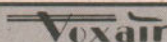

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Mortgages Made Easy

Almost every homeowner in Manitoba has, or at one time had, a mortgage and many do not fully understand the nature or effect of the legal relationship created when signing or assuming a mortgage.

I will be restricting this discussion to residential real property mortgages, although some of the principles may apply to commercial mortgages or to chattel mortgages.

A mortgage is a legal contract between the land owner borrowing funds, who is referred to as the mortgagor, and the lender, either a financial institution or private lender known as the mortgagee. A third party, referred to as a guarantor or covenantor, exists on some mortgages, as a person other than the land owner who is joining with the mortgagor in the promises made under the mortgage.

The terms of the mortgage contract are contained in the

mortgage document and are governed by a number of provincial and federal statutes including the Real Property Act, the Mortgage(s) Act, and the Interest Act.

Every mortgage document contains a promise by the mortgagor to repay the mortgage principal amount and the interest, if any, stipulated, by the agreed upon method of payment. Most mortgage documents also contain other promises such as a promise to keep buildings insured, a promise to pay property taxes and other municipal levies, and a promise to keep the premises in good repair.

Additional clauses may be included only in certain types of mortgages. For instance a mortgage against a condominium unit usually contains promises relating to payment of common element fees, and a second or subsequent mortgage usually indicates that default on the prior mort-

gage will be deemed to be default on that mortgage.

The mortgage will also contain clauses giving to the lender security not only by way of the above personal promises of the individual but by way of rights against the land and buildings involved. These rights too may vary from mortgage to mortgage but the Real Property Act outlines the specific method of realizing on the mortgaged security in the event of default of the promises in the mortgage. The terms of the mortgage cannot allow the mortgagee to proceed any faster than allowed by statute, or to circumvent any of the steps required by the Act, preceding the final order of foreclosure. The lender may, however, choose to proceed against the mortgagor or mortgagors or covenantors personally by a law suit in addition to or instead of proceeding against the land, in the event of default.

It is wise to be apprised of all

the major covenants and terms of your mortgage before signing it as they will be legally binding upon you. Your lawyer or your lender should be able to explain the provisions to you.

In shopping for a mortgage when buying a house or refinancing, most people consider the available interest rate, and the conditions of prepayment. Many people are not concerned about prepayment penalties, figuring that they are not likely going to come into additional funds to apply against their mortgage. They fail to realize, however, that with most mortgages, the penalty also applies in the event of sale of the property prior to the expiry of the term of their mortgage. Anyone who may be moving in future should discuss the options available to reduce or avoid such a penalty, with their lender or their lawyer prior to finalizing their mortgage.

Before the mortgage funds will be advanced (or paid out) by the lender, the mortgage must be a) approved by the lender, b) prepared by the lawyer, c) signed by the mortgagor, d) registered by the lawyer at the Land Titles Office, e) reported by the lawyer to the lender, and f) processed by the lender for advance. In the event of a refinance to pay off an existing mortgage coming due, or to obtain funds for loan consolidation or home renovations, you would be wise to discuss how long each of these steps take (with your lender and your lawyer) and apply for your mortgage long enough in advance of the time when funds will be required.

remain a source of pride for both the Air Force and the Nation.

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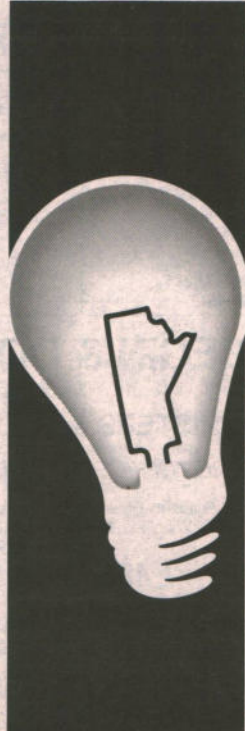
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From the Hangar Doors

Dash 8 familiarization continues apace. Not too long ago, Labs and Servicing sent personnel on an "EFIS" course. That was so people could understand the new cockpit information displays, with four CRTs (TV tubes) replacing some of the old "steam gauge" (dials) displays. And, hopefully, how to fix 'em.

You have to understand that with our experience of 1950s Heres and 1960s Tutors we are having to make a huge jump in technology. For those who spent most of their time working on the Dakotas, the span is more like six decades. Suddenly you have to deal with a plane that has computers galore and is Acronym City. PSUs, ADCBs, HMUs, ECUs, IVSIs, #1 and #2 DADCs, AHRUs, #1 and #2 NCU's ... throttle? compass? uplocks? what are those?

