Le prix nobel de la paix 1988 Nobel Peace Prize

OTTAWA — Le ministre de la Défense nationale, l'honorable Perrin Beatty, a exprimé sa fierté et sa satisfaction quant au choix des troupes de maintien de la paix des Nations Unies (ONU) à titre de récipiendaires du prix Nobel de la Paix 1988. L'annonce de la remise du prix, qui a été fait aujourd'hui à Oslo, en Norvège, souligne les succès de l'ONU au cours des dernières années dans la recherche d'une résolution pacifique de plusieurs conflits régionaux.

"Ce Prix est une juste reconnaissance des nobles efforts de l'ONU dans le domaine du maintien de la paix. Je suis doublement fier de la participation du Canada et plus particulièrement des membres des Forces canadiennes qui ont contribué à ces efforts," de dire M. Beatty.

M. Beatty a souligné que le Canada est le seul pays membre de l'ONU qui a pris part à chacune des missions de maintien de la paix de l'ONU depuis 1950. "Plus de 80 000 Canadiens ont participé aux 18 missions de la maintien de la paix, faisant ainsi rejaillir sur le Canada un respect international pour son efficacité et son service dévoué. Que ce soit

au Congo-Belge, en Nouvelle-Guinée et au Cachemire au cours des années passées, de même qu'en Iran-Irak, à Chypre et en Afghanistan aujourd'hui encore, les Canadiens ont porté fièrement le béret bleu des Nations Unies", a-t-il dit.

M. Beatty a de plus affirmé que "en recherchant une sécurité globale, les Nations Unies contribuent fortement à l'équilibre mondial. L'apport du Canada aux efforts de paix de l'ONU y est pour beaucoup dans la sauvegarde d'une paix mondiale."

OTTAWA — The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Perrin Beatty, expressed pride and satisfaction at the selection of the United Nations peacekeeping forces as the recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize for 1988. The announcement of the award, made today in Oslo, Norway, praised the U.N. for its successes over the past year in seeking the peaceful resolution of a variety of regional conflicts.

"This award is indeed worthy recognition for the noble efforts of the United Nations in the area of peacekeeping. And I am doubly proud of the part that Canada, and particularly the members of our Armed Forces, have had to play in these endeavours," Mr. Beatty said.

Mr. Beatty noted that Canada is the only member of the United Nations that has participated in every U.N. peacekeeping operation since 1950. "Over 80,000 Canadian servicemen have participated in 18 peacekeeping efforts, earning international respect for Canada by their effectiveness and dedication. From the Belgian Congo, New Guinea, and Kashmir in past years, to

Iran-Iraq, Cyprus and Afghanistan today, Canadians have been proud to wear the blue U.N. beret," he said.

Mr. Beatty asserted that "the United Nations' pursuit of global security makes an important contribution to world stability. Canada's support of U.N. peace initiatives makes a tangible difference to world peace."

From the Mailbag

In previous issues, I talked about services available to customers when mailing a letter or parcels. In this issue, I'll talk a little about some of the other services that we provide as well as a few rules and regulations.

One service is lock boxes. At MPO 400, we have two styles of boxes — A and C. Style A is approx. 10 cm wide x 14 cm high x 35 cm long and Style C is approx. 30 cm wide x 14 cm high x 35 cm long.

The fee, at the present time, is \$6.74 for Style A and \$20.22 for Style C. This price is good for one year. For customers whose residence or place of business is located such that they have letter carrier service, mobile delivery service, suburban service or rural mail service on a frequency of 5 or 6 times a week, the fee for a Style A box is now \$26.20 and for a Style C box is \$78.60. This means if somebody wants to rent a box and they live or work where there is the above mentioned services, then they have to pay the higher rent. The only ones at MPO 400 for the cheaper rate are those that live in the MDP (row housing), messes or single living — in personnel. The fee is paid before the first

of the due month. The due month is calculated by when you first opened the box. If the box was opened between the 1st and the 15th of the month, the due date would be backdated to the first of that month and if the box was opened between the 16th and the 30th or 31st, then the due date would be dated the first of the following month. For example, if you opened your box on the 10th of July 88, your due date would be the first of July 89 and if you opened your box on the 17th of July 88, then your due date would be the first of August 89. Initial notices for rent due are placed in the boxes 30 days before the rent is due. The second notice (final notice) is placed in the boxes 7 days before the rent is due. N.B. There is no period of grace given. If the rent is not paid by the due date, the box will be closed and the mail will be placed in General Delivery. If the mail is not picked up, it will be returned to sender as "UNCLAIMED".

