Working for Peace in Yugoslavia

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia — It's like nothing else he's ever done. But for Sgt. Daniel Saint-Pierre and ten other members of the Canadian Forces drawn from units at NDHQ and 1 Canadian Division Forward, monitoring the fragile ceasefires in war-torn Yugoslavia is an experience he'll never forget.

"This is the first time I've been involved in something like this," says the administration clerk from Ottawa. "It's a first for everybody."

Soon after Sgt. Saint-Pierre's Oct. 10 arrival in Zagreb, the capital city of Croatia, the wail of air raid sirens left little doubt in his mind that he and his comrades were in a war zone. The sight of shattered glass from actual attacks bore witness to the fact that months of fierce fighting since the republic of Croatia declared independence last June, was not yet over.

International media have described the fighting as the bloodiest in Europe since the Second World War. There have been 13 ceasefire accords, most of them backed by the European Community. In November, the United Nations sponsored the 14th and hopefully final truce. UN peacekeepers cannot be deployed until the fighting stops.

"But conditions are slowly changing," says Sgt. Saint-Pierre. "There are a lot of refugees coming in from the Dalmatian coast Vukovar — an increasing number of refugees."

And although there are still troops in the streets and pieces of tape over panes of broken glass from the air attacks, Sgt. Saint-Pierre optimistically says things do seem to be getting better.

"We haven't had any air raid alerts for the last two weeks," he says. "Life is getting back to normal. The trams are starting to run at night and on the weekends and the street lights are on again at night until about 2 a.m."

The 11-member CF mission helping to monitor ceasefire

efforts are working out of four locations: in Yugoslav capital of Belgrade, in Sarajevo, Split, and Zagreb.

Yugoslavia is located in southern Europe and borders on the Adriatic Sea as well as Italy, Austria, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Greece, and Albania. Following the First World War in 1918, it was established as a kingdom (the Kingdom of Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes). In 1945, Yugoslavia became a six-republic federation. Since June 25 when Croatia declared its independence, 13 failed ceasefires have been struck by the European Community. The 14th is sponsored by the United Nations.





Air Reserve Augmentation Flight (ARAF) Update

With 1991 now behind us, it's time to reflect on our accomplishments for the year and realize how much we, as reservists, have contributed to the overall operation of our Armed Forces and indirectly to the well-being of our nation. From the Gulf war to CFS Alert, reservists have anonymously performed their duty in a dedicated and professional manner. On a smaller scale, but cer-

tainly as important, the 51 members of ARAF Winnipeg have played an important role in the day to day operation of CFB Winnipeg. While getting valuable training in preparation for their war augmentation role, our cooks, nurses, administrative clerks, finance clerks, and the 19 remaining trades have provided tremendous assistance to each of their individual sections.

In 1991, the unit has grown from 44 to 51 members with a

mix of 17 officers and 34 NCM occupying 23 different trades. The majority of these reservists are working an average of 10 days a month, sharing the rest of their time with their civilian employer and, of course, family. It is a delicate triangulation that requires, at times, the best juggling skills.

As for 1992, it promises to be quite a challenge for ARAF Winnipeg. Even though the war augmentation role of the ARAF will remain unchanged, the bene-

fits in peacetime will continue to be recognized and accepted as a vital component to the Total force structure. The individual contribution of an ARAF member will be most rewarding as the quality of their work and the relevance of their service will result in concrete accomplishment of daily tasks. In addition, with the closure of CFB Portage, a transfer of positions will take place resulting in an increase of ARAF activities.

In summary, 1992 is going to be another very exciting year for ARAF Winnipeg and the Air Reserve in general, the fruits of your efforts will be a stronger and revitalized Total Force.

"Schools everywhere are struggling with the issue of disruption caused by students who find themselves in conflict with other students, teachers or the system in general." Jameswood School administrative and teaching staff are addressing the problem in as many ways as possible. To be known as a 'non-violent school', is a difficult characteristic to achieve, particularly when there is such a large turnover in the school population from year to year, as well as the predictable changes in the administrative and teaching staff.

The crux of the issue of disruption tends to center around student behavioral management issues. Gone are the days of 'dominant-submissive relationships' between a child and his or her parents, teachers, or school principal. Similarly, the 'accepted hierarchy of power' (more powerful imposing its will on the less powerful) is being replaced with relationships that stress equality. In cases of conflict, "decree and force are no longer sufficient to maintain the status quo".