Think what it's like when we get a snag on some of this new stuff. Sometimes we get a problem that even deHavilland has trouble solving. On the other hand, snags are your best opportunity to learn about a plane (and best excuse to tear it apart).

It's not just techs who have to know this stuff in a hurry: so must the pilots. A good example how inexperience can stump everybody was when a pilot aborted his flight when he couldn't get a good test indication for his prop blade heaters. Ice on props is not good for any plane's health (not to mention crew's and passengers'), and so he and his copilot went through more testing to see if they had missed anything. Circuit breakers in? Yep. AC power from generators on line? Sufficient voltage. Engines at sufficient idle? Must be: we've got the generators on line. Shut her down and write it up.

When the techs plugged in external electrical power everything checked "serviceable." Hmm... "Finger Snag?" (i.e., pilot not holding down the switch properly?)

What to do? Well, let's run up the engines, and use internal power. Maybe that was the problem. Well only a few techs are qualified to be "tarmac pilots," but they found one. Start 'em up.

After ten minutes, they stumbled on the answer. In one line buried in the middle of one of our many Dash 8 manuals, there was this instruction: engines must be running at least 900 rpm. Put them below that, you can still be at idle, you will get power, but no, the prop heating system won't work.

So, it was never a snag, but it wasn't something you could fault the pilots for either. We can't expect them to take our library of manuals up in the air with them. Just something that has to be passed onto all techs and all pilots to remember, and for experience.

Experience we do lack, except for a very few men who were posted in from Germany. To them we are very much in debt. And I also believe we techs in 16 Hangar and the pilots from CFS and 402 Sqn can pat our collective backs, because inexperience can make for frayed nerves, finger pointing, and distrust. We've adopted the better attitude: we're in the same boat, so altogether! row! and bail and where're those manuals!?

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Base Supply Tips

Have you ever complained to your friends that the uniform does not breathe well in the heat, or that an item from your permanent kit allotment for which you receive a Clothing Upkeep Allowance (CUA) and must maintain at your own expense is of poor quality. Or perhaps a piece of equipment you work with is not safe or needs some modification to make it more efficient/economical, or more useful. Maybe a lot of people have already thought of it but never acted upon their own ideas and observations.

You have a voice in the hierarchy of things! The CF 777 Unsatisfactory Condition Report (UCR) is your vehicle to communicate with the higher levels and air your comments or suggestions.

The UCR is used to report suggestions and recommendations on technical or non-technical matters. In some cases, if the originator has made suggestions that could result in significant savings to the government, the originator may be advised to raise a submission under CFAO 99-2, Suggestion Award Program as well.

In certain cases, though, a UCR is not the proper form to use in reporting defects or errors of specific nature. It is best to consult the Canadian Forces Technical Orders C-02-015-001/AG-000 when submitting the UCR.

The UCR is submitted through your normal chain of command, i.e. supervisor, section head, etc. The completed UCR is sent on to the controlling agency. At CFB Winnipeg, BAMEO controls the UCR submissions. The UCR is then forwarded to a technical authority i.e. aircraft related — BAMEO, vehicle related — BE-MEO, Supply related — BSpO etc. for comments and review. A UCR affecting safety would also be routed through the BGSO or AFSSO.

The UCR must be completed and investigated within 14 calendar days from the receipt of UCR at second level, and 30 days (urgent) or 90 days (routine) at NDHQ level, dependent on the priority assigned. So take action and see the results if you have something to say! Don't wait for someone else.

Base Supply provides a service to approximately 400 customer accounts from which we receive over 50,000 demands each year.

Most demands should be priority 03 for items required within 15 to 30 days. When the customer account holders forecasts their requirements, they should substantiate their demands, quote entitlements, use proper stock numbers, quote realistic order quantities (which is 30 days supply on hand), and use priority codes in accordance with regulations; they will be, in most cases, very satisfied customers.

Every time someone fails to provide all the information Base Supply needs, the routine workflow is disrupted and not only causes delays in providing proper service but affects the service we provide to the approximately 399 other customer accounts. Help us make you a satisfied customer by following the guidelines in A-LM-185-002/JS-001 CFP 185 Vol 2 which is available to all customer account holders upon request from Base Supply Distribution Accounts section.

Remember that requests for loans of tentage, etc., should be addressed to Customer Services, the coordinating controlling desk for temporary loans. This includes all adventure training, ball tournaments, etc.

This year Base Supply was allotted only 80 percent of the required local purchase budget which will definitely affect the customer. Don't be surprised if the quantities have been reduced on your demands or if more substantiation is requested. Whenever you are not satisfied with the equipment you receive for whatever reason make sure you let us know. We should be able to help.