If you rent a box and later decide that you do not want the box anymore, a refund will be given depending on the amount of time the box was rented.

Keys for the boxes are \$2.00 each up to a maximum of 2 keys.

The keys are fully refundable if returned when the box is closed. If keys are lost or more than two keys are needed then the extra keys are \$3.00 each.

Now down to one of our major headaches. People who live in the MDP (row housing) must obtain their mail by General Delivery or lock box through MPO 400 or if permitted at their section. At present, mail is coming in addressed to their PMQ address. THIS IS WRONG!! For mailing purposes, these addresses are NOT recognized as official postal addresses by Canada Post. Customers will come in and say businesses, banks and other services do not recognize General Delivery or lock boxes as an address. If mail is sent to you, the address is: General Delivery or lock box NO. Westwin, MB R3J 0T0

Also the place is Westwin not WINNIPEG!!! Even though we are within Winnipeg city limits, we are classed the same as a rural post office. And if you look in any postal code book, you will not see the MDP addresses listed. I talked with Base Accommodations and it's also mentioned on your PMQ messages that these addresses are not official mailing addresses and mail is handled by General Delivery or lock box through the Base Post Office. N.B. It has happened that mail was returned to sender because of using these addresses. Also without the proper address, your mail could be delayed by one day or more depending on circumstances. IT'S YOUR MAIL.

People using the lock boxes will have mail coming in their maiden name or have mail for their friends or relatives going to

the same box. If you fall into this category, LET US KNOW, there are signs in the post office posted to this effect, but it still happens. If we do not know these people, this mail could be Returned to Sender as "Unknown".

Canada Post has just released another development in regards to lock boxes but I will keep you informed when I get all the details.

Another area of concern is Clearances. According to CFAO 57-3 Sect 1 Para 7, personnel shall:

- (a) upon arrival, complete form CF 426, Postal Index Card
- (b) notify correspondents of correct postal address
- (c) call for mail on a regular basis
- (d) advise in writing of any absence from the unit of over 14 days and give instructions concerning the disposal of mail
- (e) upon departure, complete the mail redirection portion of form CF 426, and notify correspondents by completing Canada Post Change of Address Announcement Card.

If we have no record of you coming to this base or cannot find you by available resources, your mail will be held for 15 days and then sent to the Postal Tracing Section CFB Trenton. The mail, if still unknown, will be returned to sender as "UNKNOWN" or if found in the microfiche, it will be sent to your present base or base that you were at.

When you leave, your Postal Index Card is kept for 180 days and then destroyed. So, in other words, you have approx. 6

months to change your address. Your mail is then sent to CFB Trenton again. N.B. It is YOUR responsibility to change YOUR address with YOUR friends, relatives or bills. We will try our best to deliver your mail, but our resources are few.

On a gentler note, another service provided is Priority Post. Due to a recent agreement between DND and Canada Post, anyone who mails at a military post office is entitled to a special rate. For example, if you were sending a 5.0 kg package to Sask. or Man., it would cost \$3.55. The same parcel without special rate is \$7.50 for Man. and \$9.00 for Sask. A First Class parcel, same weight, would cost \$4.95. But wait, there's more, if your package goes to a Post Office to be picked up at the Post Office, there is a special reduction of \$1.25 for a total cost of \$2.30 Priority Post. A 1.0 kg parcel to Ont., Que. (except codes beginning with a "G") and B.C., the rate is \$8.20. If it was going to a Post Office for pick up, it would cost \$5.20. A special reduction of \$3.00. A First Class parcel would cost \$4.92 and if you wanted more speed an extra \$1.40 for Special delivery or an extra \$2.63 for letters. Priority Post to most major centres is one day. If you have any questions, please ask us.

N.B. According to CFP 121 Staff Procedures and Military Writing for the Canadian Forces Section 6 Para 151 (2) Department regulations prohibit the use of official stationery and envelopes and department mail facilities for despatch of personal correspondence.

