THE HISTORY OF MOTHER'S DAY

Be it with cards, flowers, telephone calls or personal visits, each year on the second Sunday in May, Canadians across the land celebrate Mother's Day. A time-honored event, this holiday has become every bit as important as Christmas, Thanksgiving, or Easter. In fact, Hallmark Canada reports that people spend more money on Mother's Day cards than for greeting cards for any other occasion.

But if it hadn't been for the crusading efforts of Philadelphian Anna M. Jarvis, Canadians would

not celebrate this holiday at all. In 1907, Miss Jarvis mounted a campaign to have a nation-wide day dedicated to mothers. Miss Jarvis was inspired by her own late mother, who had nursed a lifelong dream of establishing this celebration.

For the next three years Miss Jarvis who was never a mother herself, worked hard at spreading her idea; she wrote hundreds of letters to congressmen, state governors, influential businessmen, clergymen.

In 1910, Miss Jarvis' tireless ef-

forts were rewarded when the governors of West Virginia, Oklahoma, and Washington officially proclaimed Mother's Day. Within a year, Mother's Day observances were being held in every state in the U.S. Miss Jarvis achieved her final victory on May 9, 1914 when President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation directing "the 2nd Sunday in May as a public expression of our love and reverence for the mothers of our country."

Once the custom became established in the United States it

was quickly adopted in Canada, and gradually spread all over the world. Today Mother's Day is celebrated everywhere from Australia, Mexico and Japan to the West Indies, Europe and Africa.

Ancient Tributes
 However, the idea of Mother's Day did not originate with Anna M. Jarvis. Both the ancient Greeks and Romans held festivals to pay tribute to mothers. During the Middle Ages Christians honored Mary, the mother of Jesus, with special celebrations each year.

In medieval England there was a Mothering Sunday, when children who had been away from home as apprentices returned to see their mothers. They usually brought the gift of a "mothering cake" a fruit cake with almond paste, meant to be eaten on Midlent Sunday. This tradition held in March, is still alive in Britain today.

In Canada, cards are by far the most popular way to celebrate Mother's Day. Typically sentimental, they usually contain a simple verse expressing love and affection.



Base Electrical Mechanical Engineers

Canadian Forces Organization Order 2.12 details the role of CFB Winnipeg and the services it must provide. These services include operations, administration, technical services, and controller. The technical services branch is further sub-divided into supply, maintenance, construction, transportation, telecommunications, and general safety. The maintenance service is also divided into two separate responsibility areas which includes the BAMEO and BEME sections. The purpose of this article is to expound on BEME and its place within the base.

The "raison d'être" for BEME is to ensure the operational readiness of the combat and combat support equipment of the land forces, and the land based support equipment of "all environmental elements." At CFB Winnipeg the latter portion of the responsibility area is more prevalent with 70% of our effort being directed toward that task. BEME has numerous guidelines to help its personnel in carrying out this task and are guided by the following tenets:

- Repair where the equipment breaks down, if possible;
- Carry out regular inspections of equipment as a preventive maintenance function to ensure maximum availability to the user;
- Repair parts scaling must be an integral part of equipment acquisition and a factor in initial provisioning;
- Electrical mechanical engineering tradesmen will be trained to undertake all levels of maintenance in their trade;
- Every BEME tradesman forms part of the team, and as such is expected to participate to the maximum extent possible and feasible in maintenance actions

being executed, even when not of his particular specialty;

- All BEME personnel must be trained and capable of carrying out the defence of their unit, base or formation;
- Repair operations are guided by the Permissive Repair Schedule (PRS) which defines the magnitude of repairs to be attempted at each line;
- All BEME personnel are responsible to report failures which appear to be caused by defective material, engineering, administrative or technological short-comings, and to suggest modifications, alterations or design changes which will alleviate or eliminate them;
- All BEME organizations, irrespective of Command, have a responsibility to provide repairs, when requested, providing it does not endanger the immediate accomplishment of their own mission;
- The BEME authority shall have technical control of its resources;
- The BEME system shall be monitored by inspections;
- Unit BEME organizations shall only be staffed by qualified tradesmen;
- Recovery and backloading of equipment is an BEME responsibility;
- Determination of the requirements for repair parts at each line of maintenance is an BEME responsibility; and
- An information system must exist which will provide data on maintenance workloads and backlog.

The above doctrines are only a portion of the full list and are mentioned because they affect the every day operation of BEME. In order to carry out its responsibilities BEME is divided

into three main functional groups. They are:

- **Planning and Control:** responsible for inspections; planning; local contracts; control; receipt and issue of repaired equipment; coordinating, expediting, and scaling of repair parts; and coordinating the operation of the workshop management system;
- **Production:** responsible for vehicle repair; weapons repair; materials support; land communications; radiax repair and calibration; electronics, fire control systems repair; and
- **Maintenance Administration:** responsible for admin/trg; long term planning; coordinate technical projects; and coordinate BEME annual equipment inspections.

