402 Sqn's Reserve Assoc. Makes A Difference

Loyal, good friends are hard to come by, so that when we do find them, we value them highly.

Usually, those same friends work quietly in the background and ask for no special recognition. 402 "City of Winnipeg" Squadron counts itself fortunate in having many friends who have stood by the unit over the years.

In this Voxair article, 402 Squadron would like to acknowledge the countless contributions made by one particular friend — the "City of Winnipeg Reserve Air Force Association". The Association is made up of more than 500 former 402 members and friends from recent times and as far back

as the early days of the Squadron in the 1930s.

Since its formation in 1974, the Association's members have dedicated a multitude of volunteer hours for the benefit of the Squadron. The Association has organized and provided funding for the Squadron's last three reunions (1974, 1978 and 1983) and it is actively involved again in 1992's August reunion, the Squadron's sixtieth anniversary.

Museum formed

Following the last reunion, Association members noted that they had a collection of donated films, books, historical artifacts

such as medals, log books and personal papers, as well as more than one thousand photographs and negatives (now more than 3,000). What followed was the birth of a 402 "City of Winnipeg" Squadron Museum, housed at the Western Canada Aviation Museum.

A number of Association members began volunteering their time regularly during the week to organize the materials at their museum. In the process, they obtained several grants to mount two free-standing displays depicting the history of the Squadron and the medals of former 402 Squadron Leader Jeff Northcott, and hired summer students to carry out an oral history project and a cataloguing project. From all this it is hoped that a squadron history book will be published, in time for the Squadron's anniversary next year.

The Association has contributed to 402 in other ways as well. For the last fifteen years, the Association has presented the best 402 Junior Ranks' Airman/Airwoman Award at its Annual Jack Reeve Award Dinner, held in memory of a 402 crewman who was killed in an airplane accident while on duty with the Squadron in Thunder Bay in the early 70s.

Its members have also built a special display case for the first RCAF Ensign, presented by King George VI early in the Se-

cond World War to 402 then known as 112 (AC) Squadron. That display is on loan to Air Command Headquarters.

Says LCol Bob Patrick, CO of 402, "I think that the Air Force is lucky to have the RCAF Association to look after it, but I don't think that there are too many squadrons which have just one organization looking after them as 402 does.

"We're very appreciative of the efforts and initiatives that the members of the City of Winnipeg

Reserve Air Force Association have carried out on our behalf. They've made a difference in the way we look at our Squadron's history and the people who made it the great Squadron it is."

CT-142 Navigation Training Begins at CFANS



CT-142 Navigation Trainer is becoming a familiar sight in the skies around Winnipeg.

On Monday 14 Jan 91 Basic Air Navigation Course 9101 (see photo) began classes at CFANS and became the first group of students to train on the CT-142. The Course is expected to run for 11 months with an anticipated graduation date of 19 Dec 91.

At present three of the four CT-142 Navigation trainers are here in Winnipeg. Aircraft 803 is

currently being updated to final production specifications; a process that 804 will undergo upon completion of 803. The last aircraft (142806) is anticipated to arrive from De Havilland Division, Boeing of Canada Ltd., on 8 Feb. 91. This will complete the CF fleet of six Dash 8 aircraft (including two CC-142s) located at CFB Winnipeg.

Musical Potpourri

A Year — Not a Review

As the memory of 1990 fades into collective memory it may be worth at least one more reflective look. 1990 with its political and economic problems may well have only been a harbinger of worse times ahead. Whenever times are bad, people look for escapism and in the past year we saw some of the biggest musical happenings in history. Rap was supposed to be a short lived fad. It proved otherwise as MC Hammer went over the 10-million mark in sales for "Please Hammer, Don't Hurt 'Em" and, as of this writing, Vanilla Ice has moved in excess of six million units of "To The Extreme".

It was the year of the female entertainer as Madonna continued to dominate the charts and new artists like Mariah Carey made giant strides. It was also a

year that saw Sinead O'Connor, Heart, Bette Midler and Whitney Houston return with music that has spilled over into this year's best seller listings. Perhaps the biggest phenomenon to occur last year was the trio of Wilson Phillips, second generation popsters, who topped with "Hold On", "Release Me" and "Impulsive".