Clocks back Sunday

Manitoba clocks move back one hour in the early morning of Sunday, Oct. 30, when standard time returns to the province.

Under the Official Time Act, enacted in Manitoba in 1967, uniform daylight saving time is in effect in all parts of the province for a six-month period — beginning the last Sunday in April and changing back again the last Sunday in October.


This year, the official reversion to standard time occurs precisely at 3 a.m., Oct. 30, at which time clocks are turned back to 2 a.m.

More questions on Conditions of Service...

In the course of a recent Condition of Service staff visit to CFB Winnipeg, a number of questions were asked by CF members which no one on the visiting team was able to answer at the time. The questions have been researched and the answers are provided below.

QUESTION:

Effective 1 Jun 87, Manitoba experienced a 2% increase in income tax. This was backdated to 1 Jan 87. DPIS was unable to institute this increase in deductions until 1 Jan 88. As a result members were faced with a lump sum payment at the end of the year. Why could the changes not be instituted until more than six months after the fact?

ANSWER:

Without discussing the technical aspects of the problem, suffice it to state that the complexity of the computer programming necessary to institute the changes caused the extended delay. However, the BCompt released a letter (7204-1 (BCompt) 28 Aug 87) to all section heads advising members they were being undercharged income tax for 1987 and had the option of submitting a TD3 form requesting a voluntary increase in tax deducted at source. The letter further stated that failure to do so would result in a substantial tax remittance for the 1987 tax year.

QUESTION:

Our regular children's caregiver comes into our home and provides highly dedicated and competent care. When my wife and I proceed on our HHT, this individual will care for our children on a full-time basis for up to a week. For this I can claim only \$5.00/night when I could claim \$35.00/day for so-called professional day care services. As far as I'm concerned, the care my children receive in their home is of a professional standard & far superior to what they could receive in a day-care centre.

ANSWER:

Regulations do allow for situations such as this. DGCB 189 241400Z JUL 86 provides for childcare to be paid to an individual who provides care on a regular basis to a maximum of \$35.00 per day, provided that a receipt bearing the individuals SIN number is obtained. Each unit orderly room has a copy of reference.

QUESTION:

Why is Field Operations Allowance (FOA) payable on a daily basis while other comparable environmental allowances are paid on a monthly basis? CFAO 205-25 states that a monthly environmental allowance is payable to members whose exposure to adverse environmental conditions is continuous and substantial. Under this definition, members

who are filling designated parachutist positions may be paid a monthly Paratroop Allowance if they complete as few as four jumps a year. Members drawing Aircrew Allowance, Diving Allowance, Sea Duty Allowance etc. similarly qualify for a monthly allowance even though their exposure may be relatively infrequent. Many army members spend weeks at a time under field conditions but receive no allowance at all while in garrison, on leave etc. The rationale for the difference in treatment is not understood.

ANSWER:

The allowances have been categorized as either casual or continual.

FOA was created as a casual allowance in recognition of the sporadic nature of the exposure to adverse environmental conditions. FOA parallels casual aircrew and casual sea duty allowance both in purpose and in the daily amount of the allowance.

The basis for continual allowances hinges upon qualifications and activity rates, and is paid to those occupying designated positions recommended by the applicable Commands. FOA is neither restricted by qualification requirements nor are activity rates consistent.

It should also be noted that in all cases, the basic monthly rates for continual allowances when expressed on a daily basis, are considerably lower than the casual rates.

QUESTION:

Even if the CREW trials were to be deemed successful, no assumptions could be made about women in the combat arms in wartime and this is a very real concern of the men.

ANSWER:

No peace-time experience with any new weapons, new equipment, new training methods, new tactics, and so on can accurately predict what will occur in war, but experience in peace and rejection of that which patently will not work minimizes the risk. Similarly, experience with women being employed as combat-ready soldiers in peace-time will serve as a warning or a reassurance for what can be anticipated in war.

The Alcohol Rehabilitation Clinic was first established at Stadcona, Halifax, unofficially in 1956 and officially in 1967. Five other clinics have been created since 1967, Esquimalt, Winnipeg, Kingston, Valcartier, and Lahr, West Germany. The mandate of each clinic is to treat the individual member with an alcohol problem (family members are not treated at CF ARC's). To date, thousands of service members have been treated at the various ARC's.