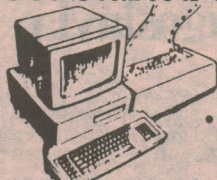

Operation Identification is a program designed to discourage theft of valuables from your home and other locations and provide a way to easily identify stolen property.

The program has dramatically reduced the profit in stolen goods. Marked articles are difficult to dispose of and easily traced. Thus, if it is advertised that your valuables are protected by Operation Identification, you will less likely be victimized.

Operation Identification works whether your property is stolen or lost. Property identification makes it easier for police to return personal property.

WHAT NUMBER DO YOU USE?

Use a personal identification mark such as a social insurance number.

TAKE THE OFFENSIVE:

Operation identification is basic step to prevent theft. Good lighting, good locks, and other security precautions can be taken to prevent crime in your community.

The engraving tool can be signed out at the MP section, Whytewold entrance, telephone number 833-5204.

HELPFUL HINTS ON OPERATION IDENTIFICATION

- Don't put decals on your doors or windows unless you have engraved your property.
- Be sure to make a record of your property. Keep it in a safe place.
- When engraving, hold the tool straight up, not on a slant.
- The engraving tool has a depth adjuster. Adjust to the hardness of the material you are engraving.
- For deterrent purposes, the identification number should be visible. A second hidden number can be applied if required.

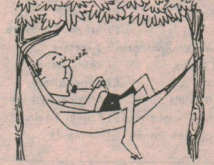
Dust off the bowling shoes peo-

The resolution of conflict must now, in today's society and school system, take place in a more equalized relationship. Mutuality, co-operativeness and equalized relationship. Mutuality, co-operativeness and equalness are the necessities of a successful relationship! Fortunately, Jameswood staff recognizes this and is attempting to facilitate such relationships by enhancing the anger management, impulse control and empathetic skills of their students. It is a task to which the entire school is committed.

In recent weeks, two relatively new concepts have been focussed upon by the Jameswood School staff - a Conflict Medi-Mediation Program and the Second Step Program. Although both programs have been under consideration since the spring of 1991, recent training sessions for the teaching staff have allowed for an anticipated unified beginning for each program within the next few weeks. The skill development included in these programs will hopefully enhance the learning environment within the school and help make school a more positive experience for all students.

Coping with conflict is a complicated task. The Jameswood staff realizes that they cannot

eliminate conflict. It is a fact of life! However, it is hoped that if students are taught to start to look at conflict and understand the nature of it, perhaps it can be lessened and less disruptive.

Conflict can be destructive and harmful, as we well know, depending upon how it is used. Conflict, on the other hand, can also be constructive, and even the healthiest interpersonal relationships are NOT conflict-free. "Conflict is a part of all the relationships we have with other people." Each of us is unique and therefore the ways that we experience the world around us is also unique. Whenever human differences or uniquenesses meet, conflict occurs. There is also no guarantee that all conflicts can be resolved. However, we can change the way that we deal with conflict, and that is one of the primary goals of the Conflict Mediation and Second Step programs.

BSOC 9150 Graduation

Pictured is the recent graduating class of the CFSAS Basic Space Operations Course which was conducted from 27 November to 5 December 1991.

The course members were exposed to topics ranging from the space environment and orbital mechanics to Canada's future space programmes. The aim of the course is to familiarize officers with space operations and the impact on their occupations. It provided a basic introduction of the terminology and concepts associated with space. The BSOC curriculum includes lectures and briefings in space sciences, space policy and doctrine, and space programmes and operations. The course members quickly recognized the significance of space to their operations and occupations and that Canada was one of the first nations involved in space activity. The group was very dynamic and provided excellent debate during discussions about the relevance of manned space activity, whether Canada should have a launch facility, and space surveillance from a Canadian perspective.

Guest speakers from Telesat Canada and Space Commerce Corporation augmented the course. Mr Barry Turner, Director, Satellite Control Systems Division, provided an overview of Telesat history and current status. As a former CF officer, he gave added insight into the challenges of commercial space opportunities for Canadian companies. Mr Harvey Wasiuta, Senior Commercial Expert, Glavkovmos/SSC Canada, gave an overview of the Soviet space policy and programmes. This discussion proved very timely in light of current activities in the Soviet Union. The course members were very receptive to the open debate that ensued.