On the country side, established artists like Randy Travis, George Strait and Alabama continued their winning ways, but it was also a year that saw Garth Brooks become a heart throb and Carlene Carter make a triumphant return to the charts. Canadian legend Stompin' Tom Connors wrapped up his 70-date, six-month, cross-Canada tour with a pair of sold-out shows at Toronto's Massey Hall on October 24th and 25th. To pay

tribute, Capitol Records arranged for a four colour mural of Stompin' Tom to be painted by artist Bill Wrigley. The mural is 60 feet wide by 28 feet high.

1990 was a year that saw Canadians move even further into the international spotlight as

It was a year that saw major record companies purchased and the death of the long playing album. As CD and cassette sales rose, the talk went to digital audio tape, or DAT. But, now the Q-sound has arrived and how far away can an affordable, home-recordable CD be away from the consumer's market?

It was a year that saw the return of Bill Medley and Bobby Hatfield, better known as The Righteous Brothers, thanks to the runaway success of *Ghost*. It was a year when the Neville Brothers finally received the recognition they deserve and it was a year that saw record companies release multi-cassette (or CD) collections. CFANS UPDATE

In a previous edition, the staff of the SANC (Staff Air Navigator Course) Flight were introduced along with a promise for further details on the course itself. The aim of the SANC is to provide advanced training to develop the operational, technical and training techniques associated with the Air Navigator Occupation.

Students on the course will learn about technological and operational developments related to navigation, communications, sensor and weapon systems. The course will last seven (intensive) weeks and will include 40 periods

on navigation systems lectures, 20 on electro-optical systems, 17 on radar systems, 14 on aerodynamics and aircraft performance, 14 on statistics, 10 on communications, 30 on airborne instruction; as well as weapon systems, research, management, and the Defence Program Management System.

In the next edition, look for photos of the SANC Flight personnel and the brave men of Course 9001.

Day. The day was spent preparing the staff for instructional duties on the CT-142's. The first students will begin flight training aboard 'Gonzo' later this month. Des Videos en Français

Depuis quelques temps déjà, la bibliothèque de Saint-Boniface offre une excellente collection de vidéos en français. Il est possible d'emprunter ces vidéos à raison de trois par personne et ce pour une durée de trois jours, tout cela sans frais.

Compte tenu du fait que des films francophones ne sont pas disponibles dans les boutiques de vidéos à Winnipeg (hormis *Le Déclin de l'Empire Américain* — doublé par dessus le marché), il est de bonne augure que la bibliothèque de Saint-Boniface offre un tel service. Il est tellement agréable de pouvoir regarder un film de qualité en français dans la tranquillité de son foyer entres amis. En offrant un tel service, la bibliothèque se met sans contredit au service de la communauté francophone de Winnipeg. C'est précisément ce genre d'amélioration significative qui nous aide à profiter de notre langue et de notre riche patrimoine culturelle en dépit de l'om-

niprésence du fait anglais, sans parler du nombre de canaux de télévisions anglophones à notre portée. Cette initiative des responsables de la bibliothèque de Saint-Boniface est vertement louable; en instaurant ce service, la bibliothèque devient sans doute une chef de file non seulement au Manitoba, mais au Canada tout entier.

Parmi la collection imposante de vidéos disponibles, on retrouve de réels classiques, autant français, que québécois, sans oublier des longs métrages traduits de l'américain et de l'anglais. Entre autres, on retrouve *Jesus de Montréal, 37°2 le Matin, Danton, Les Ripoux* et la nouveauté *Ripoux Contre Ripoux, 3 Hommes et un Couffin, Bonheur d'Occasion, Carmen, Jean de Florette, La Vie est un Long Fleuve Tranquille, Le Temps d'une Paix, Le Matou, Les Misérables*, etc. Du côté des films traduits, on retrouve également des films bien cotés, tel que *Platoon, Karat Kid, The Rain Man, The Tenth*

Man, The French Lieutenant's Woman, Midnight Express, Gorky Park, etc. Il est également à signaler que des documentaires à propos de toutes sortes de sujets d'actualité sont également disponibles, dont des programmes de Jacques Cousteau et du National Geographic.