Why do we need alcohol treatment centres? It is estimated that there are between 8,000 to 10,000 alcohol drinkers within the CF. In terms of lost productivity, financial, child, and marital problems the costs are incalculable.

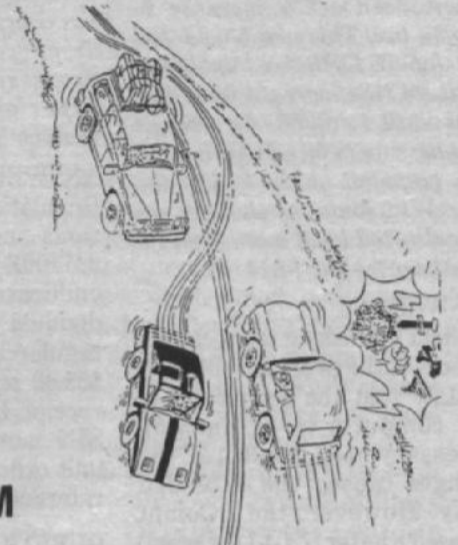

Testing for Language Proficiency

How many Canadian Forces members can communicate with their fellow workers on a day-to-day basis using both official languages?

From CF second language proficiency tests (LPTs), which have been in existence for the past 10 years, it has been established that 6 235 members are completely bilingual (1 125 who selected English as their first official language (FOL) and 5 110 members who selected French). All achieved an 'integral' (I) profile on their language proficiency tests.

However, during the past four years there has been a reduction in language testing while new tests based on the communicative approach have been developed. Now, CF members who fall into other categories on the old LPTs, including 'functional' (F) down to the basic bilingual qualification of

at least 2 in any skill, need to be retested on their second official language abilities in speaking, listening, reading and writing in the military environment.

Therefore, the Canadian Forces is planning to launch a language testing campaign using brand new certification examinations. The program will begin on 6 September 1988 and continue until 30 June 1989. Because of its intensity, extensiveness, expected accuracy and short duration, the testing is being called a "blitz".

Chosen target

The target population for the "blitz" has been chosen from the results of existing second language tests and includes the following three categories: Functional profiles (A = 3, B = 3 and a minimum total score of 10) which are more than five years old; near-functional (at least a 3 in any of the four abilities and a total score of 7 to 9), and basic second

language knowledge (BSLK) profiles (at least a 2 in any of the four abilities).

Altogether, 16 878 CF members (7 679 who have selected English as their first official language, and 9 199 who have selected French as their FOL) will be tested during the "blitz".

The new language proficiency examinations (LPEs) are currently undergoing final validation and reliability testing and upon implementation in September will replace the old out-of-date LPTs.

Mrs. Suzette Hafner, section head, program development and validation, directorate of language training, said the old test was primarily based on the grammar and linguistic aspects of the second language. "It's just out of date," she said. The new test examines the actual communicating abilities and is more militarized in its content. "We'll be asking about the job, the workplace," she said. "It's a much more realistic

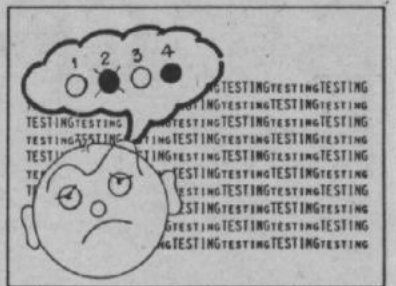
test. We'll be testing the member's capability to use the language."

The new test is currently composed of three abilities, listening and reading comprehension and oral interaction. The latter stage is on a one-to-one basis and is only carried out if a level 3 competency is obtained on listening and reading skills. Later there will be a test for writing ability but this will not be included during the first "blitz".

Curriculum change

The curriculum of second language training (SLT) courses is also changing to reflect the requirements of a more communicative approach.

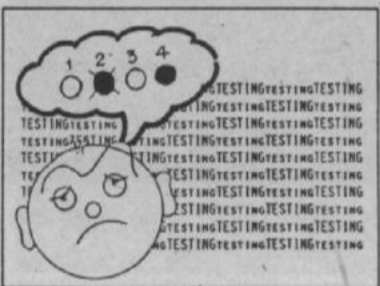
Although it's planned to undertake a language "blitz" every four years, there will be a continuous requirement to test approximately 4 000 CF members annually. Among these will be included, functional linguistic profiles which have lapsed; members



deemed functional on completion of second language courses and integral and functional profiles from the LPEs for whom the linguistic profiles will lapse after four years.