The shops and cells that give the support mentioned above are spread around numerous buildings within and around CFB Winnipeg. BEME headquarters is located in bldg P6 on the south site of CFB Winnipeg. Other locations are found in P1 and C1 south site; Bldg 87 and 96 north site; Minto and MacGregor armories in Winnipeg; and Thunder Bay army in Thunder Bay.

BEME has 97 personnel, representing various trades both civilian and military, to assist the BAMEO in carrying out his maintenance function. The tradesmen are allocated to the following shops:

- **Tels Shop:** is located in bldg P6. Its responsibilities are to provide 1st, 2nd, and some 3rd line support to all tactical communications equipment used by regular, militia, and cadet units from Thunder Bay to the Alberta border. The Tels shop is also tasked with the calibration of all radiax equipment from

Thunder Bay to the Alberta border;

- **Fire Control System Shop:** is located in P6. The FCS shop is divided into an electrical and an optronic repair cell each given 1st, 2nd, and some 3rd line repair tasks to a large variety of equipment. The optronic cell handles projectors, binoculars, telescopes, lasers, night vision equipment, etc. The electrical cell is tasked to repair clocks, electrical appliances, power tools, starters, alternators, etc;
- **Weapons Shop:** is located in P6. This shop's duties and responsibilities are numerous and diverse ranging from the inspection and repair of small arms up to and including 105mm towed howitzers. Also, they are responsible for the maintenance to the TOW under armor turret system. Forcible entries and repairs to security containers which include locks, safes, and automotive locking hardware; the inspection and licensing of ranges used by cadet, militia, and regular force units; and engraving are also part of the weapons trade function;
- **Non-Tech Shop:** is located in P1. It consists of three trades and employs 9 civilian tradesmen. Carpenters, refinishers, and upholsterers do a wide range of woodwork repairs ranging from manufacturing new items to refinishing office furniture. Our textile cell upholsters or repairs all types of covered furniture, tents, canvas as well as tarps found on the cargo box of some vehicles;
- **Materials Shop:** is located in part in P6 and bldg 87. This shop comprises four individual cells responsible for machining, welding, auto body repairs, and painting. In the machining cell,

they repair or manufacture items using machining lathes performing such tasks as making bushings, turning brake drums, and repairing or manufacturing items not available from the supply system or manufacturer. The welding cell performs all types of welding repairs by means of tungsten inert gas, metal inert gas, oxygen acetylene, and plasma arc welding and cutting processes. The body repair cell is tasked to repair all autobody damage as a result of an accident or rust. The painting cell applies the paint finish to complete the jobs;

- **Vehicle Repair Shop P6:** provides 1st, 2nd, and some 3rd line maintenance to all CFB Winnipeg supported units who hold vehicles which includes the 2PPCLI while in garrison. This shop has three cells consisting of repair parts, tool crib and component repairs which renders support in completing requested repairs; and
- **Vehicle Repair Shop Bldg 87:** this shop provides 1st and 2nd line vehicle repair support to vehicles located at the north site. Its major responsibility is maintenance support to the SNIC and Tender fleets. This shop is also responsible for the repairs to AMSE equipment powered by an internal combustion engine.

Listing all the equipment that falls under the BEME maintenance umbrella is quite long but a simple rule for CFB Winnipeg is that "if it doesn't fly BEME will fix it." Yes, there are exceptions and it would be easier to contact the control office at local 6078 where direction will be gladly given as to how your broken equipment can be repaired.

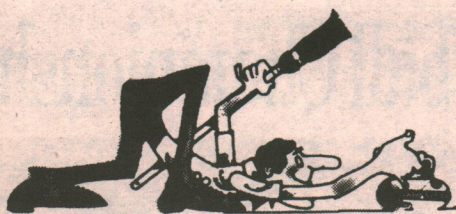

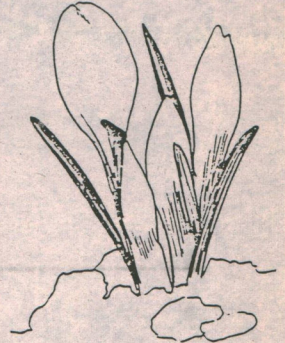
Greetings from the Chapels

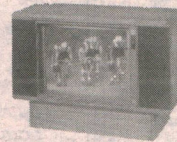

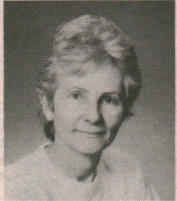

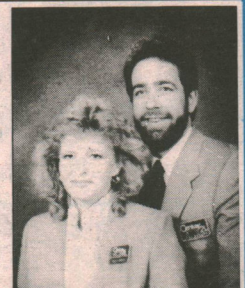