Par le temps qui courent, louer des vidéos régulièrement peut rapidement devenir onéreux... et habituellement, on ne peut les garder que 24 heures. A la bibliothèque de Saint-Boniface, on ne peut vraiment pas se tromper puisque l'emprunt dure trois jours et il demeure est tout à fait gratuit... à moins, bien sûr, qu'on ne les rende en retard! Ça en vaut bien le détour! La bibliothèque de Saint-Boniface se trouve à l'angle des rues Taché et Provencher et pour emprunter des livres ou vidéos, il faut être muni d'une carte de membre. Finalement, le numéro de téléphone de la bibliothèque est le 986-4330.

Nationair Chartered Military Flights

As you probably already heard, DND has set up a commercial charter with Nationair to take over domestic and international service flights previously flown by the Boeing 707. These flights have been operating quite smoothly since they were initiated on 17 January 1991. They are a reliable means of transportation, as Nationair will replace a disabled aircraft within six hours of a breakdown.

The aircraft used is a DC8-62 with a 170 passenger configuration, which is the same number of seats as the Boeing. The backup

aircraft will be a DC8-61 or a B757. However, even if the aircraft can accommodate more passengers, the Air Movements Units and Sections will only be boarding 170 passengers. There will be no seat assignment on the domestic portion, but seats will be assigned on the international legs.

This service operates through the military airfields (with the exception of Vancouver), so passengers still report to the military Air Movements Units and Sections until 31 March 1991, when this chartered service

terminates.

Passengers are reminded that check-in times terminate one hour prior to flight departure, and that the fifty lb. baggage limitation has not been altered. All previous rules and entitlements continue to be followed, except for the \$3.21 boarding fee for leave travel (vice \$3.00) due to the GST. Arrangements for Priority 4, 5, and Opportunity travel are still in effect. Please contact the Air Movements Section at 833-5623 or 833-5622 after normal working hours for additional information.

First Female Infantier for the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders

Tracy Painchaud didn't waste much time in taking advantage of the change in policy that allowed females into Combat Arms positions in the military.

The 17-year-old student at Glen Lawn Collegiate promptly marched down to the Reserve Army recruiting office at Minto Armoury last spring and signed up for the Infantry. She successfully completed the enrollment program, and this past May, Pte. Tracy Painchaud proudly became the first female Infantier to be sworn-in as a member of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada.

Pte Painchaud is not the only female in a Combat Arms position in the Manitoba/N.W. Ontario Militia District however. The Royal Winnipeg Rifles have two females in Infantry positions and there is one female "crewman" with the Fort Garry Horse.

Pte Painchaud travelled to Vernon, B.C. this past summer for her Basic and General Military training courses and is now training in regular duties with her Regiment.

Pte Painchaud says, to her, the Infantry presents the type of challenges and experiences that would not be available to her in any other branch of the military. She cites the physical demands and the quick decisions needed by the Infantry just to stay alive in their hostile environment as the type of the activities she eagerly looks forward to.

Pte Painchaud says she has had a long fascination with the military, particularly the "front line soldier" aspect.

"Sure there's added pressure in being the only female in the Regiment", she says, "but that just makes me more determined to prove myself, and to others in the unit, that I'm a good soldier."

Pte Painchaud says she feels a little uncomfortable with the fact that she has broken tradition by becoming the first female in what to now has been strictly a "man's world"... but she says, "that is not

why I decided to join the Infantry or the Camerons".

"I did it for my own personal reasons and not to become a trail-blazer for other females".

Pte Painchaud says she had been treated well during her time with the Regiment and considers the best compliment she can receive from her fellow soldiers is "to be treated exactly the same as anyone else in the outfit".

Pte Painchaud intends to complete high school and then to go on to university. "The Army Reserves will help pay for that", she says.

Pte Painchaud also intends to vigorously pursue her military development as well, with the view towards someday extending her tradition-breaking role by becoming the first female Infantry Officer in the Manitoba/N.W. Ontario Militia District.

New Chief of Reserves & Cadets

Major-General Frederic Mariage, CD, is the new Chief of Reserves and Cadets. He took over the helm on the 1st of September from Rear-Admiral W.N. (Wally) Fox-Decent, who completed his tour of three years.