The LPEs will be co-ordinated at base level by a base designated testing co-ordinator (BDTC), who will provide further information about the new proficiency examinations as testing time approaches.

Col Guy Thériault, director of language training, said that every precaution had been taken to ensure that the new tests were based on up-to-date and professionally recognized testing principles, were credible to the testers and easy to administer.

Combien y a-t-il de membres des Forces canadiennes qui sont en mesure de communiquer quotidiennement avec leurs compagnons et compagnes de travail dans les deux langues officielles?

En s'appuyant sur les tests de compétence linguistique en usage ces dix dernières années, on a pu établir que 6 235 militaires sont complètement bilingues. De ce nombre, 1 125 ont mentionné l'anglais comme première langue officielle (PLO) tandis que 5 110 ont mentionné le français. Tous ont atteint le profil intégral (I) aux tests de compétence linguistique (TCL).

Cependant, vu que l'évaluation a été en décroissance au cours des quatre dernières années afin de permettre l'élaboration de nouveaux tests fondés sur l'approche communicative, les membres des FC qui appartiennent aux autres catégories [i.e. du profil fonctionnel (F) à la qualification élémentaire de bilinguisme qui équivaut à un minimum de 2 dans chacune des habiletés obtenu aux anciens TCL] devront être testés de nouveau dans leur environnement militaire. On évaluera la connaissance de leur seconde langue officielle (SLO), dans les domaines

suivants: expression orale (parler), compréhension auditive (écouter), compréhension de l'écrit (lire) et expression écrite (écrire).

Par conséquent, les FC dressent les plans d'une campagne d'évaluation de la langue et feront appel pour ce faire à de nouveaux examens de certification. Ce programme débutera le 6 septembre 1988 et se poursuivra jusqu'au 30 juin 1989. À cause de son intensité, de son étendue, de sa courte durée et de la précision attendue, cette campagne de *testing* est qualifiée de *blitz*.

Cible du blitz

C'est d'après les résultats obtenus aux tests actuels de langue seconde que l'on a désigné la population cible pour ce *blitz*. Celle-ci se subdivise en trois catégories: ceux et celles dont le profil F (i.e. A = 3, B = 3 et, comme résultat total, un minimum de 10) remonte à plus de cinq ans; les militaires dont le profil est proche du F [i.e. au moins un 3 dans l'une ou l'autre des habiletés et un résultat total de 7 à 9) et, enfin, ceux et celles dont le profil indique une connaissance élémentaire de la langue seconde (i.e. au moins un 2 dans l'une des quatre habiletés).

Au total, 16 878 militaires (7 679 qui ont désigné l'anglais comme PLO et 9 199, le français) seront testés pendant le *blitz*. La validation finale et l'évaluation de

la fiabilité des nouveaux examens de compétence linguistique (ECL) sont en cours. Au moment de leur implantation en septembre, ils se substitueront aux anciens tests de compétence linguistique aujourd'hui dépassés.

Nouvelle orientation

Mme Suzette Hafner, chef de la Section du développement des programmes et de la validation à la Direction de l'enseignement des langues (DEL), nous a déclaré que l'ancien test se fondait surtout sur les aspects grammaticaux et linguistiques de la langue seconde. «C'est dépassé», nous a-t-elle dit. Le nouveau test examine les habiletés réelles à communiquer, et son contenu est plus militarisé. «Nous interrogerons sur le métier ou la profession, et sur le lieu de travail, a-t-elle précisé. C'est un test beaucoup plus réaliste. Nous évaluerons la capacité du militaire à utiliser la langue.»

Le nouveau test porte actuellement sur trois habiletés: la compréhension auditive, la compréhension de l'écrit et l'interaction orale. Cette dernière consiste en un tête-à-tête qui ne se déroule que si le profil 3 est atteint en compréhension auditive et en compréhension de l'écrit. En ce qui concerne l'expression écrite, il y aura aussi un test, mais plus tard. Et l'introduction de ce test ne se fera pas au moment du premier *blitz*. Par ailleurs, on

apporte aux curriculums de français et d'anglais les changements nécessaires pour qu'ils se modèlent sur l'approche communicative.

