

14 Training Group Disbandment Ceremonies

On 1 August 1990, a Flag Lowering Ceremony was held on the tarmac in front of 11 Hangar at CFB Winnipeg to mark the close out of 14 Training Group.

Following World War II, Canada undertook to train North Atlantic Treaty Organization aircrew personnel. This agreement required the reactivation of some training facilities in the Prairie Provinces, and on 1 August 1951, No. 14 (Training) Group was formed to administer these facilities. The Group performed its role with distinction for eight years until it was absorbed into the Royal Canadian Air Force Training Command in 1959 when that command moved to Winnipeg. This Command was later succeeded by the Canadian Forces Training Command, which, in turn, was disbanded and transferred many Air Force training tasks to Air Command on its formation in 1975.

On 17 February 1981, the Minister of National Defence announced the formation of 14 Training Group to train specified air operations branch personnel to initial trades/classification standards and conduct other training functions as directed by Commander Air Command.

An Inauguration Parade was held on 1 August 1981 and the

Group has carried out the function of "training Canada's Air Force" with distinction for the past nine years.

Early in 1990 the decision was made to disband 14 Training Group and form a new Chief of Staff Personnel & Training Branch at Air Command Headquarters. This Branch will take over the training functions performed by 14 Training Group in addition to other functions already being handled by staff at Air Command.

Brigadier-General D.N. Kinsman, CD, the last Commander of 14 Training Group presented the 14 Training Group flag to Lieutenant-General F.R. Sutherland, CMM, CD, Commander Air Command during the Flag Lowering Ceremony on 1 August 1990.

Prior to presentation of the flag to the Commander Air Command, Lieutenant-General Sutherland and Brigadier-General Kinsman addressed the parade. Brigadier-General Kinsman was posted to Aircom as COS Ops and Brigadier-General C.R. Thibault, former Base Commander at CFB Moose Jaw, has been appointed Chief of Staff Personnel & Training at Aircom.

Canadian Forces Europe to Reduce Personnel

OTTAWA — The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Bill McKnight, announced today that military personnel stationed in Canadian Forces Europe (CFE) will be reduced by approximately 1,400 in 1991.

"These are budget driven reductions. We are able to make them because threat levels are no longer what they were in Europe," said Mr. McKnight. "There

will be no change in our role in NATO as a result, and our personnel strength in Europe will remain well above what we had in the mid-1980s."

The withdrawn military personnel will be absorbed into bases across Canada, and reduced recruitment demands will allow for a natural adjustment in overall strength.

The operational impact of the reduction at CFE will be minimal, given the change in the security situation in Europe.

Canada is just one of several countries to announce reductions in forces stationed in Europe. Gen. John de Chastelain, Chief of the Defence Staff, has informed Canada's NATO allies of the reduction in Canadian Forces troops at CFE.

OTTAWA — Le ministre de la Défense nationale, l'honorable Bill McKnight, a annoncé aujourd'hui que l'effectif militaire des Forces canadiennes en Europe (FCE) sera réduit d'environ 1 400 personnes au cours de 1991.

"Il s'agit de réductions découlant du budget. Nous sommes en mesure de les effectuer car les niveaux de menace en Europe ne sont plus ce qu'ils étaient, a indiqué M. McKnight.

Notre rôle auprès de l'OTAN demeure inchangé, notre effectif en Europe reste bien supérieur à ce qu'il était au milieu des années 80."

Le personnel militaire rapatrié sera réparti dans les diverses bases du Canada, et des réductions au niveau du recrutement entraîneront un réajustement naturel des effectifs.

Les répercussions opérationnelles de la réduction au sein des

FCE seront minimales, étant donné que la situation, sur le plan de la sécurité, n'est plus la même en Europe.

Le Canada n'est que l'un de plusieurs autres pays à avoir annoncé des réductions de leurs forces en Europe. Le général John de Chastelain, Chef d'état-major de la Défense, a informé les alliés du Canada au sein de l'OTAN de cette réduction des troupes canadiennes en Europe.