Maj-Gen. Mariage was born on Bone, Algeria, in 1942 and came to Canada as a student in administration in 1965. He began his studies at the Laval University, Quebec City. As he became a citizen of our country he also became an Infantry Officer with the Voltigeurs De Quebec and later the 6e Bataillon Royal 22e Regiment. He became the commander of the Royal 22e Regiment in 1975. In 1980 he was appointed Commander, District #2 du Quebec (Milice). On July 16th, 1990, he was promoted major-general and later appointed to his present position.

As a civilian, Maj-Gen. Mariage is Director General, Eastern Canada, for MacMillan Bloedel (a multi-national lumber firm based in Vancouver). He is married to the former Odette Grellant and they have three children.

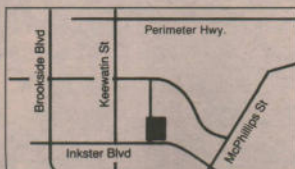

Preparing For Retirement

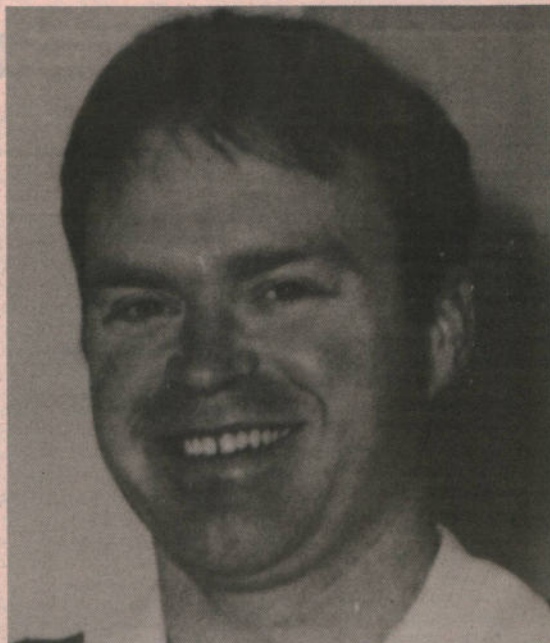
Do you have fifteen or more years of service? Are you about to be released from the CF for medical reasons? If so, you may be asking yourself questions such as:

- How is terminal leave calculated?
- Do I qualify for UIC?
- What things should I look for when buying a home?
- Is my military will adequate?
- How do I start a small business?

These are normal questions which should be asked by anyone within five years of retirement. The answers to these questions, and many more, will be answered at the Second Career Assistance Network (SCAN) seminar to be held on 6 and 7 March 1991, in the CFANS theatre (Building 84). Because retirement affects the entire family, spouses are urged to attend.

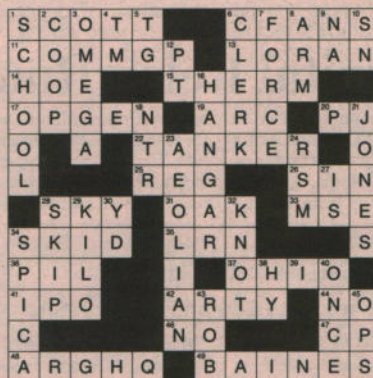
The SCAN program is coordinated by Personnel Selection Officers (PSOs). It is designed to provide information to retiring members on issues that will affect them during, and after, their transition to civilian life. This information is disseminated by military and civilian specialists in order to provide the most comprehensive and current advice available. This advice and information is conveyed through three avenues: seminars; workshops; and interviews. Seminars run for two to three days and cover a broad range of topics. Workshops normally take a day or a half-day to complete, and involve a small group discussion on specific topics such as resume writing or job search techniques. These are provided on a demand basis; when we have enough people expressing interest in a given topic, we organize a workshop. Finally, individual counselling is offered to individuals who require a one-on-one session to address their problems or concerns.

Anyone wishing to partake in the upcoming SCAN seminar, or interested in workshops and counselling, must first register with the Base Personnel Selection Office (BPSO) at local 5471.

Who is Saddam Hussein?

Dear Friends,

During September, I researched the life of President Saddam Hussein of Iraq. My enquiries took me to the British Military Academy, Sandhurst, where considerable research is going on concerning military leadership in several nations.

