attended.

To ensure consideration by the Selection Committee, an application form must reach the Manager, CAWF, no later than 1 Jul in the year of application. Candidates will be advised of the results of their application no later than 15 August.

ROYAL CANADIAN AIR FORCE BENEVOLENT FUND. A financial assistance for education purposes to veterans or surviving spouses, including vocational and other special training. Interest free loans are repayable after completion of education/training at rates then prevailing and the ability to repay, normally through pay assignment. It must be stressed that the Fund provides "last dollar" assistance, and other loans should be explored prior to application. The amount will be affected by the assistance provided by other sources. The maximum amount provided over the total tenure of post-secondary training is \$3,000. If the total is reduced by repayment, eligibility to \$3,000 is reinstated. *Assistance for post-graduate training will not be considered.*

THE ROYAL CANADIAN NAVAL BENEVOLENT FUND. Financial Assistance for educational purposes to dependants of former members of the Naval Forces of Canada. This program is not only for university educa-

tion but for vocational and other special training, to an amount of \$3,000. Interest free loans are based on need and merits, repayable after completion of training. Liability for repayment shall be jointly accepted by the parent and student. Assistance is to supplement, *not replace* the students own financial resources. Assistance to former members of the Naval Forces of Canada will be considered in exceptional cases, with special consideration to widows and deserted wives requiring training to increase earnings.

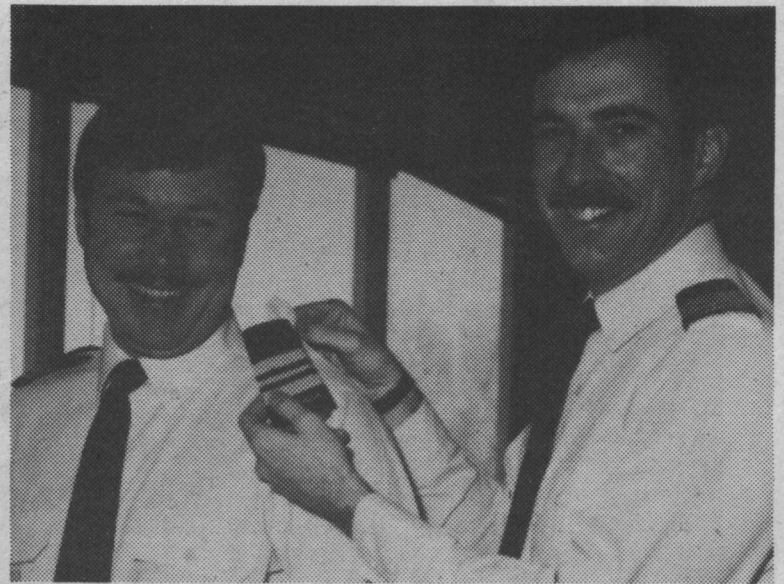
they were there, France recalled her Ambassador from Canada. We warned them that if they keep taking our fish we'll keep sending them ASC students. Cooler heads will now prevail.