Make Your Place Firesafe

The "residential" property classification continues to account for the largest number of fires. In 1987 there were 30,735 fires in this category, 46% of the Canadian total. These fires resulted in 439 deaths, or approximately 85% of the nation's fire fatalities.

The majority of these fire deaths could have been prevented

by changing risky behaviours and by identifying and removing home fire hazards.

We are dying in fires that occur in places we feel the safest. We need to look around these familiar surroundings and see the dangers that lurk there.

We can protect ourselves if we identify and remove home fire hazards before they start a fire.

This year's Fire Prevention Week theme is "Make Your Place Firesafe". Hunt for home hazards. We hope it will be an inspiration to everyone to lower the risk of having a fire in their home.

This year Fire Prevention Week will be observed from 7-13 October. These statistics were taken from the 1987 annual report for fire losses in Canada.

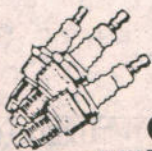

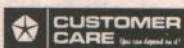

Family Support Centre Activities

"My name is Gloria. I am a wife and mother to a family of three children and a husband. My husband is like yours — he quite often disappears for months at a time! My children are Nicholas who is 9, Larissa 5, and Lundi 2. The best way to describe our family is — NEVER a dull moment!

Not only am I a mom, I am also a Sparks leader to 10 little girls. Sparks is once a week. I also help out at the Family Support Centre and St. Andrew's Women's Centre.

I guess the whole thing I am trying to say here is, this is a place for US! The military family. There's always something going on even if it's just a quick coffee and a friendly face that you want to see. There's always a pot on and someone who cares. Greetings from the Chapels

Vital Signs



data used in monitoring the heart, pulse and respiration of a person. Generally, they provide measurement of a patient's health and strength. Without these vital signs, doctors would not know how their patients were faring or how to best treat them. But this tends to address only the physical dimension of the person. What about mental, emotional, sexual and SPIRITUAL dimension of a person?

As our medical vital signs are an indication of our physical state of health the same is true for our spiritual lives. It is every bit as important as any other aspect of our development and everyday life. One interesting aspect of this is that every human being whether they want it or not has a spiritual dimension. We all have the capacity to believe in the intangible, the unproven. We are the only critters on God's green earth that can say "... I believe

that ... oh I don't believe that ...". We say it all the time and every time we do, we are reaffirming our capacity to believe in something. Historically, this belief has taken the form of belief in a transcendental power whether it be the Creator Spirit, a Higher Power or God.

God loved the world so he sent his Spirit to live within us. This Spirit reveals his presence in our personalities, thoughts and actions. For God knew that one of our most valued yet potential troublesome attribute is our gift of free will. Our power to choose. God wanted those who believed in him to do so freely. That means we have the capacity to say "No" and may choose not to believe. God wants believers, not slaves. Thus, it is this activity of being in relationship with something beyond ourselves, God, positively or negatively that accounts for our spiritual dimension.

It is these manifestations of God in our personalities, thoughts and actions that act as our spiritual "vital Signs".

What am I doing to be consciously aware of them? How am I taking spiritual care of myself that I might be fully developed and live to my full potential as the truly gifted person God created all of us to be?

Have you ever had one of those days where everything seems to go wrong and you end up feeling totally oppressed by it all? You start the day arguing with the spouse over nothing, the boss criticizes you, the guys at work are driving you crazy, on the way home from work you're cursing some guy in Japan because your little compact car won't run right and the inside door handle keeps falling off! It's at about this time that the temptation to make unreasonable judgments or give way to resent-

ful thoughts set in. This can make us feel helpless. But maybe all this is not the result of impersonal circumstances. It is hard to be self-effacing but maybe all our problems aren't caused by others. If we take the time to look within our own hearts we may discover that much of our anxiety is the result of our own sin.
