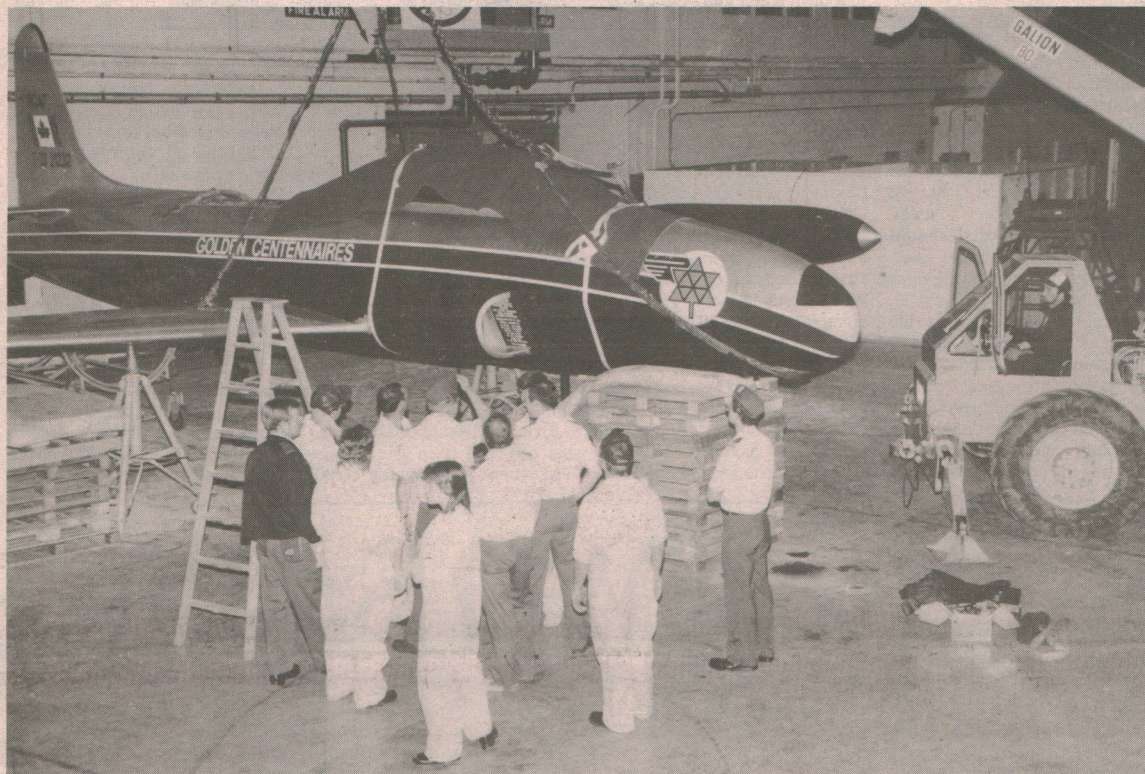

## T-33 Remounted in Centennial Park

"Like clock work", was the operation transporting and fastening the T-33 aircraft to its perch in Centennial Park on 24 and 25 May. The aircraft was removed some time last year for refurbishment. Once the aircraft was refinished, its replacement was left to the careful hands of the CFB Wpg crash and salvage team, along with support from the BTNO, BSECURO, Litz Crane, Wpg Police, Wpg city crews. The operation started, 9:30 pm, 24 May and extended into the wake-up hours of 25 May. The route was complicated a couple of times. In one instance, a gated fence at the north end of the base presented the crew with an obstacle. With 60 feet of boom, a 35 ton crane lifted the aircraft over, and gently replaced it on the 40 foot flatbed trailer. The second instance was unforeseen. A number of vehicles were parked overnight on Sturgeon! The Military Police along with the Winnipeg City Police escorted the truck and trailer down the normally north-bound lane. Thankfully good organization made no complications too difficult for the crew to handle.

## The Union of the Talents

At one time or another, most human beings have hoped or dreamt of meeting their idol and perhaps even to having a little conversation with him or her. But in the military, because of our fields of duty, that kind of "star" is very rare. Perhaps the only exception is in the music world! On May 17, the musicians of the Air Command Band, and especially

the clarinetists, have had that wonderful opportunity happen maybe once or twice in a normal lifetime. They had the privilege to play and to discuss with the world renowned clarinetist, Eddie Daniels.

For the average citizen, that name does not ring a bell, but for any musician, or person interested in music, Mr Daniels is the

very best reference alive, for either classical or jazz, when it is time to talk about the clarinet.

"This virtuoso came to play, in Winnipeg, for the Music Festival of Canada", said Warrant Officer Barry Tyson, a trombone player, "so he needed a band to accompany him. Here in Manitoba, when it is time to find a professional band, the choice is very limited, not to say non-existent, after the Winnipeg Symphonic Orchestra. This is why the organizers of the festival called us a few weeks ago to find out if we would be able to accommodate him. Such an invitation could not be refused!!!", Tyson said with pride. "He recently won a Grammy Award for Memos From Paradise, and released a new album, Ne Penthe, which is currently at the third position on the charts", he added.