The CFSAS once again sends out a hearty thanks to LCol Popplow (AIRCOM Flt Surg), and, Mr Barry Konzelman (CFS-MET) for their ongoing support to the school. LCol Popplow has an avid interest in the bioastronautics field, and his presentation is very enlightening. He always attempts to discourage potential astronauts by discussing the "real world" of human engineering in



space. Mr Konzelman applies some of the material learned earlier in the course to explain how space is used right here in actual operations on the base. Both presentations were very well received and CFSAS looks forward to continued participation in its curriculum.

While the course is normally fully loaded by air operations and direct support officer career managers, last minute vacancies sometimes arise. These vacancies are filled locally by the Course Director who manages a "standby list" on a "first come - first served" basis. 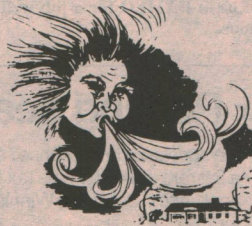

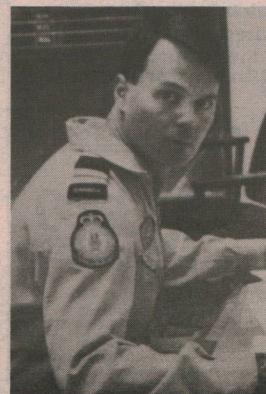
Pilot Training in the Reserves

Greetings from the Chapels

What's Your Sin?

Everyone carries a sin about with him, but what about sins? Sins are not something we talk about readily these days. The reason probably is that the things that were considered to be sins when we were growing up are not considered as such now. When was the last time you felt guilty about reading *Penthouse*? So much of what was once considered sin was in reality social pressure to conform to a stated pattern of behaviour. I don't want to fall into the trap of categorizing sins or implying there are greater or lesser sins. Let's stick to a general definition that sin is anything that prevents you from becoming completely whole. Sin implies guilt, answerability, and responsibility.

Right and wrong, good and evil

are learned at an early age. But as I indicated, so much that used to pass for sin rates scarcely a glance today. In his book, *Whatever Became of Sin?*, Karl Menninger contends that sin is no longer an acceptable concept today. Much of the sinful activity engaged in by adults - gambling, pornography, prostitution, to name only a few - in time became crimes, and the State took over the task of defining a sin. This then made the designation of sin pointless. Neither the ruling of the church or the admonishment of a priest was any longer required, either for sanction or penalty.

Sin as pure sin became a strictly personal matter, an offense which was contrary to one's conscience or moral stan-

dard. Dealing with it was a task left to the pulpit, the confessional and individual conscience.

Sound harsh? I believe it does, for if this were the case, this would be a cold, hard, senseless world all the time, instead of just sometimes.

I believe that we, as men, have continued to retain our sense of sin - the knowledge that our choice of action, if persisted in, will mean separation from our God.

No, we know what sin is, and we experience great guilt because of it. What we have lost is the *sense of forgiveness*. We are absorbed by the thought that everything must be paid for - despite absolution, and the price Christ paid upon the Cross, we don't really believe our guilt is

wiped away.

The Good News is that God bestows favours which we do not merit - if we did deserve them, where would be the gift and where would be our joy? The Parable of the Prodigal Son - the story of the youngest son who spent his inheritance in riotous living, and then returned home to find forgiveness - this parable points out the reward that comes with admitting defeat. It speaks to us of confessing one's sins and experiencing the great celebration that accompanies it.

We, too, are like the Prodigal Son, we feel exiled, impoverished and guilty, and we yearn for the wealth of the home we have abandoned, and for forgiveness.

So sin IS real, but it can be overcome.

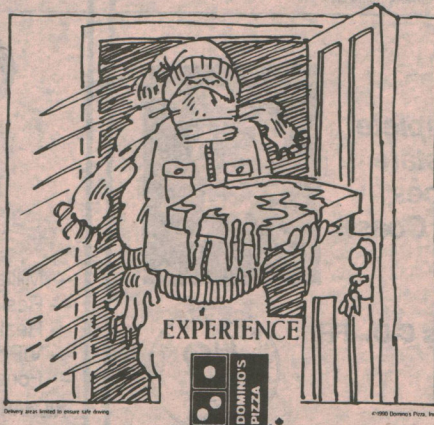

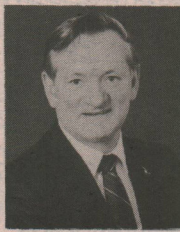