Bien que l'on prévoit entreprendre un *blitz* tous les quatre ans, il y aura une demande continue et l'on devra tester, chaque année, environ 4 000 membres des FC. Parmi eux, il y aura ceux et celles dont le profil linguistique fonctionnel vient à expiration, les membres jugés de niveau F à la fin de leur cours de langue seconde et finalement, ceux et celles dont le profil F ou I obtenu au ECL viendra à expiration après quatre ans.

Afin d'assurer la coordination des ECL, on nommera dans chaque base un coordonnateur du *testing* (CDTB). Un peu avant la période du *testing*, le coordonnateur fournira de plus amples renseignements sur les nouveaux ECL.

Le colonel Guy Thériault, Directeur de l'enseignement des langues a affirmé qu'on avait pris toutes les précautions pour s'assurer, d'une part, que les nouveaux tests s'appuient sur des principes de *testing* reconnus, professionnels et des plus actuels, et d'autre part, qu'ils sont plausibles pour les administrateurs de tests, et faciles à administrer.

The Canadian Forces School of Aerospace Studies is well into the current academic year and the transfer of knowledge from instructors to course members is proceeding at a fast pace. In the last column, the various courses were described briefly; in this and successive issues, each of the courses will be explained in finer detail.

The Aerospace Systems Course (ASC) is one of the longest-running and most prestigious courses in the Canadian Forces. It had its origins in the Specialist Navigator Course over

40 years ago, and while its aim has not changed significantly, course members now include pilots, navigators, air weapons controllers, aerospace engineers, communications and electrical engineers, and air traffic controllers.

The aim of ASC is to produce graduates who are equipped to assume technical duties in Aerospace Systems acquisition, i.e., in project offices in NDHQ, or in Test and Evaluation establishments. The course provides the members with instruction in basic sciences, aerospace systems,

and management techniques, and exposes them to current programmes and technologies.

Exchange students often are found on the course since the instructional staff includes both RAF and USAF officers. Other military officers occasionally take the course on a trial basis; a RAAF officer and a CF artillery officer have appeared on recent courses.

ASC is ten months in length, running from late August to late June. Included in this time are five tours to acquaint the stu-

Commandant's Corner

I recently had the opportunity to participate in one of the great annual rites of fall in the Canadian Armed Forces — the merit board marathon. I consider myself extremely fortunate in that this is the second time that I have been involved in this procedure. Fortunate primarily because I believe this is a chance to get as close as possible to the true strength of the CF merit system, an experience which renews by faith in the honesty and integrity of our personnel evaluation system.

Over the years we all hear the rumours of factors that warp the true order of merit; however, a short exposure to the actual process convinces you these fears are groundless. The strength of this unique CF system is the composition of the board, the operational people drawn from the real world who carefully review each and every eligible individual and return to the "system" a list of names deemed best able to serve that occupation in higher rank.

The merit board system is one of the few thanks which distinguish us from our civilian counterparts. It may be in-efficient, time consuming and sometimes tedious, but without it we would all lose.

dents with CF Operations and with the capabilities of the aerospace industries of Canada, the United States and Europe.

After an initial period of intensive study of university level maths, physics and other sciences, the focus of the course shifts towards Aerospace Systems — Aerodynamics, Radar, Displays, Electro-Optics and Communications etcetera. These Systems subjects usually culminate in syndicate exercises during which the members have the opportunity to practice what their instructors preach.

A recent syndicate exercise was conducted to consolidate the teaching of the Human Factors subject. With the cooperation of Central Flying School and BAMEO/ASO in providing airframes, the course members conducted evaluations of the cockpits of a Tutor, a Musketeer and the T-40 Simulator.

As part of the curriculum, each student is required to produce a major technical paper addressing an issue of operational interest to the CF. While this entails much research and painstaking prepa-

ration, it is only one part of the report writing phase. Each of the three syndicates produces a major report of operational interest as well, and each member prepares three reports of visits undertaken during the tours.

It all adds up to an extremely busy year for the course — many long evenings of study and preparation are required, and the students are very occupied right up until graduation. The ASC qualification is well recognized, however, and carries its own rewards for the successful candidates.