Orphaned at the age of nine months, Saddam's life has been a catalogue of disappointment, violence and ruthlessness. He lived 160 kilometers North of Baghdad, the son of a peasant farmer and his wife. When they died, young Saddam went to live with his uncle, an officer in the Iraqi army, where he learned military tactics, intrigue and power politics even though he did not go to school until he was nine years old.

Saddam's main ambition was to become an officer in Iraq's army and he became bitterly disappointed when rejected by the authorities at Baghdad's elite Military Academy.

The nearest Saddam ever got to military combat was to become

an assassin in the rebellious Baath party who in the 1960's sought to overthrow the military leader Abdul Kassem. Saddam was appointed to the murderous team who riddled the General's car with machine-gun bullets; amazingly the General survived. Loyal troops pursued the assassins, killing some and wounding Saddam in the left leg.

Saddam later recounted how he escaped and hid and dug the bullet out of his leg using a razor dipped in iodine. Then he described how he disguised himself as a bedouin tribesman, swam the Euphrates then stole a donkey and crossed the Syrian desert, finally seeking refuge in Egypt where, in due course, he somehow met Colonel Nasser, who quickly recognised Saddam as a fellow "Pan Arab", and further encouraged the young man by sponsoring him at law school in Cairo.

Saddam's studies were short-lived and he lost patience with the endless debates of his fellow students... "Why argue with him?" he once shouted... "Why

not take a gun and shoot him?" This was his attitude for the next fifteen years, and when he returned to Iraq he began recruiting fighters for militia attached to the Baath party in Baghdad.

In 1968 the Baath party, having overthrown the government, led Iraq through changing times; Saddam was deftly working his way up the ladder of government until in 1979 he was 'number 2' in the Nation of Iraq. Before long, the President retired as an elderly man and Saddam became President!

Two of his early actions were to appoint himself General and to execute twenty-one of the cabinet on charges of treason! He had met the Ayatollah Khomeini shortly after Khomeini came to power in Iran. The Ayatollah accused Saddam of blasphemy in the Muslim faith... (The Ayatollah is a Shiite Muslim whilst Saddam is a Suni Muslim). In 1980, relations between Iran and Iraq got worse until later that year, Saddam declared war on Iran.

Iraq was vastly superior in

military strength and weapons, but Iran fought hard. Saddam's army of nearly a million was humiliated as war dragged on for years; then Saddam used deadly nerve gas, condemning thousands of Iranians to agony and death. When a few years later, his own people rose up against him, Saddam bombed their villages with the same agonizing weapon, killing thousands.

After eight years the Iran-Iraq war ended in stalemate, and Saddam had an army of a million men and a tattered economy. What do you do with an army that size? Saddam used them to fight Kuwait and restore his Nation's economy, incurring the World's condemnation.

Saddam Hussein is an Arab, a descendant of Abraham. The first Arab was Abraham's illegitimate son Ishmael. Just before Ishmael was born, an angel came to Hagar his mother and said "... he will be a wild donkey of a man, his hand will be against every man, and every man's hand will be against him..." What a very appropriate description of today's most notorious Arab, Saddam Hussein.

Although many nations have assassination plans for Saddam, the Lord would rather not the

death of a sinner, but that he should turn from his wickedness and live. I pray that Saddam might come to know the one true God through the Lord Jesus Christ who came to save sinners, like you and me, and Saddam Hussein.

The next phase of my research centred around Saddam's hero, King Nebuchadnezzar. Like him, Saddam wants to lead Jerusalem into captivity. I wonder if he knows that Nebuchadnezzar finally came to know the one true God. He too was a 'wild donkey', and spent seven years eating grass. (See Daniel Ch 4: vs 33-37). The account ends with, "Now I, Nebuchadnezzar, praise, exalt, and honour The King of Heaven, for all His works are true and His ways just, and He is able to humble those who walk in pride."

I too, praise, exalt and honour the same Living God of Abraham, and pray that He would bring Saddam Hussein to a saving knowledge of Himself in the same way He brought Nebuchadnezzar to salvation so long ago.

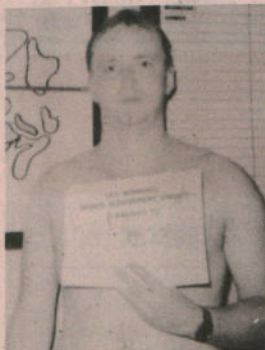