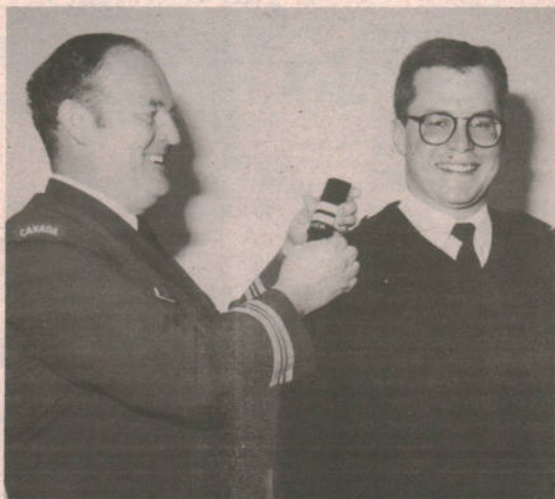

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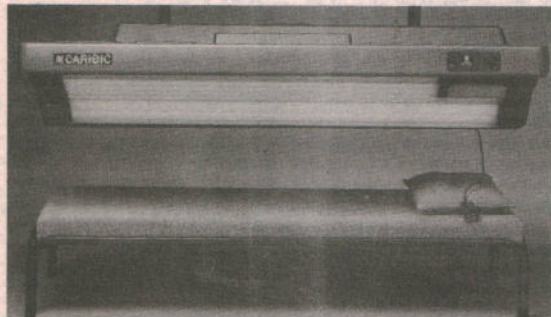

We will soon be in the period of the year which sees much movement on all Bases: the active posting season. Bicycle Safety Tips

All bicycles need regular maintenance to keep them running smoothly. Take a few minutes to inspect your bike before each trip. Ask yourself the following questions:

- Are all parts tightly fastened? Check the wheels, saddle, handlebars, handlebar stem, brake levers, brakes, pedals, cranks, derailleurs, lamp, reflectors and accessories by pulling, pushing and twisting each part to see if it is loose. If so, tighten each loose part or the clamp that holds it.
- Are tires fully inflated to the recommended pressure and in good shape? Keep tires inflated to the pressure marked on them. Riding with soft tires makes bicycling hard work and will ruin your tires and rims. Tires should be free of cuts and bulges and have no cords showing through. Replace the tires when the tread is worn smooth. With worn tires you will have more spillover because your bicycle will have less traction, especially on wet roads.
- Are all rotating parts lubricated and properly adjusted? Rotating parts such as pedals, wheels, the chain and steering bearings should rotate freely but not be loose enough to shake or wobble.

Lubrication is an important part of your regular maintenance. The following parts should be checked and lightly lubricated weekly: hand lever bolts, brake cable and rods, brake pivot bolts, wheel bearings, steering column head, pedal bearings, sprocket hanger bearings, coaster brake bearings and the chain.

- Do the brakes respond quickly? Squeeze hard on both brake levers; there should be space for one finger between the lever and the handlebar. If not, tighten the brake cable. Check brake blocks. Brake pads should be of equal distance from the rim and the entire block should touch the rim, not the tire, when the brake lever is engaged.
- Do the gears shift smoothly? With the rear wheel lifted off the ground, turn the pedal and shift through each gear. If the chain shifts when you don't want it to, the control levers are too loose and the adjustment bolt needs tightening. If you have difficulty shifting, the levers are too tight and the adjustment bolt should be loosened.
- Do I have all the right equipment and accessories for the trip? One of the keys to bicy-

cle safety is to make yourself visible to other road users. Wear brightly coloured clothing; orange and yellow are most visible. A helmet is strongly recommended to reduce the risk of head injury. If you plan to be riding at night, be sure to have a headlamp and rear reflector. Clothing with retro-reflective strips is recommended for added nighttime visibility. Make sure your lights and reflectors are clean and positioned so that they can be seen even when you are carrying a load.

It is a good idea to bring along a few basic tools, especially if your trip will take you out of the city, in case roadside repairs are needed. These include: a dumbbell-shaped multi-socket wrench, a 6" adjustable crescent wrench, a tire patch kit, tire irons and a bicycle pump, a narrow-bladed screwdriver, and a set of Allen keys to fit your bike. Add to this any special tools required for the type of bike you ride.

Have your bicycle safety-checked twice a year by a reliable bicycle service dealer. Proper care will help you maintain full control of your bike. It will also work more efficiently and last longer.