### The Practice

Around 9:30 a.m. that morning, each and every member of the band, including its chief, were impatient to see him arrive. Everybody was trying to be as ready as possible, the sound that emanated from the instruments was a real cacophony, the practice of scales was done faster and louder than usual, the tension was at its

zenith, when suddenly... the "master" made his appearance. He was finally here!

After a very brief welcome, the practice was on. The 35 musicians present rapidly realized how demanding he is. He kept stopping them in order to obtain what he exactly desired. "Every sound must be clear and perfect, not too high and not too low", said Daniels at a certain point. "He is such a great master of his instrument, as well as of the music, that I do not consider that an insult to be corrected by him, even though I have been playing for 30 years", said Warrant Officer Edwin Burrows, an euphonium player. "That kind of encounter should happen a lot more, it is good for everybody, and especially for the youngest members of the band, who probably have never had the opportunity to meet such a person", he added.

After 90 minutes of intense practice, Daniels took time to give a little instruction to the six clarinetists of the band. At the beginning, they were a little bit intimidated but quickly forgot his great reputation as he was laughing and joking with them. "I think it was good to meet such a musician, it is very motivating, myself and others had pictures taken standing beside him which will go straight into our scrapbooks",

said Private Michael Elmer, one of the clarinetists.

### The Presentation

At 9:00 p.m., the show finally began. The 5,000 spectators demonstrated their appreciation with standing ovation, on many occasions. After the presentation, Eddie Daniels, who played for the first time with a Canadian Forces band, was also very impressed by what he experienced. "I am accustomed to playing with symphonic orchestras, (60 to 120 players). I must admit that for a small band they are excellent, I can assure you they have no reason to envy others", he said. "Their repertoire is very large, they even played a jazz version of Sweet Georgia Brown (the theme song of the Harlem Globe Trotters), in order to have me perform some jazz tonight", he added with visible satisfaction.

The Air Command Band can now add one more honour to its collection, not only did it meet the challenge it faced, but proved, without any doubt, that its talent can match one of the best musicians in the world.

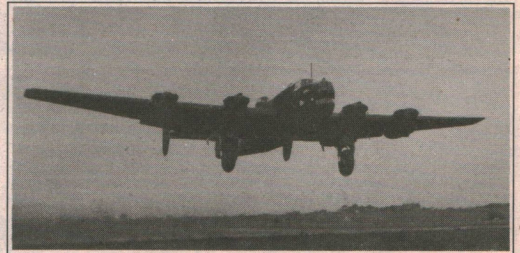

breed of animal in any zoo. So if you're so inclined to view this beast, contact the Camp Berger Safari Club and for a nominal fee they will give you a guided tour.

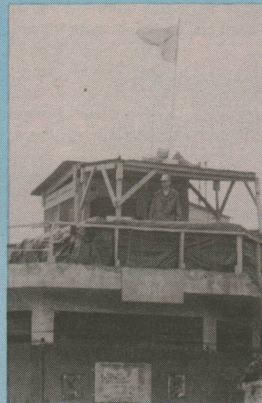

# Life After Birth

One of the great joys of being a clergyman is to be present with people as they celebrate the great joys of their life. Baptism of little children into the Kingdom of God is one of these joys, and often as I gaze into the face of one of these innocents I am struck by the miracle that is life. Much has been written about the quality of life, and the final rewards — life after death. But can we be certain there is life after birth?

Let me explain. Until now birth has been seen as the beginning of a continuous action until death: birth as the beginning of the death process. Recently, the pattern has been broken. Theologians have commented on death and our way of leaving this world — on the premise that there is nothing we can do about our entrances, but we can make a good exit.

Our common struggle is to make meaning of our lives, and at the end of our allotted time "our passing into the beyond" takes up all our waking moments. Because we begin with where we are now and stare into the black beyond, we feel despair often, and hopelessness many times. handed you a rough deal, why not start again; if life has been satisfactory, but not spectacular, why not start again? "Today is the first day of the rest of your life" — the truth is that you have the means of making a fresh start if you believe that what counts is from now on.

Jesus Christ said that anyone who followed him must leave the old life behind (Luke 9:62). Don't dwell on old business. It is time to move on. Consider today as your birthday if you want — a whole new life is ahead of you. Take hold with both hands.

As a Christian, I believe that Christ is the source and direction of our strength, and as children of God to realize our full potential is to realize God's purpose for us. With help, spiritual and mental, you can form a life of which you can be proud, a true life after birth!



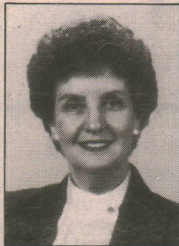

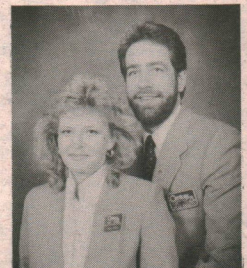
